It may have been the briefest Purcell school board meeting ever (5 minutes), but it was still long enough for superintendent Jason Midkiff to tout the district's upcoming \$19.475 million school bond election.

The special bond election will be October 10.

"We want to get the word out as much as we can," Midkiff told the board Monday afternoon.

Starting with a talk Wednesday with PTO members, Midkiff will be repeating the message often between now and election day.

"I have various days booked to speak to different groups around town," he said.

In addition, open community meetings are planned at 6:30 p.m. September 25 and October 3.

The informative meetings will be in the board's meeting room, the cafeteria/gymna-

When collegestudent Kelsey Harmon snuck a picture of her grandfather munching on a hamburger sitting alone at dining room table when the other five grandchildren were supposed to be there, never in her wildest dreams would there be such a to-do and books written about it.

The tweet eventually went viral and the Harmon family, and 'Sad Papaw' in particular, was internet news around the globe.

With news networks scrounging for information and talk shows going off, the one show in New York City the Harmons almost went to was the Rachel Ray Show. It

So the trip to New York and the Rachel Ray show never materialized. It was the only solid invitation for the Sad Papaw entourage.

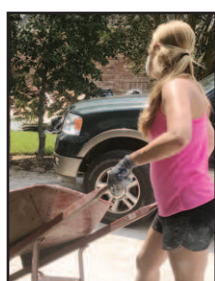

Post-Harvey

Purcell's own Katie Midkiff stepped up to help Texans

Hurricane Harvey hit the Texas coast and the world changed for millions of people. Watching it on TV, Katie Midkiff felt called to do something, anything to help. First she asked her husband, Purcell school superintendent Jason Midkiff, if he would be supportive of her going to Texas to help out for a few days. Absolutely, he told her. Go. Then Katie Midkiff's sister, Kimberly McCage, got wind of her plan and decided to join her.

McCage teaches school at Argyle, Texas, near Denton. She brought items donated by students. Houston was hardest hit by the hurricane and some 50-odd inches of rain. So the two women never made it into Houston proper due to extensive flooding. But they found plenty of people to help in the Cypress area northwest of Houston. "Driving into town, there was house upon house with piles of sheetrock, appliances, belongings," she recalled. "Ten-foot piles in front yards. And businesses were that way

as well." Through social media, Katie Midkiff had become acquainted with a Cypress woman who had been doing boat rescues. The woman opened her home to the pair. "The first couple days we helped people there with demo work," she said. The following day they made their way to a home further south. The resident had just been able to get back into the home the day before. Though some neighborhood streets were still flooded, the water had receded enough that boat rescues had pretty much stopped.

Amidst tragedy and loss, Katie Midkiff found those affected by Hurricane Harvey to be a positive lot. "There were so many volunteers," she said. "The people are real positive and you could feel that unity. "I saw neighbors talking to neighbors, even able to share some laughs." It made her feel fortunate, she went on, that "we haven't had to deal with that here." The work was long, but rewarding. I really enjoy volunteering. I wish I was closer so I could zip down for a day to help." So would she do it again? "Absolutely!" They never got used to all the piles of stuff. "It never gets old," she said. "Every time you see it, it is jaw-dropping. "I don't know how long that stuff will be out there. It's going to take a while."

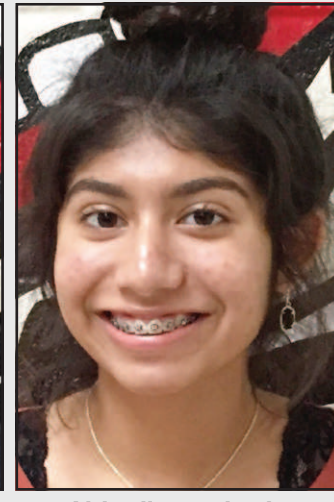

Millsap goes Down Under

Purcell resident works as au pair

When 20-year-old Shelby Millsap decided to become an au pair, her parents thought maybe their home-loving daughter would move to Chicago or perhaps New York City.

So Andie and Tim Millsap were admittedly a little surprised when the job she took was to care for three children in Port Headland, Australia.

It was in no way close to home in Purcell, Oklahoma.

To give you an idea just how far from home it is, Andie and her stepmother, Beth Herrin, decided to visit Shelby last spring.

It took 26 hours flying on three planes to reach Port Headland from Dallas.

The first leg to Sydney, Australia took 17 hours. Then Sydney to Perth was another seven hours and a puddle jumper flight from Perth to Port Headland was two hours in the air.

The women made the trip in April, the start of autumn Down Under.

So they were spared the 120 degree-plus heat of the desert environment.

Andie had just two words for the country around Port Headland.

“Very flat,” she said.

And very remote.

“It takes two hours to get to a Wayne,” she explained.

They visited Broome, which is noted for pearls.

It was an 8-hour drive on a two-lane, very straight highway.

Not only are all the eggs brown, Australians never refrigerate eggs.

Bathrooms proved another new experience since toilets are actually in a separate room from tubs and showers.

Hospitality was over the top.

On the night Andie and Beth reached Port Headland, 40 to 50 Australians showed up “to greet the Americans” with an impromptu barbeque.

“We ate lots of really good food,” Andie recalled.

As for Shelby, she spent a year filling in as mother to kids 4, 6 and 9 years and seeing they made it to school, as well as various after school activities.

Because being an au pair isn’t viewed by the government as holding a job, Shelby had to find work at a Panera-like eatery, earning money and paying taxes for 90 days in order to extend her visa.

Her employment with the first family has ended and Shelby has moved a little closer to home – she is in Perth and hopes to get a position with another family. She is still waiting to hear if her visa is extended.

“She called me the other day and she is homesick,” Andie said.

Shelby will return home for a visit in November and December.

In the meantime, she has met a young man there.

“Two little gas stations were the only thing between the two points,” she recalled. “We passed maybe three cars.”

Given the lack of phone service in the area, it isn’t a place where you’d want to have car trouble.

And what does one do after shopping for pearls? Why, ride a camel of course.

Since the women would be in Australia at Easter, Andie had packed dye with which to color eggs.

That’s when she learned Australian hens lay only brown eggs.

The Equifax security breach has apparently affected only one person on **The Purcell Register** staff.

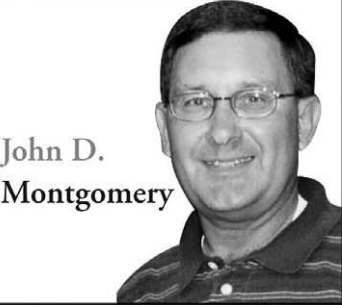
I'll give you two guesses as to whom it is and the first one doesn't count.

Healing after hurricanes

Oklahomans are all too familiar with natural disasters. Having dealt with deadly tornadoes on a regular basis, we are painfully aware of the destruction and heartbreak that they visit upon our communities.

Loss of life, destruction of property, and the hopelessness that settles upon us when mother nature's reign of terror finally subsides, is unfortunately a part of life in this part of the country.

Two weeks ago, our nation was horrified to see the historic damage caused by Hurricane Harvey as it ravaged the city of Houston and the surrounding areas. To date, it is one of the most powerful storms to make landfall in the United States, and will likely exceed the damage caused by Hurricanes Katrina and Sandy.

To put this into perspective, roughly one third of Harris County has been under water sometimes as deep as 50 inches. That is approximately the size of the entirety of Cleveland County.

There are estimates that the cost of the damage brought

about by Harvey will exceed the combined damage of Katrina and Sandy and could approach two hundred billion dollars.

Shortly afterwards this past week, the U.S. suffered another damaging blow from Hurricane Irma. The destruction left in its path will be costly as well. After Harvey, we are prepared to work with and support FEMA again so that they are not spread thin and ready to help with recovery in Florida.

When Moore was hit in 2013 by a devastating EF5 tornado that killed and injured hundreds of people, the outpouring of support from individuals, non-profits and the government was truly astounding. President Obama, who never won a single county in Oklahoma, was on the ground one week later pledging to Oklahoma that "We've got your back."

And while he and his policies were never popular in Oklahoma, I saw personally how much the residents of Moore appreciated his visit and his empathy. On that day we ceased to be Democrats and Republicans and just became

Oklahomans who cared for one another and were willing to do whatever we could to help one another.

Now it's time for all of us to have Houston's and Florida's backs. As recovery efforts continue, it will be hard to predict the exact dollar amount that will be needed in the long run to provide aid immediately. This past week, the House passed a measure that will provide nearly \$8 billion for immediate recovery and relief and \$7 billion for long term reconstruction.

Whatever the numbers may be eventually, we should give the millions of our fellow citizens, first responders, FEMA and other related agencies the resources they need to recover and rebuild.

I commend President Trump, Governor Abbott, Governor Scott and our FEMA officials for their resilience and dedication to helping those in need. More importantly, I am proud to hear of and see the heroism from local law enforcement, first responders, local citizens and volunteers who are on the front lines to help others. Recovery may take time, but as we have in the past, our nation will heal.

Separation of church and state in constitution

Dear Editor:

I was shocked to hear of the suit by Americans for Separation of Church and State against East Central Oklahoma University declaring that the cross on the chapel on campus must be removed. But our Attorney General of Oklahoma said the cross did not have to be removed.

Now, I heard on the news today that entities from The Separation of Church and State from outside Oklahoma are taunting Oklahoma, again saying we must take the cross down.

The ACLU and Americans for Separation of Church and State have brought many suits claiming the separation of church and state. But what does the First Amendment of the Constitution really say?

The First Amendment tells what Congress shall not do? The Bill of Rights was not written to limit the rights of people.

The First Amendment says: Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of a religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof.

How can some interpret this to mean "Separation of Church and State?"

The word separation is not in the first amendment. The word church is not included. The word state is not here. The words Separation of Church and State are not in our US Constitution. But most people believe the words "separation of Church and state" are in the First Amendment.

Where are the words, wall and separation found?

They were found in an obscure letter written by president Thomas Jefferson to a small Baptist Church of Danbury, assuring them that the government would not interfere with their dealings. Jefferson said, "I contemplate with solemn reverence that act of the whole American people which declared that the legislature should 'make no law respecting the establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, thus building a wall or separation between church and state.'"

James Madison, who introduced the Bill of Rights, said that the government was forbidden from establishing a national religion. The First

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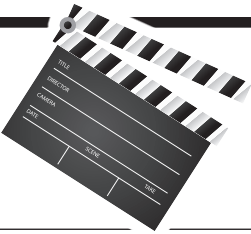
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MOVIES WITH DAVE

An arrangement that changes all their lives in ways they couldn't imagine.

Would you look at that. Finally another romantic comedy. I think this is only the second one of these I've seen all year, the other being "The Big Sick." It's nice to have a break from the typical action flick or R-rated comedy.

And while it is good to have a slight change of pace, the movie's execution of it leaves a lot to be desired, even if I do like the overall concept.

So let's start with what I did like and what I enjoyed about the movie the most, the film's general story.

I have to say, I just love the idea of a bunch of guys, filmmakers no less, crashing at a single mom's house. There's so much fun you can have with that. Sure there's the obvious potential for romance and sexual tension, but the parts I enjoyed the most were when the unlikely housemates just get along as a family.

I especially liked the sort of father/daughter bond that develops between Jon Rudnitsky character and Alice's oldest daughter (Lola Flanery). Probably the most endearing relationship in the whole movie.

Sadly, things start to go downhill from there.

The main romance here is supposed to be between Reese Witherspoon and Nat Wolff's character, and holy crap I did not buy it for a second.

It wasn't Witherspoon necessarily, at least her part of the equation was fairly believable. Wolff was just terrible though. It's like he's going out of his way to try and be the blandest, most boring love interest ever invented.

All he does is talk in hushed tones, look handsome and give Witherspoon smoldering looks. Why the pair fall for each other is anyone's guess, besides both being attractive I guess.

I need more out of a romance than that though. Heck, if anything the film gives Witherspoon more reason to fall for Rudnitsky's character. At least with those two there's some kind of connection, plus there's his prior mentioned relationship with Witherspoon's daughter.

But enough about the romance, this is a romantic COMEDY after all. How are

the laughs in this film?

I do have to admit, this movie does have a fair amount of genuinely funny moments. More than I thought it would in fact. Sadly the large majority of the humor in this film fell flat, or at least it did for me.

Much of the comedy rests on the girls who play Witherspoon's daughters. With her oldest being a walking talking prescription drug commercial, something I find more depressing than funny, and her youngest speaking in a way that's beyond her years, something she does with zero conviction and feels completely unnatural. It just felt like a bunch of adults feeding a kid lines they think would sound funny coming from a little girl. If you find stuff like that funny, great! But to me it just seems forced and artificial.

Plus I can't help but feeling like there's no real stakes in this movie. All the character conflicts feel like they're handled with kid gloves and there never seems to be the potential for anything truly bad to happen. I guess depending on how you look at it, that may very well be a positive though, so I'll just leave it at that.

Like I said, I did enjoy parts of this film. If all you're wanting out of a movie is a cute little romcom with a couple laughs, you'll probably have a fairly good time here. On the other hand, if you prefer your comedies to have a bit more of an edge, you should probably look elsewhere.

Next up, a film based on the classic Stephen King horror novel, "It." When children start disappearing from the small town of Derry, Maine, a group of misfit kids band together to discover the fate of their missing friends and family members.

All the while, the group is forced to face their greatest fears as they encounter the infamous and terrifying clown, Pennywise (Bill Skarsgård).

You never know what you're in for with a Stephen King movie. While the man is a very talented author with dozens of bestselling books, the films based on his work have been notoriously hit or miss.

Heck, you only have to go back a few weeks to find one of those lackluster adaptations with last month's "The Dark Tower."

So while I admit I was quite hopeful going into this movie, you'll understand when I say my expectations were still very reserved.

With that said, I am very happy to report that my concerns were unwarranted. This movie is fantastic.

I'm not sure if I can say this is my favorite horror film of the year. Jordan Peele's "Get Out" is still in contention after all. It's by far the scariest though.

I was not prepared for how genuinely creepy this movie would be. Scene after scene was filled with incredibly creative and truly terrifying moments. Scenes that had me wide-eyed and made my skin crawl.

While it's not gory to an extreme, this movie is bloody and incredibly unsettling. Only to be amplified by some very creative camera work and clever use of computer generated elements.

But you can't talk about "It" without mentioning the king clown himself, and I must say Pennywise is the stuff of nightmares in this movie.

Skarsgård's performance is

brilliantly unnerving, especially in his facial expressions. I couldn't even imagine seeing this movie if I was already afraid of clowns.

And it's not just Pennywise who's great here. The kids, our band of misfits, are the real stars of the movie.

I've said it many times, but you never know what you're going to be in for when it comes to child actors. So many kids just can't cut it, either from their own lack of experience or just from directors who are incapable of getting solid performances out of younger actors.

Not here though. All the kids here do an amazing job.

This film does something so few movies seem capable of, kids who actually act like kids. They aren't unnaturally smart, they don't speak like adults, they're just kids and they talk and behave like you'd expect kids would. What a concept.

Despite a killer clown around, this movie really captures the feeling of being a kid wonderfully, something I haven't seen this well done since movies like "The Sandlot" or "The Goonies."

It's also surprisingly funny.

I wasn't expecting to laugh at all during this film, but some parts here had me rolling.

Much like "Get Out" earlier this year, the humor doesn't destroy the tension, it enhances it, giving you much needed moments to catch your breathe. Plus it strengthens your connection with the characters and makes you care about what happens to them that much more.

I don't know what else to say. This movie is fantastic. One of the best horror movie experiences I've ever had.

I would be shocked if there was a better scary film all season. If you're going to the theater for terror, you can do no better.

"It" is rated R.



Last this week I saw "9/11." Five people, unrelated by anything besides location, find themselves in an elevator when the unthinkable happens. The elevator stops and the group ends up trapped with no way of escape or connection to the outside world.

Little do they know the worst attack on American soil just occurred and they're right in the middle of it, stuck inside the north tower of the World Trade Center.

When you film a movie about a massive tragedy like the September 11th terrorist attacks, you need actors who can handle the subject with grace. People who can treat the event with the gravity and respect the victims deserve.

Or you can be like this movie and just hire Charlie Sheen.

I honestly thought this film was a joke when I first heard about it. Why on Earth would you star Charlie Sheen in a movie about 9/11? Who thought that'd be a good idea?

None of the actors, including Sheen, have the skill to handle a story like this.

This movie is what they would call a "bottle episode" in television, meaning the large majority of the story takes place in a single location, a trope usually used by producers to save on budget.

That's not to say it's necessarily a bad concept. The classic 1950s movie "12 Angry Men" uses the same basic trope exceedingly well, but to pull it off you really need top notch

I taught seven years at what is now the junior high school. The building still leaks when it rains, it has asbestos in parts of the building and from a security standpoint it is a nightmare.

Too many doors to secure.

Conger field is worse.

I have coached here in Purcell for 17 years. I spend five days a week at the football field during the year and during the season seven days and more than 35 hours a week at the field and in both buildings at Conger Field.

The old field house leaks and has mold. Most of you would not allow your child to be in a building with mold and we have to have our junior high players dress in the building and allow other teams to dress in it.

Many of you are former players and know what it was like when you played. It has not changed in fact it is worse.

I know many of you don't want the stands to be changed. Red Hill is slowly sliding onto Conger Field. If this bond issue passes, at least \$500,000 if not more will go toward a retaining wall to keep it from continuing to slide onto the field.

If we don't do something now, it is possible in 5-10 years there will not be football at Conger Field because it will cost too much to fix compared to building a new facility.

We have had other football fields in Purcell before but if you want to keep this one where it is vote yes on the bond issue. A no vote is a vote to move the field somewhere else in the future.

Tips for charitable giving after disasters

In the wake of Hurricane Harvey's widespread damage throughout Texas and the pending arrival of Hurricane Irma on the Florida coast, the Oklahoma Society of Certified Public Accountants offers these tips to make sure well-intentioned donations make it to those who need it most.

1. Look at charity review services and research online. You will want to make sure the charity is registered and legitimate. The most popular services are Charity Navigator (www.charitynavigator.org), GuideStar (www.guidestar.org) and the BBB's Wise Giving Alliance (www.give.org). Many charities have similar sounding names and some use donations more wisely than others.

2. Avoid getting scammed. Make sure to thoroughly

research the organization to which you are making a donation. Here are tips for avoiding scams:

- Don't fall for copycats. Some scammers use names similar to a reputable organization, so always double check that you're giving to the right organization.
- Be wary of email and social media requests. Links to third party sites could be links to fake webpages designed to phish your information, so its best to go directly to the organization's site.
- Don't provide personal information. Some charities may ask for your name or email address, but if they ask for your social security or driver's license number, it could be a scam.

Most legitimate charitable organizations have no need for

either of those numbers.

And, while it is not the primary goal for helping others, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) still allows taxpayers to deduct charitable donations, so be sure you take these steps to receive proper tax benefits for any donations:

3. Non-cash donations require a tax acknowledgement. Typically, you have to determine the item's fair market value (FMV). Substantiation of the goods donated could include the following:

- List of the goods donated and their condition (must be in "good" condition or better);
- FMV (usually thrift shop value) of used items. Valuation guides can be found on the Goodwill website or the Salvation Army website;
- Any item worth more than \$5,000 must be appraised professionally in order to make a claim. You will want to keep a copy of the appraisal;
- If you donate a car, truck, boat or airplane worth more than \$500, you will need a written acknowledgment and 1098-C from the organization before you can take a deduction;
- If your non-cash donations are valued at \$500 or more, a Form 8283 Non-Cash Char-

itable Contributions must be filled out and attached to your tax return. For this, you will also need the original purchase price and/or the original date of purchase or how it was acquired;

- Travel to and from donation locations — as well as miles driven while doing volunteer work — are deductible at 14 cents per mile; and

- For a donation of publicly-traded securities, the high/low-average market price on the date of transfer to the charitable organization is considered the FMV.

4. There are some things you cannot deduct. Even if you give something valuable, it does not mean you can deduct it. For example: the IRS will not allow you to deduct the value of your time or services, including blood donations or income lost while you work as an unpaid volunteer for a qualified organization.

Breakfast helps set the state for academic success

Mornings during the school year can be a hectic blur for both parents and students trying to get out the door, but that should not be an excuse to skip breakfast.

Whether it is a piece of whole wheat toast and a glass of milk or a more elaborate spread, the morning meal sets the stage for a successful day of learning.

"There's a strong link between breakfast and how well students perform at school," said Deana Hildebrand, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension Service nutrition specialist. "Research has connected breakfast to better memory, test scores and attention span as well as better

overall nutrition."

Figuring out how to slide breakfast into an already jam-packed morning routine can be tricky or overwhelming. But, there are some strategies that can make it less challenging.

For instance, consider getting a head start on breakfast the night before or focus on stocking up on healthy options children can take with them.

Options for make-ahead meals include measuring out a bowl of a favorite cold cereal and pre-cutting fresh fruit.

Meanwhile, nutritionally solid on-the-go breakfast choices range from hard-boiled eggs to homemade muffins to bagels with low-fat cream cheese.

"Don't be afraid to get creative," Hildebrand said.

"It doesn't always have to be cereal and low-fat milk. Focus on building a meal that includes protein along with fruits and vegetables."

Parents also should explore if the school or child care provider offers a breakfast meal.

"The important thing is that families make time for breakfast each morning," Hildebrand said. "Of course, it's not realistic to expect a full sit-down meal, but children should be able to eat without feeling pressured to hurry."

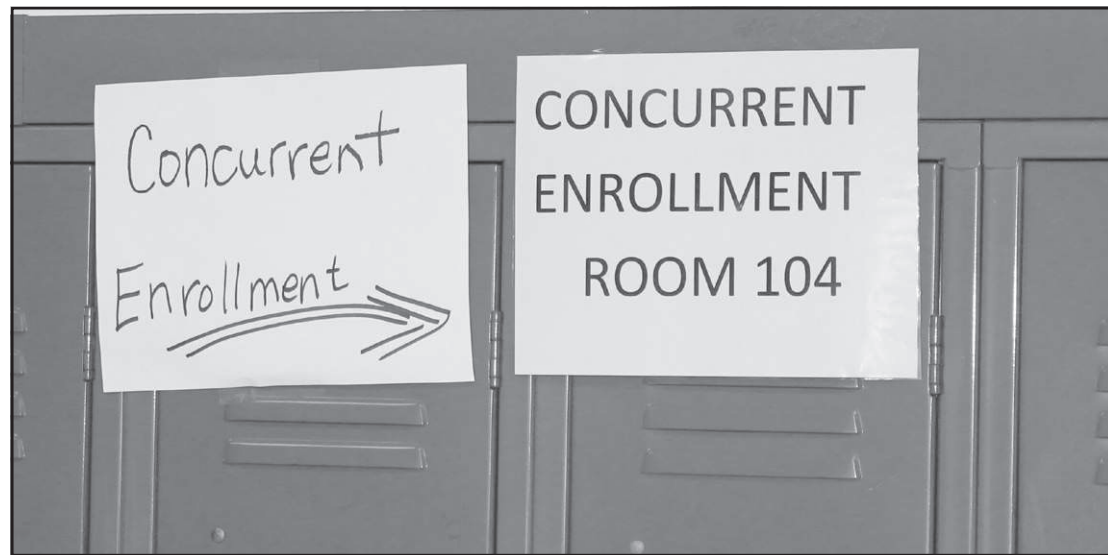

College students should budget

It is true, college students are not known for having a lot of money, but that does not take away the need for a budget. In fact, it may be even more important to know how much is coming in and going out of the bank account.

No matter a person's age, building a budget is generally the same: Income minus expenses equals the amount that can be saved or spent on extras. However, having a plan and working that plan can help students better manage their often limited funds.

"Goals provide direction," said Cindy Clampet, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension assistant state specialist, family resource management. "Deciding what's most important helps people use their money and resources to the best advantage."

For college students, examples of goals may include

paying for school or saving for a car.

After establishing clear goals, the next step is to create a spending plan.

Developing an effective spending plan involves taking a close look at income and expenses as well as credit use and any reserve accounts where funds are set aside for quarterly, semiannual and annual expenses such as car insurance.

"To get a good idea of your financial picture, it's important to figure out how much money is available and where funds are being spent," Clampet said.

Write down all sources of income and all expenses, finalize the plan then put it into action.

"Be prepared to make adjustments to the plan as you go along," Clampet said. "This may take some time and require changes in some of your financial habits. Just keep your goals in mind for motivation and encouragement."

Finally, one unique consid-

eration for college students may be the order in which they spend financial aid.

Students should spend "free money" such as grants and scholarships first before using funds earned or saved through working or the federal work study program. Finally, they should use money gained through loans.

"Spending school funds in this order will keep the amount you borrowed as low as possible, which in turn should allow you to pay off the debt faster," Clampet said.

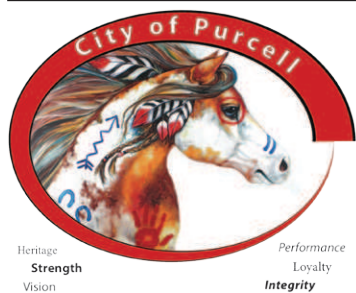

Collection, Hauling and Disposal of Municipal Solid Waste Change in Collection Time

The City of Purcell has an exclusive contract with WCA of Oklahoma to collect, haul and dispose of municipal solid waste within the city's corporate limits.

Collection Time—Pick up is now the last Monday of the month beginning in October. Items are not to be put out by the curb until that weekend prior.

Bulk Waste—Brush or limbs shall be bundled in no larger than three feet x three feet bundles. No furniture larger than a pickup bed or that exceeds 75 pounds. Appliances must have refrigerant/compressor legally removed and shall not exceed 75 pounds. Yard waste such as leaves and grass clippings must be bagged. All items must be bagged and no loose items will be picked up.

Hazardous Waste—Solid waste identified or listed as a hazardous waste by the administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) or so classified by any federal or State of Oklahoma statute, rule, order or regulation should not be put out for collection. This includes tire, paint or oil products.

"Curns went by both spellings," Kenny related. "When he left Verden he went to the Harmon spelling. He would be gone for weeks at a time and when he would return home he would have nothing to say.

"That's when the family figured out he was running with outlaws in Missouri," Kenny noted.

"He was either with the Youngers gang or the James gang," Kenny said.

Both were notorious.

"We know it was one of those two but we're not sure which one."

Harmon has about 300 copies of the book for his personal sale but is not sure of the number on sale on Amazon and Books-A-Million.

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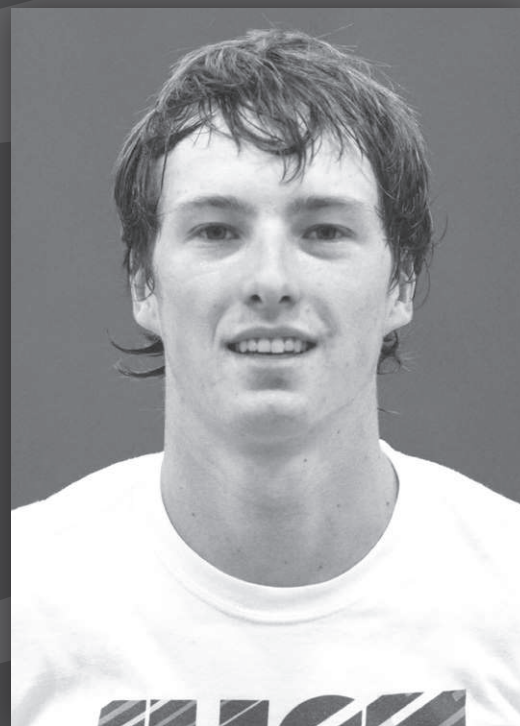

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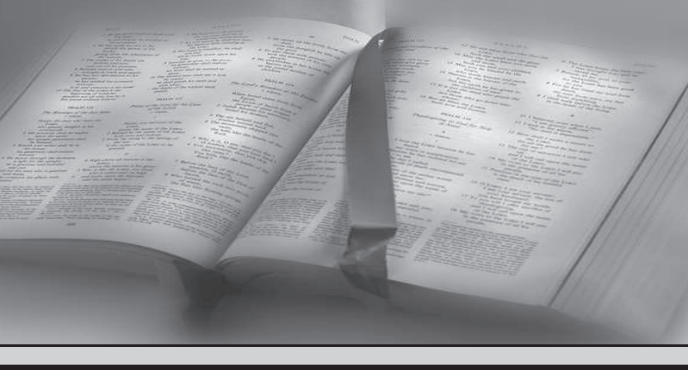

Very good week to all! Welcome to the "front porch."

The other Lord's Day we "changed pace" a bit and visited with the congregation about the importance of having a "good day," using Paul's beautiful writing of Philippians 4 as a basis. We called that sermon, "A Horrible, Terrible, No-good, Very Bad Day."

Maybe you all can relate. For this week I want to write something for all of you that, we hope, will help you on those bad days.

We can begin by saying, don't hang around with those mean, negative people. Don't involve yourself with grueling, aggravating chores. And don't listen to bad, grumpy news during the day, if you can help it.

"Okay," you say, "so you're sayin' to quit my job."

Well, good point. Better not do that. But maybe you can close the door to your office every now and then, if you have one. Somehow, better put up a little shield - like when you looked at the eclipse - to keep from having too many of those bad days.

You see, I have come today with some breaking news: We absolutely, positively cannot afford a bad day!

Several years ago, I sent out

an e-mail at my Red Oak High School in Texas recruiting teachers and school employees to re-enlist in our weekly "pep talks" we sent out. Somehow - on one of those bad computer days - the system swallowed up my old list, so I had to get a new one. Many good teachers wrote back to us quickly, saying, "Add me on." Then I received this desperate message.

"Coach," the teacher wrote, "please put me on your e-mail list. I had a TERRIBLE day yesterday!" The "caps," by the way, not mine. She was a junior high teacher, which tells us all we need to know.

I don't know what happened "yesterday" with my new friend. But I couldn't help thinking of all the bad things that could've gone wrong. The list might've made Gone With The Wind look like nothing but a comic strip, just not quite as funny.

But for the sake of my new teacher friend, I quickly assembled my mailing list and wrote a little piece reminding all, "You can't afford a bad day!"

The truth is: You don't have to be a junior high teacher to have a bad day (although it doesn't hurt). We all have bad ones, and - chances are - about

half of you right now are having one. If you are, stop it! Stop it right now! Close the door, turn off the news, slip out the back door, breathe deeply, say a big prayer, grab a Snickers. Do something!

Here's why I know: One day near the twilight of my teaching career, I was having a bad day. I had earned it, and I was enjoying it to the fullest! I took my bad, bad, bad day to the hallway between classes and was standing at my classroom door, when one of my sweet young students walked up to me with a friend; and she dropped a bombshell:

"Coach," she said, "this is my friend Mary Ann. Mary Ann's been having a really bad day, so I wanted her to meet you. I knew that if she met you you'd help her feel better."

Ouch. (By the way, if you want to know one way to end a bad day immediately, that's it.)

I learned something that day: You may think you can, you may think you have earned it, and you may think you're fully entitled to it.

But the truth is: We really, really can NOT afford a bad day. Just ask Mary Ann.

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Matthew's Gospel has a very clear composition. It contains five major discourses (speeches) of Jesus, alternating with accounts of his deeds and miracles. Chapter 18 is the fourth major discourse of Matthew's Gospel and is very important. Here Jesus gives a speech about how we are to live together as Church, as a community of faith. It is called the "ecclesiastical discourse" because it contains very specific instructions to the people of faith - we are to be humble, we ought to avoid scandal, and we ought to seek the lost ones as God does.

At the beginning of the chapter, Jesus places a little child before the disciples. He says "You all are to be humble like this little child." For many years,

I thought this meant that we should be curious like a child, or to be awed at discovering new things about God. But now I think that Jesus also meant something else. He meant for us to let go of our pride, because our pride keeps us from being in real relationship with other people.

Secondly, Jesus wants us to avoid sin - even if we have to cut off an arm or a leg or pluck out an eye to avoid sin. Jesus takes sin very seriously and so should we also. Third, Jesus wants us to seek the lost as God does. He gives us the little parable about leaving the ninety-nine sheep to search after the one who is lost (Mt 18:10-14). God seeks us when we are lost in our sin. God seeks us when we have made mistakes. God seeks us when we turn away from him.

And finally Jesus gives us a three-part process of how we should do what God does, how we should seek the lost one in our community who is doing serious sin, either against us or against themselves. First, we meet with that person one on one. Out of respect for that person, we keep the sin confidential and private. We want to resolve this simply and quietly. If our brother does not reconcile, then we ask another small group to join us. This will show our brother that this case is not only my judgment, but the judgment of others also. And if the brother still refuses to acknowledge his

guilt, then we bring matters to the whole church.

Reconciliation is not an easy thing to do. It requires of us to be very clear, to be sympathetic and to accept criticism. We do not like to be accused of being self-righteous. We do not like to be accused of being perfect. And, of course, no one of us is perfect.

But the community of faith depends on honesty and respect and truth. Jesus is calling us to this today. Let us pray that we will have the courage to be honest with each other, to admit our own weaknesses, and to gently admonish those who live in serious sin.

Fr. Nerio led a three-day "Summer Mission" this past week on the topic "Why am I a Catholic?" The mission centered on the four marks of the Church - the Church is one, holy, catholic and apostolic.
