

High noon opening Variety of bills await legislators

Come high noon Monday, the Oklahoma Legislature will be in session, ready to tackle the state's business, as well as a number of bills that have little if anything to do with governing.

Lawmakers representing this area - Reps. Bobby Cleveland and Tim Downing and Sens. Paul Scott and John Sparks - have authored 60 bills and a handful of resolutions they hope to see become state law during the upcoming session.

Sparks is co-author of Senate Bill 1, perhaps the briefest measure legislators will be asked to approve.

It is also one which will cause the greatest grief to residents if it isn't passed.

The bill would bring Oklahoma into compliance with the Real ID Act of 2005.

It was on former Gov. Brad Henry's watch that the state initially refused to implement driver's license requirements of the act.

The current extension granted by the federal government will run out in 2018, after

When firemen arrived on scene, there was fire coming from all windows and rooms at 217.S. Third Street.







HB 1013 offers solution to rural health care crisis

One year ago I wrote an op-ed about the health care crisis in rural Oklahoma. At that time, as the administrator of Cordell Memorial Hospital, I'd been trying to recruit a second physician for 18 months.

A year later, that situation hasn't changed. Despite a competitive salary and generous benefits, the position remains unfilled.

The residents of Cordell are not alone in seeing their access to health care dwindle to the point of crisis. It's happening in rural communities across Oklahoma and around our nation. Each year, rural Americans have fewer and fewer choices for their health care, wait longer for appointments and drive farther for the

House Bill 1013, by Rep. Josh Cockroft, is a step toward changing that. The measure would allow nurse practitioners (NPs) to practice to the full scope of their education and training and eliminate the unnecessary requirement that they pay for a collaborative agreement with a physician.

Let's be clear: nothing in HB 1013 changes the scope of practice for NPs in Oklahoma. NPs are already working in communities across our state without any supervision from physicians. The so-called collaborative agreements are often nothing more than a formality, but a formality that can cost an NP tens of thousands of dollars each year.

Furthermore, current law states that physicians can only have agreements with up to two

NPs. That places a hard cap on the number of NPs allowed to work in Oklahoma, and it's rural residents who suffer most under that limit.

Our state ranks 49th in physician-to-patient ratio and study after study shows poor marks for the health of our residents. That's not a coincidence. Oklahomans are sicker and die younger for a host of factors, including a lack of access to affordable, quality health care.

Giving full practice authority to nurse practitioners is not a radical idea. It's law in 21 other states, including neighboring Colorado and New Mexico. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs recently granted full practice authority to NPs working in V.A. facilities

Charter schools have regulatory financial edge over "traditional" public schools

Although many early pilgrimages to North America were based on a desire for freedom from governmentally imposed religious dictates. against the British Crown 150 years later their primary complaint was taxation without representation.

Consequently, the bedrocks upon which our government is founded are that (1) neither the government nor the will of the majority will dictate anyone's religious beliefs and (2) citizens will always control taxation and expenditures through the power of the ballot box.

Our representative democracy preserves our right to "vote out" elected officials who fail to be accountable with public tax dollars. When voters fail in their duty, the fault lies with no one but themselves.

Alarmingly, the proliferation of charter schools in Oklahoma is evidence of voters failing in their duty. For years, rural legislators tenaciously protected the local control of education in the communities they represented. Unfortunately, political cash has recently tilted the balance of power from those who protect the authority of voters and the boards of education they elect to those who allow public tax dollars to be siphoned into the pockets of corporate charter school sponsors.

In 2015, Senate Bill 782 created a procedure to allow the State Department of Education as much.

to approve a charter school to be located in any community in the state even if the locally elected school board objected. The legislation passed primarily along party lines with only when the colonists pushed back five Republican legislators voting with the Democrats in opposition to this bill that undermined local control.

schools have been approved in rural areas of Oklahoma. The first was in Carlton Landing, a secluded, self-contained and planned picturesque community of upscale homes on the shores of Lake Eufaula. The second was approved by the State Board of Education last week over the objection of the Seminole Public School Board.

Not only are charter schools exempt from many of the rules with which traditional public schools must comply, study after study shows that charter schools perform lower or no better than traditional public schools. However, the real rub is the financial drain that charter schools put on already underfunded traditional community schools.

During an era when many are calling for further school consolidation, charter school laws actually create costly additional districts. For instance, in FY 2016, traditional public schools received an average per pupil share of \$1,560.87 in state aid while the average charter From page 1A school received \$3,034.60 per pupil in state aid – almost twice

> The right of a local community to control its manner and method of education seemed relatively fundamental. Unfortunately, strategically placed political contributions have had the tendency to cause even rural legislators to forget about what is good for their communities. Now we only have to wait for voters to remember that they have the power to change their legislator for one who will truly help public education.

For the fall 2016 semester, 1,282 students were named to the President's Honor Roll, an honor achieved by those who recorded a "straight-A" or 4.0 GPA.


In addition, 2,042 students were named to the Dean's Honor Roll, a list of those who achieved a 3.5 GPA or better for the semester, and no grade lower than a B.



3. Talk with your child specifically about what he/she is learning. What kinds of goals do they want to reach with their education?

4. Help your child learn to be organized. Use a simple system that keeps school papers in order. Organization is beneficial in many areas of our lives.

5. Encourage time management. Help children break down homework tasks and projects into more manageable time slots. Time management is a success tool.

Each of these tips will help students become more responsible and successful in school and life.







Winter management of the backyard peach orchard

Extension Ag Educator When it comes to fruit trees,

February and early March are the most important times of the year to make management decisions. This is especially true of stone fruits (peaches, nectarines, and apricots) since of a complete fertilizer such as they will be blooming soon. Late winter is the time of year to take care of several things such as fertilizing, pruning, and initial insect and disease control applications.

There are two schools of thought when it comes to the amounts by half. pruning stone fruits. One is to wait until after the trees have accurate method of fertilizabloomed and the initial fruit set is on. This can be an advantage when we get a late freeze that kills part of the bloom set. By waiting to prune we leave a leaf analysis, follow the above little more if there are less viable blooms available. If we do not encounter a partial killing freeze and fruit set is heavy, then we can prune away more of the unwanted branches.

There are a couple of drawbacks to waiting to prune. One is the tree has put a lot of wasted energy into setting fruit that will most likely be pruned off. The other disadvantage is that any time we remove the protective bark as we do with pruning we leave an open wound that is a more likely entry route for insects and diseases. By waiting to prune, the weather can produce. A number of funwill be warmer and pests will be more prevalent.

The other pruning option is to do it in February before the blooms have opened. This will allow the cut wounds to "seal" off somewhat before warmer weather arrives. I prefer the pre-bloom method because I think it is healthier for the tree and more importantly, I have more free time on my hands as scale, aphids, mealybugs now than I will in a month and mites can be controlled or two. On young peach trees, either you can utilize directions on a recent soils test or if one is not available use one pound 10-10-10, 10-20-10, or 13-13-13 for each year of tree age. For example, a two-year-old tree should receive about two pounds of fertilizer. If using a more concentrated fertilizer such as 19-19-19 then reduce

On older trees, the most tion is applying based on a leaf analysis. This service is available for a fee from the Extension Office. Without a method, but limit the maximum amount of fertilizer to five or six pounds per tree. When applying, spread the fertilizer around the tree from one foot of the trunk to the outer edge of the branches (drip line).

Now is also a good time to get a jump-start on controlling insects and diseases. One common disease of stone fruits is peach leaf curl. This disease causes leaves to curl up, thicken, and turn red. It is seldom fatal to the tree but can limit production by reducing the amount of food the leaves gicides if applied at the proper time, which is before the buds crack open, easily controls it.

After the buds have started to open, infection has already occurred and fungicides are not effective. Commonly used fungicides to control this disease are Lime Sulfur, Bordeaux Mixture, or Daconil[®].

the temperatures are 40° F or above.

Please note that there are two types of horticultural oils, one is labeled as "Dormant Oil" and the other as "Growing Season or Superior Oil." Dormant Oil will damage the tree if used during the growing season.

To produce blemish-free peaches in Oklahoma, many timely applications of fungicides and insecticides are required. Determine your goals for your backyard orchard and decide how much you are willing to commit in both time and money to have supermarket quality fruit. If blemish-free fruit is required, be ready to spray a fungicide to control brown rot, scab and other diseases beginning at bloom and every week or two thereafter until harvest.

The list of fungicides for homeowners to use during the growing season is limited but two commonly used products are Daconil® (used only until fruit is formed) and Captan[®]. Add an insecticide to the mix after petal fall to control plum curculio, Oriental fruit moths, and other insects. Commonly used insecticides include Sevin®, Malathion®, Ortho's Bug-B-Gone Max[®], and Bayer's Fruit, Citrus, and Vegetable Insect Control®.Be sure to follow the label when using any pesticide to make sure it is legal for the trees you have.

Producing your own backyard fruit can be a rewarding experience but it does require a lot of hard work and diligence. Contact your local OSU Extension Office for more information on stone fruit production including Fact Sheets; #6228 "Annual Pruning of Fruit can and Fruit Trees", and #7319 coats the insects and eggs "Home Tree Fruit Production



Very good day to all! Welcome to the "front porch."

We have been sitting down together for two weeks now to consider the great "life" theme we see in John's organic gospel. We saw it, remember, in the lives of so many blessed men and women who crossed paths with Jesus during His walk: in the life of Nicodemus (John 3), the woman of "shattered romances" Jesus meets at Jacob's well (chapter 4), and on through almost every chapter.

In John 5, the Lord uses yet another image to describe the life He has come to bring, this

the grave. In John 5:25, he says, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, The hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live."

No doubt the Lord is talking there about men who listen to His teaching and come into obedience to it, both from that generation and the generations to come: To them He will give life.

Then he transitions in verse 28 to the final resurrection: "Marvel not at this," he says, "for the hour is coming, in the

which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, And shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation" (vs. 28-29).

The Lord references first the resurrection to life that we experience when we obey the gospel - being buried with him, then "raised with him" in baptism (Colossians 2:12) - then He takes us to the great resurrection of the last day when the righteous will again hear His voice and recognize it as they had in their lifetimes (John 10:3), then come forth

one the image of rising from from the grave triumphantly.

In John 6 the Lord changes metaphors to that of "bread." He says to the multitude following him, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that believeth on me hath everlasting life. I am the bread of life" (vs. 47-48). Then he extends the metaphor in vs. 53-54, "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except ye eat the flesh of the Son of man, and drink his blood, ye have no life in you. Whoso eateth my flesh and drinketh my blood, hath eternal life; and I will raise him up at the last day."

The Lord's listeners understand well the story of Moses and the bread the Lord gave to sustain their lives for those long, forty years in the wilderness. Knowing that they are well aware of that great story, the Lord refers to it as a type of His own life-giving ability, only the life He gives is life eternal.

Chapter by chapter in John's gospel we see both in teaching and in actions the Lord giving and promising life. In chapter 8, he gives new life to a woman who is an inch away from death row. In the ninth



veterans, and the other 16 were surviving spouses.

As an Accredited VA Claims Agent, I receive a copy of all the rating decisions the Department of Veterans Affairs makes on each of the veterans and surviving spouses I represent. Last week 10 veterans received a rating of 100 percent for their serviceconnected disabilities. This group of veterans will receive a combined annual benefit amount of \$375,654. We had 20 veterans who received ratings that ranged from 10-90 percent. This group of veterans will receive an annual combined benefit amount of \$215,938.

For those of you who would be interested in helping others, please consider joining us as a volunteer. An annual OSBI background check is required. We are a 501(c)(3)non-profit organization that not only cares about the health and welfare of the men and women who have served our country, but we are making a difference.

Many times, when a veteran dies the attending doctor who signs the death certificate does not know that he or she is service-connected. If the person has a serviceconnected disability or one that is presumptive to their military service is not listed as a contributing condition on the death certificate the surviving spouse and dependents will not receive VA benefits. We have seen thousands of surviving spouses denied VA benefits because the attending doctor did not know about these conditions.

I would like to see a state law enacted stating veterans VA disability rating decision be reviewed before the death certificate is finalized. There are doctors who sign death certificates who know nothing of the veteran's health issues. When these surviving spouses do not receive the VA benefits to which they are entitled it creates a hardship on the state, the veteran's surviving spouse, as well as their dependents. The only other option these surviving spouses currently have is to request that the death certificate be amended. Amending the death certificate can be done by the attending physician by listing the contributing factors in a letter and fax it to the Oklahoma State Health Department. Last week I wrote that we were in need of a lift chair for a veteran and an electric wheelchair. Two of our readers met these requests. It feels great to be able to be able to find people who can meet the needs of the veterans who we see each week. One of our veterans who recently received

a VA rating has promised to donate his old truck to a veteran in need. We will keep you posted on who receives it as we move forward in the next few weeks.

I would like to have a van with a wheelchair lift to be able to provide transportation for veterans who need this service. Clayton and Louie have been assisting veterans in and out of our vehicles to their wheelchairs. As long as I'm wishing maybe we could go for a high-top van so that veterans could stay in their wheelchairs during transportation. We will probably need another driver for that van! For those of you who would like to join us, we always have a job that needs doing!

Each month we are spending on average \$30,000 to assist others. One of the folks I told you about a couple of weeks ago is a homeless vet with only one leg. We paid his rent in a hotel and are transporting him to other social services to help him get permanently off the streets. We gave him a food basket and a gift card to buy milk, bread, and fresh food items. Currently, we are using our savings account to provide much of the funds for these types of services.



breeding to be royalty.

As a weanling in October, Poindexter of Calera, Okla. In November of 1994, Jerry Wells saw that royalty in him, but could not come up with the money to purchase him, so one of his customers at the time, Joan Crews Hoyt of San Angelo, Texas, purchased him with the intention that Jerry would buy him from her when he could put the money together. In March, 1995, Wells purchased Perpetualism at the same price that Joan had paid and he now was the sole owner.

He died way too early, but he left his mark.

Perpetualism had nine Open World Championships, 10 Amateur World Championships and four Youth World Championships. He also had eight Open Reserve World Championships, five Amateur Reserve World Championships and two Youth World Reserve Championships.

He sired six Open World Champions, six Amateur World Champions and three Youth World Champions, as well as eight Open Reserve World Champions, four Amateur Reserve World Champions and one Youth Reserve World Champions. He also sired two Amateur High Point horses.

In January, 2002, circumstances forced Jerry to sell Perpetualism and thanks to Wayne and Rebecca Halvorson, he was purchased by Cal Loree, Loree Quarter Horses in Guthrie. Perpetualism would have another partner in his ownership in January, 2005, as Ed Melzer of Guthrie, was now in partnership with Cal Loree. He stood at Loree Quarter Horses, under the breeding management of Wayne Halvorson until his death on April 1, 2010.
