

Developers of a proposed senior citizen housing complex here will go before the Purcell Planning Commission at 7 p.m. December 12.

Greg Rodewald, development coordinator with Belmont Development Company in Oklahoma City, said The Village on Green will be built on acreage in the 1900 block of North Green Avenue.


Purcell's Board of Education has awarded the funding for a lease purchase of an LED lighting project to McClain Bank.



# Be aware of electrical safety during the holiday season

When using lights this holiday season, be sure to select lights appropriately. Use indoor lights indoors and outdoor lights outside. Take the lights down when the holidays are over; these lights are not designed for prolonged exposure to the elements.

It is important to never overload wall outlets or extension cords. Connect lights to power strips that have several outlets and a built-in circuit breaker. Extension cords should never The cords could become frayed after being walked on recently, which can be a fire hazard.

Also, be careful about putwalkways as they can be a tripping hazard. Try to run cords along the wall.

With a few extra devices plugged into the outlets, you might see a spike in your utilities bill. To help save on the electric bill, use LED lights because they use about 90 percent less electricity than a standard string of incandescent lights.

LED holiday lights are typically a bit more expensive, but may pay for themselves in the long run. Consumer also can take advantage of sales after the holidays and stock up for next year.

# Keep foodborne illness off holiday menu

The holiday season brings friends, family and lots of good food. From cooking the turkey to homemade pies, it is easy to forget safe food handling practices during the hustle and bustle.

Every year, approximately 48 million people become ill with a foodborne illness. The Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) reminds everyone to practice food safety when preparing holiday foods.

OSDH recommends the following food safety tips to prepare the turkey and keep holiday gatherings free of foodborne illness:

• Clean: Wash hands with soap and warm water for 20 seconds before, during and after handling food. Wash cutting boards, dishes, utensils and counter tops with hot soapy water after preparing each food item and before you go on to the next food.

• Separate: Disease-causing germs can spread from raw food to other foods. Use separate cutting boards, and keep raw meats and their juices away from fruits and vegetables.

• Cook: Always check the internal temperature of cooked meat, poultry and egg dishes with a food thermometer to ensure the food is cooked to a

safe temperature. • Chill: Be safe with leftovers. Refrigerate leftover foods promptly. When foods are left

§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited.

No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful

# Legislature should stop making Oklahomans victims

Many Oklahomans may once again be victims because of inaction by their lawmakers and the governor.

A law passed by Congress in 2005 imposes tougher requirements for proof of legal U.S. residency in order for state driver's licenses to be valid for federal purposes.

Congress took the action because of the attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, more than 15 years ago.

Even though legislation has been introduced for Oklahoma

# What Trump's presidency could mean for Oklahoma

The full impact of Donald Trump's presidency in Oklahoma won't become clear for some time, but its implications

already loom large in the areas of health, energy, taxes and infrastructure spending.

Policy analysts and political observers interviewed by Oklahoma Watch since Tuesday's election said Trump's plans, if enacted by Congress, could produce a tectonic shift felt from one end of the state to the other.

Here is an initial assessment of how Oklahoma might fare under Donald Trump's presidency in several key policy arenas.

### Health

Perhaps the biggest domestic issue in the presidential race was the future of the Affordable Care Act, the 2010 law that expanded Medicaid for poor people in most states and set up a subsidized health insurance market for middle-income Americans.

Trump has vowed to repeal it, something conventional Republicans have been itching to do, too. Details remain hazy, though, about what they intend to put in its place or what will happen to the 16 million Americans who have obtained health insurance coverage since the ACA took effect. In a report published Friday, Trump said he now might try to amend rather than repeal the law.

In Oklahoma, about 130,000 low-income and middle-income people are now covered by private health plans sold through the ACA policy ex-

The effects on them depend on how much of a rollback a Trump administration is willing and able to accomplish.

"How much it actually takes away from the benefits people now have is the question," said Gene Perry, policy director of the Oklahoma Policy Institute in Tulsa.

Oklahoma Hospital Association President Craig Jones said health care officials across the health care agenda

a shift toward Medicaid block grants that give states more discretion in their use of federal funds to provide insurance to the poor.

"In Oklahoma we haven't expanded Medicaid, so we're not going to be kicking people off the program," Perry said. "But there are other changes they could do that would basically give states total flexibility to shrink their Medicaid populations, change the benefit structure, change requirements."

Oklahoma is one of 19 states that have rejected the federal government's offer to pay most of the cost of expanding Medicaid for their citizens.

the governor and Legislature to expand traditional Medicaid, some health care advocates have been promoting the idea of a subsidized private-market insurance program that would still qualify for federal funding. Arkansas already operates a similar program.

That campaign could be stalled by Trump's election, advocates said. With the future of the ACA in its present form now in doubt, state officials are likely to be wary of embarking on a new program that would depend on future federal fund-

"It does seem as though decisions on whether to adopt Medicaid expansion should be put on hold," said Dave Bond, CEO of a conservative advocacy group affiliated with the ments don't explicitly endorse Oklahoma Council for Public Affairs in Oklahoma City.

"What still is an obvious need, however, is Medicaid reform, particularly steering more people away from emergency room use for non-urgent medical needs," Bond said.

Three more drilling rigs went to work in Oklahoma's oil and gas fields last week, nudging the total to 76. Yet rig count remains far below the 214 level



recorded two years ago when prices began to collapse.

If Trump has his way, tripledigit rig counts might become the norm again. The Presidentelect's energy platform is unabashedly pro-development, particularly when it comes to petroleum.

Trump has pledged to "unleash America's \$50 trillion in untapped shale, oil and natural gas reserves." He wants to open onshore and offshore leasing on federal lands, and "reduce and eliminate all barriers to responsible energy production."

Doing so, he said, could increase petroleum industry employment by 400,000 people across the country.

That kind of language is music to the ears of Oklahoma oil and gas producers, who feared the worst if Hillary Clinton had been able to carry out her campaign pledge to try to cut billions of dollars in "wasteful" oil and gas tax subsidies.

State environmentalists and clean-energy advocates said they feared that Trump's energy policy would exacerbate problems associated with oilfield fracking and wastewater disposal, and undo years of progress in curbing emissions from coal-fired electric plants.

Trump is an "anti-regulation, pro-fossil-fuel, climate-change denier," according to Sierra Club Oklahoma Chapter Director Johnson Bridgwater.

"All of this will combine to have a tremendously negative Instead of trying to persuade impact on the environmental health of Oklahoma, the United States and the world," Bridgwater said.

Trump's energy policy is expected to lighten the existing regulatory burden on fossil-fuel producers, actions he can take in some cases without needing congressional approval.

It appears possible Trump will be advised in those efforts by a prominent Oklahoma oilman, Continental Resources CEO Harold Hamm. Trump consulted with Hamm on energy issues during the campaign. Hamm has been mentioned as a possible candidate for energy secretary, although he sent a post-election email to employees saying he planned to stay put in Oklahoma.

Trump's campaign statethe practice of hydraulic fracturing, in which fluids are pumped into well bores to increase the flow of oil and gas, or the injection of wastewater into deep wells. Wastewater disposal in particular has been linked to Oklahoma's increased earthquake activity.

But his call for robust "shale energy" production appears to convey an implicit acceptance of those practices.

The Sierra Club's Bridgwater said Hamm's ties to Trump signaled the probable direction of future policy.

"Harold Hamm is one of the people who helped create this fracking movement," he said. "If you have a president stating they would use somebody like Hamm to run their energy policy ... there is a strong likelihood that the environment is going to suffer."

### Taxes and Spending

If the president-elect persuades Congress to enact all of his policy proposals, Oklahomans will share in what amounts to a substantial economic stimulus program, Republican-style.

Trump's economic agenda includes broad reductions in individual tax rates, featuring big benefits for wealthy taxpayers but extending down through lower tax brackets as well. Businesses would receive a big cut in corporate income taxes: The current 35-percent tax rate would be chopped to 15 percent.

According to an analysis by the Tax Foundation in Washington, D.C., people in the bottom 20 percent of taxpayers would see their federal taxes cut \$97 a year under Trump's plan. People in the top 10 percent would gain \$12,326 to \$18,945, in the top 1 percent, \$86,355 to \$135,460. The foundation said it could not provide a single estimate for high-income households because of ambiguities in the Trump platform.

Trump also wants to repeal what's left of the federal estate tax, which mainly affects higher-income Americans.

On the spending side of the stimulus equation, Trump has endorsed a big package of bond-financed infrastructure investments totaling as much as \$1 trillion over time. That would be even more than Obama's \$840 billion stimulus program.

"We are going to fix our inner cities and rebuild our highways, bridges, tunnels, airports, schools, hospitals,' Trump declared in his election victory speech. "We're going to rebuild our infrastructure.... And we will put millions of our people to work as we rebuild it."

A burst of new spending on infrastructure would be welcomed in Oklahoma, where unemployment is rising because of the rapid downsizing

# Disappointing fall colors

Many residents look forward to the fall of the year in anticipation of a beautiful pallet of bright colors in our deciduous trees.

fall color is astonishing and in other years the colors may not warrant a second glance.

This year the color intensity was a little on the disappointing side. What makes this fall color show different from year to year?

There are many different factors that affect fall leaf color. The most important influencing factor is day length. As the hours of daylight gets less and less, normal physical functions of the leaf are influenced. The vessels that bring water and nutrients up from the ground to supply the leaf with the needed building blocks start to constrict.

The chlorophyll, the green substance in leaves that take these nutrients and manufacture them into sugars, begins to die off. As long as chlorophyll is active and new chlorophyll This is only one of the five cells are being produced trees will appear green.

When the green chlorophyll dies off and is removed from the leaf then other colors such as yellows and orange already present in the leaf become the dominant color. The colors are called carotenoids. They are present in many different plants and are also what gives carrots and bananas their color.

In a few tree species the carotenoids are in so much abundance that they can overshadow the green chlorophyll during the growing season and the tree leaves appear yellow all the time.

In certain groups of trees, there is another chemical called anthocyanin that starts being produced only in the fall of the year. This chemical is responsible for the bright reds and purples that can be breathtaking.

For anthocyanin's to be produced, they require a fairly precise combination of bright sunlight and cool nights. When chlorophyll is weakened, as leaves process food it creates the anthocyanin's which are the red cast colors.

Temperature is not the main driving force of fall color but it does play a role in color intensity. As a rule, we need sunny days and cool nights to get the best color shows. In 2016, we had night temperatures that would not be considered cool but warm by most standards.

The average low temperature according to the Oklahoma Mesonet data for Washington, OK was 69° for August; 63° for September; 55° for October;

and 47° for November up thru our trees.

With these warmer than normal temperatures the color change process is slowed down. Then when we got the hard freeze on November 19 Some years the brilliance of of 27° that stopped the process entirely and leaves now will turn brown and fall off.

> We have been experiencing warmer than normal temperatures for the last decade. Whether this warming is manmade or a natural cycle may be a topic for discussion but there is no doubt the world is warmer right now. Unfortunately, one result of this warming in the fall may be less fall color in

If you want to plant a tree with a specific fall color here are a few species to consider. For yellow and gold colors hickory, ash, cottonwood, and sycamores would be a good choice. For brilliant red and purple a good species would be maple, oak, sweetgum, and persimmon.

Just like there are variations in the appearance of people there is variation in trees within a species.

The best way to determine if your desired species has good color is to buy it from the nursery in the fall when colors are prominent.



Levels are formulated from an objective handicapping system that assigns exhibitors and horses to competition levels. That handicapping system is based on real data from AQHA shows. Level eligibility is based on both points and awards earned. Level point ranges to group horses and riders with their peers of similar experience and points earned.

Classes are leveled based on exhibitor or horse records. Level eligibility is based on both points and awards amateur, halter and cattle Division classes excluding British Columbia, Canada. halter and cattle events.

2016 AQHA World Show is as follows: 2,187 horses, 1,540 exhibitors, 17 show days, plus one day in and one day out translates to more than \$23.3 for the Oklahoma City area economy. 



Such an exit would fall "right in line" with ODOT's plans to have six lanes of interstate running north-south from the Red River to the Kansas state line.

"I guess we will have two to three proposals to kick around," he added.

For the present, Bloss said, he is trying with limited funds to align projects across the division.

Bloss noted that Division 3 is the only division that doesn't abut another state.

It encompasses 11 counties and some 4,000 lane miles of highway to maintain, in addition to 600-plus bridges to

When council member Tom McCurdy questioned the number of pending projects for McClain County in the 8-year plan, Bloss pointed out that ODOT is committing \$132.3 million to work in the county, second only to Garvin County with \$133.5 million and ahead of Cleveland County at \$124.8 million.

"I think we're doing a lot for McClain County," he added.

Bloss said the division's 8-year plan includes 257 separate road and bridge projects.

City officials were also given an update on the new bridge that will span the South Canadian River between Purcell and Lexington.

Patterson noted that when ODOT first decided to replace the existing bridge, the time line called for construction in 2020.

However, they have been able to move that project forward with a construction start anticipated next summer.

"As soon as we get utilities (relocation) out of the way, we can start building the bridge," Bloss said. "We're excited to move forward."

In the meantime, the ODOT officials asked a favor of the

We have several ladies who work with Shirley at (405) 361-9322 who specialize in assisting surviving spouses to receive VA benefits based on their veteran's military service. For your information, if a serviceconnected disability is listed on the veteran's Death Certificate the surviving spouse may be eligible for DIC.

One of the things many don't realize is the increased number of female veterans whose surviving spouse may be entitled to DIC benefits. Please stop by to inquire about possible VA benefits. Keep in mind there are many presumptive diseases and the VA has a Registry for Agent Orange and Gulf War Veterans that I encourage all eligible veterans to check out.

For those of you who have not visited with us before, we start signing in people at 5:30 on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. I am a VAAccredited Claims Agent who represents veterans and surviving spouses with their applications for VA benefits. I don't know of any VA Accredited Claims Agent in this United States who provides this service at no charge to anyone. Currently, we have over 6,000 veterans and spouses who are represented at the Department of Veterans Affairs. We add an average of 80 more veterans each week. The number of veterans and surviving spouses who come in from other states continues to average 10 or 15 each week.

People from all over are making the trip to Norman. Most people will visit us an average of three times before receiving benefits. I wish of the work that we do. All I know is that we do see some with our community. very happy people after their

VA claims are approved.

Some of the veterans who we visit with have told me they have been trying to receive VA benefits for 50 years and we could help them in only a few short months. 

# Managing wheat pasture bloat

One issue that must always be considered when utilizing lush forages is bloat. Bloat is a form of severe indigestion marked by a collection of gas in the rumen that the animal is unable to expel.

Poloxalene is the recomoutbreaks. Poloxalene is a feed additive that reduces the surface tension of the foam, thereby reducing the amount of foam in the rumen.

It has no residual effect, therefore, it must be consumed daily at the recommended rate.

Since bloat outbreaks can occur very quickly, producers may want to consider having a small emergency supply of poloxalene containing supplement on hand throughout bloat

The common form of poloxalene is Bloat Guard®. It can be used as a top dress in the feed bunk, mixed at feed processing, or added to a supplement pellet. It is a relatively expensive

If mineral is used, producers need to encourage daily consumption of the proper poloxalene amount. Mineral consumption should not be expected to stop a severe bloat

Bloat Guard® is also available in block form. If using the blocks, make sure to remove all salt blocks. Again, adequate mended treatment for bloat consumption, on a regular basis, is the key to effectiveness.

> One manufacturer recommends one block per each five head. Placement should be in areas where cattle frequent, such as near water, etc.

> If the bloat outbreak is severe, producers may have to consider removing the cattle from wheat pasture. Many producers ask if feeding an ionophore will reduce bloat. Monensin (sold as Rumensin) is the only ionophore that has been shown to reduce bloat severity.

> It would not be the only treatment in a bloat outbreak, but it would be prudent to include, if the wheat pasture cattle were already being fed supplement.

Feeding hay is a common practice on wheat pasture, but low consumption yields limited bloat control. OSU studies have shown no effect of feeding hay to reduce bloat. High quality hay could be offered to encourage adequate consumption to increase rumen motility and/ or substitute for wheat pasture
