Thanks to a brave and courageous 13-year-old girl, an attempted car jacking and kidnapping at Star Travel Plaza about 3 a.m. Tuesday was foiled.

Purcell Police were called to the convenience store there when Casie Lewis stopped for gas and coffee on her way home to Kansas City, Missouri, from Texas.

In the Ford Explorer were three children ages 13, 11 and 9 who were asleep.

A white man with a beard and mustache jumped into the car and started to drive off.

The 13-year-old, who was in the front seat, woke up when the door slammed

and began hitting and kicking the man.

With her courageous actions, the man fled and Lewis, 35, found the vehicle hung up on a curb across the way from the store.

"Probably did a good thing," said Purcell Police Det. Sgt. Scott Stephens. "It was a dangerous thing to do because we don't know if the guy was armed or not."

The kids said the man was wearing a gray stocking cap, sweat pants and a Carhartt-style jacket.

They said he escaped in a white extended cab pickup.

He is facing kidnapping and first degree robbery charges. Police are on the lookout for him.

# New crime idea on way here

According to the Purcell Police Department

There is a somewhat new method of criminal activity that's making its way from North Texas.

It is mainly referred to as "Jugging" or "Bank Jugging". It is expected for this type of crime to become more prevalent in Oklahoma as well.

Suspects will survey a bank parking lot, ATM, and even follow individuals carrying a bank bag into a bank lobby.

They hone-in on these individuals who may run or work for a business making change and possibly have a large amount of cash in the bag.

Suspect(s) then follow the

victim to their place of business or residence either burglarizing the vehicle or committing a robbery on the person as they are exiting their vehicle or entering their business.

The perpetrators frequently utilize rented vehicles.

Citizens who utilize bank bags or other money bags need to be more cautious and aware of your surroundings.

"If you notice something strange, do not hesitate in contacting your local law enforcement to investigate suspicious activity. Be vigilant," said Lt. Kevin Austin.

"You may consider varying

times and routes to your final destination, taking more than one person as an additional deterrent, 'decoy' bags, etc.," Austin continued.

More tips are available through the Investigations Division or the Crime Victim Liaison of the Purcell Police Department.

"If you are a victim of this type of crime, please make aware to the responding officer of your recent bank transaction as the bank's video footage may have captured partial suspect(s) information which will assist in the development of leads in the case," he said.

## LARC escapee caught in Phoenix

Police in Phoenix, Arizona, have arrested an Oklahoma Department of Corrections inmate who escaped Saturday from the minimum security unit of Lexington Assessment and Reception Center.

ODOC Fugitive Apprehension and Investigations agents tracked Ronnie Henderson, DOC No. 454166, to a Super 8 in Phoenix.

There, they contacted police, who responded immediately.

They arrested Henderson around 6:30 p.m. as he was walking in a hallway of the motel.

"We are extremely thankful for the efforts tonight of the Phoenix Police Department, as well as our many other dedicated partners in law enforcement who always assist

us when we have an escapee," said ODOC Director Joe M. Allbaugh.

"Additionally, our Fugitive Apprehension and Investigations agents did stellar investigative work to track Mr. Henderson to Phoenix."

Henderson was reported missing after a 6 p.m. count at LARC's Rex Thompson Minimum Security Unit.

He is serving a 40-year sentence for possession of a controlled dangerous substance with intent to distribute, eluding police and manufacturing a controlled dangerous substance.

Henderson was reportedly surprised to find that law enforcement had tracked him to Phoenix

# Despite objections, Oklahoma schools use "seclusion rooms" to isolate children

A controversial practice of shutting children alone in small closet-like rooms to control their behavior has led Oklahoma parents to withdraw their children from school, seek police intervention and take legal action.

School officials give the rooms benign-sounding names like "blue room," "cool-down room" or "de-escalation room" and say they're intended to provide a healthy temporary separation. But many parents and child advocates say the practice is like being locked in a closet, and some liken it to solitary confinement in prison. Students placed in the room often have special needs.

One father says his special-needs son was placed in a closet for timeout a dozen times in the first two weeks of classes at a Mustang elementary school. In the small Coal County district of Cottonwood, parents say the school placed their son in the narrow "blue room" multiple times for not minding his teacher when he was just three years old. Lawsuits have been filed over schools in Cottonwood, Ardmore, Edmond and likely elsewhere.

"We send them into school, and we trust these other adults have been trained to deal with these problems ... and they do these outrageous things and we don't know," said Jennifer Ashford, a mother who sued the Edmond Public Schools district over its seclusion rooms in 2010.

Students have been injured, traumatized and even died in seclusion rooms across the country, according to a 2009 report by the U.S. Government Accountability Office. That report found hundreds of allegations of death and abuse, most of children with disabilities, related to the use of seclusion and restraints in public schools; none of the case studies were from Oklahoma.

Some Oklahoma school officials defend the use of the rooms, saying they are used only in extreme circumstances to isolate a student acting violently. Or, as in Mustang, they are used as part of a program to prevent suspensions of students with severe behavioral and emotional disabilities.

In some schools, the room may be as large as a classroom, with no furniture. In others, it may be a former supply closet with cinderblock walls, a beanbag chair and a lock on the door.

Twenty-eight states have laws protecting all students from restraint and seclusion, and 38 states do so for students with disabilities, a 2016 analysis by the Autism National Committee found. Oklahoma



doesn't have a law - it has voluntary, non-binding guidance from the state Department of Education, which advocates say isn't enough.

The guidance has some parameters on size - large enough so the student can sit or lie down - and the lock - it must automatically disengage in an emergency, such as a fire. The guidance also says the room should have adequate lighting, heating, cooling and ventilation, and a way for staff to see and hear the child at all times.

Schools are supposed to contact parents immediately, and at least within 24 hours, every time their child is secluded. But parents and advocates say many times it doesn't happen.

"We don't, as a state, have a good handle on how often these incidents are happening," said Lori Wathen, of Oklahoma City, whose son has Down Syndrome and who advocates online for a state law with seclusion guidelines. "There's no law that says schools have to report this. I think it's happening more than what's being

reported."

Schools are also supposed to train staff on de-escalation and intervention techniques, possible effects of seclusion and the appropriate use of seclusion rooms - and many districts do. But it's not required, and that's a point of contention in one of the lawsuits.

Legislation to restrict the use of seclusion and restraint of special education students, and to codify the guidance on the rooms into law, was filed in 2016 and 2017 by Rep. Josh Cockroft, R-Wanette, but the bills failed to progress. An interim study planned for the fall was not held because of the special session on the budget.

Many states require parents

to be quickly notified so they can watch for concussions and hidden injuries. Cockroft's bill would have given schools 24 hours to contact parents.

## Underreported and Misreported

## NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

### A first step toward peace

Regarded as a sacred city to the Jewish, Christian and Muslim faiths, the ancient city of Jerusalem has been at the center of dispute between Palestine and Israel for decades.

And for many years, U.S. Presidents have attempted to engage and negotiate peace talks between Israel and Palestine in hopes that it would help set firm boundaries and a final two-state solution.

Every president in recent history has campaigned on a pledge to officially recognize Jerusalem as the true capital of Israel. Yet none of them has followed through and

actually done so.

But last week President Trump delivered on his promise and recognized Jerusalem as the capital of Israel.

The city of Jerusalem is home to many religious sites of the three monotheistic religions - Judaism, Christianity and Islam - and millions of people hold these sites sacred. Since 1948, both Palestine and Israel have claimed Jerusalem to be the capital of their respective states.

These conflicting claims have incited many acts of violence throughout the years. In 1995, Congress passed bipartisan legislation to formally recognize Jerusalem as the capital of Israel, and the seat

of its government.

Although this sent an important message at the time, no previous administration has actually recognized Jerusalem as Israel's capital.

Israel is the most powerful, democratic ally of the United States in the Middle East. It has served as the catalyst of democracy in the region. As a democratic and sovereign nation, it has and should have every right to name its capital.

The majority of Israel's government institutions - from the Knesset to the Supreme Court and the office of the Prime Minister - are located in Jerusalem. It should be fundamentally understood that Israel should be able to

claim Jerusalem as its rightful capital.

President Trump's was careful to point out that the geo-political boundaries of Jerusalem should be negotiated and agreed upon by Israel and Palestine. In addition to formal recognition of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel, the Administration also plans to move the U.S. Embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem in the future.

However, the President was careful to keep open the possibility that Jerusalem might also serve as the capital of a future Palestinian state.

The idea of recognizing Jerusalem as Israel's capital has had bipartisan support

for many years. Many of my colleagues on both sides of the aisle strongly expressed their support for President Trump's decision. United Nations Ambassador Nikki Haley has also been a leader in voicing America's position on Jerusalem on the international stage to garner support from other nations.

In the coming weeks and years, the United States will play an integral role in the process for peace between Palestine and Israel. However, by recognizing Jerusalem as the capital of Israel, the United States has sent a powerful message of our alliance and friendship with the Jewish state.

What a week. Not only saw one of the year's best movies, but also one of its worst too.

So, no sense in stalling. Let's get straight to the reviews.

First up is "The Disaster Artist." When Greg Sestero (Dave Franco), an aspiring actor, meets the strange and mysterious Tommy Wiseau (James Franco) in an acting class, the two form a unique friendship and travel to Hollywood to make their dreams of becoming big time movie stars come true.

Based on the true story behind the creation of "The Room," a film widely regarded as one of the worst movies ever made.

This one's going to require some explanation.

For those out of the loop, Tommy Wiseau's "The Room" is a movie infamous among film buffs and critics alike. And it's for good reason.

The movie is profoundly horrible in the best kind of way. A film so bad, it actually ends up being hilarious.

Everything, from the unfocused narrative and awful dialogue, to the poor set design, all topped by Wiseau's remarkably bizarre performance as the film's lead. Acting so terrible it has to be seen to believe.

This quick and easy recipe is a crowd pleaser.

### Dump and Run Taco Soup

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 small onion
- 2 garlic cloves (optional)
- 1 package taco seasoning
- 1-1/2 cups water
- 2 cans undrained beans, 15 ounce, your choice (I typically use black beans and Pintos, but Great Northern, Ranch Style, Mild Chili Beans are all great options)
- 1 small bag of frozen corn or 15 oz. can whole kernel corn, drained
- 14 oz. can stewed tomatoes
- 1 can Rotel
- 14 oz. can chopped green chiles
- 1 package of dry ranch salad dressing mix
- Cheese, tortilla chips, sour cream (optional garnishes)
- Fry ground beef, chopped onion and minced garlic, drain grease.

Add taco seasoning into beef mixture, and mix well. Dump and stir in the remaining ingredients. Bring to a boil.

Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 15 minutes or until heated through, stirring occasionally. The more time it has to simmer, the deeper the flavors.

If your preference is a "soupier" consistency, add a bit more water.

The recipe may also be made in a crock pot. Just dump all the ingredients in the morning (only with cooked taco meat option), run your errands and let it cook all day. If you have it on low, you can easily cook it for 6-8 hours. If you put it on high, cook for 3 hours and then turn to low. Since all meat is cooked, it's just about heating thoroughly and letting flavors meld.

disproportionately on special education students.

But advocates say the numbers are dramatically under-reported. It appears some districts toe the line between seclusion and "timeout", and an overwhelming majority of districts report zero, which is unlikely to be accurate.

Advocates at the Autism National Committee say if the door is locked or blocked by staff, or students don't feel they can voluntarily leave the room, it's seclusion, not a timeout. Temporary, brief timeouts are a recognized behavior management technique, the committee says.

The state Education Department defines seclusion as "the involuntary confinement of a student alone in a room or area which the student is physically prevented from leaving." Timeout, it says, is not a form of seclusion.

For the 2013-14 school year, the latest available, 36 of the more than 500 Oklahoma school districts reported secluding students, the Office of Civil Rights data shows.

Oklahoma City Public Schools, the state's largest district, reported 384 incidents of seclusion for the 2013-14 school year. The district says it doesn't use seclusion rooms.

"We don't have those rooms in our buildings. Teachers may be using time-outs, or a cool-down area, for those students as a behavior technique," said Erin Trussell, director of special education for Oklahoma City Public Schools. Students are never alone, and always able to leave and use the restroom, she added.

Similarly, Tulsa Public Schools' policy is to continuously monitor special education students in seclusion rooms and to only seclude the student as long as necessary to keep him or her safe; students are able to use the restroom and get water to drink.

The district reported 53 incidents of seclusion during 2013-14; the district didn't have any seclusion rooms that year, though three schools have one now, a spokeswoman for the district said.

In some school districts, a seclusion room is also used voluntarily by students who recognize the need to cool off or who may wish to work on schoolwork free from distractions.

Cottonwood Public Schools says it doesn't seclude students, but it does have a narrow "blue room" where students are sent and the door is closed.

Cottonwood Public Schools in Coalgate didn't report any seclusions in 2013-14, and superintendent John Daniel said the district doesn't seclude students.

When pressed about what the district calls the "blue room", a narrow space within the front office containing three student desks, he said students are sometimes sent there involuntarily and the door is closed.

"Sometimes, it's used for safety," he said. "Sometimes it's used for somebody to do homework. Sometimes students with ADHD (attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder) need some quiet to do work. We're not trying to seclude anybody."

**A Glance at Other States**  
Five states ban seclusion for children with disabilities: Georgia, Hawaii, Nevada, Pennsylvania and Texas. Georgia and Hawaii ban seclusion for all students.

Texas requires that video monitoring of special education classrooms be provided on request, in order to protect students from their own teachers.

The 2016 law stems from a TV station's investigation into "calm rooms," or small, padded spaces where students were secluded in some schools. The station obtained a video of a teacher forcing an 8-year-old boy with autism into one of the rooms, then holding the door shut.

School districts are on the hook for the cost, estimated at \$3,000 per classroom, including camera installation, setup and storage.

In Iowa, the American Civil Liberties Union is advocating for new statewide restrictions on schools' use of seclusion rooms, after the Iowa City school district was found to have violated state and federal laws. In that city, children were being secluded for minor infractions such as having "attitude," being out of "instructional control" and cursing, according to news reports. Iowa City has since announced it will do away with seclusion rooms.

The ACLU has petitioned the Iowa Department of Education for new rules limiting seclusion and restraint to emergency situations only, no more restrictive than necessary, as a last resort, and never for discipline or punishment.

Robert and Ashley Glover used to drive nearly half an hour to have their son attend Cottonwood. The small school, 75 miles northeast of Ardmore, is in a sought-after district for its school report-card score, which was an A+ in 2016.

But then their son's attitude toward school changed, and he became tearful and scared each morning. They suspected something was wrong. They requested a meeting with the school, and found out he had been sent to the "blue room" several times.

At the time, the boy was in the school's pre-K program for three-year-olds.

In the blue room, "he was expected to understand what he did wrong and tell them, 'I will act right for the rest of the day' before he got to come out," Ashley Glover said.

The Glovers, who have filed a lawsuit against the school, also allege a teacher once physically restrained their son for refusing to put on his shoes. The teacher made him sit with his legs crossed and pressed his face to the floor, the parents say.

School officials have not responded to those allegations in court. A lawyer for the school has asked a judge to throw out the lawsuit on a technicality.

In Mustang, a father's Facebook post about an elementary school program for special-needs children that repeatedly placed his six-year-old son into a small room sparked a public backlash on social media. Billy Wynne described the room as a supply closet modified with a half door instead of a full door.

Like Cottonwood, the room was called the "blue room," and the district says it's for refocusing and de-escalation. Several schools in the Mustang district have one. Students can enter voluntarily, but can also be forced into one if the student's behavior is "posing an immediate threat to themselves or others," district spokeswoman Shannon Rigsby said.

The rooms are used in conjunction with the BRAIN program, an intensive behavior-modification program for children with severe behavioral issues.

"These kids had been suspended, expelled, hospitalized. They had never completed a full year of school — ever," said Mustang Middle School Principal Kathy Knowles, who helped pioneer the program.

But Mustang doesn't count incidents when students are placed in a "blue room" as seclusion. Mustang didn't report any restraints or seclusions of students in 2013-14, and although it did document 15 incidents in 2016-17, Rigsby said, those incidents "may have nothing to do with the blue rooms, which are specific to the BRAIN program."

In response to the backlash, the district made some changes, including requiring teachers to fill out a form every time a student voluntarily enters one of the rooms and having the BRAIN teachers communicate with parents daily, Rigsby said.

Another district that has faced criticism from parents over its use of seclusion rooms is Edmond Public Schools.

Jennifer Ashford alleged in a 2010 lawsuit that her son was forced into a "timeout room" multiple times — once for at least two hours, during which he urinated on himself.

"She (the teacher) would take away his shoes because he would be kicking the door, trying to get out," Ashford said.

After over a year of litigation, a federal judge sent the lawsuit to district court and Ashford opted not to pursue it further because of the time and energy involved.

Federal education officials visited the district after the lawsuit was dismissed and didn't recommend any changes, said Nancy Goosen,

Edmond Public Schools director of special services.

She said school staff use seclusion minimally and only to protect themselves and others from injuries. There were 33 reported incidents in the 2016-17 school year. According to district policy, the timeout rooms are a last resort if other methods of de-escalation fail.

Research shows seclusion in K-12 schools provides no educational or therapeutic benefit, and could be harmful to children, according to a 2014 U.S. Senate committee report. Also, teachers in many districts can, and do, manage violent students without seclusion.

Many U.S. schools use a data-driven approach called Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports to reduce incidents by teaching students alternative behaviors, the Senate report said.

"As educators, we need to find better solutions to restraint and seclusion," said Josh Fearing, a special education teacher in the Oklahoma City area.

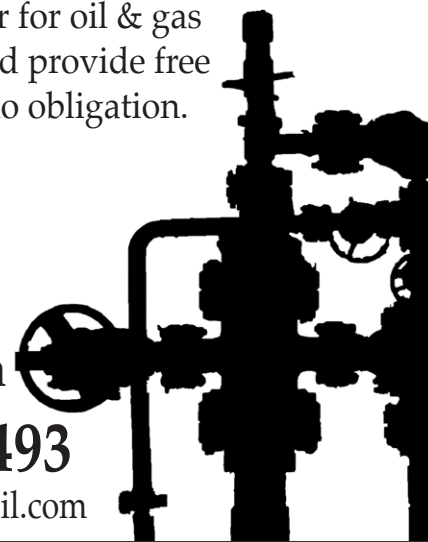

A felony animal cruelty charge was filed November 29 against a 52-year-old Purcell man after police found a bleeding pit bull locked in a van outside his home.

James J. Trammell is also charged in McClain County District Court with unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia, a misdemeanor.

He is in the McClain County Detention Center in lieu of a \$10,000 bond.

According to an affidavit, police went to Trammell's home at 103 W. Huron on October 30 after receiving a complaint about a narcotics violation.

Master Officer Zach Paulk asked Trammell to step outside the home for a conversation, but Trammell shut the door in his face instead.

When Paulk knocked on the door a second time, it was opened by Trammell's wife. Looking past her, the officer saw Trammell pick up a black bag and colored glass pipe and walk to the back of the house.

Trammell returned to the front and Paulk told him police had received a call that narcotics were being smoked on the front porch.

Trammell initially denied it and then blamed his sons, according to the affidavit. He also denied there were narcotics in the home and refused to give police permission to search the residence.

Wayne Public Schools' Zach Powell has five words of advice for lawmakers:

"Take care of business first."

But with the rhetoric and propaganda that seems to flow in conflicting currents from the capitol and Gov. Mary Fallin's office, Powell admits he's "not real optimistic" this special session will result in a budget.

"It's unpredictable, to say the least," Powell said. "It's pretty disappointing they came within 5 votes of passing a budget and it didn't pass."

Wayne Schools are up in enrollment, but the superintendent isn't counting on a mid-term adjustment in state aid.

The superintendent said the district's budget going into this year was pretty well fixed and included a healthy fund balance. But successive years of cuts to common education have eaten into that cushion.

"Go back and look at the history," he said. "Our budgets have been cut tremendously over the past five years."

Powell has emailed all of his legislators and routinely forwards to district employees every update he receives from professional organizations like the Oklahoma School Boards

"We're fortunate we've been able to have healthy fund balances several years now and don't go into panic mode ... but anytime you're not fully funded, those balances will be less and less each year," he said.

Making everything work with "what little they give us" isn't for the faint of heart.

In Lexington, Ronda Bass is taking a glass half full approach to the special session.

"I hope and pray they come up with something," she said. "It may be wishful thinking ..."

Bass added the district is preparing for a \$300,000 loss going into next year.

"We already absorbed a couple of positions this year," she said. "I know for sure we will not be hiring first year teachers next year. We're out of options is what it comes down to."

"The sad part is all the other bills we have to pay. None of those general day to day expenses are going down," she continued.

Enrollment in Lexington Public Schools ebbs and flows. Present numbers of students are down.

"I stress to the school board how imperative it is we pass

the next bond election. We've got to have help from our local people," she said.

That issue will be put before Lexington voters sometime in 2018, Bass added.

"I am very stressed," Bass admitted. "There are no easy answers."

And then continued that the Legislature returning to session "does give us some hope."

Washington Public Schools Superintendent A.J. Brewer said the district has obviously had to make cut backs.

"But we're OK," he added. "We've been able to hold a consistent fund balance. We would sure like to not have any additional cuts."

Brewer only occasionally reaches out to area legislators and isn't one to keep the highway hot between Washington and Oklahoma City.

"I spend most of my time right here at the school," he said.

Like practically all Oklahomans, he doesn't know what this second special session will accomplish.

"We've had to watch our spending and cut some things, tighten our belts," he said. "I hope we don't have (another) budget shortfall for the state."

called the Legislature into a second special session on Monday, Midkiff told school board members this week.

"Because of how late the session is happening, the impact of any budget bill on this year's budget is limited," he said. "They can, however, help to shore up future budgets as we currently are facing another \$600 million shortfall for next year."

One step Fallin has taken was to issue an executive order dictating 60 percent of school funds go toward instruction.

"The problem with this is in the details," Midkiff said. "While I agree that the majority of funds should be spent on instruction and kids, how it is reported can have a major impact on those percentages."

The superintendent noted that Fallin's data included bond

money and all expenditures, while excluding expenses critical for learning like teacher's aids, transportation, nutrition, lighting and more.

"When you include the extra expenditures and take out funding for those other services, meeting the 60 percent threshold is pretty difficult," he said. "When you just look at expenditures through our general fund that exclude those other expenditures, it's quite a different picture."

Last year, the district spent 70.4 percent – \$6.2 million – of the \$8.8 million budget on certified salaries. Support staff salaries totaled \$1.2 million.

Altogether, salaries accounted for 84 percent of the district's budget.

"I feel good about that. We're spending money on instruction," he said.

Members of Purcell High School's first-ever state champion band were at Monday's school board meeting to express their thanks to board members and Midkiff.

"It's not always about the trophies," band director David Hilger said. "But it was nice coming home with it."

Hilger told the board that the 78-member band is "young, but also (has) great senior leadership."

"We did well at all state contests this year," he continued. "I'm extremely proud of the program. I thank the board for all your support."

Hilger noted that the state championship in October followed a less than stellar performance on the field during the Dragon's football game against Washington.

When the band left the field after that disappointing show, Hilger said, they spent most of the third quarter away from the stadium assessing just what had gone awry.

Other faculty who had a role in readying the band for its state championship bid were assistant band director Kyle Myers and Matthew Matheny, a student teacher.

Midkiff also gave the board an update on the district's new bond project.

"We have finished the layout of the field house and we are working on the junior high layout," he said. "Prep work has been taking place (soil samples, surveying, elevation, etc.). We are still on schedule to start late summer/early fall. Both the architect and construction manager have been working hard."

In other business, the board hired Wilma Mize as a paraprofessional for the remainder of the 2017-18 school year.

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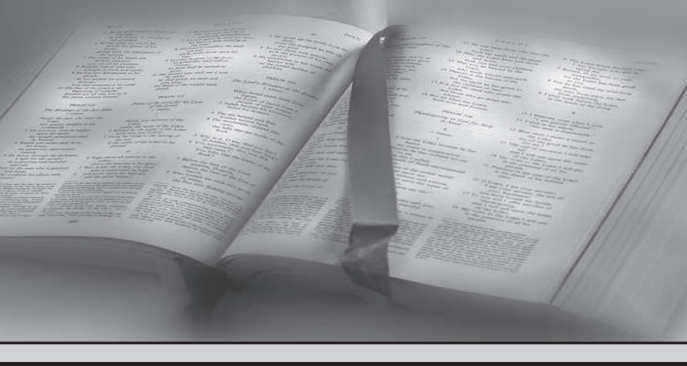

In 1985 - when my son Mal was five - he had to have

surgery on his palate. I remember distinctly how happy and gleeful he was the morning of the surgery, not fully understanding the impact of what was about to happen - not only of the surgery but the aftermath of having his little arms in restraints so he would not disturb the stitches, and having to eat out of a dropper or a straw for a time. He had no idea of that.

That was part of the reason when the white-clad nurses wheeled him to surgery that morning, I went to the nearest secluded place I could find, to be alone. You understand.

The next day - Mal still in the hospital - I had to leave for work. But as I drove away from that hospital - leaving a five-year-old son with mom - my heart could not help but ache. It longed to be there.

My body may have been driving away, but my heart stayed behind at Texas Children's Hospital, downtown

Houston.

I thought of that time again this week - and I thought of Mr. Hogland's eloquent speech -- as Mal again had surgery, this time in L.A.'s UCLA hospital. It was a similar surgery as the other 30 years ago - the doctors having to break his jaw to reset it and clean up some of the scar tissue from that surgery when he was five, then another again at seven.

All day Wednesday - home in Texas - I kept in touch with Mal and mom, who was there faithfully - just as before.

As I went about my business, I could not help thinking as before: My body may have been Texas, but this time my heart was in Los Angeles.

Mr. Hogland, thanks, again, for reminding me of a lesson that sticks with you: Wherever your treasure is, your heart surely will follow.

In the book of Ecclesiastes we read: "God made man simple. Man's complex problems are of his own devising." (Eccl. 7:29) One day Jesus went up the mountain. He sat down and began to teach the people many things. They brought to him those who were lame and blind and deformed and mute. They brought to him people who were incomplete, imperfect,

and broken. And he healed them. He made them whole.

The people had been with him now for three days. And everyone was hungry, for they had nothing to eat. They were in a deserted place, far from anywhere to get food. The disciples were able to gather up seven loaves of bread and a few fishes. Jesus took these scraps of food, held them in his hands, and gave thanks to God for them. And everyone had enough to eat. (Mt. 15:29 ff)

On that day, people were in need. God entered into their lives through the ordinary elements of bread and fish. With a simple prayer of thanks, the ordinary elements became a sacred gift.

The prophet Isaiah lived in a time when his people were in need. They were living in exile as refugees, far away from their home. They missed their homeland, just as you and I would. Isaiah tried to comfort them. He did not promise a return home. But

he promised that God would comfort them in this strange and lonely place.

He said that God desires to smooth out our lives. He wants to take the rough places in our life and make them smooth. He will level the mountains of guilt that we carry with us. And he will fill in the valleys of sadness. He will help simplify our lives.

The second letter of Peter is the last letter written in the New Testament. When this letter was written, people had become impatient that the Lord had not yet come. They were waiting, waiting, waiting. The author says "Be patient. In the Lord's eyes, the counting of time is very different. For him, a thousand years is like a day, and a day is like a thousand years."

He is patient with us. He is patient with us as he waits for us to change, to be converted to him, to reshape our hearts

Finger weaving is an art form used mostly to create belts, sashes, straps and other similar items without using a loom.

It was common in much of eastern North America, where

it was first accomplished using spun buffalo hair, rabbit hair, as well as mulberry bark and dogbane.

In addition to the simple diagonal weave, other common patterns include those depicting chevrons, lightning bolts, arrowheads and diamonds. These are all achieved with slight changes to the weaving process.

Please remember that neither our volunteers nor I am paid for what we do. We have learned we need to help our veterans because no one else does enough.

Last Friday our volunteer appreciation brunch was held at Legends Restaurant in Norman. Our Executive Director, Lora Malone, presented plaques to each volunteer as we were honored by our Board of Directors and our co-volunteers. I'm very proud of the men and women who give us their time and talent each week.

Our volunteers come from all walks of life bringing their experience and knowledge to help. We have three married couples who volunteer and I believe that when a couple shares a common bond volunteering that it only strengthens their relationship.

During the past week, we had several more surviving spouses approved for DIC benefits that will result in from \$40,000 to over \$200,000 in payments. we worked on her DIC claim. I'm happy to say that she will receive more than \$40,000 plus the Champ-VA medical insurance. When I called her to give her the VA decision she was two months behind on her rent. Needless to say, her life was changed for the good after meeting with our volunteers. Maybe it's time for you to join our team of volunteers?

There were 247 veterans and surviving spouses assisted last Tuesday and Thursday morning with their VA claims and questions. Several of our visitors were transported by our two drivers, Clayton and Louie, who logged 64 hours last week carrying 28 folks 1,183 miles.

We are continuing to average 25 or more veterans from Norman each week who are requesting we represent them with their claims. As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive the rating decisions and other correspondence from VA on the veterans and surviving spouses represented at our foundation. Of the decisions received last week, there were six veterans awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. This group of veterans, both men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$229,023 per year.

There were 25 veterans awarded VA rating decisions from 10-90 percent. This group of men and women will receive a combined annual income of \$306,654 per year. It is a very good feeling to be able to help veterans receive VA benefits. Everyone who applies for VA benefits is not going to be approved the first time they apply. Sometimes it may take several years to be approved.

I believe most of the places veterans and spouses go for assistance with their VA application for benefits are going to find that organization is going to do what they can for them. What I also believe is that some who help veterans and their families are more

knowledgeable than others. Veterans might consider shopping around for the best help available when considering filing a claim for benefits. People who help with your VA claims are like anyone who offers a service such as auto repair to tax preparation; some are very good at their job, and some aren't. With that in mind, why not visit us for a review of your VA claims folder.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

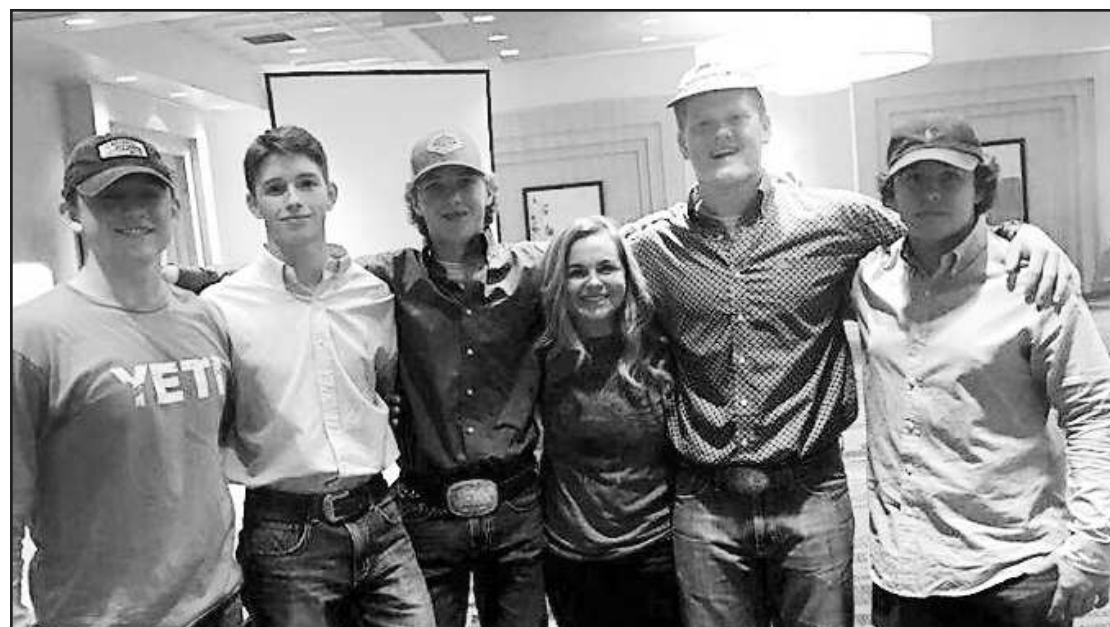
