U.S. SUPREME COURT RULES

Sends Bosse sentencing back to Court of Criminal Appeals

The U.S. Supreme Court on Tuesday set aside the death penalty for a Blanchard man convicted nearly four years ago in the brutal murders of his Dibble girlfriend and her two young children.

A McClain County District Court jury convicted Shaun Michael Bosse of three counts of first degree murder and one count of first degree arson in October 2012.

Killed on July 23, 2010, were Katrina Griffin and her children Christian and Chasity. Bosse stabbed Katrina Griffin and

Sounds of children

Education Station moving to HRC

It's been three years since Purcell Public Schools shuttered the former intermediate school and took over part of the space for the district's Human



Resources Center.

Three years without children, without their laughter and the echoes of their footsteps in the hall.

That is about to change.

The Purcell Public Schools Board of Education voted Monday to relocate Education Station from its present home across from the elementary school to the HRC.

Superintendent Jason Midkiff said the Education Station building needs "extensive" repairs – a need that came to light during a facility tour by the board earlier this year.

Describing Education Station as "a good program," Midkiff said the move makes sense on two levels.

First, the former school provides a better educational setting. And second, Midkiff pointed out, moving the program is cheaper than making those extensive repairs to Education Station.

That is especially important with the district facing uncertain state funding in the face of another record budget shortfall at the capital.

"School budgets are just getting harder and harder to balance," Midkiff told the board. "We are seeing shrinking revenue from all sides. In the last two to three years, we have

A new light

LED conversion will save scarce cash

Things will be getting brighter for Purcell Public Schools after the board of education voted Monday to convert all the district's 4,540 lights to LED bulbs.

According to projections provided by Oklahoma LED, the district stands to save more than \$1 million over 10 years. That figure includes an energy company rebate of \$20,600.

The total lighting investment including installation is \$280,171.

With energy savings of \$98,850 per year, the district's return on its investment is projected at 2.6 years.

The district's present electric bill for lighting is \$157,221 per year. With LED, that will drop to \$58,372, according to the company.

Kilowatt usage will drop from the current 1,046,135 Kwh to 388,399 Kwh per year, a 63 percent reduction.

The Purcell Municipal Hospital Auxiliary has a giving nature.

In September, the auxiliary presented the hospital with a new EKG machine.

It was just the most recent in a long list of equipment needs for the hospital that has been met by the organization.

They are glad they have it to fall back on.

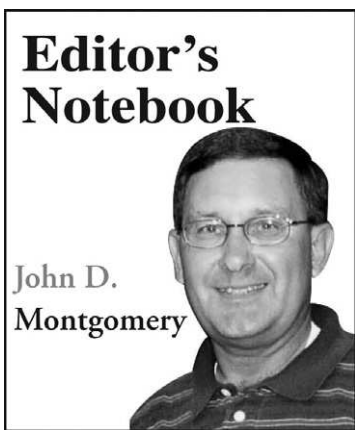
I saw the work of our fire-fighters and police securing the area.

An unlikely alliance

Congressman Tom Cole

When the affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare, was passed in the spring of 2010 it was done so with no Republican votes. Since then, the Republican controlled House of Representatives has voted more than 60 times to repeal the law.

Republican animosity towards this destruction of our health care system is well established. But recently another high profile political leader added his voice to the chorus of well deserved criticism of the disastrous consequences of Obamacare.

"People gained access to health insurance but wind up with their premiums doubled and their coverage cut in half... The people getting killed in this deal are the small business-people and individuals who make just a little too much to get in on these subsidies... It's

the craziest thing in the world."

The sentiments expressed in these statements aren't a surprise - they are shared by a majority of Americans. However, the fact that these sentiments were expressed by former President Bill Clinton, arguably the most revered figure in the Democratic Party, speaks volumes about the real impact Obamacare is having on the American middle class.

The American people have known since it's inception that Obamacare is a disaster. It has done lasting damage to individual health care options and to the market for health insurance. And in the waning days of his presidency, President Obama himself is even recognizing that the flaws the program has might give way to its demise.

Even Congressional Democrats have been developing buyer's remorse for blindly supporting the law in the first

place. Dissent of Obamacare has suddenly become a bipartisan issue as evidenced by Bill Clinton's unexpected candor.

I could say that I'm shocked that one of the country's leading Democratic leaders has pulled the curtain back on the truth of Obamacare. But the reality is that like most Americans, Bill Clinton has come to the conclusion that Obamacare just does not work. I give President Clinton credit for this one and I fully agree with him - the law simply "doesn't make sense."

The fundamental flaw of Obamacare is the rapidly rising premiums, which pay for increasingly inferior healthcare. In some states like Minnesota, premiums are increasing by almost 70 percent. Yet despite these massive premium increases, the top four insurance companies in the country are

Giving away control of the internet

When Oklahomans asked me to represent them in Washington DC, I knew that I would not win every fight on every policy, but I understood many issues are worth the fight and the stand, even if you do not win. But I can honestly say, I never dreamed I would have to fight with the President and other members of the Senate over the future of the Internet.

In case you have not heard, on October 1, President Obama inexplicably gave away American stewardship of one of the greatest technological advancements in the history of the world, the internet.

The internet was created in the U.S., which is why the Department of Commerce had oversight of the naming functions. As a medium for communication and commerce and a product and forum for our First Amendment right of free speech, jurisdiction over the management of the naming

functions is important to protect the free and open platform which guided the platform from its creation.

Unfortunately the President gave away the control of the future of the internet to an international body with no promise of protection for free speech.

The internet's domain name system, like .com and .org, addresses, was completely handed over from the Department of Commerce and day-to-day oversight from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) to a global nonprofit organization called the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers, or ICANN.

ICANN is an organization made up of technical experts, representatives of businesses and more than a hundred foreign governments, which includes oppressive regimes such as China, Russia, Vietnam and Iran.

President Obama has advo-

cated giving away America's protection of free speech on the internet for years, even though many Americans, including myself, raised serious concerns about its impact on the future of the internet.

Because of the Administration's obsession to give away the future of the internet, in the funding bill for Fiscal Year 2016, we included clear language to prohibit the Department of Commerce from transitioning the functions to an outside entity. Some of us, in Congress, have fought this on multiple fronts.

Earlier this year, myself, and Senators Ted Cruz and Mike Lee challenged ICANN CEO's involvement with the World Internet Conference and his commitment to free speech. In May and June, we also exposed the NTIA's apparent violation of federal law in using federal funds to transfer internet au-

Healthy people

Dear Editor,

I'm not talking about oil, gas, coal, wind, or solar panels. I'm not talking about healthy people running, trotting, and walking on our streets. Also, health clubs full of many people paying good money to lift weights, running on a treadmill, and rolling around on the floor doing push-ups and such things just to be healthy.

What a waste of energy. I have a great plan.

We build some twenty foot diameter cages. Inside the cage steps will be 28 inches apart for people to walk on. The cages will be sitting on nine 8 inch rollers that will roll as people walk on the steps inside the cage. This cage can be built as long as needed.

Where addiction holds a grip treatment is lagging

For many Oklahomans, the tug of war between drug addiction and the wait time for treatment can be a one-sided competition: The power of addiction often wins.

Those who lack insurance or cannot pay out of pocket often find themselves on a long waiting list that prioritizes the most severe drug addiction cases. If the person isn't pregnant or injecting drugs, he or she will not receive state-funded treatment or will be forced to wait, sometimes weeks, until a spot opens up.

The problem is exacerbated in rural areas, where there are fewer drug and alcohol treatment facilities and higher percentages of people who lack the health insurance or cash to get the care.

"Usually, if you're not an IV drug user, it takes awhile (to get treatment)," said Kim Burns, a clinical social worker at Hugo's Kiamichi Council on Alcoholism and Other Drug Abuse. "We had a lady (addicted to alcohol) who was just begging. We did get her into a bed, but she had to wait five days, and she has to be clean just to get into the facility."

That wait time can mean the difference between recovery and falling back into addiction. "The addicts, they've got to get in when they're motivated," said Robinson Tolbert, a social worker who helped found the Stigler Health and Wellness Center's mental health unit. "By the time they can get in, they've relapsed and they're no longer motivated."

The waiting list for treatment at state-contracted facilities is usually between 600 and 800 people, according to the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services.

An Oklahoma Watch analysis of data from the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner points to the problem of substance abuse in rural areas.

Among the 10 counties with the highest rates of accidental fatal overdoses in 2014 and 2015, seven are mostly rural, as defined by the federal government. The other three – Muskogee, Stephens and Murray – are commonly considered rural counties.

Most of those same counties also had higher than average rates of suicides, residents reporting frequent mental distress and hospital discharges with a substance abuse-related diagnosis, the data shows.

The risk factors for drug and alcohol abuse are particularly strong in rural Oklahoma, from generational poverty to chronic unemployment.

That helps spawn an attractive market for drug traffickers. **'Drugs Everywhere'**

Five years ago, Michael Ginsburg appeared to have overcome a crippling drug addiction and turned his life around.

But he hadn't. The classically trained violinist and 2007 Oklahoma fiddle champion moved to the McAlester area in 2010.

A Pennsylvania native, he had been arrested on a drug charge there and then was charged with manslaughter for the overdose deaths of two people to whom he sold heroin in 2005. First he was sent to Narconon, a rehabilitation facility in Canadian, north of McAlester. Then he returned to Pennsylvania and served 2½ years in prison related to the heroin deaths.

He returned to McAlester in 2010 and began working as a Narconon spokesperson. He even started a program called "Take McAlester Back," with the goal of promoting the arts while discouraging drug use.

But in 2011, he began using again.

"I picked up and used once and it just took that one time to remind me of what it was like and what I enjoyed about it," Ginsburg said. "All the consequences – I just didn't think about them."

Ginsburg began using methamphetamine, oxymorphone and other drugs, all while publicly promoting an anti-drug message.

"I found myself going to drug education programs with the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and I was getting high at the same time," Ginsburg said. "I had a certain image I felt I had to uphold."

Finding drugs in McAlester and other parts of southeastern Oklahoma was not a problem, said Ginsburg, who now lives out of state.

"In McAlester, there are drugs everywhere," Ginsburg said. "Even if I tried to be clean, people would come knocking on my door or window. Drugs will find you if you step foot into that scene."

One Drug After Another
Oklahoma's rate of drug overdose deaths has been among the highest in the nation in recent years, according to federal data. State Medical Examiner data show that the number of deaths dropped by 5 percent last year, to 823, but health and law enforcement officials are alarmed by a surge in fatal methamphetamine and heroin overdoses.

Washington County, home to Bartlesville, has been especially hard hit by the opioid epidemic, and now heroin is taking a toll. Laws aimed at curbing opioid abuse have caused addicts to shift to heroin, treatment experts say.

"I can tell you heroin is coming, heroin is here," said

Jim Warring, a detective with the Bartlesville Police Department. "It's here and I think it's going to make meth look like Christmas."

But use of meth and opioids remain huge problems in rural areas, said Phil Black, director of development for CREOKS, a community mental health center that serves east central Oklahoma.

"The drug problem in this state is definitely an epidemic," Black said. "It's a massive issue, and it permeates all socioeconomic levels."

Leah Thompson Carter knows the pain of the drug crisis all too well.

On the morning of March 6, the Bartlesville mother went to her son's bedroom to ask him if he wanted to go to church with her. But when she walked in, she found Michael Thompson in bed, unresponsive.

His death was caused by an overdose of pain medications prescribed to him for polycystic kidney disorder.

Thompson, 24, was a promising athlete and a loving father, but there were signs he was misusing drugs, she said.

Now, Thompson Carter is seeking help for another son who struggles with drug addiction, but finding such treatment is difficult.

"I've been asking for help and I can't find anywhere to get help for him unless he's a needle user," Thompson Carter said. "I seek answers so I don't have to do this again."

A Tangle of Reasons
Last year, a drug sweep involving local law enforcement officers and the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs in the town of Clayton, located in Pushmataha County, netted nearly 40 people, or nearly five percent of the town's population.

Other small Oklahoma towns have also seen large numbers of people arrested in drug sweeps, said Mark Woodward, bureau spokesman.

In several cases, major drug traffickers have set up shop in rural areas to avoid the scrutiny they would otherwise receive in urban areas, Woodward said.

"It's critical for agencies like the Bureau of Narcotics to work with those local departments, because they may only have three, four, or five officers," Woodward said. "They can't pull a guy off the streets to work six months undercover."

The reasons for high substance-abuse rates in rural areas are complex and intertwined, treatment providers say.

Underlying much of the prob-

lem is untreated mental illness.

Combined with a lack of jobs, generational poverty, family environment and even boredom, a shortage of mental-health providers can increase the prevalence of addiction.

In Quinton, a community of around 1,000 in southeast Oklahoma, drugs have become a major problem, said Amanda Needham, a resident who was addicted to meth before going into rehab in Oklahoma City. Pittsburg County, home to Quinton, has posted high fatal overdose rates in recent years.

"It's easier to find drugs than a job," Needham said. "When you're bored, that's all you think about – how to get drugs and what kind of drugs

to do. Unless you go fishing or hunting or something like that, there's not much to do in

a small town."

Needham said she had used meth since she was 12, but it wasn't until she got a divorce that she began using a needle. "I didn't know how to cope with it," said Needham, who now lives in Texas. "I had been on dope for years. It was easier for me to blame my problems on it if I increased my drug use."

Dr. Michael Woods, a Bartlesville family medicine doctor, said people often seek out prescription painkillers from doctors rather than ask a physician for help to address mental-health issues.

"The people who come into the office that are problem cases with opioid addiction all have mental health problems," Woods said.

Anxiety, bipolar disorder and depression cause people to seek out illicit drugs to self-medicate, said Charles Danley, CEO of Grand Lake Mental Health Center.

Another big contributor to substance abuse is family environment, which may set chil-

dren on the path to addiction.

"Kids these days are under so much pressure. They're not always taught healthy coping skills," said Teresa Huggins, CEO of the Stigler Health Center.

Danley said some children begin drug use as young as age 10, which points to the need for prevention and treatment programs in schools.

Barriers to Escape
Getting help for addiction in cities or small towns can be difficult. But affordable extended-inpatient programs and mental-health professionals tend to be clustered near urban areas, despite higher poverty rates in rural ones.

Needham said she ran into this problem. The only way she could get into a program, she said, was after being arrested.

"You have to either absolutely want it or you get in trouble with the law and you're forced to," Needham said. "It's easier to get a divorce than it is

thority to ICANN.

In June, I joined Cruz and Lee again in introducing the Protecting Internet Freedom Act (S. 3034), a bill to prevent the Obama administration from transferring internet authority to ICANN.

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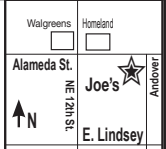


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Lexington Community News

to get help.”

I kept telling them (prosecutors and probation officers) I need rehab, because as long as I’m in this little town, not having my own place to live and staying from person to person – that’s all I knew was people who did drugs, so I couldn’t get clean,” she said.

Burns, of the Kiamichi Council in Hugo, said rural residents addicted to drugs often don’t have a job and can’t afford treatment, meaning the cost will fall to the state.

“Some had no running water, no electricity. It was like that because they were so deep into their drug addiction,” Burns said. “It’s either you don’t make enough money and can’t get treatment or you make too much and then it’s private pay.”

A revamping of the inpatient waiting list by the Mental Health Department has helped expedite finding people a bed, Burns said. But the system still prioritizes intravenous drug users and pregnant women over other types of drug users.

Dr. Ray Cordry, an Oklahoma City psychiatrist who has worked in rural Oklahoma, said many of the 30-day treatment models – in which a person is first detoxed and then stays in an inpatient program for 30 days – is virtually nonexistent in Oklahoma.

“There’s no place to treat them. It’s been so long since

there were very many 30-day programs, a lot of the younger doctors have never seen a 30-day program,” Cordry said.

Most counties have drug courts, which have been effective at helping people overcome addiction, said Kim Hamilton, site director for CREOKS’ Okmulgee clinic. “They’re very disciplined programs with specific requirements of the client,” Hamilton said. Typically, clients have reached the point where they’re facing serious sentences if they don’t participate.

But for low-level offenders with only a misdemeanor drug charge, drug court is not an option. Courts do require such offenders to enter treatment, but often the treatment doesn’t stick, said Burns, of the Kiamichi Council in Hugo.

“Some of it was good – it helped turn their life around,” Burns said. “And some of them, a week after they hit stage five, were back at it again.”

to receive their VA benefits for many years and then they came to us and were approved in just a few months. As the VA Accredited Claims Agent for all of the veterans and spouses who are represented at the Department of Veterans Affairs by us, I receive a copy of all correspondence and the rating decisions on each of them. On those that a reply is needed, we send a letter to the veteran or spouse telling them what they need to do and what benefits they are entitled to receive. This could be some of the Oklahoma State benefits such as reduced auto tags, property tax exemption, sales tax exemption and a host of others. There are too many veterans and their families who are struggling to keep a roof over their head because of disabilities that were caused by or aggravated by their military service. The cost of war does not stop when a veteran is released from the military. Many of them have disabilities that are visible while many others are suffering from PTSD or other undiagnosed illnesses. As many parents, wives or children of veterans will tell you, many of them are never the same after serving tours in combat or other stressful situations. One of the goals that I have had for the past 25 years is to encourage veterans to seek counseling for a better understanding of what happened to them. In the early 90s, I went to the Oklahoma City Veterans Center for help understanding why I kept reliving my military experiences. When I was put in a group of 15 veterans, and we talked about our experiences I learned that we were more alike than different. I was not the only person who was reliving Vietnam. This was the turning point of my life that began my mission to help others. It was probably the best therapy that I could have found. I have also found that when we help a veteran receive the VA benefits that they are eligible for, their life does get better for them. As most of you know, we are a 501(c)(3) non-profit with your donations to this organization being tax deductible. Each week we use the money donated to provide services to veterans and their surviving spouses who would otherwise be without. Currently, we spend an average of \$30,000 each month to provide services to the veterans and surviving spouses who we represent. The combined donations we receive each month is approximately \$20,000, and we are withdrawing an average of \$10,000 each month from our savings account to make up the difference. If it is possible for the veterans, we need to help pay it forward for the next veteran who needs assistance. If we are unable to receive the needed funds at some point, we will be forced to reduce the assistance we provide to veterans and their spouses. For those of you who would like to make a monthly donation, we can set up an au-

tomatic withdrawal from either a credit card or from your bank account. If you are a veteran or a family member, please stop by on Tuesday or Thursday morning to talk to one of the lawyers from Legal Aid. They don’t handle criminal matters, and their service is free to those who qualify. On each and every visit, veterans should bring all of their DD-214’s (discharge papers), all VA rating letters, and all VA forms that have been filed. For privacy reasons, Dale K Grahams Veteran’s Corner does not keep your information on file and does not have access to any of this information. A couple of things are sometimes needed to file for VA benefits are D214 discharge papers, bank account information (voided check), marriage information, social security information, and all VA rating decisions. 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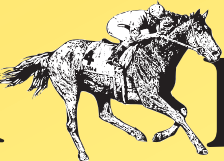

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Deacon John Warren preached this past Sunday. The liturgy - 2 Kings 5, Luke 17:11-19 - invited us to a spirit of gratitude for healing, for forgiveness, for God's mercy.

There was once a very wise and compassionate rabbi who served a congregation in a small European village. The villagers loved the rabbi and often came to him to pour out their hearts with their woes. Nagging spouses, aches and pains, lazy children - the rabbi listened patiently day in and day out. "Why is God making my life so difficult? Why must I suffer more than others? Why can't my life be as profitable as his or as comfortable as hers?" The rabbi heard it all over and over again.

Then the rabbi came up with a plan. He announced to the congregation, "Place your troubles in a bag with your name on it," the rabbi said. "On Friday, just before the start of Sabbath, we will hang the bags on the great tree in the center of the village. Everyone will be allowed to exchange troubles and go home with those of your neighbor rather than your own."

The rabbi's proposal was enthusiastically greeted by the villagers, eager at the prospect to exchange their troubles for someone else's, imagining that their lives would be easier and

happier from that day on. On Friday, just before sundown, the villagers gathered beneath the tree with bags in hand. They tied their bags to the branches and the rabbi offered a blessing. Then the rabbi directed: "Now, if you will all move about inspecting the bags, you may choose someone else's troubles to take home, thus freeing yourselves from your own."

The villagers rushed to the tree and began peering into the bags of those they thought had happier lives than they did. But before long the villagers grew quiet, moved by what they read of the plight of their neighbors' struggles and disappointments. They also felt foolish. And wiser. Each family then sought out their own bag and walked home to celebrate Sabbath.

The rabbi smiled. It was just as he had hoped. The villagers had come to realize the sorrows of others. They became more thankful for what they had - and kinder to one another. They chose to bear their own burdens more patiently, and respected others who were also bearing their own burdens.

We can choose to be sorrowful, resentful jealous and cynical—and we may have good reasons for feeling that way. Or we can put aside our disappointments and be grateful for what we have. We can be grateful for

the good we possess.

Even the outcast and the foreigner were healed by Jesus. Their illnesses were healed and they were given the gift of faith. How often have you or I been one of the other nine lepers, who did not return to give thanks? (Lk. 17). I have to recognize my daily blessings before I can be thankful for them: my spiritual healings, the grace to reach out to others. God repeatedly assures us: "I have loved you with an everlasting love, I have called you and you are mine." (Jeremiah 31:3) You are mine, God says to each of us. Like the grateful leper, let us thank God every day for our many blessings.

Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Welcome, friends, to our weekly front porch visit. We hope your week is going well.

We are glad to be able to visit with you this week from one of the great books of the Old Testament, the book of Ruth. The story is "A Mother's Homecoming." By the end, we

will be reminded again that there really is no better place to be than the House of the Lord.

The book of Ruth begins with the tragic story of a Bethlehemite named Elimelech, a man who lives during the time of a great famine with his wife Naomi and two sons, Mahlon and Chilion. Elimelech and his family live in one of the most special places in the Bible: Bethlehem. Bethlehem, certainly, needs no introduction to any of us. The name means "House of Bread." What a beautiful description of the place where God's presence is! We would do well always to remember that there is no better place to be than in the house of bread. It is better to be in the house of bread during a famine than to live in a land of plenty away from God.

But Elimelech does not understand that great truth. He seems to be frustrated with

his inability to provide for his family a little better. He comes home one day and breaks the news to his wife:

"Naomi, we're moving to Moab."

The Israelites had left Moab with their worldly view long, long ago. They had fought great battles against Moab so that they could cross over the Jordan and secure the Promised Land.

Surely Elimelech makes a poor decision in leaving God's country and returning to Moab. Elimelech does not have to travel far from his home in Bethlehem until he comes to the Dead Sea. Appropriately, he crosses that ominous water, goes on to Moab, and dies. He does not survive long in that far country, and his wonderful wife and two sons have to bury him in a foreign land (Ruth 1:3).

Church:

Naomi and her two sons stay in Moab, and the two boys marry Moabite daughters, two girls named Orpah and Ruth. But tragedy strikes again, and the two boys die and are buried right alongside their father.

Left with nothing except two grieving daughters-in-law, the heartbroken Naomi decides to go home. The inspired writer says that, “Then she arose with her daughters in law that she might return from the country of Moab” (Ruth 1:6).

Naomi decides to go home! Few stories are greater than homecoming stories. The Lord tells the parable centuries later of a young boy who, also, had explored that far country and decided to go back home. The story recorded in the fifteenth chapter of Luke is one of the greatest stories ever told.

Naomi heads back home, and, amazingly, she is not alone. Her two daughters-in-law go back with her. Her influence has been so great they wanted to be with her. Orpah goes partway, but when she counts the cost she decides to go back to her people. She kisses her wonderful mother-in-law, and heads

back to Moab. As she walks away, Naomi – no doubt with tear-filled eyes – turns to Ruth and says, “My sweet daughter, you go on home, too.”

Ruth stands up tall, looks in Naomi’s teary eyes, then delivers one of the greatest speeches recorded in holy scripture:

“Intreat me not to leave you,” she says resolutely, “or to return from following after thee: for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge: thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God” (Ruth 1:16).

I have often thought that Ruth demonstrates that rare strength and courage it takes today to be a Christian. Regardless of the hard times that may lie ahead, a woman such as Ruth is willing to stay the course. Like Ruth, we, too, must understand that there is no better place to be than in the House of Bread – whether in good times or bad.

So today we say with Ruth, “Intreat me not to leave thee!”

We are home. And at home is where we will stay.
