Glasgow faces misdemeanor

Reckless conduct with a firearm

Purcell Police Sgt. Kyle Glasgow has been charged with a misdemeanor in conjunction with an incident last year when a dog was allegedly shot with Glasgow's service weapon.

The incident on Reece Lake Road in October of

2016 was investigated by the McClain County Sheriff's Department and the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, according to Purcell Sgt. Det. Scott Stephens.

Glasgow, an Administrative Support Liaison with the Purcell Police Department, faces a charge of reckless

conduct with a firearm in McClain County District Court.

According to Stephens, Glasgow has been suspended with pay.

"The city is going to have an independent investigation on his status with regard to what happened," Stephens told **The Purcell Register**.

Clayton Colley knows what it is to work hard for your money.

In farm fields surrounding Oquawka, Ill., Clayton entered the workforce earning the princely sum of 50 cents an hour for detasseling the corn rows for a seed company.

He was 13 and what he remembers most is the job required he get a Social Security number and pay taxes.

He would later find work in the rural area helping farmers bale their hay. That paid \$1 a hour and taxes weren't a consideration. As an older teen, he picked tomatoes after school and on weekends for 50 cents a crate.

The experiences built a work ethic for the rest of his life—lessons that weren't lost on Clayton.

He joined the Navy at 17, serving one tour.

When his enlistment was up, Clayton found work at a lawnmower company and later a dredging company on the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers.

In 1966 or thereabouts, he became a merchant seaman on the West Indies, a seagoing tug sailing between Port Everglades, Fla., and the Bahamas.

He then was a well point installer and bulldozer operator at Hollywood, Fla.

He returned to the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers for two tours as a deckhand and assistant engineer on a tow boat before heading back to Florida for another stint of well point and dozer work.

Then it was to Minnesota to learn a building trade and a career spanning a quarter-century give or take.

When Minnesota winters slowed the outside work, Clayton took evening and

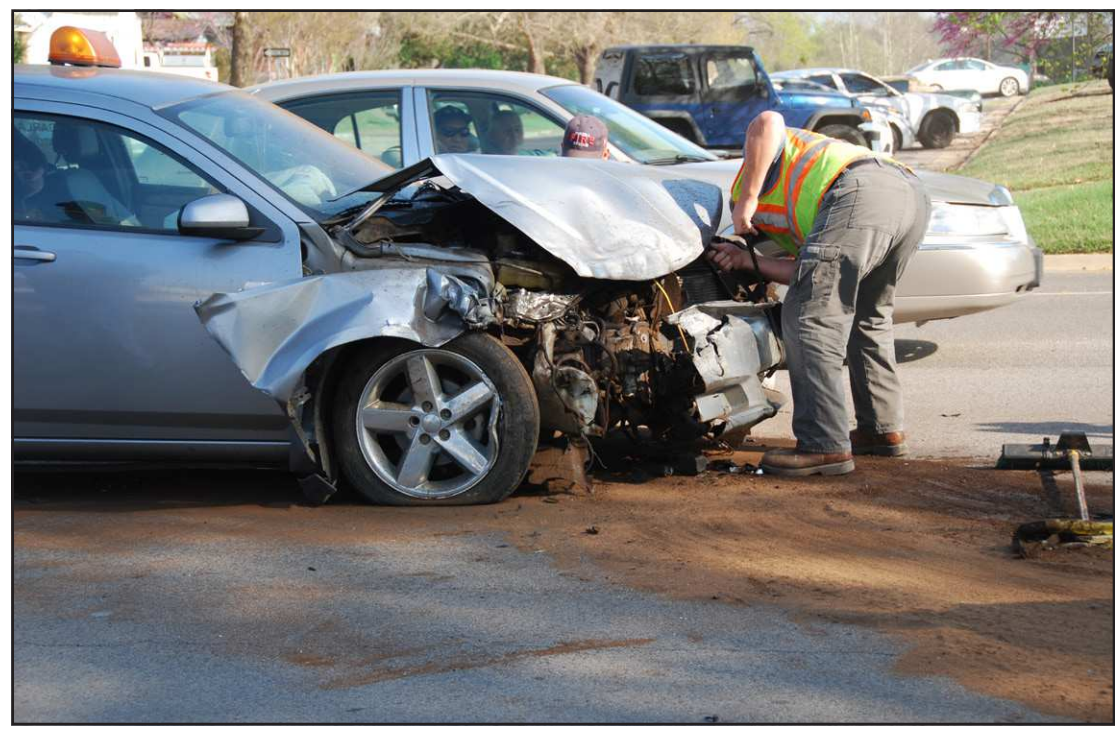

Making sure babies sleep safely

Everyone likes curling into a favorite position for a nap or good night's sleep and babies are no different. But, for little ones, the most comfortable position may not always be the safest.

Positional asphyxia occurs when babies cannot breathe because the position of their body blocks the airway.

"Caregivers should focus on putting infants to sleep in safe places and safe positions," said Laura Hubbs-Tait, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension parenting specialist. "The safest way to accomplish this task is to place babies on their backs in a crib or basinet that has met U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission standards."

Positional asphyxia may occur when a baby's position

blocks his or her nose and mouth such as when a baby's face becomes wedged between a mattress and a headboard. Or, the passage of air from the mouth and nose to the lungs is blocked because the baby's head is slumped over or the chin is pressing into the chest.

Babies who experience reduced oxygen levels as a result of positional asphyxia may later face cognitive or behavioral issues. Positional asphyxia also can be fatal.

Although newborns and young infants are at highest risk for experiencing positional asphyxia, older infants and toddlers also may be affected by the condition.

"Newborns and young infants just aren't strong enough yet to be able to move themselves if their airway becomes blocked, which puts them in danger of experiencing positional

asphyxia," Hubbs-Tait said. "Older infants and toddlers may be at risk if they're slumping while sleeping in a car seat or if the car seat is placed on a bed or other furniture and overturns, trapping them."

Recent research indicates car seats and sling carriers are associated with the highest frequency of positional asphyxia.

However, other carrying devices such as swings, bouncers and strollers also have been connected to incidents of the condition.

"Car seats are safe as long as they're used correctly," Hubbs-Tait said. "They are designed to protect babies in the event of a car accident. They are not designed for safe sleeping or unsupervised awake time."

To reduce the risk of positional asphyxia when using car seats, sling carriers and other carrying devices, caregivers

should read and follow all manufacturer's instructions, said Gina Peek, OSU Cooperative Extension housing and consumer specialist.

"All caregivers, including family members, babysitters and childcare providers, should know how to install and correctly use carrying devices," Peek said. "If necessary, set aside some time to practice until everyone is comfortable."

Families can contact the state or county health department for specific assistance with safely installing and operating car seats.

Purcell Elementary pre-k and kindergarten pre-enrollment

Students planning to attend pre-k or kindergarten in the Purcell School District this fall should plan to pre-enroll April 11 and 12.

Enrollment will be held in the parent resource room at Purcell Elementary on Tuesday, April 11, from 3:30-6 p.m. and on Wednesday, April 12, from 8 a.m. until 2:30 p.m.

Children who will be four years of age prior to Sept. 1, 2017 are eligible for enrollment in the pre-k program. Students

who will be five before Sept. 1, 2017 are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten.

Parents will need to provide a birth certificate and a current immunization record to complete the pre-enrollment process. Residence in the district will be verified at the enrollment confirmation in July. Verification will require proof of residence in the Purcell School District.

Enrollment in pre-k is limited and will be filled on a first

come, first served basis. Packets will be available for pick up in the elementary school office on April 3, 2017.

Please feel free to pick up your packet early in order to complete it before the day of enrollment.

Pursuant to state statute stu-

dents must have current and up to date immunization records upon enrollment in school. Parents may contact the McClain County Health department to complete immunizations.

Northwest Oklahoma wildfires exceed \$16 million in damages

The numbers have been crunched: the March 7 wildfires that ravaged parts of Beaver, Harper and Woodward counties had an economic impact exceeding \$16 million.

"In Oklahoma, more than 310 thousand acres burned causing a wide variety of losses to livestock, pastures, hay, fences and facilities," said Derrell Peel, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension livestock marketing specialist. "Estimates of losses based on preliminary information currently available, sum to a total of \$14.6 million for cattle operations."

In addition, a large hog farm sustained losses of some 6,000

sows and an unknown number of weaning pigs. Peel said hog farm losses of animals and facilities likely total \$2 million dollars or more. Estimated cattle industry losses in Oklahoma include:

- \$6.7 million for fence replacement and repair;
- \$3.5 million for livestock killed or destroyed as a result of the fire plus veterinary costs and reduced value of surviving injured animals;
- \$2.2 million for burned facilities and corrals;
- \$1.3 million for emergency feed; and
- \$920,000 for burned pasture and hay.

"These estimates are based in part on preliminary totals

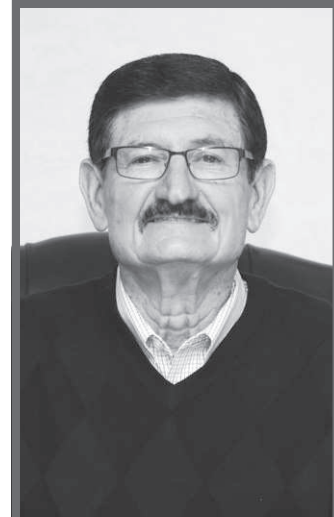
of some 3,000 head of cattle lost and more than 1,100 miles of fences impacted," Peel said. "The current totals do not include any estimates for equipment losses, meaning estimates may increase as a more comprehensive assessment of the losses is completed."

Although the losses incurred in the fires will have significant and long-lasting financial impacts on the operations and families affected, Peel said no significant market impacts on livestock prices are expected.

"The losses incurred are very personal, both in terms of those directly affected and the

House bills advance to Senate, budget work continues

Last week, the House passed 132 bills in advance of the chamber of origin deadline. This deadline required all House bills be considered in the House and all Senate bills in the Senate before they pass to the opposite chamber.

Of the 2,242 bills and resolutions filed at the beginning of this session, only 657 survived this deadline – 316 from the House and 341 from the Senate.

The large number of bills heard last week required several long nights on the House floor and a great deal of focus as we considered one measure after another, including questions and debate.

Our House bills are now the property of the Senate; we hope to get them back in one piece!

If the Senate passes the bills as they are, they go straight to the governor's desk to await her signature to become law. If they are amended, they come back to the House for reconsideration. If the House doesn't agree with the amendments, the bills move into conference committees made up of House and Senate members.

Also last week, we resumed appropriations and budget subcommittee work, with each subcommittee meeting with state agencies to discuss fiscal year 2018 budget priorities. While we want to be sure to appropriately fund areas such as public safety, transportation, education and healthcare, we also have to remain good stewards of taxpayer dollars.

Not every wish-list item can or should be funded. People are much better managers of their own money than the government.

This budget work will continue throughout much of the rest of the session, though House leadership is focused on getting the budget done earlier this year than in the past. The Joint Committee on Appropriations & Budget, made up of House and Senate members, began meeting this week.

One highlight of this session I'd like to point out is the ending of the zero-emission, or wind, tax credit. The House passed a

The healthcare battle is far from over

Last week, Congress came very close to delivering on our promise to repeal and replace Obama Care. For the past seven years, Americans have been burdened by this so-called Affordable Care Act, which caused premiums and deductibles to increase, while choices and providers dwindled. I, along with many of my colleagues in the House, have made repealing this law and replacing it with something that genuinely works, amongst our highest priorities.

Along with Republicans in the House and Senate, President Trump also campaigned heavily to repeal Obamacare, and made it a priority of his presidency. For the past seven years, House Republicans have voted over 70 times to repeal Obamacare, only to face the veto pen by then President Obama. When President Trump was elected, we knew that our opportunity to achieve that objective could become a reality.

Recently, Speaker Paul Ryan introduced the American Health Care Act (AHCA), which was a bill that included provisions to repeal Obamacare and replace it with a working healthcare system that would

benefit millions of Americans. It would allow for a market-based system that will give consumers more choices, give states the authority to regulate Medicare and Medicaid to fit the needs of the states, allow people with pre-existing conditions to purchase health insurance and give people under the age of 26 the opportunity to stay on their parents' plans.

Further, it would nullify the burdensome individual and employer mandates from Obamacare, and introduce new tax credits that would provide more flexibility for families.

In Oklahoma, people have suffered far too long from Obamacare's failures. Premiums have skyrocketed, there is only one remaining insurance provider and people in rural areas have lost access to quality doctors. People deserve better, and the American Health Care Act was that opportunity – it represented a good first step giving Americans a health care system that can work for all.

By no means was this a perfect solution or perfect bill. And it is not likely that Congress will get it right on the first try. However, the legislative process itself has a way of improving and refining public policy. What happened

last week with the AHCA was that some allowed 'perfect' to be the enemy of the good.

In so doing they essentially halted the process itself, thereby shutting off Congress' and the President's opportunity to continue working towards a better, more flexible and more affordable health care policy.

I was fully prepared to support the American Health Care Act, should it have come to the House Floor for a vote. This bill was our first and best chance to repeal Obamacare. I am very disappointed that Congress failed to seize this opportunity.

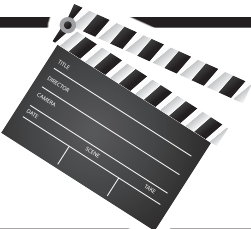
I believe President Trump, Speaker Ryan and House leadership did everything they could to make this bill a working solution. Both of them were in constant contact with the disparate factions and coalitions that make up the Republican Party, and were willing to put their political capital on the line. But at the end of the day, that kind of consensus proved to be elusive.

I commend them, as well as the Republican Conference, for their efforts to understand and accommodate the regional, ideological and economic com-

MOVIES WITH DAVE

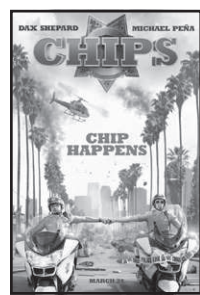

But the evil wizard Gargamel (Rainn Wilson) also discovers the map and follows it hoping to capture the Smurfs and use them to increase his power.

This is the second TV show made into a movie I saw this weekend. Luckily I enjoyed it much more than "CHIPS." Granted that's not setting a very high bar, but this movie was very pleasant and I don't have any major complaints with it.

The story has the feel of an old Saturday morning cartoon, which I don't think is a bad thing. There's nothing wrong with having a simple plot as far as I'm concerned, as long as it's well executed. And while it wasn't as engaging as I would have liked it to be, I still had a good time.

The characters are pretty much what you've come to expect from a Smurfs film. The voice actors do a good enough job bringing them to life and I thought they worked well for the most part. There may have been a moment here or there that felt a little off, but that would mostly be nit-picking.

Third was a sci-fi horror film called "Life" starring Jake Gyllenhaal, Rebecca Ferguson and Ryan Reynolds.

Set on the International Space Station, the crew of the ISS receives a long awaited space probe containing a soil sample from Mars. The tests ran on the sample uncover one of mankind's greatest discoveries, proof of extraterrestrial life.

Those tests end up having major unintended consequences and soon the crew finds themselves fighting for their very survival.

I enjoyed this movie a lot more than I was expecting.

It's a sci-fi horror film featuring a hostile alien life form in an enclosed space vessel, so it's hard not to compare it to Ridley Scott's 1979 film "Alien." And while it is similar, I think this movie does enough different to keep things fresh.

I really liked the setting. I know it's becoming more and more common, but there's still not too many movies completely set in zero gravity and I think they pulled it off very well here. It definitely made the film feel more realistic and grounded in reality.

I thought the actors did a mostly good job with their characters. They didn't always have the most convincing dialog, but I think it felt genuine enough for the most part. The standout performance for me was Ryan Reynolds. The man just oozes charisma and any scene he was in was my favorite.

The movie does drag a little in the beginning while it's setting the stage and introducing the characters, but when this movie gets going it really gets going. I haven't had a film make my heart pound like this in a while. It had me glued to the screen.

While probably not the most

original design, the alien in this movie was absolutely terrifying. The way it attacks and kills was very unsettling and unnerving. Exactly what you want in a movie like this.

This is the third TV show rebooted into a movie I saw this weekend. I'm not sure what's going on, but seems like a bit of a trend.

I never watched the Power Rangers growing up, but I was able to catch a few episodes of the original show before I saw this movie.

Legislative update

Our family strongly supports public education in Oklahoma. Several members of our family are teachers including my wife, Susan, and her mother, Geraldine.

With so much negativity about our public school system swirling in the media and on social media, I felt compelled to do some research and share the truth about teacher pay in Oklahoma compared to other states.

I encourage you to do your own research as well. You've probably heard, as it's the most common statistic used by many, that Oklahoma ranks 49th in teacher pay nationwide.

Based on their study that is a fact but they simply looked at the minimum salaries of each state not any other factors like cost of living expenses in the various states, which encompasses income tax rates, property tax rates, sales tax rates, the cost of homes or rental prices as well as the cost of groceries, child care, school fees and a number of other expenses.

If you're going to do a study, you need to carefully research and take into account all relative factors.

Oklahoma is continually ranked nationwide as one of the cheapest states to live in, which is a key factor to recognize when discussing salaries for any profession. I, of course, whole-heartedly support pay raises when we have the funds for all of our hardworking public servants, like our teachers and law enforcement officers, as well as our roughly 33,000

Cole: plexities of health care policy.

Repealing Obamacare and creating a replacement with quality, affordable care should remain a public policy priority. The American people deserve better, and I will continue to work with my colleagues to deliver on our promises.

state employees.

Another fact to remember about teacher salaries is that the legislature only sets the minimum salary schedule. Local school boards set everything above that schedule so you'll see teachers making different amounts based on what district they work in – that's because their school board and superintendent made financial decisions to be able to pay them more.

School boards also decide superintendents' and other administrative pay; the legislature has nothing to do with administrative school pay. That's a local decision.

On average, the legislature appropriates 35-36 percent of general revenue to the Department of Education, which then allocates money to the various school districts and the local school boards decide how to use their annual allocation. Traditionally, very few people vote in school board elections but they decide how one-third of state revenues are used in local public schools.

My point, however, is to show that our state teacher minimum salary schedule when compared to other states, along with the overall cost of living, moves Oklahoma much further up the list on salaries.

Let's compare Oklahoma to Texas, which is the most common comparison on social media. The teacher salary statutory minimum in Oklahoma is \$31,600 while in Texas the statutory minimum is only \$27,540. Texas teachers don't make \$31,600 until they've

worked there for five years unless they work for a school that chooses to pay above the minimum salary schedule.

Just as in Oklahoma, schools that typically pay higher salaries are in areas with higher property taxes and other living expenses.

It's all a matter of perspective and what school district a teacher works in. According to the May 10, 2016, Journal Record article, "Periscope: Simple arithmetic on teacher pay," the average salary for Oklahoma City teachers is \$46,635 while the average pay in Dallas is \$55,052.

However, the average Oklahoma City teacher's salary, adjusted for Dallas' cost of living, would be \$55,825; so as the article points out the teacher would actually be losing \$773 per year by moving from Oklahoma City to Dallas. Texas recruiters don't point that fact out, though, and neither does most of the information found on Facebook.

Again, I know we need to increase the minimum salary schedule. I just want people to look beyond the social media rhetoric and make fair comparisons.

18 graham crackers, divided
1/3 cup butter or margarine, melted

3 Tbsp. sugar
48 oz. packages of Philadelphia Cream Cheese, softened

1 cup sugar
1 Tbsp. vanilla
3 Tbsp. flour
4 eggs

1 cup Baker's Semi-Sweet Chocolate Chunks, divided
1 cup Jet-Puffed Miniature Marshmallows
Heat oven to 350°.

Line 13x9-inch pan with foil, with ends of foil extending over sides. Crush 14 graham. Mix with butter and 3 Tbsp. sugar; press onto bottom of prepared pan. Coarsely chop remaining graham.

Beat cream cheese, 1 cup sugar and vanilla in large bowl with mixer until blended. Add flour; mix well. Add eggs, 1 at a time, mixing on low speed after each just until blended. Chop 1/2 cup chocolate chunks; stir into cream cheese batter. Pour over crust. Sprinkle with remaining chocolate chunks, marshmallows and chopped graham.

Bake 40 minutes or until center is almost set. Cool completely. Refrigerate 4 hours. Use foil handles to lift cheesecake from pan before cutting into bars.

The calls, texts and emails are a seasonal phishing scam that spikes during tax season. According to the IRS, the callers claim the victim owes money to the IRS and demand payment through a pre-loaded debit card or wire transfer.

If the victim refuses, he or she is threatened with arrest.

In a town on this scam, the caller may tell the victim they are due a refund to trick them into revealing private information.

The IRS, however, doesn't initiate taxpayer communication through email.

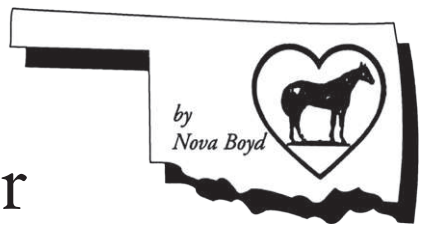
Anyone who thinks they have been contacted by one of these criminals is asked to report the contact to the IRS at phishing@irs.gov or by calling the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 1-800-

366-4484.

Det. David Tomkins with the McClain County Sheriff's Department said the scams often originate from outside the United States. Frequently they are located in Nigeria or Russia.

"Never give your Social Security number or any information over the phone," Tompkins said. "If the caller is harassing you, call the sheriff's department at 527-2141 and ask for me. I will try to help get the calls stopped."

outpouring of support from volunteers," said Darrell McBee, Harper County Extension Office director and agricultural educator.

As the region's primary coordinator of relief efforts, McBee said help has been rushing in from individuals, groups and organizations from 30 states. measure to end this credit as of July 1. By ending the credit as early as possible, in July, the state stands to save up to \$500 million over the next 10 years. The State kept its promise to the wind industry through July, but it was time to end this credit.

I voted to end the wind credit, and I am thankful 2/3 of our members were courageous enough to do the same.

When then Gov. Frank Keating signed this tax credit into law in 2001, the project was projected to cost the state less than \$2 million annually in exchange for expansion of renewable energy and job creation. By 2005 – the first year credits were claimed – they cost the state \$2.7 million. That ballooned to \$64 million by 2015 and was estimated to cost the state \$263 million by 2018. This credit is simply unsustainable for an industry no longer in its infancy.

detectors and replacing or installing first time units in homes throughout Wayne

Regional Chief Executive Brad Barghols said over 100,000 alarms have been installed nationally with the goal by next October to be one million.

"We know we have saved over 200 lives," Barghols said.

Barghols recalled the tragic fire in Oklahoma City where a woman pulled her mother out of their burning house but lost two children in the blaze.

"We were within about two blocks of their house when we ran out of time and personnel. If we would have had three more volunteers that day we could have gotten to their house."

He said Oklahoma is fourth in the nation in fire fatalities per capita.

"That's something we don't want to be at the top of," Barghols said.

When the Red Cross volunteers would enter a residence in addition to checking and installing smoke detectors they also go over tornado preparedness and tell residents to have a plan in case of a fire.

"We tell them to have a meet-

ing place so parents can know if the children are out safe," Barghols said.

The Red Cross says every time you change your clocks, change the batteries in your smoke detectors.

Charlie Sherman, who serves on the Heart of Oklahoma Red Cross Board of Directors was on hand Saturday morning to observe.

Among the Red Cross volunteers and Wayne officials that formed up at the Wayne First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall were Donnell Weatherall, Director of Wayne Emergency Management, Scottie Peery, Sarah Kennedy, Linda Jones,

\$1,000 worth of meat from a freezer, leaving behind only some hamburger from a slaughtered calf.

When investigators went to the Wayne property, they found evidence connecting that burglary to the theft of an enclosed 6-by-12-foot box trailer stolen earlier from Goldsby.

McComb allegedly sold the trailer and a stolen welder to an individual in Creek County.

"We recovered the trailer Friday," Guthrie said. "The buyer didn't know it was stolen and paid fair market value for the trailer."

A break in the case came at 2 a.m. March 8 when a Maysville woman called the sheriff's department, saying she was awakened by her dogs barking.

When she checked to see what the dogs were barking at, she saw a white Toyota pickup at her barn. The pickup, on which the driver's side headlight was out, was towing a white box trailer.

The woman confronted the

people in the pickup and they left her property.

On March 17, Lt. James Richardson of the sheriff's department spotted a pickup matching the description at State Highway 74 and Horse Avenue in Purcell.

It was driven by a woman who told Richardson she borrowed the pickup from McComb.

At McComb's, investigators said they recovered 20 of the items taken in the March 8 Wayne burglary, in addition to the trailer.

Also found was stolen property linking McComb to three other burglaries in McClain County.

weekend jobs in retail.

A brother-in-law was in Oklahoma and urged Clayton to come to the Sooner state where there was plenty of work to be found..

It was 1980 and the oil patch was booming.

"I came out first in November 1980," he said, "and worked until the oil bust" in the mid-1980s.

By then, Clayton, his wife Susan, and three of their six children – Stacy, Shandie and Jeremy – were well settled in the Washington community and schools.

Susan was a nurse at Sunset Estates in Purcell, a job she continues close to 30 years later.

And life was about to take a major turn.

In late 1994, Clayton became one of the founding members of the Sheriff's Posse, a senior citizen advocacy group initiated by then McClain County Sheriff Dwain Anderson.

Clayton enjoyed that so much that when he saw an advertisement for CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates), he volunteered.

That was in 1998 and he's still with the program that sees most volunteers burn out in a year after working one or two cases.

Clayton admits he's come close to quitting a few times.

But being the voice for "well over 100 kids" during an 18-1/2 year tenure is hard to walk away from.

In fact, he and others believe his years of service with CASA may be a statewide record.

His case load has ranged from abuse cases and failure to protect to instances where one or both parents are drug abusers.

"My goal is to fight for reunification (of the family) wherever possible," Clayton said. "Where it's not possible, I fight for permanent removal of the children. My word in court carries a lot of weight."

An unwavering advocate's soul sometimes puts him at odds with the Department of Human Services.

"DHS sometimes doesn't realize if people are dirt poor, they can't do everything DHS wants done," he explained.

Clayton has been known to buy a needed appliance or provide a little financial aid out of his own pocket to help struggling parents get on their feet if

Garvin, Lincoln, Custer, Creek and Pottawatomie counties.

Approximately eight individuals were involved in the ring, Guthrie said.

"They were out stealing, making easy money to feed their drug habits," he said. "They sold a lot on Facebook."

McComb, the detective said, sold items to buyers as far away as Lockridge, Iowa. A Don Rich custom cow horse saddle valued at more than \$3,500 was sold to a company that deals in Don Rich saddles.

"They had no idea it was stolen," Guthrie said.

The ring is also suspected in several vehicle thefts.

"The dots are starting to fall into place," Guthrie said of the investigation.

Each case for CASA can last anywhere from one to several years.

"I stay with a case until it's cleared one way or the other," Clayton said, adding he usually works two cases at a time.

Sometimes the cases he's handed are repeats.

He said he will continue being a CASA volunteer "until I get old." In his 70s now, he reckons that won't be for "at least a couple more years."

But back to the late 1990s.

Clayton was selected to attend the Oklahoma Aging Leadership Academy in 1999, graduating in 2000.

It was also in 1999 that he went to work as a juvenile detention officer at the diagnostic and evaluation center in Norman, as well an Office of Juvenile Affairs facility in Chickasha for "hard core" teenage girls.

He helped the sheriff's department transport juveniles to and from court. He was also a field officer after graduating from the sheriff's reserve academy.

He left that position at age 60 to return to college and earn credits in social and criminal justice.

Oh, and when he was 55, he took up skydiving.

In his spare time, he volunteered as a mediator in Cleveland County District Court.

Now he's retired. Sort of.

Some years back he went online and got credentials as a minister. His business card states he performs informal weddings for "no fees—gratuity welcome."

"I run across a lot of people who want to get married and can't afford it," he explained.

He's officiated weddings at venues ranging from bed and breakfast inns to courthouse lawns to area lakes.

Among the dozens of couples he's married are a daughter and son-in-law. He's also officiated at the nuptials of co-workers and the daughter of a CASA supervisor.

He advertises his services by passing out some business cards at the Cleveland and McClain county courthouses.

Clayton's wedding ceremony is brief – about five minutes.

"It's really a good deal" for the couples, he said.

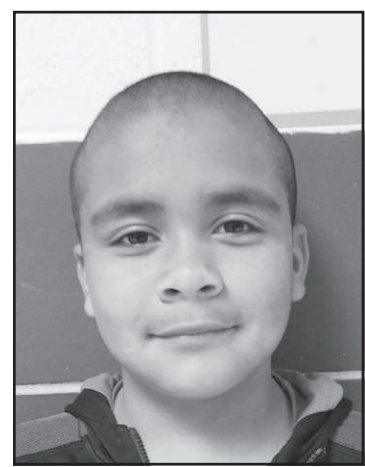

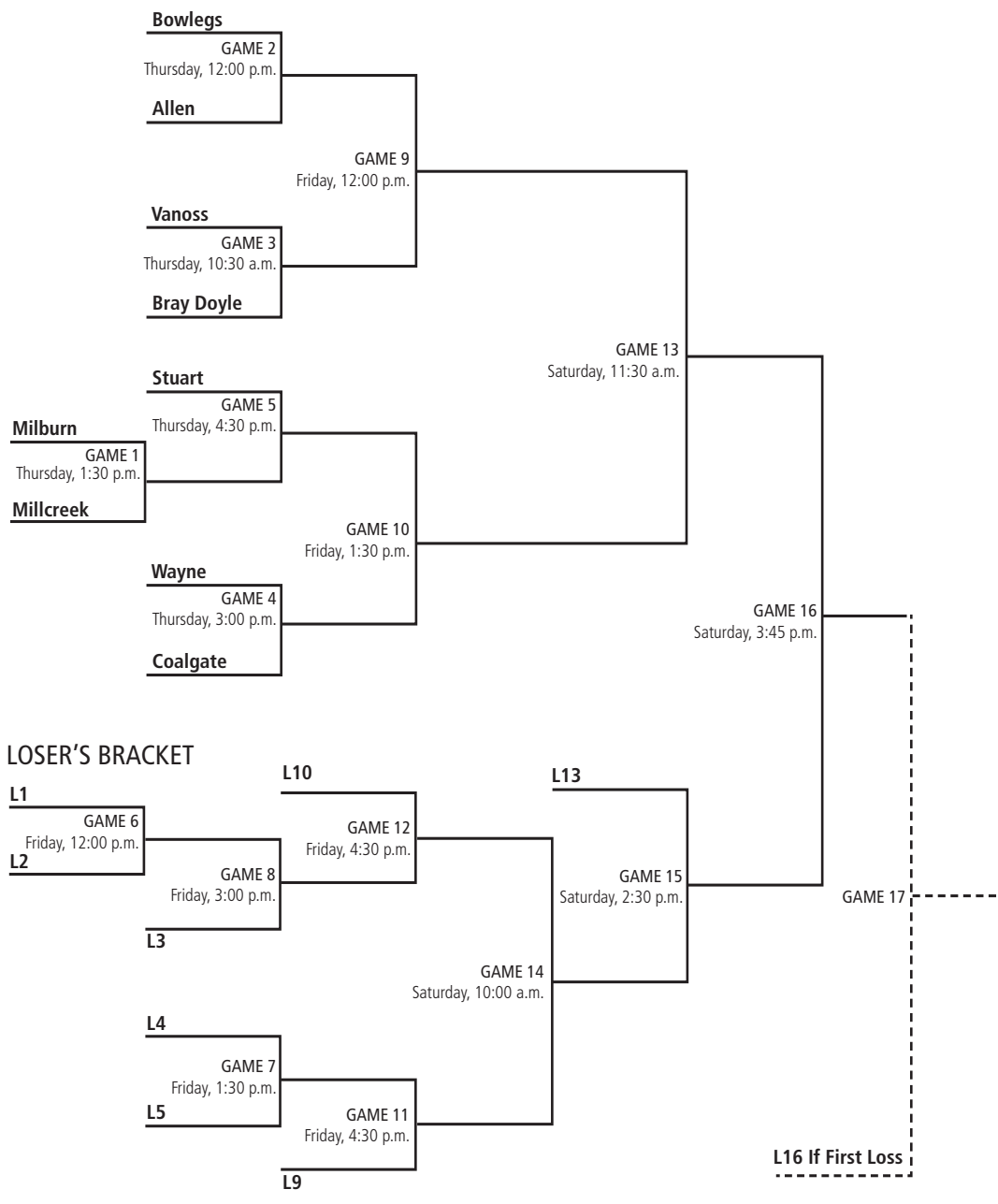

I was honored and surprised last week with a visit from Eunice Khoury of Well Preserved Radio Show on iHeart Radio. I am honored to have been selected as their 700th Senior Salute of the Week. The Well Preserved Advisory Group picked my family and me up in a limo and took us to dinner in Norman to celebrate the award.

I appreciate Synergy Home Care, Kings Limo Service, The Oklahoma Senior Journal, KTOK News Radio 1000, Eunice Khoury and the Well Preserved Advisory Group for such a great honor. I am deeply grateful for the honor of the Eunice Khoury Salute #700 Award. I appreciate your support of our nation's veterans and their families. You can listen to the radio spot online at www.wellpreserved.info/audio/dale-k-graham.mp3

Before 5 a.m. each Tuesday and Thursday morning we arrive to volunteer, helping veterans and surviving spouses apply for VA benefits. When we open the doors at 5:30 a.m. there will be from 25 to 30 veterans and their families already lined up waiting for their turn to be seen by one of our volunteers. We can help an average of 100 of them each morning with their claims and questions.

Some of these men and women have traveled hundreds of miles for the assistance that our volunteers provide. Many people asked me why so many veterans visit us when other places are available where they could go for help. I tell them about our success rate in helping veterans. We believe our volunteers trained to use our methods work better than other organizations. Most of the people who we see are excited that our volunteers are primarily veterans and surviving spouses who have walked in their shoes, and can understand what is required for them to be approved for VA benefits. We have volunteers who have been helping us provide our services for over 15 years.

We started tracking the number of veterans who have a Norman address to see how many from our town we have helped to receive benefits. Currently, our records show almost 300 veterans from Norman whom we have been able to help.

One of the things I have seen many times is that veterans won't file a claim for benefits until they are unable to care for themselves. My thoughts on this subject are that veterans should file for their VA benefits now before a critical need occurs to keep their families from facing a financial hardship when they have to pay for the cost of a veteran's care. A veteran who is rated at 70 percent service connected is eligible to live in one of our state facilities or a VA approved facility at no charge.

One of the changes we have made in our procedures to help veterans receive the maximum VA benefits is our new triage system. This means that our most experienced volunteers including myself will visit with each veteran or family member soon after they arrive to help determine which forms need to be filled out. This system has improved the quality of claims and less wait time for most veterans. Since implementing this system our on-site work day has been shortened by a couple of hours each day. Many of the veterans who visit us are finished by 9 a.m. and on their way home. We continue to train our volunteers and have training scheduled in April which should help us to process claims even more quickly.

Each Tuesday and Thursday morning we accept the first 100 veterans and surviving spouses

that arrive by 8:30 a.m. or so. After that, we may be able to take someone who has traveled a long distance or is disabled. It does make it easier for our volunteers if everyone is signed in by that time.

Our organization's mission is to improve the lives of all veterans and their families. The support from veterans and others in our community enables us to continue to make a positive impact on all veterans and their families. With your continued support, we hope to have a facility in Norman where we will be able to do more. With so many people who are around my age, we need easy access to any location where we provide our services.

I believe that we could increase the number of veterans and their families who are assisted to receive VA benefits if we were able to be open more than just two days each week as we are now. When we first started helping veterans back in 2003, I wondered how long it would take for all of the men and women we helped to receive a million dollars a year annually. That being said, based on the VA rating decisions I receive each week for the people I represent, currently we are averaging almost one million annually. This is going to add up to somewhere around 50 million dollars each year for the men and women we are helping today.

Two surviving spouses were awarded benefits. Fourteen veterans were awarded 100 percent benefits that total on an annual basis \$518,125. Forty-five veterans were awarded benefits ranging from 10-90 percent. That dollar amount, on an annual basis, totals \$526,839.

As we see an increased number of veterans who are facing financial hardship, the amount of monies we are using to help these men and women continues to increase. Currently, the cost in direct support to these men and women is averaging \$30,000 each month. As we move forward with our plans to increase our footprint in the Norman area, I foresee a time when the number of veterans and their families who need assistance is going to increase dramatically.

The demand for the food baskets we provide for those who are hungry continues to increase each week.

Our drivers Clayton Lee and Louie Metself are averaging a thousand miles each week transporting veterans to their VA medical appointments. This week they spent 66 hours transporting 20 veterans. We could really use a handicapped accessible van to transport wheelchair-bound veterans. Please let us know if you have one. We are a 501(c)(3) non-profit where your donations are

tax deductible.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. 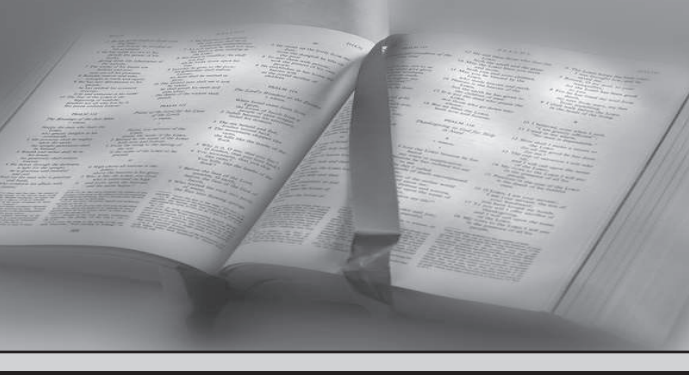

For I have chosen my new king from among his sons."

When Samuel arrived, Jesse presented each of seven sons. They were tall and strong and handsome. Each of them looked like a strong king. Samuel looked at each one of these. But none of them was the one that God wanted. Samuel asked Jesse: "Do you have any more sons?" Jesse replied: "Yes, he is the youngest and is tending the sheep. I don't think he is the one you want." But Samuel said "Bring him here." And so they brought David, the youngest son, to Samuel.

David was small and quiet

and more sensitive than his older brothers. He was not strong or tough like his older brothers. And Samuel said "This is the one that God has chosen. This is the one that God has chosen as his king." God sees in a different way than man sees. Man sees the outward appearance. But God sees deep into the heart. God sees the beauty inside of a person. God judges us – not by how we look on the outside – but how we love and feel on the inside. He judges us by our capacity to love.

In Sunday's Gospel, Jesus smeared mud on the eyes of the man who had been blind all his life (John 9). Jesus gave him back his sight. And he wanted him to see things differently now. He wanted him to see how God sees, how God judges others – not by their outward appearance, but by the deep feelings of their heart.

appearance – by the clothes they wear or the color of their skin. Let us pray that we will look into their hearts and love their sweetness from within.

up and established, they have to follow Jesus, and the Lord. writes the evangelist Mark, "leads" them up into that high mountain.

But following the Lord isn't an easy thing, not at all! These three disciples have to work! Faith, you see, is work! They have to climb that mountain and sweat and labor. I suppose that image is one of the best to describe faith – the toiling, the sore muscles, the fatigue of climbing a tall mountain.

Faith never comes easy. Infidelity does. Being an agnostic comes easy because you do not have to do anything. You just have to say, "I don't know." But if you truly "don't know," faith—or at least a desire to have faith—requires you to say, "Let me find out. I'm sure there is a true answer if I will search."

Yes, labor is, indeed, the foundation of faith. It forces you to make a decision. It makes you read. It makes you pay attention to the details that lead to faith. It makes you ques-

tion, then search diligently to find the answer. It makes you lay aside previous ideas and long-held positions to accept what the Lord actually says, when you may never have even thought of those things before. It makes you place what you used to believe beside that which you read, then be honest enough – to want true faith badly enough – to seize Truth and discard error.

It makes you take a good, hard look at yourself, at the life you're living, at the road you're traveling, and say, "I'm going home. I'm not going to live this way anymore." Faith makes you pack your bags, head down that long, dusty road, swallow every last little bit of pride you have, and say to your father (or mother, or friend): "I have sinned." I want to come home (Luke 15:17-21).

That boy's journey is a pure picture of true faith. And what a blessed faith it is!
