



Prayers for Caleb

Newcastle teen in critical condition

A 16-year-old youth remained hospitalized in critical condition a week after losing control of his Dodge pickup while merging onto northbound Interstate 35 at State Highway 9 West and colliding with a semi.

Caleb Freeman suffered head and internal injuries in the collision which occurred shortly before 5:30 p.m. December 19.

He is in the hospital's intensive care unit.

According to Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Jeff Cummings, the teen was pinned in the wreckage for approximately 20 minutes before being freed by Goldsby

firefighters using a Hurst tool. Also injured was his 14-year-old brother, Clayton, who sustained internal injuries. He had been released by Tuesday.

Both teens were transported by EMSTAT to OU Medical Center in Oklahoma City.

Driver of the 2017 Freightliner, Alexander D. Stout, 31, of Saulsbury, Tenn., wasn't injured.

The brothers were reportedly on their way to a men's basketball game at the University of Oklahoma.

It was raining heavily and eastbound traffic on SH 9 was backed up more than a

All that glitters

Suspects sell 18 faux gold bars

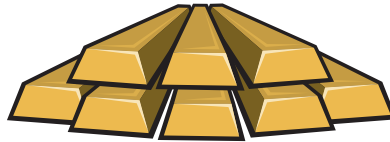

Arrest warrants are outstanding for an Oklahoma City woman and a man from Harrah who allegedly pawned fake gold bars in Purcell a year ago.

Lucinda G. Alvarez, 54, is charged in McClain County District Court with one count of obtaining cash or merchandise by false pretenses.

Two counts of the same charge were filed against Bradley M. Barnet, 25.

According to court records, the two were charged Decem-



ber 20 for the alleged offenses that occurred between Dec. 15, 2016, and Feb. 6, 2017.

Purcell police received a report from the victim, William Henning, on May 19.

According to the affidavit, the pair came to his pawnshop and sold him 18 supposedly gold bars.

Henning paid them \$11,900 for the 18 bars, purchasing eight for himself and the remaining 10 for the pawnshop.

One bar was packaged and stamped from the Perth Mint and the others from PAMP, according to the affidavit.

Henning told police he suspected the bars were counterfeit after receiving a telephone

Making healthy choices during the holiday season

Anyone trying to follow a healthy lifestyle knows it is tough enough to stay on track on a regular day or week. It only becomes harder during the gauntlet of holiday gatherings. The good news is no one has to give up their healthy goals or give in to temptation. By following a few common sense strategies, it is possible to make it through the season with pants that still fit perfectly and button easily.

One, two or even three big meals aren’t going to lead to a substantial weight gain. Your goal should be to consistently make positive choices throughout the season. Successfully managing parties and big family meals during the holidays actually starts well before you

arrive at the festivities.

In between gatherings, stick to normal eating routines and physical activity levels will go a long way toward helping you stay on track. On the day of the event, be sure to eat a sensible meal or snack.

You want to avoid starving yourself because that could lead to overeating later. Eating breakfast is especially important as research indicates people who do so tend to consume fewer calories throughout the rest of the day.

At a holiday gathering, take some time to mingle with others before heading for the food. If the meal is being served buffet-style, check out all the options first before beginning to fill a plate.

Start with salad, if it’s offered, and use a vinaigrette

rather than a creamy dressing, then go for the grilled, streamed and broiled options, if possible. Select foods you like and pass up dishes you don’t like as much.

Choose water or unsweetened ice tea rather than a sugary beverage such as soda to save additional calories. Eat slowly and savor your food. Pay attention to your hunger cues. When you feel you’ve had enough, stop eating. Wait about 10 minutes if you’re thinking about getting a second helping.

Finally, if there is an opportunity to get in some physical activity after the meal, take it. Going on a walk or organizing a basketball game, for instance, not only gets you active, but also is a chance to continue spending time with family and friends.

It was Friday, Monday and Tuesday all rolled neatly into one tight little package.

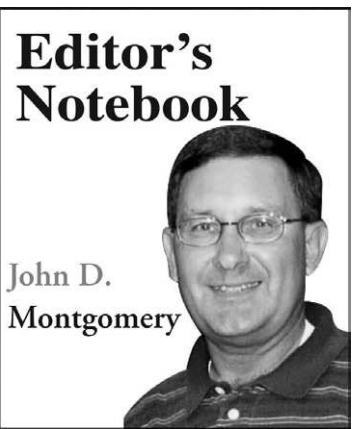
That is until around 4 p.m. when Gracie, our Trojan Work Horse said, “I’m going home. I don’t feel well.”

A Christmas gift

As promised, Congress and the Trump Administration delivered substantial tax reform to tens of millions of American taxpayers and hundreds of thousands of US corporations and businesses before Christmas. For years, many of my colleagues and I have called for tax reform - reform that would benefit American workers by letting them keep more of what they earn, bring American companies back to our shores, promote economic growth, and lower taxes on businesses.

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, which has now become law, is the answer to delivering economic expansion, higher wages, more job opportunities and individual prosperity.

Under the new tax system, the standard deduction that most Americans use is doubled. Single filers will see their standard deduction go from \$6,500 to \$12,000, married couples filing jointly will see theirs go from \$12,000 to \$24,000 and heads of household will go from \$9,550 to 18,000.

Furthermore, the additional

child tax credit is increased to \$2,000 and becomes fully refundable up to \$1,400. And to the benefit of all individual filers, the top rate for each bracket is lowered. For Oklahomans, that means the average four-person household in the Fourth District making \$73,624 will see a tax cut of \$2077.

This legislation was also a major tax relief for job creators of all sizes – from the small businesses on Main Street to large corporations that employ thousands – and the results are already beginning to emerge.

With a significantly lowered corporate tax rate of 21 percent, American companies will now be more competitive on the global stage.

Since the final passage of the tax reform bills, numerous corporations like AT&T, Fifth Third Bank, Comcast, Bank of America, Boeing, Wells Fargo and more have pledged to give hundreds of thousands of their employees generous bonuses, and some have announced plans to invest billions of dollars into the American economy.

For those of us who have

been advocating this kind of tax reform, the results we are already seeing confirms what we have been claiming for years - lowering taxes unleashes the innovation of American businesses and helps families all across the income spectrum.

In addition to the benefits on the individual and corporate level, the tax bill was changed to support other initiatives like housing and education. I am pleased that the medical expense deduction was retained and the mortgage interest deduction will be allowed on home purchases up to \$750,000.

Furthermore, I am pleased that the Conference Committee removed harmful language that would have forced thousands of graduate students to face significant yet unintended tax bills on tuition waivers.

No tax reform bill is perfect and there are aspects of the code that can still be improved. But the passage of this tax reform bill is historic.

This was a major legislative accomplishment and a welcome Christmas gift for millions of Americans.

A crisis at the health department

The House Special Investigation Committee had a guest in to answer some questions on December 19, and the responses and her testimony were eye-opening, to say the least.

Former Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) Chief Operating Officer Deborah Nichols answered more than two hours’ worth of questions Tuesday. Prior to her time at OSDH, Nichols was the chief executive officer for an insurance company. It was clear during her House testimony that her business experience proved very beneficial.

During the committee meeting, she spoke candidly about her experience at OSDH, and what she felt were red flags for the agency’s financial situation.

Nichols said she realized in early 2016 that things may not have been totally upright at OSDH because projects were cancelled last-minute because the agency didn’t have the money it thought it did.

Further, she talked about seeing and hearing phrases like “payroll not posted,” something she had never experienced during her years in

the private sector.

She said she tried to raise red flags repeatedly and that she felt like she was sitting on a “financial time bomb.” When she raised concerns to people above her, Nichols said she was frequently met with comments dismissing her findings. People would say things like, “You just don’t understand how things work in the government.”

All of that is extraordinarily frustrating and should be looked into. The thing that shocked me most, though, was Ms. Nichols’ insight into general mismanagement.

The former COO talked about her frustrations with the Office of Management & Enterprise Services, or OMES, saying the agency didn’t have any vested interest to control information technology (IT) costs at the project level. She spoke about how IT costs ballooned to more than \$100 million between Fiscal Year 2013 and current day.

Now I’m the first to admit I don’t know much about IT, but I’m fairly sure we could fly a rocket to the moon for that price.

Nichols is not the only agency staffer I’ve heard raise

concerns about IT costs. In fact, I’ve had several people from other agencies tell me the same thing. It begs the question: If we created OMES to consolidate IT functions and save the state money, why aren’t we seeing results? And why has spending swollen so much in recent years?

The testimony from OSDH staffers will be crucial for our House Special Investigation Committee. We can hear from agency heads all day long, but we need to listen to employees of those agencies too. I, for one, learned a whole lot from hearing Ms. Nichols’ testimony, and I bet other lawmakers did as well.

Going forward, the committee will continue to seek documents pertaining to OSDH’s mismanagement of more than \$30 million.

I’m on a mission to find answers. These are your taxpayer dollars, and you deserve to know exactly how this fiscal crisis occurred – and how we can prevent it in the future.

Your Views Making a difference when there is a need

Christmastime traditions, of which there are so, so many, include a lot of fundraising. What better time than when benefactors are consumed by an especially giving mood? Bonus: It’s kind of fun.

This year I begged for money on TV during OETA’s fall festival and a couple of weeks ago I stood out in front of Bass Pro with fellow Rotarian Mark Barth from Goodwill Industries ringing a bell for The Salvation Army. The irony was not lost on Mark, but he has a pretty healthy we’re-all-in-this-together philosophy.

All by myself, I bought some wrapping paper from Kevin, my Curbside Chronicle vendor.

Last year, we got the 10-and-under hockey team together and through a family-run, take-no-bows charity delivered Christmas presents to families who weren’t expecting anything at all. Young hockey players discovered firsthand that not everyone’s house looks quite like their own. Plus, I got to be a Santa.

About seven years ago, Possibilities Inc. asked me to do the asking at its annual fundraising luncheon.

“Sure,” I said. I tend to do that – say yes first and contemplate exactly what I’ve agreed to later. And it eventually occurred to me that what I’d agreed to carried an awful lot of responsibility. This was a big deal for a nonprofit with an annual budget that strives to see \$400,000. Failure to get the checkbooks open could be devastating to an organization I care about, where I’d spent six years on the board. What if I didn’t motivate anyone to give? I could be single-handedly responsible for the downfall of a great operation founded decades ago by Linda Lambert and John Rex.

“Get them to tear up twice,” a nonprofit industry vet advised. “All the data shows that if you can get them to tear up twice you’ll get a really good response.”

No pressure.

It worked out OK. In fact, I found out that I really liked asking for money. It’s a great challenge to find the words that will communicate what the organization truly does, the part that’s never captured in the brochure or the elevator speech, and why it’s important, why that extra five dollars a month really does make a difference.

This year’s topic was Changing the Conversation. Like anything you’ve done enough times, you start to worry that maybe you won’t be able to come up with another good idea, a new way of looking at it, a new way to reach people’s hearts so they’ll understand why their help is important.

While I was writing the ask for Possibilities this year, I was struck by a simple idea, that charity isn’t about anything more complicated than someone’s willingness to help a stranger. If a person knew, I thought, that the man sitting to her left was hungry and that what he really needed was five dollars for lunch because payday wasn’t until tomorrow, she would give him five dollars. If a man knew that the woman to his right was scared and lonely because she had just received a terminal diagnosis, would he offer to visit her once a week? Of course, he would. Of course, we all would. And if a woman knew that the man at the back of the room had just lost his wife of 40 years and was so despondent he was considering ending his own life rather than live without her, would that woman talk to him? Yes, of course.

Giving isn’t about knowing a person, it’s just about knowing there’s a need.

They take 12 pictures on a roll of 120 film and produce negatives that are 2.25 inches square, so you can enlarge photos to near-mural size and still have a crisp image.

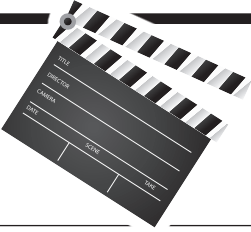
And they’re just cool, with the boxy look, the two lenses, focusing through the top of the camera.

The strangest thing though is the film repeatedly pokes fun at its entire concept, undercutting every emotional moment possible. It’s like the movie’s constantly mocking itself.

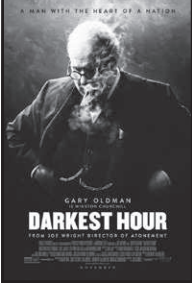
I couldn’t help but laugh. It’s like a serious dystopian sci-fi film and a parody of that same movie all rolled into one.

Peeping tom

Newcastle man charged in district court

A Newcastle man faces three peeping tom counts after he reportedly was captured on video looking in his neighbor’s windows in the late evening and early morning hours.

An arrest warrant is outstanding for Khalil R. Freeman, 21. Prosecutors filed the misdemeanor charges in McClain County District Court on December 18.

According to an affidavit, Lt. Toby Garver was sent to the victim’s home on SE 16th Terrace on the afternoon of October 24.

The woman told him she’d received a phone call from a blocked number. The caller, who identified himself as Dan, told her, “Just so you know, I’m going to kill you. I’m going to kill you and Kaden and your dog.”

When the woman said she was going to hang up, the man threatened to bash in her mother’s head before skinning her. The man added he was at the entrance to the neighborhood and could see the woman’s car.

After hanging up, the woman called a friend who said she’d

received a similar call from a man who told her “I am going to kill your friend ... and then I’m going to find you and kill you too.”

Garver took a report on the threatening calls and ordered extra patrols by the woman’s home.

Later that day, the victim’s mother and the victim went to the police station, where they left a thumb drive containing photos retrieved from a trail camera beside the house.

The images showed a man looking into the woman’s windows on October 14, 17 and 18.

One for the History Books

Throughout the history of Oklahoma, the roles that women have played have evolved. From few pioneering women in business, politics and other aspects of public life to the civic leaders of today, women have left their mark on the state. The Oklahoma Historical Society celebrates the legacy of these women at its museum and sites.

“2018 marks the centennial of women's suffrage in Oklahoma,” said Dr. Bob Blackburn, executive director of the Oklahoma Historical Society. “On Aug. 5, 2018, an amendment to the Oklahoma Constitution that granted women in the state the right to vote was ratified by a vote of the people.

“Oklahoma was the 21st state to grant universal suffrage to women, more than two years before the 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution was ratified. Even before they had the right to vote, women actively participated in Oklahoma public life.”

In Park Hill, Okla., the Murrell Family completed construction of a house called “Hunter's Home” in 1845. Today that house is known as the Murrell Home, and is operated by the OHS. The lady of the house, Minerva Murrell, was the niece of Cherokee Principal Chief John Ross.

According to “Voices of Cherokee Women,” edited by Carolyn Ross Johnston, “Division of labor was gender specific and equal.

Land was held communally, but women owned the dwellings, and men lived in women's homes. Women also held substantial political power in the tribe.”

In the coming year, the home will return to its original name, Hunter's Home, as a reflection the history of the plantation and the role of women within the Cherokee tribe, said Jennifer Frazee, historical interpreter at the site.

Elva and T.B. Ferguson established the Watonga Republican newspaper, said Cindy Pitts, director of the T.B. Ferguson Home in Watonga, Okla. “T.B. Ferguson died on Valentine's Day in 1921, and Elva stepped up as editor of the newspaper. That was unheard of at the time,” Pitts continued. “Elva sold the paper in 1930. She acted as technical advisor on the film, ‘Cimarron,’ a movie adaption of Edna Ferber's novel. The novel was based on the early day experience of T.B. and Elva.”

The Pioneer Woman Museum in Ponca City, Okla., presents a major exhibit about the role Oklahoma women have played in journalism and

broadcasting, said Director Kelly Houston.

Another special exhibit provides an “exciting history of women in Wild West Shows.” The permanent exhibits at the museum showcase what life was like for women and families during the days of Oklahoma Territory.

One woman featured in the exhibit is Lucia Loomis Ferguson, who was born in the Choctaw Nation in 1886. She married Walter Ferguson, the son of T.B. and Elva Ferguson, in 1906. After their marriage, they moved to Cherokee, where they ran the Cherokee Republican newspaper. Lucia wrote a weekly column.

She advocated equality of men and women in the family and in work and politics, said Houston. Following her husband's election to the State Senate in 1916, Lucia became editor of the newspaper. They sold the newspaper and moved to Oklahoma City, where she became a columnist for the Oklahoma News. Her column, A Woman's Viewpoint, appeared in other U.S. newspapers.

At the Oklahoma History Center in Oklahoma City, the “African American Experience” exhibit features the remarkable civil rights work of Clara Luper. Clara was a teacher and became an advisor to the Oklahoma City chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) Youth Council in 1957. She staged a sit-in at Oklahoma City's Katz Drug Store on Aug. 20, 1958, walking into the store and ordering Cokes at the “whites only” lunch counter. Under her leadership, the Youth Council participated in sit-ins through the early 1960s, helping to end segregation in public accommodations in Oklahoma.

From 1960 to 1980 Luper hosted a radio show, and later she chronicled her fight for civil rights in her autobiography, “Behold the Walls.” She received 154 awards, including the Langston Alumni Award, Zeta Phi Beta Woman of the Year and the National Voter Registration Award.

“Despite early political and social barriers, the women of Oklahoma have worked diligently to have a voice in how business, politics, culture and family life should be conducted,” said Blackburn. “From the women who came to Indian and Oklahoma Territories to start new lives to the community leaders of today, the state has benefited from the perseverance of these indomitable women.”

last spring.

“But, we’re disappointed more than anything. I wanted to see these guys make the playoffs that they missed out on last year. We fully expected to make the playoffs and I sure hate that we couldn’t.

“We didn’t take care of business when we needed to. I’d say out of the 10 teams we played, we were better than eight of them. But, I’m so proud of these guys. They made my first year as coach at Lexington a blessing.”

Berglan (who brought along his defensive coordinator Keith Bolles from Newcastle) said his ‘Dawgs win their first six games.

Much of Lexington’s success was due to senior tailback Zach Smith, who ran for 1,734 yards and 20 touchdowns on 206 carries last season.

In 2016, Smith had 1,268 yards despite missing two games with injury. As a sophomore, he had 2,102 yards and 21 TDs on 275 carries.

“Coach Hall had spoken very highly of him,” Berglan said of Smith.

“Zach is probably the best running back that I’ve had the pleasure of coaching. I had some good ones at Yukon and Paoli. But, Zach is one of those kids where the more carries he gets, the better runner he becomes. You don’t have to watch what you do with him. You don’t have to pace him or worry if you’re going to wear him out.

“He actually gets stronger as he runs more throughout a game. It was a transition for him this year. He always had

his hand in the grass at the fullback position out of the flex bone. This year, being in a two-point stance with different movements and steps, it was different for him to get used to. He really flourished this year because he’s so strong and fast and able to break tackles. When we needed a first down - no matter what the yardage - Zach was our best option.”

Smith (like all the outgoing Lexington players) was disappointed about not making the playoffs again despite going 6-4 in back-to-back campaigns.

But, he isn’t looking back with any regrets.

“It was hard not making the playoffs again,” said Smith, who totaled 5,109 rushing yards in his three years on Lex’s varsity.

“The guys worked so hard for it. I just went as hard as I could all the time. I never worried about getting hit or anything.

“I just got along so well with everybody. My time at Lexington was great. It was really fun this year and last year. If we could have won the last game, we would have been in the playoffs. But, that’s how it goes. You can’t regret anything you do when you’re playing with friends.”

Fischer Bowling was a beast on defense for Lex during his senior year. He provided the ‘Dawgs with 105 tackles (27 for loss) and had eight QB sacks.

Like Smith, Bowling was disappointed with not making the playoffs again. He’s proud, though, of what his teammates are leaving behind to build on.

“It was a good year, though,”

Bowling said.

“I think I did okay but I could have done better. But, as far as the team coming together and playing together, we were all like a family. We just jumped in and did it together as a team. To go 6-4 two years in a row and not make the playoffs is heartbreaking. It’s a shame, really.

“But, I loved these coaches. I wasn’t sure at first of what to expect. Come the second and third week of the season, I realized I loved them – like family. Everything considered, it was a good year and I think we’ve laid that foundation. All the guys next year just have to put in the work and good things will come to them.”

Jordan McWaters played both sides of the ball his senior year and was a stalwart.

He graded out at 86-percent on the O-Line and recorded 58 tackles (nine for loss) and had four sacks for Lex.

After a great start, McWaters said the ‘Dawgs battled to the end in the last four games.

“We started really well and we were hyped,” McWaters said. “But, after we lost to Purcell, we started going down just because I think we knew there were better teams coming up on the schedule. We might have gotten our heads down toward the end but we still fought strong. It’s hard to remember all the games and what happened.

“I’ll just always remember the practices and the hard work we put in together, especially the linemen. It was a lot of fun growing with the guys and I’ll miss the coaches, including our

old ones. Adjusting to the new coaches wasn’t bad at all. They were all great to us. We worked hard and played the same for both sets of them.”

Ethan Scott had a great senior year as a lineman for Lexington. He graded out at 84-percent on the offensive line.

On defense, he had 83 tackles (14 for loss) and six sacks.

Playing under a new head coach his senior year was not that big of a deal for Scott and he is very fond of all his teammates.

“It was different with the change in coaching staff,” Scott said.

“We were really close with coach Hall. But, when he left and we got the new coaching staff, we got to know them and we started meshing really well as the season went on. We all got along and I felt like this team was a close-knit group. We all looked out for each other. It was very good for me.”

Like the other Lexington seniors, Scott said he thinks this year’s group of departing players has laid a solid foundation for next year’s team.

“It’s not a good feeling to miss the playoffs like we did,” Scott said.

“Last year (in 2016), I didn’t even get to play the last three games due to injury. It’s rough. There’s no other way to put it because we all worked really hard to get there. All we needed was just one more win and we fell short. But, I think we’ve set a foundation for the seniors next year to build on. 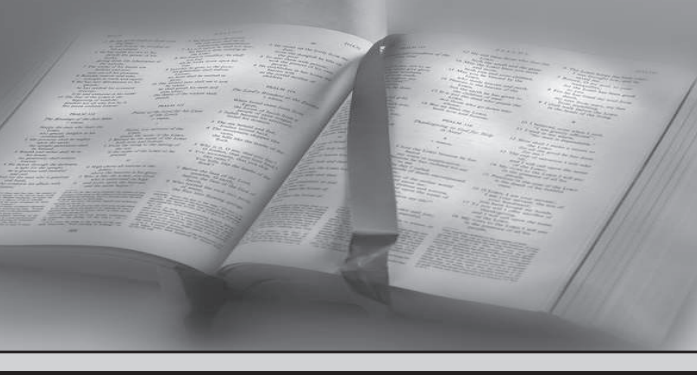

All of us can think of someone in our lives who is good. We all have a picture of someone who we would call good – not perfect, of course. But good.

My sister married a man named Frankie. When I was a young boy, we would go canoeing together. He loved to be outdoors in God’s creation. Frankie is always kind to strangers. He loves to start a conversation with a stranger – on the bus, in a store, any place. He likes to learn about other people, and to hear their story. More importantly, he lives in the way we are called to live in the Letter to Titus – he lives temperately, justly, and devoutly. (Titus 2:11-14)

In other words, his life is in balance, he is fair to all people, and he respects God and his faith.

We may not be able to define goodness, but we know it when

we see it. We recognize holiness in other people. We recognize the face of God in people who we respect and admire. And we want to be around people who are good. We are attracted to them. We love to be with our grandmother who prays always, or our father who is a kind man. To be good is to be beautiful, to be attractive.

The feast of Christmas is all about the incarnation of God, the becoming flesh of Goodness. It is about seeing goodness in the flesh and bone of a real person. The Jewish people had prophets and kings and priests. But God was high up in the sky. He was distant. His face was beyond comprehension.

It was on Christmas morning that we first saw the goodness of God in the face of a child. And now the world would never be the same. This child would grow up and teach us how to

be good and true and beautiful.

At this point in the story, we don’t know how the story will go. We only know that we are attracted to this child. We want to be with this child who is good. We only know that we are gazing into the face of a child who is good and true and beautiful. And today, on Christmas Day, that is enough.

Welcome, friends, to our last “front porch” visit of 2017.

Did you know that we’ve visited in this spot now for 10 years: 2007–2017. We’re hoping for 10 more, or 20 – whatever the Lord, by His grace, has on his schedule.

Today we want to close out the year by introducing you once again to the greatest story of all. Through the hundreds of writings and “front porch” visits this past decade, we have tried to make sure that we keep this one story as the center-piece, the theme of every column, every paragraph.

And since this story is so powerful – the most gripping and compelling ever told – I want you to join us as we close out this year and open up the next surveying it once more.

We’ll start with the Gospel of Luke.

Through all of our travels through the Old and New Testaments the past few years, Luke’s gospel – with little doubt – is the loveliest book of all. During these family and Jesus-focused days of chilly December, I think we appreciate his gospel and the physician’s brilliant storytelling more than ever. Of course, he doesn’t take on his writing task alone. He has the Holy Spirit guiding and blessing each stroke of his pen. Did you know that only Luke

tells the story of those shepherds tending their sheep on a silent, holy night? Of all the gospel writers, only he tells of the angel appearing suddenly to these scared men trembling beneath a heavenly light. But they get a front-row seat to one of the world’s greatest announcements that night, a narrative we’ve heard a thousand times: “For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour which is Christ the Lord” (Luke 2:11).

Luke, of course, does not stop there. He takes us on a long, thrilling journey until we reach a tomb outside Jerusalem where an angel again appears – this time not to shepherds in the field but to grieving women of faith at a sacred graveside. And, in what is a resounding chorus in Luke’s gospel, he shares that most glorious angelic declaration: “He is not here, but is risen!” (24:6).

Luke’s account – from the beginning on that spectacular night to the powerful grave-bursting victory three decades later – is the greatest story ever told. Shakespeare, Hemingway, nor Twain can compare.

For a man to tell the life story of this babe born in a manger and of the risen Saviour in a page or two is an impossible task, of course. Thousands of

men and women through the ages have put their minds and pens to the task, as evidenced by the infinity of books that fill the world’s libraries. Even those libraries fail to ever tell it the way it could be told.

As John writes at the conclusion of his own memoir: “... if (these things) should be written every one, I suppose that even the world itself could not contain the books that should be written. Amen” (John 21:25).

Yes, Amen, and Amen again.

But today – at the sunset of another year – we can re-join the writers of the ages and retell it at a glance.

We know many of you particularly need to reflect on this story today – as you reflect on the many mountains and valleys of another year. And, with you in mind, we are blessed to remind you of the story today, to help you to end the year with it in your memory, and to assist in awakening us all into a new year with the same theme before us.

Enjoy these blessed thoughts today, and – the Lord’s being willing – we will visit both Bethlehem and Calvary for a moment more at the sun-rising of 2018 ... here on the “front porch.”

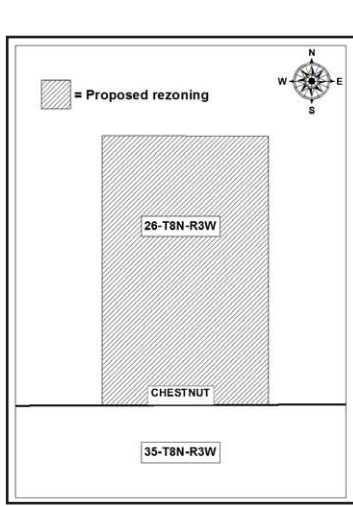

Without the sacrifices of veterans who have served, this country would not be the land of the free and the home of the brave.

As a volunteer with this organization, I have been able to help make a difference in the lives of thousands of veterans and their families. During the past 12 months, our volunteers have helped more than 10,000 veterans and surviving spouses apply for benefits from the Department of Veterans Affairs. As many of you know, we post the number of veterans and surviving spouses each week along with the annual amount that they will receive in VA benefits.

During 2017 there were over 50 million dollars in veterans benefits awarded to them and their surviving spouses. We have been helping veterans receive benefits for so many years that I do not know how many hundreds of millions of dollars those we have helped are receiving. I do know that since becoming accredited a few years ago that there are close to 20,000 in our database who have visited us.

In case you're wondering why so many veterans and surviving spouses seek us out instead of going to a local organization in their town, the answer is "our volunteers." On any Tuesday or Thursday morning, there will be from 110 to 140 veterans and surviving spouses who need our help with their VA claims and questions.

REC offers youth programs

Students within Rural Electric Cooperative's service territory could win an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C., Steamboat Springs, Colo., or Canyon Camp in Hinton, Okla., this summer. High school seniors could win a scholarship to help with college expenses.

A representative from REC will visit schools beginning in January to distribute information about these programs. Youth Power Energy Camp is available for eighth graders from within REC's service area. Eight students will be selected to attend a four-day camp near Hinton to gain a better understanding of electric cooperatives, enhance leadership skills and meet new friends.

To participate in this contest, students must be attending a school within REC's service area and write a short essay on a topic provided by REC.

Youth Tour in Washington, D.C. is a week-long, all-expense paid trip to Washington D.C. for three students to attend the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's

Last week the surviving spouse of one of the Vietnam veterans who we had helped recently to receive a 100 percent rating came in to talk about possible surviving spouse benefits. After we reviewed the veteran's VA file and his death certificate we asked her to request an amendment of the death certificate to reflect the veteran's presumptive diseases from Agent Orange. The surviving spouse will now qualify for VA DIC of \$1,500 per month.

During the years we have been assisting veterans and surviving spouses, I have seen many surviving spouses and veterans who were previously denied VA benefits because the person helping them did not ask the right questions. We are very proud of all of our volunteers for all they do to help each veteran and surviving spouse to receive all of the benefits for which they are eligible.

I receive calls daily from veterans and surviving spouses from other states. Many of the people who call with their questions about VA benefits will end up driving or flying in to see us. Currently, we have veterans from Florida to New York on the east coast and from California to Washington on the west coast and most states in between visiting us each week. It seems to me that we could be the most successful organization in the United States at helping veterans and their families.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive a copy of all rating decisions the VA makes on the men and women represented. Last week there were five veterans awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$185,947 per year. Twelve veterans were awarded disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. This group will receive an annual combined amount of \$159,197 per year. Two surviving spouses were awarded DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance benefits. Their

combined yearly amount will be \$29,589.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

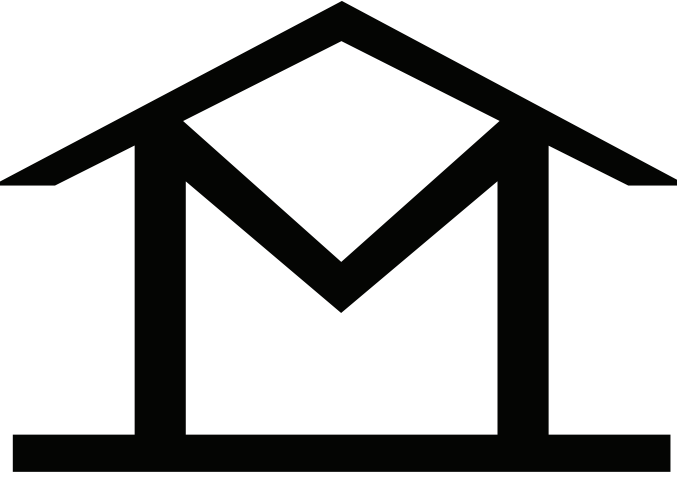
