Don Boyer has more interesting stories than Carter has pills.

And if you visit with him more than a minute or two, the tale telling begins.

Each one preceded by a smile and a standard lead-in: "Let me tell you an interesting story about that."

"That" can be whatever is crossing his mind at the moment.

Bred and born in Purcell, Don's family roots run long and deep here.

His grandfather was a U.S. marshal and jailer when the federal government operated out of a courthouse near the base of Red Hill and not far from the Purcell High School Dragons football field.

His father, Frank Boyer, worked as a carpenter, among other jobs.

He was also a firefighter and was one of the drivers who set a world record on a quarter-mile track with Purcell's fire horses, Sam and Prince.

Don's mother was originally from Purdy, but lived most of her life in her adopted hometown of Purcell.

Don was a Dragon – Class of '61 – and a starter on the state championship basketball team that suffered just one defeat and that at the hands of a "big Class A champion Texas" team.

He also played football and ran track.


By the time he graduated from high school, he had "two or three" scholarship offers.

"Everybody in our club got a scholarship," Don said.

He accepted one from Northwestern Oklahoma State University at Alva and played basketball one year for the Rangers.

To say nothing of good food.



All-out search

Spurred by a pursuit by the Oklahoma Highway Patrol through Purcell last Thursday afternoon, a foot pursuit followed after Jamie N. Durham, 27, of Purcell. Fleeing driver turns self in

Pursuit lasts four minutes in Purcell

A suspect who eluded law enforcement officers for more than two hours in a foot chase Thursday afternoon turned

himself in to the McClain County Sheriff's Department on Tuesday. Jamie N. Durham, 27, of

Purcell, is in the McClain County Detention Center on a hold from Lyon County, Kan.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Aaron Nickell saw Durham fail to yield while turning east onto Lester Lane from Green Avenue at 4:13 p.m.

When the trooper then saw him fail to yield at a stop sign, he attempted to make a traffic stop.

According to the trooper, Durham drove through multiple city streets before finally stopping at North 2nd Avenue and Madison Street four minutes later at 4:17 p.m.

During the pursuit, Durham was driving at 45 mph. The speed limit in the residential areas is 25 mph.

There he got out of the vehicle and ran east toward a creek.

Eight OHP troopers and supervisors were joined by Purcell and Lexington police, the McClain County Sheriff's Department and Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation in a search for Durham.

The hunt was called off at 6:21 p.m., according to the OHP.

Producing adequate amounts of fall forage with cool season annuals such as wheat and rye is usually proportional to how early the plants come up and how long a growth period they have before cold weather slows or stops their growth.

Cool season forages like wheat, rye, and ryegrass mostly stop growing when average daily temperatures stay below 60 degrees or when nighttime temperatures get below freezing. This usually occurs in our area of Oklahoma sometime during late October or early November.

In general, rye can tolerate slightly cooler temperatures than wheat and wheat can tolerate temperatures cooler than ryegrass.

Cool season annuals planted in mid to late October have

little chance of growing much fall forage before the weather shuts them down. Data from the Lahoma Research Station showed a difference in fall forage growth of 2,400 pounds when planted in late August versus 200 pounds when planted at the end of September (six year average). As you can see, if we wait too long to plant our cool season annuals, we run the risk of growing little or no fall forage.

Ideally, all fertility needs of the crop should be in the ground and we should have a firm seed bed prepared prior to Labor Day. If needed, we still have time to pull a soil sample and get the results back if you do it now.

It takes approximately 60 pounds of actual nitrogen to grow one ton of cool season grass forage. That would be about 130 pounds of urea or 176

pounds of ammonium nitrate.

We should then be ready to plant 90-120 pounds of wheat or rye seed per acre, or if planting ryegrass, 20 to 25 pounds per acre. Seed should not be planted to deeply since the plants will struggle in the hot soil temperatures when trying to emerge from deep planting depths.

Planting should be done in the first few weeks of September if fall forage production is to be expected. If we have been lucky enough to get a late August rain we can plant to moisture, if not the crop should be dusted in to the seed bed in anticipation of an early September rain.

September on average is the third wettest month of the year. Planting at this time

will allow the crop close to 60 days of growth before cool weather causes the plant to cease growth.

Planted depth is also important at this time of year since small grains have a difficult time emerging from the soil due to warm temperatures. Wheat should not be planted any deeper than one inch for semi dwarf varieties and no deeper than two inches for tall varieties, when in doubt, one inch should be your planting depth.

Rye should be planted no deeper than 3/4 of an inch. Ryegrass is normally just broadcast on top of the ground and either harrowed in or left on top to await a rainfall event. It can be planted through a drill but should not be planted more than a 1/4 inch deep. With cool season annuals, early planting is the key to fall forage production.

When planting early you always have more risk of insect damage. This can include grasshoppers, fall armyworms and Hessian flies.

Fall armyworms have been present in damaging numbers on grain sorghum for several months now. Scouting is very important to ward off a stand failure to heavy insect feeding.

Negotiating with terrorists

It has been a longstanding policy of the United States that we will not negotiate with terrorists and we will not pay ransom money to free hostages. The reasons for this policy are obvious; paying ransoms incentivizes the taking of more hostages. U.S. presidents for decades have recognized this policy and adhered to it - until this president.

As we have learned over the last several weeks, the Obama administration paid Iran \$400 million in pallets of foreign currency - supposedly to pay them back for an arms deal in the late 1970's that the United States had negotiated with the Shah of Iran when they were considered a friendly ally. Not surprisingly, when the Shah was overthrown and the Islamic Revolutionaries took over the country and seized 52 American hostages, that arms deal was negated and diplo-

matic relations between our two countries were severed.

Unbelievably, we have since learned that the Obama administration has also paid Iran \$1.3 billion dollars in 13 separate payments of \$99,999,999.99. This, they explained, was the interest we owed Iran for keeping the \$400 million over the past few decades.

This defies common sense by any definition. A country that held 52 Americans hostage for 444 days and has been a sworn enemy of the west and which is widely recognized as one of the leading state sponsors of terrorism should not be rewarded with a refund on an arms deal along with nearly four decades of interest.

These payments coincided with a prisoner swap in January of this year where four Americans detained by the Iranian government were released contingent upon the release of four Iranian prisoners here in the United States.

Prisoner exchanges themselves are a violation of our policy of not negotiating with terrorists, but the coinciding transfer of nearly \$1.7 billion to Iran should make it abundantly clear that this administration very clearly paid a ransom of dollars and lawfully detained enemies of the United States.

When Members of Congress demanded answers, the Obama administration slipped into their all too familiar practice of denial, deception and blame shifting to their political opponents. They claim these payments were a part of the Iranian Nuclear deal they negotiated last year and had nothing to do with the release of four Americans.

This despite the known fact that the four Americans were delayed on the runway in Iran until the \$400 million had arrived, despite the fact that

Politics and public schools

We've had public schools in Oklahoma for more than a century, but politicians have just recently (over the past five years or so) become very interested in our public education system.

State legislators have been sponsoring all kinds of public school bills over the past several years for various reasons, but the justification most relate is that our "public schools are failing, and something must be done." Nothing could be further from the truth, however, as student test scores are higher than they've ever been, graduation rates are at an all-time high, drop-out rates are the lowest they've ever been, and public schools are educating more students than ever.

So, what are the real reasons behind this sudden legislative interest in our public schools? What motivates legislators to say things like "our schools are failing." "students expect results from teachers" and "we're pouring more money into our public schools, with

no results" - all blatant lies.

I've studied this legislative phenomenon for the past five years from a researcher's perspective and even run for public office, in an effort to fully understand legislators' motivations to bring down our local public schools. I've discovered the primary motivation is as old as dirt - money.

In the process of correlating specific legislators' (those who sponsor bills which threaten to destroy our schools, such as "voucher bills" and school board dissolving bills) campaign accounts with the school killing bills, an interesting pattern emerges. It seems that many of these legislators have received both financial and verbal support from outside-the-state corporate and non-profit entities such as Connections Academy, American Federation of Children (AFC), Alliance for School Choice (vouchers), Center for Education Reform, Heartland Institute, National Association of Charter School Authorizers,

and hundreds more.

These state legislators and corporate entities have something else in common - they both belong to the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC). According to "ALEC Exposed," global corporations and state politicians vote behind closed doors to try to rewrite state (public school) laws that govern your rights. These so-called model (education) bills reach into almost every area of American life and often directly benefit huge corporations.

The corporations that become members of ALEC pay anywhere from between \$5,000 to \$25,000 in dues each year, but the state legislators pay only \$50 to become a member. In return for a corporate membership - he corporation gets access to state legislator members, who all too gladly take the model corporate bills back to their home states for

History of Oklahoma's restrictive beer laws

The upcoming November election is a pivotal turning point for Oklahoma beer law modernization.

Oklahomans will vote on State Question 792 to decide if cold, strong beer can be sold in grocery, convenience and liquor stores.

This vote signifies a big step forward that has been decades in the making and originally started in 1959.

Oklahoma has a long history of restrictive beer and liquor laws dating back to statehood in 1907. When the state constitution was drafted, alcohol was banned. Oklahoma's prohibition started 11 years before the rest of the country decided to ban the sale and production of alcohol with the 18th Amendment in 1920.

During Prohibition, the country entered the Great Depression and Oklahomans began searching for new ways to generate state revenue. They

found a way in early 1933 by allowing the sale of "non-intoxicating" 3.2 percent beer in grocery and convenience stores.

Later that year, the U.S. Congress ratified the 21st Amendment, which repealed Prohibition; however, Oklahoma did not ratify the 21st Amendment until 1959. This kept Oklahoma with only 3.2 percent beer for an additional 26 years.

Once Oklahoma repealed Prohibition in 1959 strong beer could be sold in the state, but it came with restrictions including where and how it could be sold. Even as years wore on and the general sentiment toward beer and liquor regulations changed, Oklahoma continued to be steadfast in prohibiting these laws to change.

There have been many attempts to change Oklahoma's beer laws, but few have gained

significant traction outside of this year.

These efforts have included similar constants, such as quality and convenience for the consumer and the opportunity for businesses to operate free of unnecessary restrictions.

These consumer and business freedoms have been echoed in 2016 and in State Question 792.

This November, Oklahomans will finally have an opportunity to update Oklahoma's beer laws with State Question 792.

By voting yes on State Question 792, Oklahoma consumers and business owners can enjoy cold, strong beer from their local grocery, convenience and liquor stores, and remove unnecessary restrictions on Oklahoma businesses.

With just three days remaining until the "Election of the Century," the stress amongst the good folks of the Valley was considerable.

During a matter of weeks, the source of the egg inflation became public knowledge; Juliet Stoughton, previously known as "Claire" to her only friend, launched a last-minute campaign for mayor; and the leading candidate, Raymond Cooper, was tricked into agreeing to participate in the town's first public debate since the "Red Menace Debate" back in 1958.

Valley old-timers remembered that spectacle as "Better Dead Than Red" Barry Jarrell faced incumbent mayor, "Friendly" Wiley Roark.

Both Jarrell and Roark vowed to keep the debate cordial, and it almost worked out that way until Jarrell called the mayor "a Stalin-loving communist from California" 20 seconds into the proceedings. It was at that moment "Friendly" Wiley picked up a metal stand, on loan from the Baptist Church choir, and smacked it squarely across the jaw of his opponent.

The 1958 debate lasted all of four minutes until fights broke out in the audience after Jarrell roared, "Anyone who would vote for this Red-loving Bolshevik should go on back to Moscow right now!"

No one anticipated as many fireworks in this debate, taking place 40 years later, but it wasn't outside the realm of possibility.

Raymond Cooper began the Monday installment of "Renderings with Raymond" with a quote from Adlai Stevenson, who ran for president against Dwight Eisenhower in 1952. "I offer my opponents a bargain," quoted Cooper. "If they will stop telling lies about me, I will stop telling the truth about them."

The phone rang immediately with restless callers, anxious to chime in during the broadcast.

"Who is this so-called 'Juliet Stoughton?'" Marvin Walsh almost screamed into his phone. "And what makes her think she deserves to share the same stage as Raymond Cooper?"

Tension Peaks as Election Looms

The next caller, Boyd Sanders, was even more adamant. "Tell her to come by after the debate and clean up," Sanders jeered. "It seems to me that she should be home cooking dinner for her husband, instead of wasting our time."

Cooper, as always, played the role of peacemaker. "Now listen," he told his audience. "This is America. And every American has the right to run for office, no matter how misguided their efforts might be."

The next caller, Vera Ingram, took a different tone. "It seems to me," she said, "that we should hear this young woman out. After all, isn't that what America is all about?"

Raymond, not wanting to show disrespect to a potential voter, chimed in. "You're right, Vera," he said in a charming tone. "Perhaps this is the perfect time to show this young woman, who is new to our community, what Lennox Valley hospitality is all about."

Cooper, skillful at manipulating the emotions of his audience, knew this would move the discussion to Juliet's lack of experience in important Valley matters.

What happened next took Raymond by surprise, and that didn't happen very often.

"Hi, Raymond. This is Myrtle Paxley." "What's on your mind today, Myrtle?" answered the gentle voice of Cooper.

"I just received the strangest call from Springfield. It was somebody taking a poll. They wanted to know who I was going to vote for in the mayor's race. Of course, I told them I was voting for you."

Raymond searched for the right words before saying, "Myrtle, are you sure about that?"

"Yes, I'm sure. They asked if I supported Mayor Bland, you or that new woman. I told them that any real American would vote for you."

Raymond played a commercial for Pucket's Hardware Store while he composed himself.

Following the commercial, Cooper calmly be-seeched his listeners, "It is obvious we are facing more than two opponents in the election." After a pause, he continued, "We are facing the mobilized forces of the elite media and the federal government, who will stop at nothing to see this humble American fall."

the Iranians themselves have referred to it as a ransom, and despite the State Department now warning Americans not to travel to Iran because of the risk of arrest and detention. Indeed, when the going price for an American hostage is apparently \$100 million, we would be wise to stay away.

passage. In return for the legislators' \$50 membership fee, ALEC provides an all-expense paid family vacation to a luxury resort at the annual convention.

In Oklahoma, the process is almost always the same - legislators attend the annual ALEC convention, pick up the voucher and school consolidation bills, receive campaign donations and corporate support, and bring the bills back to Oklahoma to be voted on by the House of Representatives and Senate.

Coincidentally, several Oklahoma ALEC legislators have children who attend private schools, not local public schools. Who can blame them for sponsoring voucher bills in which their tuition would be paid by your tax dollars? It would be a windfall for many ALEC members at taxpayer expense.

Again, according to "ALEC Exposed" - ALEC is a corporate bill mill. It is not just a lobby or a front group; it is much more powerful than that. Through ALEC, corporations hand state legislators their wishlists to benefit their bottom line. Most state legislators do not want the public to know about their membership in ALEC, but "ALEC Exposed" has published a list of all state legislators who belong.

Unbelievably, a couple of our local state legislator's names appear on the list, but the only true way to know if a legislator has been influenced by ALEC is to examine his

or her donation list - and if any ALEC corporations appear, it's a good bet that they're under the influence of the corporate bill mill. It is now understood by many that ALEC is a "corporate welfare" factory that seeks to funnel state tax dollars to corporate and private entities.

The old adage - "follow the money" or "the money trail" as how to find out what entities or who is involved in unethical behaviors (in my opinion) certainly rings true for ALEC and its corporate membership. In other words, where the money starts and where it ends up can explain many mysterious actions of corporations and legislators.

Again, only my opinion (that and \$1 will buy a cup of coffee): 1) The money starts with giant corporations or a non-profit such as the AFC 2) The non-profit pays high membership fees (\$5,000 to \$25,000) to ALEC, in order to gain access to state legislative members (who pay very little, \$50) 3) The wealthy corporate and non-profit entities donate \$thousands to legislative campaign coffers in order to persuade them to sponsor corporate welfare bills back in their home states.

If the non-profit does not donate to the candidate, it runs negative campaign ads against the candidate's opponents. Accepting assistance from corporations and non-profits in order to get elected, and then sponsoring legislation which benefits their bottom line is also known as "crony

capitalism."

Our local public schools have been an ALEC target for some time now. Corporate charter and private schools have seen a multi-billion dollar cash cow (public tax dollars) and believe it's ripe for the picking. The giant education corporations (testing companies, charter chains, private schools, non-profits) have purchased many state politicians and candidates, so it becomes very important to do our homework and expose these politicians before the November elections.

It's important we do so, for the future of our public schools.


Chicken with Creamy Corn and Potatoes

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

Traveling exhibit on water policy visiting Purcell Public Library

Children's risk of exposure to head lice goes up with arrival of new school year

As the school year gets underway and Oklahoma students are reunited with old friends while making new ones, an unintended consequence could be increased risk of exposure to head lice.

"In general, when your child goes back to school, they could have a risk of being exposed to lice because you have kids from different home environments coming together at one focal point," said Justin Talley, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension livestock entomologist.

While transmission tends to spike in late fall into winter and spring, a child could contract lice at any point in the school year.

"The critical thing is prevention and talking to your child about not sharing their personal items such as combs, brushes and bed linens, especially pillows," said Talley, who stressed that lice are a common problem throughout the United States.

"Anyone can get head lice. It's not about cleanliness. It doesn't matter where you live. It's a matter of who you come into close contact with," he said.

Head lice are a blood sucking insect that can only be transmitted from person to person

through direct contact such as through sharing a pillow, a brush or by having head to head contact with someone who has lice.

Examples of direct contact include when one individual's hair comes into contact with another individual's hair or someone who is infected with lice combs or brushes his hair and immediately passes the comb or brush to an uninfected person who uses it.

Infestations can take between five and 10 days to develop after exposure, depending on temperature and the condition of the infested person's hair.

"If you see your child scratching her head or exhibiting abnormal behavior where she's flicking her hair or scratching more than usual, then check for lice. School nurses are also trained to identify lice," Talley said.

The easiest way to check for lice is to part the hair all the way to the scalp every two to three inches all over the hair, and especially in the back toward the neck.

Head lice range in color from creamy white to brown and are visible with the naked eye.

"They'll be active, crawling on and near the scalp," Talley said.

In cases of suspected lice infestation, there are over-the-

counter lice control shampoos available. If the infestation is severe or if the over-the-counter product does not work, stronger alternative may be available by prescription from a medical professional.

Whether over-the-counter or prescription, lice control products typically require two applications — one initially and a second one about 10 to 14 days later.

"Regardless of the product you're using, the second application is critically important because the first application doesn't kill the eggs. Reapplying the product after about 10 days allows those eggs to hatch so you're killing the remaining nymphs," Talley said.

Families also should launder the bed linens, especially the pillow cases, in the case of possible head lice infestations. Items should be washed in hot water above 125° and dried on a high heat setting.

Tips to help avoid gardening injuries

Many people enjoy gardening for its relaxing benefits, but it is important to keep in mind it is still a physical activity.

As with any physical activity, it must be done properly in order to prevent injuries, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension consumer horticulturist. "Gardening is made up of a lot of repetitive activities such as weeding, digging, raking, lifting, gripping, stooping and squatting," Hillock said. "Using common sense and joint/muscle protection techniques can help minimize the potential for injury. This, in turn, will help keep you in the garden free of pain."

The nature of gardening activities places the avid gardener at higher risk for injury than those with more sedentary hobbies.

Repetitive motions involved in gardening place stress on the hands, wrists, elbows, neck, back, hips, knees and ankles. Just as a person does some warm up exercises prior to a workout, gardeners also should stretch before heading out to tackle gardening tasks. Also, always use good posture to help prevent strained muscles.

"Gardeners also may want to consider investing in some ergonomic gardening tools. These tools are designed to place less stress on the body during use, which, in turn, can cut down on injuries," he said. "A wide variety of tools are available at your local garden center or hardware store, as well as online."

For the do-it-yourselfer, tool handles can be modified and built up using padded foam pipe insulation. Another alternative is to wear padded gloves like those used by bikers or weightlifters. Any of these options will increase traction for gripping and decrease the amount of muscle force needed to grip, all while decreasing the stress and strain on your joints. Tools ideal for padding include rakes, shovels, trowels, pruning shears and spray nozzles.

Hillock said gardeners also can help reduce the risk of injury simply by keeping their tools in good working order.

"Shovels, hoes, trowels and pruning shears require less muscle force to use if kept sharp. Be sure to lubricate any tools with moving parts," he said.

After completing some stretching, gardeners are ready to head outside. One key factor

to keep in mind is to change position frequently. Also, work as closely to your body as possible and avoid stretching and overreaching.

Use lightweight equipment and if reaching overhead is necessary, use a step stool or ladder. Keep your elbows slightly bent and avoid twisting your forearm. Be sure to keep your back straight, bend from the knees instead of leaning over and use a garden mat or pad to cushion your knees when kneeling.

"We're starting to see some lower temperatures, but it can still be quite warm. It's a good idea to take a short break every hour or so," Hillock said. "Even though you may not feel as hot or as thirsty, it's always important to stay hydrated, so keep a bottle of water close by at all times."

If, despite your best efforts, you get a sprain or strain, use the RICE principle (rest, ice, compression and elevation). Once injured, it is important to limit aggravating activities to avoid making the injury worse. If symptoms persist, a visit to your primary care physician may be in order.

State ends marriage initiative as part of budget cuts

Citing budget cuts, state officials are ending the controversial Oklahoma Marriage Initiative, a 17-year-old program originally aimed at reducing the state's high divorce rate.

The state Department of Human Services announced it is eliminating its funding for the program because the agency is facing a budget shortfall of more than \$100 million this fiscal year. It is implementing \$45 million in cuts that include slashing 91 positions and reducing several public-assistance programs and will seek supplementary funding to help fill the remaining gap.

The state has spent more than \$70 million in federal discretionary Temporary Assistance to Needy Families money on the Marriage Initiative since the program began under Gov. Frank Keating in 1999. It provided counseling, workshops and other support services for thousands of Oklahomans with the goal of reducing the rate of divorce as a way to combat poverty. In 2002, initiative leaders abandoned the goal of reducing divorce rates, saying it was unattainable, and the program's purpose began shifting to encouraging healthy

marriages and families.

Still, the initiative drew scrutiny as Oklahoma's rates of divorce, unmarried cohabitation and single-parent families increased while the percentage of households with married couples declined. These reflected national trends. The state's poverty rate also rose, although it slipped in 2013 and 2014, while remaining above the national rate.

In 2012, Oklahoma had the third highest divorce rate in the country, measured by the Census Bureau as the percent-

age of people aged 15 and over who are currently divorced. The 13.5 percent who said they were divorced was also an increase from the 11.6 percent who reported in the 2010 Census that they were divorced.

The latest data from the National Center for Health Statistics shows Oklahoma's divorce rate in 2014 was again the third highest in the country and well above the national rate.

Concerns about the program prompted Sen. Kyle Loveless, R-Oklahoma City, to unsuccessfully push a bill this year to end the state's involvement in the program.

The program was also the subject of an interim study last year. Rep. Mark McCullough, R-Sapulpa, who requested the study, said the program's goals were laudable, but it was important to scrutinize the services and its results.

"When Gov. Keating kicked off the marriage initiative, it was very ambitious," McCullough said during a hearing in November. "The idea was to reduce our divorce rate in Oklahoma by 25 percent, and quite frankly that was probably an unrealistic goal."

Sheree Powell, a DHS spokeswoman, said the cut was an example of the agency having to eliminate programs that aren't considered part of

at Alva," he said.

After a year, he transferred to the University of Oklahoma where he "majored" in partying.

It was while he was at OU that Don was offered a job in the press box at Owen Field.

"I ran the press box for 12 years," he said. "I loved it. They paid me and I saw every game, got sideline passes to OU-Texas."

Perhaps the most memorable was the "game of the century" in 1971 when the OU Sooners battled — and lost to — the University of Nebraska Cornhuskers.

He got to know the players like Steve Owens and coaches like Barry Switzer. And he genuinely liked the sports writers who shared his birds-eye view of the field and love of the game.

But running the press box called for long Saturdays. His game days began at 7 a.m. and lasted anywhere from 13 to 14 hours.

After 12 years, he was tired and he gave up the press box gig.

He's still a huge OU fan, but hasn't been to a football game since 1999 or maybe it was 2000.

Don worked for Oklahoma Natural Gas and on April 19, 1995, was one block away from the Murrah Building in downtown Oklahoma City when a bomb made of ammonium nitrate fertilizer and diesel fuel detonated and pancaked the building, killing 168.

The bomb was in a Ryder rental truck parked outside the federal building.

"I stayed there (downtown) til about 7 that night," Don recalled. "I actually stepped over the Ryder truck when we went to turn off the gas."

The smell of sulphur and death was everywhere, he said, and he remembers it well.

When he got back to Purcell that night, he stopped at Val's barbeque on South Green Avenue. There was a television turned on and a large crowd watching ongoing news coverage of the bombing.

When others learned he'd just left the scene, he was bombarded by questions that seemed to go on for hours.

He and his wife, Sandra — she goes by Sandee — married in 1967 and the following year their daughter, Stacie, was born.

The young family moved to Oklahoma City and later Edmond.

In 1980, he lost his dad and moved back to Purcell to be closer to his mom.

Heretired from ONG 18 years ago and Sandee is also nearing retirement. Daughter Stacie Graham is a registered nurse and lives in Denver.

"He's a great husband and we have a lot of fun. We're very

fortunate," Sandee said.

He loves Purcell, but it's different now.

"It's not home like it was 30 years ago," he said. "Most of my friends reside at Hillside Cemetery."

Still, a few remain. Don, Ron Argo and Rick McCurdy still run together.

In June, they drove to Springfield, Mo., to place a wreath on the grave of Eddie Gilliam, another close friend, class and teammate who died 20 years ago.

"We remain close to his wife, daughter and her children," he said.

Don recalled an earlier trip to Springfield. Gilliam had suffered a heart attack and the buddies slept three nights on the hospital floor until it seemed he was stabilized.

They drove back to Purcell on the fourth day and Gilliam died that night.

"They were waiting on a heart and nothing came," Don said.

About 1-1/2 years ago, Don had chest pains. He called Rick McCurdy who told him to go to the Norman Regional Healthplex on Tecumseh Road.

Tests revealed a blockage and Don received a stent that saved his life.

"It was the same artery that killed Gilliam," he said.

His older brother, Chris, died Sept. 4, 1952.

"He was 21 — 11 years older

than me," Don said. "He was in the Navy and made it through Korea and comes home and is killed in a car wreck."

Don paused between his interesting stories for just a moment.

"I've had a great life," he finally said. "I've been blessed with family, two wonderful sisters, a great mom and dad."

voters who went to the polls trounced a proposed 0.6 percent hike in the sales tax for construction of a new water park.

Supporters saw the water park as a quality of life issue that would turn Purcell into a recreation destination for area towns.

Detractors argued the sales tax would not generate enough revenue to build the park, much less maintain and staff it in the years to come.

That election was decided by 522 voters – a scant 13.9 percent turnout of the 3,747 registered voters in the eligible nine precincts.

With a penny sales tax hike on the ballot last week and the future of McClain County's only hospital in the balance, those same nine precincts saw 1,134 votes cast for a 30.3 percent turnout.

The 992 voting for the sales tax easily won with 87.5 percent of the vote. Still, that number accounted for just 26.5 percent of eligible voters.

A total of 142 people voted against the Purcell Municipal Hospital sales tax were – 12.5 percent of the turnout, but just 3.8 percent of those eligible to vote.

The precinct polling places that were open for both sales

tax elections were:

- 03 – Mid-America Technology Center, 0 eligible registered voters, 0 votes in either election (because the elections were both on state election days, the precinct had to be open even though there were no eligible voters for the Purcell sales tax propositions);
- 04 – Wayne High School Library, 1 eligible registered voters, 0 votes in either election;
- 06 – McClain County Community Center, 428 eligible registered voters; 148 votes in hospital election, 34.6 percent turnout; 62 votes in water park election, 14.5 percent turnout;
- 07 – Unity Missionary Baptist Church, 131 eligible registered voters; 20 votes in hospital election, 15.3 percent turnout; 14 votes in water park election, 10.7 percent turnout;
- 08 – Washington First Baptist Church, 7 eligible registered voters; 0 votes in either election;
- 20 – Goldsby Community Center, 31 eligible registered voters; 3 votes in hospital election, 9.7 percent turnout; 2 votes in water park election, 6.5 percent turnout;
- 21 – Purcell First Baptist Church, 1,069 eligible registered voters; 226 in hospital

election, 21.1 percent turnout; 115 votes in water park election, 10.8 percent turnout;

• 23 – Purcell Emmanuel Baptist Church, 912 eligible registered voters; 338 votes in hospital election, 37.1 percent turnout; 159 votes in water park election, 17.4 percent turnout; and

• 24 – Purcell Memorial Assembly of God, 1,168 eligible registered voters; 395 in hospital election, 33.8 percent turnout; 170 in water park election, 14.6 percent turnout.

Three precincts – 21, 23 and 24 – with 958 votes combined accounted for a whopping 84.5 percent of all votes cast in the August 23 election.

Those same precincts have a combined 3,149 registered voters – or 84 percent of the 3,747 eligible registered voters for the election.

The water park sales tax generated 444 votes total from those same precincts or 14.1 percent of the eligible voter pool.

The final vote for the pool sales tax was 323 against to 199 in favor. While the margin of victory was 61.9 percent to 38.1 percent, the actual numbers put the turnout at 13.9 percent, with 8.6 percent voting no and 5.3 percent voting yes.

Available at the food court will be such festival staples as fried Oreos and corn dogs to Frito chili pies, pretzels, jumbo cookies and Indian tacos.

Arora Torres will also be preparing her sought-after homemade tamales.

Vaughn said live entertainment will be on stage from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Recorded music will be played for the final hour.

"I was so proud of our team all weekend," said head coach Hillary Price. "It was so fun to watch them start to finally mesh together as a group."


"(Lauren) Beason and Fink are starting to settle down on the mound and get in a groove, which in turn is giving our defense and offense more confidence."

Wayne’s 32-7 win over Healdton Friday night came at a high price with the loss of senior quarterback Jackson Embry to a broken leg.

“It hurts,” said head coach Brandon Sharp. “Jackson had worked his butt off to get back after the shoulder injury and this is another fluke injury.”

Embry was off to a hot start for the season, rushing 10 times for 100 yards and going 2-6 for 32 yards through the air. He also scored four touchdowns.

In the first quarter the signal caller scored on a 25-yard run.

The point after attempt was no good but Wayne would strike again in the first, this time courtesy of Braden Smith on a 63-yard jaunt.

Jordan Womack punctuated

the score with a successful two point conversion.

Wayne scored in the second quarter, again on the legs of Embry on an 18-yard run.

He put in two more touchdowns in the second quarter on a pair of one-yard runs.

After Embry went down in the third quarter, Wayne struggled to get much going offensively.

“Healdton’s defense knocked us around in the second half,” Sharp said.

Wayne had negative offensive yardage in the second half. Sharp didn’t think his offensive line played as well as they’re capable of playing.

“We gave them some life and made it a defensive struggle.”

Controlling defense After allowing Healdton to score on their opening drive,

the Wayne defense found its rhythm and didn’t allow the Bulldogs’ talented running back much room to operate.

“Our front seven really controlled the run game with our two safeties filling alleys,” Sharp said.

The Wayne D allowed as many pass completions as they had interceptions in the game – one.

Jace Elliott led the Bulldogs’ defensive charge with 16 tackles from his Mike linebacker position.

Colton Smith registered eight tackles while Braden Smith had seven tackles and a fumble recovery.

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


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

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

mistakes in the opening contest. "It's just a matter of getting things corrected," he said. "We kept the scheme extremely simplistic. When we get this sorted out this offense will evolve."

Good day to all. Welcome to the "front porch."

Many of you know that the Washington community and so many others throughout Oklahoma are grieving the tragic death last week of Washington High baseball and softball coach David Vallerand. Coach was also very special to our church loved ones, the Wells family, particularly his former softball pitcher, Allison.

We are honored today to be able to pay tribute to "Coach V" who died helping others, just as he had lived. In his honor—and as a small gift to his family and loved ones—we would like to re-tell a story we wrote about Coach about three years ago after meeting him for a short time. We will tell it now as we told it then ...

We've always felt that the best sermons are the ones that walk out the door with us. Sometimes, though, the best sermons walk right up to you. We were reminded of that lesson last Wednesday when we visited with several Washington High School coaches at their weekly FCA meeting. During the Bible study, Washington's head baseball coach David Vallerand told a story that hit home with me. I think it will you, too.

More than a decade ago, Coach V's baseball team was playing a playoff game against Yukon High School and a young

catcher named Justin Sullivan. While Coach's team was taking batting practice, Sullivan's teammates stood around making wise cracks, trying to induce a fight.

When batting practice was over, Coach V walked to home plate to pick up the last few balls. Sullivan met him at the plate with four or five balls in his catcher's mitt, gave the balls to him, and said, "Coach, we're looking forward to playing your team. You always give us a good fight when we go up against you. Good luck."

Coach said he was shocked by the gracious nature of the young man. It was something he never forgot. Justin Sullivan went on to become a great Oklahoma high school player and won the state Player of the Year award on June 2, 2002. The next day, the great young player—and even greater person—was killed tragically when tires from an 18-wheeler flew off and struck his vehicle on the freeway. As the shattered family went through his belongings, they found a journal that he had been keeping daily. It was a "prayer" journal, and for the six months prior to his untimely death, he never missed a day.

Coach skillfully continued weaving this story that morning at the FCA, going on to explain that the memorial service consisted mainly of read-

ing selections from the young man's journal. The journal later became a book, called "A Life Worth Following." Coach pointed out with the story that we never know the impact we can make on others. Every day we run across many people, and we can impact their lives in positive ways, often without even knowing it.

The Lord, of course, says it best: "Let your light so shine before men," He says in His sermon on the Mount, "that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven" (Matthew 5:16). Justin Sullivan's light did not shine long, but it shone brightly. Even more than a decade after his death, he preaches a sermon by the way he walked during his life—and by a few words he said at home plate during batting practice many years ago.

He reminded Coach V—and he reminds us—always to be on the watch for good sermons. Sometimes they will walk out the door with you when you leave the church building. More often, they will walk out the door with you when you leave the house in the mornings. ~

I wonder why the Bible wants us to let someone else be first? Why do we play sports? We play sports because they help us excel in a physical activity.

When we run, we become better at running. When we swim, we become better at swimming, and we become healthier for our physical body. We also become more alert, and balanced, and develop hand-eye coordination from sports. These are all good things.

But in the rest of life, in our life with God, we learn that to be first is not the most important thing. The most important thing is to love each other. And sometimes we love each other by letting someone else be first. For example, we love her by letting our sister have the best place next to mommy or daddy. We love him by letting our little brother play with our toys. We love someone by letting them

have the last cookie or the last piece of German chocolate cake (yum!). This is how we learn how to be happy. This is how we grow in our life with God.

This Friday, September 2, we will have our regular First Friday Adoration from 7-9 p.m. with Confessions offered during the last hour.



One for the History Books

For years Oklahoma popular culture sites have been listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and now plans are under way to celebrate their stories at the Oklahoma Museum of Popular Culture (OKPOP), which will be built in the Brady Arts District of Tulsa.

These historic sites include the 1910 Blue Hawk Peak Ranch home of Gordon W. "Pawnee Bill" Lillie on the west edge of Pawnee, the 1910 Muskogee Manual Training High School for Negroes, and the Oscar B. Jacobson House in Norman.

Others include Oklahoma

City's Farmer's Public Market, a Spanish-style building opened with great fanfare on June 16, 1928, and Will Rogers High School in Tulsa, opened in 1939 as an outstanding example of Public Works Administration Art Deco architecture.

"Historic sites that once served as a showcase for popular culture combine the power of shared memory with a strong sense of place," said Dr. Bob Blackburn, executive director of the Oklahoma Historical Society. "These crossroads of creativity help define our cultural history and bring us together as a community."

Gordon Lillie, who thrilled

worldwide audiences with stagecoach robberies, covered wagon attacks, trick roping and shooting in his Wild West Show from 1888 to 1913, hired architect James Hamilton of Chester, Penn., who once backed the Wild West Show business, to build a home at Blue Hawk Peak for \$75,000.

Lillie bought the land in 1902. The National Register nomination describes the property as including 280 acres with Blue Hawk Peak, the rustic stone 14-room mansion built in 1910, and several original ranch buildings.

"When the state purchased the ranch in 1961, it stood much as it had when Pawnee Bill died 20 years before," said Kent Ruth, who prepared the National Register nomination. "The house, outbuildings, garden, original log cabin and three-story barn were essentially unchanged."

Visitors can now tour the mansion to see Lillie family memorabilia, photographs and original art work. The ranch also has covered picnic shelters, picnic tables and a meeting room that can be rented. The Pawnee Bill Ranch recreates Pawnee Bill's Original Wild West Show in June every year.

The Manual Training High School for Negroes is one of the oldest remaining black secondary schools in eastern Oklahoma. Muskogee's 25,278 population in 1910 included 7,831 African Americans, about 31 percent of the population.

The thriving black community included retail stores, physicians, attorneys, a black-owned bank and a black-owned newspaper, the Muskogee Cimeter.

For 70 years, the Manual High School was a significant educational institution in Muskogee, and its faculty nurtured nine nationally-recognized jazz musicians, including eight African Americans born in Muskogee, according to Rogers State University professor Hugh Foley.

The Oscar B. Jacobson House is associated with a director of the University of Oklahoma's School of Fine Arts who revolutionized art study for the university, said William A. Mathes, who prepared the

National Register nomination. The house is a unique example of Italian Renaissance architecture in Norman.

As director, Jacobson embraced the work of five young Plains Indians artists. In 1928 the Kiowa Five were accepted by OU as special students – a significant event in Plains Indian art history, said Mathes. During the 1920s and 1930s the Jacobson House became a focal point for artistic and literary projects through interaction between the Norman, Santa Fe and Taos artistic communities.

The Farmers Public Market in Oklahoma City became the hub of farm produce marketing in Oklahoma, and its second floor auditorium was a dance hall with famous bands such as Bob Wills and Merl Lindsay.

Lindsay and his Oklahoma Night Riders became a popular western swing band during the 1940s and 1950s. He also broadcasted a daily radio and television show in 1947.

After the dance hall burned that year, Lindsay and the Oklahoma Night Riders opened the Lindsay Land Ballroom in south Oklahoma City, where they recorded and enjoyed regional popularity.

In 1957 Red Foley featured them on his Ozark Jubilee television show and then hired them as the regular show band. The name was changed to the Ozark Jubilee Band. Lindsay was inducted into the Western Swing Society Hall of Fame in 1992.

In Tulsa, Will Rogers High School was nominated for the National Register as one of the nation's best examples of Art Deco school architecture, said Cathy Ambler, who prepared the nomination. The school was built by Manhattan Construction of Muskogee.

The building is associated with the book, "The Outsiders," written by S.E. Hinton while she was a student at the school. Oklahoman Gray Frederickson was a producer on the film version of the novel.

OKPOP will be proud to celebrate the major roles these and other major sites have played in the development of Oklahoma's culture, said Blackburn, and to preserve their stories well into the future for Oklahomans.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, AMENDING SECTIONS 5-1, 5-2, 5-3, 5-4, 5-5 and 5-6 OF ARTICLE 1 OF CHAPTER 5 OF THE GOLDSBY CODE OF ORDINANCES; CHANGING THE DEFINITION OF PERSON AND ADDING DEFINITIONS OF FOOD AND MOBILE FOOD VENDOR; PROVIDING THAT IT SHALL BE AN OFFENSE FOR ANY PERSON TO ENGAGE IN THE BUSINESS OF PEDDLER, SOLICITOR, CANVASSER, FIXED LOCATION TEMPORARY FOOD SERVICES STAND, MOBILE FOOD VENDOR, OR ANY OTHER ITINERANT OCCUPATION WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING A LICENSE THEREFOR; ADDING AND CHANGING PROVISIONS FOR LICENSURE AND REGULATION OF ITINERANT OCCUPATIONS, PEDDLARS, SOLICITORS, CANVASSERS, FIXED LOCATION TEMPORARY FOOD SERVICES STANDS, AND MOBILE FOOD VENDORS AND FACILITIES; AMENDING THE APPLICATION AND PERMIT ISSUANCE PROCEDURES FOR ITINERANT OCCUPATIONS, PEDDLARS, SOLICITORS, CANVASSERS, FIXED LOCATION TEMPORARY FOOD SERVICES STANDS, AND MOBILE FOOD VENDORS AND FACILITIES; PROVIDING ADDITIONAL GROUNDS FOR LICENSURE REVOCATION; AND ESTABLISHING FEES FOR LICENSURE OF MOBILE FOOD VENDORS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA, THAT:

Section 1. Purpose. The purpose of this ordinance is to better regulate the facilities and actions of itinerant occupations, fixed location temporary food services stands and mobile food vendors within the Town of Goldsby. It has been determined that it is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, good order and general welfare of the residents of the Town of Goldsby that the facilities and actions of itinerant occupations, fixed location temporary food services stands and mobile food vendors within the Town of Goldsby be regulated by ordinance.

Section 2. Subparagraph 3 of Section 5-1 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances, Amended. Subparagraph 3 of Section 5-1 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is hereby amended in its entirety to read:

3. Person. The word "person," (whether or not capitalized), when used in connection with any Peddler, Solicitor, or Canvasser or any business carried on by means of house-to-house solicitation shall mean and refer to the natural person seeking to engage in or engaging in such business or

occupation within the corporate limits of the Town of Goldsby. The word "person," when used in connection with any Fixed Location Temporary Food Services Stand or Mobile Food Vendor shall mean and include any individual, as well as any corporation, company, partnership, firm, association or society legally authorized by the State of Oklahoma to conduct business in the State of Oklahoma. When the word "person" is used to designate the violator or offender of any law, ordinance or regulation, it includes corporation, company, partnership, firm, association, society, and any other association of persons.

Section 3. Section 5-1 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances, Amended. Section 5-1 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto the following definitions:

6. Food. Food has its usual and ordinary meaning, and includes any foods whether prepared or prepackaged and all other items offered for human consumption, including but not limited to ice cream, frozen novelties or desserts, candy, gum, popcorn, hotdogs, sandwiches, peanuts, soft drinks, beverages, coffee and dairy products.

7. Mobile Food Vendor. Mobile Food Vendor shall mean any business, operator or vendor who conducts any business involving the sale of food from or through use of a motor vehicle as defined herein and shall include business operated from or through the use of a trailer that is typically dependent upon a motor vehicle for movement or relocation.

Section 4. Section 5-2.1 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances, Amended. Section 5-2.1 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is hereby amended in its entirety to read:

1. It shall be unlawful and an offense for any person to engage in the business of peddler, solicitor, canvasser, Fixed Location Temporary Food Services Stand, Mobile Food Vendor, or any other itinerant occupation within the corporate limits of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, without first obtaining a license therefor, as provided in this Article, and paying the prescribed fees to cover the reasonable costs of investigation and processing of the application. The fee shall be paid to the Town Clerk-Treasurer when the application is filed and shall not be returnable under any circumstances. The Town Board of Trustees, from time to time, may change such fee by Ordinance, to an amount not to exceed the reasonable costs of Licensing and enforcement under this Article.

Section 5. Section 5-3 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances, Amended. Section 5-3 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Goldsby Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by amending numerical sub-paragraph 2 thereof

to read as follows:

2. The application shall give the following information:

a. Full name, birthdate, recent photo and Social Security number of each individual applicant. If the application is for the Fixed Location Temporary Food Services Stand or the Mobile Food Vendor license and the applicant is not a natural person, the full name of the applicant entity, evidence that applicant entity is legally authorized by the State of Oklahoma to conduct business in the State of Oklahoma, the full name, contact address, telephone number, facsimile number, and e-mail address of the natural person in the State of Oklahoma duly authorized to act and receive notice on behalf of the applicant, and the full name, birthdate, recent photo and Social Security number of each employee of the applicant who will be physically present within the corporate limits of the Town of Goldsby while engaging in such applicant's business. The employer shall have the privilege of changing employees after license, if any, is granted, but the number of employees shall never exceed the number listed in the original application without the express consent of Goldsby and provided that the employer has provided the full name, birthdate, recent photo and Social Security number of each such substitute or additional employee of the applicant who will be physically present within the corporate limits of the Town of Goldsby while engaging in such applicant's business

b. Address, both legal and local, and telephone number or other means of immediate contact;

c. A description of the nature of business and kinds of goods, property or merchandise to be sold, and if the applicant is a farmer or truck gardener, whether said goods are produced or personally-owned, cultivated and controlled;

d. If the applicant is employed by another, evidence that applicant's employer is legally authorized by the State of Oklahoma to conduct business in the State of Oklahoma, the full name, contact address, telephone number, facsimile number, and e-mail address of the natural person in the State of Oklahoma duly authorized to act and receive notice on behalf of the employer, together with a brief description or credentials showing the exact relationship;

e. The first and last date of the period for which the license to do business is desired;

f. A description and depiction of any sign or display to be used sufficient to permit a determination of compliance with the sign code of the Town of Goldsby;

g. Description and license number of any vehicle to be used;

h. A statement as to whether or not the applicant has been convicted of a felony, the nature of the offense and the punishment or penalty assessed therefor;

i. If applicant will offer for sale any goods, property or mer-

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Corner is not affiliated with any other organization. Our services are only provided at Faith Pointe Baptist Church, 3404 NW 36th, in Norman.

The Volunteer of the Week is Rick Tucker. Rick and his wife Sherrie are residents of Wayne. We appreciate their support in our mission.

Several years ago I wrote about the Secretary of Defense's plan to make it easier for veterans who were suffering from PTSD or other mental disorders to upgrade their discharges. We have filed a number of (DD Form 149) Applications for Correction of Military Records to assist veterans whose discharge was other than honorable. I have received information from them stating that they have forwarded these applications and evidence to the Surgeon General's Office for an opinion.

One of the applications we filed recently resulted in a finding that the veteran's discharge should be upgraded to Honorable based on his diagnosis of PTSD. This veteran was wounded in action and received the Purple Heart while serving in Vietnam. For more information, please stop by to see one of our volunteers.

We were officially closed last Tuesday with Faith Pointe used as a voting location, and we were able to process claims for 145 veterans and surviving spouses with 65 of them being first timers. As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive the rating decisions on the veterans and surviving spouses who we represent. This week VA approved 30 veterans for disability benefits ranging from 10-90 percent depending on the severity of their injuries or illnesses that were service connected. Their combined annual compensation will be just over \$250,500 per year. I

also received decisions on six veterans rated at 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These six veterans will receive a combined annual income of \$222,000 per year. We received one DIC approval this week along with approvals of several Aid and Attendance applications.

Last week we had a surviving spouse approved for Aid and Attendance and VA Pension and will be receiving more than \$3,000 per month to help with the cost of nursing home care. Since we started receiving copies of the VA rating decisions for veterans and spouses, we can provide better assistance to those who visit us. The knowledge we gain from these decisions has enabled us to know where we need to improve our application papers.

Our ladies assisted 18 surviving spouses with their applications for VA benefits last week. Several of those spouses will be eligible to receive either VADIC or Pension benefits. Not every person who applies will be eligible as these benefits are based on whether the veteran's cause of death was presumptive to a service connected condition or whether they were service connected for a disability listed on their death certificate. The pension benefit is based on when the veteran served and on income.

Please remember we are a free service provided to our nation's veterans and their families. Legal Aid is on-site each Tuesday and Thursday morning to help our veterans and their families. Their service is free.

Another free service part of our mission involves transporting veterans to their medical appointments and bringing Vets and their families to see us so we can help them with their VA claims. Our drivers, Clayton Lee and Louie Metseff, drove a combined total of 581 miles transporting nine veterans. Clayton and Louie graciously donated 44-1/2 hours in support of this part of our mission. Louie and his wife, Norma, also spends many hours each week preparing the food baskets we have available for those who qualify.

We are a 501(c)3 non-profit, so your donations are tax deductible. Each week we provide financial assistance from the funds donated to us. Currently, every person including myself is volunteering their time to help the veterans and spouses who we assist with their VA claims and questions each week. Without your support, we would not be able to provide the extra support such as food, medical testing, transportation, rents, utilities and the many other unmet needs that many in our community have.

As we move forward in our mission, we will try to do more for those in our community who are not able to provide for themselves and their families. With your help, we can make a difference in the lives of our veterans and their families. You can make a taxable donation through our website, through the mail, or in person. We can also help you set up a monthly contribution through your bank or your debit/credit card. We would love for you to visit us at the church to see first-hand what we do. We look forward to showing you around.

Since February 2016, we have spent more than \$200,000 on the men and women in our area. Last week we started counting up the number of people we have assisted since moving to Faith Pointe Baptist Church. We are on schedule to have served almost ten thousand veterans and spouses in the past 12 months. I find it

almost impossible to believe this has happened in the first year we have been at this location.

As we continue to grow, we are going to need more volunteers to help us meet the needs of the many veterans and their families who are reaching out to us. Please consider being a part of what we do each Tuesday and Thursday morning.

On each and every visit, veterans should bring all of their DD-214's (discharge papers), all VA rating letters, and all VA forms that have been filed. For privacy reasons, Dale K. Graham's Veteran's Corner does not keep your information on file and does not have access to any of this information. A couple of things are sometimes needed to file for VA benefits are D214 discharge papers, bank account information (voided check), marriage information, social security information, and all VA rating decisions.

Second Grade


"It's not really hard. I've learned a lot of math. I like math. There's not much homework. All I have to do is just read one story.

Kozik mentors Destiny, a seventh grader. Since their school schedules did not coincide during last year's fall semester, Kozik sent cards and notes to keep in touch. Johnna Hayes, Stillwater Middle School counselor, said that Destiny's face always lit up when Hayes handed her Kozik's notes.

"Based on the fall semester, I think Destiny, my mentee, has matured considerably since last year. This could be due partially to her adjustment from elementary to middle school," Kozik said. "Destiny seemed to be much more focused on her homework this year, which is something I have been stressing."

"Mentoring has given me a new appreciation for the support system I had growing up, including parents and grandparents, family friends, and more," Kozik added. "I know that, without them, I would not be where I am today."

When asked what she would say to motivate others to mentor, Kozik responded, "I would ask each of them to think about any mentors they had growing up, formal or informal, and the impact he or she had on his or

her life."

"Too many children do not have the support and attention they need and deserve, but anyone can provide that by taking just an hour or two per week," she concluded.

Fagin-esque crime DA: Mom told children to steal

Like the character Fagin in a Dickens novel, a 35-year-old Ada woman allegedly ordered her four children to shoplift more than \$1,500 worth of merchandise from Walmart.

Sandy L. Talton is jailed here on a \$4,000 bond on felony charges of larceny of merchandise from a retailer and contributing to the delinquency of minors.

Prosecutors charged Talton in McClain County District Court.

The charges were filed after a former felony conviction.

According to an affidavit, Purcell police were sent to Walmart on August 9 to investigate a larceny report.

An asset protection employee told police he stopped a 14-year-old girl who was pushing a cart of unpaid for merchandise out the door.

After detaining the girl, the employee learned that a 9-year-old boy had been stopped bypassing the registers with another shopping cart filled with merchandise at the other end of the store.

Between them the children

had allegedly pilfered 208 items worth \$1,506.29. The merchandise included children's clothes, shoes, make-up, hygiene items, medicine and food.

The employee contacted Talton, the children's mother. She said she had no idea they had attempted to steal merchandise.

When police questioned Talton, she said she had only a few dollars and had stopped at Walmart to buy a pack of cigarettes. She had four children with her. The other two are ages 11 and 13.

She said the four children live in Ardmore and she was taking them to Oklahoma City.

While being questioned, the 14-year-old said thefts were her mother's idea.

Surveillance video showed the two boys taking one cart and the two girls the other. As they walked around the store, they took items from the shelves and placed in the carts. Talton was also seen on video placing items in the carts.

The other two children were later found at Braum's.

All four children were placed in the custody of Talton's brother in Ardmore.

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
