Senior citizen living center approved

The Village on Green, a proposed rental home community for senior citizens, won the support of the Purcell City Council Tuesday night.

The council approved a zoning change request for a site on North Green Avenue between the Purcell High School agriculture barn and Coldwell Banker.

The community will consist of approximately 48 one and two-bedroom homes, as well as a clubhouse for residents.

The homes will be built in four and six plexes and renters must be at least 62-years-old.

The site was previously zoned commercial, but the change approved by the council changed that to multifamily residential.

The council also approved spending \$930,000 from the city's reserves to pay for its share of the Green Avenue Improvement Project from Grant Street to Washington

The city is partnering with the Oklahoma Department of Transportation on the project which includes GreenScape. Those improvements have been on the drawing board for five years.

Included in the project is the construction of school crossings, sidewalks, new lighting and landscape improvements in the median. Total cost will be \$1.93 million.

Bids on those will be opened January 19, the council was told.

Council members also learned about the city's community service program administered by Jimmy New.

That program is two-fold, benefitting individuals who are ordered by the court to per-

Many parts of state said to be high-level math, science 'deserts'

Participation in advancedlevel math and science classes in high school is a strong predictor of success in college, in the class or whether it results classes offering more chalin college credit, studies show.

Yet as many as two-thirds of Oklahoma high schools report they don't offer calculus or physics, leaving swaths of the state devoid of these classroom opportunities, according to data for the 2014-2015 school year, reported by schools to the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights.

Calculus and physics aren't needed for a high school diploma, and schools may offer other high-level math and science courses, such as statistics. But calculus and physics are regarded as key concepts used in many other disciplines. And the classes are essential for entry into well-paying careers in science, technology, engias well as medicine.

"Of- Education Department - from the 2011-2012 school year show that Oklahoma had the third lowest percentage of schools reporting they offered calculus, with 34 percent, just above Alaska and North Dakota. Oklahoma schools reported the second lowest percent offering physics, at 36 percent, above only Alaska.

And although Oklahoma reported one of the highest percentages of high school availability of Algebra 1, at 95 percent, that, too, could be interpreted as a sign the state is lagging. To reach calculus by senior year, students should complete Algebra 1 in middle school.

The self-reported data likely contains some discrepancies, such as whether a school counts pre-calculus as a calculus course, and may not capture the full availability of courses in districts that rotate offerings every other year. Additionally, some districts disputed the numbers published by the department. But the data collection is subject to a series of embedded checks to ensure significant data errors are corrected before districts submit, according to the federal Education Department.





Classless.


He must not have been watching when Samaje Perine took a knee on a sure touchdown run against Oklahoma State.

After Raymond Cooper received the first seven votes of the ballot count, Iris Long wondered if she was the only voter who cast her ballot for Dick Bland.

Halfway through the count, Vera Pinrod made the decision to call a 10-minute break. After 382 votes had been tallied, Raymond Cooper led with 205 votes, compared with 177 for "Silver Tongue" Dick Bland. Because it was a run-off election, write-in votes were not allowed.

There was a definite buzz in the VFW section, as Cooper supporters anticipated an overwhelming win. Word also spread throughout the crowd that Dory Funk Jr. had defeated The Sheik at the Spring County Fair using his signature move, the spinning toe hold.

Marvin Walsh, overcome with emotion, shouted, "It looks like true Americans are carrying the night!"

As the break approached the 15-minute mark, folks took their places as they sensed history taking place before their eyes. After five more minutes, Sheriff Dibble approached the microphone.

"Due to a medical issue, Mrs. Penrod will not be able to continue," Dibble announced. "Diane Curtis is driving her to Spring County Hospital.' A murmur grew throughout the crowd.

Suddenly, the election count was a bit less important. Vera was like family to everyone in the Valley. Dibble went on, "Mrs. Penrod said to tell

everyone she would be fine, and she requested that Iris Long take her place counting the

"What?" exclaimed Elbert Lee Jones. Earl Goodman had thoughts of his own. "No way!" he shouted.

A sharp glance from Chief Dibble in their

direction quickly calmed things down. He then looked in the direction of Iris, who had been tallying the vote on her own reporter's pad. "Mrs. Long, would you continue the

You wouldn't think a hardened news reporter would get nervous, but Iris stammered, shocked by the turn of events. "I guess so."

Long took Vera's seat in front of the crowd. Chief Dibble placed the ballot box in front of her, and she withdrew a slip of paper.

"Bland!" she shouted with as much energy

as she could muster.

"No way!" shouted Walsh.

Dibble had about as much as he could stand. He quickly made his way to Marvin, said a few words only Walsh could hear, then made his way back to the stage. Marvin quickly became unusually subdued.

"Bland," continued Iris. Then, "Bland," again.

You could feel the heat rising from the VFW section, but no one dared say a word with Dibble at full attention.

As the count continued, the tallies on each side of the board became closer. At one point, Iris stopped to catch her breath. That's when Beatrice Justice spoke just

loud enough for most in the crowd to hear her. "Romans 2:11," was all she said as if she, too was out of breath. Perry Pratt, almost to himself, but again loud

enough for most to hear, uttered "They're tied." Indeed they were. With 742 votes tallied, Bland had caught Cooper with 22 ballots left. The room became silent, waiting for Long to continue the count. As those final 22 votes were tallied, Chief

Dibble no longer sought to quiet the crowd. With every ballot, there was a roar which grew louder with each slip Iris pulled from the box. 'Cooper!" Iris yelled. Then, "Bland!'

The count went back and forth, much like the match between Gorilla Monsoon and Jerry Lawler taking place at the fairgrounds.

With one ballot remaining, Cooper had 381 votes. Bland had 382.

Would there be a second run-off? Could there really be a tie?

As Dibble again attempted to quiet the crowd, word spread that Lawler and Monsoon fought to a draw in their match. Iris pulled the final ballot from the box.

Dibble needed try no longer. You could have heard a pin drop in the room. Iris looked at the ballot for what seemed

like minutes, but was only a few seconds. Putting her hand to her chest, she read the name on the paper, "Bland."

It took a moment to sink in. Raymond Cooper had been defeated by two votes.

"It's a fix!" screamed Walsh. "Iris Long has fixed this election!"

Like most others, I stayed in the Town Hall for several minutes, realizing I had just wit-

nessed history in the making. This was quite possibly the most exciting night in the history of the Valley . . . so far.

As we start this New Year of 2017 all our volunteers want to express their appreciation for the support our mission has received from our community and the men and women we serve. Without your support, we would not be able to meet the needs of the 10,000 veterans and surviving spouses who made the trip to Norman for assistance.

During the past year we have spent several hundred thousands of dollars in direct support of our nation's veterans and their families. Some of the items that were funded were for rent, utilities, food items, transportation, medical expenses, repairs, medicines, along with a host of other daily needs. Please remember there are many veterans and their families in our state who are doing without not just today, but every day.

Some veterans are affected by Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) caused by mental trauma that occurred while in the military. This condition has caused some of our veterans to have mental health issues they will experience their entire life. During my service to veterans I have met some of them who continue to struggle with PTSD that occurred while in WWII. For some of them their struggles have led to alcohol and drug abuse.

Personally, I feel there have been thousands of veterans who received bad discharges from the military when the veterans were suffering from untreated and undiagnosed PTSD symptoms. To support my belief the Secretary of Defense recently ordered the military review boards to take a look at the possibility of upgrading some discharges based on PTSD or other mental health diagnosis. For information on applying for a review of a military discharge please stop by any Tuesday or Thursday morning.

The last week of the year we were very busy helping veterans and their families apply for the VA benefits for which they may be eligible. There were a total of 175 men and women who were assisted. Of that number there were nine surviving spouses who filed claims for DIC, Pension or aid and attendance. To apply for the pension benefits the veteran must have served on active duty at least one day during war time. Our ladies are available to assist with your claims or questions each Tuesday and Thursday morning or

call Shirley at (405) 361-9322.

As an Accredited VA Claims Agent, I receive the VA rating decisions on each of the veterans or surviving spouses who I represent. This allows us to send a letter to the veteran or surviving spouse detailing what is their next step should be in the claims process. Having this information has enabled us to guide them in their quest for VA benefits. Before being accredited, I was just like the other service officers who veterans went to and never knew if the veteran was approved or not for VA benefits. Having that Accreditation has improved everything for both the veterans and me. Last week I received the fol-





A Norman man who failed to make a court date in Mc-Clain County District Court on September 14 has now been charged with bail jumping.

The original charges filed against Kristopher Long, 27, in November 2015 were possession of a controlled dangerous substance, two counts of larceny of lost property and pos-



"In the last day," the Lord says, "that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying, If any man thirst, let him come unto me, and drink" (v. 37).

lem for several days to observe the yearly Feast of Tabernacles. The Lord, certainly, was not one to waste an opportunity. In fact, He times His arrival into Jerusalem just right – waiting until the middle of the week so that He can maximize His effectiveness (7:9). (There is, by the way, a great lesson for evangelism in that for us.)

But it is now the last day of the feast – that is, this is the "last" chance for some! Today is the last time many of those present will have the opportunity to respond to the Lord's teaching. This may be the last "invitation" they would ever receive to turn their lives over to the Lord.

One thing that strikes me as we glance at this picture is that if even one in that crowd can be touched by the Lord's message, that will be enough. We know, as we look at verse 40, that more than one takes notice – whether they follow Him then or not, we do not know, but they take notice. Still, only one would have been enough. It reminds

The Lord has been in Jerusa- me that any time we share the gospel – sometimes in word, sometimes in kindness – we never know who that gospel may affect. People really do watch every step you take.

> In addition to Jesus' seizing every opportunity, we learn something else invaluable from this great John 7 scene: The Lord has a great passion for His message. Notice that He doesn't whisper it in a corner somewhere. No, he "stands and cries" out the great message (v. 37). His message is the greatest the world has ever heard, and He cries it out passionately.

I have always felt that – outside teaching truth – perhaps the best attribute for a teacher or preacher of God's Word is his passion. Should a man want to preach, he had best be a man of great passion, with a "fire burning in his bones." (Time does not allow us, today, to talk about Jeremiah, Elijah, and the Apostle Paul, but you understand that sermon well,




