The special meeting of the district's board of education will begin at 6 p.m. in the Lexington Auditorium.

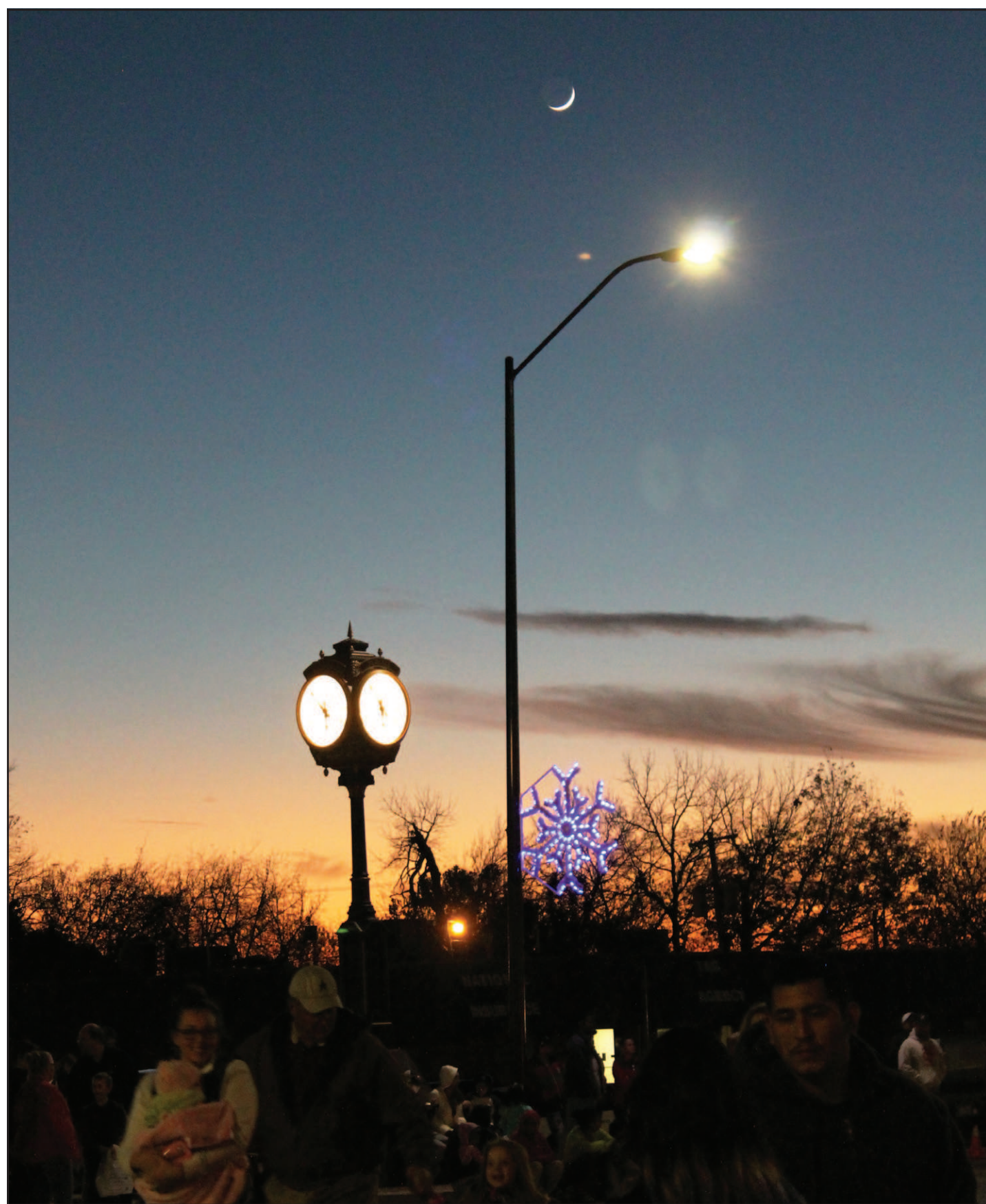
It will be the second town

Wood burning stoves offer heating alternative

As temperatures continue to drop, wood burning stoves will get more and more action.

The stoves are an economically friendly solution to heating the house, but without proper operation, the result could be more costly than just a high natural gas bill. The

majority of fires involving wood stoves are a direct result of improper operation.

The Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service offers guidelines from everything from starting a fire to ash removal to ensure a warm and uneventful winter.

Once the wood stove is installed correctly, open the

damper completely. Kindling or paper should be placed over the entire bottom of the box, which will achieve an evenly burning fire. Use of flammable liquids to start a fire can result in explosions and uncontrolled fires.

Oklahomans stand to gain financial help buying health coverage

Already, about 8.8 million Americans, and 113,209 Oklahomans, who buy health insurance through HealthCare.gov receive tax credits that help make coverage more affordable. But about 12 million more Americans, including 226,600 Oklahomans, may also be eligible for help during this Open Enrollment, but not know it. This group includes:

- Current HealthCare.gov consumers: 5,600 Oklahomans who didn't get tax credits last year could be eligible for tax credits in 2017, even if their income remains the same, because financial assistance moves along with rates. That's 27 percent of currently unsubsidized Oklahoma Marketplace consumers.

- Off-Marketplace individual consumers: About 33,000 Oklahomans who currently pay full price for individual coverage off-Marketplace could be eligible for tax credits if they purchase a 2017 plan through HealthCare.gov instead.

- The remaining uninsured: About 188,000 uninsured Oklahomans earn incomes indicating they, too, could be eligible for financial assistance. Nationwide, 84 percent of Marketplace-eligible uninsured Americans have incomes suggesting they are tax credit eligible.

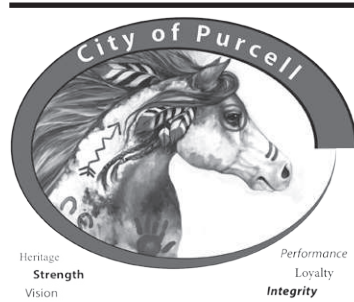
In Oklahoma, 31,803 people have already signed up for coverage in the first month of Open Enrollment, more than last year at this time. But many more Oklahomans might benefit from visiting HealthCare.gov before the December 15th deadline for January 1 coverage and checking out their options for affordable, quality health insurance.

Affordable by design. The Marketplace's tax credits are designed to keep pace with premium increases. This means that for many consumers already receiving tax credits, the value of that financial assistance will increase this year

to keep pace with the cost of coverage in their area. It also means that more individuals may qualify for tax credits as premiums rise.

For people eligible for financial assistance, the ACA

Section R319 Site Address

R319.1 Address numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall be a minimum of four inches (102mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means should be used to identify the structure. This will allow emergency crews to locate the house number.

New leadership for a new era

As President Obama’s days in office come to a close, the specter of significant change is on the horizon. While President-Elect Donald Trump assembles his leadership team, Congress is busy preparing our own agenda to repeal, reform and replace some of the most onerous policies of the Obama Administration.

With the right people, Congress and the new President can bring badly needed change to the political atmosphere in our nation and finally begin to get things done.

I’ve been very impressed with the initial choices President-Elect Trump has made for his cabinet. Fewer women in State Legislature

Women, already underrepresented in the state Legislature, will hold fewer seats in 2017 despite a surge in the number of female candidates this year.

Those results, coupled with Hillary Clinton’s failed bid to become the first woman presi-

dent, have left many women in Oklahoma feeling that their representation in politics has been dealt a blow.

When the Legislature reconvenes in 2017, there will be 19 women among the state’s 149 elected representatives — or just under 13 percent. Election results show a net loss of three seats; in 2016, 22 women held

seats in the Legislature.

Only Wyoming will have a smaller percentage of female legislators in 2017 (10, or about 11 percent), according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

Nationwide, nearly a quarter of legislators are women. Since 1971, the number of women serving in state leg-

islatures has more than quintupled, although the number has stayed fairly steady in the past several election cycles.

Both Republican and Democratic women who are leaders maintain that their presence makes a positive difference in approaches to policy.

“Women bring a certain dynamic to the process,” said

Sen. AJ Griffin, R-Guthrie, who was first elected in 2012. “We do conduct business differently. We’re more likely to reach across the aisle. And we bring representation of over half our state.”

She and other female law-

makers will form a women's caucus in the upcoming legislative session. The women will meet regularly, help co-author each other's bills and work on key issues such as domestic violence, equal pay, substance abuse and women's incarceration.

The women's caucus will be bipartisan and include House and Senate members.

"It will give us a stronger voice. If we don't have the percentages, at least we can bind together as a women's caucus and really push some of those issues," said Rep. Leslie Osborn, R-Mustang.

Hats in the Ring

The 2016 election cycle drew more candidates than any other in the past decade, including 77 female candidates for the House and Senate. Fifty-six advanced to the general election, but many faced uphill battles unrelated to gender.

The new class of legislators includes 13 female representatives; eight are incumbents. Newcomers are Meloyde Blancett of Tulsa, Rhonda Baker of Yukon, Carol Bush of Tulsa, Tammy West of Bethany and Tess Teague of Choctaw.

Six state senators are women. All but one — Republican Julie Daniels of Bartlesville — are incumbents.

Even though there will be fewer women overall, there will be women in leadership positions in the House and Senate. For House Republicans, Rep. Elise Hall, R-Bethany, will serve as vice caucus chairwoman and Rep. Katie Henke, R-Tulsa, will be caucus secretary. The House speaker, pro tempore and caucus chairman will be men.

The Senate GOP leadership roster includes Sen. Kim David, R-Porter, as chair of the Senate appropriations committee, the first woman to be named to that position, and Sen. Stephanie Bice, R-Oklahoma City, as assistant majority floor leader. The Senate pro tempore, floor leader and eight other announced GOP leaders will be men.

Democrats will select and announce their leadership positions within the next few weeks.

The presence of women legislative leaders shows voters are willing to elect women. Studies show women are far less likely to run for office than men. "Women are not recruited. Women are less likely to be tapped and cultivated and pushed forward. And women are much more likely to not think they are qualified," said Cindy Rosenthal, former mayor of Norman and a political science and women's studies professor at the University of Oklahoma.

Those circumstances, in general, create big barriers to getting

women into office.

In 2018, when statewide elections are held, women's prospects for winning key offices are uncertain. Griffin said she and other women legislators work to plant the seed early, even with young, school-aged girls.

"We've got to start raising up girls to consider a life of politics," Griffin said.

President and Congress

In the presidency, an election poised to deliver an enormous milestone to women instead resulted in disappointment among some voters, especially Democrats and young adults.

Hillary Clinton supporters created the "Pantsuit Nation" movement and the corresponding hashtag, and voters plastered



the grave of woman's suffrage leader Susan B. Anthony with "I Voted" stickers, which was streamed live on Facebook on Election Day.

"There was certainly a sentiment of some, clearly not all, women that this was going to be an historic moment," said Rosenthal. "This was something many have waited a lifetime to see happen."

The day after the election, Rosenthal had students in her office, sobbing and hugely disappointed in the outcome, she said.

Despite pre-election women's empowerment sentiment, exit polls showed that while Clinton won the support of a majority of women voters, more white women voted for Donald Trump. Support for Trump was even stronger among white women without a college degree.

Keith Gaddie, chair of the University of Oklahoma political science department, predicted Clinton would be just as unpopular in Oklahoma as Barack Obama had been.

"We never imagined that gender could be more powerful than race in this country, but it is... I think it is part of the cultural pushback against a strong woman in a place that's not usually occupied by women, even though we've elected a female governor," Gaddie said.

The results indicate there were issues deeper than gender.

Trump's campaign was pock-

marked by a 2005 video of him describing using his celebrity status to grope women and a slew of women accusing him of sexual assault.

His win, some female leaders say, is voters' stamp of approval or indifference to sexist behavior.

Democrat Courtney Blau, a health-care attorney, said Trump's support among women was discouraging.

"This election took us a step back in terms of our equality and our rights," she said. "This election was an affirmation of oppression of women, and objectification of women."

Based on campaign promises, some political analysts and women are speculating that Trump's policies as president will limit women's access to abortion and birth control. Trump has said he'll nominate pro-life Supreme Court justices in an attempt to overturn Roe v. Wade. He also vowed to repeal Obamacare, which requires insurers to provide contraceptives for free. Recently, he walked back that promise, saying he would amend the law instead.

Trump also announced plans to provide mothers six weeks of paid maternity leave and allow working parents who earn less than \$250,000 a year to deduct child-care expenses from their income taxes — proposals that could benefit many women.

In the aftermath of the election, women's rights supporters also were disappointed in congressional and state governors' elections. The number of women in Congress will remain the same, at 104, or 19 percent, according to the Center for American Women and Politics at Rutgers University. The number of women governors will drop by one, to five.

But women's advocates can point to one historic and encouraging fact: For the first time ever, a woman won the nation's popular vote in the race for president. Nancy Duff Campbell, co-president of the National Women's Law Center in Washington, D.C., noted the significance of her achievement and said it is a harbinger.

"We are fortified by the knowledge that for the first time in history tens of millions of Americans could, and did, vote for a woman presidential candidate from a major political party, that girls and boys could see a powerful woman have a real chance of becoming president, and that because of this breakthrough, we will see a woman occupy the highest office in the land one day," she said in a written statement.

Mary Ann Tinkersly sat one row to my left and one seat ahead of me in algebra class during the spring of 1998, and no amount of studying was going to make up for the confusion she created in my brain cells each day during fourth period.

First, the mayoral election. Everyone expected the election to be concluded prior to kicking off the county fair on Wednesday. But there we were, still listening to Raymond Cooper broadcast the evils of the Federal Reserve System, as well as those of his opponent. The front page of The Lennox Valley Hometown News, normally filled with stories related to fair competitions and visiting celebrities, was filled with articles about the previous week's ballot count and Juliet Stoughton's decision to bow out of the upcoming run-off, allowing "Silver Tongue" Dick Bland to face Raymond Cooper "mano a mano."

Second, the scheduled appearance of Tanti Blevins and the Heavenly Hosts Friday night at the fair. Each year in late August, most of the excitement, especially among the Valley's female population, was reserved for the lineup of pseudo-celebrities who made their way through the county fair circuit, and 1998 was no exception. Not since "Mr. Sound Effects" Wes Harrison visited Spring County in 1983 had a celebrity of this stature made an appearance.

It was hard to imagine which was subject to more discussion, the fair or the election, as Wednesday began. Iris Long, editor of the Hometown News, wrote as much in her weekly editorial.

"Every town," Iris began, "deserves a week each year to take a break from the ordinary."

Slowly add seasoned dry wood to lit kindling, being careful not to smother the fire with too much wood. Once the fire is burning briskly, adjust the draft controls to maintain the desired heat output.

Stoves are built differently and should be treated accordingly. New cast-iron parts need to be "seasoned" and should have only small fires built the first few times to avoid cracking. Stoves without an ash pit should have two inches of sand insulating the bottom of the firebox to prevent overheating and an eventual burnout.

As the fire calms and it is time to refuel, the draft controls should be opened for a couple minutes for the stove pipe and flue to heat up.

"This will increase the draft and should prevent smoke from coming out into the room when the stove door is opened," said Scott Frazier, associate professor in Oklahoma State University's Department of Biosystems and Agricultural Engineering.

Wood should then be added and the draft left open until the new wood catches fire. The new wood will require readjustment of the controls to the desired setting. Once the desired setting is reached, we cannot let our guard down, said Frazier.

"One of the most common causes of wood stove-caused home fires is leaving the fire unattended," Frazier said. "Whenever someone must leave the house while a fire is burning, take the necessary precautions to prevent the possibility of an uncontrolled fire."

Frazier said the worst danger in leaving a stove burning is the fire could burn out of control and overheat the stove, or a spark will escape through a draft inlet. Opening the stove pipe damper and closing the air inlet dampers can avoid both of these scenarios.

Older stoves which are not airtight are much more difficult to control as they have their own hidden air intakes. The best thing to do is to make sure the fire has died down before leaving the house.

"Allowing a large fire to burn unattended in such a stove is dangerous," Frazier said.

Any combustible material should be at least three feet clear of the stove.

"It's easy to overlook such things as clothes drying, kindling, newspaper, carpets or logs left to dry under the firebox," Frazier said. "All of these things can catch fire from

intense heat radiation."

Upon returning to the house, the dampers should be opened and the fire stoked. The fire should burn briskly for a while to get it hot and burn off some of the creosote. Creosote is a tar that forms on the inside surfaces of the stove and chimney. This unwanted product comes from smoke and water and mainly occurs when using green wood or fires that are not hot enough (below 250F).

Creosote is very flammable and if ignited could cause a damaging chimney fire. Chimney fires are sometimes hard to detect but may make a loud, continuous "whoshing" sound. If a chimney fire is detected - shut off all air supply to the fire (glass doors, vents, etc.), and safely extinguish the main stove fire. A fire extinguisher should be located near the stove within easy reach.

Only multipurpose dry chemical extinguishers should be used, as a pressurized water extinguisher could result in severe stove damage or even an explosion. As always, if things are getting out of control - call the fire department.

To avoid creosote buildup, the best method is to keep the fire burning with dry, well-season wood, which will keep flue temperatures above 250 degrees. However, this preventative measure may be uncomfortably warm for some people as it produces a continuous amount of heat.

"Another alternative to help reduce creosote buildup is to deliberately have a hot fire for 15 to 30 minutes each day," said Frazier. "This will tend to burn off creosote in small amounts to reduce buildup problems."

No matter the method chosen to reduce buildup, inspection of all stove pipes and flues should happen regularly, especially during the first wood burning season. A simple method of checking stove pipes is to tap on the pipe with a metal object. The sound will change from a "ping" to a dull "thud" as creosote builds up on the inside of the pipe.

A flashlight can be lowered down a chimney flue to see any buildup. Frazier said 110-volt electric bulbs should not be used for this unless the bulb is protected in a wire cage. Mirrors also can be used, in some cases, to look up the chimney from inside the house.

"Ideally, the chimney and stove pipe should be inspected once a month during heating season," Frazier said. "If the inspection indicates significant creosote buildup, then the chimney should be cleaned."

While ash buildup is typically not a major problem, a stove that is functioning under normal heat output under round-the-clock operation will need to have the ashes removed once

every week to 10 days.

When removing ashes, keep in mind that they may still be hot and should not be shoveled into a paper bag, cardboard box, plastic container or any other combustible material.

"There are many cases of home fires which have started when hot embers in disposed ashes ignited the combustible container in which they were placed," said Frazier. "Always remove and store ashes in a noncombustible container, which is stored on a noncombustible floor or on the ground, well away from combustible materials, until final disposal. Also, be careful about dumping the ashes from these containers as field fires have been started from ashes that were several days old."

Everyone is encouraged to use the disposed ash as a fertilizer as it is very beneficial. Simple maintenance and proper usage of a wood burning stove will result in a warm and cozy winter, without the hundreds of dollars lost on gas and propane.

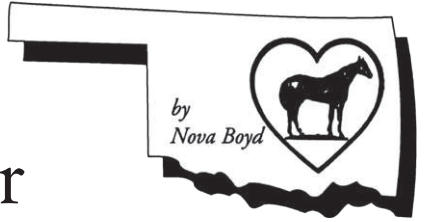

Safe online shopping over the holidays

There are lots of advantages to shopping online. Following a few important precautions will help make shopping as hassle free as possible.

One of the easiest ways consumers can protect themselves online is to use their common sense and trust their instincts, said Cindy Clampet, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension resource management specialist.

"If a deal or special doesn't make sense or seems too good to be true, move on," Clampet said.

Before making an online

transaction, consumers should verify the physical address and phone number to ensure the seller is legitimate.

Consumers also should know exactly what they are buying and how much it costs.

"Definitely do some comparison shopping, and don't forget to factor shipping charges into the cost," Clampet said. "Read product descriptions closely, too, including any fine print. Words such as 'refurbished,' 'vintage' or 'closeout,' may mean the product is in less-than-top condition."

Review terms of purchase, including delivery dates, and refund and privacy policies.

Specifically, the privacy policy should explain what personal information the company is collecting and what will be done with that information. If the policy is unavailable, unclear or difficult to find, consider taking business elsewhere.

Using a credit card for online purchases ensures the transac-

tions are covered under the Fair Credit Billing Act, allowing consumers to dispute charges and withhold payment until the creditor investigates. Many credit cards also offer protection if the item is damaged.

Generally, a consumer's liability for fraudulent charges on a credit card is \$50.

Consumers should keep records of transactions, including the product description and price, the online receipt and any other correspondence.

"Monitor your credit card statement to make sure there are no mistakes and all the charges listed are ones you made," Clampet said.

If there is a dispute, initially try to resolve them directly with the seller. If that is not successful, potential shopping fraud can be reported to the Federal Trade Commission (www.ftc.gov) or the state Attorney General (www.naag.org).

told the council that Chilvers was agreeable to relocating the lights to the new ball park adjacent to Purcell Municipal Airport.

Lucas Reed, PBSA spokesman, said the association has raised \$20,000 for lighting and the lights from McCurdy Park would illuminate two fields at the ballpark.

City workers will handle the removal and reinstallation of the lights.

The council was introduced to the city's new parks and recreation director, Cody Penner.

Penner appeared before the council to discuss whether they wanted to name a council member to be an ex-officio member of the city's parks and recreation board.

The council took no action on the offer, opting instead for different members to sit in on the board's meetings from time to time.

The council also took no action on transferring ownership of the old hospital building on West Washington Street.

City manager Dale Bunn said the city has hired someone to appraise the property now occupied by the McClain County Historical Society Museum and Delta Community Services.

The county has offered a land swap for the property. However, the appraiser has been unable to locate the land the county wants to trade.

"It appears it is part of the

(PBSA) ball park," Bunn said.

In addition, the city still hasn't found suitable accommodations for the museum's and Delta's relocation.

Bunn said the museum wants between 2,400 and 2,700 square feet and Delta slightly less.

The council de-annexed property at 18934 Horse Ave., at the request of the owners, Dean and Cindy Peters.

The property was taken into the city limits years in the 1990s when it belonged to a former Purcell police chief. The city requires the police chief live inside the city limits.

In other business, the council:

- voted to cut insurance on the Multi-Purpose Building from more than \$2 million to \$1,030,225, dropping the annual premium from \$5,600 to \$2,800;
- approved budget amendments moving \$12,889.94 from city funds revenue to drug fund miscellaneous expenses;
- approved a budget amendment increasing grant monies received by \$2,500 for emergency management;
- learned Bunn has signed a contract with Kimley-Horn to evaluate the city's closed swimming pool;
- accepted the 2015-16 financial statement audit report from Bob Dillon and Associates;
- reappointed Charlie Sherman to the Library Advisory Board and appointed Katie Blue to fill an open seat on the board with both terms ending Dec. 31, 2019; and
- approved an amended power sales contract between the city and the Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority.

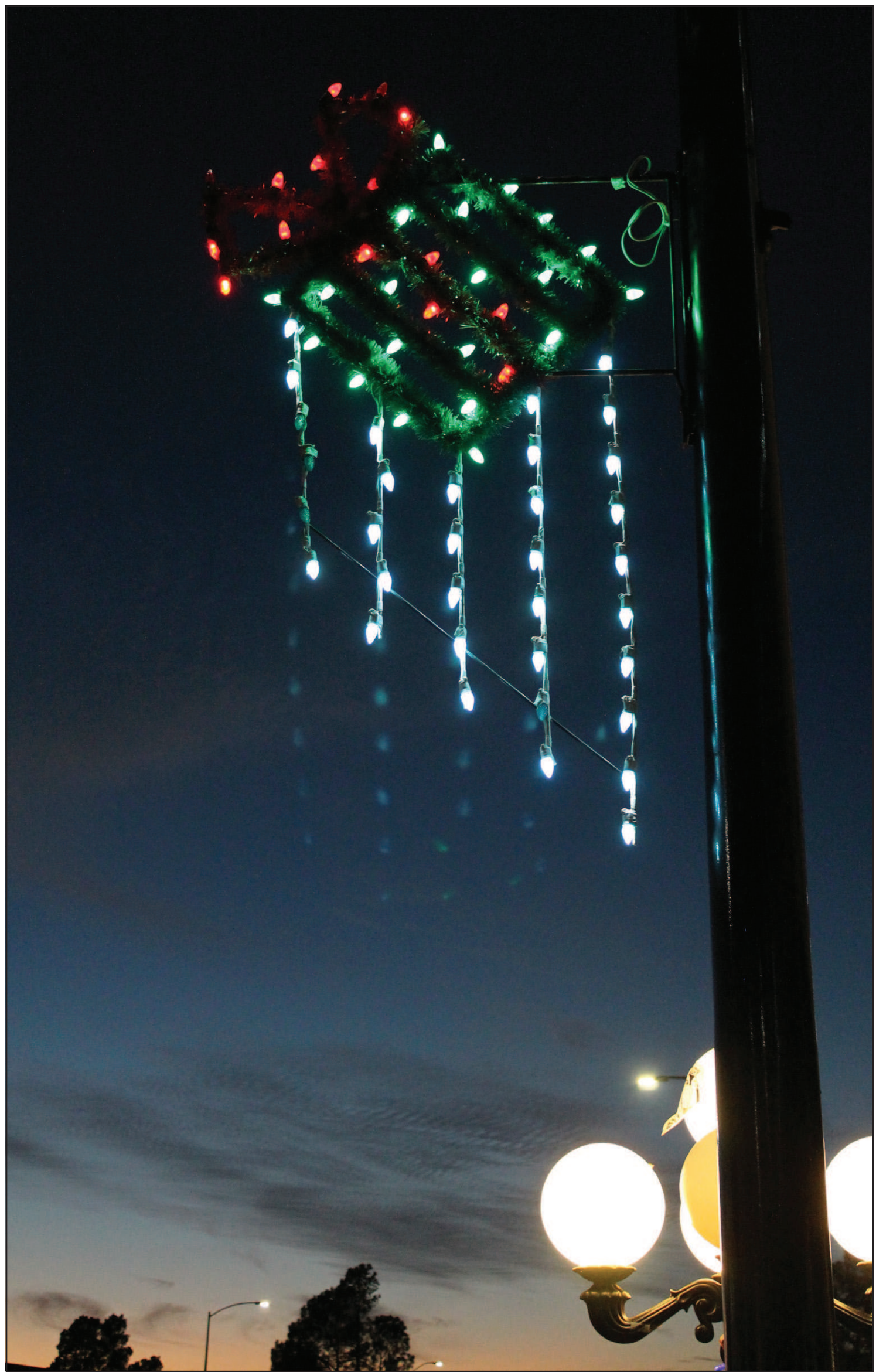

"At one point we gave up 14 points in a span of four minutes then held them to four points the rest of the way."

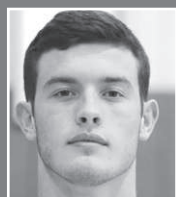
"We just couldn't get our offense going," Sikes said.

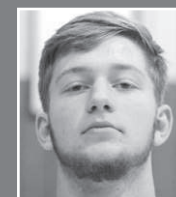

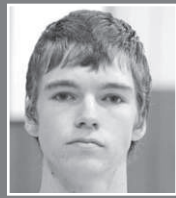

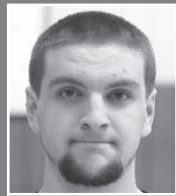

That's when Graham challenged her squad to take control of the game and they responded with 18 third quarter points while limiting Lexington to eight.

"We didn't necessarily start off slow," Graham said. "We just gave up too many easy baskets and second chance baskets in the beginning."

The Dragons had to grind down the stretch in the home opener with Tecumseh before pulling out a 39-32 victory, with a stifling defense and just enough offense.

"I think that we started off slow due to our nerves being a little high," Graham said. "It was the pure excitement of the first home game and having new kids in the mix."

Jaden Webb came off the bench in the Tecumseh contest, due to a pre-season injury, but responded with 16 points.

"She did a great job of leading off the bench," Graham said of her senior leader. "She hit some huge shots and gave us a spark."

The key to the Tecumseh victory, according to the coach, was the Dragons' performance at the charity stripe.

"We hit 18 of 24 free throws," she said. "If we don't make our free throws we don't win that game."

Purcell missed six free throws against Lexington, something that didn't please the head coach.

"We practice those in practice every day," she said. "We've got to do a better job at the line."

Graham also mentioned the play of freshman Chelsea Spain.

"She's doing a good job. She knows her role and that is to play defense. Anything we get after that is extra," the coach said.

Spain is averaging three points, three steals and one charge per game so far this season.

"We're doing a good job of being aggressive on offense and getting to the line. We've just got to make those free throws."

Coach Nick Beene's Dragons have hung their hats on defense in the first two games holding Tecumseh to two single digit quarters and shutting Lexington out in the second quarter of that victory, limiting the Bulldogs to nine first half points.

Austin Nation's 17 points led all scorers in the 51-32 victory over Tecumseh while fellow senior Riley Hamilton was in double figures with 11.

Hamilton knocked down a trio of treys in both games and led all scorers in the 65-38 victory over Lexington with 22 points. He was red hot in the first half when he canned 16 of the 22.

Nation and Kieran Embree both finished in double figures

against Lexington, singeing the nylons for a dozen points each.

"The three guys that stood out in the Lexington game that had really good performances were Riley Hamilton, Kieran Embree and Jackson Milner," Beene said.

"Riley led the way offensively in the first half and we held Lexington to nine points in the first half so once again I thought we played solid defense.

"We finally had a good offensive quarter in the third," when his Dragons went off for 22 points.

"Kieran set the tone with his point guard play in the third quarter. He ended up with 12 points but more importantly he had a really good game passing and distributing the ball around."

Beene said Embree's assist to Hamilton was one of the best high school passes he's seen in quite some time.

"He jumped up and threw the ball across the court," Beene said. "It was just a beautiful pass."

Beene pointed out the top-shelf defense his club played against Tecumseh in the season opener.

"Riley Hamilton and Jarrett Sweeney played really well defensively against their best offensive threats. Between those two I feel we can lock down most people's guards," Beene said.

In the preseason scrimmages the Dragons had focused primarily on man-to-man offenses and defenses.

But just three possessions into the Tecumseh game the Savages switched to a zone defense and stayed that way for most of the remainder of the game.

"Even though we are a team loaded with shooters they were able to take us out of our rhythm by going zone," Beene said.

Another hitch in the Dragons' git-a-long was Riley getting into foul trouble.

"That also threw us off offensively," the coach admitted.

"Austin Nation, who led us with 17 points, didn't necessarily have his best shooting night but no one else did either," Beene said. "But he made some timely baskets.

"After watching the film I felt that we played very well defensively. In fact, it was our best defensive game overall in two years. We needed it to overcome a poor offensive showing. We had to play well defensively to give ourselves a chance to win."

Purcell boys head coach Nick Beene will have a little bit more of a personal connection when the Dragons travel to Garden City, KS for a basketball festival this coming weekend.

"He's been my coaching hero and mentor," Beene confirmed.




















The Friday night foe for both the boys and girls will be Holcomb, KS, who is ranked No. 1 in 4A boys, Beene said.

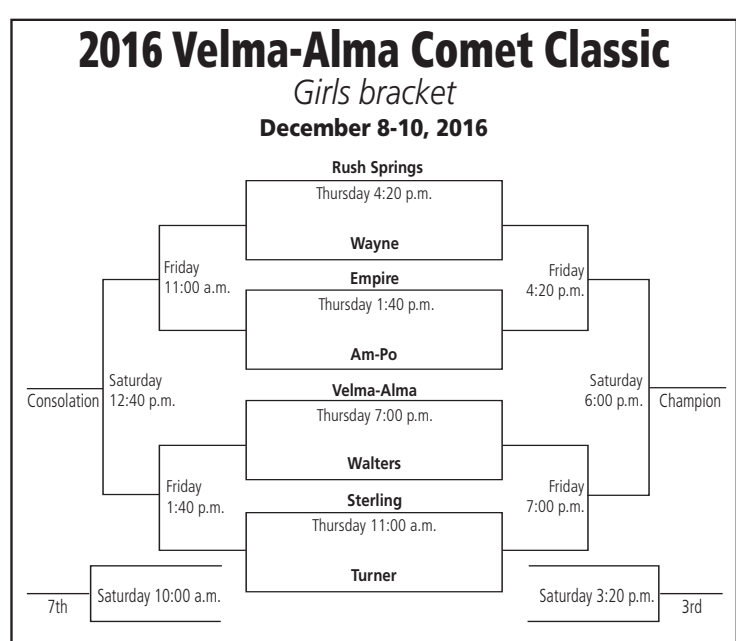
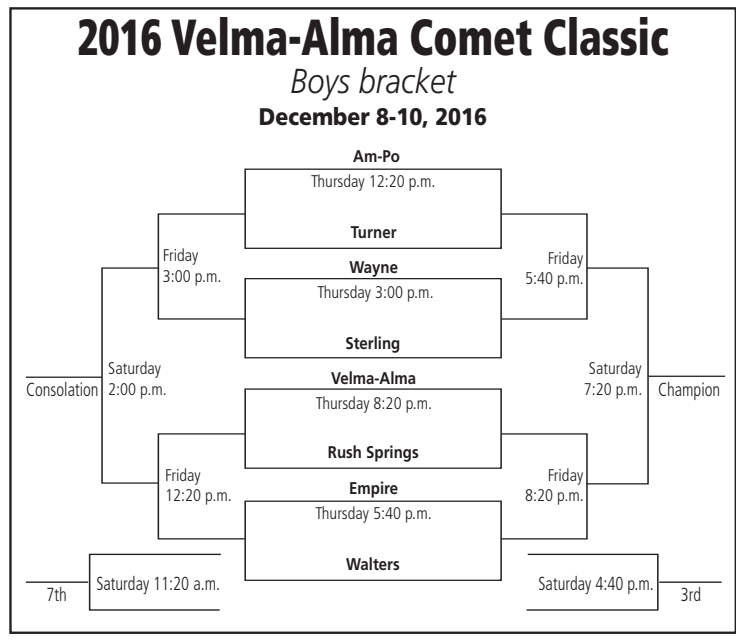

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Last Sunday our parish was introduced to four adults who desire full acceptance into the Catholic Church and have begun the process of RCIA. One person is unbaptized and the others are baptized either in the Catholic faith or another Christian faith. Their goal is to prepare themselves for receiving the final sacraments of initiation – Holy Communion and Confirmation—at the Easter Vigil next year.

In the years prior to Vatican Council II (1962-1965), an adult who wanted to become Catholic would meet privately with the priest for a few sessions. Or perhaps there would be a “convert class,” again taught by the parish priest. The Council revised the sacramental process to more closely match the practice of the early Church. The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is this process, and it has many beautiful elements.

The candidates (or catechumens, if unbaptized) are gradu-

ally introduced to members of the faith community in which they will practice. A series of “rites,” or public prayers, are celebrated which coincide with the liturgical flow of the Church year. The classes are taught by a team which now includes a deacon and several catechists. And the faith journey of the candidates is recognized as a process of awakenings, of deeper stirrings of the human heart.

This past Sunday we celebrated the first Rite, the Rite of Acceptance or Welcoming. As a parish, we can now begin to pray for these candidates whom we have welcomed, who desire to enter our Church. And by doing so, we are convicted ourselves to receive the sign of the Cross – on our ears that we may be open to hear the Word of God, on our lips that we may praise Him with our words and voice, on our shoulders that we may bear the gentle yoke of Christ, and on our hands that Christ may be seen in the work

that we do. The faith journey of these candidates is our faith journey, too.

On Thursday, December 8, we will celebrate the Feast of the Immaculate Conception with a bilingual Mass at 7 p.m.

On Monday, December 12, our Hispanic members will celebrate the Feast of the Virgin of Guadalupe which recounts the appearance and miracles of Our Lady as she appeared to Juan Diego in the year 1531 on the hill of Tepeyac in Mexico. These series of blessed encounters resulted in the conversion of millions of native Mexican peoples to the Catholic faith. The Mass includes much music and dancing. All are welcome to participate!

Very good morning, Oklahoma friends! Thanks for joining us again for our weekly “front porch” visit.

A long time ago my older brother Wayne told me something that has stuck with me through the years. He said that sometimes we are so concerned with giving our children the things our parents weren’t able to give us that we fail to give them the things our parents did give us!

I’ve thought about that a great deal, especially in this era of change. The Holy Spirit provides that lesson for us in the scriptures beautifully by recording a simple but powerful fact in the life of Isaac: Isaac – who was abundantly inheriting the blessings of the Lord (Genesis 26:3, 12-13) – went back to the valley of Gerar where Abraham had long dwelt, and he re-dug the wells his father had dug. The Philistines had come through and sealed them up, but Isaac wasn’t going to have that.

Not only that: He called

“their names after the names by which his father had called them” (v. 18).

That story reminds me of my brother’s comment. Think back to some of those old values that our parents and grandparents taught us that we’ve let slip a little. We may have thought they were out of style and “behind times” and “old fogey” then, but now we can see their wisdom. Re-dig some of those wells. Name them as our forefathers named them, and teach them to your children and grandchildren.

There are so many of these lessons that I remember, but here are some that stick in my mind the most. They are important not only because I learned them from my parents and grandparents but because they are founded soundly in the scriptures. Please make sure that is the case, because sometimes our parents can be misled, too.

Those who raised me taught me the importance of Truth. Often today we fail to “find truth

and put our foot on it!” That’s how Grandma always put it when she described Preacher Miller’s and her discovery of Truth. The Apostle Paul warned the young preacher that the time would come when men would not accept “sound doctrine” but would “turn their ears away from the truth and be turned unto fables” (2 Timothy 4:3-4) – that is, they’ll turn to the things that make them feel good and seem to be right yet aren’t established in the scriptures. Let’s re-dig this well of searching and following after truth.

I also learned the importance of worship. Every worship service was special in those growing up years. It was a solemn time to serve God. If I played in services, then Mama would give me a good pinch. (It made me want to holler out, but I knew better.) You didn’t even think about missing the assemblies, whether on Lord’s Day or on Wednesday night or

is required before anyone is permitted to volunteer. If you are interested in helping us, please stop in any Tuesday or Thursday morning.

Last week more than 215 men and women were assisted. Eight veterans received a rating of 100 percent.

We recently sent out our annual newsletter. If you would like to get a copy, please contact us at dalekgrahamveteranscorner@gmail.com. Each year we try to update on changes the VA has made. I also encourage veterans have their service-connected disability re-evaluated. Many times, a disability will become more severe with age. Another disability that is a problem for many veterans is TBI (Traumatic Brain Injury). TBI symptoms include headaches and memory loss.

Many organizations will tell the veteran to file for service connection of a condition without using the VA Disability Benefits Questionnaires. Claims filed this way may be approved or denied by VA. I do not encourage anyone to file a VA claim without first obtaining a written diagnosis or using the appropriate VA DBQ form filled out by their medical provider.

The VA has a DBQ form for all disabilities. When the VA introduced these forms several years ago, the plans were to use them to rate some veteran's disabilities without sending veterans to VA providers for an evaluation.

When a veteran or surviving spouse visits us, I want their applications for benefits to be approved. Our system has been proven to work.

Another part of that story is our excellent VA Regional Office in Muskogee.

Our ladies processed 24 last Tuesday and Thursday. More veterans and surviving spouses are applying for nursing home benefits and the VA Aid and Attendance benefit. For those of you who need this type of help, please visit with Shirley at (405) 361-9322 or one of our other ladies at the church.

I appreciate everyone for the donations that have enabled this organization to have assisted over 10,000 veterans and their families in 2016. Without your help, this would not have been possible. As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, your donations are tax deductible. As tax time draws near people who would like to reduce their tax liability might consider donating their extra running car or truck to us. We will give that vehicle to a needy veteran or spouse.

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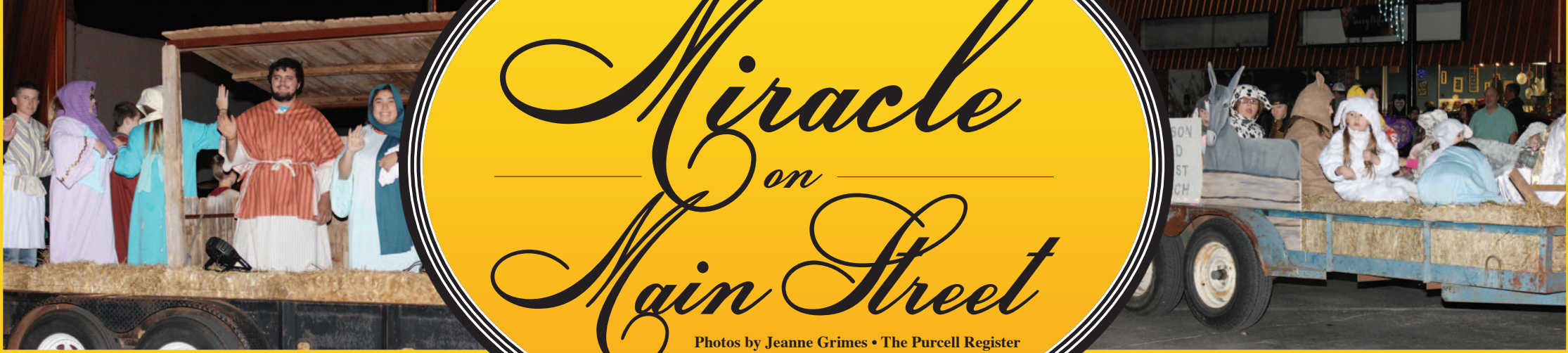
