

On their first day of law school at the University of Oklahoma, Zack Simmons and Matt Swain met.

They became friends and after graduation in 2009 Swain opened a criminal law office in Norman while Simmons became an assistant district attorney for Cleveland County.

Over the years they were sometimes adversaries, but always friends.

"I worked alongside him for the past eight years," Simmons said. "He is a person who is honest. He is a hard worker, someone I respect. Someone who knows how to practice law the right way.





## The romance of flowers


The romance of flowers comes down through the centuries in poetry, song, legend and art.

Questions on a recent Greater

Oklahoma City Chamber survey suggest topics that are on businesspeople's minds. There are plenty of questions about whether the chamber is effectively representing members, of course, but the important ones for legislators to consider are directly tied to the chamber's lobbying efforts. The survey asked members of the business community to rate the importance of things such as business growth incentives and funding for entrepreneurship organizations such as the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology and Innovation to Enterprise, better known as i2E.

It also asked about the importance of increasing teacher pay and of retaining the state's college graduates and getting

early childhood education and the need for pre-K and kindergarten programs.

If it's not clear to our legislators yet, here's what can safely be read into those questions: The chamber of commerce is confident that its members feel strongly about the importance of education, that a well-educated Oklahoma means a prosperous Oklahoma. It also suggests that the business community values incentives for innovation and entrepreneurship, which are just the things in which those welleducated Oklahomans are likely But the survey also asks a

very pointed question about bills that are nothing more than philosophical statements and it gives chamber members an opportunity to voice their frustra-

It asked about the importance of bullet point for the author's next campaign brochure.

An early example is Sen. Nathan Dahm's hat trick of gun bills, the most ludicrous of which attempts to trump federal law. That's nothing but a waste of time and money and in the unlikely event the bill becomes law, it will waste more time and money until the Supreme Court eventually points out its lack of constitutional merit. Such nonsense bills not only fritter away legislative resources, they project to the rest of the country an image of backwater regressive thinking that deters serious business leaders from considering a stake in Oklahoma.

## Oklahoma receives REAL ID extension through June 2017

with legislative leaders today received an extension through June 6, 2017, to meet the requirements in the REAL ID Act. But the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) warned that failure for the state to act during the 2017 legislative session on legislation committing Oklahoma to all the REAL ID requirements could result in the denial of future extension

Without the extension, federal agencies later this month would have been prohibited from accepting Oklahoma driver's licenses and identification cards, meaning those without identification that complies with the REAL ID Act won't be able to enter a federal building, military base or courthouse. REAL ID enforcement for boarding commercial aircraft is scheduled to begin Jan. 22, 2018.

The letter states that "for the duration of this extension, federal agencies may accept Oklahoma-issued drivers' licenses and identification cards for official purposes in accordance with the phased enforcement schedule and existing agency policies."

"Although this is great news for Oklahomans, this is only a temporary fix," said Fallin.

Governor Mary Fallin along "While there will be no re- Security," Schulz said. "DHS strictions on individuals using announced that Oklahoma has Oklahoma licenses to fly or access federal buildings through June, legislation must be approved this session to make this permanent.

"I will continue to work with legislators, the state Department of Public Safety, Oklahoma's congressional delegation and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to ensure a permanent solution is passed into law before this extension expires in June."

Identical letters sent to Fallin and Senate President Pro Tempore Mike Schulz and House Speaker Charles McCall state that DHS "recognizes Oklahoma's efforts in enhancing the security of its driver's licenses and identification cards" and granted the extension "indicating the plans of your administration and state legislative leaders to move forward on a legislative solution and their expectation that a vote will occur in the 2017 legislative session.

This extension is intended to provide Oklahoma with the opportunity to take any necessary steps needed to meet all the requirements of the REALID Act and implementing regulation."

"I'm pleased Oklahoma has been granted an extension by recognized Oklahoma's sincere efforts to resolve issues in complying with the federal REALID law. This is an important issue for the thousands of Oklahomans whose livelihoods depend upon access to federal buildings and military installations, and it is an issue of convenience in regards to airline travel. There's still more work to do to solve this issue permanently, but addressing REAL ID compliance will remain a high priority when the Legislature convenes in a few weeks."

McCall said, "I am very pleased that the federal government is giving us additional time to develop a legislative solution to this issue. This extension will allow our citizens to continue to interact with our federal entities without interruption.

"House Republicans are committed to a solution that will bring Oklahoma into compliance with the Real ID Act while also protecting the privacy and liberty of our citizens," he said,.

Fallin, Schulz and McCall wrote a letter last month to DHS requesting the extension.

Congress passed the REAL ID Act in 2005 to make driver's licenses harder to forge. Oklahoma legislators in 2007 passed a bill forbidding the state from the Department of Homeland meeting provisions of the act.

The mayoral election seemed a million miles away on Friday night at the Spring County Fair. With "Silver Tongue" firmly entrenched in his role as leader of the Valley for two more years, it was as if the good folks breathed a collective sigh as they caravanned en masse to participate in the most anticipated county fair performance in memory.

I somehow managed to get up the nerve to invite Mary Ann Tinkersley to attend the show with me. I wasn't sure if she was as excited as I was about our first official date. We had been exercising sheep together for the better part of four months, and in my thinking it was just a matter of time before we became "official."

Although Springfield, the county seat, had a much larger population than our town, it seemed as if almost half the crowd was from the Valley. Perhaps the bigger city folks didn't understand the star power of Tangi Blevins.

Springfield radio stations had been playing Tangi's biggest hit, "Turn Your Radio On," several times each day during County Fair week. Even Raymond Cooper, firmly entrenched in the battle of his life, made it a habit to begin each day by playing the song as his station came on the air.

Husbands in their flannel shirts and boots, and wives in their finest jean skirts were dressed for a night on the town. It was probably the biggest date night in years for the folks of my hometown. Even my mom and dad got dressed up for the occasion.

Not everyone had a date. I noticed Juliet Stoughton walking through the fair gate alone as I stood in line to buy a funnel cake for Mary Ann. I figured she was meeting someone, or perhaps she needed a night on her own after the long campaign. Being new to the area, my guess was Ms. Stoughton probably didn't understand she was participating in one of the biggest nights in Valley history.

Like every bigtime concert, the warm-up act preceded the main event. Little Lori Tolliver wowed the crowd with her banjo playing and

pitch-perfect voice. When she belted out "Stand By Your Man," her 12-year-old voice filled the outdoor arena. Her triology of sentimental favorites, including "Roses for Mama," "10-4 Teddybear," and "Blind Man in the Bleachers," left barely a dry eye among the audience sitting in the folding metal stadium seats.

Being the true showperson she was, she lifted those same spirits with the finest banjo version of "The Devil Went Down to Georgia" heard to this day.

The audience was beside itself as Tangi Blevins and the Heavenly Hosts made their way to the stage. It was years before I realized the irony as she kicked off her performance with a song made famous by the father-daughter duo, The Kendalls:

Oh whoa, just a sin away, I can't wait another day, I think I'm giving in. Though I'd love to hold you tight, Oh whoa, be with you tonight, But that still won't make it right, 'Cause I belong to him."

"Heaven's just a sin away,

In true gospel fashion, the Heavenly Hosts, two 20-something backup singers in mid-length denim skirts with chevron patterns and yellow boots, pointed toward the heavens as they sang, "'cause I belong to Him."

Tangi knew how to put on a show, and there was no way she was going to sing her biggest hit until late in her performance, possibly as an Midway through the show, I felt Mary Ann

lay her head against my shoulder as Tangi sang the Dolly Parton classic, "I Will Always Love As I looked over toward Mary Ann, I saw

Juliet Stoughton from the corner of my eye. It looked like she might be crying. I suppose a love song, sang by a true artist like Tangi Blevins, can do that.

A moment later I looked back and she was gone. I figured she'd gone to the concession stand to get a funnel cake. It was several years before I realized how wrong I was.

## Chilling requirement for peaches

trees bloom early and others January/early February), but seem to bloom later in the normally cold temperatures spring?

has to do with the hours of chilling required by that particular variety to bloom.

hours below 45°F necessary to break bud dormancy.

Temperatures in the 40 to resulting in frost damage. 45°F range are most effective in satisfying the chilling requirement. Little chilling is accumulated below 30°F and temperatures above 60°F can at all. negate some of the accumulated chilling.

Dormancy in peaches has two separate stages: rest and quiescence. Rest is a time when the chilling requirement is being accumulated and the buds will not grow.

Quiescence is the period of dormancy that peaches enter once their chilling requirement has been met. During this stage, buds will break and grow when sufficient warm weather occurs that is favorable for growth.

Often, in Oklahoma, the quiescent phase of dormancy. chilling requirement may Ever wonder why some fruit be met in mid-winter (late will keep buds from swelling The answer, at least in part, until late February or March.

It is important that you pick a variety of peach that has the proper chilling hours for our Chilling requirement is a area. If you pick one with too term to express the number of few hours required your trees will be ready to bloom with the first warm winter spell, usually

In a lot of years, many cultivars will reach their chilling call at the Extension Office. Most peach cultivars grown requirements in February or

All that is needed then is a series of consecutively warm days and blooming will begin.

Hopefully, this doesn't happen and we switch back into a cold freezing period like last year.

In addition, since many of the trees did not set fruit last year they should be in good physical shape to handle a heavy crop load this year.

Once trees begin blooming, all we can do is hope for nonfreezing temperatures until the traditionally warm days of April arrive.

## Day camps to offer conservation and survival lessons to youth

To prepare the next generation to be good stewards of the land, the Chickasaw Nation will offer environmental education classes to all interested teens, ages 13-16, at no charge.

Yaakni'Appisachi'(Caretakers of the Land) day camps will be hosted 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and will be offered at Kullihoma, located 7 miles northeast of Ada on state Highway 1. Bus rides to and from the event will be offered at the Chickasaw Nation Housing Annex in Ada, 1629 N. Broadway.

Campers may choose one of several dates, including February 20, March 10, March 13-17, April 14, May 5 and 25.

Young explorers will take trips to local hiking trails and set up a camp where guides will teach wilderness survival skills and first aid, as well as how to reduce their environmental

knowledge along to students.

Hiking days will start with students receiving shirts and bags of supplies. The group will receive information on snakes and poisonous plants before leaving for Kullihoma.

Once there, they will hit the trail toward camp, making stops along the way for observations and scavenger hunts. At camp, the group will gather wood, build a fire, cook and eat lunch.

Environmental classes will begin after lunch. Lessons include knife safety, animal behavior, food plants and roots, knot tying, how to avoid getting lost, surviving if lost and building shelters. Games will be interwoven into the lessons.

from the Dominican Republic. only their own personal God. Whenever I travel, I remember that not everyone goes to church each week like us. Many people do not practice their religion, or any religion, like we do.

I was traveling with a group of students from the University of Oklahoma. But there was a second group of students there also. They were from a small college in the east. A few of these students said they do not believe in God at all. They do not believe that God is real. They believe that we create a God in our own image. We believe in this God because it is a God that is convenient and comfortable for us. It is a God in our own image and likeness.

But also in the Dominican Republic I lived in the home of a very nice older couple - Gabriel and his wife. They have a very strong Catholic faith. But they do not go to the church on Sunday or any day. They watch Televida each day, a Catholic television network and they pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. Gabriel holds up the crucifix each day and prays for the sins of the world.

But they do not go to church or practice with others in an organized religion. Why? Perhaps because they know people in the church who are sinners. They know people who are not perfect. So they do not go to church at all.

If someone does not practice faith within a religious com-

I (Fr. Jim) have just returned First, their God may become They may indeed create a God that has been formed in their own image. The second danger is that

their God is too small. They will not see how God is working in different ways in the lives of many other people. They will not see how God has revealed Himself, not only throughout the ages of the Scriptures, but also today in the lives of people who are both sinful and also holy.

Jesus began his public ministry by being baptized. Why did Jesus agree to be baptized? Why did Jesus, who had no sin, receive baptism from John, who was baptizing for the remission of sins? Jesus practiced his religion faithfully. He was a good Jew. Jesus was very careful to show us that religious practice is very important. All of his life he went to the Temple to pray. He observed the religious practices of his Jewish faith – such as Baptism, ritual cleansings, the Sabbath, prayers, and meditation on the Scripture.

To be part of a sinful congregation is a great act of humility. We are humble before the Lord, acknowledging that we, too, are sinners and that we want to be re-made into the image and likeness of God, not the other way around. Perhaps Jesus was beginning his ministry by modeling for us the virtue of

There are people who study munity, there are two dangers. the "stages of faith" that one

can attain. The highest stage is that of a universalizing, or communal, faith. Here someone begins to see life as a mystery and often returns to sacred stories and symbols but without being stuck in a theological box. This person will give her/ his life to the full in service of others without any worries or doubts. Very few people ever attain this stage.

Some examples that are always given are Jesus, Mohandas Gandhi, Mother Teresa, and Martin Luther King, Jr. Note that these individuals always remained part of a faith tradition, a congregation of saints and sinners.

St. Paul wrote a letter to the church in Corinth - a church that had many sinners. He reminded the church that they are "called to be holy, with all those everywhere who call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ - their Lord and ours." (1 Cor. 1:1-3)



Please join me in expressing our appreciation to Louie and Clayton who spent 57 hours last week transporting 18 folks 900 miles and for going the extra mile to ensure veterans like the one I told you about are safe, fed and warm.

Many veterans are living on the edge of society that most of us know nothing about. These men and women grew up as the child next door to someone with not a care in the world until something occurred while they were in the military. Some of them may be suffering from PTSD from an event or traumatic experience that happened to them while in the military. Others may have started using alcohol or drugs to cope with their mental health issues such as loneliness or depression.

Last week we received a thank you letter from the daughter of a World War II veteran at the age of 92. His daughter told us her father was recently approved for VA benefits after all the years he had been denied service connection for a disability that occurred during his military service. She said we were the only people who had ever helped him in his entire life.

Over the years, many people have asked why we spend so much time and money supporting veterans and their families. As a Vietnam veteran who served in the Marines, I'm fully aware of the needs that many of our brothers and sisters have after discharge from military service. All of us who volunteer our time and money know that if we do not help each other, no one is going to. I have had veterans and their families who told me that they could not believe what was happening every Tuesday and Thursday morning.

Last week more than 200 veterans and surviving spouses who visited us for assistance with their VA claims and questions. Of that number, there were 17 surviving spouses assisted with their claims for DIC, Pension or Aid, and Attendance. For those of you who have questions about possible surviving spouse benefits, please stop by or call Shirley at (405) 361-9322.

While we are writing about surviving spouse benefits, did you know that if the veteran's service-connected disability or one that is presumptive to death certificate, you may be eligible for VA benefits? My suggestion for all surviving spouses of veterans is to visit with one of our specialists for information that may help them to receive VA benefits. Another bit of information that may help some surviving spouses is that a death certificate may be amended to reflect diseases or disabilities that contributed to the veteran's death.

As an Accredited VA Claims Agent, I receive all VA rating decisions and other correspondence on each of the veterans or spouses who are represented by us. This enables me to review each decision that VA makes and to send a letter to the veteran or spouse detailing what needs to be done next.

Last week I received the following decisions on the veterans and spouses who I represent. Nine veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. Those veterans will receive a combined annual income of \$30,190.80 per year. We had 27 of \$287,797.27 per year. Two of our surviving spouses were approved for benefits, and their annual income will be


