Search warrant puts spotlight on chief, suspended officer

The strange saga of the McClain County Sheriff's Department serving a search warrant on the Purcell Police Department began June 30 when a police officer allegedly violated a protective order obtained by his estranged wife

a week earlier. Richard Kyle Glasgow, 37, has been on paid suspension from the department since March 27 when he was charged in McClain County District Court with reckless conduct

Electrifying!

Rates and customer fees vary across area

It isn't immediately clear why the City of Purcell should penalize residents for cutting back electricity consumption.

Yet it appears the city is seriously considering a rate change to counter what some say will be a revenue loss if many residents opt for an alter-

native source like solar to power their homes and businesses.

The Purcell City Council and Public Works Authority is considering five options to recoup that lost revenue.

The options were offered last week by the Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority, which furnishes electricity for

the city-owned utility.

Presently residential consumers pay a \$5.70 monthly customer charge and their metered use at a rate of 11.61 cents per kilowatt hour.

An average residential use of 941 kWh results in a bill for \$114.90.

The State of Oklahoma's disdain for common education might lead a reasonable person to think public school superintendent is one of the worst jobs a person could have.

Not Jason Midkiff. You see, it all depends on what yardstick you use to measure the merits of the job.

"I've been a superintendent five years and every year finances are worse than the one before," said Jason, who just concluded his first year at the helm of Purcell Public Schools.

That said, Jason's love of children is genuine, as is his "passion to make a difference in people's lives."

That is what tips the scales. In spades.

Jason was born in Alva and the family moved several times while he was growing up.

His father ran retail clothing stores in Oklahoma and Kansas for C.R. Anthony's.

Jason graduated from Mardill High School in 1993 and went into college not quite knowing what he wanted from life.

"I spent three years trying to figure out what I could make money at," he said.

Well, education has never been a huge money maker career in Oklahoma - even in the heyday years immediately after House Bill 1017 became law.

But it seems that is where Jason, breaking from family tradition (his sister also worked in retail clothing), was headed.

"I crammed four years of college into six," he continued, graduating with a bachelor's degree in education from Southeastern Oklahoma State University

Power restored to Lexington

Backup from OG&E substation in south Purcell

Electric power was restored to about 2,000 OG&E customers in Lexington by 11 p.m. Sunday.

That's the word from Lexington City Manger Chris Coker, who said the power went off about 6 p.m. due to 70 m.p.h. winds that knocked down 14 electric poles east of the Lexington Assessment and Reception Center (LARC) in what could have been a down burst.

"We have a backup feed that comes out of Walnut Creek from the old OG&E substation on the south side of Purcell," Coker explained. "So we switched to that."

Coker said he has been told state Highway 39 east of the prison was to remain closed through Wednesday afternoon as OG&E crews work to restore the regular utility service from the knocked down poles.

4th victim dies from injuries

OHP: "Investigation may take awhile"

The deadly accident that occurred Monday, July 17, at mile marker 91 has claimed a fourth life.

Officials at Children's Hospital in Oklahoma City have confirmed that 13-year-old Lizzie Edwards expired Wednesday from injuries she sustained in the accident.

She had reportedly been removed from life-support earlier last week due to lack of brain

activity.

That brings the total to four persons killed when the 2014 GMC Yukon slammed into the back of a 18-wheel tractor trailer in the northbound lanes of Interstate 35 July 17.

Also killed in the accident were the driver Erin Van Horn, 40, of Jenks, her son Zach, 10 and Becks Kitterman, 12, all of Jenks.

Two other 13-year-old

unidentified females remain in critical condition at Children's in Oklahoma City. A seven-year-old female was treated and released from Purcell Municipal Hospital.

The last report on the two 13-year-old girls at Children's Hospital was that they remain in ICU.

OHP Trooper Kyle Rosine investigated an injury accident on Ladd Road west of Interstate 35 in Goldsby.

Rosine said a 1994 Chevro-

let pickup driven by Knowell Gilbert, 37, of Lawton struck a pedestrian Zachary Wood, 22, of Norman.

Both men were transported

to area hospitals. Gilbert was taken to Norman Regional with a head injury. He was listed in fair condition, according to the trooper.

Wood was transported to OU Medical Center with head and hip injuries. He too was listed in fair condition.

Rosine said the pickup turned northbound on the interstate in the southbound ramp. The trooper said after about 3/4 of the way on the ramp, the pickup departed the road to the right. Then the pickup was driven westbound through the grass, crossing back over the Interstate southbound on ramp, through a fence and a gate before striking the pedestrian.

Rosine said the vehicle continued to drive over Ladd Road coming to rest in a ditch.

The trooper said the driver's ability control the vehicle was impaired.

Energy saving reward

Purcell Schools earn OMPA rebate

The City of Purcell and its power supplier, the Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority, presented a rebate check Tuesday to Purcell Public Schools for the district's energy efficiency improvements.

The check was for \$25,537. Superintendent Jason Midkiff said after the award that the district's recent conversion to LED lighting is resulting in between \$4,500 and \$5,000 per month in savings.

The new lighting is in all buildings and all outside lighting with the exception of the large lights at the football field. "Hopefully, we can eventually do those," Midkiff added.

The rebate is part of the Demand and Energy Efficiency Program (DEEP) administered by OMPA.

DEEP assists OMPA's 42 members with their qualified customers to reduce electricity

energy demand and costs.

The program provides rebates to commercial and industrial customers that implement retrofits that reduce their demand at peak times.

In addition to changing out lighting, qualifying projects include HVAC, refrigeration, commercial food service equipment, pumps and motors.

These improvements help OMPA delay the time it needs to add expensive generation capacity.

In 2016, OMPA awarded 69 DEEP rebates totaling \$164,640. The estimated reduction in energy demand was 1,056 kilowatts.

The program recently passed a threshold with more than \$1 million handed out over 7-plus years.

The reduction of peak demand since DEEP's inception is 7,040 kilowatts.

The rebate comes at a crucial time in funding for schools in Oklahoma.

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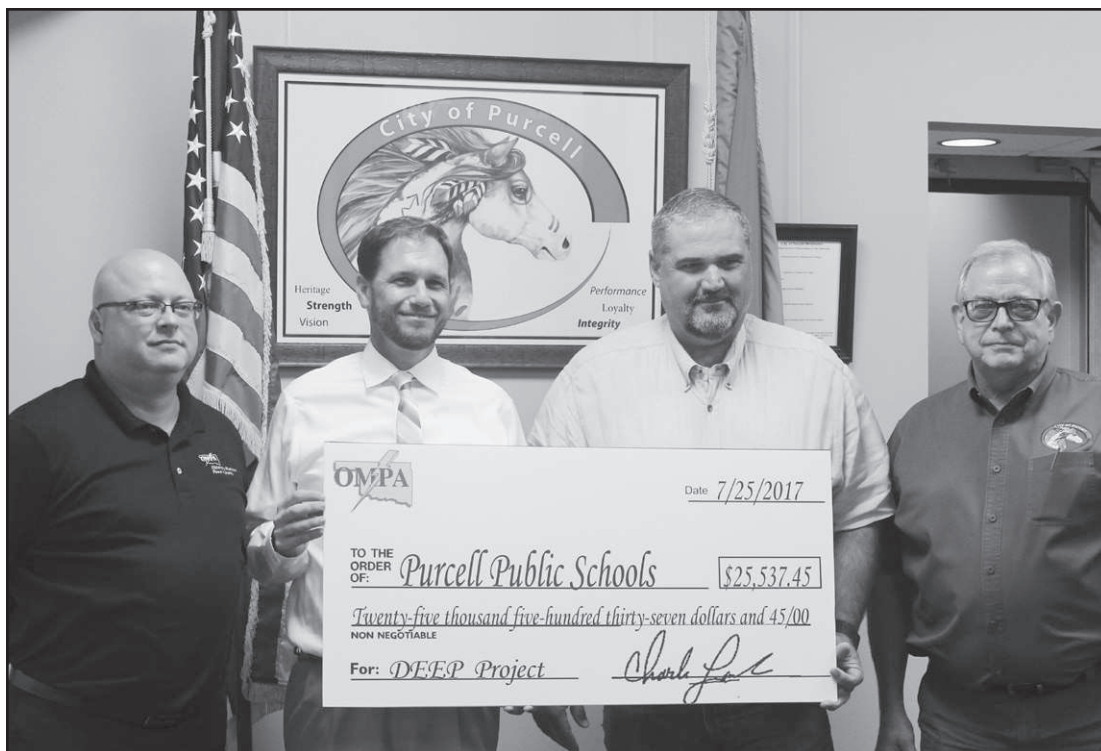

Funding the values we prioritize

This past week, as the House Appropriations Committee considered all 12 bills to fund the government, one of the more significant funding measures was passed.

The Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies (LHHS) Appropriations Subcommittee is responsible for funding some of our government's most vital agencies that reflect the things we place value on as a society — our health, our jobs and our education.

For the past three years, I have served as the Chairman of this subcommittee, and I have seen how the agencies within this bill's jurisdiction impact almost every aspect of our lives. From cancer research to early childhood education programs, this bill plays a large role in improving Americans' lives of all ages.

For decades, our government has relied on the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) to be the helm of medical research and biodefense. The important work that takes place in those facilities is essential to our national security and public health.

This year, the NIH received a total of \$35.2 billion, a \$1.1 billion increase from last year, an increase for the third consecu-

tive year. These funds will be allocated among Alzheimer's disease research, the Cancer Moonshot program for cancer prevention and cure research, medical drug innovation, mental health and substance abuse programs and numerous disease initiatives.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) also received \$7 billion this year. One of the most critical elements of the CDC is its biodefense resources.

This year, the CDC's Public Health Preparedness and Response programs will continue with an increase of \$45 million — a total of \$1.45 billion.

Our public health is fundamentally part of our national security. Just as our military gears up on military defense machinery and equipment, the CDC serves as a biological shield for some of the world's most deadly diseases.

Providing strong, quality education for students across the country has always remained a fundamental priority in the creation of every LHHS bill. I've met with countless groups and individuals who have expressed their gratitude to college preparedness programs like TRIO and GEAR UP.

TRIO received a total of \$1.01 billion combined and will be integral in helping thousands of first-generation college students prepare for higher education. GEAR UP

funding was also totaled by \$350 million.

The Department of Education continues to be a leader for Special Education resources as well. This year, IDEA Special Education funding received an incredible increase of \$200 million, for a total of \$12.2 billion.

For the younger students, under the Administration for Children and Families, the early childhood program Head Start received \$9.3 billion. All of these funding measures add up to create a quality education system for students, who are the future of our nation.

In other areas of funding, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting continues to be supported in advance for three years at \$445 million, and the National Labor Relations Board will receive \$249 million.

In addition, there is a provision included to prohibit the implementation of the "joint-employer" rule at the National Labor Relations Board.

Overall, this bill eliminates wasteful programs and invests in the ones that are successfully providing for our health, education and job security.

The American taxpayer deserves to know that their hard earned money is spent well. The funding laid out in this bill demonstrates good, solid funding measures that create a secure future for our nation.

Hey TSET, can you spare a dime?

Several weeks ago, the Oklahoma Turnpike Authority came to the rescue of the Oklahoma Highway Patrol.

OTA ponied up \$5 million so the OHP could run its academy to train new troopers. The move was hailed as a great thing. OHP had no money to train needed troopers. OTA had an extra \$5 million so there you go.

Problem solved. If the OTA can help the OHP, could the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust do the same and help out the Department of Human Services?

TSET leaders are you listening? Your mission is to improve the health of Oklahomans, right? Well, after DHS

cut some programs, like food for rural folks, how about stepping up to the plate and helping to fill it?

TSET originally focused on getting people to quit using tobacco, but the mission seems to have expanded into fighting obesity and apparently even mental health areas, according to Canadian County Health Department Director Jay Smith. No doubt, many of us could shed a few pounds and Oklahoma has a long and sad history of underfunding mental health issues. But hopefully TSET isn't striking out on its own in an effort to address mental health and expanding waistlines. The last thing Oklahoma needs is more duplication of programs

like these. We already have agencies working on things like this.

Some state lawmakers got crossways with one another after DHS Director Ed Lake said the agency was making cuts to some programs, efforts that mostly helped the poor. Some lawmakers, like Rep. Mike Sanders of Kingfisher, took issue with the cuts, saying the agency had gotten an increase in state funding. He said the DHS cuts only served to make the Legislature look bad.

Other lawmakers, such as Rep. Leslie Osborn, Mustang, came to the defense of DHS,

In response

Dear Editor,

As some readers may remember I have offered three times via letters in **The Purcell Register** to meet publicly with our state senator and representatives to discuss and debate the results of the 2017 legislative session.

I obviously think the four month confab this year in OKC produced little of value but based on their colorful campaign pieces now flooding my mail box they believe just the opposite.

Although I remain disappointed that neither Senator Paul Scott nor Representatives Tim Downing and Bobby Cleveland responded in any way to my proposals, I was encouraged to see that local Purcell resident Cathy Foshee weighed in on the subject via her letter last week titled "Just Wondering."

However Cathy was a bit off base with some of her comments so I want to take this opportunity to bring clarity to the important issues she raised. My responses follow.

1. Cathy wonders what the real purpose is for my invitations to lawmakers to debate. The answer is simple. I want to hear directly from these three very well paid lawmakers why our state lags the nation in almost all categories most folks believe are important - education, health care, public safety and infrastructure...to mention just a few.

2. Cathy assures me that our legislators have had open meetings so citizens could inquire as to their performances and priorities this past session. Really? When? Where? Who was invited? What was discussed? I do know they meet regularly with campaign donors but how about us commoners?

3. Cathy is exactly right that I represented this area in the legislature for a long time and we faced many of the same problems. The difference is we worked to fix the difficulties rather than make them worse. Example: From 1990 until 2006 I served in the state senate and during that time there were eight, repeat eight, distinct and significant pay raises for our classroom teachers. I authored several of them. By comparison there has not been a single pay hike for educators in the last eight years.

4. Cathy rightfully laments the terrible condition of our roads yet criticized me for improving them while I was in office. As Chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee I met regu-

Rate checking the rate check

Dear Editor,

In the July 20, 2017 issue of **The Purcell Register** you ran a story of the Purcell City Councils special meeting to establish new electric rates for citizens and businesses who wish to install alternative power sources for their homes and businesses, specifically solar power.

The story continued with Mayor Ted Cox quoted as saying "I don't want to discourage solar panels or keeping customers from being environmentally conscious." But that is exactly what he and the Council are doing by proposing a "customer charge" increase from \$5.70 to \$50.00, even with a decrease in kWh from 11.61 cents to 9 cents.

The story reports that average residential use in Purcell is 841 kWh so we will use that as our basis for all the falling numbers. Under the current rates a household would pay \$103.34 under the cities power provider OMPA. The increase/decrease proposed would raise rates for that household to 125.69.

I realize they would be on their solar when they could so perhaps they would pay less during those times but if for any reason their equipment was down or was not producing as expected their bills would be higher than the average consumer. The story reported that this increase/decrease proposed by OMPA would limit Purcell's revenue loss from \$30.35 to 77 cents, which does not make a lot of sense unless this is a reference to profit and not revenue.

And while Mayor Cox wants to stay competitive in the county, Purcell is the only OMPA customer in McClain County.

A city should not have any profit at citizens expense, the City is not a business, and if run properly should be able to exist on the sales and property taxes it collects.

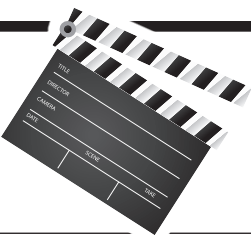
Why can the residents switching to solar not just pay their regular customer charge monthly (presumably they will want city power as a backup) and regular rates when they do use city power? They maintain their convenience and the city is paid

MOVIES WITH DAVE

This weekend was full of surprises.

I saw a bad movie from a director I like, an R rated comedy that actually ended up being funny, and a highly acclaimed film I couldn't stand.

So without further ado, here's my reviews.



First up I saw "Valerian and the City of a Thousand Planets."

Set in the 28th century, special operatives

Valerian (Dane DeHaan) and Laureline (Cara Delevingne) are part of the human police force on Alpha, a sprawling space station home to millions of creatures from hundreds of planets across the universe.

Faced with a new crisis that threatens to destroy the entire station, the pair must race to discover the cause of this potential catastrophe and save Alpha and all its residents from annihilation.

This is an interesting one.

The movie's based on a French sci-fi comic series "Valerian and Laureline" which dates back to the 1960s. And while the series is wildly popular in France, as well as the inspiration of many other sci-fi works, Valerian is basically unknown in the U.S.

I hadn't even heard of the series before the film was announced. The film definitely got my attention though when I heard it was being helmed by French director Luc Besson, best known for making the 90s sci-fi cult classic "The Fifth Element."

And while I did enjoy the world and all the creatures this movie brought to life, the film itself ended up being pretty terrible.

Sure the visuals are impressive and there are some really interesting sci-fi concepts explored in this movie, but it's all just a setting for bland characters and horrendous dialog, the worst offenders being the film's main characters, Valerian and Laureline.

Throughout the movie there's this whole subplot with Valerian trying to get Laureline to marry him. But forget about love, I have a hard time believing the pair can even stand each other. DeHaan and Delevingne have some of the poorest onscreen chemistry I've ever seen.

There's an expression in writing "show, don't tell" and this film absolutely fails at that. The movie expects us to believe Valerian and Laureline care about each other, not because the film shows it in any way, but because the movie says so.

Also the first scene with Valerian lays out his entire life history, his motivations plus his life goals all in a matter of minutes. Just terrible writing all around.

And it's a shame too, because I found the world around them very interesting. The visuals, while a little cartoony, are beautiful and the creatures all have

a certain charm about them.

I'd love to see this station and the universe around it explored in more detail if it just had a more competent filmmaker attached to it.

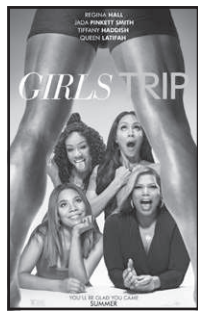
Nothing personal against Luc Besson, but there's only so much you can blame on the actors here.

It'd be one thing if it were a single bad performance, but it's every single character. From the leads, to people who only have one speaking part in the whole movie, every performance in this film is terrible.

Valerian is just a poorly directed film, made worse by terrible screenwriting. Both of which were done by Besson. The man may be imaginative visually here, but his writing and direction stink.

I can't recommend this movie to anyone except maybe the hardest core sci-fi fans. Besides an interesting universe, this film has nothing to offer.

Next I saw "Girls Trip."

I was also surprised by just how well filmed this movie was. Any other comedy would have just cheaped out and filmed on a couple controlled sets. Not this one though.

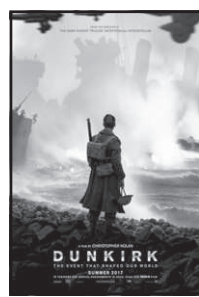

The Good Folks of Lennox Valley

More often than not, Sunday was the most anticipated day of the week in The Valley. It's not because anything earth-shattering took place in the four sanctuaries each week, but most folks like having people and places in their lives which don't change significantly over time, and the Sunday morning service was just such a place.

Sure, people come and go. In time, even priests and preachers either move on or pass away. Still, it was soothing to know most things remained the same from week to week and year to year.

At the Lennox Valley Methodist Church, Sarah Hyden-Smith was making last-minute preparations for the morning worship service. She came in early on Sundays, usually around 6:30 a.m., to make sure everything was ready for Sunday school and worship. She glanced over the bulletin Becky Moorehouse, part-time church secretary and bookkeeper, had prepared.

The Methodists count on certain activities. Normally, they began with announcements and then sing an opening hymn, usually written by Charles Wesley, brother of Methodism's founder, John Wesley. Like the Catholic church across the corner, the fine Methodists of Lennox Valley would dutifully recite the Apostle's Creed midway through the service.

As Sarah made her final preparations for the morning, Father O'Reilly had already begun the first of two services. The Catholics referred to their worship service as a Mass, which made most of the Baptists and even some Methodists wonder what was actually going on within the walls of All Saints Church. The first Mass, at 8 a.m., was held in Latin, while English was spoken at the 10:30 Mass.

At 8:25, Brother Billy Joe Prather made his way to his chair, located directly behind the pulpit of First Baptist Church. Brother Billy Joe didn't use notes as he preached, so he used these last few minutes to pray for inspiration as he led his flock.

The Baptists, like the Catholics and Lutherans, held two services on Sunday morning. Being exactly six days before October 31, Brother Billy Joe would firmly remind his

lary with Highway Director Gary Ridley to insert funding into the eight year construction plan to four lane both Highway 77 and 39 over in Cleveland County and currently those projects are well underway. for the upkeep of the required lines and meters attached to the house based on the amount used. Would it be much different than not using electricity for an entire month?

OMPA claims this is an issue of reliability, which I'm confident they are reliable, but as for the City of Purcell, you'd be hard pressed to find a citizen who did not have regular power surges, or power losses, during any hint of wind or weather, and for significant periods of time. Unless it is not the revenue we are trying to protect, instead it is the profits.

To elaborate, the City of Purcell buys power from both OMPA and Southwestern

Power Administration, which have varying rates. But averaged together, for the month of June the City of Purcell paid approximately 3.4 cents per kWh, and in January approximately 5.2 cents per kWh (according to City of Purcell bills from both companies for those months). Purcell residents are charged 11 cents per kWh according to the story. Which is 100-300 percent mark-up on power. A pretty good return for sure.

For comparison, if we were OG&E customers (which is not an option for us) we would pay a maximum of 7.3 cents per kWh in the summer and a maximum 6.54 cents in

the winter. OG&E customers would pay \$747.89 annually based on season and the average of 841 kWh cited in **The Purcell Register**. City of Purcell citizens pay \$1240.08 for the same energy needs. Almost \$500 a year difference.

Energy provided by the city should be a zero-sum equation, or close to it, it is understandable that equipment must be purchased and maintained and some costs must be absorbed by the patrons for that purpose. Any discussion about energy sell back to the grid is a non-issue, as they are paid far less for creating energy than they pay for using it.

In those four entities alone reside literally billions of dollars. And they have revenue streams that keep the money

flowing. Every year a few of them hand out some money here and there and they often brag how well they've done in being good stewards of these sacred trusts. And yet, every year Oklahoma continues to rank near the bottom in any number of

categories that matter to human beings. Something needs to change. After she was canned as chair of the Appropriations and Budget committee, Rep.

Osborn said she would continue to work to find ways to pull Oklahoma out of "mediocrity."

Could a state question like the one proposed might be one way of helping to do just that?

Some argue they don't want the elected legislators having access to money like this. That thinking fails to realize who is actually in control when elected lawmakers have the power to make financial decisions. It's the people who

elect them. If the people who elect them

don't like what they do, they can remove them. The same is not true with an unelected bureaucrat.

Unfortunately, in Oklahoma those are the folks who are really running the show.

Wise up lawmakers. Stop fighting with one another and start fighting for us.

3 large eggs

1-1/2 teaspoons of pure vanilla extract

3 cups of all-purpose flour

3/4 teaspoon of baking soda

3/4 teaspoon of salt

1-1/2 cups of Red, White & Blue M&M'S, plus more for topping

1 cup of mini chocolate chips, plus more for topping

Preheat oven to 350°.

Line a 9x13 baking dish with foil, leave some overhang to make removal easier.

Spray foil generously with nonstick cooking spray.

In the bowl of a stand mixer, beat butter, granulated sugar, and brown sugar together until fluffy.

Add in eggs and vanilla extract and continue to beat.

Lower speed of mixer and add flour, baking soda and salt, and mix until combined.

Add M&M's and mini chocolate chips and give a final stir, reserving some M&M's and mini chocolate chips for topping cookie bars.

Transfer cookie dough to prepared baking dish.

Press additional M&M'S and mini chocolate chips into top of cookie dough.

Bake 30 to 35 minutes on oven rack in lower third of oven to prevent over browning.

Regulations for Garage Sales

1. A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall for each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.
 2. A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.
 3. Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.
 4. Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility pole or street sign, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.
 5. All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale.
 6. If you have any questions, call 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission, call them at (405) 521-3274.
- Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.

Safely walking and riding a bicycle to school

When school begins this fall, many Oklahoma students will arrive by bus or car, while others will walk or ride bicycles, and that means keeping some important safety precautions in mind.

Walking and biking are easy, reliable ways to get anywhere, including to school, and are environmentally friendly and offer a great way to get in some physical activity, said Gina Peek, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension housing and consumer specialist.

"However, children can be at increased risk of injury because they're smaller and can have trouble judging distances and speeds of cars," Peek said. "They also generally don't have a lot of experience with traffic laws."

As a basic rule, walkers and bikers should obey all traffic signs, signals and laws, as well as any adult school crossing guards.

"Younger children who walk or ride their bikes to school

and children who don't know the rules of the road should be accompanied by an adult," Peek said. "Keep in mind that in many states, bicycles are considered vehicles. Parents and caregivers also should check local and state laws to see if bicyclists can use the sidewalk."

Regardless of the age of the children, family members should work together to map out the safest route from home to school.

"Parents and caregivers should talk with their children about sticking to the chosen route, not letting their friends talk them into taking shortcuts and not hitchhiking or accepting rides from people they don't know or who weren't sent by their parents," Peek said.

Walkers should use sidewalks, if they are available. If not, keep to the shoulder of the road, facing traffic.

Meanwhile, bicycle riders should wear properly fitted bike helmets for protection from injury as well as brightly colored clothing to make them

more visible to motorists.

Bikers should be predictable in their movements and go with the flow of the traffic, staying to the right and riding in a straight line, rather than weaving around cars."

"Students riding their bikes to school should watch for road hazards such as potholes, storm grates, pools of water and other things that could cause them to lose control of their bikes," Peek said.

"Parking lots or other low-traffic areas are good places to practice riding to increase bike-handling skills such as riding in a straight line, stopping and signaling."

Walkers and bikers should pay attention to their surroundings and keep distractions, such as cell phones or other electronic devices, to a minimum.

"Watch for parked, oncoming or moving vehicles when crossing driveways and intersections," Peek said. "Use caution at intersections and crosswalks. Before crossing a street or intersection, stop and check the traffic. Only

begin crossing when there is no traffic coming."

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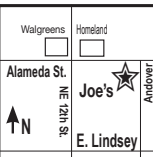

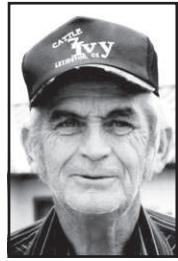

Glasgow:

with a firearm, a misdemeanor. That charge stemmed from Glasgow allegedly shooting his neighbor's dog last fall. City manager Dale Bunn said Friday that Glasgow's suspension began with the filing of that charge. He added Glasgow is currently under investigation by the department.

On June 23, Amy Glasgow filed a protective order against Glasgow for herself and the couple's three minor children ages 7, 10 and 14.

The order was granted and Glasgow was prohibited from attempting any contact with his family and was ordered to leave the residence in Washington by 12:30 p.m. June 23.

He was also ordered to surrender all firearms and other dangerous weapons to the sheriff's department.

Shortly before midnight June 30, however, Amy Glasgow called the sheriff's department to report Glasgow had attempted to call his daughter and was parked outside the family home.

According to an incident report by sheriff's Det. David Tompkins, Deputy Brandon Wheeler arrived at the house and found Glasgow sitting in his car which was parked between the road and pipe fence.

Glasgow exited the car after repeated commands by

Wheeler, who arrested him for violating the protective order.

Glasgow, who apparently had been drinking, allegedly berated the deputy, saying he shouldn't be taken to jail because he was a police officer.

He also insisted repeatedly that Wheeler call Undersheriff James Harryman, saying Harryman would tell the deputy it was a bad arrest, according to the report.

On July 1, the sheriff's department got a search warrant for Glasgow's car. Among items found was mail addressed to Amy Glasgow and the couple's 7-year-old daughter, an evidence tag for a Poulan blower/vacuum from the Purcell Police Department and a Samsung cell phone, as well as beer, tobacco and personal items.

After returning the mail to Amy Glasgow, Tompkins told Glasgow that he'd seized the property evidence tag and cell phone, but that other items found in the vehicle were in his property.

On July 2, Amy Glasgow called Tompkins and said her mother had brought her handgun Glasgow had given to his mother-in-law.

When Tompkins arrived at the house, Amy Glasgow gave him a .38 caliber Cobra pistol, as well as a magazine/

cuff holder containing Smith & Wesson handcuffs and a Glock magazine holding 14 rounds and a .223 magazine holding 28 rounds.

The items were placed into property at the sheriff's department.

Then on July 10, police chief Kevin Williams called Tompkins about the Cobra pistol which the department issued to Glasgow as an off-duty weapon. Williams said Glasgow was letting his mother-in-law use the handgun and asked if the police department could get it back.

Minutes later, Tompkins received another call, this from Capt. Bobby Elmore, who said he was doing an audit and if the handgun were returned to the police department, he could put it back in property.

Tompkins reminded Elmore that the protective order stipulated the firearms would be surrendered to the sheriff's department.

Elmore said paperwork showed Williams issued the weapon to Glasgow, adding that wasn't authorized, but that the weapon belonged to the city, not to Glasgow.

The captain later texted Tompkins a copy of a Sept. 29, 2016 order giving the pistol to the police department. Tompkins agreed to return the pistol

to the city after Amy Glasgow said she, not Glasgow, gave the weapon to her mother on June 23 after the protective order was issued.

When he returned the weapon, handcuffs and magazines, Tompkins asked Elmore about the property tag found in Glasgow's car.

Elmore said the blower/vacuum was found property and didn't work. Glasgow reportedly said he would take it home and fix it.

Amy Glasgow said the blower/vacuum had worked ever since Glasgow brought it home.

On July 17, Tompkins and another officer returned to the Glasgow home where Amy Glasgow took them to a closet where they found several boxes of different types of ammunition. Field drug test boxes were found to hold .223 rounds. In addition, a sealed and unopened bag bearing a Purcell police department evidence bar code contained nine .40-caliber rounds.

Also found was a Fuji digital camera, five kinds of knives and two loaded .223 magazines.

Tompkins photographed the closet shelves with their contents before going outside to the shop to photograph the Poulan blower/vacuum and two large speakers.

Amy Glasgow told the investigator she didn't know how Glasgow obtained any of the items.

The following morning Tompkins contacted Donnie Anderson, a District 21 investigator, about the property and evidence inconsistencies with Glasgow and the Purcell Police Department.

Anderson in turn contacted the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, which agreed that afternoon to take the case.

OSBI spokeswoman Jessica Brown said Monday the agency's "very long and detailed" investigation is open and active.

The request by the McClain

County Sheriff's Department was to look into possible discrepancies" within the police department's property/evidence room.

"Ours is a criminal investigation of broad scope. We're looking at everything. It is very wide open," Brown said. "We are sifting through a lot of paperwork."

While unusual, Brown said some police departments do issue off-duty weapons to their officers.

Once agents complete their investigation and report, they

will confer with the district attorney who will determine if charges will be filed.

As of press time Tuesday, no charges have been filed in connection with the search warrant and recovered items.

Glasgow remains free on bonds totaling \$3,500 and is barred from contacting his wife or their children.

An arraignment on the charge of violating a protective order is scheduled for 9 a.m. August 10.

A jury trial in the dog shooting case is on the docket for 9 a.m. October 5.

For Jason, teaching was a means to continue his love of sports.

“I got into coaching basketball,” he explained.

Rates:

However, a resident who has solar panels may see their kWh drop by 40 percent to 564 kWh. The resulting bill would be \$71.18.

A nice savings for the resident, but viewed only as a net revenue loss by the city.

The options would raise the monthly customer charge in \$5 increments from \$30 to \$50, while cutting the per kWh charge.

So Option 1 would bill the consumer \$92.04 for using the same 564 kWh when the bill is figured with a \$30 customer charge and 11 cents/kWh.

With a \$35 customer charge and 10.5-cent/kWh, the bill would be \$94.22.

Raising the customer charge to \$40 and dropping the energy rate to 10 cents would result in a bill for \$96.40.

At \$45 and 9.5 cents, the customer would pay \$98.58.

And finally at \$50 and 9 cents, the bill would be \$100.76 – and a net revenue loss of only 77 cents.

So how does that compare with other electricity utilities in the area.

Oklahoma Electric Cooperative bills a service availability charge at 60 cents per day. That averages \$18.25 per month.

The cooperative divides

residential billing into five major categories.

Winter rates reflected in bills mailed January through March are 9.2752 cents per kilowatt for the first 1,000 kWh. The cost of 941 kilowatts would be \$87.28.

Next is the spring shoulder period of April and May. The cost of electricity is 11.5252 cents per kilowatt. So 941 kWh would be \$109.95. A second spring shoulder period is reflected in the June billing. That is also when on-peak hours (weekdays from 3 to 7 p.m.) are utilized.

The on-peak rate is 25.6688 cents and 941 kWh would cost \$241.54.

In the non-peak hours, the same amount of electricity used would be billed at 11.5252 cents or \$108.45.

Summer rates in July through September are the same for peak hours, but off-peak drops slightly to 10.2688 cents. Those 941 kWh would cost a residential customer \$99.04.

Fall shoulder rates are billed in October through December and are 11.5252 cents. Again, that bill for 941 kWh would be \$108.45.

OEC has no surcharge or separate rate structure for a customer who installs solar.

In fact, the utility’s only requirements of the customer are:

- Member to submit an application and pay \$25 application fee;
 - Member to furnish certification from manufacturer or engineering firm that equipment meets applicable codes and standards;
 - Member to use an Oklahoma licensed electrician/electrical contractor;
 - Installation of a separate, lockable, OEC-accessible safety disconnect;
 - Execution of a contract between OEC and the member; and
 - Final inspection by OEC.
- OG&E bills a monthly \$13 customer charge.

From June through October, the utility charges 6.54 cents per kWh for the first 1,400 kilowatts used and 7.3 cents for any additional use.

Purcell’s average 941 kilowatts would cost \$61.59 (\$74.59 with the customer charge).

From November through May, OG&E bills residents the same 6.54 cents, only for the first 600 kilowatts. Additional usage is 2.5 cents per kilowatt.

Thus 941 kilowatts would cost \$47.77 (\$60.77 total).

8 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Thursday, August 3, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

fore September 1 are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten.

The Lexington Honorary Chapter Farmer Award was presented to Matt and Michelle Haswell, as well as Roy and Jessie Johnson.

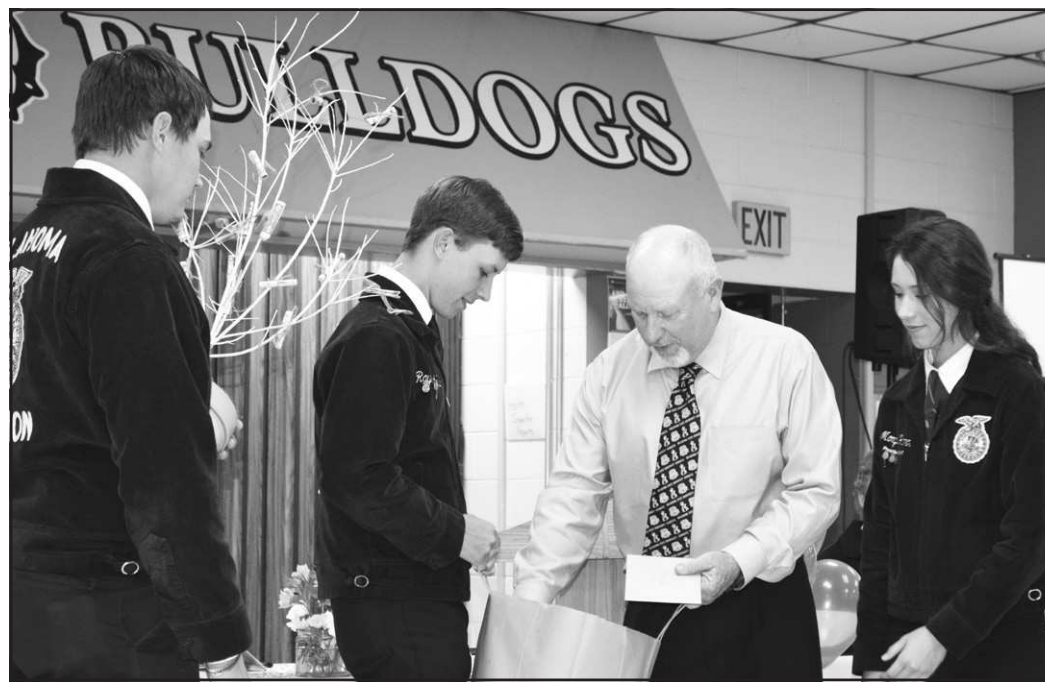

The program's Coordinator of the Oklahoma 4-H/Multi-State 4-H ATV Safety Program Mike Klumpp was among those on hand for the Hands-on ATV Rider Course. Another instructor and Communications Specialist Todd Johnson was also in Purcell for the event that provided training to eight youngsters. Also at the course was Wayne Fireman Robbie Moore.

"There are too many people killed on ATVs and this program is aimed at helping

to prevent some of those accidents," Klumpp said.

He said there are about 25 young riders killed every year.

"And, we've had some this year," he said.

Klumpp said there is also an on-line course, E-Course, at ATVsafety.org. Both the hands-on and on-line courses are free.

The rider course includes pre-ride inspection, starting/stopping, quick turns, hill riding, emergency stopping/swerving and riding over obstacles.

The course improves riding skills, builds confidence and teaches how to tread lightly.

Each week we recognize a veteran who served either WWII or the Korean War. Ray Thompson of Oklahoma City is our Veteran of the Week. He served in the Korean War.

Mr. Thompson is a retired High School Principal. In the Navy, he was a radar operator on a submarine killer out of Norfolk. He has participated in the Honor Flight to Washington, D.C.

We are proud of all who have served in our military. They are the true patriots in every sense of the word.

We are progressing quickly on the changes required to make our new building at 1268 North Interstate Drive

in Norman compliant with the City and the Americans With Disability Act (ADA). We hope to have everything finished and inspected within the next couple of weeks.

Wade Electric of Norman, began work last Friday. They are providing the labor for this job at no cost to the veterans we serve in our community. Our plumbing contractor, Graham Waterworks of Edmond, is providing services for free and will only charge for materials. We are thankful to have businesses willing to help us in our efforts to make a difference.

One of our veterans, Lenard Long, contributed to the purchase of tile needed. He will also lay the tiles himself. We are still looking for someone to tint our front windows to help keep the facility cooler in the summer. If you have someone who can help, please call Bill Scott at (405) 651-3808.

Many people and organizations talk about helping veterans and their families, but I know our organization is doing it. We are spending an average of \$30,000 each month on direct support. That money comes from people we have helped or from individuals or organizations who know what we are doing.

When we move into our new location, we plan to continue our big days on Tuesday and Thursday. On Monday, Wednesday and Friday we will schedule some appointments as we increase the number of volunteers.

We encourage others to sign up to be a part of what we do. I believe everyone has something to offer when it comes to helping the men and women who served this great nation. For those of you who would like to make a difference, please consider joining our organization. We average 23 hours per week, and provide the training for all volunteers.

Last week we assisted a record number of veterans and surviving spouses apply and receive VA benefits. There were more than 240 who made their way to our current location for help with their VA claims and questions. Of that number, there were veterans from Texas, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, Florida, Mississippi, Missouri and Georgia.

I'm very proud of the reputation we have as the place to go for assistance in receiving VA benefits. I have never heard of anyone from Oklahoma going to another state for better help with a VA claim for benefits. I believe that every veteran and their surviving spouse should receive all the VA benefits they are eligible to receive.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive more than 100 letters each week from the Department of Veterans Affairs on some of the people I represent. Many of these are rating decisions that show what percentage the veteran will receive ranging from 10-100 percent. A 10 percent rating

equates to \$133 each month while a 100 percent rating is over \$3,000 per month. I wish that each of you could be here when a veteran is approved for VA benefits. Many of them will break down and cry when they realize what we have done for them.

Today I received a hug and a kiss on my cheek from an 85-year-old surviving spouse who was recently approved for DIC (Death Indemnity Compensation). Her income went from \$800 per to over \$2,000 a month.

This week six veterans received a disability rating of 100 percent for their service connected disabilities. These men and women will receive an annual combined benefit of \$227,475 per year. There were also 16 veterans who received disability ratings ranging from 10-90 percent for their disabilities that were service connected. They will receive an annual combined payment of \$141,740.88 per year.

During your visit to us, please take advantage of a few of the other services we offer. Legal Aid is on site providing legal help to our Veterans. Upward Bound is also on-site to answer questions and to assist Veterans to take courses at vocational and technical institutions or colleges. Also joining us to help veterans is a representative from the Small Business Development Center to provide our veterans with individualized consulting and training to new and growing businesses.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

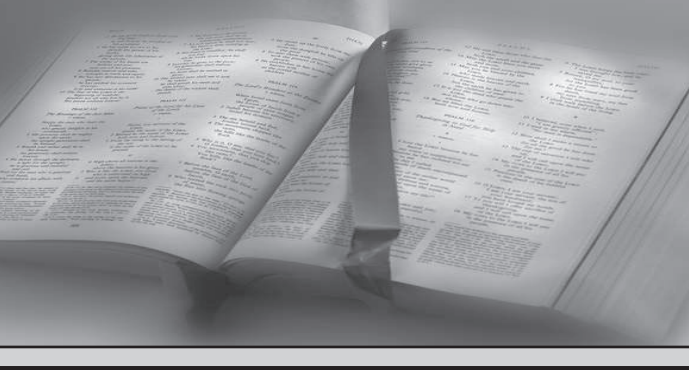

Welcome, friends, to the "front porch."

As we have made our way through God's Word over the past couple of years, it is always hard to leave a book behind. But then each new book presents fresh challenges and great lessons not seen in the previous.

Reluctantly, we are in the process of leaving Acts and moving to Romans; but, quickly, in the early words of the great apostle we see a powerful theme that we are very glad to explore in this first "epistle" of the New Testament. That theme is wrapped up neatly in a singular verse, and it is one of the greatest verses in all of God's Word:

iat term to many Bible students. You can see immediately that the word looks a great deal like our English word, "dynamite," or "dynamic." Nothing in this world is more dynamic, more powerful, has more "dunamis" than the gospel. However, we need to stop and consider all that this "gospel" – this "good news" – involves.

The gospel, I say respectfully, is more than carrying a few nice scriptures with us to help us along each day, although that practice is very commendable.

Nor is the gospel a "feel-good" sermon. It should "feel good" to know the peace that comes from the gospel, but the gospel is more! While sweet to the lips, the gospel of Christ can also be bitter to the stomach, as the psalmist writes.

else will Felix put the apostle off to a "convenient season" (Acts 24:25) or the young king Agrippa laugh Paul off with an "Almost you persuade me to be a Christian? (Acts 26:27).

The gospel demands too much to them. There is too much to give up, too much change involved, too much "repentance," too much dedication and focus they are not willing to devote, too much "church" and going to church for worship, too much going out and telling the story of Jesus, too much separation from those old friends who will not have a great deal to do with the gospel.

So, Felix and Agrippa choose a different road than the apostle Paul.

But Paul travels a singular road, and – though unbelievably bumpy and hazardous – he can say confidently in his salutation to the Christians in Rome:

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ," says the great apostle, "for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek" (Romans 1:16--NKJV).

Here is a lesson we want to teach all with whom we have influence. In 32 simple words, the Holy Spirit – through the pen of the apostle Paul – shows us what is most important in life. In short, he shows us the "power source." That source is the gospel of Jesus Christ!

The word "power" is a Greek word "dunamis," a fairly famil-

We do not have to read very far into the gospel accounts, then into Acts before we see that the gospel is extremely difficult. It demands sacrifice, focus, dedication, repentance, church worship, evangelizing, doing unto others the way we should do to others, a change a mind, a change of behavior, a change of attitude – and even more.

Yes, you'll notice we include "repentance" because the gospel demands a change. Why
