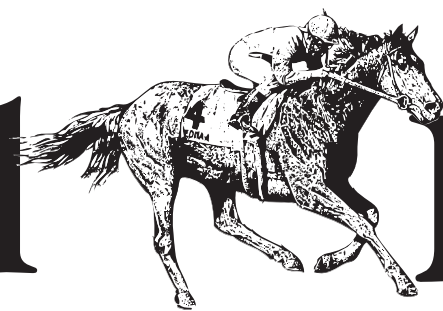

Pending felonies

Byars suspect held on \$200K bond

McClain County prosecutors have until Friday to file felony charges against a Byars man arrested Monday on a warrant for two misdemeanors.

In the meantime, Phillip W. Collett, 51, is in jail in lieu of a \$200,000 bond on

complaints of kidnapping, rape by instrumentation, planning or threatening a violent act and domestic assault and battery.

Collett initially came to the attention of the McClain County Sheriff's Department on April 25 when Deputy David Childress answered a

domestic assault call at 12065 Camp Arbuckle Road.

According to an affidavit in that case, Childress contacted a 21-year-old woman who said Collett picked her up at her residence and drove her to his home on Camp Arbuckle Road where the couple

began arguing.

During that argument, Collett allegedly punched her in the face, arms and upper body.

He then drove her back to her home, but refused to let her out of the vehicle.

Bidding opens for pool demolition

Companies interested in demolishing Purcell's swimming pool and cleaning the site have until 11 a.m. June 8 to submit bids.

That is when bids will be opened and read aloud

at city hall.

A mandatory pre-bid meeting is scheduled for 11 a.m. May 30 at city hall.

The pool was last used in the summer of 2015.

The Purcell City Council voted in 2016 to close the pool. They later briefly reconsidered that decision when it was brought up that it might be possible to repair the

aging pool.

However, estimates far exceeded available funds for repair.

Plans and specifications for the project may be examined at city hall.

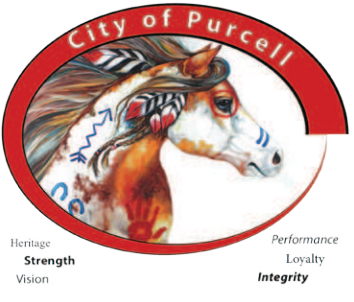

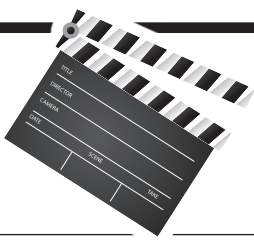

MOVIES WITH DAVE

Not the best week of movies for me, at least as far as quality is concerned.

Still have plenty to talk about though, so here's what I thought.



First I saw "King Arthur: Legend of the Sword."

Written and directed by Guy Ritchie, this retelling of the classic Arthurian legend naturally follows the story of King Arthur (Charlie Hunnam).

Robbed of his birthright, the young Arthur is raised as a peasant trying to make the best of his lot in life. His lineage catches up with him though once he pulls the legendary sword Excalibur from a stone and Arthur is forced to deal with his legacy, whether he wants to or not.

Well, this isn't the worst movie I've seen this year. It's far from the best though.

For better or worse, this movie has a very unique editing style. The film speeds up, slows down, and skips backwards and forwards in time constantly. I wouldn't mind that in small doses, but it was so frequent it became obnoxious and made the movie extremely hard to follow.

Speaking of obnoxious, I don't mind films using montages to quickly show a series of events, but this film was just ridiculous. I swear there must have been five or six of them in here.

Using a montage to show Arthur growing up? Sure, that makes sense I suppose. Using a montage to show Arthur dealing with a person who ruffed up his friend? Probably a little much especially considering the growing up montage was only 10 minutes before that.

And it doesn't stop there. It feels like almost nothing in this film is done in real time. It's like the entire movie was the planning montage from "Ocean's Eleven."

That isn't to say they were all bad. The montage where Arthur handles the person who messed with his friend is probably my favorite part of the movie. It was just way too overdone.

It wouldn't have been so bad if the movie had actually given me a reason to care about these characters in the first place.

I don't think the performances were bad, but the movie just never takes the time to stop, slow down and get to know these people. It ended up making the movie an absolute slog to get through. I was bored to tears during second half of this film.

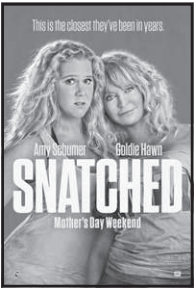
But that wasn't even the worst. No, that would be the film's big climatic fight scene at the very end. It looked shockingly bad. Like something out of a video game cutscene from 10 years ago. Not only did it look awful, but it had the same obnoxious editing style the rest

of the film had. I was stunned with how terrible it was.

Even with all that said, I can't say I hate this movie. It's almost like there's a half-decent film in there somewhere, but it's trapped behind all the annoying editing and rushed storytelling.

This whole thing makes me really concerned for the next film Ritchie's slated to direct, a live-action adaptation of Disney's "Aladdin." Hopefully Disney can keep him reined in, because this movie doesn't bode well for Aladdin's future.

"King Arthur: Legend of The Sword" is rated PG-13,



Next I saw the new Amy Schumer comedy "Snatched."

After being dumped by her boyfriend on the eve of their

planned vacation to Ecuador, Schumer's character convinces her ultra-cautious mother (Goldie Hawn) to accompany her on her trip to the South American country. Things don't quite go as planned though and the pair find themselves on an unexpected adventure the two of them won't soon forget.

I have to say I did enjoy this movie more than I thought I would. It was still a very mixed bag in the end though.

If you've seen Schumer's other movies or comedy specials you pretty much know what you're in for. Most of her comedy revolves around saying things you wouldn't expect, like cursing excessively or talking about bodily functions casually. Just an all around willingness to come across as gross, but in an endearing sort way. Unfortunately for me, her humor can be very hit or miss. Don't get me wrong, she had some really funny moments, they were just fewer and farther between than I would have preferred.

By far the performance I enjoyed the most was Bashir Salahuddin who plays a very annoyed U.S. State Department official. He was hilarious and I ended up loving every scene he was in.

On the other side of the coin was Wanda Sykes and her character. Every line she says was so forced and unfunny, you could practically hear crickets in the audience when she was on screen. Not sure what went wrong there.

But regardless of laughs, the movie was still kind of fun for the most part. The film does fall flat on it's face whenever it tries to get sentimental with the mother/daughter relationship stuff, but it doesn't linger on those scenes for long thankfully.

As always with comedies, your mileage may vary based on your sense of humor. The audience I was with seemed to enjoy the movie a whole lot more than I did.

If you're a fan of Schumer's

other works, I don't see a reason you wouldn't enjoy this too. It just wasn't for me.

Last this week I saw "The Wall."

Set in 2007 during the the Iraq War, two American soldiers (Aaron Taylor-Johnson and John Cena) find themselves under fire from a deadly sniper with only an unstable, crumbling wall between them. Hoping for rescue, one of the soldiers tries radioing for extraction, but instead ends up in contact with the very person trying to kill him.

Nothing like a simple movie with a simple premise.

I actually was kind of looking forward to this movie. I was interesting in seeing Cena in another film role after he completely stole the show in 2015's "Trainwreck."

Sadly, I ended up left pretty disappointed.

With a movie like this where most of the "action" is waged in a war of words, the actors and screenwriters need to be on their absolute A game. The whole film rests on their ability to make just talking exciting. Quentin Tarantino for example, is a master at this. The man can make a conversation over strudel the most tense, nerve-racking scene you'll ever see. This is no Tarantino film unfortunately.

The acting and writing aren't bad, but they aren't nearly good enough to carry the whole film on their shoulders.

Overall there are a couple good tense moments, but they're way too few and far between to keep things interesting. In fact, some parts of this movie can be downright dull.

And that brings me to my last point. This movie lingers on scenes for way too long.

It's like this movie is like the exact opposite of the King Arthur film I talked about earlier. Instead of editing too much this movie edits too little. Staying on a scene and letting it breathe is great, but this was ridiculous.

You don't need to show every single tiny detail in a film. There's a part where Taylor-Johnson's character is removing bricks from the wall so he can use his scope without peeking his head out. The movie shows him removing every single, little stone, one by one. I'm pretty sure I got the point after the fourth rock, thanks movie.

There are so many moments like that where the film just stays on shots way longer than it needs to, for seemingly no reason. It's like they were padding the film's runtime or something. This film could have been 60 minutes long if they would have edited things down properly.

Maybe I set my own expectations too high, but this movie ended up being a disappointing end to a disappointing day.

The Good Folks of Lennox Valley

Outside church organizations, there were only three prominent civic groups in Lennox Valley during my teenage years.

The VFW post was formed in the 1920s by local veterans who served in the Spanish-American War and World War I. A focus of the group was to foster camaraderie among United States veterans of overseas conflicts.

In the 1960s, a few local citizens formed the Ruritan Club. Never quite as prominent as the VFW, the Ruritans' motto was, "To serve The Valley with fellowship, goodwill, and community service."

While both espoused civic duty, there was a third group in our community which seemed to attract more attention than either the VFW or Ruritans.

The Auburn Hat Society of Lennox Valley was made up of women, 50 years and older, who possessed qualities befitting members of such a society. One requirement of membership was to wear a bright auburn hat to each meeting.

Occasionally women younger than 50 asked to take part in Society gatherings. They were sometimes allowed to participate, as long as they wore a light orange fedora. Fedoras of such colors being difficult to find, it was rare younger women attended the meetings. Outsiders often commented the requirement was simply to keep them out of the group.

There was a reason for this. The secrets of the Auburn Hat Society were tightly guarded. Meetings took place at various places, but always in public areas. Since no outsiders were allowed in the group, only members of the Society knew what important matters were discussed. Not even husbands were privy to inside information.

To nonmembers, the obvious question was "Why meet in public if your meetings are secret?"

The question alone indicates they have missed the point entirely, because the real reason for the existence of the Auburn Hat Society was twofold: To be seen and to have fun being seen.

At the October meeting of the Auburn

An unstated rule was each member took a "royal potty break" at least twice during dinner to allow diners to admire their headwear and wonder what important business was being carried out in secret.

As the group left Red Lobster, Vera stopped in her tracks, watching a silver Dodge Stratus pulling out of the parking lot. "Did anyone else see that?" she asked.

"See what?" asked Rhonda Graham.

"That car. I'm sure I saw Raymond Cooper and A.J. Fryerson in that car."

The importance of an independent FBI

President Trump's firing of FBI Director James Comey has predictably brought howls of protest from leading Democrats in Congress.

recruiting the right homes.

We need more homes willing to take teens, sibling groups and kids with special needs. These needs include medical needs, developmental disabilities or behaviors brought about by the trauma that comes with abuse and neglect. We need more tribal homes and homes in the Tulsa area because kids in foster care do better when they stay connected to their cultures and communities.

We must also make sure people better understand the core mission of foster parenting. Foster parenting is not an on-ramp to adoption. Foster parenting is about caring for a child in crisis and mentoring biological parents in order to facilitate safe and successful reunifications. To put it simply, foster parents stand in the gap to keep families intact.

Oklahoma's foster care system has made significant progress over the last five

years, but we still have work to do, especially in supporting the great foster parents we already have. I still hear from too many foster parents who have experienced poor communication or felt their concerns for a child were not fully heard.

We can do better. DHS leadership is working every day to create a culture that values foster parents as professional members of the child welfare team.

Foster parenting is difficult, even under the best circumstances, and we need the help of our churches and community partners in supporting foster parents through the tough days they will inevitably experience. If you can't be a foster parent, please find a way to support foster parents as they work to care for and love our kids.

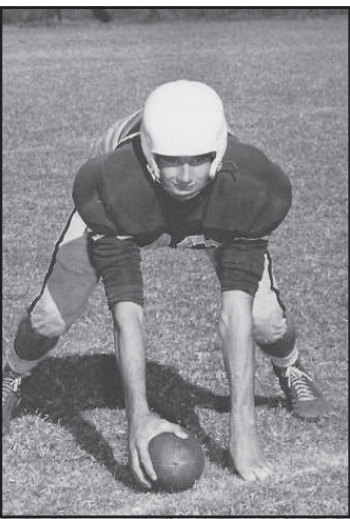

was in danger.

“I had been housed in protective custody and due to overcrowding continually had 4-6 inmates in one 2-man cell.” Bullock alleges.

One inmate assaulted him and another threatened him. Both

were moved, but several days later were returned to Bullock’s cell, the lawsuit alleges.

Bullock claims that action and the subsequent assault violated his rights under the fifth, eighth and 14th amendments to the Constitution.

Suit:

as individual commissioners Wilson Lyles, Charles Foster and Benny McGowen, was filed after a tort claim submitted by Harryman was denied in September 2016.

Harryman alleges in the action that he suffered “severe physical harm, including hospitalization” when the commissioners withheld reports of toxic mold present in parts of the McClain County Courthouse.

The lawsuit notes that on Jan. 11, 2016, the board hired Dirty Deeds, a company specializing in air duct cleaning and remediation to conduct an air quality analysis of the courthouse.

After completing the analysis

on Jan. 13, 2016, the company gave the board a report indicating mold spore counts were “beyond acceptable limits in parts of the courthouse and jail and that certain areas should not be occupied without remediation measures or the use of protective respiratory devices,” the lawsuit alleges.

However, the lawsuit continues, the board withheld the findings and didn’t inform employees about the findings or recommendations.

“The implementation of this policy exposing Captain Harryman and other employees to the dangerous condition was continuing and present from ... Jan. 13, 2016, to September 2016,” the petition reads. “By ignoring the test results which showed the dangerous conditions, the defendants were deliberately indifferent to the exposure to which ... employees were subjected.”

Harryman alleges he has suffered “multiple debilitating respiratory symptoms, emotional distress, medical expenses and lost wages.”

Subsequently, he drove back to his house where he held her approximately 45 minutes before again returning to her house.

According to the affidavit, he threatened to kill her and burn her house if she reported the assault.

On Monday, the victim’s mother called the sheriff’s office asking for a welfare check on her daughter, Det. David Tompkins said.

Deputy James Nail responded and learned the victim had been in another domestic abuse situation with Collett, the detective added.

According to the second affidavit, Nail and Childress contacted Collett at his home and arrested him on a warrant issued earlier in the day for domestic abuse/assault and battery and threatening to

perform an act of violence.

Tompkins said Collett was booked into jail and bond was set at \$2,000 for the two misdemeanors.

Monday evening, Tompkins and Nail interviewed the victim at the sheriff’s office.

She told them she was awakened Monday morning by Collett hitting her leg with his closed fist.

He then followed her into the bathroom, allegedly knocking her into the bathtub and striking her several times in the head.

When she went to put a movie on for her son, Collett reportedly got a pistol and used the weapon to strike her on the arms, according to the affidavit.

The victim said he threatened to kill her and fired the pistol towards the closet


while holding her down.

She said she asked Collett to allow her to take her son home. Then when Collett left the room, she took his keys and she and her son got into Collett’s car.

But before she could drive away, Collett reached the car. He returned the victim and her son to the house and forced the woman to go into the bedroom where he reportedly made her undress, tied her hands behind her back and raped her, according to the affidavit.

Tompkins turned his affidavit over to the district attorney’s office and Tuesday morning Collett’s bail was raised to \$200,000.

The detective said the investigation is ongoing may result in additional charges against Collett.

We would also like to recog-nize World War II Veteran of the Week Rance Willis. He served in the United States Air Force, Army Air Force and was a member of the Military Police for seven years. After serving in World War II, he was part of the Occupation Forces in Japan.

Things are looking great for the veterans and surviv-ing spouses who visit us each week. The number of veterans receiving VA compensation awards continues to increase each week. Most of the veter-ans we help will get approved for benefits.

Our system of using the VA Disability Benefits Ques-tionnaire (DBQ) forms in conjunction with the VA form 21-526EZ application for VA benefits is one of the many reasons we are successful. The VA can use the DBQ forms that we send in with their 21-526EZ to approve a veteran’s claims for compensation.

To give you an idea of what we see, sometimes the VA contractors send the veteran to the same doctor for an evaluation like the one we filled out for the original Dis-ability Benefits Questionnaire for the veteran. One of the things that bothers me is the average cost. For us to send a veteran for a diagnosis and evaluation, it runs about \$300. The VA pays the contractor several thousand dollars for the same test. If VA would use the DBQ that we provide they could save millions of dollars each year that could provide more staff doctors and better medical care. Just an idea, from an old man who has seen a lot in his short life.

Recently we asked a lady to come in to evaluate our services to see how we could do more for the veterans and surviving spouses in a shorter time. When we implemented the changes, she suggested the wait time for many of the men and women who visit us got cut in half. After all the years I have been doing this job it was very strange to find out that there were ways to improve our process.

After implementing the changes she suggested it was clear to me I should have been working smarter instead of harder. We are not only processing claims quicker; our quality has improved many times over. Before implementing the changes, we would spend many hours reviewing veteran’s claims for accuracy. Today there will only be a few minor changes that require us to do anything.

We had 216 veterans and surviving spouses who were assisted with their VA claims and questions last Tuesday and Thursday. Of this number, we had 65 veterans who made their first trip to see us. I do believe that our reputation as the “go-to” place for help with VA claims and questions has reached most every part of Oklahoma. We are also continuing to see veterans and surviving spouses from many other states who need help with their VA claims.

Yesterday I received calls from California, North Caro-lina, Kentucky, Texas and Arizona. The first question I am always asked is whether there is a place like ours in their state. As always, I tell them if there is I don’t know about it. We do have some veterans in North Dakota who are trying to start up a group similar to ours. I told them that I would review the claims of any veterans who wanted to use our POA.

Please remember that most claims for VA benefits will be denied if you do not provide evidence and a diagnosis of a condition that occurred in the military. Each of the men and women who assist you with your VA claims and questions are volunteers who are there to help you.

The following VA rating decisions were received last week for the men and women who served in the military. Nine veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabili-ties. These men and women

will receive an annual com-bined amount of \$328,327.56 each year. There were also 35 veterans who received VA disability ratings rang-ing from 10-90 percent. The combined annual amount that these men and women will receive is \$312,135.79 per year. Two surviving spouses were approved for DIC or Pen-sion based on their veterans’ military service, and they will receive \$33,384 per year.

As many of you know those whose disability is rated at the 100 percent level will be eligi-ble for the Oklahoma property tax relief and sales tax relief. The dependents of veterans who are not retired military and rated 100 percent may be eligible for the Champ-VA medical insurance.

Many times, veterans who we have helped will give items to us to give to other veterans and surviving spouses in need.

Currently, we have a couple of lift chairs that appear to be in good working order, a motor-ized wheelchair and a window air conditioner. If you are a disabled veteran or surviving spouse of one and need any of these items, please contact Rhonda at (405) 760-0917.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of as-sistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday morn-ings. Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Last weekend we celebrated Mother's Day and gave a special blessing and carnation to our mothers, young and old. It was also a good time to reflect upon the gift and vocation of motherhood in the light of the Gospel. First, a mother receives no training to prepare her for this most precious work.

A young man attends seminary for five years to prepare for ordination to the priesthood. A mother's only training is "on the job" training. She has to raise her children with only two things to guide her – her own maternal instincts and the light of Jesus. She learns about how to be a good mother by following her maternal intuitions one day at a time. So she is likely to make mistakes. We must forgive her for a few mistakes.

Second, a mother carries all the burdens of her children around in her heart. Remember when Jesus was a baby, Mary and Joseph took him to the Temple to be consecrated to the Lord. The prophet Simeon blessed the baby and the parents, and then he turned to Mary and said: "To you yourself a sword shall pierce your heart." (Luke 2:35) Mary would carry much pain in her heart as she would witness the pain that her son would feel.

Beginning when we were

very young, our mothers feel hurt whenever we feel hurt. When we were made fun of at school, our mothers felt the pain with us. When your heart was broken as a teenager, your mother's heart was broken, too. When you were disappointed, or scared, or sad, so was your mother disappointed and scared and sad. Mary, the mother of Jesus, felt all of his pain, too.

Third, a mother needs quiet time alone to sit at the feet of Jesus. Remember when Jesus went to visit his good friends, Martha and Mary. Martha was scurrying about the house getting everything ready for the meal. Her sister, Mary, simply sat at the feet of Jesus and listened to his words. Jesus said that Mary had "chosen the better part." (Luke 10:38-42)

We expect our mothers to be scurrying about – cleaning and cooking and doing all the household chores. But shouldn't we also give her time to sit at the feet of Jesus, Her Lord, to listen to his words, to rest in his company? Shouldn't we give her time to go on a retreat, to relax, to receive nourishment for her soul as well?

When we were a little child, we had a hurt finger, a scratch, or a burn. We were crying from the pain. We asked our mother to kiss the wound. When she

gave her kiss, the hurt seemed to be a little easier to bear.

It is time for us to give a kiss back to our mothers. Let us kiss her and forgive her for the mistakes she may have made over the many years. Let us kiss her and thank her for carrying our wounds and our emotional hurts over many years. Let us kiss her and bless her with the permission to have time to rest and refresh herself. Let us kiss her and thank her for being our mother.

At the end of his life, as Jesus was dying, he saw his mother and the disciple John at the foot of his cross. In that final act, he gave his mother to be a mother to the disciple John. As Catholics we have always understood this act to be a profound symbol. The disciple John represents the whole church.

Jesus was giving his mother, Mary, to be a mother to the whole church. We need a mother, a spiritual mother, to guide our church, to feel with us our pain. And, most importantly, to lead us to her Son, Jesus.

rriors who ever lived? His faith grew so weak at times that his lies almost caused a massacre, had God not stepped in!

So why was he a great man of faith, a man the writer James says had a “faith made perfect”? I think it’s because of this: In all his life, he never lost his will to follow the Lord. You see, he chooses faith even

after he doesn’t nearly live up to it. He skids off of the road from time to time; but he always gets out, pulls his life out of the ditch, and puts it back in gear.

To be able to keep yourself out of the ditch, you’re going to need some help. The best short piece of advice I can think of comes from Lee

Strobel in his classic book, The Case for Faith. As he talked to an older Canadian preacher named Lynn Anderson about faith, he asked the old man for a good place to get faith started.

Mr. Anderson answered that a person needs to surround himself with the right things: the right people, the

right reading materials, the right influences. Then he says something curious, and true.

“After all,” he says, “if you want to grow roses, you don’t buy an acre at the North Pole. You go to where roses grow well.”

Ah, there’s the key.
