


Horse industry legend dies



Learning what makes Purcell firefighters tick

Inside the "structured chaos" they encounter at every fire scene, Purcell firefighters find within themselves something more than knowledge and expertise.

"It" fuels their every effort to save lives and property in an emergency.

"It" emboldens them to run into burning buildings

and other scenarios from which the rest of us would wisely flee.

"It" is a rush of adrenaline they get from no other line of work.

Driver Brandon Norman described his adrenaline rush like this: "all the excitement within the structured chaos" and working past, through or over any notion of fear in the face of fire.

His most frightening experience occurred a few years ago while he was still a volunteer Washington firefighter battling a grass fire near Goldsby.





Section R319 Site Address

R319.1 Address numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall be a minimum of four inches (102mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means should be used to identify the structure. This will allow emergency crews to locate the house number.

His father worked for Clarence Scharbauer, Sr., for 17 years, handling both cattle and horses, so horses were an integral part of Jack's life since birth.

It is highly possible to say that Jack has ridden more miles before daylight than many folks have ridden in their entire lifetimes.And, he has probably had more broken bones.

After Jack and Marilyn were married, they lived in New Mexico, working for a cattle trader. During these years Jack showed reining horses.

He worked at La Mesa Park, at Raton, NM, on the starting gates and as a trainer from 1963 to 1966.

starting the Kansas and Texas Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Associations to protect the horsemen's interest in the industry. He is a founding member of the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Association and was on the Board of Directors in 1977. He is a lifetime member of the American Quarter Horse Association and has served on many other boards of directors over the years.

Jack and Marilyn moved to the 6666 Ranch in Guthrie, Texas, in 1966, where Jack ran the Quarter Horse breeding program for two years. While there, Jack worked on and improved the extender solution which preserved a stallion's sperm for use in artificial insemination.

In 1974, Jack and a group of some of the greatest horsemen of the era built Oklahoma Stud in Purcell. That group included the renowned Dr. John Beall, World Champion Cowboy Louis Brooks, Oklahoma racing insiders Joe L. and Joe F. Gary, highly regarded race horse breeder Clarence Scarborough, Jr., from Midland and McReynolds, the resident manager.

Oklahoma Stud was the first of its kind to bring together a group of owners and breeders to stand a group of outstanding stallions in one place.

The group purchased almost Jack was instrumental in a section of raw land in the soft, rolling hills southwest of Purcell. Managing partner McReynolds built what is still considered one of the most beautiful breeding facilities in the racing world. Not only beautiful, the facility is regarded as one of the best laid-out for handling horses.

> Oklahoma Stud looked more like a country club than a breeding farm. Most of the plans for its layout and efficiency were ideas that Jack had carefully worked out in his mind during his many years in the horse business.

> The farm opened in 1975 and was immediately recognized as the elite of breeding operations in the Quarter Horse industry. It was widely publicized, and race fans and industry insiders both came from all over the country to see this state-of-theart facility.

The stallions that stood at While at the 6666, Jack was Oklahoma Stud were some of the most famous and important in the history of AQHA. With stud fees starting at \$1,500 and ranging upward to \$10,000 for the 1976 season, Oklahoma Stud broke new ground in the racing world.

The stellar roster included

These stallions, each a headliner in his own right, put Oklahoma Stud on the map as one of the premier breeding programs in the country.

The sons and daughters of Oklahoma Stud's original roster are seen in the top pedigrees today.

These stallions were joined later by Twin Jet, Fols Native (TB), Flaring Dancer, Gold Seeker Bars, Jet Charger, and Decka Center.

It is fair to say McReynolds has touched, bred, raced, or trained every pedigree known to the horse industry.

The AQHA presented the McReynolds' and Oklahoma Stud with a historical marker for their role in creating some of the best crosses in AQHA history.

Oklahoma Stud is considered to be the birthplace of parimutual racing in Oklahoma.

The Heart of Oklahoma Horsemen's Association was organized there for that purpose. Large parties were held entertaining upwards of two thousand horsemen, a who's who of Oklahoma racing.

Jack sold Oklahoma Stud in 1986 and built McReynolds Farm on Horse Road, close by, where he raised, trained and raced Thoroughbreds.

Jack retired in 2005, and the couple moved to town.

Jack's work with those horses led him to become the living legend that he was.

Jack needed Marilyn to work by his side, build their family, lending her intelligence and grace along the way.

> "I had a gentleman tell me early on I needed to find a career and quit working so hard all my life," the former rancher/ farmer said.

"An adrenaline rush is hard to The worst situation he can explain to someone who's never been in our shoes," he continued.

The worst fire he's ever been

in?

"There have been so many," he mused. "Probably the wild grass fires. The humidity drops and wind kicks up and you're out there for hours trying to get a handle on the situation. Sometimes it's difficult to get that handle on. It depends on the situation whether you can control it at all.

"After 28 years, yes, I do" still experience an adrenaline rush," Askew said. "If you're dispatched and see smoke as soon as you pull out on Green Avenue, you know it's a big one and you're going to be there awhile.

"I fell in love with it in the early days and never wanted to do anything else."

Still, there are some similarities with his former calling as rancher/farmer.

"It's hard on families," he said. An understanding, apprecia-

tive family is a must-have. "I've missed a lot of Christmases and Thanksgivings," Askew said. "You try to work around it.'

The job carries some truths. First, firefighters don't dislike the 4th of July.

"Winters are worse for us than the 4th of July," Cypert said.

There's dead vegetation for fuel and wildfires pose the greatest danger from January through March when the humidity drops.

And second, anytime construction starts on the interstate, there will be car wrecks.

Askew noted in 1993, if the department made 200 fire calls a year, "that was something."

Now they run on 1,100 to 1,200 calls a year and do so at the same staffing level-10 fulltime firefighters, 16 volunteers and two administrators.

"We train every shift," Cypert said.

Claunch added the goal is 16 hours training every month, 40 hours emergency medical training every two years and emergency vehicle driver training annually.

All to prepare for the unexpected.

"There are some situations that heighten my awareness of what we're going into," Cypert said. "Hazardous materials you never know what you're getting into."

Most of those stem from wrecks of semi tractor-trailers and occasionally rail transport.

The worst the chief could recall stemmed from an Auto Zone truck that turned over.

Lexington falls to Marlow

Season ends for 'Dawgs after 6-4 run

That's probably the best way to sum up the end to the 2017 high school football season for the Lexington Bulldogs.

The Marlow Outlaws beat the 'Dawgs, 36-18, on Lexington's home turf last Friday night.

The loss ended Lex's season with a 6-4 record overall and 2-4 in district play. Meanwhile, the Outlaws (with a 5-5 overall mark but a 4-2 record in district play) go on to the Class 3A playoffs to meet the Plainview Indians this Friday night.

"Tough loss for the Bulldogs," Lexington head coach Dale Berglan said. "The boys left it all on the field. Marlow was definitely a handfull and we were a few plays away from having a chance."

Senior running back Zach Smith put the 'Dawgs on the scoreboard first with a 38-yard touchdown run – but the run for the two-point conversion failed.

Marlow proceeded to score

twice in the first quarter to lead, 14-6.

The Outlaws had a 26-yard touchdown run to make it 21-6 in the second quarter.

But, Lexington junior quarterback Toby Prevost connected with his senior wide receiver, Hunter Findley, for a 7-yard touchdown play to close the gap to 21-12 after another failed 2-point conversion run.

Marlow tacked on another touchdown and a 2-point conversion run for a 29-12 halftime lead.

The score was 36-12 after the third quarter following the Outlaws' 8-yard touchdown and PAT.

Smith had another 1-yard touchdown burst in the fourth quarter. After the pass for a 2-point play failed, the final score stood, 36-18.

"Every year, there is really only one team in each class that is happy with how their season ended up," Berglan said.

to all: Welcome again to the of Galilee elegantly for some years, hushing the Pharisees, calming the storms, and offering peace to all around.

The noise has grown to such a level that one particular man sitting up ahead on the side of the road turns and asks what all the commotion is.

Don't you know, is the reply, don't you know that "Jesus of Nazareth passeth by" (Luke 18:37).

This news without a doubt is what this man named Bartimaeus had waited for years to hear. Perhaps that is why he chooses to sit in this very spot today. Bartimaeus, you see, is a blind man; and he must have known that if he ever had hope of seeing a sunrise or looking

into the eyes of his loved ones, this is the Man he must meet.

Bartimaeus immediately calls out, "Jesus, thou Son of David, have mercy on me" (Mark 10:47).

Those standing near quickly rebuke the blind man: Hold your peace! Don't you know Jesus is busy! Don't make a scene right here in the middle of the street, what's wrong with you, sir? Do you want to give our town a bad name? And on and on.

But the blind man lends a deaf ear to the criticism and the rebukes. This is his chance for salvation, and he is not about to let it pass him by. The inspired writer tells us that "he cried the more a great deal, Thou Son of David, have mercy on me!" (v. 48)-this clamor no doubt much to the dismay of the spectators nearby.

Bartimaeus, you see, is different from all of the others, and -perhaps-he is different from you and me, too. Bartimaeus is a complete and absolute desperate man. He has no worry in the world about what he is wearing, or how he might be perceived, or who particularly likes his pleas or who doesn't. His only concern is to get the attention of the Master, to call and cry and plead, laying it all on the line, until by chance the Lord mercifully turns his face toward him.

Indeed – if you know this great story - you know our Lord hears the desperate cries of the blind man, and he does an amazing thing. He simply stands still (v. 49).

He stops.

Virtual schools could reap largest gain in lawsuit

Virtual charter schools stand to receive the largest share of local tax funding if a lawsuit by a pro-charter-school group is successful.

That gain could occur despite the fact that virtual schools have fewer expenses than brick-and mortar ones, with few or no buildings to purchase and no transportation to provide.

The Oklahoma Public Charter School Association is suing the state Board of Education over the funding allocated to charter schools, which it argues is inequitable. Oklahoma charter schools are eligible for state and federal funding but not local tax revenue, including building fund taxes; gross production tax proceeds, and motor vehicle revenue. The lawsuit seeks to allow charters — both virtual and brick-and-mortar the ability to receive the same funding as non-charters.

Virtual schools have the most to gain from the lawsuit because schools are funded per student. There are far fewer virtual schools – four, compared to 25 brick-and-mortar – but more students in those schools.

Of the 25,000 charter students in school year 2016-2017, more than half, or 13,225, were enrolled in virtual schools, according to state Department of Education data.

Virtual schools spend significantly less on building and maintenance and on transporta-

for nearly a quarter of a school's resident student who attends, budget, according to the Education Commission of the States. Many brick-and-mortar charters don't provide transportation either, and are often housed



in repurposed buildings such as churches and shopping malls.

Blended school models, where students receive some in-person instruction but most is done online, can save \$1,100 per student per year, compared to traditional schools. Fulltime virtual education costs approximately \$3,600 less per student, according to a 2012 report by the Thomas B. Fordham Institute, a conservative policy group and advocates for school choice.

Nineteen states fund virtual charter schools at the same perpupil level as brick-and-mortar charters; 10 states fund virtual charters at a lower per-student amount, the Center for School Change found in a 2013 report. can intervene is scheduled for tricts, for instance, are required County District Court.

tion — expenses that account to pay cyber charters for each minus the cost of transportation, adult education and debt service. In Ohio, virtual schools receive per-pupil funding equal to that of traditional schools, but they aren't eligible for certain program funding, such as for at-risk students and English language learners.

Another reason states are hesitant to give virtual charters equal funding is because they are often managed by forprofit companies, the Education Commission of the States reports. All of Oklahoma's virtual charters are managed by for-profit companies.

Oklahoma City Public Schools and Tulsa Public Schools last week filed motions to intervene in the lawsuit, in opposition. The districts believe the state Education Department and charter school association have reached an agreement. Deana Silk, of the Education Department, told The Oklahoman last week there is no settlement pending.

The districts estimate \$1.5 million or more could be diverted to brick-and-mortar charters located within their enrollment boundaries, and millions more could be reallocated from school districts across the state because virtual schools are statewide and enroll students in all 77 counties. The attorney for the charter school association, Bill Hickman, has ties to Epic Charter School, the state's largest virtual charter, with more than 8,000 students. Hickman has been Epic's attorney since at least 2010, when a case was brought against the Education Department over funding; a 2011 dispute with an early sponsor of Epic, the University of Central Oklahoma; and a 2013 dispute with the Education Department for withholding its A-F report card.

Hickman's former law partner, Brad Clark, who litigated several of those cases with him, now represents the Education Department, including in the charter school association case.

A state Education Department spokesman said Clark's role does not present a conflict of interest.

"Clark is a fierce advocate for public schoolchildren in his role as attorney for the state board and the state superintendent. It is very common for attorneys to square off against former colleagues in courts of law," said Phil Bacharach, the department's chief of staff. "Any insinuation of a conflict of interest here is plain garbage."

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
