

Toddler drowns

Saturday night in South Canadian

The Oklahoma Lake Patrol investigated a drowning in the South Canadian River last Saturday night near the Sundog Trails property on the Lexington side of the river.

According to Lexington Police Officer Jonathan Fried, a child, not quite three-years-old from Bethany, was pronounced dead at Purcell Municipal Hospital.

Officer Fried was dispatched 8:02 p.m. to the

scene on the river arriving about 8:04 p.m.

When the officer arrived CPR was in progress.

Fried said he checked for a pulse and then continued CPR until Wadley's EMS arrived. They then took over the CPR and transported the child to the hospital where the child was pronounced dead.

Lexington Police are not releasing the name of the family.

A lifelong Purcell resident and teacher at Delta Head Start will serve the remaining months of Tom McCurdy's city council seat.

The council on Tuesday voted unanimously to accept Theda Engert as McCurdy's replacement.

Mayor Ted Cox said four residents expressed an interest to him in serving.

Others were Jay Tate, Brandon Comer and Chad Hall.

But just Engert and Tate attended Tuesday's meeting to address the council.

"I grew up in Purcell," Engert said. "I love this town and want to be a part of it."

She has been a resident for 38 years.

Tate told the council he is a member of the veterans com-

mittee and was involved in getting the municipal airport renamed.

"I want to see Purcell grow," the 42-year resident said. "I have a sense of civic duty and want to act on it."

Council member Graham Fishburn pointed out serving on the city council is just one way to serve the community.

"There are hundreds of other ways," he said. "This is a difficult job, tough decisions to be made."

Mike Pollok made the motion to bring Engert onto the council, saying it was time for a woman to serve "like Betty (Gerhard)."

Gerhard, a longtime council member and former mayor, resigned in 2014 to move out

Bridging the FUTURE

State awards \$36 million contract for new Purcell-Lexington bridge

The next – and final – chapter in the history of the James C. Nance Memorial Bridge opened

Tuesday when the Oklahoma Transportation Commission awarded a \$36 million contract for the construction of a new span connecting Purcell and Lexington.

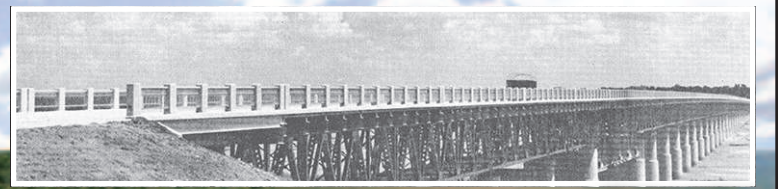
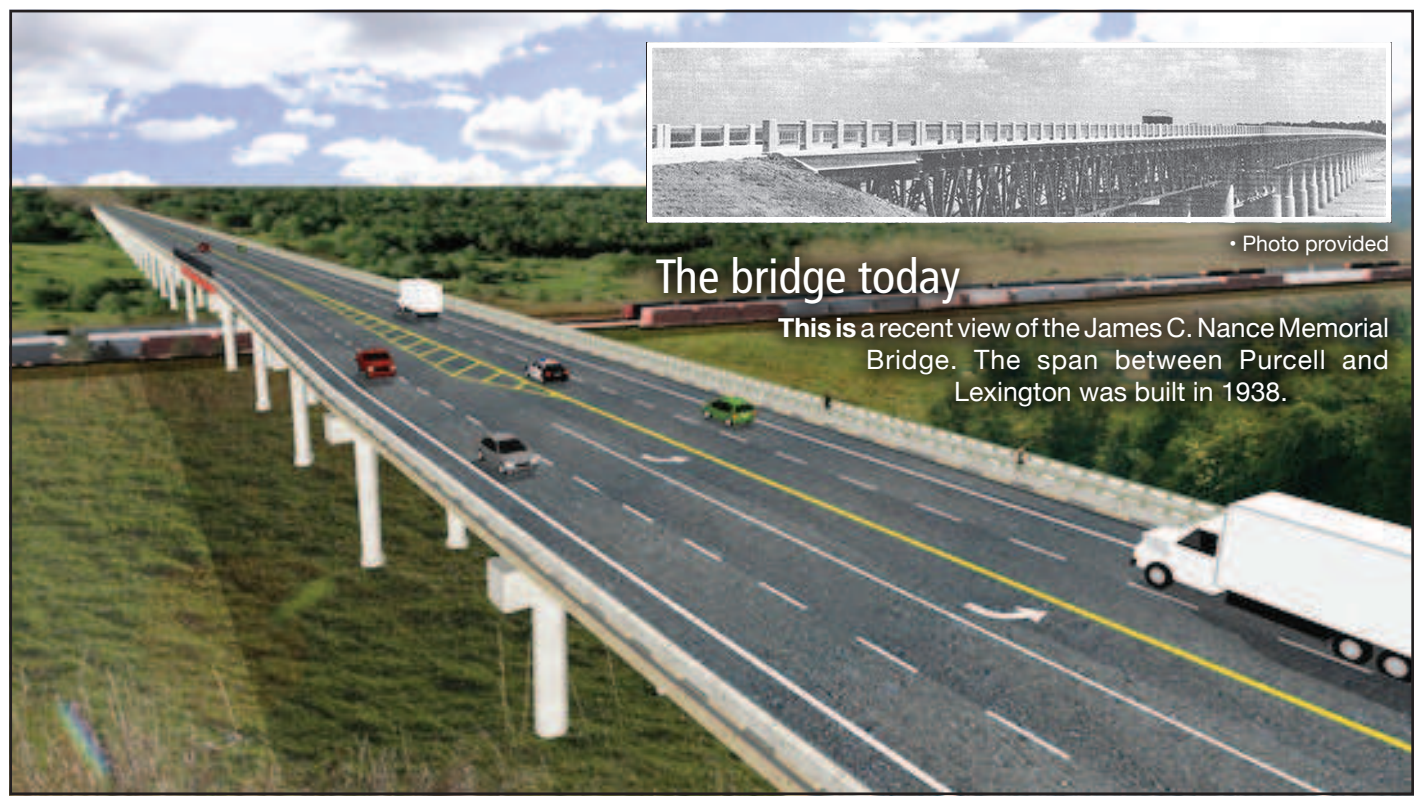
Webber, LLC, was the lowest of three bidders. The company is based in The Woodlands, Texas.

Included in the contract is \$2 million bonus in possible financial incentives if the project is completed ahead of schedule.

The bridge carries U.S. 77/State Highway 39 over the South Canadian River and BNSF railroad.

"This bridge is a lifeline between two cities that are part of one community," said Mike Patterson, executive director of the Oklahoma

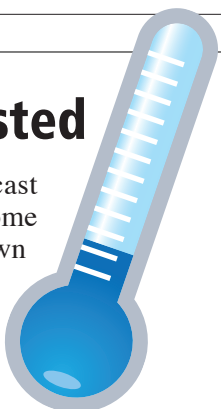
Cooler temps forecasted

of state. The council quickly worked through the rest of the agenda, approving a resolution to accept a Federal Aviation Administration grant offer to install a fuel farm at the city-owned airport. They also voted to accept transfers from Hollis Airport

for \$48,568, Clinton-Sherman Airport for \$8,401 and El Reno Regional Airport for \$10,505. All three transfers are earmarked for the fuel farm project. The money from El Reno Regional Airport must be repaid next year. Purcell doesn't have to pay back the

funds to the other two airports. Dr. Glen Mead thanked past and current city officials for adding fluoride to the Purcell's water supply. Children between the ages of 2 and 8 years will experience 70 percent fewer cavities over their lifetimes if they drink fluoridated water, Mead said. The Purcell Public Works Authority took the following action at the meeting:

- approved an application fee of \$1,147.66 to Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality for construction of a drying bed at the wastewater treatment site for sewer cleaning debris
- approved an electrical rebate of \$3,419.30 and water rebate for \$300 for Southern Hills Phase 2
- approved an electrical rebate of \$4,881.78 for The Cliffs Phase 5
- approved a budget amendment of \$8,600 due to reimbursement received from Wendy's for a transformer
- approved \$29,928 for professional services from Banc Statement Inc., to process utility billing and late notices for the city.

Second Chance Executive Director Cindy Adams also attended the event and shared her appreciation for the contribution.

"For 28 years we have been rescuing dogs and cats in Oklahoma," said Cindy. "We are run on private donations and a few grants only and the cost of what we do is pretty high. So unfortunately money is an important part of keeping us going. So thank you so much, we appreciate it!"

To play Folk Secrets, participants downloaded the Folk Secrets Codex App on their mobile devices and used it to scan history related clues throughout Cleveland and McClain Counties. In the process they learned information about historical people, places and events in Oklahoma.

"We had quite a few people come to our organization looking for answers," said Stephanie Hixon with the Cleveland County Historical Society, who was also on hand for the season finale. "And it was so encouraging to see that; people engaged, interested, looking for history clues and for answers. There are a multitude of museums, historic sites and historic resources in our area that can be used to continue learning about our local history."

Approximately one thousand people downloaded the Codex App and joined the hunt. Of those, only thirty completed all the clues, most of whom attended the Season Finale. Finishers will be treated to a

VIP dinner with the show's host, Jonathan Quill as a thank you for their efforts.

Quill hosted weekly video episodes of Folk Secrets on Facebook, where he shared the treasure's background and connection with Oklahoma. During the Season Finale video, Quill was kidnapped by masked men he referred to as "them," just before announcing a new treasure stash. This opens the door for Folk Secrets Season Two.

"Season Two is tentatively scheduled to begin in October

on Friday the 13th and run through December 22nd," said Brent Wheelbarger, CEO of Trifecta Communications, the firm responsible for Folk Secrets.

"We have some fun surprises in store for viewers and an augmented reality treasure hunt digging even deeper into our local history. We greatly appreciate the sponsors who funded Season One, many of whom will be perpetuating this project in Season Two."

Folk Secrets Season One

uniformed PAOs found a restaurant close by that had the game on the television.

The first quarter and a half belonged to the Sooners as they built an amazing 20-0 lead.

That's the only part of the game I actually witnessed since lunch was over and it was back to work.

While I was back to work so was Ohio State, who scored four unanswered touchdowns to make the score 28-20 before Sooner Magic took over.

A flea flicker set the table for a one yard Elvis Peacock touchdown but the try for two

failed.

With the Buckeyes still leading 28-26, as you know, the Sooners kicked on side and got the ball back.

That set up 'The Kick' by von Schamann or "von Foot" as defensive backs coach Bobby Proctor dubbed him since he couldn't pronounce his real name.

The funny part of the story is when von Schamann hit the game winner with just three seconds left there was this tremendous roar that came from every room in that building.

The captain's orders obviously had fallen on deaf ears.

Late that night after the team got back, I ran across Uwe sitting alone at a table at a local Norman watering hole.

We toasted his kick and I got to hear first hand what I had missed due to my service to our country.

By the way, while I was in the Navy not one Russian submarine was ever detected in Lake Texoma.

The opioid crisis

There is a rampant health crisis that is destroying families and communities across our nation. Opioid addiction and drug overdoses have turned into a shocking epidemic that impacts people from all walks of life and every corner of our nation.

We cannot stand idly by while this scourge steals the hopes and aspirations of our fellow citizens while simultaneously destroying entire communities.

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), drug overdoses are the leading cause of death among Americans under 50, and opioids are by far the biggest contributor to this alarming fact.

For those who aren't familiar with the definition of opioids, they are a class of drugs that include legally prescribed medications such as oxycodone, hydrocodone, codeine and morphine – just to name a few. When taken in short doses under the careful supervision of a health professional they serve a good purpose.

However, many people become addicted and begin

to procure these prescription drugs illegally through street dealers, unscrupulous doctors or pharmacists, or even by stealing them. The other substances under the term "opioids" include illegal heroin and fentanyl.

It is estimated that over 50,000 Americans die each year by overdosing on drugs, almost 150 each day, and this number continues to grow. In response to this alarming statistic, there is a growing bipartisan consensus that this is an issue that must be treated with the utmost urgency.

Last spring, President Trump established the President's Commission on Combating Drug Addiction and the Opioid Crisis. This summer, the Labor, Health and Human Services Appropriations Subcommittee, of which I am Chairman, included \$747 million dollars to address opioid and heroin abuse - \$83 million above the White House request.

This epidemic is complex and crosses many demographic, criminal justice and health issues. It needs to be aggressively attacked on all three fronts.

First, we need to recognize that this problem is urban,

rural, suburban – you name it – it exists everywhere. As I travel through Oklahoma, I hear heart breaking stories about families, businesses, even entire neighborhoods being destroyed by this epidemic.

Second, we need to start saving our fellow citizens by getting them access to the intervention, medications and technologies to help them break their addictions and integrate back into a healthy and productive life.

And finally, we need crack down hard on the criminals who are supplying this poison. It shouldn't matter if they are lurking in the shadows in a trench coat, or if they are illegally dispensing them wearing a lab coat.

People who illegally supply these drugs must be stopped and must be punished.

To put it in perspective, if there were a deadly pandemic sweeping America and killing over 50,000 people a year, we would certainly make addressing it among our highest public health priorities.

I submit that this deadly addiction, and the overdosing of opioids is every bit as critical and ought to be taken every bit as seriously.

First, there was Daddy Camp. That's the week after all the summer camps end and before school begins when I take a vacation and entertain the twin tornadoes. This year there were school orientations to be attended, so my big plan for a road trip to Mount Rushmore was thwarted. and really, how long can you spend looking at kitschy car sculpture?

Day Three of Daddy Camp was to be spent at Frontier City, where both boys boasted about their all-grown-up willingness to ride the big roller coasters. Except the Silver Bullet. And the Diamondback. But all the other ones. Seriously.

That left the Steel Lasso and the Wildcat. After the magic show and the carousel, they had plenty of nerve for the Steel Lasso. When we got to the Wildcat, the big

wooden coaster, the 7-year-old's bravado faded and he opted to sit it out. That was OK with me; who needs six years of therapy bills? But the 10-year-old bucked up and buckled in, and I only made a couple of comments about rusted bolts and rotting wood and Look how high we are! He clutched my left arm (I still have the bruise) and we dropped. "Aaaaaaaaaaaaaaaaaah!" he screamed – at least I think

I can't estimate how many cards she sent people, how many cellophane bundles of cookies she baked and delivered, how many times she called people to encourage them.

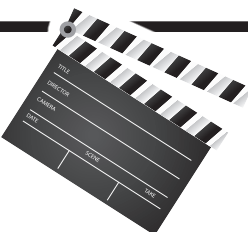
I still miss her and wish I could relive that August morning in 1977.

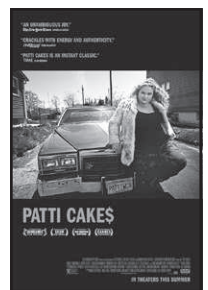


And I thought last week had a low turnout. I think this may be the emptiest I've ever seen the Moore Warren (Regal) Theater.

Luckily for me though, the Warren added a couple smaller releases, so I at least had something new to go watch.

First up is "Patti Cake\$." Aspiring rapper Patricia Dombrowski (Danielle Macdonald) isn't your typical would-be hip hop artist, especially in appearance since she happens to be a plus sized white girl.

That doesn't stop her from pursuing her dream though, and despite facing adversity from all sides, Patti puts it all on the line to make it big.

Even so, hip hop still isn't exactly my favorite style of music.

Still, they throw in a few surprises here and there to keep things interesting, and the characters are strong enough keep the film engaging for the most part.

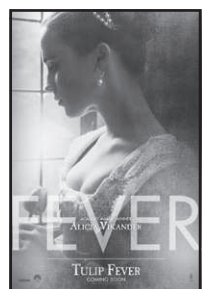
Also, I just have to mention the ending. The music during the finale perfectly encapsulated the emotions of the whole movie into one song and really ended the film on a spectacular note.

The other movie I saw this week was "Tulip Fever." Set in 17th century Amsterdam during the Dutch Tulip Mania, this movie tells the story of Sophia (Alicia Vikander), a young woman raised as an orphan, forced to marry a wealthy Dutch merchant (Christoph Waltz) to escape poverty.

Years later after bearing no heir, Sophia's husband commissions a series of portraits in hopes of leaving some sort of legacy. But Sophia finds herself falling in love with the hired painter (Dane DeHaan) and later begins a passionate affair with the struggling artist.

I guess that's the plot? I think? I'm honestly not sure. The story in this movie is all over the place.

Ididn't even mention Sophia's maid (Holliday Grainger) and her fishmonger boyfriend (Jack O'Connell) who tries to make his fortune in the tulip market.

It's not that the two don't have any chemistry together, it's just that the pair barely even interacts before deciding to run off and get romantic.

Heck, the maid and her fishmonger boyfriend have more interaction and they aren't even the top billed characters. That isn't to say their relationship is much better. This movie's filled with enough melodramatic garbage to make a soap opera jealous.

Long lasting, passionate relationships crumble in moments over simple and idiotic misunderstandings. Mix-ups that could be cleared up with 10 seconds of communication if the characters just bothered talking to one another. It so frustrating to watch.

The only reason anything tragic ever happens in this movie is because all the characters are dumb as a box of rocks and have seemingly mastered the ability to make the worst decisions possible at any given moment.

Why is Christoph Waltz and Judi Dench even in this? They're both incredibly talented performers, but they're completely wasted in this trash film.

Dench barely gets any screen time, which in hindsight is probably for the best. Somehow the more someone's featured in this film, the dumber they end up looking. Poor Waltz is forced into a one note role, given nothing to work with besides an obsession with legacy and zero interesting dialog.

I think the only actor I actually came away liking was Tom Hollander, who plays a pervy woman's doctor in the film. At least the man has a couple funny lines.

But that brings me to my final complaint. The tone of this movie is just all over the place.

One moment the film is over dramatic and serious, the next it feels like a screwball comedy, only then to be followed by a section where characters contemplate concepts like suicide.

It's so jarring. It's like they couldn't decide which kind of movie they wanted to make half way through production.

Please, stay far, far away from this movie. I know it's been slim pickings for romantic films lately, but this movie isn't the answer.

Fans of the genre deserve better than over dramatic pieces of trash like this film.

it was him – and we laughed and screamed the rest of the way and there's only a small chance either one of us will need therapy.

An email popped into my inbox the next day telling me all the secrets about roller coasters I never knew. Psychology is as much a part of the thrill as engineering, according to coaster consultant Brendan Walker. And it turns out the biggest thrill comes while you're sitting still.

"The moment the lap bar is being locked down and you have that feeling of things being inescapable, that you have to suffer the effects of the ride, is the highest moment of arousal," Walker says. "The actual ride might only achieve 80 percent of that excitement."

That's not the moment for me;

I don't mind the lap bar clicking into place. I get spooked chugging up that escalator, thinking about everything that could possibly go wrong, and my biggest panic moment comes when the coaster releases from the chain, because I know that's the point of no return and it's really, really high, and Aaaaaaaaaaaaaaaaaaaaah! Only sometimes I use other words when I'm not sitting next to a 10-year-old.

I learned that roller coasters are expensive to build. A single foot of tubular steel roller coaster track can cost upwards of \$40,000. And the 1999 PC game RollerCoaster Tycoon let you build them for a lot less money – you can buy a current version of the game for as little as \$5.99 – and brought a lot of people into the business. The

most expensive? Jurassic Park: The Ride at \$110 million.

Six Flags (NYSE: SIX), which relies on coasters to attract guests, was trading at about \$9 seven years ago. Today it's north of \$53 and in April hit a high of \$63.52. That's the sort of ride investors appreciate.

Silver Dollar City in Branson, Missouri, is going all-out; my final coaster clash came upon my return to work, where I found on my desk a press release (and some peanut brittle) peddling Silver Dollar City's newest, a crazy \$26 million, 53-mph, 3,000-foot-long, triple inversion Time Traveler coaster opening next year.

Maybe we'll ride it. And then we'll hit the therapist's couch.

Murder plea reached in 2015 case in Newcastle

Wineland draws life with parole

A 25-year-old Newcastle man will serve life in prison with the possibility of parole after pleading guilty August 25 to first degree murder.

Stephen E. Wineland entered the plea in McClain County District Court, avoiding a jury trial that was scheduled to start August 28.

He was charged after a former felony conviction. His sentence will run concurrent with that case. In 2013, Wineland was charged in Canadian County with robbery with a weapon. That charge was later amended to larceny of

an automobile.

The murder victim, Michael M. Martinez, was shot twice. A Newcastle police officer on patrol in the 900 block of Northeast 31st Street followed a blood trail to the body on November 19, 2015, when he noticed a flat tire standing up with a tire iron next to it.

On closer inspection, he found blood on the tire and a blood trail leading to the south. The officer called a supervisor and they followed the trail to a shoe in the tall grass.

Martinez' body was nearby and police recovered a 9 mm shell casing from the scene.

The victim's next of kin

took OSBI investigators to a house Martinez sometimes stayed at in southwest Oklahoma City.

A truck outside the residence belonged to the murdered man.

Agents watching the house while preparing a search warrant for the truck saw Wineland get into the truck with a duffel bag.

When Oklahoma City police tried to stop him, Wineland drove away. He abandoned the truck after a short pursuit, fleeing on foot.

When police caught him, a 9 mm handgun was found a few feet away.

Monarch Butterfly events at the Chickasaw Cultural Center

Enjoy the close of the summer season at the Chickasaw Cultural Center (CCC), 867 Cooper Memorial Road, in Sulphur.

Plan to visit September 16 to be introduced to the remarkable world of monarch butterflies and what the Chickasaw Nation is doing to assist these magnificent creatures.

The Chickasaw Nation will host its Monarch Butterfly Watch Day from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The day offers educational opportunities, beautiful views of nature and documentary films concerning butterflies.

With recent additions to life-sustaining milkweed and nectar-rich plants growing in CCC flowerbeds and in a "hoop" greenhouse constructed last year, visitors are likely to spot monarchs making their annual migratory trek south to wintering grounds in Mexico.

"The Monarch Butterfly Watch Day is geared toward families and includes pollinator games, make and take giveaways, tours, movies and free milkweed plants," said Thalia Miller, CCC horticulture director.

"We will give a brief presentation of what the Chickasaw Nation and six Oklahoma tribes are doing to increase monarch habitat by planting thousands of milkweed (plants) on tribal properties."

The Chickasaw Nation is dedicated to increasing the monarch butterfly population in America.

Activities include:
10 a.m. to 4 p.m.—Milkweed giveaway in an outside area east of Aaitafama on the CCC campus. The plants make it possible for visitors to help monarchs thrive in home flowerbeds.

10 a.m. to 4 p.m.—Make and takes in CCC Chikasha Poya Exhibit Hall Plaza.

10:30 a.m.—Butterfly Garden tour – meet at square flowerbed in Plaza.

11:45 a.m. — Anoli Theater, a brief overview of the Monarch Habitat Project.

Noon — Anoli Theater – film "Flight of the Butterflies" (44 minutes).

12:45 p.m. — Anoli Theater, a question and answer session will be held.

1:30 p.m. — Butterfly Garden Tour—meet at square flowerbed in Plaza.

2:30 p.m.—Anoli Theater will host a brief overview of the Monarch Habitat Project.

2:45 p.m.—Anoli Theater, film "The Incredible Journey of the Butterflies" (56 minutes).

3:45 p.m. — Anoli Theater – question and answer session concerning the film and day's activities.

In 2014, MonarchWatch.org, a University of Kansas educational outreach program, estimated the average area of monarch colony sites in Mexico covered only 1.65 acres, a 20-year low.

The Chickasaw Nation and six other Oklahoma tribes have partnered with Monarch Watch to give the insects a fighting chance of surviving and thriving.

Monarch caterpillars feed only on milkweed plants. Monarchs must lay eggs on milkweed so their offspring will feed.

Caterpillars then spin themselves into cocoons and come out a few weeks later as brilliantly-colored insects.

The Chickasaw Nation is responding by planting milkweed and nectar plants throughout 13-counties in Oklahoma.

Ms. Miller oversaw the planting of milkweed, fruit trees and nectar-producing plants at the cultural center.

"While the milkweed plant is very important, the nectar plants are also," she said. "For that reason, we have filled our gardens with plants that produce large amounts of nectar, such as Coreopsis, Solidago, Monardo

and Echinacea."

The "hoop" greenhouse, located near the CCC Traditional Village, offers a controlled enclosure for growing plants year-round. Monarchs may enter and depart the structure safely.

Autopsies reveal a march of infant deaths tied to unsafe sleeping in state

In October of last year, a two-month-old infant from Kiowa County died after co-sleeping with her parents.

Her mother woke up to find her father's arm partially obscuring her face, according to an autopsy report, which attributed her death to probable asphyxiation due to "overlay."

In May of last year, a six-month-old Tulsa County infant died from suffocation after co-sleeping with an adult and a sibling on an adult bed. The baby was found unresponsive between the mattress and wall with his face in a pillow.

Three months earlier, a five-month-old Oklahoma City infant was found dead in her crib with her one-year-old sibling lying on top of her.

Despite more than two decades of national and state safe-sleep campaigns, unsafe sleeping practices are playing a significant role in dozens of infant deaths across Oklahoma each year.

An Oklahoma Watch review of autopsy reports from 2014 to 2016 found that 149 children under age 1, or around 50 a year, died in circumstances in which co-sleeping, sleeping in unsafe sleep environments, or both, were involved or suspected at the time of their deaths.

The deaths comprised about 12 percent of all infant deaths in the state during the three years, but they made up 64 percent of cases in which autopsies were performed. The infant deaths, many of which appear to have been preventable, contributed to Oklahoma's relatively high infant mortality rate.

Co-sleeping is when infants sleep in beds or on couches or other surfaces with adults or other children. Unsafe sleep environments include couches, adult beds, cribs, bassinets or playpens that contain items that raise the likelihood of suffocation, such as stuffed animals, pillows or blankets. Sleeping in swings and car seats also can be dangerous.

State data suggests that many mothers in the state co-sleep with their infant children. A 2014 Oklahoma State Department of Health report, based on earlier survey data, found that nearly 75 percent of mothers reported co-sleeping at least some of the time. (The analysis looked only at first-time mothers who breastfed for at least eight weeks, in order to reduce potential bias from previous breastfeeding and infant-sleep experiences.)

"That's a major issue, and ... most people feel like they're being nurturing by sleeping with their infant, not realizing that it's really dangerous," said Joyce Marshall, director of maternal and child health services for the state health department.

Along with maternal tobacco use, unsafe sleeping is a significant issue in infant mortality, said Kelli McNeal, who oversees maternal and child health outreach and fetal and infant mortality review for the Oklahoma City-County Health Department.

"We know babies should be placed on their back to sleep, but there are a lot of other issues surrounding infant safe sleep that people just aren't aware of, like what the crib should look like, the fact that infants really should be ... hopefully room-sharing with parents that first year," McNeal said.

The American Academy of Pediatrics warns against co-sleeping, which is associated with increased risks of suffocation, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) and Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID). The latter en-

compasses SIDS, accidental suffocation and strangulation, and deaths due to unknown causes.

Despite the warnings, many parents and some health experts argue that co-sleeping in a bed with an infant can be done safely and promotes breastfeeding and mother-child bonding.

An Invisible Toll

Pathologists for the state medical examiner rarely list co-sleeping or unsafe sleep practices as the cause of death. Instead their reports often cite Sudden Unexplained Infant Death, asphyxia, an illness such



as bronchitis or undetermined.

The references to sleeping are noted as "other significant medical conditions" or a contributing factor. But many reports offer details that are stark and tragic.

A seven-month-old Pushmataha County boy is found dead lying face down in a crib with blankets, a bumper pad, a stuffed animal, clothes and pacifiers, all of which pose risks of suffocation.

A three-month-old child in Choctaw County dies after co-sleeping with two adults and two older children in an adult bed.

A seven-month-old Tulsa County infant with a respiratory illness dies while co-sleeping on her stomach with her father on a couch.

Some deaths involve suspected use of drugs or neglect or mistreatment by a parent. But many reflect the risk of what seem to be simple loving gestures on the part of parents, who perhaps are tired or become careless in seeking warmth for, or closeness with, their children. Many parents may not even know what's safe or what isn't.

Many families whose children died live in lower-income areas, often in apartments, autopsy reports and Census Bureau data show. Two infants died while sleeping in day care centers — one in a carrier, the other lying prone.

The average age of death for the 149 children was a little over four months.

Infant deaths are rarely reported in the news media, further obscuring the widespread problem of unsafe sleeping.

A Public Health Concern

Encouraging safe sleep remains an active public health campaign.

The Oklahoma Child Death Review Board recommended last year that all hospitals that deliver babies educate families on safe sleeping practices after a birth. In 2015, the board, which reviews all child deaths in the state, studied 112 deaths over multiple years related to unsafe sleep environments.

"I think people, really most Oklahomans, want their baby to be safe, but it's hard getting the message out and understanding what is safe for a baby and what is not, because some of those recommendations have changed over the years," Marshall said.

Until a few decades ago, doctors and other medical professionals told parents to place their babies on their stomachs to sleep. In the early 1990s,

the American Academy of Pediatrics began recommending that caregivers place infants on their backs instead, which led to a dramatic decrease in SIDS cases. The national SIDS rate has continued to decline, in part because deaths that had been reported as SIDS began to be recorded as accidental suffocation or having an unknown cause, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports.

Co-Sleeping Advocates

Alora Brinkley, a Yukon mother of five, briefly became the unwitting public face of co-sleeping earlier this year after a Facebook post of her lying next to her infant daughter and two-year-old son went viral and made international news.

Her husband, David Brinkley, took the picture and posted it on Facebook, praising his wife for being a loving mother. Soon anti-co-sleeping commenters criticized or scorned the couple, telling them they were terrible parents or should have their children taken away.

"Parent shaming" is what Alora Brinkley calls it. "We literally live in a world where you can't love your kids too much."

She said she supports mothers' decisions about co-sleeping and expects them to support hers. Even among her moms' group, no one agrees on every parenting choice the others make, she said.

The Brinkleys began co-sleeping when they had their fourth child. They didn't want to miss out on what they felt was a meaningful parenting experience. When they had their fifth, co-sleeping was a given.

Brinkley said she researched co-sleeping and spoke to her pediatrician, who encouraged her to use a co-sleeping bed. Sweeping prohibitions against co-sleeping don't take into account individual parents' needs, Brinkley said.

"I just don't think that there can be any logical science behind it necessarily, because every situation is different," she said.

Brinkley, who is Vietnamese, said co-sleeping is common in countries such as Vietnam. Multiple families often live under the same roof, so there's

no room to spare, she said.

"People have been doing it since the caveman era," she said.

Alternatives to Bed-Sharing

Many other parents and some health experts believe co-sleeping is beneficial and can be done safely. But top state and local health officials and the American Academy of Pediatrics disagree, saying all co-sleeping is dangerous. Even secure sleepers for adult beds are not recommended because research on their safety is lacking. Instead, experts recommend room-sharing.

"It's not safe to ever sleep with your infant," said McNeal, of the Oklahoma City-County Health Department. "I think there's a lot of misunderstanding about that. Of course, we want you to be close to your baby. Of course, we want you to breastfeed your baby, but then we really want you to have them in their own sleep space. That allows you to sleep better and ultimately allows them to sleep better."

For some families, the issue is money: They can't afford a crib or cribs.

The state health department began a pilot program in 2015 to provide portable cribs and sleep sacks, a wearable blanket similar to a sleeping bag, to new parents who are lower income. In its first year, the program gave away 364 cribs, Marshall said.

"The need has been significantly higher than realized," she said.

The program, funded with a \$45,000 grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, led to a 30 percent drop in co-sleeping from January 2016 to February 2017, surveys show. The program ended in April, but the state obtained federal block grant funds to continue the project, which is ongoing.

Bluegrass fiddler brings lifetime of experience to stage at McSwain Theatre September 9

It's not often a world famous musician who bolstered an entirely new musical genre is available to give you a live performance.

Three-time National Fiddle Champion Byron Berline extends that opportunity 7 p.m., Saturday, September 9, at the historic McSwain Theatre, 130 W. Main Street, Ada, Oklahoma.

On the corner of Oklahoma Avenue and Wentz Street, Berline's Double Stop Fiddle Shop and Music Hall has stood tall since 1995. Hand-crafted instruments – some centuries old – hang on nearly every wall. Photographs, records, awards, books and mementos fill any space a fiddle, guitar, mandolin or banjo doesn't fill.

Stepping inside, you might find the 73-year-old Berline manning his post behind the front counter.

He might tell you only 70 years ago a new sound – with roots deep in the soil of America – sprouted up with rich vocal harmonies and a flurry of picking, strumming, plucking and bowing.

This convergence of musical styles is called "bluegrass."

Settlers and immigrants coming to the land of opportunity brought their music with them, including Irish jigs, reels, British ballads, waltzes, gypsy instrumentals and hauntingly beautiful folk singing.

Some of these newcomers settled in North America's Appalachian region, where sounds and songs mixed and stewed among the mountain folk. You can hear the echoes of these times in today's bluegrass music.

It wasn't until the 1940s when the multicultural concoction made its way down out of the mountains and into broad popularity. And it wasn't until the mid-1940s when Berline's story intersected with bluegrass.

By the hands of only a few musicians – among them mandolinist Bill Monroe, banjo players Ralph Stanley and Earl Scruggs, and master guitar flat-picker Lester Flatt – bluegrass was introduced to the masses.

With its burst of popularity, a young Berline soaked in more than a few bluegrass tunes over the radio while growing up where southern Kansas and northern Oklahoma meet just west of Interstate 35.

It was in Caldwell, Kan., Berline's father introduced him to the fiddle. He showed young Berline how to play "Mississippi Sawyer."

"It was the easiest tune my dad knew at the time, but it wasn't really easy," Berline said. "He'd just show me. He'd play it and say 'here, look at me do it. Now you do it.'"

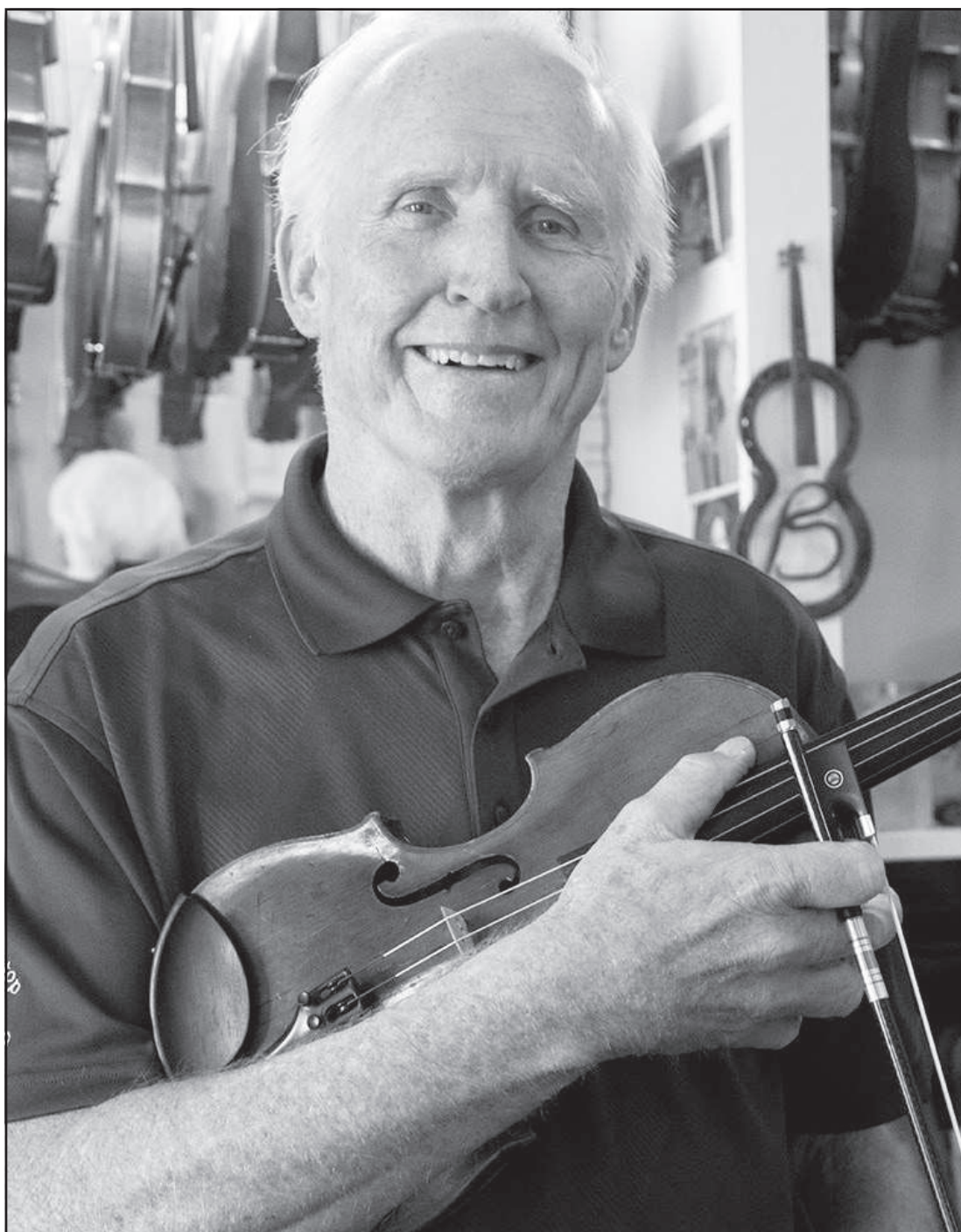
These early days are when Berline picked up some of his father's unique fiddling techniques. It's when he began playing by ear. "You have to feel it," Berline's father would tell him.

"You have to listen to it, get it in your head and then go from there – especially with bluegrass," Berline said. "It's like a poem or song. You don't want to read it constantly, you want to know it enough to be able to express yourself with it."

The 1940s were winding down while Berline's lifelong relationship to the genre was winding up.

"I remember always being around music growing up. We grew wheat and raised purebred shorthorn cattle on a farm and ranch," Berline said. "We'd listen to the radio and I'd hear people like Bill Monroe and (Western Swing innovator) Bob Wills. We would listen to the Grand Ol' Opry."

It wasn't all merely listening. The Berline family performed anywhere they could find a

stage.

Berline and family found their way to fiddle contests in Oklahoma and Kansas. At contests, he first met other players and learned new tunes.

"I went to my first contest at 13 and met Buster Jenkins, which was his stage name. Frank Canard was his real name. He inspired me a lot," Berline said. "He taught me how to play 'Black Mountain Rag' and taught me how to tune the fiddle. He said, 'You're gonna be a good fiddler someday.'"

In 1962, the University of Oklahoma awarded Berline an athletic scholarship. He had a knack for throwing javelin.

But it was his knack for the fiddle and a chance encounter with The Dillards (probably best known as "The Darlings" on The Andy Griffith Show) during a campus show. It was by happenstance Berline's life path was changed.

He remembers the time and place clearly.

"I'll never forget, the first day I got on the show was Nov. 22, 1963 – the same day President Kennedy was killed. That's the same day I met the Dillards," Berline said. "They were the most unbelievable bluegrass band I'd ever heard."

He said they jammed together on campus that afternoon during the show "Friday at 4." Afterward, the group invited him to perform with them at an off-campus show later that same night.

The next week, he returned to campus with his father's tape recorder and the Dillards were back for more.

"We recorded a bunch of fiddle tunes. They asked me to record an album with them. They had to fly me out to California. It was their third album called 'Pickin' and Fiddlin' from 1965," Berline said.

That same year, he and his dad were invited to attend the Newport Folk Festival in Rhode Island. It was there Berline met the 'Father of Bluegrass' Bill Monroe.

For anyone counting, this makes two life-altering chance encounters for Berline in a

year. Being at the right place at the right time was only half the battle. Luck only goes so far, but Berline had the skill on the fiddle to take him the rest of the way.

"When I met Bill Monroe I knew who he was. I had listened to him on the Grand Ol' Opry all this time. He started the first bluegrass band in 1946 with Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs, Chubby Wise and Cedric Rainwater," Berline said.

"He was the guy – I mean, he was the guy to learn from. It was going into the major leagues playing with him. So when he asked me to join his band, I thought it was great," Berline said.

Problem was Berline hadn't yet finished his degree at the University of Oklahoma. He told Monroe to come back around in two years. Monroe did in 1967 and Berline made his way to Nashville on a new musical adventure.

But not before marrying his college sweetheart, Bette.

"She was from Guthrie. I met her at the University of Oklahoma," Berline said. "I was a senior and she was a graduate student getting a degree in piano. She loved sports and music and that's what I love, so we had a lot in common. Still do."

Alongside Monroe, Berline wrote songs and learned new ones. These songs are still among Berline's repertoire when performing biweekly in Guthrie; tunes such as "Gold Rush," "Virginia Darlin'," or "Sally Goodin."

It was a nice gig, but it didn't last as long as Berline might have hoped. In September '67, he was drafted into the U.S. Army.

"I was very lucky, because I got to play the fiddle and throw the javelin in the Army," Berline said. "Being a draftee, a lot of my friends went off to Vietnam. Some came back and some didn't."

Berline caught a lucky break in basic training. He was assigned to organize and perform music during family day. He scoured the ranks looking for capable musicians but came up

empty-handed.

"So I called up my friends the Stone Mountain Boys out of Dallas, Texas. They brought me a fiddle and came to Fort Polk, got there about 8 o'clock and the show started at 9," Berline said.

"We went up, played every fast thing we knew. People went crazy," Berline said. "The colonel came running to me afterward and said 'Ah, you gotta play for the officer's club! You gotta do this, you gotta do that!' He went on and on," Berline said.

The day before he was discharged, Doug Dillard telephoned Berline and asked him to come to California and work up some recordings alongside Gene Clark.

In 1969, Berline and his wife moved west. This kicked off the years Berline spent writing fiddle music for movies and performing with a bunch of noteworthy bands.

Berline's musical touch can be heard on shows and movies such as: "Star Trek," "Blue Collar," "Back to the Future Part III" and "Run Simon Run."

Living and working in California allowed for recording gigs with bands like The Rolling Stones, Bob Dylan, Elton John, The Byrds, the Flying Burrito Brothers and Willie Nelson.

All of this didn't stop Berline from forming and performing with a whole slew of his own bands, including "Byron Berline and Sundance," "California," "Berline, Crary and Hickman," and "Country Gazette."

In 1995, he and his wife decided to leave California. They returned to Bette's hometown.

"I had already done what I needed to do in L.A. I wanted to find a store and music hall. I wanted to concentrate on having my own place to play and having a place I could house these instruments (collected since 1987)," Berline said.

The Double Stop Fiddle Shop and Music Hall became everything Berline needed. Every instrument had its space and Berline had plenty of time

Stabbing sparks charges

Bond set at \$100K for Purcell man

A knife attack has landed the alleged assailant in the McClain County Detention Center in lieu of a \$100,000 bond.

Trampas L. Deaton, 48, of Purcell, is charged in McClain County District Court with assault and battery with a dangerous weapon.

Prosecutors filed the charge after 13 former felony convictions dating back to 1996.

According to an affidavit, Purcell police were called to a disturbance at 1931 N. 9th Ave., on the morning of July 20.

En route to that address, however, they were informed a bleeding man had knocked on a door at Wind Ridge Apartments and told the woman there he had been stabbed.

The woman told police she gave the man a towel and he left.

Cpl. Rick Adkins and Officer Daniel Ashbridge found Braun Skaggs Jr., walking in the 500

block of Hallmark Boulevard.

Skaggs told police he'd been stabbed by Deaton. An ambulance was called and Skaggs was taken to OU Medical Center.

A 19-year-old Midwest City man is in the McClain County Jail in lieu of a \$52,000 bond after he allegedly attempted to lure a 12-year-old Purcell girl to meet him.

McClain County District Court prosecutors charged Cameron D. Berry with possession of juvenile pornography, contributing to the delinquency of minors and obstructing an

officer.

His preliminary hearing conference will be at 9 a.m. September 6.

According to an affidavit, Purcell police were called to the girl's home in the 1700 block of Briarwood shortly after 9 p.m. on August 19.

The girl's father said she disappeared from the garage about 10 minutes earlier.

Residents reported seeing a girl walking in the dark and police were able to quickly locate her in the 300 block of North 4th Avenue by pinging her cell phone.

But when approached by an officer, she reportedly tried to get away, saying she needed to help a friend.

Instead, police took her home where she told officers she was meeting Berry.

With permission from the girl's mother, police searched the girl's phone and found the number she had a conversation with immediately prior to leaving home.

While police were examining the phone there was an

incoming call from that number which Sgt. Heather Kaluzny answered.

The caller was Berry, according to the affidavit, who said he was four miles from Purcell.

Kaluzny told him to meet her at Mazzio's and contacted him in the parking lot when he arrived.

Berry initially gave police a false name but was unable to spell it. He also gave his birthdate as 20/9/16, according to the affidavit.

He eventually gave police his phone and permission to search it.

There were text messages between Berry and the girl, who reportedly was aware he was 19.

Berry also knew the girl was under age, although she had texted her age as 13, almost 14.

Police also found on his phone a Facebook post where a girl had sent him a photo of herself nude from the waist up and asked him how old he thought she was.

Berry's guess was 10; that girl was also 12.

Department of Transportation. "We thank the people of Purcell and Lexington for their patience in 2014 and are so excited that this day has already come."

Construction is expected to take two years and when completed, the new 4-lane bridge will also feature a sidewalk for pedestrian traffic.

Half of the new bridge will be built alongside the existing structure and all traffic will be moved over.

This first phase is expected to take about one year to complete.

The old bridge will then be removed to make room for the second half of the new bridge. This will allow the bridge, which carries more than 10,000 vehicles per day, to remain open during all stages of the two-year construction.

ODOT closed the bridge for more than four months in 2014

as a safety measure after several cracks were discovered during a final inspection following bridge rehabilitation work.

ODOT brought in national experts, Modjeski and Masters, whose engineers found bridge builders in 1938 had used a rare manganese alloy instead of steel in constructing the bridge.

The alloy, not found on any other bridges in Oklahoma, is prone to cracking when welded.

Repairs to the bridge were completed in June 2014 and the bridge was reopened to traffic, albeit with a load posting.

Frequent safety inspections have been the norm since then.

The emergency closure turned a 3-minute drive between the two towns into a 45-minute detour up I-35 and across Norman.

In 2014, ODOT's 8-year construction work plan didn't include the James C. Nance

Memorial Bridge.

But ODOT set about to fast track the pre-construction process.

For the first time, the agency began designing the new bridge at the same time the environmental review was being conducted.

Typically, detailed design doesn't begin until after the environmental review process is completed and the proposed project is reviewed by state and federal resource agencies for impacts to the human and natural environment.

"All of the stakeholders recognized the importance of replacing this bridge quickly and came together to help fast-track this project and get it to bid in three years, rather than 10," Chief Engineer Casey Shell said. "It's a testament to the good working relationship ODOT has with our

state and federal partners."

The bridge's historic significance weighed heavily during the planning and environmental review process, which included a public meeting and comment period in 2015.

ODOT also consulted with the Oklahoma State Historic Preservation Office, the cities of Purcell and Lexington and other preservation groups on the best plan to address the bridge.

ODOT was able to preserve the existing intersection at Canadian Avenue in Purcell.

The design of the new bridge incorporates aesthetic elements of the historic structure, including reuse of some of the original railing on top of the bridge. Educational displays with information on the structure's history will also be erected at each end of the bridge for the public to view.

Saddles:

All had been displayed for years in the popular eatery, adding authenticity to Smokin' Joe's western ambience.

But at a price.

So much of the restaurant's inviting aroma had settled on the leather that the saddles smelled more like barbecue than, well, saddles.

In fact, once the saddles were inside Schneder's Handlebar Saddle & Leather Repair Shop in downtown Purcell, their aroma was so enticing that Schneder and his wife, Mary, opted to deliver the restored saddles back to Smokin Joe's personally so they could experience the restaurant.

Cantle plates and conchos, unrecognizable as sterling silver, were restored to gleaming perfection.

As Schneder began the task of cleaning and restoring the saddles, the history they represented became evident.

Starting with those won by Purcell's Joyce Kernek during a storied barrel racing career.

Kernek, who has probably won too many trophy saddles to count, grew up on her family's cattle ranch in the mountains of New Mexico.

So far into the mountains that there was no electricity. "My great-grandfather and great-grandmother came to the Mogollon Mountains of New Mexico," she said.

Kernek was just a girl when she first got her hands on *Western Horseman* magazine. A neighbor brought her all of his old copies.

And what she saw in those issues was kind of an epiphany for Kernek.

You see there were two sisters – Sherry and Florence Price from Addington, Okla., – who were world class barrel racers.

"I thought some day I will do that," Kernek recalled. "Something sparked inside my heart."

She taught herself the sport – lessons learned the hard way.

Kernek's self-taught lessons would eventually pay off when she won her first buckle at a county fair.

When she started college at New Mexico State University, she continued rodeoing on the college team.

In 1962 she and a teammate got word that one of the prizes for Miss Rodeo New Mexico was a set of luggage.

Neither girl had a set of luggage so they entered the contest. Kernek competed on a horse borrowed from the teammate.

"I won the horsemanship and Miss Rodeo New Mexico and we split the set of luggage," she said.

She would go on to win the title Miss Rodeo America in 1963.

She majored in nutrition/dietetics and psychology in college, but never completed her degree.

The rodeo world beckoned instead.

"I have never not known what I wanted to do," she said. "Thank you, God, I've been able to do what I wanted and am still doing it.

"God has a plan and God's plan for my life has been blessed."

She rodeoed "off and on for probably eight years." During that time, she competed twice at the National Finals Rodeo, winning the world title in 1970 with barrel racing earnings of \$10,600.

Compare that to the women on the circuit today. In early August, the No. 1 barrel racer in the country had already earned more than \$240,000 for the year.

"When I ran, if I didn't win, I didn't eat. Now they have sponsors that cover

expenses," she said.

"I wanted to be the first woman to be Miss Rodeo America and win the barrel racing titles in different associations so I could set up a training stable," she said.

Kernek won a world championship in ribbon roping, flag racing and all-around back when all-girl rodeos were a huge draw.

To win the all-around title and a horse trailer, a girl had to ride rough stock, as well as compete in the timed events. Wanting to win that trailer led to Kernek's first – and last – foray into bull riding.

She married Barry Burk after her one-year reign as Miss Rodeo America and later married noted reining horse trainer Bob Loomis. Wells is their daughter.

She has been training top barrel horses for the public since 1971.

In 1974, Kernek won an American Quarter Horse Association championship with Man O War Leo, a half brother to her world champion pro horse, War Leo Dude.

"I work with a lot of kids and also interns from other countries," she said. "I've been to Brazil 17 times. Barrel racing went world wide."

To say the sport's popularity has skyrocketed is an understatement.

And for that Kernek credits Claude Cope, a former Navy Seal, who came up with the notion of 4D barrel racing.

"That has changed the whole face of barrel racing. That and big money at the NFR," she said.

Kernek has sold horses to the Czech Republic and noted there are rodeos now in China and Japan.

"Oklahomans have shipped so many horses to different countries," she said.

Wells has followed in her mother's footsteps.

She won her first world championship in junior barrel racing in 1984.

She took a break from horse shows and rodeos to spend time in Austria and Spain.

When she returned to the States, she decided to run for Miss Rodeo Oklahoma.

Kernek and Wells are the only mother and daughter to win horsemanship in national queen competition.

And it is likely Wells is the only competitor to win horsemanship back-to-back in separate national queen contests.

She won horsemanship in the Miss Rodeo America contest in 1998. The following year she competed in the Miss Rodeo USA contest, winning both horsemanship and the crown.

Kernek came to Oklahoma when Loomis relocated his ranch from Nebraska to Love County in the 1980s.

Following their divorce some 24 years ago, she moved to McClain County.

After five years of being single, Kernek was determined to never marry again.

But then a friend introduced her to George Kernek, a former professional baseball player with the St. Louis Cardinals.

The first time they met, he told her, "I'm scared to death of horses."

On August 8, they celebrated their 19th anniversary.

In their 70s now, the idea of downsizing and retiring is sounding more attractive. Kernek's training and clinic schedule is time demanding and the ranch is "a lot to take care of."

But she's not ready just yet to do more than talk about someday letting go of their ranch.

"If I ever live to look out a window and not see a horse, I think that would be a bad thing for me."

Guilty:

a loaded firearm.

Jurors recommended Moore serve five years in prison on the first count and three years on the second count, along with a \$500 fine on count three.

Moore, who had been free on a \$50,000 bond, will await sentencing in the Cleveland County Jail following the guilty verdict.

"Moore consistently ignored the law, circumstance and consequences," said Assistant District Attorney SuAnne Carlson. "And in doing so, Faught died."

Defense attorney Jay Silvernail argued that parents who let children go to a known party house or who didn't make sure where they were bear the responsibility for Faught's death, not Moore.

"If we are going to lay blame, we need to lay blame where it needs to be," he said.

Another adult, Tonya Moss,

35, also of Wanette, pleaded guilty to the same charges in May 2016 and was sentenced to 20 years with one year concurrent.

Faught was a Lexington High School freshman when he attended a party hosted by Moss' 16-year-old son at the couple's Wanette residence on March 28, 2015.

Faught was found non-responsive in a bathroom on the morning of March 29.

According to an affidavit, Moore and Moss had gone to a casino at Shawnee and returned home after Moss's son told her Faught was dead.

She attempted to revive Faught with CPR and left the house with Moore before authorities arrived.

Investigators with the Cleveland County Sheriff's Department found marijuana and

pills in the house, as well as numerous beer cans and empty liquor bottles.

Moss' son said he acquired the liquor from a Hispanic man outside the liquor store in Lexington and that the beer was brought to the party by the guests.

He said that Faught and another teen were drinking straight vodka and became very intoxicated. He said he helped put the pair to bed in his room.

Moss said at the time she knew her son drank alcohol and would rather he drink at home.

Moore, Moss and Moss' son were later detained on a traffic stop in Lexington after Moss failed to keep an appointment for a follow-up interview with detectives.

In the pickup with them were several changes of clothing, as well as newly purchased toiletries and firearms.

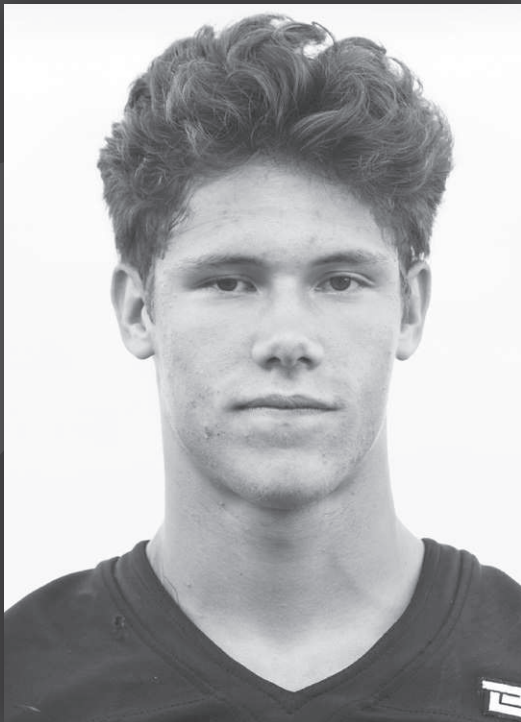

One for the History Books

From 1892 to 1895, a young man named Will Rogers traveled a 40-mile cattle trail from his family ranch near Oologah to Willie Hallsell College, a Methodist boarding school near Vinita. That trail became part of U.S. Highway 66 in 1926.

Rogers played a major role in publicizing the "Mother Road" with his syndicated newspaper columns on the 1928 Bunion Derby and on Model-T Ford drivers racing from Claremore to Beverly Hills, Calif., wrote Joseph H. Carter in *Route 66 Magazine*.

A congressional resolution to name Route 66 in honor of Will Rogers was considered in 1935 but was not finalized. The highway was unofficially dubbed the Will Rogers Highway by the U.S. Highway 66 Association in 1952.

Oklahoma's first Will Rogers monument was established in 1999 by the Will Rogers Monument Committee of Vinita, said Amber Egnor of the Vinita Area Chamber of Commerce. Historical markers were placed along Route 66 from Chicago to Los Angeles. The life of Will Rogers and his place in Route 66 history are now showcased in the Will Rogers Memorial Museum on a Claremore hillside.

Route 66 also has become famous for iconic sites and businesses, which are celebrated by the "Crossroads of Commerce: A History of Free Enterprise in Oklahoma" exhibit at the Oklahoma History Center in Oklahoma City.

"A contrasting reaction to the accelerating pace of life in the 1960s and 1970s was the growing allure of two-lane roads and lost Americana," said Dr. Bob Blackburn, executive director of OHS. "Reinforced

by the fruits of historic preservation at both the national and local levels, a new business sector emerged that banked on the public's attraction to neon signs, forgotten motor courts and roadside attractions.

"There was no better place to find those treasures than on Route 66, known as the Mother Road or Will Rogers Highway."

A video in the "Crossroads of Commerce" exhibit describes iconic sites and businesses along Route 66. One of those businesses, an early way station in Oklahoma, was a two-story stucco structure built in 1929 a few miles east of Weatherford. The most famous owner was Lucille Hammons, who lived there, operated the service station and managed the adjacent motor court. Now known as Lucille's, the building is visible from Int. Hwy. 40.

Another site on the Will Rogers Highway is the Foyil Totem Pole Park. In 1937, this famous folk art attraction was developed by manual arts teacher Ed Galloway. The central totem pole featured a 90-foot-tall piece of painted concrete on the back of a turtle with 200 images of American Indians, symbols and animal figures.

During the early 1970s, Hugh Davis built Route 66's iconic Blue Whale next to a spring-fed pond near Catoosa. Davis added picnic tables, sand beaches and a replica of Noah's Ark. Over time the Blue Whale fell into disrepair, but in recent years community groups have restored this attraction.

In 2007, Oklahoma oilman and entrepreneur Aubrey McClendon opened a new addition to the Will Rogers Highway sightseeing list, POPS. Designed by award-winning architect Rand Elliot, POPS

featured a modern gas station, restaurant, gift shop and event venue.

POPS also features a 66-foot-tall sculptural pop bottle, illuminated by LED lights, and a 110-foot cantilevered canopy.

"Inside, the road theme continued with souvenirs and more than 600 different pop varieties, including more than 80 root beers," said Blackburn. "As Oklahoma natives McClendon and Elliot proved the substance and spirit of Route 66 is still alive."

The story of Will Rogers Highway, and the ways that historic preservation along Route 66 contributes to local economies, can be found in exhibits at the OHS's Oklahoma Route 66 Museum in Clinton.

"A few years ago, the friends of the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum Inc., with the assistance of Virgil Smith, completely restored a Valentine Diner as a special exhibit at the museum," said Pat Smith, director of the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum. "People travel Route 66 from across the United States and around the world to see the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum, which is the largest museum dedicated to the history and culture of Route 66 from Chicago to Santa Monica."

"This proves that preservation along Route 66 enhances community revitalization, economic development and sustainable tourism along America's iconic Mother Road."

"Nostalgia has made vacationing on Route 66 a popular pastime," said Blackburn. "Historic preservation along Route 66 has ensured that a new generation can enjoy the simple pleasures of a road trip, and that local economies remain vibrant."

played a good game. Still, Lexington is off to its first 2-0 start in five years.

In 2012, the 'Dogs walloped Maysville, 54-0, before defeating Little Axe, 36-20, in their second contest that season.

After a scoreless first quarter last Thursday, the Indians struck the first blow on the scoreboard when David Santiago, a 5-foot-8, 135-pounder, scooted 30 yards into the end zone for the first tally of the game in the second quarter.

The Indians went for two but failed to convert.

Santiago is listed as a "scat-back," or a running back that is valued for speed and athletic ability over size and brute strength - more of a utility back than a traditional running back.

"They had a really fast kid (in Santiago) who scored for them and he was good!," Berglan said.

"He was extremely fast and effective. But, we started slow and we bobbled the snap a few times and had some penalties when we had the ball at first. We're still a 'work in progress' but our defense played a great game again.

"We just need to do a better job of wrapping up the ball carrier. If we do that, they wouldn't have scored that touchdown. We were flying around to the ball which is good. We just have to do a better job of wrapping up."

Lexington answered Little Axe's only score when junior quarterback Toby Prevost con-

nected with sophomore tight end Nathan Clegg for a 29-yard touchdown pass to make it 7-6 at halftime in favor of the 'Dawgs.

In the fourth quarter, Prevost found junior wide receiver Andre Ibarra wide open for a 45-yard touchdown pass. Senior running back Zach Smith (who rushed for 172 yards on 26 carries) capped off his usual outstanding performance with a 4-yard punch into the end zone for the final tally.

Caden Jones was good on every one of his extra-point kicks.

Next up for Lexington is a home game against Stratford at 7:30 p.m. Friday. Stratford is 0-2 after losses to Hobart (32-8) and Healdton (34-7) but Berglan still thinks they are a force to be reckoned with.

Stratford is only two years removed from when it won the Class A state football championship with a 67-28 win over Cashion in 2015.

"Stratford always plays good football year in and year out," Berglan said. "They are as good as I can remember. They are going to be a 'Power-I' team on offense that will do a lot with their play-action game. They will probably throw a little bit more this year than they have in the past. They'll try to hit you with the run and then get behind you with the play-action stuff - lots of boots and waggles. Defensively, they run a 3-4 just like us."

Head coach **Dale Berglan's** nominations for Player of the Week honors included **Zach Smith** on offense and sophomore defensive back **Jaylen Cottrell** on defense. 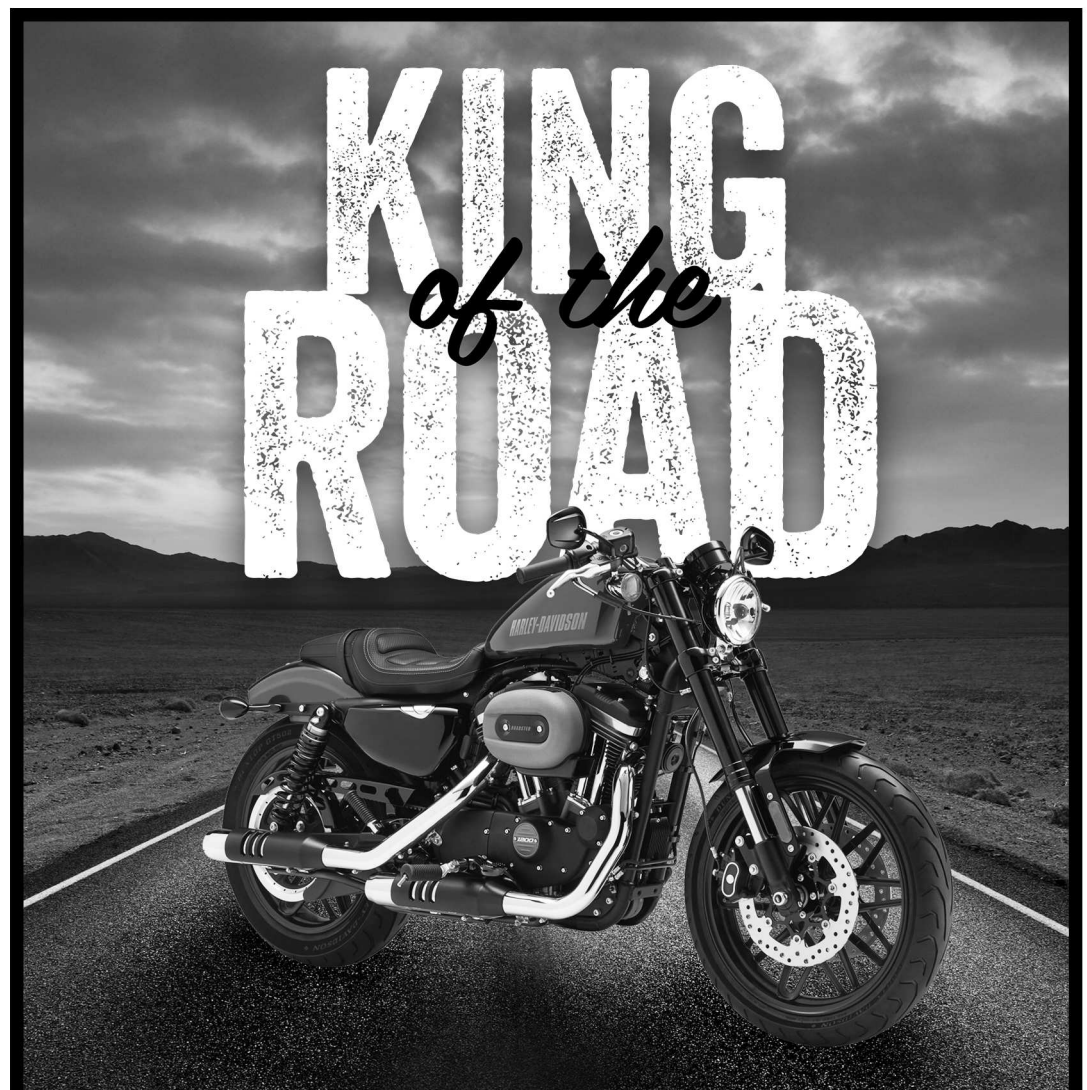

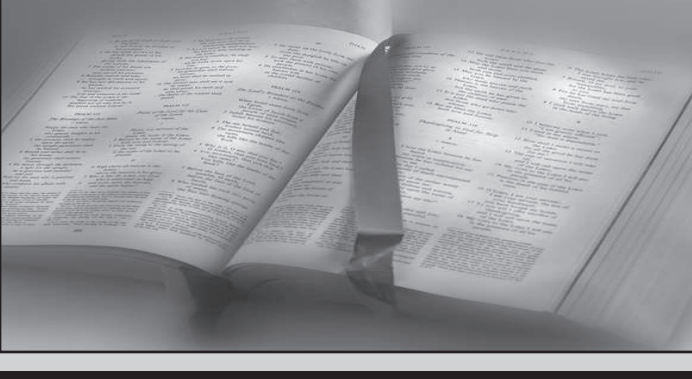

Good week to all. Welcome to the "front porch."

Maybe I'm just a little old-fashioned. But I wanted to come to our visit today and tell you something that I still believe:

I still believe the Bible means what it says.

And - as my father-in-law Bill Dickinson says - it also says what it means. This applies to Romans 8:26, too.

I pick Romans 8:26 because, to my absolute and utter dismay, I have heard too many preachers stand before audiences and preach that the Holy Spirit does not intercede for us when we pray.

The apostle Paul - guided by the Spirit Himself - writes to the Roman Christians, saying, "Likewise the Spirit also helps in our weaknesses. For we do not know what we should pray for as we ought, but the Spirit Himself makes intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered."

What an amazing passage! What great promises, what comfort, what hope, what joy! How beautiful for a Christian to know that through it all - through life's many disappointments, through all the difficulties that we face, even as those Christians are facing in this context (vs. 22-25) - we have some great assurances!

One, Paul says, the Spirit - that is, the Holy Spirit - helps our weaknesses! I am glad to

know that today. And it is no small matter to me to hear one who preaches the gospel deny that grand fact!

The Bible states that "the Spirit helps our weaknesses." Certainly, it is not "my" spirit that helps my weaknesses, but it is the Holy Spirit.

Second - because we do not know what we should pray for as we ought - "the Spirit Himself makes intercession for us."

Again, my human spirit cannot possibly make intercession for me. Rather, it is the Spirit of God Himself! It is the Holy Spirit.

Sometimes amidst deep trouble we cannot express our present needs. Perhaps all we can utter is "Abba Father" (Romans 8:15). But the Spirit Himself understands our great distress, and He seems to "intercept" our feeble prayers and deliver them to the throne of God - through Jesus Christ - and we can only believe that He reinterprets our prayers to fit the will of God (Romans 8:27).

We say "through Jesus Christ," because Christ also intercedes for us. Paul tells us later in Romans 8, verse 34, that Christ "is even at the right hand of God (and) also makes intercession for us."

These are all beautiful, glorious promises: Christ - our high priest who is so touched with "the feelings of our infirmities" (Hebrews 4:14-15) - sits at God's right hand to offer

intercession. He does so unlike any other, because He, too, lived as a man.

And the Spirit also offers intercession, helping our weaknesses, helping us put those prayers and desires into words to fit into the will of God. You'll hardly find any promises in the Word of God greater than these.

It is almost unimaginable, but sometimes I hear men say something different. But I want you to know today that it doesn't matter who a man is or how others of great influence look upon him, when he says something different from what the Holy Spirit says, that man is wrong.

He is not only wrong, but he is preaching a false doctrine, his own doctrine, not that of the Holy Spirit, and not the doctrine of Christ!

I suppose men reserve the right to deliver lengthy dissertations to explain why Romans 8:26 doesn't teach that the Spirit of God intercedes when we pray.

But when they close the book and sit down, and I, then, open my Bible to the eighth chapter of Romans, I want you to know what I've found: I've found that the Bible still says that the Spirit Himself intercedes for us. And I believe it says exactly what it means. And it means just what it says.

Outside of the Gospels, Paul's letter to the Romans is probably the most important book of the New Testament. It appears in the Catholic lectionary more than any other epistle. Written at the end of his life, it is Paul's greatest explanation of faith through the Gospel of Jesus. And most theologians would say it is the foundation of Christian theology.

In this letter, Paul begins by describing what the human situation looks like when humans live apart from God. (Rom. 1:28-30). Then, because he is a religious man - first always a good Jew and now a good Christian - he describes how

God has intervened to save humanity - both in the Old Testament times and now in the person of Jesus (Rom. 3:21-24). In the heart of the letter, chapters 5-8, Paul describes what it is like to be justified, to experience salvation. (Rom. 5:3-5)

In our reading from last Sunday (Rom. 12:1-2), Paul begins to teach us how to live a moral life. Once we have been saved, how do we live our lives, illuminated now by God's grace?

First, we should "offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, a spiritual worship." In the wake of Hurricane Harvey, many people dropped everything to come to the aid of people in need. They rescued people with their own boats, delivered food and drinking water, and opened their churches to those displaced out of their homes - and all this, to complete strangers!

In this crisis, people were giving of their time - they were offering up themselves in an act of worship. But how do we do that in times of non-crisis? How do we live lives of complete generosity - of complete giving, complete worship?

Many of us cradle Catholics remember this prayer, the Morning Offering: "I offer you my prayers, works, joys

and sufferings of this day, in Union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass that is being offered throughout the world..." God wants our day to be lifted up - no matter how mundane/uneventful - in an act of spiritual worship.

Secondly, Paul goes on to say: "Do not conform yourselves to this age, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and pleasing and perfect." (Rom 12:2).

Often the world sends us a message that is very different from what our Christian faith teaches us. The world says: "Avoid pain as much as possible. Drown your sorrows. Escape and live only for today!" But the message of Jesus is "Live soberly as in the day. Be on guard. For you know neither the day nor the hour, when a final reckoning will be required of you..." For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it... Finally, take up your cross. Come, follow me."

The world measures the economy in terms of gross domestic product (GDP), val-

The world seems to say that the resources of the earth are for ours to use, and as quickly as you can get to them. Burn up all the oil, use up the minerals, maximize the production of food, and "develop" the land today regardless of the cost to living creatures.

But our Catholic faith teaches us to reverence the land as gift

and to consider both human and non-human living creatures in our stewardship. In addition, we conserve resources for the sake of our children and our grandchildren and their children and grandchildren.

When we study our faith, we are reminded again of these truths. They will become part of us, our second nature, and we will call upon them as needed. They will help us to discern what is "good and pleasing and perfect."

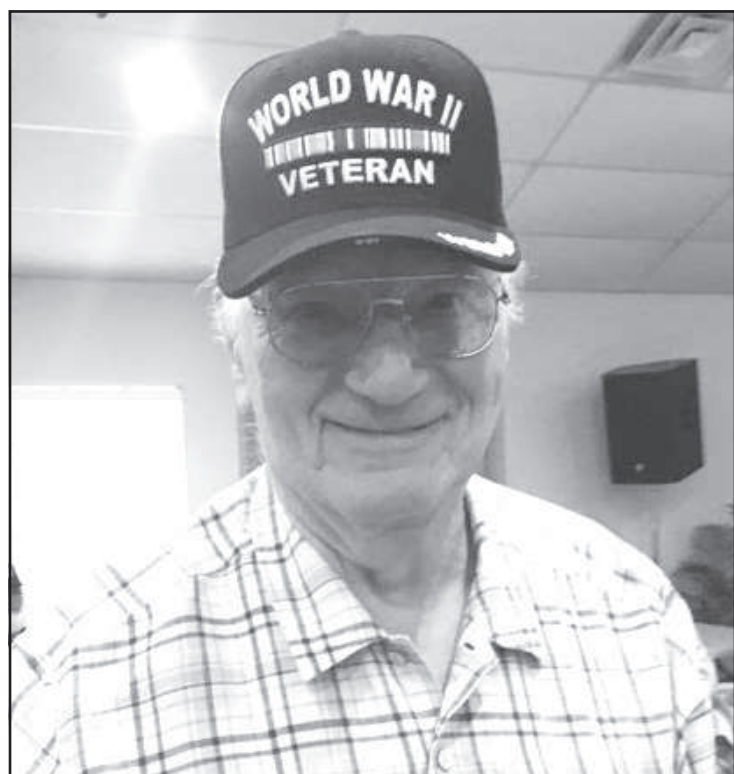

fares. This allows us to review the VA decisions made on your claims for benefits. We then send a notice to the veteran or spouse detailing what needs to be done next in the claims process.

Many times, some of them will be eligible for other benefits. Before I was able to receive these decisions, I would not know if we were doing everything right. Most places that veterans go to for assistance will not know what the VA decided on their claims. Personally, I want each veteran to receive all of the benefits for which they are eligible. One of the things we talk about each week is "do no harm." By that, we are saying do not file for a re-evaluation of a disability if it has reached the maximum allowable rating per CFR-38. The VA can and may reduce a rating for any disability that is deemed less severe. I have seen veterans who were rated at 50 percent for hearing loss, and someone tells them to go to another place ask for a re-evaluation, and the veteran's benefits were reduced. The rule of thumb I use is never re-evaluate hearing loss that is rated at 40 percent or higher. Too many veterans will receive a reduction.

Last week I received rating decisions showing six veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service



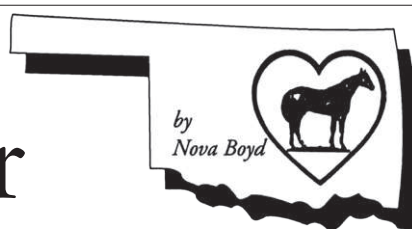

2017 AQHYA Select World Championship Show Results

The AQHA Select World Championship Show was held at the Tri-State Fairgrounds in Amarillo, Texas, from August 25 through September 2. This is the pinnacle event for American Quarter Horse amateur exhibitors, ages 50 and over, from around the world, who must qualify for the event by earning a predetermined number of points to compete in each of the classes representing halter, English and western disciplines. More than 1,090 entries from the US, Canada and Belgium competed for 44 world championships. There were 54 contenders for the Select All-Around Amateur title. There were 545 horses making 1,093 entries, with the top two classes being Trail at 78 entries and Ranch Riding at 68 entries. Following to complete the top 5 were Horsemanship 59, Cutting 58, Reining 52 and Showmanship 52. Total purse of payout was \$158,480, with value of awards (trophies, buckles and other gifts) at \$444,725. There were sixty nine exhibitors age 70 and over, with the oldest, 83-year-old D L Becker of Leavenworth, Kansas, competing in 3-year-old stallions. Exhibitors were from 38 states, two Canadian provinces and Belgium. Economic impact of this show was more than \$6.3 million into the Amarillo area. As always, our Purcell and Heart of Oklahoma horse industry was well represented by not only exhibitors and owners, but by the breeders in our area and the stallions siring many

of the horses shown. September is National Preparedness Month

Prepare your family for a disaster

Oklahomans are all too familiar with the damage often caused by disasters. In a short amount of time, disasters can alter a family's normal routine. Neighborhood streets can be closed because of large debris or downed power lines. Suddenly, an area that is a familiar part of a normal daily routine is now unrecognizable. In times like this, it is crucial for a family to have a plan to reunite and meet at a safe location.

In observance of National Preparedness Month this September, the Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) encourages families to create a plan for both adults and children to follow.

A family may not be together when a disaster strikes so it is important to plan in advance: how to get to a safe place; how to contact one another; how to get back together; and what to do in different situations.

During a disaster, roads are often blocked or closed and alternate routes must be used. Knowing multiple routes of travel in advance can save time and frustration when trying to reach loved ones.

OSDH also encourages families to have a basic emergency kit consisting of water, snacks, first-aid kit, flashlight, batteries, prescrip-

tion medicine and important paperwork.

Parents can help reduce the effect of disasters on children by adding a few simple kid-friendly supplies such as books, games, a favorite toy or comfort item and medical items such as infant/child fever reducer to the kit. Those with babies should consider a three-day supply of formula, diapers, antibacterial wipes, non-perishable baby food and sealable plastic bags for soiled items.

Scott Sproat, director of the Emergency Preparedness and Response Service at OSDH, reminds families who have members with medical conditions and disabilities to consider any unique needs during and after a disaster.

"If you have, or care for someone, with a disability or access and functional needs, it's important to include needed supplies, equipment and medications as part of your planning efforts," said Sproat.

"If evacuating from the home is necessary, it is important to take medication and specialty equipment such as hearing aids, oxygen, a wheelchair, diabetic supplies, food for a special diet, and

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) afford parents and eligible students certain rights with respect to their education records. When a student reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level these rights are transferred to the student. (An “eligible student” under FERPA is a student who is 18 years of age or older or who attends a postsecondary institution.) These rights include:

1. The right to inspect and review the student’s education records within 45 days after the day Mid-America Technology Center receives a request for access. A parent or eligible student should submit to the Assistant Superintendent, Tony Hancock a written request that identifies the record(s) the student wishes to inspect.
