County clerk's office due renovation

Property records in McClain County have always been stored in books safely tucked away inside a vault at the Mc-Clain County Clerk's Office.

But before this year ends, those volumes will be boxed, barcoded and moved to Hutchinson, Kans., for permanent storage in salt mines there.

County clerk Pam Beller said every page of every book has been digitally saved so that all of the records can be accessed by computer.

Once empty of the books, the vault is being renovated into a computer room.

A lack of room is the biggest reason for the changeover.

"There are 2,500 books in the vault," Beller said. "It is wall to wall books and we are out of room in the vault."

Only about 15 people can work in the vault at any time and imagers, who photograph pages in the books for oil and

Keeping vaccines at proper temperatures

Respiratory disease in cattle, also known as BRD, shipping fever or pneumonia, may cost the U.S. cattle industry over \$2 billion annually.

Management techniques can offset much of this cost and having a good vaccination program can maintain the health of production system.

A vaccine can cost over \$3 a respectfully. head, and if not stored properly that vaccine can be rendered in-effective. Producers cannot afford to overlook the importance of how they store vaccine and handle it prior to injection.

Biological products should be stored under refrigeration at 35 to 45°F unless the nature of the product makes storing at a different temperature advisable. If vaccines are not stored within this temperature range, efficacy to the calf can and will be reduced. Killed vaccines are to 35.6° F. especially susceptible to freezing temperatures.

Freezing a killed vaccine will alter the adjuvant or delivery system of a killed vaccine. This, in turn, negatively affects the immune response to the antigen in the vaccine. Modified live viruses (MLV) are more stable but can be inactivated if they are repeatedly cycled above or below the required temperature range.

In addition, once activated by mixing, MLV's effective life will be reduced to one-two hours and need to be maintained at the 35° to 45° F. This can be accomplished by only mixing the doses that you will use at that time and use a cooler to working cattle.

Researchers from the University of Arkansas and Idaho analyzed the consistency of temperatures for different types, ages and locations of refrigerators over a 48-hour period. They found that only 26.7 percent and 34.0 percent of refrigerators were within a calf all the way through the the acceptable temperature limit 95 percent of the time,

Refrigerator location can also effect temperature. Refrigerators located in barns (35.6° F) were colder than in mudrooms (41.72° F) and kitchens (40.82° F). Temperature within a 24-hour period can also be highly variable for individual refrigerators. Researchers demonstrated some refrigerators might take up to eight hours to cool down to the too cold varying from 24.8° F

Thermostats can also be very variable from unit to unit, so keeping a thermometer inside works well to monitor and to make adjustments as need. Simple indoor-outdoor thermometers work well to achieve this goal.

> The outdoor unit can be placed in the refrigerator while the LCD display can be hung with a magnet on the door. This allows temperature to be monitored without opening the door and many models will record the high and the low temperature in a 24-hour period so producers can adjust accordingly. How a producer handles vaccines outside of the refrigerator is important as well.



Behind the scenes: largest tax increase in Oklahoma history

Session has been orchestrated for one reason: to intentionally create public crisis and increase in Oklahoma history, nearly half a billion dollars.

That plan failed during special session. We ended up with an agreement on an appropriations bill that made use of state funds as well as new revenue from gross production taxes on oil and gas wells drilled before July 2015, and some state agencies

lowed for the continuation of core health care services for our state's most vulnerable, and 12 state agencies would receive no cut to funding this fiscal year. Those included common education and the Department of Rehabilitation Services.

However, the governor backed out on her agreement and vetoed the budget, but fortunately signed a portion that will protect the public from lost services in the near future.

What I witnessed behind the scenes is disgusting, and I still cannot believe any person would intentionally terrify our most vulnerable for a political agenda. But that is exactly what happened, and I fought

against it. The state Constitution, as amended by State Question 640 in 1992, is clear. Increasing taxes requires a vote by the people of the state. The only exception to that is if it receives a three-fourths To be clear, there was never majority in both chambers of vote to put it on the ballot.

Since 1992, the Legislature

The continuance of Special elderly, those with disabilities has never passed a tax increase to the ballot as required by the incessant creation of chaos under that standard. The people themselves have overwhelmingly rejected taxes in ballots even as recent as 2016. The voters have only approved one tax increase since 1992, tobacco products in 2004.

Yet, the governor keeps trying to circumvent the Constitution. Her refusal to sign a budget last session that did not include a tax increase required the previously failed cigarette both parties and sent them to tax to be redesigned as a fee. it administers targeted cuts to the Senate to appropriate the The state Supreme Court saw through that tactic and ruled the fee unconstitutional setting the Legislature up for special session.

House members were pressed to vote in favor of House Bill 1054x, the largest tax increase in Oklahoma history. Based on prior ballots, it is believed this bill would not receive 15 percent support in a statewide ballot. The public should know that despite it not receiving three-fourths support, HB1054x did pass, as it was a bill to place taxes on the ballot. The same is true of the prior tax increase bills. But knowing that voters will reject these proposals, procedures have been used to make sure these tax bills do not go

Constitution.

Let's be clear, if HB1054x had passed, we still would have used the same state funds we should have used from day one to prevent fear. Those funds still would have to be used for the 90 days before the bill could take effect and the taxes could start being collected. And, we still would have had to make almost identical cuts to the ones made by agreeing to it.

I respect other members' positions, but I did not believe it was right representation for me to vote for a massive tax increase knowing the voters of my district would overwhelmingly reject it in a ballot. But I have advocated for my district, including those who sincerely do believe taxes should increase, to have their constitutional right to vote on such a new tax.

I want to clarify that Speaker Charles McCall has asked that the tax proposals go on the ballot as intended when failing to get three-fourths votes, and I have appreciated his stance on that.

Meanwhile, the unconstitutional bills and wasted legislative days are the result of the governor's continual demand to raise taxes but refusal to adhere to what voters demanded in 1992, their approval in a ballot question.

State of Oklahoma Legislative update

need to take some of the blame for the predicament we found ourselves in this year. Being new, I didn't know what issues to tackle and bills to file to best help the state. While I did file legislation, I was mostly trying to watch and learn as did most of my freshmen colleagues.

The legislative process is an extremely complex one. It's not a simple cut and dry, allocate some money and everything will be fine. Oklahoma's budget structure is inefficient and the legislature must require more of agency heads, as far as providing us with more detailed information about their budgets and the programs supported by

We should be looking ahead only agenda should be making and taking action to better the health of our state, improve our roads and bridges, support education and other vital state services in the future. Unfortunately, the past few years, the legislature is too focused on filling budget gaps to plan for the future and our agencies are suffering.

It is imperative that the legislature establish and agree on a long term plan this coming session. All good business owners have a plan. As the saying goes, "failing to plan is planning to fail". The House and Senate must start working together to move the state forward. There are too many

our state better.

We lost the battle but we are determined more than ever that next session we will win the war. Budget meetings will continue and the bill request deadline is a week away. We are not finished and we will do better.

The Senate presented several revenue raising measures that I believe will be brought up again and, hopefully, our colleagues across the rotunda will be more amenable to them.

This past session, we approved a bipartisan bill creating an independent commission to conduct comprehensive performance audits of state agendas but the legislature's agencies. Under HB 2311,

the commission will also conduct a diagnostic analysis of the state's budget to identify spending trends.

They will then make recommendations to the Legislature on how to implement best practices from both the private and public sector to ensure state government services are run in the most cost-effective manner. I'm anxious to see what the commission finds.



§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited.

No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the city.

used to describe the way in which we choose to practice our life with God, our prayer life, our devotional life. For example, someone uses lectio divina (divine reading) to pray with Sacred Scripture. Another prays a centering prayer in complete silence. Another follows the exercises of St. Ignatius in seeking to "find God in all things" in her daily life.

A very appropriate spirituality for today is one that is centered on gift and stewardship. A "steward" is not one who owns but one who manages responsibly, and thereby protects and improves and enhances that which he is given. Jesus told the parable of the talents to encourage us to seek a rich harvest with the talents we are given. (Matthew 25). We must not bury them in a field or hide them under a basket.

If I remember that I am a steward, I may make my choices differently. I will begin each day with a prayer of thanks for the day that is before me, for which I am a steward. I will ask myself: How will I use my time this day to improve the world around me? How will I care for other living creatures and all things of the created earth? How will I put my gifts and

The term "spirituality" is talents to work in the service of the Kingdom?

Will I treat my body as a gift, giving it the proper nourishment and the exercise and the rest that it needs? How will I responsibly attend to my marriage? How will I treat these children or grandchildren of mine who I have under my care for just a little while before they are given back to God? All is given back to God in the end.

The composition of our stewardship can change over the years. At one time of our life we may have much time and little treasure to share. At another time in our life, we may be blessed with a good-paying job but have little time to give. We trust that our needs and responsibilities will be met, in good time, when we are generous. It is true that "God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). But God will also take care of a cheerful giver.

Finally, if we practice giving thanks for the good gifts, perhaps we can one day understand the grace in receiving the "notso-good" gifts, such as illness or painful loss. The grace in these gifts is most often seen at a later time.

Stewardship is the prayerful acknowledgment that "all good giving and every perfect gift is

from above, coming down from the Father of lights" (James 1:17). This one prayer should belong to us all: "Thank you, Lord, for this good life, and forgive us if we do not love it enough."

The spirituality of stewardship teaches patience. It teaches balance. And it teaches a kind of "letting go" that ultimately God is the Giver and Master. I am only his servant. Perhaps this is what Jesus meant when he said "My yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Mt. 11:30) If I am but a steward, I can only manage that which God has given me to manage. I am responsible for no more.

There's just something special about Thanksgiving. The mood seems to stick to you kind of like that turkey and dressing. It's one of those holidays that last far beyond that special of the burning car. Thursday every year. We seem to write about Thanksgiving all the way through the holiday season into the next year.

AThanksgiving never comes around that I don't think about my grandfather, E.H. Miller. "Preacher Miller" was an oldtime, tell-it-like-it-is, backto-the-basics church of Christ preacher. He preached a great many sermons in his days. But one of the best sermons of his life wasn't one he preached. It was one he lived!

In the mid 60s, Preacher Miller and some friends got in a bad car accident driving home from a revival in Marietta, Ga. Two cars were drag racing that night on the two-lane Atlanta highway, and Preacher Miller met the car in his lane when he topped a hill.

'It happened so fast," he later would say, "that we didn't even have time to swerve."

I still remember the phone ringing late that night at our little house on Juniper Street. The news wasn't good for any-

Those riding with the preachfully! May the Lord bless you er had numerous injuries, but Preacher Miller was hurt the worst. The impact was so great that his shoe melted to the gas pedal, and the workers had to pull his foot out of his shoe to get him and his broken hip out

The doctor did all he could for the preacher for several days, but one morning he walked into the LaGrange, Ga., hospital room and delivered the news: "Preacher Miller," he said, "I'm sorry, but I don't think you'll ever walk again."

The preacher didn't buy it. He said, "Doctor: you, me, and the Lord can do better than that." And they did.

In a month he was walking and preaching — on crutches. In three months he was walking with a walker. In six he walked, period. Just with a limp. While he was a man of

great faith, he also became discouraged often during his rehabilitation. One day when he was really feeling sorry for

himself, he started wheeling through the hospital, looking around. He was surprised by what he saw.

He saw a man who was missing a limb. He saw another who couldn't get out of bed. He saw one he knew wouldn't see too many more sunrises.

So he went back to his room and gave thanks.

He never took walking for granted again. From that time on, he walked stairs every day of his life, back when walking really wasn't the "in" thing.

Walking stairs, of course, isn't something you can do at home. So every day he'd go out and find one of the tallest buildings in his hometown; and there he'd walk the stairs. It was a place he attended every day in his visits anyway, and it was a place where he could go and never feel sorry for himself. He had always tried that.

He learned a long time ago. You can't feel sorry for yourself...walking the stairs down at the hospital.


