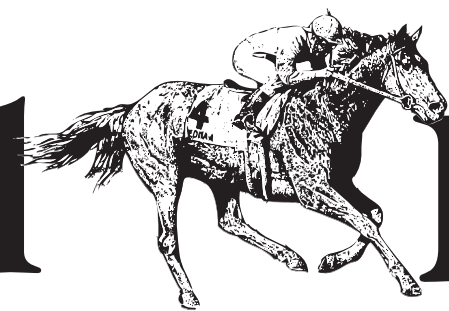
LCC briefly loses water supply

one, too. He's literally grabbing life by the horns.

"I've got the greatest job in the world," said Webster, who's just 24 but already considered a

seasoned veteran of his profession.

"Traveling the country and fighting bulls is what I do. I make my living basically being a secret-service man for the bull riders."

Much like the agents who protect and serve the President of the United States, Webster and his fellow bullfighters do the same for cowboys in the rodeo arena.

Secret service personnel will take a bullet for the POTUS; Webster elects to stand between cowboys and powerful, mean bovines that average 2,000

pounds.

"When the guys make a qualified ride or get bucked off before the eight second whistle, we have got to move in and be an easier target for the bull to get," Webster explained. "Sometimes, we'll actually have to step in and take a shot for the rider."

A regular rodeo features bullfighters who are there to protect the cowboys, first and foremost.

But, thanks to a new organization this year named Bullfighters Only (BFO),

Leadership Oklahoma, a statewide leadership program, is now accepting applications for its 2017 Youth Leadership Oklahoma (YLOK) class which will be held June 4-9, 2017.

Applicants must be high school Juniors or home schooled equivalent with at least a 3.25 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

Completed applications must be received in the Leadership Oklahoma office, located at 5500 N. Western, Suite 142, Oklahoma City, OK 73118, no later than 5 p.m., Thursday, Dec. 1, 2016.

The organization accepts a class of 50 members each year. Criteria for selection include demonstrated leadership ability in activities such as student council, athletics and service clubs in their schools and communities as well as an exhibited commitment to community

service and extra-curricular activities.

Participants are also considered on the basis of geographic, racial and cultural diversity. In 2001 Leadership Oklahoma conducted extensive research to create a model youth program unlike any other in the country.

It was important that the program be designed to be educational and inspiring and to instill in our young leaders a hope, pride and responsibility for Oklahoma’s future. The result was YLOK and a week-long journey each summer across the state that introduces high school students between their junior and senior years to the leaders, issues, resources and cultural treasures of Oklahoma.

Politics:

It was believed by the school voucher advocates that they could not get the public to repeal the “no public money for private religious schools” clause in the Oklahoma Constitution by simply telling voters the truth. The truth is that corporate and private interests want Oklahoma tax dollars, so Article 2 Section 5 must be eliminated.

About the same time as voucher wolves were trying to come up with an idea to do the job – a mentally unstable “citizen” smashed the Ten Commandments monument at the capitol by running over it in his vehicle. He told the police that Satan told him to do it.

When the monument was

subsequently replaced, the capitol was sued for violating the separation of Church and State statutes, specifically Article 2, Section 5, of the Oklahoma Constitution. The Oklahoma Supreme Court agreed with the plaintiff in the case, so the monument was removed.

These events and court actions gave voucher wolves the perfect cover for eliminating Article 2, Sec. 5. If they could disguise it as a freedom of religion bill, and make it sound like “if you vote against it, you’re against the Ten Commandments, and you are not a Christian” it may convince voters to pass it.

The real motivation for those legislators sponsoring

SQ 790, however, is much more sinister. It’s about allowing private and corporate charter schools access to Oklahoma tax dollars – it’s all about money.

Those voucher wolves care nothing about placing the Ten Commandments monument back at the capitol. They don’t even care if a statue of Baphomet is placed at our capitol as long as they have access to public tax dollars.

If a senator or representative says “By golly, I want the Ten Commandments back at the capitol, so I’m gonna vote ‘yes’ on SQ 790”, be very cautious as to his real intent. He just could be a “voucher wolf” in sheep’s clothing.

Cole:

was less interested in cleaning up the agency than he was in covering up some of its questionable actions.

Last year, Congress froze the IRS’ budget and prohibited the use of funds to target organizations because of its past actions. It also prohibited the White House from directing the IRS on how to classify a tax-exempt organization.

However, the continued obstinacy of the IRS and Commissioner Koskinen has led many in Congress to

conclude further sanctions must be considered. While Congress has not formally impeached a member of the executive branch in over 140 years, I do believe there is enough evidence to consider doing so in this case.

In my opinion, covering up the actions of Lois Lerner rises to the level of an impeachable offense.

Students of history will recall that President Richard Nixon resigned the Presidency in order to avoid impeachment charges - charges

brought against him not because of the Watergate burglary, but because of his role in covering it up. Nixon faced impeachment for covering up a two-bit burglary of a political headquarters.

Someone at the IRS likely covered up crimes committed against tens of thousands of Americans. If the House Judiciary Committee concludes that Mr. Koskinen had some role in this cover up, impeachment would certainly be an appropriate action for the House to consider.

Those are not spider webs in the trees

With Halloween quickly approaching, some might think massive populations of giant spiders have taken over parts of the state, spinning webs in tree branches as far as the eye can see.

Those webs, however, have nothing to do with spiders and everything to do with webworms. Oklahoma is experiencing a wave of fall webworms, which have simply been more abundant than in years past.

“In some years we barely notice them at all,” said Eric Rebek, associate professor in Oklahoma State University’s Department of Entomology and Plant Pathology. “Some years are bigger than others, this year we just happen to have a bumper crop of these caterpillars.”

The webworms prefer pecan and persimmon trees, but this year is even worse than last year and the worms are feeding on other host trees such as sweetgum, sycamore, birch and even some oaks. While the webs may be unsightly, there is not much to worry about concerning the health of the trees.

“The webworms will do no damage to the actual pecan, but it can defoliate the tree,” said Jackie Lee, OSU Cooperative Extension entomologist. “The only reason you should be concerned is if you have a lot of webs in the tree, it could cause severe defoliation.”

Even then, the long-term impact on the tree will be minimal.

“By the time they start doing their damage, the trees have already produced enough sugars and starches through photosynthesis to make it through the winter,” Rebek said. “It’s not going to harm the tree at all, as the leaves are soon to fall off anyway.”

There is one exception, however, as commercial pecan growers should treat for fall webworms as defoliation can reduce nut yield the following year.

Younger trees are more susceptible. Lee suggests removing any webs and webworms from trees less than five years of age.

“It’s very simple,” she said. “Just take a branch and run your hand along the branch to remove the webworms, or prune out those branches, making sure to dispose of the worms.”

The webs themselves are created by a group of worms for protection against their own natural enemies, like arthropod predators, parasitoids and birds. Soon the worms will begin to fall from the webs and begin the next stage of their lives, pupating in the soil.

The webs will naturally degrade with exposure to natural elements, such as wind and rain.

Oklahoma National Guard unit changes commanders one last time

The Oklahoma Army National Guard's 345th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 90th Troop Command, held its last change of command at the armory in Ada September 10.

The 345th's headquarters unit is scheduled for deactivation. Its component units will break into several support companies and reassigned to new commands within the Oklahoma National Guard.

The unit was organized and federally recognized on Sept. 3, 1918, in the Oklahoma National Guard as Hotel Company, 3rd Infantry, Ardmore, Oklahoma. It served under the famed 45th Infantry Division. The unit has been located in both Oklahoma and Texas.

The Battalion currently commands four independently numbered companies including Headquarters Company (HHC) 345th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 1245th Transportation Company, 1345th Transportation Company, and Alpha Com-

pany, 777th Aviation Support Battalion (Distribution).

Guardsmen, friends and family gathered to celebrate the change of command ceremony between Maj. Steve Cheadle, of Tishomingo, Oklahoma, and Lt. Col. Robert "Shawn" Barefoot, of Washington, Oklahoma. The two officers began their careers with the long-standing support battalion.

Cheadle, incoming commander, said he sees his new position as an honor.

"I started my career with the Oklahoma Guard in this unit," Cheadle said. "I think it is a great honor to be able to case the Battalion colors and close out the history of this unit."

Cheadle started his military career in the Navy before joining the Oklahoma Army National Guard in 1995 as the 345th's Headquarters Company Operations Officer. He has served a variety of positions within the 345th, including his most recent Battalion Support Operations Officer. Cheadle has three overseas deployments, two in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom and

one in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

In a heartfelt farewell speech, Barefoot highlighted the many accomplishments of the 345th during his command.

"I stand here today only because of the Soldiers who have served underneath me or beside me," said Barefoot, who commanded the Battalion since July 2014. "To be able to come back to this Battalion—the unit I started out in—and mentor young Soldiers, NCO's and officers the way I was mentored, is what meant more to me than anything."

Barefoot was commissioned in 1991 from the East Central University ROTC program and has spent his entire career in the Oklahoma Army National Guard. Barefoot has also deployed three times with two tours in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom and one in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

Barefoot will continue as the state deputy director of personnel assigned to the Joint Force Headquarters in Oklahoma City.

A hospital spokesman said he was discharged on Tuesday.

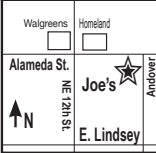

Chickasaw language takes Civic Center stage October 7

Chickasaw classical music composer Jerod “Impichchaachaaha” Tate remembers the first time he laid eyes on Joshua Hinson.

It was 2007 and Hinson was honored by the Chickasaw Nation for his master’s thesis on Chickasaw stickball regalia. Hinson is director of the Chickasaw Nation Language Division, which is tasked with preserving the Chickasaw language. Tate was aware of Hinson’s critical role.

Only 70 fluent Chickasaw speakers remain, so language preservation is a very high priority, to say the least.

Eight years passed. In the chilly early winter of 2015, Tate was commissioned by Canterbury Voices of Oklahoma City to compose an oratorio, a large-scale musical work for orchestra and voices.

The Chickasaw composer had been approached in 2013 by the group’s executive director, Dr. Kay Holt, who planted the seed of a commissioned work.

“It is an important part of Canterbury’s mission to add to the greater body of choral literature. When it was time for us to commission again, we could think of no one more exciting than Jerod Tate,” Holt said. “We have long admired his music and talent.”

Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby said that it is gratifying to see this traditional Chickasaw story expressed in a new and creative way.

“It is exciting to see a story so important to Chickasaw culture and history conveyed in a Chickasaw language oratorio,” said Gov. Anoatubby. “Chickasaw storyteller Te Ata once wrote that art binds all people together. It is our hope that this musical work will help a new audience develop a better understanding and appreciation for Chickasaw culture that will bring us all closer together.”

Tate’s creation is titled “Misha Sipokni” (The Old Ground). In song, it allows people to experience the pre-history migration of the Chickasaw and Choctaw tribes.

The oratorio will be performed entirely in Chickasaw.

Tate reached out to Hinson almost immediately for assistance in translating English into Chickasaw in time for the performance October 7 at

7 p.m. in the Oklahoma City Civic Center Music Hall, 201 N. Walker Ave.

More than 250 individuals will perform the oratorio at the Civic Center Music Hall, encompassing the Oklahoma City Philharmonic Orchestra and Canterbury Voices – both adult and children choirs – in addition to a trio of top vocal soloists.

The soloists represent the voices of Chickasaw leader, Chikasha, Choctaw leader, Chahta and the last soloist will sing as the matriarch of the Chickasaw people.

Hinson jumped at the opportunity to tackle Tate’s project.

“You know, it isn’t every day you get a call from an Emmy-award winning composer whose very compositions preserve endangered Native languages,” Hinson exclaimed. “Jerod Tate is a nationally known classical composer.

“His work is critically acclaimed both in Native American circles and in the mainstream classical music realm. To be asked to assist, even in a small way, was truly an honor,” Hinson said.

Tate explained Hinson’s role as anything but small.

“I’m not a fluent Chickasaw speaker,” Tate noted. “I’ve known Josh Hinson for years and he is the man who made this all happen.”

While the initial collaboration was discussed in December 2015, the dual endeavor began full-tilt in April and concluded in August 2016.

Tate spent months in his Oklahoma City studio composing music, scribbling melodies and harmonies on blank staff paper; creating English lyrics to bring the migration story – which Tate terms “amazing, awesome and epic” – to a historic metropolitan stage.

“It is the human condition to construct expression,” Tate said while thoughtfully explaining the creative process. “For the libretto, I was interested in what the two brothers were saying to each other and what was said to the community making the journey. What was the sacred White Dog thinking? What did the brothers feel? What emotions were felt by weary tribal citizens? How did all of these feelings and thoughts coalesce into action and decisions, and what would the Creator think and how would

he speak to them?”

Libretto is the formal musical term for lyrics of a classic piece.

English lyrics proved problematic for translation to Chickasaw.

Hinson “interpreted” Tate’s lyrics and then asked fluent speakers JoAnn Ellis and Stan Smith to edit the interpretation.

Hinson prefers the term “interpreted” to “translated.”

“My duty was to the meaning of his text, (Jerod’s) creative vision, rather than the literal words – not a literal translation from English to Chickasaw. Any product of that sort would be unintelligible to our native speakers. I was trying to craft an interpretation that was acceptable in spoken Chickasaw and acceptable as verse in a song,” Hinson wrote.

Hinson illustrated how the two languages do not work in tandem.

“Jerod wrote, ‘Freedom sings its sweet euphonious song.’ Chickasaws would not speak using that type of sentence structure. Freedom would not be a noun. In Chickasaw, the word “freedom” would mean to get loose of some type of bond,” Hinson explained.

“So my interpretation became, ‘If we get free, we will sing and sing,’” Hinson said.

One example cited by Hinson that stayed very true to Tate’s original libretto was: “The sun emerges on this new day.”

The Chickasaw interpre-

tation became: “The sun is coming out. A new day has arrived.”

Music has been described by experts as “math in motion.” Taken literally, it is a true statement. Music is comprised of notes played at varying lengths of time; “meter” is the timing – or beat – of the composition and the lyrical rhyme must occur within the designated time allotted each measure.

These elements, too, caused woes when interpreting English to Chickasaw. Some Chickasaw words are quite long and can be used as a complete phrase.

“I recall Jerod contacting me to request we eliminate six syllables in one stanza so it fit the meter,” Hinson said laughing. To cut the syllables to meet the meter, it was necessary for Hinson and Mrs. Ellis and Mr. Smith to collaborate to rework the interpreted words.

“I couldn’t have been more pleased Josh stayed true to the Chickasaw language,” Tate remarked. “It is wonderful how song colorizes our language. It is truly awesome.”

Rehearsals began a few weeks ago.

Tate’s emotional stockpile exudes many heartfelt elements embedded in his soulful composition.

“It is important. It matters. It is something that needs to be expressed. I think of the many journeys of my people. Just as my ancestors made similar journeys for their children and grandchildren, I felt obligated

to tell this story,” he said, “for my son.”

It is renowned Chickasaw composer Jerod Tate’s most auspicious classical music undertaking. The commissioned oratorio will feature Tate’s musical composition and libretto exclusively sung in the Chickasaw language. The Oklahoma City Philharmonic and Canterbury Voices will be featured.

Three Oklahoma soloists will be featured: soprano Kelly Holst, tenor Jeffrey Picón and baritone Mark McCrory. Maestro Randi Von Ellefson will conduct.

Noteworthy: Chickasaw Hall of Fame inductee Margaret Flansburg will sing in the alto section of Canterbury Voices for the performance. Additionally, several Chickasaw youth will perform in the children’s choir.

“I love it,” Tate said. “This is a unique event that is impressive on many levels for our tribe. It’s a multiple win!”

Col. Lloyd J. Matthews USA Ret.

Colonel Lloyd J. Matthews, USA Ret., died in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, on Monday, September 19, 2016 after a brief illness at the age of 86.

He was born on November 25, 1929, in Clinton, Oklahoma.



His father was Lloyd Jerald Matthews, a meat market proprietor and later an Oklahoma State Trooper; his mother was Lola Cork Matthews, a homemaker.

Educated in public schools in Clinton and later Purcell, he attended Southwestern Institute of Technology in Weatherford, Oklahoma, for two years, and National University Law School in Washington, DC, for a semester prior to entering the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, New York, in 1950. Graduating in 1954 with a B.S. degree, he was commissioned as second lieutenant of infantry and attended ranger and airborne schools, subsequently serving at such posts as Ft. Carson, Colorado, and Ft. Ord, California, and overseas in Germany and South Vietnam.

During these assignments he commanded all echelons from platoon to battalion, and as a paratrooper made 17 jumps. Between duty tours, he attended the Armed Forces Staff College at Norfolk, Virginia, and the Army War College at Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania, and earned an M.A. degree from Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and a Ph.D. from the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. He served three tours on the Military Academy staff and faculty, ascending from an instructor in the Department of English to the Academy Associate Dean.

During his Vietnam War tour in 1964-65, he served initially as a militia advisor in Tay Ninh Province near the Cambodian border, and later in Saigon as Senior Aide-de-camp to General William C. Westmoreland, commander of all U.S. forces in Vietnam.

Following retirement from the Army in 1984, Colonel Matthews served as a civilian project manager in Saudi Arabia and Turkey, and then resumed his former long-time position as editor of Parameters: The U.S. Army War College Quarterly at Carlisle Barracks. During a writing career pursued concurrently with his military career, he published well over a hundred monographs, editions, articles, reviews, and features, mainly on military and literary themes.

His culminating work, taking 33 years to write, is titled General Henry Lockwood of Delaware: Shipmate of Melville, Co-builder of the Naval Academy, Civil War Commander, co-published by the University of Delaware Press and Rowman & Littlefield Publishing Group in 2014. Additionally, he was editor of three major Department of Defense Independent Panel Reports chaired by James Schlesinger: DoD Detention Operations at Abu Ghraib (August 2004); U.S. Air Force Nuclear Weapons Management (August 2008); and DoD Nuclear Mission (December 2008).

Colonel Matthews attended the Second Presbyterian Church in Carlisle.

He is survived by his beloved wife of 20 years, Phyllis Matthews; son, Lloyd J. “Matt” Matthews; daughter, Leslie Matthews; step-daughters, Amy Runyon (and husband Rob), Jennifer Thomas, and Julia Stouffer; sisters, Dixie Burch and Kay Suhre (and husband Dow); brother, Edward Matthews; and six grandchildren.

He was buried at the U.S. Military Academy Cemetery at West Point, New York, after a private graveside ceremony.

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Webster:

Webster and his comrades get their chance to show off and display their athleticism against smaller but quicker bulls that usually weigh 1,500 pounds.

“They’re the same kind of bulls that the matadors use in Spain,” Webster said. “We don’t kill the animals, of course. The BFO lets us truly show the art of bullfighting with some of the meanest, rankest bulls in the world.

Matadors fight the bulls once. That’s because they’re very smart. But, there are bulls in our game that have been doing this for 12 or 13 years in some cases. They get very savvy to the game.”

Competitions are held either stand-alone or in conjunction before rodeos. Bullfighters can earn up to 50 points based on their style and control as they jump and maneuver around the bull.

The bull can gain up to 50 points based on his quickness, aggression and willingness to stay engaged with the fighter.

While each bout can last up to a minute, the bullfighters can “declare” any time after 40 seconds – ending the fight without the risk of point deductions.

However, bullfighters most often will try and “sell” the last 20 seconds and end on a high note. Failure to reach the warning horn results in a disqualification.

Webster, who has a financial stake in the BFO as one of its original shareholders, was

ranked No. 2 in the standings behind Wyoming bullfighter Nate Jestes (\$23,075.00) with \$22,737.00 through Sept. 22.

“It’s a good investment and I’m getting a pretty good return from it,” Webster said with a laugh.

While the BFO has proven successful thus far for Webster, his bread-and-butter remains cowboy protection at the rodeos. He stays busy working about 150 performances a year, traveling thousands of miles in the process - from Texas to Wyoming and many more locales in between and beyond.

“I’ve been on the road since the first week of June,” Webster said.

“I hit a lot of good rodeos this summer, including the granddaddy of them all, the Cheyenne (Wyo.) Frontier Days Rodeo in July. I’ve met a lot of good people and made a lot of friends along the way.”

Webster’s resume is impressive. He started fighting bulls when he was just 11 years old.

In 2009, he won the prestigious Rex Dunn Freestyle Bullfighting World Championship.

When he was 18, he fought bulls at the International Finals Rodeo in Oklahoma City.

From there, he became the youngest ever (at 21) to be a bullfighter at the National Finals Rodeo (NFR) in Las Vegas in 2013.

Now, Webster is vying to fight bulls this December at the NFR for the fourth straight time. Bull riders in the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) began voting this month and it’s an honor Webster most likely will receive once again.

“When I was 21 at the NFR, it was crazy and it was all a blur to be honest,” said Webster, who also is a two-time bullfighter for the Professional Bull Riders (PBR) World Finals.

“It was something I always dreamed of doing before I could even talk. Growing up watching old tapes and films of the NFR, then actually being able to fulfill my dream and live it

out, was just wild.”

The aforementioned Dunn was a bullfighting legend who fought bulls at three NFRs and was named to the PRCA Hall of Fame before he died of cancer in 2012.

Miles Hare (six NFRs), Rob Smets (six NFRs, nine PBR World Finals), and Joe Baumgartner (14 NFRs, 18 PBR World Finals) are also all Hall of Famers that Webster has looked to for inspiration in his career.

But, the most influential of all has been Frank Newsom.

Nicknamed “Fearless Frank,” Newsom has fought bulls twice at the NFR and 12 times at the PBR World Finals.

Every June, Newsom (along with his wife Dea) puts on a bullfighting school in Lane, Okla., on land owned by Clyde and Elsie Frost.

Their son was the late, great Lane Frost, the 1987 PRCA world champion bull rider who was killed by a bull in ’89 at Cheyenne.

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“There are always a lot of good Christian bullfighters in the school,” Webster said.

“Frank took me under his wing at a very young age. He’s shown me a lot more than just bullfighting, stuff about daily living and how to be a better man. I owe Frank a lot of the credit for my career and for keeping my head on straight, to make wise decisions.”

Webster shares his home with his good friend Dusty Tuckness, who’s a six-time NFR bullfighter and a fellow BFO pioneer.

Webster currently runs almost 100 head of cattle on about 400 acres across three different locations around Wayne.

Webster has been engaged to his high school sweetheart Ashley Madden since last December; they plan to marry soon. His mother Janice Webster, father Keith Webster, uncle Pat Webster, and aunt Peggy English also lend their support on the home-front.

“You’re only as good as the company you run with and keep,” Webster said.

“I’ve been asked a lot about that day I decided to be a bullfighter. There never was (a day I decided to). It’s just a God-given talent and something I was put on earth to do. It was meant to be. There’s really no other explanation other than God has put me right where he wants me. I can certainly live with that.”

Main:

were most likely on “the drag,” driving for hours and miles and pretty much going no where and very happy with that.

It was a rite of passage. And those who did it never forgot either the experience or the camaraderie.

And that’s how Drag Main came to be in 2015. And how it will be again on October 7 in Purcell.

And finally back to Main Street.

Bumper to bumper, the circuit took about 45 minutes.

It was repeated over and over and over again.

In a time before social media, the drag was communication central for young people.

Local police shut down the custom in the late 1980s because

But the damage by the Bulldogs came early and often.

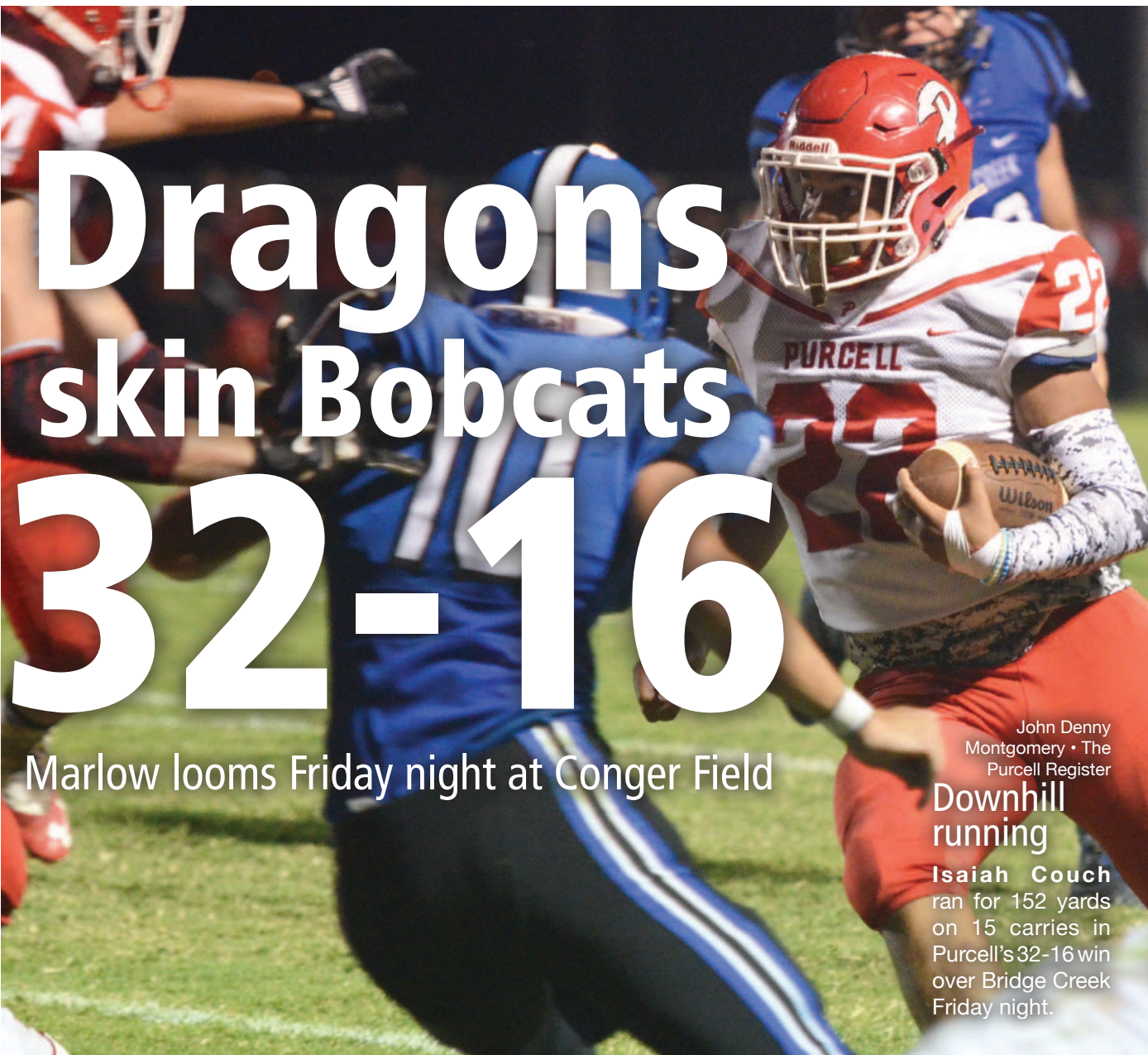
Lexington built a 21-zip lead at intermission and eventually led 42-0 with six different players finding pay dirt.

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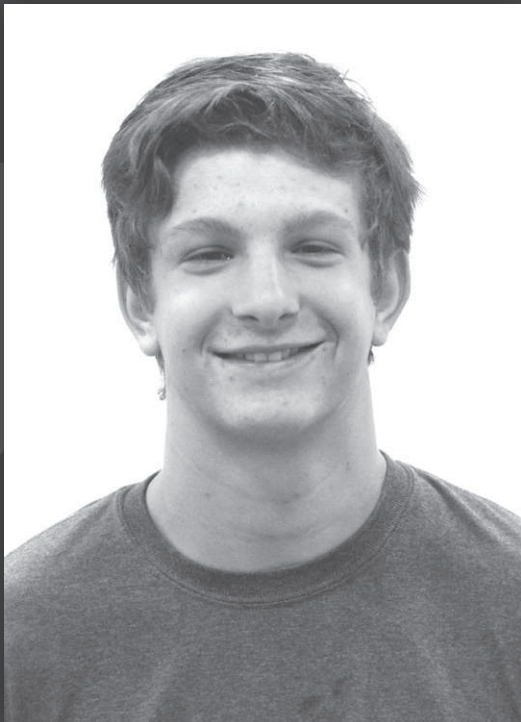

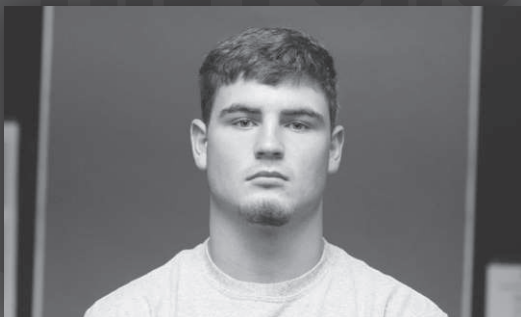

Very good week to all! Welcome to the “front porch.”

I hope many of you who “sit out” on the porch with us weekly are also reading the book of Mark this month, too. We'll continue in Mark until October 10, so you have plenty of time to enjoy this fast-paced gospel. God bless your studies as you “put your hands (and minds) to the plow”

Several days ago when we came to the eighth chapter, we paused at the scene where Jesus comes to Bethsaida, and Jesus' followers bring to him a blind man to heal. The Lord does two really amazing things on this occasion:

One, He takes the man by the hand and leads him out of town (v. 23). If you'll notice other references of Bethsaida, you will see that the city is well known for its unbelief (Matthew 11:21; Luke 10:13). It seems that the Lord is leading the desperate man out of town as if to say, “Bethsaida, you are not worthy to witness the great things we are about to do!” It really is a scary thing when the Lord ceases doing amazing things in our presence – or when we stop recognizing them.

We see something else amazing – really, unprecedented – take place once Jesus takes the blind man out of town. Instead of healing him absolutely as He always does, in this case the Lord heals the man in stages! Jesus first touches him, then asks what he sees. We can imagine the man looking around, squinting, before answering, “I see men as trees, walking! (v. 24).

Men as trees walking? While it is true that it is a wonder that he now can see, still we would not expect our Lord to heal him “imperfectly.” Jesus majors in healing us perfectly and absolutely! He does not normally heal a man in a way that would do him very little good. But notice that the Lord does not leave him with that imperfect sight. He touches him again, and – in one of Mark's nice details – tells the man to look up! At that point, declares the inspired writer, the man sees “clearly” (v. 25).

Perhaps there are many explanations to this phenomenon, and you may have thoughts of your own on it. But one thing it seems the Lord is showing us is that sometimes when He heals us, He heals us in stages. Now, when we obey the gospel

– when we're “washed in the blood of the Lamb” (Rev. 1:5) – make no mistake: We are as clean as the driven snow! The Lord removes our sins as far as the east is from the west (Psalm 103:12).

But even being redeemed by the blood of the Lamb doesn't mean we don't have to work on leaving some bad habits behind and adding some new, fresh, vital details to our lives. So we have to grow in stages, walking in the light, confessing our faults, seeking the Lord every day with all we have. We have to continue to “add to our faith virtue, knowledge, temperance, patience and other Christian graces. We are, I suppose, very much a “work in progress” in many respects.

But we will see more clearly as we go, but here in this realm we will never see as clearly as when we step over onto heaven's glorious shore. When our faith gives way to sight, our eyes will no longer see men “as trees walking.” No, on that day we will see “clearly,” as clearly as the blind man of Bethsaida, and more!

The miracle happened again this year. In the southern Italian city of Naples, on his feast day, September 19, the blood of St. Januarius becomes a liquid. It happened again this year. The relic of this early Christian martyr, kept in a vial in his tomb, is dry throughout the year, except on his feast day, when it turns again into liquid blood.

The questions of science and the questions of faith are not the same. Science asks “how”, but people of faith ask “why.” Why does this miracle occur, except to remind us that our lives must pulse with the love of God - pure, flowing and free. We are the love of the Father, pure, flowing and free, as we care for one another.

It is the beginning of a new school year. And so we are aware of the ways in which we model faith to our children and grandchildren. Every married couple should pray together. They should be praying alone together, and they should be praying with their children. They should be praying as a family.

We mustn’t make it too complicated. You can pray a rosary together, as my family did, kneeling by the side of the bed of my parents. Or simply pray with a lit candle, and a word of Scripture, and lift up your needs and concerns to the Father. It is easy. We are the love of the Father, pure, flowing, and free.

We also model forgiveness to our children. We teach them how to forgive and to ask forgiveness. They should hear us say as adults, one to another, “I am sorry. I am sorry for what I did. I will try to do better. Please forgive me.” As we forgive one another, so will the Father forgive us. Our children will learn forgiveness from us. We are the love of the Father, pure, flowing, and free.

The parable of Jesus this past Sunday was the story of Lazarus and the rich man (Luke 16:19-31). It is a story that confronts us with poverty – the poverty of being unseen and unwanted. Perhaps the rich man would have judged him as lazy and worthless. St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa) once said - “If you judge people, you have no time to love them.” Our task is not to judge them, but to love them. Our task is to respond with the corporal works of mercy – to feed the hungry, to give drink to the thirsty, to shelter the homeless. St. Teresa of Calcutta also said - “The miracle is not that we do this work, but that we are happy to do it.” We are happy to share in the work of charity. We are the love of the Father, pure, flowing, and free.

Dale K. Graham Norman Veteran’s Corner

Dale K. Graham Veteran’s Corner is not affiliated with any other organization. Our services are only provided at Faith Pointe Baptist Church, 3404 NW 36th, in Norman.

Today we recognized James McMahan as our Veteran of the Week who served in the Navy during WWII. We presented him with a hat and honored him with a short ceremony. Volunteer Sgt. Major Doug DeRyckere honored N.P.D. Officer and USMC Reserve Officer Jeffrey Rogers and presented him with a Military Challenge Coin during a ceremony last Thursday morning.

Last week we were able to assist 197 veterans and surviving spouses with their claims and questions on VA benefits. The reason so many people find their way to see us on Tuesday and Thursday mornings is the volunteers who are only there to make a difference. We had veterans who came from several states last week for assistance with their VA claims. Veterans have traveled from Seattle, Wash., and from many cities in Texas, Kansas, Arizona, Arkansas and Florida.

Each week I receive phone inquiries from many other states. Currently, we are also helping veterans in North Dakota, Nebraska, Kentucky, Illinois, Georgia, South Carolina and other states. There are millions of veterans who cannot find the quality of assistance with their VA claims that our volunteers provide.

We are in need of volunteers to help us to fill the needs of our warriors and their families. There are veterans and their families we are asking to return the following week because we don’t always have enough volunteers to assist the increased number who are in need of help with their VA claims and questions. Would you please consider helping these heroes and their families and join us on Tuesday and Thursday mornings? You can help us make a difference in the lives of our men and women who have served in the military.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive the rating decisions on all veterans and surviving spouses who we

represent. I can then review each decision letter to ensure that the decisions VA made reflect the actual severity of the claim. The most difficult veteran’s disability claims to prove involves injuries that were not reported while serving in the military. Many times young military members will not seek treatment when they suffer an injury while on active duty.

While serving in Vietnam, I saw Marines that received shrapnel injuries and did not report it to our Corpsman for treatment. Those veterans were eligible to receive the Purple Heart Medal if they would have documented their injuries. There have been many injuries that were caused by falls or lifting that could be service connected if only the military member would have sought medical care.

There were four veterans who were awarded a 100 percent rating by VA for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual benefit of \$160,444 per year. I also received decisions awarding 34 veterans disability ratings from 10-90 percent for the conditions that were service-connected. These veterans will receive a combined annual income of \$394,249 per year.

Each week we are seeing approximately 25 surviving spouses who have questions and claims about VA surviving spouse benefits. For the spouses whose veteran was receiving VA benefits before passing you may be eligible for Surviving Spouse benefits from VA if one of their service-connected disabilities is listed on the Veterans Death Certificate as a contributing factor. This could be as simple as adding hearing loss and tinnitus to their death certificate. It does require that the attending physician file a request for an amended death certificate with the Oklahoma State Health Department. For your questions on this subject, please stop by and visit with Shirley or one of our other surviving spouse specialists on Tuesday or Thursday mornings.

I received a VA notification last week stating Walgreen Pharmacies have contracted with the VA to provide flu vaccines to veterans who have a VA card at no cost. Please let me know how this works out and I will share it with our readers.

For those of you who need a hospital bed, wheelchair, walker or another type of handicap item we have some available to veterans and their spouses. Please call Dale for information or stop by the church any Tuesday or Thursday.

We have a young veteran who is needing a vehicle to get to and from work. If you or someone

you know have one in good working condition you can donate, please contact us. All donations are tax deductible.

Our food sacks have become a popular item with many of the people who we serve. During the last few weeks, we have been averaging 10 or more families who are in need this service. The number of people requesting assistance paying for everyday living expenses is also increasing.

Our drivers Clayton and Louie voluntarily spent 71 hours transporting 14 folks 993 miles this past week. We are currently providing more than \$30,000 in assistance each month to people in our community who are in need. We only receive an average of \$20,000 each month which leaves us under water by about \$10,000 every month. As we all know, we can’t sustain the level of giving that we currently have without receiving more help from the men and women we have helped. Please consider helping to pay it forward to help the next veteran and surviving spouse.

On each and every visit, veterans should bring all of their DD-214’s (discharge papers), all VA rating letters, and all VA forms that have been filed. For privacy reasons, Dale K. Graham’s Veteran’s Corner does not keep your information on file and does not have access to any of this information. A couple of things are sometimes needed to file for VA benefits are D214 discharge papers, bank account information (voided check), marriage information, social security information, and all VA rating decisions.
