Anyone with any information should call the Purcell Police Department at 527-4600. Callers may remain anonymous.

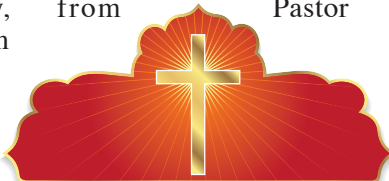
Easter Community Worship Service

OBI will conduct a blood drive from 2-6 p.m. today (April 6) at the Trinity United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

Individuals 16 and older can give blood. The OBI requires 16- and 17-year-olds weigh at least 125 pounds. Those who are 16 must also have signed parental permission. Individuals who are 18 and older must weigh at least 110 pounds.

Donors will receive a free “Hero” t-shirt in their choice of spring color: blue, purple or green.

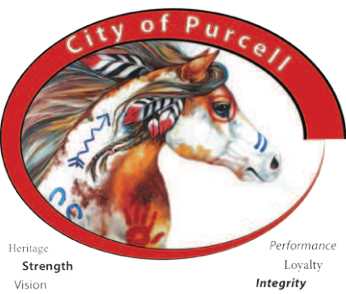
If donors opt not to take the t-shirt, funds will be donated to Global Blood Fund, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization

Behind the wheel

3D simulator drives message home in McClain County

Three wrecks in a year and McClain County Sheriff Don Hewett had enough.

“That’s too high,” Hewett said of the department’s accident rate. “It’s higher than what we want.”

Even if two of the collisions were between sheriff’s vehicles and deer.

Seeking to improve that accident rate, Hewett reached out to the Association of County Commissioners which oversees the insurance on county vehicles.

That’s when he was told about a new program to reduce accidents for sheriff’s departments and county commissioners.

The training was last week. “We were one of the first sheriff’s offices and county commissioner’s office to attend this new course,” Hewett said.

The sheriff made the training mandatory for all deputies

who operate a county vehicle, including the department’s reserves.

“That’s how much we believe in safety and training,” Hewett said. “Some of the guys had perfect driving records, but they were still required to attend.”

Thirty-one from the department took the course March 27 and 28.

David Frech, safety director for ACCO, said McClain County is the third in the state to use the new “motion-based” simulator program.

“Four or five counties used the old system last year.

The 3D simulator program was developed by Autry Technology Center in Enid, which invested about \$400,000 in the program.

Garfield County employs about 75 who drive county vehicles, Frech said. The county was averaging two to three accidents per month.

However, during 10 months after the drivers went through

the training, there were just three accidents – all involving drivers who were unable to attend the training.

Frech said last year ACCO sponsored about two-thirds of the program. It proved so successful that the decision was made to offer it to counties at no cost.

“If we can reduce accidents, it’s a wiser use of tax dollars,” he explained.

“The course involved classroom instruction and video-based scenarios,” Hewett said in something of an understatement.

Actually following the classroom portion and a written test, the deputies were placed one-by-one into a 3-D simulator for the scenarios.

“The chair rocked and rolled with you, momentum shifts,” the sheriff said. “It was just like being in a real vehicle.”

Suspect killed

Confrontation with law turned deadly

A traffic stop that turned into a high speed pursuit came to a deadly conclusion for the 57-year-old man fleeing from a McClain County deputy sheriff.

Doyle W. Johnson died at a Byars intersection on the afternoon of March 29 after being hit by bullets fired by Deputy Chris Grace, a 9-year veteran with the sheriff's department.

Sheriff Don Hewett said Johnson was driving a green pickup when Grace stopped him for a traffic violation in Rosedale.

Johnson reportedly got out of the pickup and confronted Grace before jumping back into the vehicle and speeding away.

The chase, which began at 2:33 p.m., covered about 10 miles.

Johnson pulled up outside a vacant house where he kept his dogs and again exited his pickup.

That's when he reportedly pointed a loaded 9mm semi-automatic handgun at Grace.

Before he could get off a shot, however, Grace fired two rounds, hitting Johnson.

According to Hewett, a wit-

ness later came forward and told investigators Johnson called him on a cell phone during the chase, saying he was going to stop, have a gun battle and shoot the deputy.

"He said he was not going to jail," the sheriff said.

Hewett said Johnson was originally from California, but had lived in the Byars area more than 15 years.

Johnson was known to local deputies who had "dealt with him before," the sheriff added.

Johnson's body was taken to the state medical examiner's office in Oklahoma City.

Grace has been placed on routine leave with pay while two investigations into the shooting are ongoing.

The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation was called in to investigate the shooting.

There is also an internal investigation by a sheriff's detective "to ensure our policies and procedures were followed," Hewett said.

When the OSBI completes their investigation, it will fall to the district attorney to rule on whether the shooting was justified.

At that point, Grace will be cleared to return to duty.

Farriers nail success one horse at a time

Oklahoma Horseshoeing School changed the game

One suspects that Benjamin Franklin would like Dr. Jack Roth and that the feeling would be mutual.

Roth is owner/director of the Oklahoma Horseshoeing School north of Purcell on the I-35 access road.

You see, Roth was a farrier long before he was a veterinarian.

In fact, as a young man, Roth went to what was then the country's only horseshoeing school.

He was only 19, but what he learned at Cal State Poly Technical College might not have been quite what the college intended.

"I could see they could teach much more efficiently than they did," he said.

Starting with a horseshoeing school had to be private to be a going concern.

At 21, Roth was an apprentice working for a farrier friend. He shared his idea about a better horseshoeing school with his friend who initially wasn't interested.

"But we were close friends and I made him give me the money" for a 50-50 partnership," Roth said.

His plans were interrupted, first by Vietnam and after his discharge, by life.

When he got out of the service, Roth applied to vet school but was turned down.

The second time he applied, Roth was admitted to the col-

lege.

By then his horseshoeing school at Stillwater was doing good enough that he couldn't throw it away.

He graduated in 1977 and moved to Oklahoma City on Jan. 7, 1978, where he owned and operated an Emergency Vet Hospital.

Roth took the equine and large animal cases and left the small animals to the veterinarians working for him.

"At one time I had five vets working for me," he said. "It was a nice practice."

He stayed there about 18

years until, as he put it, Oklahoma City became "too citified."

He kept the horseshoeing school, which he relocated to McClain County and continued to rewrite the book on how to best train farriers.

"We do the basics," he said.

While other schools — and yes, there are others now — tell their graduates that they need

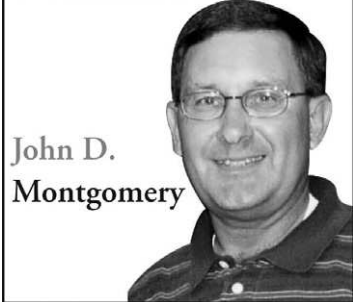

Congress must finish their job

President Trump and his administration have laid out a very ambitious legislative agenda. Health care reform, border security, tax reform, increased military spending and a massive investment in our nation's infrastructure are just a few examples of the complex policy changes the Administration is pursuing.

While I support the Administration's overall policy agenda, with a few exceptions, I believe Congress needs to take care of our basic responsibilities before embarking on the more difficult and time-consuming agenda items.

To be sure, these big-ticket proposals should be considered, debated and voted upon. However, before taking these issues on, Congress needs to take care of their basic responsibilities of governing.

The most fundamental responsibilities of Congress are to set a budget, prioritize the spending through the appropriations process and make

certain that the United States pays its bills. Unfortunately, this process rarely goes as expected or intended.

With respect to the federal government, the fiscal year begins on October 1, and ends on September 30. Under regular order, Congress should have passed, and the President should have signed, the thirteen appropriation bills before the fiscal year began.

Yet, five months after the beginning of the 2017 fiscal year, Congress still has not fulfilled that responsibility.

The failure to pass these appropriations bills leaves the country with two alternatives – shutting the government down or passing a continuing resolution. A continuing resolution simply means that current spending levels and policies continue.

This takes away the opportunity for Congress to adjust spending levels and policies in order to reflect changing needs and priorities. While it is an irresponsible way to run a government, it is still better

than shutting the government down.

Since the beginning of the current fiscal year, Congress has passed two continuing resolutions, the second of which expires on April 28. If that date rolls around and Congress still has not completed the appropriations process, we will yet again be faced with another continuing resolution, or a government shutdown - both of which represent a reckless and irresponsible way of governing.

President Trump and the Republican Congress have a very determined legislative agenda to restore our military capabilities, overhaul our tax code, secure our borders and fix our broken health care system. However, none of this will happen if Congress fails to perform the most basic task of keeping the government open. As a member of both the Budget and Appropriations Committees,

I am committed to doing everything in my power to make sure Congress finishes the job they should have completed last October.

Trimming the fat to find the bacon

We've officially reached the halfway point for this legislative session. It's my fifth session as a state representative, and I'm proud to say our budget talks are moving much faster than in years past.

By way of background, the House of Representatives began budget discussions late last year. Then in January, the House held a series of meetings that were open to the public. Five of the biggest state agencies came to the state Capitol and gave presentations about agency priorities as well as the scope of their duties.

These meetings were largely unprecedented, and they allowed every state representative to get a better grasp on budget issues.

The meetings didn't end there though. We wrapped up floor work early the week of March 20, and the House spent hours on March 23 hearing from more state agencies. These meetings took place in smaller Appropria-

tions & Budget subcommittee groups, which allowed representatives to have a more direct conversation with directors from various agencies.

Mid-session budget meetings for the entire House were new this year, and they are a direct reflection of the current leadership. Speaker Charles McCall has voiced his commitment to restoring Oklahoma's financial future, and these meetings were a definite step in that direction.

As I'm sure you're aware, there has been a lot of discussion over how to best fill that \$878 million hole in next year's budget. These talks are ongoing.

It's impossible to spend a day at the Capitol without someone bringing up the budget and brainstorming ways to fix it.

First and foremost, House Republicans want to look at all other options before discussion raising taxes on families. I believe we should first check for efficiencies in agency spending and look at things like tax credits, exemptions and deductions

before increasing taxes.

While people may groan when they hear the word "efficiencies," I know we can always operate more efficiently. I cannot think of a single private sector company that would claim to have reached peak efficiency. Companies are constantly seeking to improve their bottom line, and I believe we should do the same.

From now until the end of the legislative session in May, the budget will be the main focus for the House of Representatives. We'd like to bring substantial appropriations bills to the floor earlier than the final week, and we're taking steps to do so.

The Joint Committee on Appropriations & Budget, or JCAB, has already held its first meeting, so I wouldn't be surprised if we start looking at JCAB bills relatively soon.

It's important to remember this lengthy budget process is

Why oh why

After the drubbing they took at the hands of Barack Obama and the then-resurgent Democrats in 2008, Republicans did an admirable job of fighting back in subsequent election years. Running behind the allure of electing the first black president and Mr. Obama's unquestioned silver tongue, after the 2008 elections the Democrats effectively held the U.S. Senate 60-40 and the House of Representatives 255-178.

But in 2010 — the year of the Tea Party — the GOP roared back — almost all the way (the presidency excluded since it wasn't up). At the end of that cycle, Republicans controlled the House 242-193. Democrats still had the Senate but by a reduced margin of 53-47 rather than 60-40.

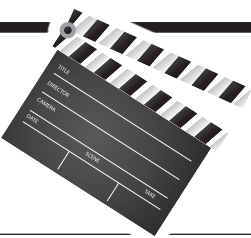
Now it's 2012 and another presidential election. Mr. Obama brushed off Mitt Romney and the Democrats captured eight more seats in the House, cutting the GOP lead there to 234-201. In the Senate, the Republicans lost two seats but off-year vacancies had benefited the Republicans and the margin was still 53-47 Democrats.

It's 2014 and changes were in the air. The Republicans clobber the Democrats in the Senate elections and wind up with a 54-46 majority. In the House, the Republicans gain 13 seats and control 247-188.

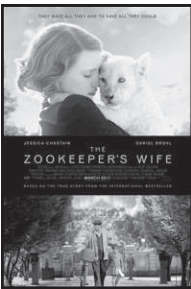

Well I guess the movies can't be good every week. Oh well, here's what I saw.



First up is "The Zookeeper's Wife." Based on the book of the same name, the "The Zookeeper's

Wife" tells the real life story of a Polish family who use their zoo to rescue and protect Jewish people from Nazis during World War II.

I was really looking forward to this movie. It had a really good trailer and the story sounded fascinating.

And while it wasn't all bad, I sadly left the theater pretty disappointed. Let's start with the good. I think it was well acted for the most part. Jessica Chastain plays the zookeeper's wife and she does a fine job in the role and was very believable. Same with the actor who plays her husband, Johan Heldenbergh. No complaints about either of them.

On the other hand Daniel Brühl, as Lutz Heck the German zoologist, was way too over the top.

Maybe his character would have worked in a film that didn't have such a serious setting, but it almost seemed like he was trying to play a villain from a comic book. He might as well have been holding a sign saying "I'm evil" while twirling his moustache and tying a damsel to some train tracks.

Another problem with this movie is the way they told the story.

Without warning the movie jumps days, weeks, even years without a second thought. It was very jarring at times. It's like the filmmakers knew which parts of the story they wanted to tell, but didn't know how to connect them all together.

But the worst thing of all, this movie is just plain boring. It felt like it dragged on and on. I think it comes down to me just not getting invested in these characters.

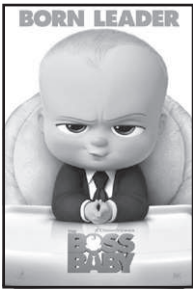
It's such a shame too. I can't put my finger on it, but I had a hard time caring about anyone in this movie. Somehow the film made me feel more for the animals in the zoo than it did for Jews being murdered by Nazis.

I honestly feel kind of bad. The movie tells the tale of real life heroes, but I could barely keep my eyes open because I wasn't engaged in the story or characters at all.

Your mileage may vary though.

This is certainly a story worth learning more about. You may be better off cracking open a book than watching the movie though.

"The Zookeeper's Wife" is rated PG-13.

I have to give the movie credit. There are a few really funny moments here and there and Baldwin's delivery is great as always.

Many of Medicare's preventive screenings come at no cost to you

How often have you tried to ignore an ache or pain by telling yourself, "Maybe if I do nothing, it'll go away." Sometimes, that works. But wishful thinking isn't the best way to take care of yourself.

Medicare has put a new emphasis on preventive healthcare.

A few years ago, Medicare mostly concerned itself with paying for your treatment after you got sick. Now, it's also focused on helping you stay healthy and avoid diseases and illnesses in the first place.

People with Medicare are entitled to a broad range of exams, lab tests and screenings to detect health problems early, when they're most treatable or curable. Many now come at no out-of-pocket cost.

Many immunizations are also free.

To make sure you get started on the right foot, Medicare covers a "welcome to Medicare" visit with your physician during the first 12 months you're enrolled in the Part B medical insurance program.

Your doctor will evaluate your health, discuss any preventive services you may need, like shots or screenings, and make referrals for more care if required. There's no out-of-pocket cost.

You can make the most of your visit by coming prepared. That means bringing a complete list of your prescriptions, your family health history and your medical records, including immunizations.

Medicare also pays for an annual wellness visit with your primary care doctor. This isn't the same as an annual physical, since it isn't a head-to-toe examination. But it does provide the same opportunity to discuss

your health.

Your doctor will develop a personalized prevention plan to keep you healthy. The visit also includes a review of your medications and routine measurements, like your height, weight, blood pressure and body mass index.

More than 40 million older Americans with Medicare -- including 475,000 Oklahomans -- received at least one preventive service at no cost to them last year.

Here's a rundown of some of these services:

- Cardiovascular screenings check cholesterol and other blood fat levels. Medicare pays for the test once every five years.
- Blood sugar screenings can determine whether you have diabetes. Based on your health, you may be eligible for up to two screenings each year.
- Mammograms check for breast cancer. Medicare covers a screening every 12 months for women 40 and older and one baseline mammogram for women 35 to 39.
- Medicare typically pays for a flu shot once every flu season, a pneumonia vaccination and, if you're at medium to high risk, a hepatitis B shot.
- Colonoscopies can find precancerous growths early. Medicare covers the screenings once every 10 years or, if you're at high risk, once every two years. You pay nothing for the test itself.

If your physician removes a polyp, you may need to pay 20 percent of the Medicare-approved amount for the doctor's services and a copayment for the outpatient setting.

- Prostate cancer screenings include a yearly PSA test and digital rectal exam for men 50 and older. The PSA test is free. You pay 20 percent of the cost for the rectal exam, after meeting your deductible.
- Medicare pays for one

depression screening per year. The screening must be done in a primary-care setting, like a doctor's office, that can provide follow-up treatment and referrals.

- If you're a smoker, you qualify for eight free counseling sessions each year to help you quit.
- Likewise, if you're obese with a body mass index of 30 or higher, you may be eligible for free counseling sessions to help you lose weight.
- Medicare pays for HIV screening for people at increased risk for the virus, people who ask for the test, or pregnant women. Medicare covers the test once every year or up to three times during a pregnancy.

Keeping up-to-date with screenings and immunizations is important, so Medicare encourages you to visit mymedicare.gov and register.

There, you can see a description of your covered preventive services, the last date you had a particular test and the next date you qualify for it again.

By eliminating the out-of-pocket costs for many screenings and tests, Medicare's new emphasis on prevention not only can save you money, it can help you take control of your health.

It may even help save your life.

Warm weather poison hazards

As the springtime temperatures emerge, Oklahomans will steadily become more active both inside and outside their homes. As they being working around the house or meeting friends and family for outdoor activities, it will be important to always keep safety in mind.

Poison hazards are around us year-round, but some of these dangers are unique to the warmer days of summer. This is especially true for outdoor activities.

Homeowners focused on shaping up their lawns and tending their gardens may rely on com-

mon lawn care products such as lime, fertilizer, herbicides and insecticides.

Some of these products can burn the skin or irritate the eyes, nose or mouth. In particular, some herbicides and pesticides also can be harmful if swallowed or inhaled.

Take the time to read the label, follow the directions and store them properly when you've finished using them. Pay attention to the weather conditions, too.

On windy days, it may be best to avoid applying certain products in order to reduce the change of skin, eye, throat or lung irritation.

During summer barbecues, charcoal lighter fluid should be stored up high and away and out of sight in order to be kept safely out of reach of children, because if swallowed, it could easily get into their lungs.

The same care should be taken with other types of lighter fluids and hydrocarbons such as gasoline and kerosene.

Finally, post the number for poison control near each phone in the house and store the number in your cell phone.

In case of a poison-related emergency, call 800-222-1222 to speak with a poison specialist. The line is available 24-7.

Chickasaw Nation to host stomp dance presentation in Purcell

The Chickasaw Nation will host a stomp dance presentation from 6-8 p.m., Thursday, April 6, at 1430 Hardcastle Blvd in Purcell. This event is open to the public at no charge.

Instructor Jesse Lindsey, who is cultural activities manager for the tribe, will talk about the history and cultural significance of stomp dancing. He will also play flute, sing and answer questions.

While there are still different dances for various occasions, stomp dances today are often social rather than spiritual in nature. No matter the type of dancing, it is always an opportunity to come together as a community.

Men sing stomp dance songs in a call-and-answer format, following a male song leader, who often sets the dance rhythm using a handheld turtle shell rattle. Women enhance the rhythms with shakers made from box turtle shells worn on their legs.

Social dances often have

animal-themed names, like the snake dance and the raccoon dance. Each social dance has a fun and unique technique. The snake dance, for example, has dancers hold hands while they curve and swerve much like a snake would.

The snake dance is one of the oldest-known Chickasaw dances and has been passed on to successive generations.

The Chickasaw Nation has planned monthly community arts and crafts classes for locations across south central and central Oklahoma all year. Class topics include the Chickasaw language, finger weaving, beading and painting.

A language class will be offered in May at Pauls Valley. Upcoming classes are also planned for Duncan, Oklahoma City and Ardmore.

EBT for children accepting applications

Families with children who receive free or reduced school meals are eligible for free food this summer through a program offered by the Chickasaw Nation.

Chickasaw Nation Nutrition Services is now accepting applications for the summer Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) for children program, which aims to enhance children's nutrition by compensating for

the lack of school meals during the summer months.

Qualifying families will receive approximately \$30 of food per child, per month for the three summer months.

This federally-funded program is open to the public and is in its fifth year of operation. Last year, the program served over 23,000 students.

Program officials said only half of all eligible families

tend to apply, though funding is planned to cover everyone who is eligible.

This program does not overlap with any other program in the area and will not disqualify a family from any other benefit.

To qualify for this program, a child must be enrolled in a participating school district in

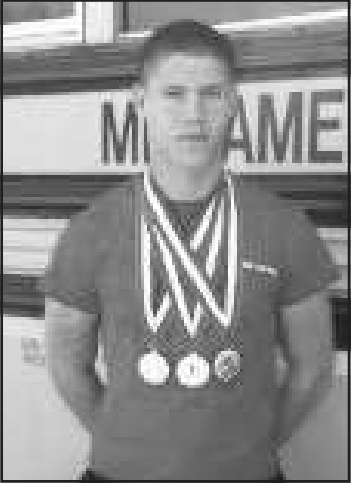

Drive:

It was so realistic, in fact, that two deputies became car sick, one so severely he was sent home.

But not until he passed the course.

Frech said that deputy was the second of about 200 who have gone through the 3D simulator, confirming the estimate that 1 percent will become carsick.

Frech said the simulator is more cost effective than use of a skid car in training.

“You get the same situations in the simulator without damage to the vehicle or risk of

injury. It’s amazing the different scenarios and nobody is in harm’s way.”

The simulator can handle 16 drivers per day.

“Each deputy did four scenarios,” Hewett said, adding the scenarios featured actual road situations a deputy might

their graduates that they need to apprentice themselves to farriers for a couple of years, Roth’s message to his graduates is this:

“When you are done here, you’re ready to go to work for yourself shoeing horses.”

“I know what my kids have got to learn – to make a set of shoes and put on that horse.”

Oklahoma Horseshoeing School offers three separate courses, with a new class starting every Monday.

There’s a 2-week course which is primarily for the horse owner wanting to shoe his or her own horses.

An 8-week course is “suitable for being able to shoe for a living – a tough row to hoe.”

The 12-week course is the most extensive and includes hands-on work with corrective shoeing and understanding the horsemanship that goes with it.

Time was Roth and his instructors would load the students into a bus and make farm calls, shoeing and trimming horses for the public.

Rosie Spurlin, the school’s manager, changed that.

“My father worked here for many years,” Spurlin said. “We came from Mexico and after high school, I started working for the school.”

She was 16 when she started work in August 1996.

“Rosie was so young, too young to know we didn’t have to do it that way,” Roth said.

Instead of farm calls, horse owners were soon setting appointments and bringing their horses to the school.

After six to eight months, Roth sold the bus.

“We didn’t need it anymore,” he explained.

Spurlin said there’s no lack of customers. The school charges

\$15 for a hoof trim and \$30 for shoes. That’s about a third of the cost area farriers charge.

The customers are on 6- to 8-week schedules so appointments are recurring.

“It’s just like a beauty school,” Spurlin said. “You take your risks, but we stand behind the student’s work.”

Enrollment averages 15 to 30 students at any time with four full time instructors.

The in-house rule is no more than 10 students per instructor, Roth said, and seven or eight is better.

In addition to the Oklahoma Horseshoeing School, Roth owns a factory in the Philippines that manufactures horse-shoeing tools.

“Nobody can do what we can do,” he said. “The procedure is very hard, but it makes really fine tools.”

The factory employs nearly

for the increase to diamond member status after a “Bridge Builders” presentation by the chamber’s new executive director, Mandy Davis.

Davis showed how the city’s support is spent by the chamber, with \$12,500 for economic development, \$5,000 each for tourism and quality of life initiatives and \$2,500 for business advocacy.

Though the chamber represents Purcell, Lexington, Washington, Wayne and Goldsby, at present it receives financial assistance only from Purcell and Lexington.

“We hope to see that change,” Davis said, adding that Purcell accounts for 85 percent of the chamber’s business members.

Council member Graham Fishburn asked why other communities want to be part

of Purcell’s chamber of commerce.

“The communities need us, but more importantly, we need them,” council member Danny Jacobs responded.

City manager Dale Bunn said the city’s financial support of the chamber was \$22,000 last year.

Davis, the only full-time employee at the chamber, has a part-time administrative assistant, Gayla Riddle.

She said the increased funding will help make Riddle’s position full-time.

Davis has also changed the chamber’s hours to 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The council also approved a funding increase for Purcell Public Library.

Librarian Peggy Cook said the library continues to see growth in its public events.

Between 1,400 and 1,500 people per week utilize the library.

Cook said Purcell Public Library draws patrons from “far east of the prison to west of Dibble.”

The service area also extends from Washington on the north to the county line on the south.

The library will receive \$10,500 from the city for FY 2017-18. Last year’s support was \$10,300.

The support will be spent as follows: \$1,000 for programs for preschoolers, \$1,700 for children’s programs, \$800 each for teen and adult programs, \$1,200 for family community programs and \$5,000 for replacing furnishings.

The city’s Independence Day fireworks show at Purcell Lake will be moved from July 3 to July 1.

The council approved the date change after learning the Huauni Hunting Club will sponsor a noodling tournament at the lake on June 30 and July 1.

Daniel Ott, chairman of Purcell’s Parks and Recreation Board, said the club has estimated the tournament will draw up to 1,500 people a day.

The club plans to make the tournament an annual event.

The council also accepted a \$23,096 FEMA grant and a local match of \$1,154 to purchase a specialized washer and dryer to launder fire retardant clothing for the fire department.

Also approved was a budget amendment of \$360,000, payable to Purcell Municipal Hospital.

The funds are the proceeds from a penny sales tax approved by the voters last year to support the hospital.

Mayor Ted Cox appointed Charlie Sherman to serve on the Purcell Senior Citizens Board and the council also named Karla Brakefield and Valerye Haley to board terms.

In other business, the council:

- approved an ordinance making the alley south of First Baptist Church one way east-bound between Green Avenue and 4th Avenue;
- approved zoning changes to R2 (single family residential) and A1 (agricultural) on two tracts totaling 20 acres east of 2200 Weedn Blvd;
- authorized Kenny Sullivan to advertise for bids for a left turn lane project on State Highway 74 south and to clear and landscape the swimming pool site;
- accepted a maintenance agreement with the Oklahoma Department of Transportation for lighting on the new bridge over the South Canadian River; and
- proclaimed the month of April as Fair Housing Month and Child Abuse Prevention Month and the week of April 24-28 as Week of the Young Child.

lived when they headed north on I-35 and were apprehended by Purcell police officers.

According to Garvin County Sheriff Larry Rhodes, the escape began shortly before 10 p.m., while Jeremy D. Lavorchek, 29, of Pauls Valley was being moved.

Lavorchek managed to enter the control room where, using a homemade knife held to the throat of a female jailer, Lavorchek forced another detention deputy to release Travis E. Seat, 31, of Midwest City.

At 10:11 p.m., the pair escaped from the jail with a set of keys belonging to one of the

jailers. They found the jailer’s van outside the courthouse and with Lavorchek behind the wheel drove away.

Rhodes spotted the van in Paoli and, with Purcell police, began a pursuit when the escapees drove onto the interstate northbound.

The pursuit ended north of mile marker 96 when officers used a tactical maneuver and stop sticks to disable the van.

Lavorchek was taken into custody when the van ran off the highway.

Seat ran away, but was captured at 10:50 p.m. in a field east of the interstate.

Rhodes said Monday investigation is continuing into how the prisoners were able to make the knife and escape.

At the time of their escape, both men were being held on \$1 million bond following a 2016 armed robbery at Legacy Pharmacy in Pauls Valley.

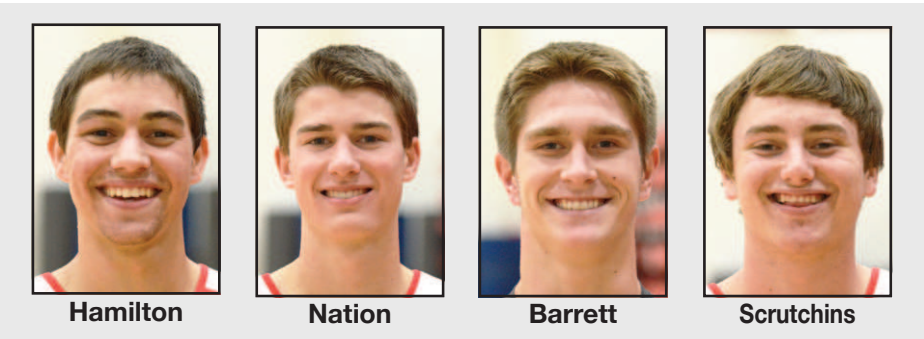

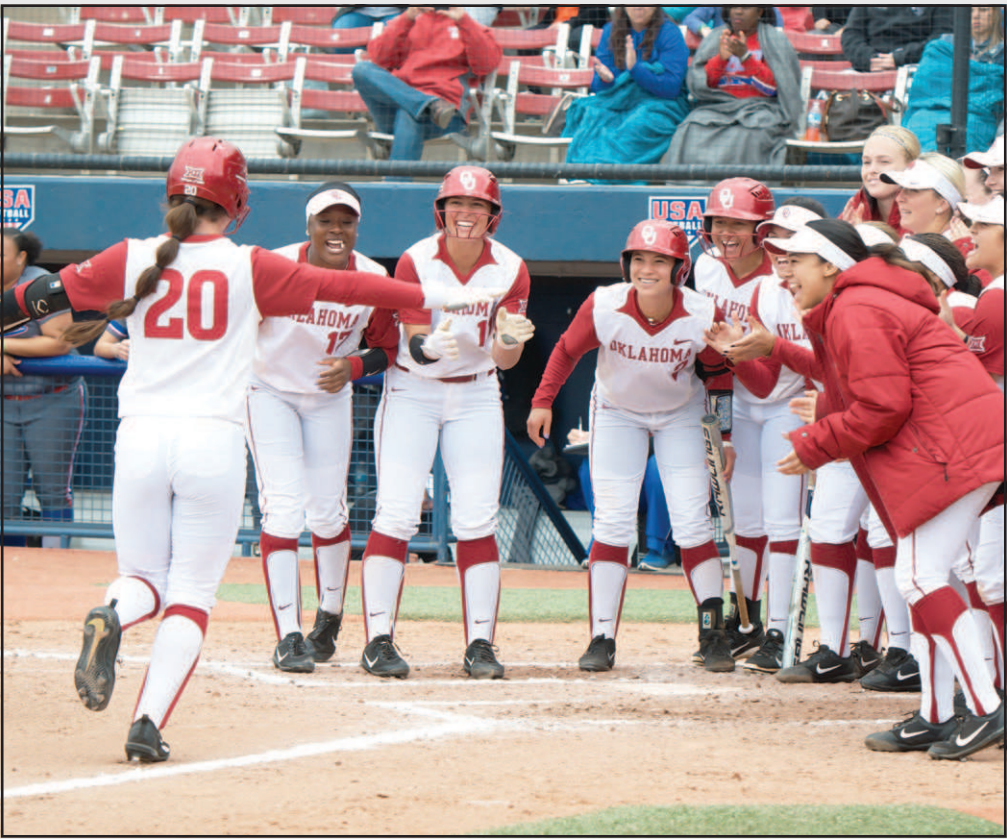

"Plainview is good, but we didn't give ourselves a chance. We didn't swing the ball well," Lucas said.

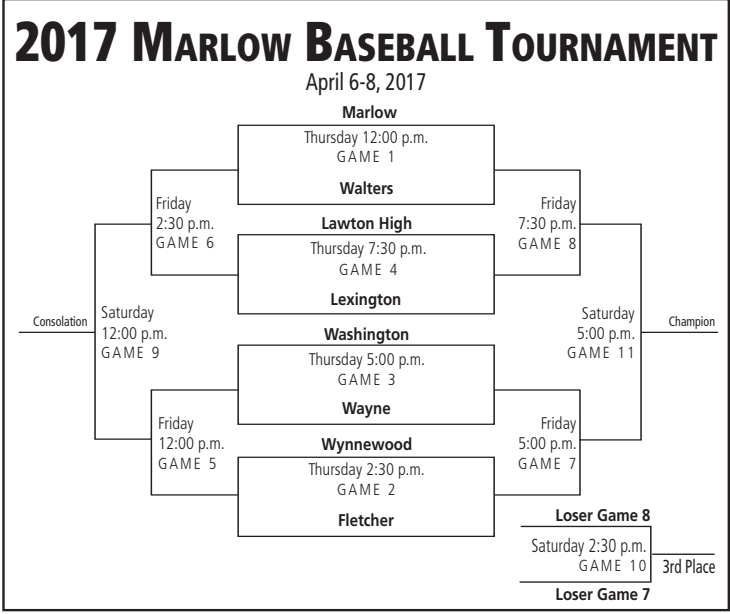
With five runs on just six total hits, the Bulldogs weren't able to keep up with the bats of

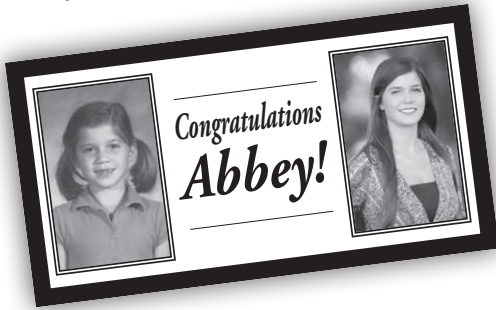
Purcell, 9-4, is scheduled for four more games this week and four next week.

Veterans Corner would like to reach out to Oklahoma veterans and spouses who served at Camp Lejeune in North Carolina, from August 1953 to December 1987.

Recent studies have found that veterans serving there were possibly exposed to contaminated drinking water. Veterans suffering from one of the following related ailments should file a claim for VA compensation: adult leukemia; aplastic anemia and other myelodysplastic syndromes; bladder cancer; kidney cancer; liver

cancer; multiple myeloma; non-Hodgkin’s lymphoma; Parkinson’s disease.

On March 14, the VA accelerated the process of qualifying for Camp Lejeune related disability pay.

Even reservists who spent weekends or annual training at Camp Lejeune (for a total of at least 30 days), will be eligible for VA compensation if they have one of the presumptive ailments listed above. If a veteran died from any of these ailments, their surviving spouses or children will see VA claims for Dependency and Indemnity Compensation fast-tracked too. To schedule a visit for Tuesdays, please contact Helen at 405-550-8806 Ext. 102. We are at the church each Thursday morning at 7 a.m. Please arrive by 9 a.m.

Today we recognize our two drivers who transport veterans every day to their VA appointments and Faith Pointe Baptist Church each Tuesday and Thursday. Both men dedicate their time making a difference in the lives of their fellow veterans and their families. This week Clayton and Louie spent 76 hours transporting 28 veterans 1,461 miles. We appreciate Clayton Lee and Louie Metseff for being there for these men and women who have served our country in the military.

We have started tracking the number of veterans from Norman who visit us each week and the financial impact of awards made to Norman residents. Last week there were 28 from Norman assisted with their claims for benefits. There were also five from Norman approved for veteran's benefits which totaled a combined annual benefit of \$149,974.48. I don't know of any volunteer organization who can match what we do each week for our veterans.

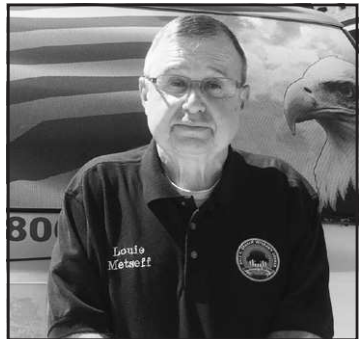
Two hundred fifteen veterans and spouses visited our volunteers for help with their VA claims for benefits last week. Many of these men and women had never filed for VA benefits before. As we do not advertise our services, we use the best method possible which is the recommendations from other veterans and their families that ours is the place to go for help in applying for VA benefits.

I believe the approval rate we have is unmet by any other organization in this United States. That is probably the reason we have veterans visiting us from most every state in the country.

Last week we helped veterans from Minnesota, Texas, Kansas, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico and California. As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive all the VA rating decisions on the men and women we are helping with their claim. Last week 46 rating decisions were approved for veterans and surviving spouses. Of these, there were 15 veterans approved at the 100 percent rate for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$567,951.48 per year. There were also 29 veterans whose disability rating was approved from 10-90 percent. This group of veterans will receive a combined annual amount of \$283,386.72.

When we moved to Faith Pointe Baptist Church, I had no idea we would be able to accomplish so much for so many of our nation's veterans. We are averaging around a million dollars each week in VA benefits for the men and women who have served our country in the military. Some of these veterans will have physical or mental scars for the rest of their lives.

It is an incredible honor to play a small part in helping them receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible. It seems to me that doing our work in God's House has enabled us to take this organization to the next level. I for one feel that it allows our veterans and surviving spouses to be in a safe place

when they are talking about the things that happened to them in the military.

As more veterans and their families seek us out for help with their VA claims and questions, we are receiving more requests for financial assistance than we can accommodate. Our Board of Directors has instructed us to reduce the amount of support we provide for rent and utility payments. We will continue aiding for medical testing, food boxes, and transportation of veterans to their VA appointments. We have been spending an average of \$30,000 each month to provide services to veterans and their families.

As we move forward, I would personally like to help as many people as we are financially able to do so. We could use a building with easy access to Interstate 35 where we could offer our services more than our current Tuesday and Thursday mornings each week. There is an unmet need in our community when it comes to veterans and surviving spouse VA benefits. Just think what would be possible to accomplish if we could help the many veterans or their spouses who are not able to visit us or are in assisted living centers. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit, your contributions to the Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation are tax deductible. Your financial assistance will help us provide services to veterans and their families.

We plan to have a volunteer training class on April 24 at 9 a.m. that will enable each of us to be more knowledgeable in the VA claims process. I encourage all our volunteers to attend this training. As always, we encourage others to be a part of what we do each Tuesday and Thursday morning.

As the number of volunteers has increased the need for more laptops and printers has increased. For those of you who would like to help with the purchase of these items, we use the following types: H-P Laptops and HP Laser printers. We can always use the following items, printing paper, coffee, 8 oz. coffee cups, pens, and pencils. An automatic donation can be established for those who would like to help us financially to meet the needs of our veterans and their families.

On Saturday mornings, the Well-Preserved Radio Show with Eunice Khoury is broadcast on KTOK AM 1000 radio station at 7 AM. Recently I was asked to be a guest on a quarterly basis to talk about veterans benefits on the air. I'm very proud to have the opportunity to speak about the veterans benefits the men and women who served in our military are eligible to receive. I'm hoping that we will have the opportunity to answer questions from the audience.

My goal is to help as many veterans as possible in the time I have left on this earth. For those of you who would like to become a volunteer or a financial supporter of what we do, please visit us any Tuesday or Thursday morning at Faith Pointe Baptist Church.

 ORDINANCE NO. 17-04

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PURCELL DESIGNATING THE ALLEY OF BLOCK 119 TO BE A ONE WAY ALLEY FROM WEST TO EAST; AUTHORIZING SAID CHANGE TO BE MADE TO THE OFFICIAL MAP OF THE CITY OF PURCELL; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR REPEALER; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that said alley should be a one way alley from West to East;

NOW, THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PURCELL HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. DESIGNATION OF AN ALLEY AS A ONE WAY ALLEY.

The alley of Block 119 of the City of Purcell is hereby declared to be a one way alley from West to East.

SECTION 2. CITY CLERK AUTHORIZED TO CHANGE CITY MAP.

Said change, herein above described, is hereby authorized to be added to the official Map of the City of Purcell, Oklahoma by the City Clerk.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction, said portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. REPEALER

All ordinance or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. EMERGENCY.

Whereas, it being immediately necessary for the preservation of the peace, health, welfare and safety of the City of Purcell, Oklahoma, and the inhabitants thereof that provisions of the ordinance be put into full force and effect, an emergency is hereby declared to exist.

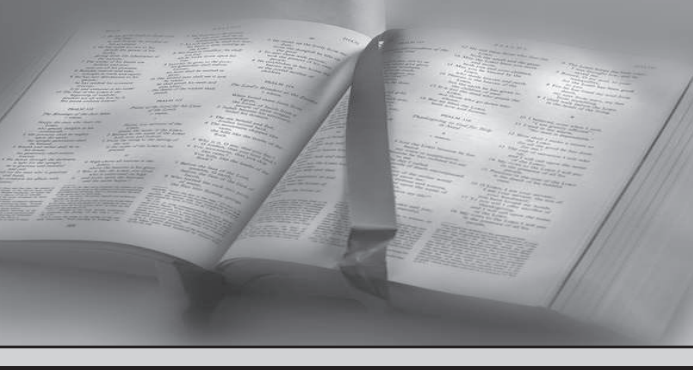

Good day, Oklahoma friends. Welcome, as always, to our weekly front porch visit:

For today: Be a can man!

Please read on.

This past Lord's Day – as we surveyed scenes from the book of Acts – we discussed the encouraging life of one of the great unsung heroes in the New Testament: Barnabas. Barnabas is one of a long line of great faithful men of the Bible with that rare and special spirit. His life is one of the most positive, determined, faithful, encouraging, purpose-driven, God-fearing men of the Bible.

He has a “counterpart” back in the Old Testament, too. It is hard to consider the positive, encouraging spirit of Barnabas without thinking of the Old Testament's “Barnabas,” a man named Caleb.

Do you remember when the 12 spies in Moses' day go over to spy out the land of Canaan, as recorded in Numbers 13? All of the men come back with a similar view of the land.

“The land where you sent us ... surely floweth with milk and honey” (v. 27) is the consensus. They recognized the beauty and value of the land they had only dreamed of before. But there is a problem. Ten of the spies add this footnote to their report: “Nevertheless, the people be strong that dwell in the land, and

the cities are walled, and very great: and moreover we saw the children of Anak there” (v. 28).

This lack of faith infuriates Joshua and Caleb, the two “faithful” spies who had gone over to view Canaan with the other ten. Caleb steps up immediately and “stills the people,” saying, “Let us go up at once, and possess it; for we are well able to overcome it!” (v. 30). If you'll go over to the “counterpart,” Barnabas does a very similar thing in Acts 9:27 when he stands up by the newly-converted Saul of Tarsus.

But as strong as Caleb is – as positive, determined, faithful, encouraging, purpose-driven, and God-fearing – this servant of the Lord is unable to infuse faith in the cowardly spies. As a result, God sends these Israelites on a 40-year exile walking in circles in the wilderness between the Red Sea and the Jordan River!

But, listen, 40 years don't weaken Caleb! After those four long, hard decades – after burying every man over the age of 20 in the wilderness (except Joshua and Caleb) – Caleb leads the march across the Jordan River. And after they overtake Jericho, Joshua begins to divvy out the inheritances. It is then that Caleb steps up much as he had earlier and reminds Joshua of his faith:

“I am as strong this day as I was in the day that Moses sent me: as my strength was then, even so is my strength now,” he says.

Then he points over to a mountain nearby, a mountain in the land of Hebron, and says to Joshua, “Give me this mountain!” (Joshua 14:11-12).

And Joshua gives him that mountain, the blessed land where Abraham and Sarah and other great patriarchs had long been buried.

Let us take the spirit of Caleb with this week! One thing very special about the old soldier Caleb is that he is a “Can” man. When the “cannot” attitude is in vogue among the Israelites, he chooses to have that positive CAN attitude that says this can be done – will be done! – with the Lord's help!

We know there will be many “cannot” people that we encounter. But, friends, let's make sure we are “can” people. We can win this battle, says Caleb. And, says Barnabas, we “can” forgive this new disciple Saul, a great preacher, says Barnabas!

And so can we today! In fact, with the Lord's blessings, and as we lean on the Lord, the battle is already won! Let us rest in that thought.

Deacon John Warren preached this past week on the raising of Lazarus in the Gospel of John, chapter 11. The evangelist thought this incident was so important that he devoted a full chapter to it! Deacon Warren presented us with three scenarios “from the minds and hearts of parishioners.”

First, the church bulletin item asks for volunteers for the St. Vincent de Paul Society. A parishioner reflects: “That group does so many good things for the poor and needy. I know it would be a wonderful experience to be a part of it. But I’m afraid I might become too committed. I am afraid of actually meeting and getting to know poor people, afraid of the surprised reactions of friends over my sudden ‘do-good-ism’.” So he stays in his own comfortable little box.

Another parishioner reflects: “Someone I know has been diagnosed with a serious illness. I’d like to call. I’d like to offer to help. But I don’t really know what to say or do or offer. I am concerned that I will say the wrong thing and make matters worse. Besides, there are people a lot closer to him who can help better than I can. Better for all concerned that I not venture too far out of my safe little box.”

A third church member hears that the parish needs teachers for religious education classes. “I’m sure I don’t know enough to do that. I really don’t want to commit myself to do something new and to do it every weekend. I just don’t see myself as a teacher or as a classroom helper. Besides, I am afraid that I might fail. There are lots of good reasons not to help. I am more comfortable in my own little box.”

The “boxes” we create for ourselves can quickly become “tombs.” We don’t need to reach out. We don’t have to do something new. We don’t have to deal with new relationships. It’s as if we are encased in cement—protected from an ugly world. No danger of over-commitment. No danger of commitment. It is almost as if we have been buried in a tomb of comfort and safety. Everyone has some reason that prevents them from being the kind of spouse, parent, parishioner, child or friend that they want to be. They let some emotion bind them up and bury them in tombs that they cannot get out of.

But before we become totally dead to the life that exists around us, Jesus invites us to stop and look at these feelings which control us. Jesus calls not only to Lazarus but to each of us: “Come out! Go free! Unbind yourselves of the wrappings of death!” The Christ who consoles Martha and Mary consoles us. He promises us that death is not an end but a beginning: the Christ who raises Lazarus from his grave calls us out of our emotional graves.

This Friday, April 7, is the last meager meal at 6 p.m. and Stations of the Cross at 7 p.m. for the season of Lent. The Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) will also be available that evening following the praying of the Stations.

We will have a parish spring clean-up day the following morning starting at 8 a.m. Come and join in the fun!

Don’t forget to come to Mass a wee bit early on Palm Sunday to pick up your palm branch and assemble at the Hall for the opening prayer and procession into the Church.

As meth surges, overdose death reach new record in Oklahoma

A record number of Oklahomans died from drug overdoses in 2016, and for the first time in years, methamphetamine was the single biggest killer, preliminary data shows.

An Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control analysis shows 952 people died from overdoses, and the number is likely to rise as pending autopsies are finalized. The total number of overdose deaths is well above the 862 recorded in 2015 and the previous record of 870 in 2014.

Meth was involved in 328 of the deaths, climbing steeply from 271 in 2015 and surpassing the total combined deaths involving much-abused opioids hydrocodone and oxycodone.

Opioids remain a potent threat, however. As a group, they were involved in more fatal overdoses than meth last year.

Fatal heroin overdoses continued to surge, with the drug involved in 49 deaths in 2016, up from 31 in 2015. Other states have seen larger increases in deadly heroin abuse.

The Narcotics Bureau said its numbers derive from its running collection of autopsy results from the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner.

Narcotics Bureau spokesman Mark Woodward attributed the meth-related deaths partly to the growing use and continued availability of the drug.

Oklahoma’s high rates of mental illness and addiction, along with crackdowns on opioid prescribing, have made the state a ready market for a form of meth, called “ice,” provided by Mexican cartels.

The living-room meth labs of the previous decade are less common now, with discoveries of labs

“When I first came here that first week sure was rough. I wasn’t quite sure if I would make it. Thankfully my friend Caleb asked if I wanted to go to church with him. I’m sure glad I said yes because here I am on my last week. It has been a blessing meeting all of you and being able to worship and eat with everyone. God Bless, Caleb.”

Another lady student back home in Nebraska wrote to my wife, “Until then take care and stay cool. Your friend, adopted daughter if you like. God Bless. Love, Riyatta.”

Ava Fredrick was recognized for having celebrated her eleventh birthday. The children of the church provided the special music for the morning worship. Gynean Gentry and her granddaughter, Lily, also provided special music.

decreasing dramatically, Woodward said. Instead, meth comes from “super labs” in Mexico and along the U.S.-Mexico border.

People who once would have cooked small amounts of meth to sell and use now steal or barter to feed their habits.

“It’s cheap, it’s accessible and someone in your circle will have it if you’re using drugs,” he said.

Changes in law have helped decrease opioid overdoses, health officials say. A 2015 law requires doctors to check the state’s Prescription Monitoring Program database before prescribing opioids and benzodiazepines, such as Xanax, to new patients. A 2014 reclassification of combination opioids, such as Lortab,

that number down.”

However, prescription drug overdoses remain a scourge.

“We’ve made a little progress with opioids but we’re nowhere near that not being a problem,” Dismukes said. “That’s still the biggest issue in the state”

Jessica Hawkins, prevention director for the Mental Health Department, cautioned against oversimplifying potential links between meth and prescription drug abuse. A drop in one doesn’t necessarily lead to an increase in the other, she said.

“They’re concurrently problematic,” she said. “What we don’t want to do is switch attention from another serious epidemic, which is the opioid epidemic we’re in, and move attention away from that.”

Hawkins said potential causes include increased strength of methamphetamine, manner of taking the drug (IV users are more likely to suffer an overdose), using meth with other substances, and multigenerational use in some families.

Woodward said there is no way to know if the hundreds of Oklahomans who died from meth overdoses were regular users or were shifting from prescription opioids to meth. Autopsies and medical examiner reports only determine what was in a person’s body at the time of death, or if responders found drugs or paraphernalia nearby. Also, many people who die from drug overdoses have taken multiple drugs, although the Narcotics Bureau counts them according to the main drug found in their systems.

“When you’re an addict, you’ll take what you can get. ... They all have their drug of choice, but they’re not exclusive to that drug,” he said. *For more go to* www.oklahomawatch.org.



which includes hydrocodone and acetaminophen, into Schedule II controlled dangerous substances, prohibits doctors from writing prescriptions for more than 90 days and phoning them in to pharmacies.

Jeff Dismukes, spokesman for the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services, said the declining number of opioid-related deaths also corresponds with lives saved from administering opioid-blocking Naloxone.

“It’s pretty darn close,” he said. “You can see how we’re really making a difference in bringing

This Public Notice is promulgated pursuant to the requirements of Section 25(e)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (herein "Code") and Regulation 1.25-77 thereto.

OVERVIEW OF MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

The McClain County Economic Development Authority (herein "Authority") has authorized a Program for qualified home buyers within the County whereby such Authority will issue Qualified Mortgage Credit Certificates to such qualifying Home Buyers within the County which will enable them to receive an annual federal income tax credit with respect to their federal income taxes so long as the original mortgage is on the home and the Homeowner continues to live in the home for which the Mortgage Credit Certificate was issued. The Authority has entered into a contract with the MCC Administration Corporation ("Program Administrator") to administer the program. This tax credit is a dollar-for-dollar reduction in the qualifying Homeowner's federal income tax due, not just a deduction from gross income. An explanation of the eligibility requirements for this Mortgage Credit Certificate is contained within this notice and you should review it carefully to see if you qualify.

AMOUNT OF QUALIFYING HOME BUYER'S FEDERAL INCOME TAX CREDIT

A holder of a Qualified Mortgage Credit Certificate issued by the Authority under the Program is entitled to a federal income tax credit equaling 50% of the interest paid on the certified indebtedness amount up to \$100,000 on the holder's home loan during that particular tax year in question. However, such qualifying Home Buyer Certificate holder is limited by Federal law to a \$2,000 per year income tax credit. Therefore, for example, if the holder paid \$4,000 of interest on the certified indebtedness amount up to \$100,000 on his or her home loan during the applicable tax year, then such holder would receive an income tax credit of \$2,000 (that is, 50% of \$4,000) and such Certificate holder would thus pay \$2,000 less in federal income taxes for the particular tax year than without the Mortgage Credit Certificate, subject to certain adjustments. **The amount of tax credit will vary depending on the interest rate on each loan and is limited to 50% of the interest paid on the first \$100,000 of the home loan which is the certified indebtedness amount and a maximum of \$2,000 per year. See the certified indebtedness amount on each individual certificate.**

HOW AND WHERE TO APPLY FOR THE MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE

The Mortgage Credit Certificate Program is available to persons who are purchasing a home and obtaining a loan thereon for a house in the County which is to be used as his or her principal residence. Therefore, one should apply for the Program at the Mortgage Lender of the applicant's choice, however, such lending institution need not be located within the County. If the Mortgage Lender you contact does not have information concerning the Program, such information can be obtained by contacting MCC Administration Corporation at (405) 364-6565 or P.O. Box 1568, Norman, Oklahoma 73070. Therefore, a Home Buyer should contact a bank, savings and loan association or other mortgage lender to apply for a loan and work with the lending officer of such institution and the Program Administrator. Upon qualifying for a Mortgage Credit Certificate, such instrument will be issued by the Program Administrator. Thereafter, the Home Buyer will file a copy of the Certificate with IRS Form 8396 and IRS Form 1040. The Homeowner should thereafter be able to claim this credit every year as long as he or she lives in the home and is paying on the mortgage.

DURATION OF THE MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

Persons may obtain Mortgage Credit Certificates under the Program until December 31, 2019. Persons receiving MCC's may be required to rebate to the Federal Government a portion of the federal subsidy represented by such tax credit upon resale of the related residence within the first nine years of the loan. The MCC Program will remain until December 31, 2019, or until the maximum amount of MCC's available through the Program have been issued.

FEATURES AND LIMITATIONS ON CREDIT

A Mortgage Credit Certificate holder is allowed to take the tax credit each tax year, so long as he/she continues to live in the home for which the Mortgage Credit

Certificate was issued. In addition to the tax credit, a Mortgage Credit Certificate holder is still able to take the standard mortgage interest deduction. That deduction is limited, however, to the mortgage interest paid during the year minus the amount of the tax credit for that year. For instance, if the Home Buyer paid \$4,000 of mortgage interest on the certified indebtedness amount for the year and receives a \$2,000 MCC tax credit, the taxpayer can also deduct \$2,000 (\$4,000-\$2,000) of mortgage interest from gross income for the year. If a holder's tax liability is less than the amount of the credit for the year, it may be possible for the unused portion of the tax credit to be carried forward.

COSTS OF MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATES

The Homeowner must pay a one-time Mortgage Credit Certificate origination fee of \$1,000 to the Program Administrator at the time of the closing of the loan. There will also be an annual Program administration fee of \$180 per year, and collected by the Program Administrator on a monthly basis from the Homeowner. The annual fee of \$180 is fixed for the first seven years of the loan, but may be increased annually thereafter by the Program Administrator but not to exceed 5% per year.

ADDITIONAL FACTS ABOUT MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATES

Before you decide to apply for a Mortgage Credit Certificate there are several features of Mortgage Credit Certificates that you should keep in mind. First, the tax credit is only available as long as you continue to live in the house financed in connection with the Mortgage Credit Certificate. You are required to notify the Program Administrator when you move and/or refinance your house. When you move, the Certificate is automatically revoked and you are no longer entitled to the tax credit. If you refinance your home, the Certificate will be revoked unless you make arrangements ahead of time with the Administrator to qualify the refinancing for a reissuance of the Mortgage Credit Certificate. Call the Administrator for details. Second, a Mortgage Credit Certificate may be transferable. For information in regard to this, contact the Program Administrator before you sell the home. Third, if you make any misrepresentations about your eligibility for the Program you risk serious consequences. Your Mortgage Credit Certificate may be revoked as a result of the misrepresentation. Further, a misrepresentation may result in a fine of up to \$10,000 in addition to any criminal penalties imposed by law.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENT OF THE MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

In order to qualify for the Program, Federal Law requires that a Home Buyer satisfy each of the following guidelines:

1. First Time Home Buyer Requirement (The Three Year Requirement): The Program and federal law require that MCC's be issued only to "first time home buyers", unless the home lays within a "targeted area." Since McClain County is an all "non-targeted area," the first time homebuyer requirement applies to all MCC's issued in McClain County. The First Time Home Buyer requirement is that the home buyer have had no present ownership interest in a principal residence at any time during the three year period prior to the date on which the mortgage on the home is executed.

2. Targeted Area Set Aside Requirement: At least twenty percent (20%) of the tax credit provided by MCC's will be devoted to residences located within Targeted Areas of the County for at least one year after the date MCC's are first made available. Since all of McClain County is a "non-targeted area," the set aside requirement does not apply.

3. Home Buyer Income Requirement: Federal law imposes a "family income" limit on home buyers receiving MCC's. "Family income" is the anticipated total income from all sources received by the family head and spouse (even if temporarily absent) and by each additional member of the family, including salary and wages, as well as overtime, dividends, housing allowances, alimony, public assistance, social security, unemployment compensation and investment income and profits for the 12-month period beginning the date of the issuance of the MCC to the Home Buyer, exclusive of income that is temporary, non-recurring or sporadic. An income work sheet making determination of "family income" which is signed by the Home Buyer is attached to and included within the sworn affidavit of the Home Buyer.

The Program income limits are as follows:

Non-Target Area
Family of 2 or less; \$69,720
Family of 3 or more; \$81,340

4. Purchase Price: Federal Law imposes certain purchase price limitations. The maximum purchase price limitations are as follows:

Non-target Area
New House; \$214,925
Existing House; \$214,925

5. Principal Residence: Federal Law requires that the Home Buyer must occupy the home as a

principal residence within 60 days after the financing is provided. A principal residence is a home occupied primarily for residential purposes. A principal residence does not include a home used as an investment property, as a recreation home or a home 15% or more of the total area of which is used in a trade or business. Further, if the Home Owner ceases to use the residence as his principal residence for a period in excess of twelve (12) months, no deduction shall be allowed for mortgage interest accruing after the first day in such twelve month period.

6. Single Family Home: The residence financed must be a one-family residence. This includes a detached home, one unit of a duplex, a townhouse or condominium unit. Manufactured housing or mobile homes qualify only if the unit has at least 400 square feet of living space, if it is more than 102 inches wide, if it is permanently affixed to the real property and is not classified as personal property under Oklahoma law. Land adjoining the home is considered part of the home only if it maintains the home's livability and is not, other than incidentally, a source of income to the owner. The purchase price includes all amounts paid for the home including the cost of completion. For example, you may not agree to pay extra for a refrigerator or drapes so that the stated purchase price is low enough to qualify. The purchase price does not include legitimate settlement and financing costs or the value of the land if you have owned it for more than two years before beginning construction of the home.

7. New Mortgage: The mortgage loan financed in connection with issuance of a Mortgage Credit Certificate must be a new mortgage and may not replace a prior mortgage of the Certificate holder on the home (whether or not previously repaid).

8. Program Area: In order to be eligible for a Certificate, the home financed under the Program must be located within this County.

9. Prohibited Loans: Under the Program, any type of loan will qualify with two exceptions. First, a loan from a lender who is considered to be a "related person" to the Home Owner for tax purposes will not qualify. Second, a loan funded from the proceeds of a tax-exempt bond issue will not qualify.

10. First Come, First Served Nature of Program: Under the Program, Mortgage Credit Certificates will be issued to eligible Home Buyers on a first come, first served basis. Only loans closed on or after July 6, 2017, are eligible for the Program. MCC's must be issued by December 31, 2019.

11. Non-Discriminatory Nature of Program: The Program will be administered without regard to race, sex or national origin or other applicable Federal parameters prescribed by law relating to discrimination.

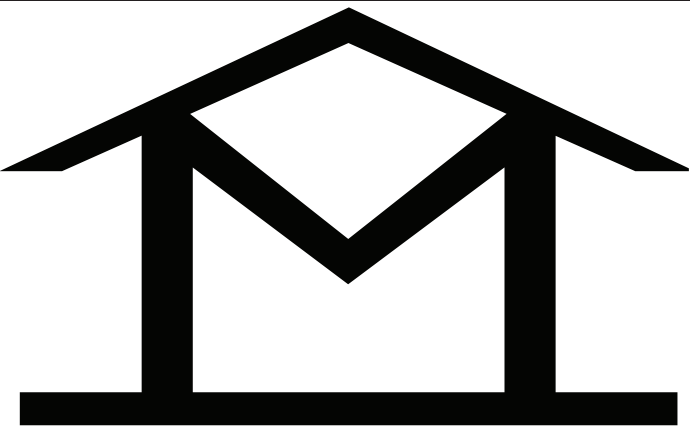

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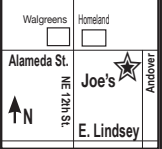

Why does Easter change each year?

You may not need a math or astronomy degree to know when to celebrate Easter.

But if you favor doing your own calculations instead of relying on a calendar or the internet, it couldn't hurt.

There are reasons, after all, why Easter is a moving target from year to year and why not all of Christendom observes this holiest of days on the same day.

It seems simple enough.

Easter is the first Sunday after the full moon that occurs next after the vernal equinox is how it is described.

In short, Easter can't be before March 22 or after April 25

But when people are involved, nothing is ever really simple.

Because the full moon referenced in the date isn't the astronomical full moon which we see in the night sky. Instead, it is an ecclesiastical moon that is in step with the astronomical full moon.

More or less.

Are you confused yet?

You see, it all began in the year 325 at the First Council of Nicaea that was convened by Constantine 1, the first Roman emperor to profess Christianity.

And since he was a Roman, the date of Easter was set using the Julian calendar.

Today most Christian churches in the western world use the Gregorian calendar. But that gets ahead of the story.

Anyway, Constantine's council ruled Easter would be on the same

Sunday across the Christian world and created tables to set the date.

Over the course of a few centuries, the tables were revised and tweaked until 1582 when another council was convened, resulting in the Gregorian calendar which is named for Pope Gregory XIII.

All should be well and good since most of Europe had adopted the new calendar by the 18th Century.

However, the Eastern Orthodox Christian churches kept the Julian calendar to determine Easter's date.

Then in 1923, those churches adopted a modified Gregorian calendar, opting to set Easter's date according to the astronomical full moon at the meridian of Jerusalem.

Maybe it's best to check the internet or whatever calendar rules your days, after all.

Nature's telling and parallels to the Easter story

Through poems and folklore, Christians around the world find in nature annual reminders of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection.

Dogwood and pine trees are two horticultural examples. Even the seas give up holy representations in the form of sand dollars.

According to some tellings the cross on which Jesus was crucified was taken from a mighty dogwood tree.

Now the Bible doesn't specify the kind of tree from which the cross was made and in any case, dogwoods aren't indigenous to what was then Judea.

Still, there's a nice Easter story to be found in the tree's white blooms every spring.

Four petals give the flower the appearance of a cross. Yellow stamens can be taken for a crown of thorns.

And the outer edge of each petal is notched as though by a nail and a reddish coloration around the notches is reminiscent of blood.

For its role in the crucifixion, the dogwood lost its tall stature among trees and was made small and gnarled forever more.

Another tale focuses on the new growth shoots of pine trees in the spring.

That new growth in the spring is

candles – yellow shoots extending from the tips of the pine branches.

About the time of Easter, the tallest shoots branch off near their tips, forming a cross.

The legend of the sand dollar is related in the following poem:

*"There's a pretty little legend
that I would like to tell
Of the birth and death of Jesus
found in this lowly shell.
If you examine closely,
you'll see that you find here
Four nail holes and a fifth one
made by a Roman's spear.
On one side the Easter lily,
its center is the star
That appeared unto the shepherds
and led them from afar.
The Christmas poinsettia
etched on the other side,
Reminds us of His birthday,
our happy Christmastide."*

*"Now break the center open,
and here you will release
The five white doves awaiting
to spread Good will and peace."*

*This simple little symbol
Christ left for you and me
To help us spread His Gospel
through all eternity."*

Easter Lilies: Roots in fables and Scripture

In all of horticulture, how could the lovely lily not be the flower of Easter?

Even Jesus paid homage to the flower in His sermon on the Mount when he told the crowd, "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do the spin; and yet I say unto you that even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these." (Matthew 6:28-29)

There are, in fact, numerous references to lilies in the Bible and what's not referenced is accepted through tradition and beliefs shaped through the millennia.

It's said by some that lilies first appeared from the remorseful tears shed by Eve as she left the Garden of Eden.

It is also reported that lilies, which have been called "white-robed apostles of hope" grew in the Garden of Gethsemane after Christ's agony.

Tradition holds the white flowers appeared where Christ's sweat fell.

Today, the flowers commemorate Jesus' resurrection with its promise of everlasting life.

There is also the bloom's association with mothers, particularly the Virgin Mary.

According to legend, Mary's tomb was visited three days after she was placed in it. Her body was gone and in its place were bunches of white lilies.

Even early pagans were drawn to the flowers and handed down fables to explain how lilies came to be.

In one fable, it is told that lilies sprang from the milk of Hera, queen of heaven.

The true focus

In the 1700s a group of German settlers came to America. Along with these settlers came the folk story of a spring time bunny (called Oschter Haws) that would bring baskets filled with colored eggs, candy and sometimes toys to the homes of children who had been well behaved.

Over time, the tradition of the Easter Bunny became a part of American culture as many folk stories have. Just exactly when and how this story became tied to Easter is a much debated subject among many, but one thing we can know for sure is that obviously, none of this comes from the Bible.

As many Christian parents and church leaders struggle with whether or not to participate in these tradition that relate to the Easter Bunny, my prayer and hope is that we keep this in mind; there is nothing inherently

evil about the Easter Bunny, Easter baskets or even colored eggs, nor is there any evil thoughts or intent in the heart of that child who is excited about coloring and hunting eggs with mom and dad.

Keep in mind what is important is that we don't lose our focus on what is important. Children learn what we show them as parents, not what we tell them. So are we showing them that our focus is on Christ and not on the Easter Bunny?

Make plans for you and your family to attend your local church Easter service. Show them, tell them, instill in them the importance and the truth of the resurrection of Christ and your children will understand that the Easter bunny, unlike Jesus Christ, is just a symbol created by a good folk story.

Make this Easter season a time for you and your family to reflect upon and celebrate the resurrection of Christ. You will be glad you did.

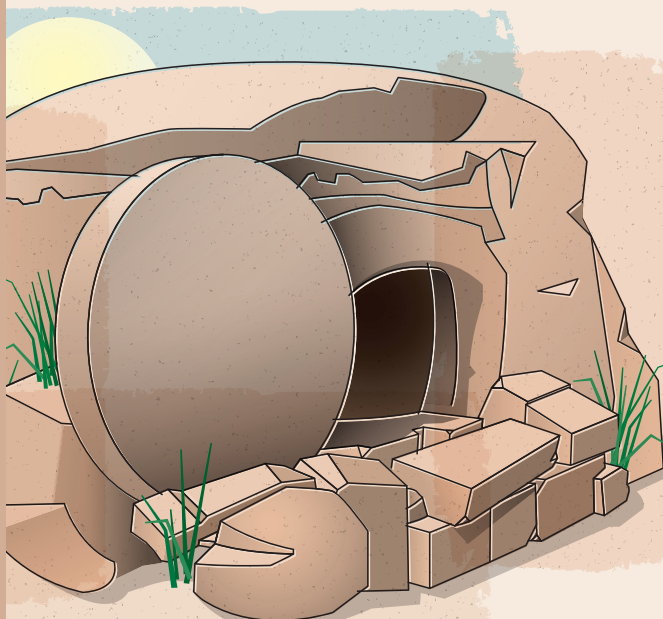
are invited to join us for the special service, regardless of whether you are a member of our church or not.

The Meaning of Easter – Beyond Space and Time

Jesus was a popular healer, a good rabbi, and a faithful friend to the many people who followed him as he walked through the villages of Galilee. But when he was carried away to his death by the Roman soldiers, his most loyal friends ran away and hid in fear. The experience with Jesus was over and he was just another good rabbi who would die, even worse, like a criminal. The disciples of Jesus would try to remember his teachings and forget his death. And they would go back to their lives as fishermen or tax collectors. But then something happened.

On that first Easter morning, the women went to the tomb to anoint the body of Jesus with fragrant spices. They were startled to find the large stone rolled back and the tomb empty. There was a young man dressed in white – an angel – sitting in the tomb next to where Jesus had laid. “He is not here” the young man said. “He has been raised” (Mark 16). The women never see the body of Jesus. But over the next 40 days, these women and the Twelve Apostles and many others do see him, that is, they experience him in a different way. Now he is the risen Christ!

One of the most beautiful quotes I have heard about Easter is this one: “On Easter Day, the veil between time and eternity thins to gossamer.” It has taken me many years to understand what this means. When

Jesus lived on the earth, he lived, like us, in a particular space and time. But when he was raised from the dead he passed over from an existence in space and time into eternity.

He is no longer limited to space and time. And when his disciples experience him in this new way they felt such euphoria that they were no longer afraid of anything, even of their own deaths! The earliest Christians were martyred for their faith – Stephen, Peter, Paul, James, Agnes, Cyprian, Perpetua and Felicity, Justin Martyr, Ignatius of Antioch, and thousands of others. As the Acts of the Apostles shows us, they spoke boldly, lived boldly, and died boldly.

Gamaliel was a wise Jewish rabbi and one of Paul’s teachers. One day he addressed the Jewish leaders and said “Let these Christians go. If this

movement is of man’s making, then it will die out on its own. Once the euphoria dies down, they will forget all about Jesus. But if it comes from God, the movement will never die.” (Acts 5:33-42) Over 2000 years later, the movement has not died and Christians gather each year on Easter to celebrate that first bright morning and the days that followed.

We, too, are invited to be part of the movement of first believers. St. Paul writes: “For if we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection.” (Rom. 6:3-11) We are invited to “hitch our wagon” to the star of Jesus, to be united with him as we carry our own cross into our own resurrection. We, too, who now live in space and time will one day be united with Jesus in all eternity.

Easter Lily Care

DO

- Place your plant in indirect sunlight at 60°-65° F.
- Water when the soil feels dry to the touch.
- After blooming, plant the bulb 6 inches deep in a sunny spot in the garden. It should bloom next June.
- Heavily mulch the plants in the fall.

DO NOT

- Place your plant near cold drafts or excessive heat.
- Overwater your plant or allow it to sit in standing water.
- Expose your plant to chilling winds when transporting.

Did you know?

- The Easter lily is native to the southern islands of Japan.
- The Easter lily is the fourth largest crop in the U.S. potted plant market, behind poinsettias, mums and azaleas.
- Michigan and California produce the highest number of Easter lilies.
