In a stunning revelation nation-wide, Republican Donald Trump has won the White House winning not only Oklahoma and McClain County but across the country as well.

With all 26 precincts reporting, McClain County followed the state trend

down the ballot in Tuesday's general election.

Unofficial results Tuesday night showed Donald Trump handily winning the state's seven electoral votes. County voters favored Trump over Hillary Clinton 13,151 to 2,893.

Libertarian candidate Gary Johnson received 795 votes in McClain County. The state vote

was 947,934 for Trump, 419,788 for Clinton and 83,334 for Johnson.

Republican candidate Paul Scott defeated Democrat Leah Pollan for District 43 State Senator 25,368 to 8,286. The McClain County vote was 12,360 for Scott to 4,287 for Pollan.

Incumbent Bobby Cleveland will return

to the Oklahoma State Legislature as District 20 Representative with a clear victory over Democrat Matt Failing. That race was 10,703 for Cleveland and 4,272 for Failing. In McClain County, the tally was 5,523 for Cleveland and

Griffith leaving

Parks head announces resignation

Purcell Parks and Recreation Director Chris Griffith will leave the city at the end of this month to take a similar post in Altus.

Griffith announced his resignation to the city council Monday evening after sharing that Purcell finished third in the state in a parks maintenance rodeo in Oklahoma City.

In addition, Griffith said Trey Phillips swept four of seven individual events at the competition.

Griffith made the announcement after telling the council that the consultants on the failed water park, Kimley-Horn, agreed to analyze the prospects for reopening the existing swimming pool or build a new pool at McCurdy Park.

City manager Dale Bunn said the consultation will include an inspection of the closed pool and estimates on "what it will take to make the pool operational."

The analysis of the existing pool will run \$15,000 and the firm is asking for an additional

Bridge rehabilitation starts

Work started Monday on State Highway 74

Beginning Monday and continuing through next spring, State Highway 74 south of U.S 77 will be narrowed to one lane in each direction for a bridge rehabilitation project.

According to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation, drivers can also expect occasional nighttime lane and ramp closures on both north and southbound I-35 at mile marker 91.

The Oklahoma Transportation Commission awarded a nearly \$2.4 million contract for the project to Manhattan Road and Bridge Co., of Tulsa in October.

ODOT crews were in the process this week of making cross overs so only one bridge will be down to one lane at any given time.

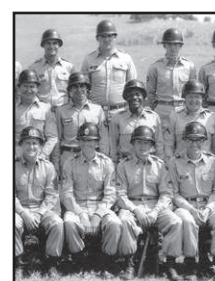

The Chickasaw Nation will honor veterans Saturday, November 12, and Sunday, November 13, at the Chickasaw Cultural Center, 867 Cooper Memorial Drive, in Sulphur. The tribe commemorates Veterans Day, celebrated nationally November 11. Active military and veterans will receive free admission into the Chikasha Poya Exhibit Center (CPEC) as well as a 10 percent discount in the Aaimpa Café and dis-

counts in the retail shops (excluding consignment items). Activities will include special stomp dances to honor military personnel, cultural demonstrations and interactive attractions in the living village, featuring stickball, archery and basket making. Attendees can visit the U.S.S. Chickasaw exhibit in the (CPEC) Center. Many exhibit items have been donated by the men who served on the ship during World War II and

the Korean War. The U.S.S. Chickasaw was the third of three U.S. naval ships named for the Chickasaws. The exhibit will remain open through December 31. Proper pecan moisture

With pecans starting to fall, there is lots of interest in stocking up the tasty morsels for next year's cooking needs. If care is not taken, pecans can mold very easily. At harvest, pecans commonly can have moisture contents of 15 percent. At this level, cracked pecans, shucks and trash can mold yielding the pecans unusable. Pecans should be stored or shelled at five-six percent moisture. A pecan with acceptable moisture levels will snap when broken. If it bends or appears rubbery, the nut should be dried. As soon as harvested,

spread pecans out or place in mesh bags, in an area away from moisture to dry. If possible place fans blowing on the bags or the nuts. The pecans should dry to an acceptable level in a couple of days. Never seal freshly harvested pecans in an airtight bag or container. **Hay Value** In our area, hay is usually sold by the bale, which is not necessarily the fairest way to price hay for the seller or the buyer. When shopping around to purchase hay please keep in mind that not all bales are created equal. Two of the biggest factors to consider when buying hay are quality and weight. The

higher quality of hay should correlate into a higher price and vice versa for lower quality hay. This doesn't always hold true. The only way to determine hay quality is with a forage laboratory analysis. If you are feeding hay without a lab test you are almost guaranteed of either overfeeding (increasing your winter feeding costs) or underfeeding (causing poor performance in your herd). Bale weight can also significantly affect the value of the hay on a per bale basis. Round bales for example can range in weight anywhere from 500 to 2,000 pounds. Small fruits gardens benefit from winter preparation

Although Oklahoma just experienced one of the warmest Octobers in state history, gardeners still need to be thinking about and preparing to winterize their small fruits gardens.

Small fruits gardens, including blueberry, raspberry, strawberry and blackberry plants, will benefit from a fresh layer of mulch to conserve soil moisture and regulate temperatures over the winter, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension consumer horticulturist.

"When winterizing your garden, apply a four-inch-deep layer of organic mulch around the base of the plants," Hillock said. "Organic mulches such as leaf compost, pine bark or straw will provide your plants the insulation needed to prevent cold damage and excessive drying of the soil."

Adding extra mulch also is beneficial for fruits such

as kiwi and grape vines. Be sure to inspect your gardens after the first killing frost and replenish mulch as needed.

Strawberry plants should be mulched in early to mid-December to protect the crowns from winter's freeze and thaw cycles. Freezing and thawing of the soil damages the growing point of the plant.

"This cycle also can cause soil heaving, which can push the plants out of the ground. This is especially a problem for shallow-rooted plants such as strawberries," he said. "However, if the warmer weather continues, hold off on mulching the plants until there has been several hard frosts. By this time the plants have developed cold hardiness. If you cover them too early, they may not become hardy enough to withstand winter temperatures."

Another small fruit gardeners may grow is passion fruit. These plants typically die back to the ground in winter, but will continue to ripen fruits until the tops are killed out.

Following a hard frost, cut the stems back to the ground and cover the plants with a thick layer of mulch to provide winter insulation.

If gardeners notice a mole or rodent problem, pull the mulch back a bit from the trunk in an effort to avoid creating a favorable feeding spot for these pests.

"Taking the time to winterize your small fruits gardens will help ensure your spring gardening gets off to a great start," Hillock said.

A proud heritage

The life and culture of our nation's Native American tribes are written in nearly every chapter of America's story. It is rich with the traditions, languages, changes, notable names, and much more. Although we honor those legacies and traditions this month, we remember the contributions that our Native American ancestors brought before us every day.

It is an honor and a privilege to be a member of the Chickasaw Nation, and a true blessing to have been surrounded by family members who were active in representing and preserving our heritage.

My great-great-grandfather served as the Chief Clerk of the Chickasaw Supreme Court, and my great-grandfather was the treasurer of the Chickasaw Nation.

My great aunt Te Ata Thompson Fisher was a Native American storyteller and performer who had many opportunities to display her talents across the world, even for the President of the United States and the King

and Queen of Great Britain.

And I am most proud of my mother, Helen Cole, who has been the greatest influence in my life - she was the first Native American woman elected to the Oklahoma State Senate.

Each time I walk into my office, I am reminded of the greater role that Native Americans have played in creating the relationship that our federal government and tribes have today, as well as their many contributions to our society. I am fortunate that I've been given the honor to represent Native Americans, and to have met many members and leaders of various tribes across the United States.

Although I belong to the Chickasaw Nation, many tribes have walked through my office doors, and I make it a priority that they are well represented in Congress.

In 1990, then President George H.W. Bush designated the month of November as "National American Indian Heritage Month." Numerous strides have been made since then in recognizing the many contribu-

tions Native Americans have made to our country, and the federal government and tribes have made significant strides towards building a stronger, more respectful relationship with each other.

In more recent years, Congress has been able to ensure that Native Americans are protected on the federal level. From critical legislation like the Violence Against Women Act, which provides reforms for combating domestic violence, to reauthorizing the Special Diabetes Program, Congress recognizes that the needs of our nation's Native Americans have are serious, and are not partisan in nature.

For me, and for many people, Native American Indian Heritage Month is every day. It is my hope that each person in America will come to learn and respect the legacy and culture that our Native Ancestors contributed to our society. And we always will continue to respect them, recognize them, and celebrate the heritage and legacy that is forever a part of our American story.

It's time to look at your health care coverage for 2017

Now's the time to check your health care coverage for 2017 or sign up for the first time. Open enrollment through the Health Insurance Marketplace began on Nov. 1 and runs until Jan. 31.

Here are six key facts to know about this year's enrollment season.

Your actual premium costs probably aren't as high as you've heard.

More than eight in 10 Oklahomans with coverage through the marketplace will be able to find a health plan for less than \$75 per month, thanks to financial assistance.

If your income falls below 400 percent of the federal poverty level - that's \$48,000 for one person or \$97,000 for a family of four - you'll qualify for federal tax credits that will

help make your coverage affordable.

About eight in 10 marketplace consumers in Oklahoma are eligible. Because the tax credits increase dollar for dollar with the cost of a benchmark health plan, most consumers are protected from rate increases.

Also, if you're buying an individual health plan but not through the marketplace, you'd be wise to visit healthcare.gov and recheck your eligibility for the tax credits.

An estimated 33,000 Oklahomans who purchased coverage outside the marketplace and paid full price for it last year have incomes low enough to qualify for assistance.

All consumers still have choices.

Even consumers served by a single insurer will be able to select from a range of plans. Oklahomans can choose from an average of 13 health plans, though the exact number will vary from county to county.

Rural areas are likely to have fewer. You can view all of the plans for sale in your area at healthcare.gov.

If you haven't purchased a health plan through the marketplace before, you should know that all plans cover a comprehensive set of benefits, including doctor visits, hospital stays, preventive care, pregnancy and prescription drugs. The plans must treat you fairly. Insurers can't deny you coverage because you have a medical issue, such as cancer or diabetes. Nor can they charge you more than they would someone who's in good health.

It pays to shop and check out your options.

If your health plan from this past year is continuing into 2017, you may be automatically re-enrolled. But you'll still want to review it to make sure it meets your needs.

Every year, insurers adjust premiums, out-of-pocket costs and benefits. You should have received a letter from your

health plan, based on factors like your age, gender, income, ZIP code and how much health care you expect to use.

You can also check out a plan's list of covered drugs and find out which doctors and hospitals participate in the plan you're considering.

Deductibles can often be made more manageable.

Most marketplace consumers qualify for financial assistance that lowers their deductibles -- the median marketplace deductible is now \$850.

All plans cover some preventive services, such as cancer screenings, vaccines and well-child visits, without a deductible. And eight in 10 marketplace consumers select plans that cover common health services, such as primary care visits, generic drugs and some specialist visits, before meeting the deductible.

As Obamacare prices soar in state, what are your options?

Oklahomans planning to sign up for 2017 health coverage under the Affordable Care Act might prepare for a possible case of sticker shock.

Only one company, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Oklahoma, is offering ACA individual health plans in this state next year. Its rates for one type of benchmark policy are rising 67 percent in the Oklahoma City area and 71 percent in Tulsa, before federal subsidies are taken into account.

The full impact of the rate hikes will be felt mainly by higher-income people who do not qualify for federal premium subsidies. Those with lower incomes generally will see smaller percentage increases.

Even so, the political impact of double-digit rate increases in Oklahoma and other states is causing big problems for the program's supporters, particularly amid a vitriolic presidential election in which "Obamacare" is a central campaign issue.

In this Q&A, Oklahoma Watch examines the reasons behind the ACA market turmoil and the options for 2017 available to Oklahomans.

Q: When does 2017 enrollment begin?

A: It starts on November 1 and ends on January 31. Applications must be submitted by December 15, though, to take effect on January 1.

Q: Should I wait until after the election before buying insurance?

A: You can, but the election outcome is unlikely to have any effect on your options for 2017, Oklahoma Insurance Commissioner John Doak told Oklahoma Watch. That's because any Affordable Care Act changes probably could not take effect until 2018 or later. "Nothing is going to happen quickly no matter who's in office," Doak said.

Q: How many people are affected by the ACA market in Oklahoma?

A: About 130,000 Oklahomans currently are covered by ACA policies, according to the Insurance Department. The Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation estimates 491,000 Oklahomans were uninsured in 2016. It said 122,000 were eligible for ACA subsidies, 65,000 were eligible for Medicaid, 82,000 fell into the "coverage gap" caused by Oklahoma's refusal to participate in Medicaid expansion, and 221,000 were ineligible for government assistance for other reasons, such as non-citizenship or high incomes.

Q: What categories of people are required to obtain coverage?

A: Generally speaking, the Affordable Care Act requires you to buy an individual policy if you are not already covered by some kind of group policy, such as Medicare, Medicaid or employer-provided plans, and your household income exceeds the federal policy level. The poverty level for 2017 is \$11,880 for a single person and \$16,020 for two people, plus \$4,140 for each additional person.

Q: Where can I get information about my options?

A: You can shop for policies and get premium subsidy estimates on the federal government's health care exchange, <http://www.healthcare.gov>, or by calling the ACA hotline, 800-318-2596. You can do the same thing on the Blue Cross Blue Shield website, <http://www.bcbsok.com/>, or by calling the company at 866-793-8111. You can also contact an insurance agent. For assistance in finding one, see <http://localhelp.healthcare.gov/>.

Q: Why are rates rising so much?

A: According to federal and state regulators and insurance company officials, it's mainly because companies have been losing money on the ACA policies they issued over the past three years. One big factor is that many younger, healthier people have not signed up for coverage, leaving the ACA insurers with a risk pool consisting of older people who tend to use more health care services.

Q: Is this happening in other states?

A: Rates are rising in many states. The average increase for the 39 states operating under the federal-run health exchange is 25 percent. Oklahoma's increases are among the highest in the country, though. Blue Cross Blue Shield of Oklahoma said it's been losing money in Oklahoma's ACA market, paying out \$1.38 in claims for every \$1 in premium revenue collected in 2015. "This is not



sustainable," the company said.

Q: Why is Blue Cross the only company left in the market here?

A: The number of ACA insurers in Oklahoma has steadily dwindled, from five in 2014 to four in 2015 to two in 2016. Blue Cross' only remaining competitor in Oklahoma, United Healthcare, announced it was dropping out of the market in 2017 because it could not provide coverage profitably here.

Q: What effect will the lack of competition have?

A: Insurance Commissioner Doak said his department is prodding Blue Cross to "ramp up" the quality and quantity of its service across the state. "These rate increases are significant," Doak said. "We want the company to be responsive." Blue Cross said it already is taking steps to improve customer service and outreach.

Q: What's happening to the people who have United Healthcare policies?

A: If you are one of about 6,000 people who are covered by United Healthcare ACA policies in Oklahoma, you will automatically "migrate" into a similar Blue Cross Blue Shield plan. If you want to change your coverage options, you will need to do so on the ACA or Blue Cross website, or by calling Blue Cross.

Q: How are ACA health policies priced?

A: Health care premiums are highly variable, ranging from as little as zero after federal subsidies are taken into account, to as much as \$2,000 a month for a gold-plated plan purchased by a single older person who smokes and does not qualify for subsidies. Unsubsidized rates for Blue Cross plans are priced by age, family size, geographic location, tobacco use, provider network, coverage tier and plan provisions, such as deductibles and copays. Federal subsidies reduce the premiums for about 86 percent of policyholders in Oklahoma.

Q: How much difference do the subsidies make?

A: Quite a lot, for many people. For example, the federal government compares markets by using the price of a benchmark "silver" plan purchased by a 27-year-old single per-

son. In Tulsa, Blue Cross will charge \$423 a month for that policy next year. If the buyer's annual earnings equaled that age group's median income of \$27,500, he or she would qualify for a monthly premium subsidy of \$250, reducing the net cost to \$173 a month.

Q: How many policy choices will I have?

A: You should expect to choose between at least a dozen plans. Most will be in the "bronze" or "silver" coverage tiers, which are designed to cover 70 percent or 60 percent of average annual health expenses, respectively. You'll also need to choose between Blue Cross' "Advantage" and "Preferred" provider networks. Advantage policies are cheaper but cover only 54 of Oklahoma's 77 counties and include 8,622 providers. Preferred policies cost more but are available in all 77 counties and include 14,680 providers.

Q: How can I tell if my doctor, hospital or other provider participates in a plan?

A: The Blue Cross website has a doctor and hospital lookup feature: <http://www.bcbsok.com/find-a-doctor-or-hospital>.

Q: What happens if I don't buy a policy next year?

A: If you are covered by the ACA mandate and don't qualify for an exemption, you will be subject to a fine. The amount of the fine is either a flat-rate amount of up to \$2,085 per household or 2.5 percent of gross income, whichever is greater. For example, a household with gross income of \$100,000 would pay a penalty of \$2,500. The fine will be assessed when you file your 2017 tax return in 2018. But the Affordable Care Act waives the fine if a basic plan costs more than 8.1 percent of household income.

Q: What if I would rather pay the fine than pay even more expensive premiums?

A: You have that right, but it would be risky. "The problem is if you get sick or have an accident and you don't have coverage, you get hammered," said Deputy Insurance Commissioner Mike Rhoads. "You're between a rock and a hard place on this thing."

Q: What happens if I already have an Affordable Care Act policy? Do I have to reapply?

A: No. If you acquired a 2016 policy and you don't reapply, you will be automatically re-enrolled in your existing plan. Your premium probably will increase, perhaps substantially. You might want to check the ACA or Blue Cross websites to see how much you would pay for other policies.

Q: Do other programs offer low-cost coverage for poor people?

A: Yes. The state operates a separate program called Insure Oklahoma that provides subsidized coverage to about 17,000 working Oklahomans. For some people, it offers health coverage at even lower costs than the Affordable Care Act. For more information, see <http://www.insureoklahoma.org/>.

Q: Why can't poor people receive premium subsidies?

A: Because the state of Oklahoma rejected an Obama administration proposal to expand its Medicaid program, known as SoonerCare. Unless you already qualify for SoonerCare, which covers only a portion of the working poor, the Affordable Care Act won't change your situation.

No one was sure who "we" were, since Chief Dibble was the only police officer in Lennox Valley. The crowd acquiesced, just the same.

Vera began, "We have counted and recounted the votes. The numbers we reported a few minutes ago are correct. Raymond Cooper received 466 votes."

Shouts of "Yes!" were heard from the Cooper section of the room. Order was quickly restored when Chief Dibble glared directly at Marvin Walsh, the primary culprit.

"Mayor Bland," Vera continued, "received 229 votes, and Juliet Stoughton received a total of 231 votes."

An audible murmur began to rise throughout the hall but quickly dissipated as Vera spoke again.

"Counting the eight votes cast for write-ins, we have a total of 934 votes. The leading vote-getter, Raymond Cooper, received 466 votes."

The VFW corner erupted in a chorus of "Mayor Cooper, Mayor Cooper, Mayor Cooper!"

A hard look from Chief Dibble restored order as Vera continued. "We've calculated the votes four times, and the result is the same each time. Raymond Cooper is two votes shy of a majority. We will conduct a run-off election between Raymond Cooper and Juliet Stoughton, who received two more votes than Mayor Bland, one week from today."

Iris Long took pictures of the melee following the

announcement. Rhonda Goodman, standing outside with the majority of folks who weren't selected to watch the election festivities inside the town hall, listened to the proceedings over speakers hastily erected on the hall steps. It was then she heard a familiar voice from inside the hall.

There was no doubt about it. It was her husband, Earl, yelling, "It's a sham! You are puppets of the Federal Reserve System! This will not stand! This will not stand!"

Marvin Walsh joined in the fracas by rushing to the edge of the stage and shouting at the election coordinators. "We want a recount! You are tools of the federal government! We demand a recount!"

Within seconds, the door to the town hall opened, and Chief Dibble exited the building behind Marvin Walsh and Earl Goodman, who were handcuffed to each other. Iris Long followed, taking pictures as quickly as she could focus her trusty Nikon, as the men made their way to the police station across the square.

Over the noise of the crowd, Father O'Reilly barely heard the voice of Brother Billy Joe Prather over the speakers. Apparently, he was trying to restore order by asking the room to bow in prayer. Unfortunately for Brother Prather, it sounded like there weren't many folks in the mood to pray at the moment.

Just then, the doors to the town hall opened again. As the crowd watched, Raymond Cooper emerged. Several in the crowd began to chant, "Cooper, Cooper, Cooper!"

Raymond stood there appreciatively, finally quieting the crowd by motioning with his hands.

"Friends. I know that many of you think what happened tonight was a travesty of justice. I must admit, I have my doubts about what just took place in there. But this is America, and we have no choice but to abide by the wishes of the election coordinators."

Much of the crowd began shouting, "No! No! No!" until Raymond continued.

"I've asked Worley Fain, chaplain of our Valley VFW, to lead us in prayer."

"Good Lord," Jessie, waitress at the Hoffbrau, muttered just loud enough for Cooper to hear.

"That's the spirit!" shouted Cooper. "Do you hear that, Chaplain? They're starting without you."

There are places to turn for help with signing up.

Besides relying on healthcare.gov, you can call 1-800-318-2596 and visit with a marketplace customer service representative. You can also visit localhelp.healthcare.gov to locate the organizations in your community that will assist

you in signing up for coverage.

Open enrollment runs until January 31. But you must act by December 15 if you want any changes in your coverage to take effect on January 1.

Don't risk paying a penalty of \$695 or more because you go uninsured next year. Check out your options at healthcare.gov. Plans may be more affordable than you think.

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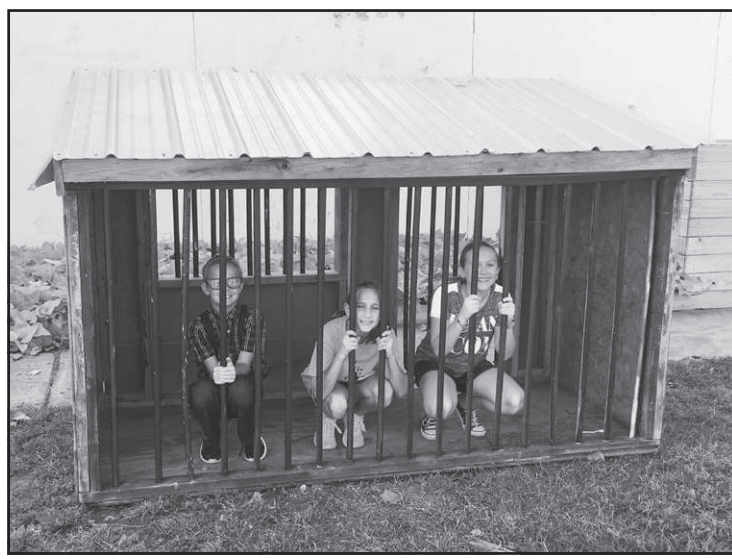

Layered Pumpkin Loaf

1 cup canned pumpkin
1 cup plus 2 TBL granulated sugar, divided
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
4 egg whites, divided
1/2 cup fat free milk
1/4 cup canola oil
2 cups flour
2-1/2 tsp. baking powder
2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
1/4 tsp. salt
8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
Heat oven to 350°.

Mix pumpkin, 1 cup granulated sugar, brown sugar, 3 egg whites, milk and oil in large bowl. Add flour, baking powder, spice and salt; stir just until moistened.

Beat cream cheese, remaining granulated sugar and remaining egg white with whisk until blended.

Spoon half of pumpkin batter into greased 9x5-inch nonstick loaf pan, cover with layers of cream cheese and remaining pumpkin batter.

Bake 1 hour or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Loosen bread from sides of pan, cool in pan 10 minutes.

Remove bread from pan to wire rack and cool completely.

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Recognizing Veterans

Jim Pratt joined Navy just after Pearl Harbor

Jim Pratt joined the Navy June 2, 1942 when he was 18-years-old.

He was sworn in with 50 other men as one of the Pearl Harbor Avengers just six months after the bombing of Pearl Harbor.

After training, Jim was stationed on a 102' wooden hull boat for his first two years in World War II. It was so small it didn't even have a name, just a number APC-28.

He said it took 21 days to travel from San Diego to Pearl Harbor at the turtle-like speed of six knots. The small boat rolled with every wave and soon everyone was seasick. One of the sailors became so sick they thought he would die before they reached Pearl Harbor.

From Pearl Harbor, the crew went on to Guadalcanal.

They stopped at several islands on the way to allow the sailors to recover from the

constant rolling of the small ship which prevented them from sleeping well.

Jim's boat arrived at Henderson Point Guadalcanal just in time to see the USS William Penn (a troop carrier) go down from a Japanese bomb. Jim remembers the reality hitting him and thinking this war is real.

It's easy as a civilian to move through the day without even a thought to the veterans that protected our country even as they were scared, injured, or as they watched their fellow soldiers fall.

Veterans Day is a time to remember and recognize veterans who have served throughout our nation's history. We have a responsibility to honor their bravery and their service, not just on Veterans Day, but throughout the year.

Veterans Corner, Inc. is focused on providing ongoing support and services to veterans in Oklahoma. We partner with local communities to make sure no veteran is forgotten by providing transportation, offering a cup of coffee and fellowship, or providing

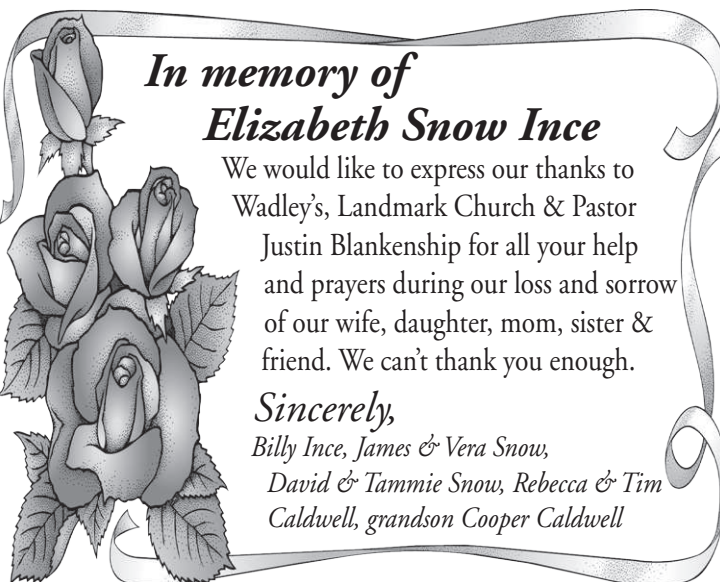

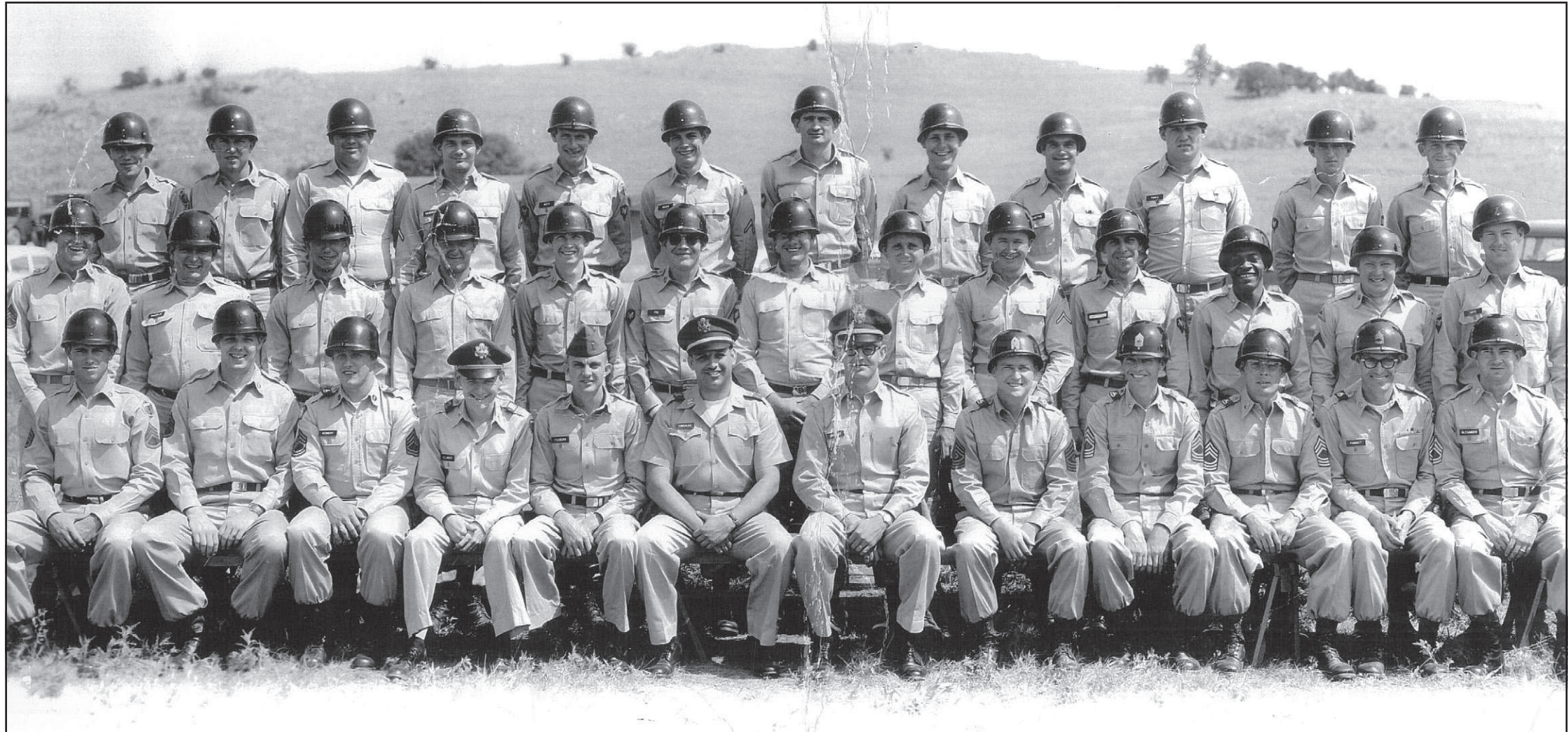

1,650 for Failing.

The District 42 Representative will be Republican Tim Downing, who won over Democrat Liz George by a count of 10,784 to 4,331. In the county, 5,895 voters favored Downing and 2,619 were for George.

In the U.S. Senate race, 13,418 county voters were for incumbent James Lankford, who polled a decisive victory over his challengers. Mike Workman received 2,388 votes. Robert Murphy garnered 440 McClain County votes with Mark Beard and Sean Braddy receiving 238 and 359 votes, respectively. State vote totals were 979,728 for Lankford, 355,389 for Workman, 43,345 for Murphy, 27,357 for Beard and 40,322 for Braddy.

Incumbent District 4 Congressman Tom Cole received 13,384 votes in the county to 2,751 for Christina Owen and 675 for Sevier White. State totals were Cole, 203,942; Owen, 76,380, and White, 12,548.

Griffith:

\$3,000 for recommendations for McCurdy Park.

A second firm, Larkin, offered similar services for \$39,000.

Bunn said it will be necessary for city workers to open up some areas of the existing pool so consultants can determine why the pool leaked.

He acknowledged that the city closed the pool without ever determining if it could be repaired or what the cost would be.

Council member Mike Pollok asked Griffith why he instead of the pool committee was addressing the council.

And council member Graham Fishburn said he still wants answers to three questions:

What is involved in fixing the existing pool as is? What is involved in fixing it with improvements to the bath-

house? And what is involved in constructing a new pool at McCurdy Park?

After a back-and-forth discussion, the council voted to hire Kimley-Horn for the consultation at a cost not to exceed \$20,000.

The council took no action on the proposed demolition of the old hospital on West Washington Street that is currently occupied by Delta Community Action and the McClain County Historical Society Museum.

McClain County commissioners have expressed an interest in acquiring the lots if the city removes the structures.

On Monday morning, the commissioners offered a land trade – five acres west of the airport and south of the Purcell Softball and Baseball Association fields for the lots.

That offer drew a lukewarm

response from the council and council members want to see appraisals on both tracts before taking any action.

In other business, the council:

- heard an address about services available locally through the Women's Resource Center in Norman;

- approved a resolution calling for a municipal primary election for Fishburn's seat on February 14;

- approved a resolution to apply to ODOT for 80 percent funding of a \$400,000 project to mill and resurface North Green Avenue between Grant Street and Ninth Avenue;

- approved a zoning change that will allow S&S Motors to expand their lot to the west; and
- tabled an insurance change for the Multi Purpose Building and approval of city job titles and pay ranges.

The Stratford Bulldogs, who are the reigning Class A State Champions, will bring their 4-6 season record to Reed Field to face off with the Washington Warriors in the first round of the State Class 2A Playoffs.

Washington finished as the District 2A-3 runners-up after losing to Lindsay 49-28 last Friday night at Reed Field. The Warriors finished the season 7-3.

In a September meeting, Wayne knocked off the Stratford, 19-6. Stratford finished third in their district utilizing a power I running game.

"They have three really good running backs," Washington Head Coach Brad Beller said. "And their quarterback runs well, too. They don't throw it much but they have 13 seniors off last year's State Champion team. It'll be a really tough match up for us."

Stratford bases out of a 3-4 on defense but are very multiple. Washington coaches believe the Bulldogs may throw some four and five man fronts at the Warriors this Friday night.

"They have two very quick defensive tackles. They (the Bulldogs) have really good defensive team speed and are very disciplined on that side of the ball," Beller said.

Beller said the key to the game is to see how the Warriors rebound from the tough

loss to Lindsay.

"It'll be interesting to see where our focus is and how we come out. Hopefully, it'll be like the previous five weeks where we have a mindset to be focused. And, we have to stop the run and win first down.

"If they get it to third and short we will have a tough time getting them off the field because they will go for it on fourth and short," Beller said.

"Our offense will have to control the speed of their linebackers and take care of the football," he said.

Beller said everything that could go wrong in the first quarter against Lindsay did.

An errant pitch and a poor deep snap to the punter led to two quick Lindsay scores that were both less than 20 yards in length.

Washington also gave up a pair of touchdown pass plays of over 70 yards in the opening period.

"Before we can turn around, we're down 28-0," Beller said. "After that our offense moved the ball and settled down to play pretty well but we just couldn't make up a 28 point deficit.

"Take nothing away from Lindsay," Beller said. "They played a great game and capitalized on all of our mistakes. We didn't match their intensity and level of

Pre-sale tickets will be available for purchase at Purcell High School for the Purcell-Pauls Valley game both today (Thursday) and Friday, Solomon said.

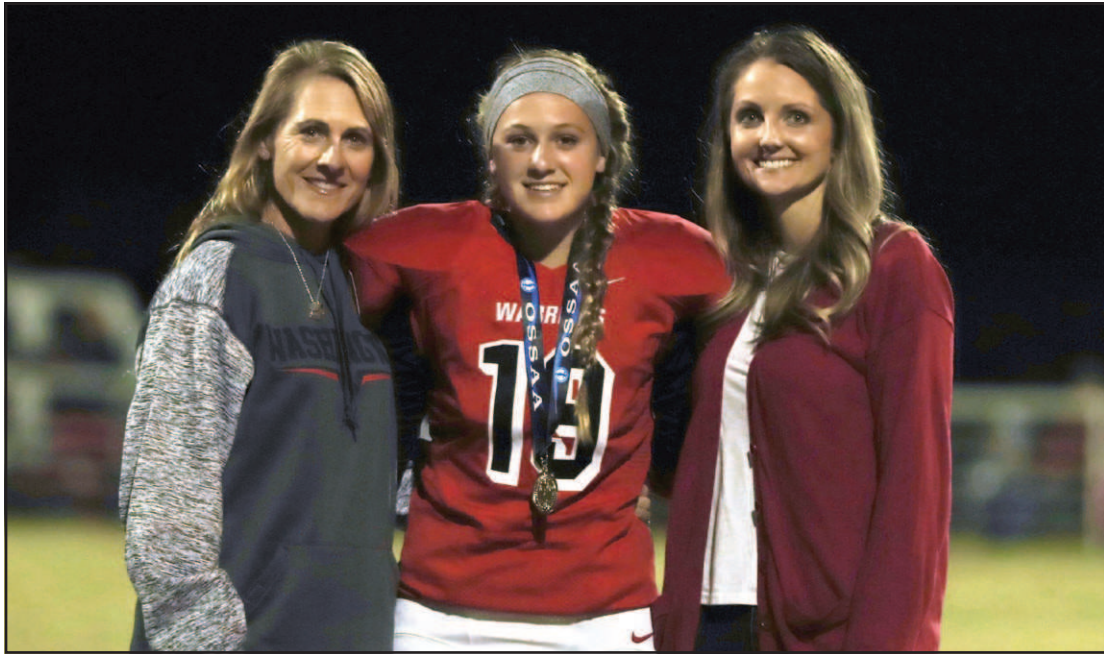

Very good week to all! Welcome to the "front porch."

With the arrival of November, we are blessed to be studying the gospel of Luke throughout the month. Luke, of course, is one of the most beautiful books ever written, its messages filled with the most intimate of human touches. You'll remember that only Luke records the very moving, coming-home journey of the Prodigal; and Luke draws in simple narrative the loving hands of a most unexpected Samaritan.

All through Luke's gospel the great theme that Jesus is "the world's greatest Answer" echoes from page to page. Search man's encyclopedias of knowledge, if you like, but you'll find no greater theme!

As we enter the winter months, people, thankfully, begin to put their minds on Jesus more than at any other time. No doubt that's why the world is a little better place in November and December than at any other time. Luke, of course, relays the story of the birth of Jesus in simple but grand detail in one of the most

beautiful stories told.

Following the usual style of biblical narrative, Luke announces the birth so simply: "And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger: because there was no room for them in the inn" (Luke 2:7).

It is the birth of a king placed in the setting of a pauper.

The scene switches abruptly to some shocked shepherds out on a hillside somewhere outside the city of Jerusalem. The world is rambling on back then, much as it is now. These shepherds have put their sheep to rest for the night, hoping for a peaceful night of rest. But this particular night will not be altogether peaceful.

Out of nowhere a light shines about them, and an angel speaks to them in the beaming night. These shepherds are scared; but the angel calms their fears - Isn't that the Lord's way throughout these scriptures! - and he assures them he has come with good news for all the people.

Yes, it is good news. The angel brings the greatest bulletin and announcement the world has ever heard:

"For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger" (vs. 11-12).

We all celebrate many great birthdays in our lives, but the day Jesus, the Christ, is born - in answer to several thousand years of prayers - is one of the greatest days in the history of man, surpassed only - if possible - by the day the Lord arises from the grave three decades later.

For hundreds of years, men have written about, sung about, felt-so-good deep inside about, this glorious night.

These shepherds do what each of us will do well to do: They lose no time in getting up and looking for this great young king.

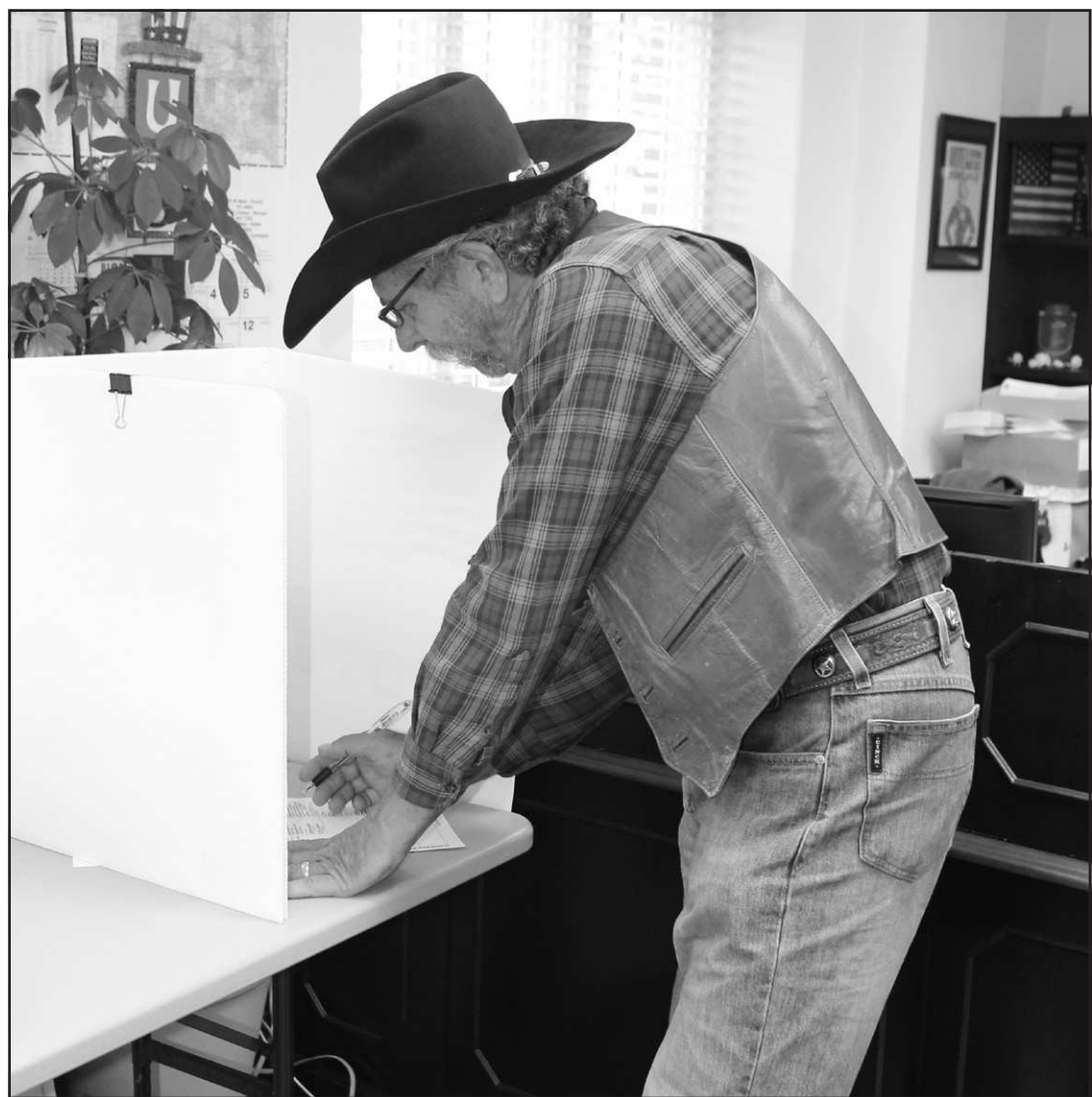

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Two weeks ago, on a Monday night, the streets by my house were crawling with ghosts and vampires and even a zombie cheerleader! But I was not afraid, because also there was Spiderman and Captain America (though they were much smaller than they appear on television). I knew these superheros would save me.

As people of faith, we look up to different superheros. We do not honor people who have big muscles, or people who have magic powers, or people who only exist in our imagination. We honor people who did exist, and in whose life we see — as clearly as possible — an image of our God, the Source of all goodness and love. These are real people who reflect something of the beauty and immensity of our God.

And so we honor Mary, the Mother of Jesus, because she said "yes" to a life that would bring her much sorrow. We honor St. Jerome who opened up for us the mysteries of the Word of God. We honor St. Francis who saw how all things on earth — animals, trees, stars, and people — were all connected to one another in a fashion of love.

We honor St. Theresa of Lisieux because she saw God in very little and mundane things. We honor St. Catherine of Siena because she had great confidence as a woman who could speak the truth clearly to men in power, such as popes and kings. These are the saints of the Church.

But there are others who have died who are very close to us — perhaps a mother or father, or grandmother who has died. Perhaps even a child. These

are saints, too. For through them we have known God's love for us. Through them we have seen an image of God.

We call this the Communion of Saints, and, in God's eyes, all are living. "God is not a God of the dead, but a God of the living." (Luke 20) In his eyes, all are alive — the saints who have gone before us, and the saints who are living now. When we need prayers, we ask people here on earth to pray for us, yes? So why wouldn't we also ask St. Francis or St. Catherine or St. Mary to pray for us? Why wouldn't we ask my deceased mother or father, or your deceased spouse, to pray for us? In God's eyes, all are living.

The Sadducees did not believe in the resurrection, in life after death. And so they showed ridicule to this belief in front of Jesus (Luke 20). What did he do? He reminded them that, in God's eyes, we are all alive — those who have died and those who are still living on earth.

How do we become worthy of being called a "saint"? By cultivating the virtue of reverence. A reverent person notices and responds to the mystery of life and the sacredness within life. The native Americans considered some places as sacred spaces. So a mountain or a grouping of rocks was a place where lived the Great Spirit. Or a magnificent tree on a hill was a place where one could go to meet God.

We behold mystery when we hold a newborn child, or gaze upwards at the stars at night. Or when we are touched spiritually by a song, or are touched in an intimate way by someone

whom we love as a husband or wife. And we behold mystery when we sit next to a loved one who is dying.

These are moments of reverence in which we see the mystery of things. We can't explain the beauty or the mystery. When we can first do that, then we can learn reverence for another human being as well. We can say "I don't understand you, but I show respect for you as one of God's creations." Then we will truly have the virtue of reverence.

There is a beautiful scene in the book of Revelation, at the end of the Bible. Twenty-four elders are standing around the throne of the Lamb. They are offering praise to the Lamb. And then together they fall down before the Lamb. "Each of the elders held a harp and gold bowls filled with incense, which are the prayers of the holy ones, the saints on earth." (Rev. 5:8) These are our prayers being lifted up to God in heaven. This is what the saints are doing for us and with us — the saints we have known and the saints who are our heroes. Let us give thanks for all of God's holy church!

One of the beautiful things about this story is how these shepherds' search for the young child ends. If you didn't know this story, it would surprise you. When they get to Jerusalem, they don't find him where they think He will be. The babe is not at the king's throne or in some grand palace. Nor is He in a sophisticated, well-warmed inn.

They find him in the little town of Bethlehem, in a stable, wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. "Away in a manger, no crib for a bed; the

little Lord Jesus laid down his sweet head ..."

Yes, that's a beautiful scene. The events on this night — a silent and holy night, indeed! — is the beginning of the greatest story of them all. The impact of His coming and the message He brings enriches our lives two millennia later, even as it does the people of Galilee, Judea, and beyond during that time.

I hope you will carry this Jesus with you as you move into the latter weeks of 2016. Perhaps an early reminder of

this blessed story will help enrich your walk and your talk.

But be sure as you move forward that you follow Him and His teachings through the streets of Galilee and Judea. Don't stop at Luke 2. Don't dare leave Him lying in a manger! Travel with Him all the way; and if you'll stay in His mercy and truth, He'll lead you from a manger in Bethlehem to a glorious Paradise in that heavenly New Jerusalem (Luke 23:43).

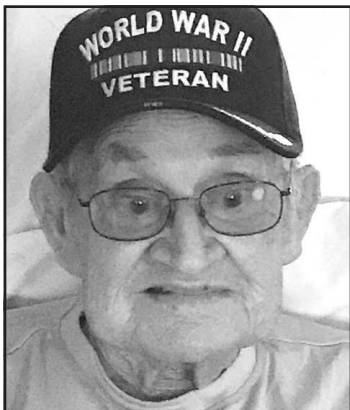
No matter who is elected, we will continue our mission to help all veterans and surviving spouses to receive VA benefits. We are seeing an unprecedented number of veterans and spouses who are having a very difficult time affording the necessities of daily living.

Many of those who are reading this know exactly how much the cost of everything we do has risen. Think about the people who are working for minimum wages, or are on fixed incomes like Social Security or other types of retirements that have not kept up with the cost of goods and services. These people are suffering as they can only cut back so far before doing without.

I know this is true based on the number of people we see each week in need of assistance from us. Many of the veterans and surviving spouses we see each Tuesday and Thursday do not have the money to pay for a medical diagnosis to support their request for a disability caused by or is presumptive to their military service. Currently, we are providing \$30,000 each month to assist veterans and their surviving spouses. We can provide these services to the men and women in our community from the donations we receive from veterans and others who are helping make a difference.

Our country recognizes veterans on November 11 and we recognize them every day at Dale K. Graham Veteran's Corner.

We recently mailed out our an-

nual newsletter to the more than 6,000 veterans and surviving spouses we represent before the Department of Veterans Affairs. For those of you who would like to have a copy of that newsletter, please stop by Faith Pointe Baptist Church any Tuesday or Thursday morning or call to request one. We use these annual newsletters to keep veterans and their families updated on changes that could affect their veteran's benefits and to encourage veterans and surviving spouses to be pro-active when it comes to their VA benefits.

Last week there were 190 veterans and surviving spouses who visited us for help with their VA claims and questions. That number seems to be the average that we see each week. Have you ever wondered why so many veterans make the trip to Norman? The answer to that is our volunteers. Each person assisting them is there because they want to make a difference in the lives of veterans and their families. It does help that most of the volunteers can relate to them as veterans or surviving spouses themselves. I found out many years ago that if we do not help each other, no one is going to help veterans. One of the things I do each week is a review of every piece of paper to be submitted to the Department of Veterans Affairs. I do not want any mistakes on anyone's claim for benefits.

I receive a copy of all VA rating decisions issued for the men and women whom I represent as their Accredited Claims Agent. The following decisions were received last week. Six people received ratings of 100 percent.

This equates to a combined annual income for these veterans of \$219,610.44 per year. Twenty-seven veterans received disability ratings from 10-90 percent. The combined annual income will be \$258,922.92 per year. Most people who try to assist veterans and surviving spouses don't know whether their efforts brought results, as the only way for them to know is if the veteran returned to tell them. We know what works and what doesn't when it comes to assisting veterans and spouses to receive benefits. Personally, I don't care where veterans go for assistance with their VA claims for benefits; I just want them to receive the VA benefits they are eligible to receive.

As a 501(c)(3) non-profit, your donations to our organization are tax deductible. As it is getting close to the end of the year, we are asking for your support to help us to continue our mission. 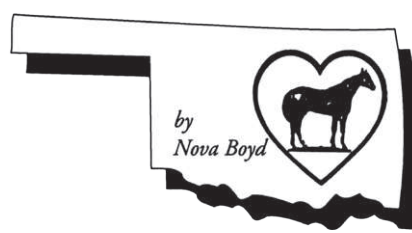

These front-line entities support many other area industries, most notable agriculture, veterinary, farming equipment, vehicle sales, insurance, manufacturers, construction, tack, travel/tourism and health care.

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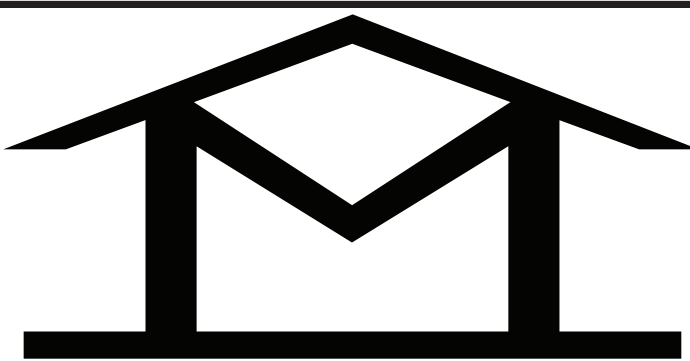
