

‘Demoralizing’ City contests FEMA payment on yard

There are those who advise to take with a grain of salt the word of anyone who says “I’m from the government and I’m here to help.”

Case in point: the extensive damage to the city yard and equipment when heavy rains sent Walnut Creek out of its banks in what was later determined to be a 500-year flood in May 2015.

FEMA officials “misspoke” when they led Purcell officials to believe the city would

receive \$3 million from the agency to pay for relocating and rebuilding the city yard.

City manager Dale Bunn told the city council Monday night when the government’s check finally arrived recently, it was for \$80,000.

Accordingly, the city is contesting the amount - a fight Bunn acknowledged which the city has little chance of winning.

An issue, it seems, was the

6 p.m. with a brief observance at First Christian Church, 117 W. Washington.

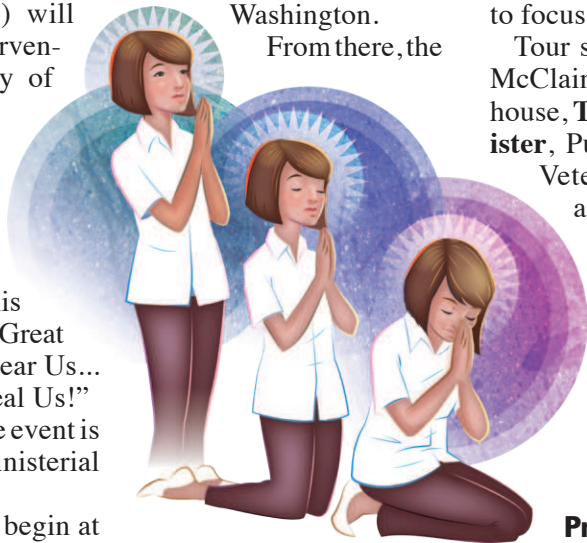
From there, the

For Blackmon, the nearly yearlong deployment wasn’t the only time spent away from his wife and children.

Prior to the deployment, he was on nine-month temporary duty (TDY) in California and then immediately deployed overseas, totaling close to two years away from his loved ones.

Also joining the returning soldiers during the ceremony was United States Senator James Lankford, Maj. Gen. Robbie Asher, adjutant general for Oklahoma, and Col. John Muller, commander of 90th Troop Command, all of whom praised each soldier for their dedication and warmly welcomed them home.

While deployed, the AOB “Warbirds” conducted air traffic control and airfield opera-

tions in support of Operations Inherent Resolve and Spartan Shield.

Their mission provided services to a multitude of units, including directly supporting Special Operations Forces.

Stationed in Lexington, the AOB is a versatile unit with the ability to set-up an airfield anywhere within minutes.

“We can start talking to air-planes and helicopters within ten to fifteen minutes, and then basically it grows from there,” said Capt. Scott Collins, commander of the AOB.

According to Collins, the unit was stationed mostly in one location for the duration of the deployment, but they continued mobility training in case they were called to another location.

“We set-up and were there

for most of the time,” Collins said. “We had some fixed-based facilities that we were working out of and also we were working on the equipment set-up and tear-down training on the side in case we did have to launch.”

Though the AOB conducted these operations for military aircraft throughout their deployment, they also provide these services for civilian aircraft when needed.

Now that the soldiers are home, they will have time to spend with their loved ones and re-integrate back into civilian life through the Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program.

This program promotes the well-being of members and their families by connecting them with resources before, during and after a deployment.

Deadly head-on Crash kills Lindsay woman

A head-on collision south of Dibble on State Highway 76 Monday morning killed a Lindsay woman.

Michelle Steizig, 47, was pronounced dead of massive injuries at the scene.

The wreck occurred at 7:31 a.m. just north of 170th Street.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Brian Ozment reported Steizig was driving a 2014 Chevrolet Cruze northbound on SH 76 when for an unknown reason she crossed the center line.

There the car struck a southbound 2005 International truck driven by Joch Neal, 26, of Moore. He was not injured.

The cause of the collision and Steizig’s condition remain under investigation, Ozment reported.

Seatbelts were in use by both drivers.

Assisting Ozment at the scene were Troopers John Anderson, Bryan Landers, Donald Curtis and Mathew Conway, as well as Dibble police and fire departments and Lindsay EMS.

Price-gouging outlawed during state of emergency

In the wake of damaging storms that moved into Oklahoma on Friday, Attorney General Mike Hunter reminds residents the Emergency Price Stabilization Act is in effect for all 77 counties.

Gov. Mary Fallin declared a state of emergency on Saturday.

The price gouging statute prohibits an increase of more than 10 percent for the price of goods and services after a state of emergency has been declared.

Additionally, the act allows the attorney general to pursue charges against individuals or businesses that engage in price gouging.

“Many Oklahomans and businesses are dealing with significant damage from the storms that came through the state over the weekend,” Hunter said. “Unfortunately, we consistently see people and businesses come in after severe weather and attempt to prey upon victims. It’s critical Oklahomans are aware of the law and their rights.”

The act is in effect through-

out the state of emergency and for 30 days after it has ended. Additionally, the act remains in effect for another 180 days for charges for repairs, remodeling and construction.

Individuals who suspect price gouging should contact the attorney general’s Consumer Protection Unit at (405) 521-2029, or fill out a complaint form online.

The following are consumer tips when recovering from a significant weather event or when hiring a contractor:

- Never pay for the entire job up front. The majority of reputable companies in Oklahoma will install or build without payment until the job is complete.
- Be suspicious of door-to-door solicitations. Get a business card and research the company’s history online. Also, contact the Attorney General’s Consumer Protection Unit to see if any complaints have been filed against the company.
- Ask trustworthy people for a referral. Whenever possible, deal with local contractors who

have roots in the community and independently verify addresses.

• Obtain several written estimates from different contractors. Ask each contractor for references where they have completed work.

Pair lifts nearly \$19K in gift cards

May be targeting Walmart stores along I-35

Two women posing as Walmart employees got away with almost \$19,000 from the Purcell Walmart Saturday.

According to Purcell Police

Det. Scott Stephens, the pair may have been targeting newly hired cashiers.

“They went to the associate and asked for another associate (who didn’t work there),” Stephens said.

“The associate told them she was new.”

According to Stephens when the cashier had problems with the transaction the pair told the cashier which buttons to push to get it through.

Stephens believes a Walmart in Norman may have also been targeted and the women may be traveling up and down I-35 stopping at different stores, including Pauls Valley.

He said the two are black females, in their late 20s or early 30s, and were seen in a black Chevrolet Impala or Malibu.

“What people didn’t realize is the time for filing bills had already passed,” the Slaughterville Republican said with a chuckle.

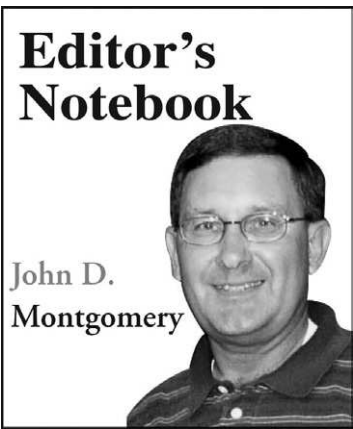
He said the only two things he has had feedback on this year was that comment and his vote to raise the tax on cigarettes.

The North Korean dilemma

In 1945, following the Japanese surrender at the end of World War II, the Korean peninsula was divided on the 38th parallel with the southern portion occupied by the United States and the northern portion occupied by the Soviet Union.

The arrangement was intended to be temporary until a reunification could be negotiated. Seventy two years later, Korea remains divided, and the geopolitical ramifications of that division has grown increasingly tense.

At the center of this conflict is the ruling Kim family of North Korea. The first ruler of North Korea was Kim Il-sung who ruled from 1948 until his death in 1994. His son, Kim Jong-il, ruled from 1994 until his death in 2011.

The country is now ruled by Kim Jong-il’s third son, Kim Jong-un. The Kim dynasty has been marked by atrocious human rights violations and a belligerent, aggressive foreign policy. However, Kim Jong-un has proven to be especially reckless, provocative and at times, seemingly unbalanced.

President Obama’s policy towards North Korea was one of “strategic patience” which relied on sanctions and a refusal to engage in negotiations with the North Korean dictator. President Trump has indicated that he intends to pursue a more aggressive policy towards North Korea, particularly with respect to their ambitious nuclear program, which is blatantly targeted at gaining the capability to launch a nuclear bomb at the United States.

It is safe to say that the threat of a nuclear exchange between two nations has never been higher since the end of the Cold War. Needless to say, this would be a disaster and would have many unintended, unknown consequences not only on the Korean peninsula, but around the world.

Despite nearly two decades of fighting a war against terrorism, the situation in North Korea has quickly become the top national security priority of the United States. I applaud and support President Trump’s tough stance against North Korea’s pursuit of a nuclear capability against our country.

North Korea and its allies need to know that the United States will consider every option when it comes to halting nuclear aggression by the Kim regime. The biggest and most important of those allies is China.

Contrary to expectations, the United States relationship with China has grown stronger under President Trump. China has signaled support for our efforts to put pressure on North Korea to stop their nuclear weapons programs.

Through this benefit, your health care practitioner will assist you in keeping track of your medical history, your medications and all of the other health care providers you see. You’ll receive a comprehensive care plan that outlines your treatments and goals.

You’ll also have 24-hour-a-day, 7-day-a-week access to health care professionals for urgent needs from the comfort of your home. Does that sound like something that might interest you?

To qualify for chronic care management services, you must be enrolled in Medicare’s traditional fee-for-service program, or you must be in

the Medicaid program and receiving Medicare benefits. You also must have at least two chronic illnesses that pose a serious threat.

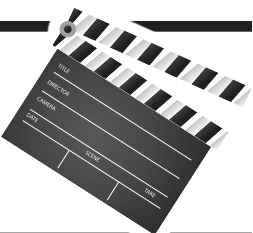

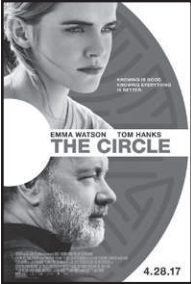

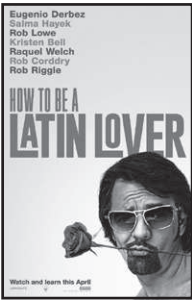
It’s the calm before the storm. Last week before all the big summer releases. Still had a couple movies to check out before those hit though so here’s what I thought of them.

Bill would shift risk from producers to consumers

A pending House floor bill would protect agricultural producers at farmers markets from legal action by shifting the risk of something going wrong to consumers. The proposed Senate Bill 595 is, in large part, an effort to make small agriculture producers more comfortable about participating at farmers markets, author Sen. Darcy Jech, R-Kingfisher, said. “It’s going to remove the excuse from someone who may not want to do it because they’re afraid of being sued,” Jech said. “If that’s a concern, then this should alleviate that concern.” The idea was pitched by someone representing the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Jech said, although he could not recall who it was. The Farmers Market Liability Limitation Act would create a new section of law rather than changing existing text.

“Any participant assumes the inherent risk of attending, buying or selling goods at a farmers market registered with the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture,” the bill states. “If a participant brings an action for damages arising from the operation of a registered farmers market, the registered farmers market operator may plead an affirmative defense of assumption of risk by the participant.” However, the bill does not create an impenetrable defense. SB 595 also states it will not prevent or limit the liability of a registered farmers market operator if that party injures the participant by intentional or willful misconduct or the operator has knowledge of a dangerous condition in the land, facilities or equipment. The law would also partially rest on the standards set by the Agriculture Department for farmers markets sellers,

Jech said. State Rep. Kyle Hilbert, R-Depew, co-author of SB 595, said it reflects a cultural movement away from too much government oversight. Hilbert said he didn’t know of any particular incident that required a response in SB 595. “It just adds an additional layer of protection for our producers,” he said. “I did speak to someone who operates a farmers market back in my district and they mentioned that they have really high insurance costs. “I haven’t seen anything that suggests this will help keep their insurance costs down, but who knows? It might,” he said. The bill has already cleared the Senate Agriculture and Wildlife Committee and passed on the floor with no opposition. It is now awaiting a floor hearing in the House of Representatives after clearing the Agriculture and Rural Development Committee.

1/3 cup chopped fresh basil
1/4 cup Kraft Grated Parmesan Cheese
2 TBL milk

Heat oven to 375°. Bake casserole, covered, 40 to 45 minutes or until heated through, uncovering after 30 minutes.

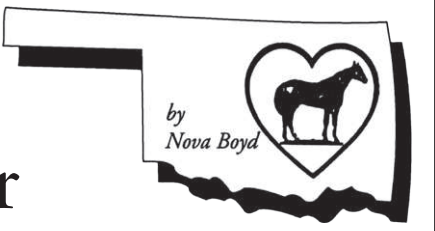
USAO graduates

The Horseman's Corner



Trainer, Clinician or Instructor

While being a horse trainer can be an incredibly rewarding career, it’s important to keep a few things in mind. First, in order to become a highly successful trainer, one must pay some dues. This generally results in a phase of the career that’s the opposite of glamorous; think mucking stalls, longing stock, and being a crash test dummy on young colts. While this phase is often difficult, it results in a well-rounded, knowledgeable, and respected professional at the end of the process.

As we’ll recall from the AHC economic study, the majority of horse owners aren’t wealthy or heavily involved in showing or racing. However, many of these horse owners are still thirsty for knowledge about how to improve their riding abilities. Therefore, an instructor for the beginner-rider still plays a crucial role in our equine industry.

In addition to serving this population, they can also serve as a feeder program for those looking to advance into higher levels of competition and showing. Keep in mind, as businesses, these programs can often be difficult and expensive to maintain.

For anyone considering this line of work, it’s ideal to consider apprenticing, interning, (see the part above about mucking stalls, etc.) or even acquiring a business degree first.

[There are many discipline-specific trainers here who accept apprentices and/or interns. There are also several who give riding lessons for beginners. Many of our trainers often offer clinics in their particular discipline, either at their own facilities or anywhere in the world. A large number of trainers are horse show judges and travel world-wide. If you want help in almost any show discipline, you can get it here. Same with the racing world. To get started there you may start by exercising horses and becoming a groom. From there, an established trainer can take you on as an assistant trainer and help get an assistant trainer’s license.]

Therapy

Most all of us can attest to the therapeutic benefits of riding horses. One of the fastest growing areas of the equine industry is the use of horses as therapy animals. Equine-assisted therapy encompasses a range of treatments that includes activities with horses to promote physical, occupational, and emotional growth in persons with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, anxiety, autism, cerebral palsy, dementia, depression, genetic syndromes, traumatic brain injuries, behavioral issues, abuse issues, post traumatic stress disorder, drug and alcohol addiction, and other mental health problems.

[The closest Equine-Assisted Therapy facility that I know about is in Noble. There are also facilities in Moore, Norman, OKC, Edmond, Guthrie, Midwest City, Ardmore, McAlester, Tulsa, Ada, Altus, Bethany, Broken Arrow, Lawton, and Muskogee. This is one area that truly needs more people in the business. Just think about how many of our young men and women are returning home from the armed forces with PTSD and traumatic brain injuries.]

Creative Pursuits

Many of the careers mentioned so far are related to science, teaching, or business. Let us not forget that there is a surplus of opportunities for those with creative minds. Those eye-catching show ring jackets are designed and brought to life by some of the most creative individuals in our industry.

In addition to the formal show ring attire, there are other designers who focus on casual riding clothing. Although these designs don’t always have the hefty price tags attached, they are still created with much thought and research in order to create comfortable, ergonomic riding apparel.

Let’s not forget our equine companions. Each year, equine enthusiasts shell out their hard-earned dollars to outfit their horses with the latest and greatest in equine apparel technology. It starts with a saddle and

bridle, a saddle pad, and grows from there.

Whether it’s winter blankets to protect them from the elements or therapeutic wraps and sheets to reduce the risk of injury and soreness, horse apparel design is a popular and growing area of the equine industry.

In addition to apparel, professionals can flaunt their creative talents through other avenues, such as photography, videography, journalism, social media marketing and graphic design. Remember, it’s not only equine organizations and publications that need creative professionals to design ads, many equine-related companies require these services as well.

[Showtime Show Clothing on Sooner Road is one of the top show ring apparel businesses in the industry. Speedhorse Magazine at Goldsby employs writers, photographers, graphic designers and sales people. Another creative pursuit that has been here for many years is horse facility architectural design. Todd Gralla, Norman, is carrying on the business that his father, Stan Gralla started at Lexington. Gralla Architects has built facilities all over the world.]

Ten tips for new tree care

Spring is the time of year that most trees are planted in the landscape. The garden supply stores have all received their spring shipments and the plants should now be fully leafed out. There are several different ways that trees can be purchased from the nursery.

Some of the most common forms are bare-root, container grown, and balled and bur lapped. Survival of trees planted in the bare-root form drops dramatically when the trees break dormancy, so I would avoid buying them this late in the year.

Container grown and balled and burlapped trees can be planted year round.

When buying a tree, make sure you know what the mature size is going to be. It makes little sense to plant a tree that will grow to 50 feet under a power line or a tree with a spread of 60 feet planted 10 feet from the house.

Also, purchase trees that are adapted to our growing conditions.

Large chain stores tend to try to sell the same trees nationwide. Some of these will struggle with our growing conditions.

Look for trees in the nursery with strong, wide limb angles and without damage or pest issues. If you need help with selecting a tree that does well in our area please contact the OSU Extension Office for a list.

Once you have picked out your tree, follow the 10 rules of thumb below to get it off to a good start.

1. Dig the planting hole two-three times the diameter of the tree's root ball.

2. Avoid digging the hole too deep since the tree should be planted at its original grade or slightly higher (1/2 to one inch above grade). If the tree is planted above grade, it is important to cover the edges of the exposed root ball with soil tapered down to the surrounding soil line.

3. Fill in the planting hole with native soil and tamp lightly.

4. Do not over fertilize the

new tree. A newly planted tree has a very limited capacity for utilizing fertilizer until it starts to establish itself.

5. Stake young trees (top heavy or planted in windy areas) when necessary but allow for sway. Remove all stakes after the first season if possible.

6. Avoid over pruning new trees. Leave lower limbs intact the first season if possible.

7. Keep a five-six feet weed- and turf-free circle around the tree. Place an organic mulch one-three inches deep around the tree.

8. Apply at least one inch of water weekly.

9. Wrap young trees as fall approaches. Tree wraps protect tender bark from rodent damage and environmental stresses because of temperature fluctuations. One should note that some young trees benefit from summer wrapping to avoid sunscald.

10. Winter irrigate, when temperatures remain above freezing for more than a few days, to avoid dehydration injury.

Control musk thistles soon

Tough growing conditions during the last decade have weakened pasture and range sites and allowed problem weeds to become established. One of these weeds becoming more common is the musk thistle plants.

Musk thistle is an herbaceous biennial plant that grows to six feet tall. It is native to Western Europe and accidentally introduced into the United States in the early 1900s.

Musk thistle can be recognized by its showy red-purple flowers and very spiny leaves and stem. The large disk-shaped terminal flower heads droop when mature giving this plant its other common name, nodding thistle.

Musk thistle invades a variety of disturbed areas and pastures and is unpalatable to livestock. Once established it can spread rapidly due to high wind blown seed production, as much as 120,000 seed per plant.

It is considered a noxious weed and is required by law to be controlled wherever it occurs in Oklahoma.

With the warmer spring temperatures,

musk thistles have started to bolt and will soon be blooming in our area. Many producers, unaware of the presence of the thistles until the last few weeks, want to know how to control them and keep them from going to seed.

If only a few plants are present, hoeing or digging with a shovel will kill the plants and stop the production of seed. Mowing may help but plants have a tendency to send up another seed head trying to survive.

For larger areas, herbicides can be very effective if applied properly. In the winter, we can use glyphosate (Roundup) on a warm day to control the green rosettes while the grass is completely dormant. Now that the plants are starting their reproductive stage and bolting, we need to use a stronger combination chemical.

Good examples are Grazon P+D, Grazon Next, Cimarron Max, or Weedmaster. These combination chemicals can be used in the fall or spring but once the seed heads are developing it may not stop seed production.

There are biological options to reduce the incidence of musk

thistles. The musk thistle head weevils have proved very effective in several locations across the state. They feed on and destroy the producing seed heads. They are very host specific and only help control musk thistles.

Results using this biological control method will take two to three years or longer to see results. There is a rosette weevil as well but it is much less effective. More information on using biological controls is available at the OSU Extension office by calling 527-2174.

The Oklahoma Department of Agriculture has the authority to issue fines for blatant issues of ignoring musk thistles on private property.

Dealing with hard water

Hard water is one of the more common water quality problems associated with private water supplies. Hardness generally refers to the amount of calcium and magnesium ions dissolved in the water. The more minerals it contains the “harder” the water.

Most groundwater in Western Oklahoma would be considered hard to very hard. Symptoms of hard water are difficulty in forming suds when soap is added to the water, spots or film on dishes, dingy clothing and rings in the bathtub.

When hard water is present, more soap must be used, pipes and fittings tend to deteriorate, and elements in electric water heaters have a much shorter life than normal.

The total hardness of a water supply can be determined by a lab analysis. State labs that perform water tests, as well as most reputable companies that sell water treatment equipment, will determine hardness for a minimal fee.

Results are returned in either grains of hardness, or parts

per million. To convert parts per million to grains divide the number by 17. Water with 4 grains or less of hardness is considered soft. It is not uncommon for Oklahoma groundwater to run 30 grains or higher.

If an analysis indicates a hard water problem, you can reduce the hardness with a mechanical water-softening unit connected to your supply line. With this unit, a tank is filled with plastic beads, often called zeolite. These beads are supersaturated with sodium ions. As hard water passes over the beads, calcium and magnesium from the water attach themselves to the beads while at the same time sodium is released from the beads. This occurs due to a process called ion exchange.

Eventually, so much calcium and magnesium attach to the beads that the unit can no longer soften the water and it has to be recharged. This requires backwashing the system with a concentrated sodium brine to flush the trapped minerals and replace the sodium on the beads.

The price of a softening unit

can vary from about \$500 to more than \$2,000. Usually the more expensive the unit is the more automatic the backwash and recharging system is.

A significant amount of sodium is added to the water from a softening unit. Therefore, individuals who have heart or circulatory problems or who are on a low-sodium diet may be advised not to install a softening unit.

If a health situation is present and a unit is installed, obtain non-softened water for drinking purposes. Additional filters, such as a reverse osmosis filter, can be added to a softening unit to remove the added sodium from the water, however, the cost of these devices often exceeds the cost of the softening unit.

Softened water is not recommended for watering plants, lawns, and gardens due to its sodium content. For watering purposes, a bypass around the softening unit should be installed.

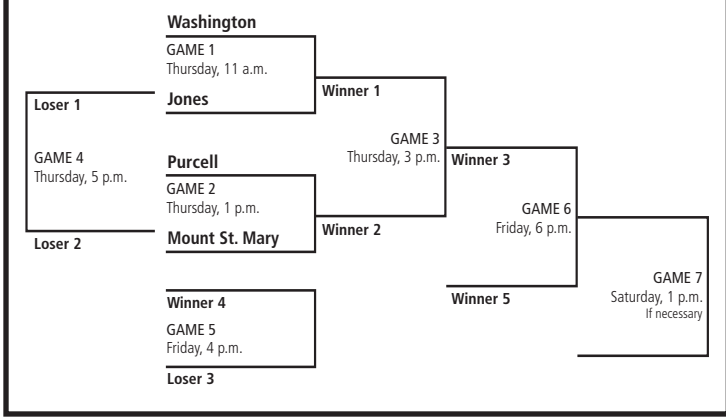

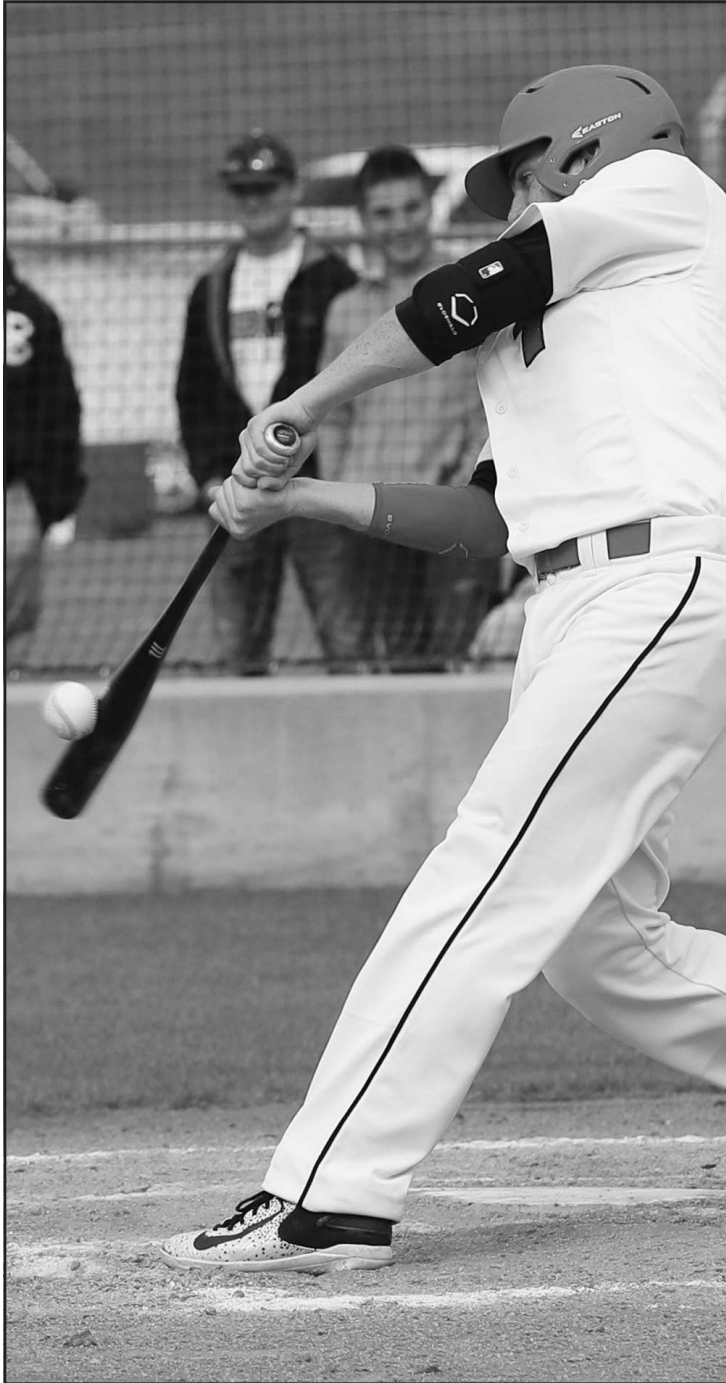

Last week we had VA Form Training at Faith Pointe Baptist Church for our volunteers. My hat is off to the men and women who work to help our nation's veterans and their families. They give their time, their ears and their knowledge to do what they can to help them navigate through the VA paperwork.

Veterans from South Carolina, Texas, Arkansas, Kansas and Florida came to visit us last Tuesday and Thursday. Because of our reputation, these visitors made the trip to Norman for help with their VA claims and questions. Their families or friends had recommended they visit us for assistance.

For those of you who have been denied VA benefits, or have not applied for benefits, you should stop by for a visit to look at what we have to offer veterans and their families. The volunteers we have are here for one purpose, to help each veteran, and surviving spouse receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible. Our mission is to serve veterans and their families including transportation to their VA medical appointments, food boxes for those who are hungry, assistance with the cost of medical testing, as well as a host of other emergency needs.

One of the things I would like to address are the visitors who want to leave before anyone can help them. Often those in that group are suffering from PTSD. When many of us returned from Vietnam some of us could not wait in line or deal with crowds. If you visit us and waiting for your turn to be helped is too much for you feel free to let me know and I will take care of you.

Veterans and surviving spouses can go anywhere they want for assistance with their applications for VA benefits. What makes us different is we don't just help you to fill out the VA application for benefits; we will help you to obtain evidence to support your claim for benefits. Most places that assist veterans will give you the application and either help you fill it out or tell you to take it home, complete it and mail it in. When that happens the veterans', or surviving spouse's claim will be denied most of the time. Each week there will be from 60 to 80 veterans, and surviving spouses visit us whose claim for benefits has already been denied one or more times.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive all of the veterans' and surviving spouses' VA rating decisions on the men and women we represent.

Please remember we are a 501(c)(3) non-profit where your donations are used to support veterans and their surviving spouses. Each month we are providing over \$20,000 to help veterans and their families. This money comes from people who believe in the services we provide. Donations can be made on a recurring basis from credit cards or bank accounts. We also accept good running cars and trucks that can be given to veterans and

their surviving spouses who need transportation.

Did you know that only about one percent of today's population is going to serve in the military? In our world of constant danger for our armed forces members, it is shameful that so many are depending on so few

to protect the rest of us. Never before in our history has so few done so much for so many. Can you help us to continue our mission? We are in constant need of volunteers to assist veterans and their families with their applications for benefits. We are also looking for a van

with a wheelchair lift that can be used to transport veterans to their VA appointments.

Our ladies who assist surviving spouses with their applications for benefits are helping between 18 to 25 folks with their claims for DIC or pension benefits each week. This group of ladies is probably the most knowledgeable I have ever worked with in the past 15 years. Their caring knowledge of the VA system is helping many of the ladies who visit us to receive some type of VA benefits.

As always it is much easier to help a surviving spouse if we have already helped their veteran. One of the most important things I tell the people we serve is that when the veteran dies, please try to have their service-connected disabilities listed as contributing factors to the veteran's death. Did you know that hearing loss can cause heart conditions and depression? Many medical studies link disabilities to a person's death. If a service connected condition such as hearing loss is listed as a contributing factor on the veteran's death certificate, the surviving spouse may receive VA DIC benefits which are around \$1,250 per month. For information, please call Shirley at 405-361-9322.

For the 40 days from Easter Sunday to the Feast of the Ascension, we are paying close attention to the 40 days in which the risen Jesus appeared numerous times to his disciples before being lifted up into heaven (see Acts 1:1-11).

This past Sunday, Deacon John Warren preached about the two disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35). The two disciples were distraught and sad. They had been following Jesus and were very disappointed when he was put to death like a common criminal. They did the only thing they could do - they searched the Scriptures, looking for answers and comfort for their sorrow.

A stranger appeared to them, a stranger who knew how to interpret the Scriptures and assure them that the Son of God must be killed. He said to them: "Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his

glory?"

He spoke to them of how the books of the Old Testament prophets all pointed to a Suffering Servant, a servant who must endure his suffering that we might be redeemed. His words enlightened them and gave them comfort.

But the two disciples did not recognize Jesus until something wonderful happened. They invited the stranger to stay with them and share a meal. It was then that this stranger "took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him." (Luke 24).

It was only in the very act of Eucharist, when Jesus repeated the actions of the Last Supper, that these disciples recognized him as the same Jesus who was their Teacher, Healer and Friend.

Each Sunday when we gather as a community, we walk the very same journey as these

two disciples. We search the Scriptures for wisdom and blessed assurance. Then we take bread, bless it, and share it. By so doing we are opening our hearts to the very Presence of the Risen Lord. We encounter Jesus in Word and in Sacrament. Praised by the Lord!

Welcome, friends, to the "front porch."

As we share this week's thoughts, we are preparing to board the plane back home from the mountains of West Virginia. For a week, the amazin' blonde and I have been blessed to share the gospel and fellowship with some of the best people in the world up here in these plush, tall mountains. Each night for a week, we considered the theme "How's Your Faith?," based on many of the great teachings and accounts from the sublime gospel of John.

Several years ago, during a home study with several members of the church in Deer Park, Texas, we addressed this same thought: "Raise your hand if your faith is where you want it to be," we said.

Of course, no one would dare raise their hand, except one. We all laughed and shook our head

when my friend Chuck Sears, a diligent leader in the work in that congregation, raised his hand as if he had found something the rest of us were still looking for. It reminded me of my teaching years when I was trying to teach young people the importance of not being "average."

I would say, "Raise your hand if you want to be 'average.'" No one would raise their hand, of course, except one. Young Johnny, sitting there in the back of the room clinging precariously to his 37 average, would have given anything to be average.

Chuck wasn't like Johnny in that regard, but I guess he did understand the question about faith in a different light than the rest of us, which was good because it livened up the discussion and gave us a good laugh. He was thinking more along the line that we do not necessarily waver in our "beliefs" - that is, our mental acknowledgement of great truths. We always know that God is real and that our Lord Jesus, the Son of God, paid that unpayable debt for our sins.

But faith goes deeper than those acknowledgements. Faith always goes deeper. Faith has to rise up and show itself in the form of obedience, selfless sacrifice, and a heat-of-the-day sweat. Sometimes in such trying moments, faith gets pushed aside by life's difficulties and by the distractions that come from both the right hand and

the left.

We all can identify with Peter, a great man who - to his credit - has the unique faith to step out of that boat to go to Jesus. After all, we do not see any of the other disciples courageous enough to step over the edge of the boat into the twirling Sea of Galilee. But despite his initial burst of faith, Peter is unable to sustain that faith and his focus on the Lord, and he soon diverts his eyes from Jesus and focuses on the boisterous waves the wind has painted about him.

"But when he saw the wind boisterous," from his unique vantage point from the outside of the boat's safety, "he was afraid; and beginning to sink, he cried, saying, Lord, save me" (Matthew 14:30).

We are well aware that we, too, can sink along the way. The fact is, we often will sink.

Peter's failure on the Sea of Galilee is not his first and will not be his last, not by a long shot. The scriptures candidly show Peter for what he is: a great man who, despite a fiery spirit and love for the Lord, sometimes fails when a moment arises that demands exceptional strength. A fiery faith up on the mountain does not always translate into a solid faith down in the valley.

But Peter is blessed to spend a great deal of strength-building time on the mountains of faith, first up on the Mount of Trans-

figuration (Mark 9), then later up on Jerusalem’s hill as he delivers that first gospel sermon announcing the death, burial, and resurrection of our Lord, along with the demands upon every man in order to access the precious, redeeming blood of the Lamb (Acts 2:38).

So Peter moves from a shaky foundation to standing on solid ground in time. We, too, are looking to grow – to de-

velop stronger inner-fortitude, boundless courage, stubborn determination, and that rare stick-to-it-ness to stand on solid ground in moments where an average faith is prone to sink.

I must say spending a week with the gospel and with men and women of fortitude up high on these West Virginia mountains does, indeed, solidify shaky foundations.

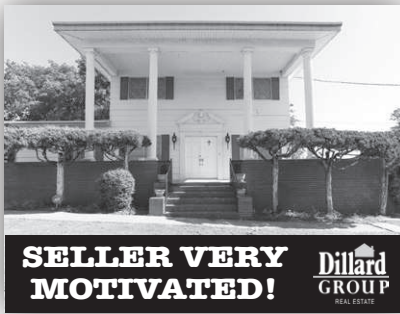

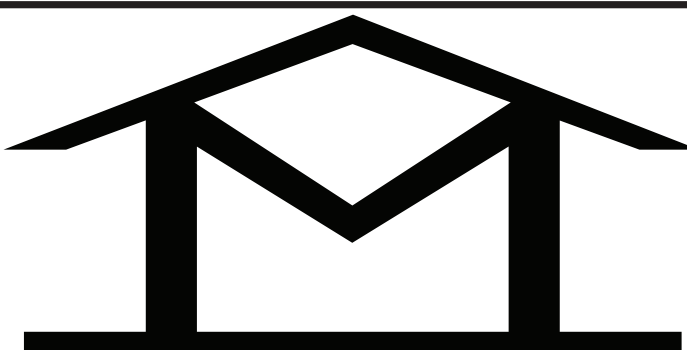
