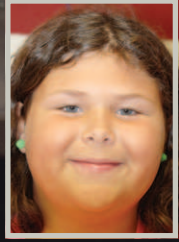

Use Daylight Saving Time as cue for fall, winter prep around the house

Whether it is a string tied around a finger or an alert on a cell phone, reminders are good and often necessary things. In that spirit, homeowners can use Daylight Saving Time as a cue to begin preparing their houses and families for fall and winter.

On November 6, Oklahomans will “fall back,” turning their clocks back one hour marking the end of Daylight Savings Time, but they should not stop there, said Gina Peek, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension housing and consumer specialist.

“Linking certain tasks with Daylight Savings Time can help you easily remember to perform some of that light, routine but important, maintenance that comes with owning a home,” Peek said.

Changing the batteries in all the smoke detectors and carbon

monoxide detectors should be at the top of any fall Daylight Savings Time to-do list.

In fact, homeowners are encouraged to also make that swap every spring, too, when Daylight Savings Time begins. Then, rather than tossing the used batteries, recycle them or repurpose them for service in toys, media players and other electronics.

Fall also is a good time to check light bulbs and light fixtures around the house.

“A well-lighted house, especially at the tops and bottoms of staircases, makes it easier to move around and cuts the risk of someone falling or tripping,” Peek said. “If you need to replace any bulbs, consider using more energy-efficient options to save a little money.”

For guidance on energy-efficient lighting alternatives, visit www.energystar.gov.

The house’s heating and

cooling system also should be serviced once a year, as well, either in the fall or spring.

“Contact a licensed professional to inspect, clean and perform routine maintenance on your heating and cooling systems. The same goes for any fuel-burning appliances in the home, such as fireplaces,” Peek said.

Finally, the end of Daylight Saving Time is an appropriate time of year to refresh the family’s emergency preparedness kit.

“If your kit is properly maintained you probably won’t have to throw away any food. But, you may have to tweak other contents such as clothing to make sure it is appropriate to the season,” Peek said. “You also should go over the family’s emergency plan and update the names and numbers of people and businesses on your emergency contact list.”

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Housekeeping at chamber lunch

Last Friday's Heart of Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce luncheon at Rodney's Pizza Place was one of housekeeping.

Even though there was no official guest speaker, several dignitaries reported on issues surrounding them.

State Rep. Bobby Cleveland said the Department of Corrections is a \$500 million a year business that has no computers.

"Can you imagine running a corporation with an annual budget of \$500 million and not having a computer," Cleveland asked.

"They operated with a paper system that if a piece of paper is lost the inmates can be put into a prison they don't belong."

Cleveland went on to say there are approximately 55,000 inmates with about half of them in prison for non-violent crimes.

"We are just a halfway house where people are not being rehabilitated," Cleveland said.

And, he pointed out the State of Oklahoma taxpayers are paying \$100 million for medical costs alone for the inmates.

This rule can put you out of business

In a little more than six weeks, a new labor rule governing overtime pay for salaried workers is set to take effect. Like many of his economic policies, this is another example of the President's fundamental lack of understanding of the free market and the job killing aspects of overbearing federal regulations.

While he may think this new rule will result in a higher take home pay for middle class workers, it is more likely to force many workers to "punch a clock" and lose the flexibility that a salary provides.

Contrary to what this administration seems to believe, businesses, especially small businesses, are not charities. Entrepreneurs know that keeping up morale among their

employees is essential to their success. But they also know that making a profit is as well. No profits mean fewer jobs and lower pay.

Current overtime rules require any salaried employee making less than \$23,660 annually, or approximately \$11.38 per hour based on a 40 hour week, to be paid time and a half for every hour over 40 hours that they work in a week - approximately \$17.07 per additional hour.

The new overtime rule set to go into effect on December 1st will increase that salary threshold to \$47,476, or approximately \$22.82 per hour. Overtime pay for these employees will be \$34.24 per hour.

For many salaried American workers this may initially look like a good thing. It will undoubtedly put more take

home pay in their pockets - but at what cost?

One of the unintended consequences of this rule will be the additional cost to employers to keep meticulous records of exactly how much time their employees making less than \$47,476 are working each week. That money comes out of the business owners' profit so there will be less money to pay their workers.

More onerously however is the fact that these employees now will have to "punch a clock," and employers will be incentivized to make sure as few as possible of their salaried employees, many of whom are managers, work no more than 40 hours per week.

Furthermore, the flexibility

The federal overtime rule will hurt more than help

On Dec. 1, 2016, yet another Obama administration rule will go into effect, creating another burdensome and bureaucratic nightmare for small businesses, colleges and nonprofits here in Oklahoma and across the country.

The "overtime" rule is an update to the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), which currently requires that any full-time employee making less than \$23,660 per year be compensated with overtime pay for working more than 40 hours per week. Under this updated rule, that threshold would double to \$47,476 a year, beginning on December 1.

The Obama administration believes that this is a minimum wage increase for salaried em-

ployees, but as I've traveled around the state of Oklahoma for the last few months, this new mandate is actually the number one concern for most businesses and non-profits.

President Obama and the Department of Labor looked at the nation, as a whole, when they formulated the new regulation, ignoring the differences in cost-of-living within each state. This means that this rule will be very difficult for Oklahoma, where there is a lower cost-of-living, and easy for New York City, where there is a high cost-of-living. It is also even tougher for rural areas of each state, non-profits and universities.

Several months ago, a human resources professional with the YWCA Battered Women's Shelter explained that, with the exception of top management,

all employees make less than \$50,000. Under the new regulations, if any full-time, salaried employee works more than 40 hours a week, the YWCA would be required to pay overtime for each hour worked.

This dramatic and immediate change will be nearly impossible to account for in their budget, which means services may be lost or diminished for some people in greatest need.

In August, I had a conversation with a youth pastor about the struggles their church faces with this new regulation. Churches and other nonprofit professionals will have to document every hour they work to ensure they do not go over a 40-hour work week.

The lesser of two evils

As the 2016 Presidential election draws nigh, one thing has become clearer than the finest crystal.

This election is an exercise in picking the lesser of two evils. Donald or Hillary? The misogynist or the shrew? The billionaire making the election his own personal reality show or the career politician whom you can trust about as far you can throw her? Two historically bad choices on the same ballot.

Which is the lesser evil? That's up to you. We're not going to try to tell you how to vote. Vote your conscience and may God help us all.

But we are going to suggest you think seriously about voting for someone other than one of the two major-party candidates.

Nationally, the Republicans and Democrats have proven themselves equally incapable of providing even-headed, far-sighted governance. They have led us - if that's the correct word - to our current level of political dysfunction.

Do we have any reason to think they will change? Do we really think Trump would make a better, more effective leader than Bush 1 or Bush 2? Would Hillary be better than Bill or Obama? Remember - we're not talking about a very high bar here.

There is no reason to think the political situation will get better spontaneously. Nationally, both parties have detached themselves from the middle of America, where people go to work, pay their bills and hope their kids have as good a chance at life as they did.

If this election were a blip on the political radar screen and we knew solid candidates were waiting in the wings, it might be different. Sadly,

neither party has much bench strength. There were a couple of moderate Republicans that looked attractive this year, but neither appears to have much chance of getting the nomination in 2020 or beyond.

If the two major parties are incapable of governing well and will not move toward the middle on their own, we have two choices: accept more of the same or bring pressure on them through a third party.

Right now, that would be the Libertarians, an apparently quirky party in favor of small government and personal liberties. They advocate such diverse positions as abolishing income taxes, legalizing pot, opposing the death penalty, privatizing Social Security, eliminating restrictions on free trade and supporting the Second Amendment. Most reasonable people would look at their platform and see some things they like and some they detest. One thing is certain: The Libertarians aren't afraid to stake a position on lightning rod issues.

To be clear, we don't think Gary Johnson, the Libertarian candidate, has the slightest chance of winning this election, but that's not really the point. No matter who wins this election - Hillary Clinton or Donald Trump - America is the real loser and there is nothing any of us can do about that.

What we're talking about is voting for the future, bringing about political change by elevating a third party to force the two existing parties to moderate their positions or risk becoming marginalized. We see that as the only way to get our government working again.

Think about it and see if you agree.

Q&A on criminal justice questions

State Questions 780 and 781 are two intertwined measures that seek to lower Oklahoma's incarceration rate and divert more offenders to treatment programs.

Proponents say the measures are critical to a state where numerous people's lives are stunted by felony convictions for nonviolent crimes. But the measures are not without detractors, who say the proposals add too much leniency to the justice system and could have negative effects.

Below are some of the arguments for and against the state questions and information about what each question would put in place.

Q: What is the goal of State Questions 780 and 781?

Supporters say they hope that the two proposals will lower the state's high incarceration rate, save the state money in the long term, and provide rehabilitation and treatment for low-level offenders, helping them become productive members of society.

Q: What would State Question 780 do?

Titled the Oklahoma Smart Justice Reform Act, SQ 780 would amend state laws to make simple possession of a limited amount of illicit drugs a misdemeanor, punishable by up to one year of confinement and/or a fine of up to \$1,000. That would apply to possession of any drug and to both first and subsequent offenses. The law would do away with stiffer penalties for possessing an illegal drug within 1,000 feet of a park or school. Also, the measure would raise the

dollar threshold at which some misdemeanor property crimes become a felony, from \$500 to \$1,000.

Q: Didn't the Legislature already make the changes found in State Question 780?

Somewhat. The Legislature changed some laws during the last session, such as raising the dollar threshold for some property crimes to become felonies from \$500 to \$1,000. Legislation also changed simple possession of some Schedule I and II drugs on a first offense from felonies to misdemeanors. SQ 780 goes further by also making subse-



quent offenses misdemeanors. Prosecutors could still charge people with possession with intent to distribute or trafficking.

Q: What would State Question 781 do?

It would create a state revolving fund called the County Community Safety Investment Fund. The Office of Management and Enterprise Services would calculate how much money, if any, was saved by SQ 780 as a result of incarcerating fewer people. The Legislature would then appropriate that amount from the general fund, to be deposited in the invest-

ment fund. OMES would then disburse the funds to counties, based on population, to pay for community rehabilitative services, including, but not limited to, mental health and substance abuse services.

Q: What would counties be allowed to do with the money?

The proposal calls for using the money for "community rehabilitative programming," which could include services such as drug and mental health treatment, job training and educational programs. It does not detail what the rehabilitative programs would entail; it requires the director of OMES to write rules to implement the act — rules that could further define the programs.

Q: Why do proponents favor spending the money on services like mental health and substance abuse treatment?

They say these will help address the root causes of crime and prove a smarter, more effective way of reducing incarceration. Oklahoma leads the nation in incarceration of women and is among the highest in overall incarceration. By keeping fewer people out of prison, the measure would also alleviate related social problems, such as separation of mothers and fathers from children and the lifelong harm that felony convictions can cause, including in employment.

Q: What do opponents say about the proposals?

Opponents argue the measures would loosen drug laws to the point that it would create a danger to public safety and increase crime, in part by

I will be forever grateful for this incredible, once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. There are many issues my colleagues and I were able to accomplish and here are just a few of them. Increased funding for the Department of Transportation to have monies to fully repair, rebuild and sustain our bridges and roads.

We began in 2005 repairing the nearly collapsed teacher retirement system, provided several pay raises and began funding the flex benefits. We looked at and passed legislation to make it more difficult to file frivolous lawsuits. We also

provided a permanent funding source for the Oklahoma's Promise program for students who qualify economically to attend college.

I am grateful for the work of many of my colleagues (including the late Rep. David Dank) to reduce and eliminate a large number of tax credits and exemptions that have been on the books for decades.

We corrected the outdated and ineffective retirement system for elected officials. We made it economically sustainable and appropriate while ensuring our teachers, state employees and public safety staff have an actuarially sound retirement system.

Criminal justice reform began taking shape in 2010, and we are just beginning to see the fruit of this work. Due to the work of Rep. Leslie Osborn, state pay raises occurred along with a long-term vision for how state pay is handled.

One of the issues that is most important to me is protecting unborn children. We authored and passed many pieces of legislation that protect unborn, innocent babies while providing women all of the information they need prior to making a life-altering decision. In fact, over the past 12 years the abortion rate in our state has been reduced by nearly 40 percent

and the number of pregnancy crisis centers has increased. That is excellent news!

There is still much work to be done for the great state of Oklahoma. More reforms are needed for criminal justice, along with more monies for the department of corrections and our social workers who work long days need an increase. I would love to see an idea come to fruition I recently heard Sen. A.J. Griffin discuss regarding school funding. The current Legislature is made up of more retired educators than all other careers, so I believe this discussion will move forward.

The past 12 years has been a journey filled with hope, optimism, valleys, unbelievable obstacles (when the oil and gas price dropped to \$23 per barrel) and prayers. A lot of prayer!

Thank you to my wonderful husband, Philip, and our three children (plus our extra son). None of us knew how to run campaigns and the school of hard work became our classroom. I could not have done this job without Saprina Crosthwait and Margie Keely. I am forever grateful to the pastors and churches who provided lunch and a powerful word on Tuesdays during my devotions.

Thank you and may the Lord be gracious to each of you.

Lankford:

This becomes problematic quickly, because many people who serve people through a nonprofit love to serve and they often exceed forty hours a week. This constraint will end up harming the very people organizations aim to help and will add an administrative burden on every nonprofit.

Please understand this. I want to see incomes rise for everyone, but this is not the way to do it. While speaking with small business owners and employees directly affected by the increase, I have found that in order to counteract the changes, tuition for higher education will rise, jobs will be lost, and charitable services will be reduced.

We must try every available option to protect the American people from this rule. I have introduced legislation called

the Regulatory Relief for Small Businesses, Schools and Nonprofits Act, which would make the effective date June 1, 2016, instead of December 1. This delay would give an extra six months for employers to plan for the rule, while rational thought can prevail in Washington DC to do this a better way.

In addition, I have co-sponsored The Overtime Reform and Review Act to stretch the proposed increases over a five-year period instead of the drastic increase slated to go into effect in December. Using a four-stage approach over a five-year expansion will ease the stress put on small business owners, nonprofits and colleges. I have also worked with my colleagues in the Senate to introduce legislation forcing the Department of Labor to

completely rewrite the rule, as well as a resolution of disapproval under the Congressional Review Act.

In fact, one of the last floor debates on the Senate floor, before the November election, was on this overtime rule. During the debate, I argued for basic fairness and common-sense before Americans lose their jobs or their opportunities for advancement.

With less than a month to comply with the regulations, small businesses, nonprofits, local governments and colleges will scramble to meet the latest Obama administration demands.

I will continue to fight to delay and defeat this rule. This out-of-touch with reality regulation is not the right way to increase wages and income for all Americans.

that many salaried employees enjoy will be curtailed. For example, many salaried workers have the flexibility to take time off to attend to personal priorities like doctors' appointments, children sports and school activities, even being stuck in traffic on their way into work - without being docked any of their pay.

Under President Obama's new overtime rules if you are not at work and on the clock, you are not getting paid. This

could actually result in workers making less income as employers strive to maintain a payroll level that allows them to stay in business.

As the Chairman of the House Appropriations subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, which funds the Department of Labor annually, I have included language in the 2017 appropriations bill which would prevent the overtime rule from going into effect for Fiscal Year 2017.

I am a strong supporter of small business in America, and I am also a strong advocate for improving the lives and livelihood of middle class families. Unfortunately, these new overtime rules do damage to both of these groups.

Congress would be wise to pump the brakes on this proposal and to advance proven, free-market economic policies which help small businesses thrive, and their workers prosper.

Q&A:

taking away the possible deterrent of a prison sentence for possession and stiffer penalties for repeat offenders. They say most of those who would be affected are repeat offenders or offenders who already don't take advantage of diversion and treatment options. Opponents also say the proposals would tie the hands of district attorneys in using their own judgment on prosecutions and would create issues of jail overcrowding. Some also say the proposals are too ambiguous about how counties can spend the funds.

Q: What happens if one ballot measure passes and the other doesn't?

If SQ 780 passes and SQ 781 fails, the changes to drug

possession and property crime laws would take effect, but any savings would not go to counties, rather to the state. If SQ 780 fails and SQ 781 passes, the latter would not take effect.

Q: Who are the supporters?

The two questions made it to the ballot through efforts from a group called Oklahomans for Criminal Justice Reform. Supporters are wide-ranging, from the American Civil Liberties Union and Mental Health Association Oklahoma to the Oklahoma City and Tulsa chambers of commerce and Oklahoma Council of Public Affairs Impact. The group is headed by former Oklahoma House Speaker Kris Steele.

Q: Who are the opponents?

There are no organizations created specifically to oppose the questions, but many prosecutors and law enforcement officials have stated their opposition to one or both of the measures. Those include district attorneys in Oklahoma, Tulsa, Cleveland and Stephens counties and a number of county sheriffs. The Oklahoma City Fraternal Order of Police also has come out in opposition.

Q: When would the measures take effect?

Both state questions would take effect on July 1, 2017. *Oklahoma Watch* is a non-profit, nonpartisan media organization that produces in-depth and investigative content on a range of public-policy issues facing the state. For more Oklahoma Watch content, go to www.oklahomawatch.org.

Fall season can bring risks to your pets

While the lower temperatures and the colorful leaves entice pet owners to spend more time outdoors with their furry friends, keep in mind not every aspect of fall is safe for your pet.

Some of the risks are made by Mother Nature, but others are man-made, said Dr. Elisabeth Giedt, director of Continuing Education, Extension and Community Engagement at the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences at Oklahoma State University.

"Snakes are preparing to hibernate at this time of year, so they may be out and about more than normal, which can increase your pup's risk of getting bitten," Giedt said. "When you're taking your dog for a walk, avoid areas where snakes may be found."

Mushrooms can be another

danger to pets. Although they pop up frequently during this time of year, fortunately only about one percent of them are highly toxic. Unfortunately, it can be difficult to determine which mushrooms are dangerous and which ones are not. To be on the safe side, keep your pet away from all mushrooms.

While there is not much a pet owner can do about risks found in nature, it is imperative to be on the lookout for hidden dangers caused by humans.

"This is the time of year when people are preparing their cars and trucks for the colder winter months by topping off radiators with antifreeze," she said. "Ethylene glycol-based coolants are toxic for pets. If you spill some on your driveway, clean it up right away. Keep in mind propylene glycol-based coolants are less toxic."

Something else homeowners

may be doing this time of year is trying to control the rodent population. As the cooler weather sets in, rats, mice and other rodents are seeking a warm place to hang out for the winter.

It makes sense that a product that kills rodents also can be highly toxic to pets. Keep pets away from areas where rodenticides are used.

If your neighbors mention having a rodent problem and plan to use poison to control the issue, find out where around the perimeter of their homes and yards they are going to put it.

"Our pets are a part of the family and need to be protected just as we protect the humans in the home," Giedt said. "As we continue through the fall season, keep an eye out for potential hazards that could be dangerous for your four-legged family members."

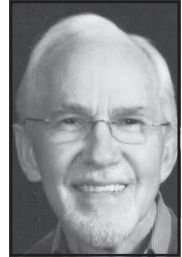

schools,” Jason Midkiff said. “Our teachers are definitely deserving of a \$5,000 raise.”

Midkiff cited the Oklahoma State Schools Boards Association estimate that the new sales tax would bring an estimated \$880,000-plus in new revenue to his district.

About \$760,000 of that would show up in the teachers’ paychecks.

And the remaining \$120,000 or so would be the district’s to use in a reading initiative.

The initiative could be used to pay for software, technology or books so long as the purpose was tied to reading, Midkiff said.

Oddly, however, textbooks aren’t included in the initiative.

Lexington Public Schools is particularly hard-pressed for textbooks that meet the state standards which the Legislature seems to change at will.

Superintendent Ronda Bass has just one word for the district need for textbooks containing the correct standards schools must teach – desperate.

It isn’t so much that existing textbooks are ragged – they are still legible – but the standards in those books simply aren’t the standards educators are required to teach.

“To meet the new state standards, teachers probably are spending more time than ever creating lesson plans,” she said. “That’s the hardest part for new teachers to learn. You teach to the standards.”

Other than the raise for teachers, which Bass supports, the bill is very specific in how additional money may be spent.

Zach Powell, superintendent at Wayne, said the sales tax will be a good thing for teacher raises, but is not necessarily going to provide an infusion of cash to district coffers.

“The teacher shortage is a reality even in a district our size,” Powell said. “In the last few years, we really have to look for applications.”

The cause, he said, is directly tied to salaries and the ability of

teachers to earn more by moving out of Oklahoma.

“So it does affect the classroom,” Powell said of teacher raises.

He is bothered by negative advertising against the sales tax. One recent ad, he explained, was particularly upsetting. It referred to “administrative slush funds” in school districts. “It’s really our state government that has put us in this position,” he said. “This (low teacher pay) is not a new problem. It’s been a problem for years and hasn’t been addressed.

“If you don’t stay competitive, you’re falling behind and teachers’ salaries are not competitive.”

Ten or 15 years ago, Powell said he easily had 50 applications on file for elementary teachers. Now when there’s an opening, the district is lucky to get three or four applications.

At Washington, A.J. Brewer acknowledges it’s hard to say exactly what the direction the

district would take with any funds over the mandated \$5,000 raise for teachers.

Some of the possibilities permitted under the measure is reading improvement in the early grades, improving graduation rates and improving college and career readiness in high school graduates.

But the teacher salary is the key.

“It’s a whole lot more difficult to get teachers in the state,” Brewer said. “The list of candidates certainly isn’t what it was in previous years.”

According to OSSBA estimates, the sales tax if approved by voters will generate \$615 million annually for education.

That will be divided as follows:

- \$427.4 million for school districts,
- \$118.4 million for higher education,
- \$49.2 million for early childhood education, and
- \$20 million for career technology centers.

he heard there were openings with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Not looking for a permanent job, Braggs applied and was hired as a corrections officer.

Days grew into weeks, weeks into months and months became years and then decades.

It was "just a job" that grew into a 34-year-and-counting career in corrections and Braggs' newest posting as warden at the Lexington Assessment & Reception Center.

At LARC, Braggs oversees a prisoner population that was 948 last week and directs 201 employees, including 102 security officers.

And it falls to him to keep his security personnel on point when they are 87 officers shy of being fully staffed.

Braggs said the recently-approved \$1,750 stipend for all DOC employees is a "shot in the arm" to raise morale among staff.

Braggs brings to LARC a world of experience, leadership, a commitment to excellence and a determination to rehabilitate offenders so they return to society as changed men.

"I think I have a passion for it (corrections)," he said. "It's fascinating the different avenues you can take in corrections."

"Our job is fostering a secure and safe environment for the employees and inmates and also for the public."

Braggs appreciates what he describes as the "vast history" of LARC.

Scant weeks in his new role, he walks, observes and talks with staff and inmates.

His walks aren't random or without purpose. As he settles more into his new role, he's

noting subtle changes he wants to make.

His right hand is deputy warden Natalie Cooper, who has been at LARC just two months longer than Braggs.

LARC has a dual purpose within the Oklahoma Department of Corrections. In addition to serving as the intake facility for prisoners entering DOC custody, it houses a permanent prisoner population.

It's through the assessment process for new inmates that it's determined in which facility they will serve their time.

It's a stringent classification process that typically takes two to three weeks as the incoming prisoners undergo medical and psychological tests.

"I try to never get complacent," Braggs said. "I've worked with some great leaders, great wardens and I'm still learning. You're never too old to learn."

Since he's been at LARC, Braggs has liked the programs he's seen for prisoners.

The lifers program, religious programs, inmate council and message programs are great, possibly surpassed only by the facility's volunteer base.

"It's great," he said of volunteers from the community. "They spend their personal time to come out here."

The volunteers complete a training program before working with inmates.

One of the best experiences, Braggs said, is when he's approached by prisoners and ex-prisoners who thank him for doing his job the way he does it.

"I've had guys say 'I appreciate you gave me your ear, gave me a word of advice,'" Braggs said. "And I ask them 'Do you have a plan (when you get out)?"

A widower, Braggs has three adult children. A daughter, 40, lives in Wichita. His sons, ages 26 and 20, live in Houston and Lawrence, Kan., respectively.

Braggs is a native of Wichita, but spent most of his adult life studying and working in Texas.

Still, he had a tie to Oklahoma before moving north of the Red River.

His parents, it seems, were born and raised at Boley.

"You never know whose footsteps you follow," he said.

Braggs lives in Lexington and is excited to be part of that community.

He looks forward to coaching some basketball for Upward Bound, saying he wants to "give back to the community I live in."

"It's like last week against Anadarko, We got the ball on the last drive of the third quarter and held it until two minutes left in the game."

"We need to control the ball and just go compete," Higbee said.

After repeated reviews of the Anadarko tape, Higbee said that he and his staff took extra time making sure the extra effort that was on display did not go unnoticed.

It was infectious and contagious, the coach said of the extra effort to defeat the Warriors.

"Take Ethan Hall for example," Higbee said. "He plays in our jumbo package. On our second touchdown drive he drove his guy to the ground and then hops up and sprints to find someone else to block."

"Ben Claunch launched himself horizontal with the ground toward the Anadarko running back. He didn't make the tackle but he made the runner pause until others could get there. It was effort like that all night long."

"Edgar Garcia gave incredible effort on a bubble screen pass away from him. He ran 30 yards down field to try to make the tackle," Higbee said.

Due to injuries, wounded senior Dillon Cook was forced into action at safety.

"He has a bad shoulder and knew it was going to hurt but he knifes down two guys in open field to stop drives. He knew it was going to hurt and he did it anyway."

Higbee said all of his wide receivers blocked well and everyone who got their mitts on the football ran hard all night long.

"We had great effort on special teams," the coach said. "Take Hayden Farley who was playing on our kickoff team. He flies down the field and misses the tackle. He got up and missed again but got up again and finally was in on the tackle."

"No one out there didn't contribute. Then there were the usual suspects that played to their caliber if not beyond."

He was speaking of Brett Webb, Omar Brown, Dylan Kimbrell, Kyle Varner, Dylan Colletata, Sweeney and the running back by committee (Gunner Fink, Brown, Waylon Steiner, Isaiah Couch and Caylin Nimmo).

Higbee said Kimbrell was in on nearly every tackle in Anadarko's first three possessions.

"When we cut out the silly mistakes and do what we're told, we can be a solid team. We don't have a marquee player but we are not weak anywhere. We are beginning to self correct our mistakes and when someone goes down the next guy pops up and gets the job done," he said.

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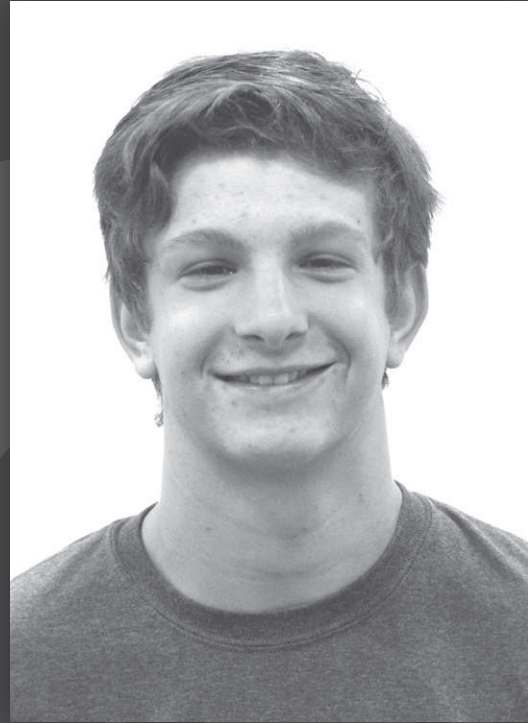

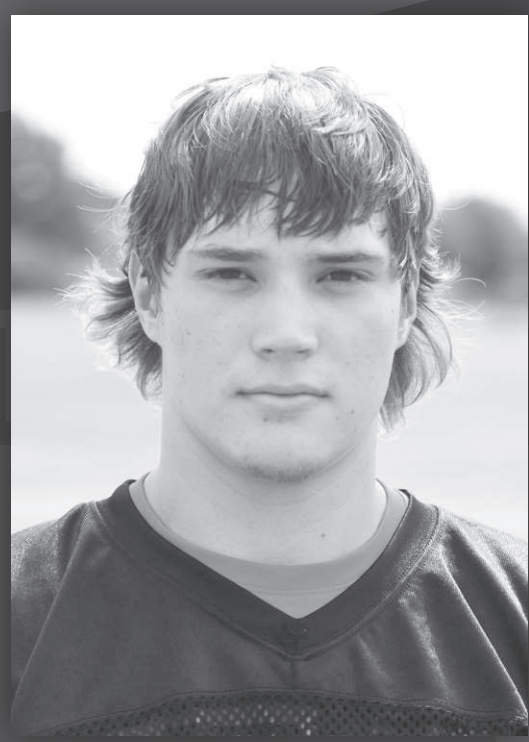

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Corner is not affiliated with any other organization. Our services are only provided at Faith Pointe Baptist Church, 3404 NW 36th, in Norman.

We will not be open on Tuesday, November 8, as the church will be used as a polling place. Also, our lawyers from Legal Aid will not be on site this week as they will be at a training seminar.

In the early morning hours, a veteran sits alone in the dark while volunteers arrive who have promised to help. A surviving spouse struggles to get out of the car for the same reason. Veterans from World War II and Vietnam blush at the outpouring of admiration from a grateful crowd gathered in honor of their military service. They are all looking forward to learning about what benefits might be available to help with the burdens of their daily living.

These are just a few of the reasons we help them. Will you please consider helping us so that we may continue helping them?

We are celebrating our one-year anniversary of our move to Faith Pointe Baptist Church located at 3404 NW 36th in Norman. We invite you to stop by any Tuesday or Thursday morning for a visit to see how things are going and to have a cup of coffee and a doughnut. I want to start out by saying this move was one of the best decisions we have ever made for our veterans and their fami-

lies. Working in a church setting with hundreds of veterans each week is a very moving experience. I believe that God has a plan for all of us in the scheme of life.

In the past year, we had just under 10,000 visits from veterans and surviving spouses. We never believed that so much could be accomplished in 12 short months. As the Accredited Claims Agent for all of the men and women whom we represent, I receive all of their VA rating decisions. Receiving this rating allows me to see what is going on with the benefits claim for each veteran and surviving spouse we assist.

After reviewing the VA's report, we send a notice to each veteran or surviving spouse explaining the VA's report about their benefits and what they need to do next to continue a request for increased benefits. Each week we receive notification of the VA benefits granted to our clients. Although the amounts vary, we routinely see \$500,000 in benefits weekly awarded to Oklahomans – which translates to more than \$26 million annually.

I want each of you to know as much as possible about what we are doing and some of the things that may affect you. For the surviving spouse of veterans, we have found a veteran's death certificate may be amended to add their service-connected disabilities as a contributing factor to their

death. Surviving Spouses may then be eligible for VA surviving spouse benefits.

If the veteran served in Vietnam or was exposed to Agent Orange, there are many diseases that are presumptive to such events. Please bring your questions about VA benefits to us. We have volunteers waiting to serve you.

For those of who have not filed for a re-evaluation of a service-connected disability, check the date stamped on the front page of your last rating decision. If it has been more than one year since the date of the rating decision, we can ask the Veterans Administration for a re-evaluation if you believe your disability is more severe.

Veterans who served at the Camp Lejeune Marine Base from 1953 to 1987 were exposed to chemicals in the water. Some may be eligible for VA benefits if they have been diagnosed with one of the presumptive diseases listed for that exposure. Family members who were there with the veteran may be eligible for free health care for covered conditions.

The names of 58,307 military men and women who died are on the Vietnam Wall. If those who died from the effects of Agent Orange were listed that Wall, it would be many times longer. The dioxins in that defoliant are causing many of us to become ill with one or more of the presumptive diseases that are associated with that

chemical. Personally, I believe that we have lost many times the number from that chemical than who died in Vietnam. VA offers veterans the opportunity to sign up for the Agent Orange Registry.

Veterans who received other than Honorable Discharges may have an opportunity to apply for an upgraded DD-214. We recently have had success with obtaining upgrades to a veteran's discharge status. Such an upgrade will open the doors to several VA benefits. Each case is unique, so we invite you to visit us to see if we can assist you in the upgrade process. Veterans and their families are suffering financially at a higher rate than other members of our society.

We are seeing an increase in the number of surviving spouses whose husband or wife have committed suicide. Oklahoma veterans and active-duty

military personnel are killing themselves at twice the rate of civilians. The last number I had on veteran suicides in Oklahoma was 175 in 2014.

Currently, we are taking \$10,000 each month from our savings to be able to provide the myriad of services that are needed. We are operating two transportation vans each day that provide transportation for veterans to their VA appointments. We provide food boxes, rent, utilities, medical testing, along with many other unmet needs veterans and their families have. We are all volunteers whose only goal is to make a difference in the lives of veterans and their families. The cost to provide services to the veterans and surviving spouses we assist is averaging \$30,000 each month.

We are asking those whom we have helped to pay it forward with a monthly donation to help keep this organization

going. The cost to provide these services to our brother and sister veterans and their families is more than we can continue to provide without reducing our services. We have provided an application for an automatic contribution. Your help is needed to enable us to continue our mission. We are a 501(c)(3) non-profit with all donations being tax deductible.

One for the History Books

American Indian artifacts, which have played a major role in the mission of the Oklahoma Historical Society to collect, preserve and share Oklahoma history, will be honored and highlighted during American Indian Heritage Month in November.

These artifacts include historic documents written by Meriwether Lewis and William Clark during the 1804 Lewis and Clark expedition and preserved by the Oklahoma History Center in Oklahoma City, the Murrell Home in Park Hill established by George and Minerva Murrell in 1838-39, a 1910 cradleboard with painted designs and beadwork preserved in the Pawnee Bill Ranch and Museum near Pawnee and a sausage mill hauled in a wagon by John and Rebecca White to a settlement near Fort Towson and preserved at the Fort Towson Museum.

"The story of collecting, preserving and sharing Oklahoma history is incomplete without talking about the people who saved important artifacts and generously donated them to the Oklahoma Historical Society," said Dr. Bob Blackburn, executive director of the OHS. "As the nation observes Native American Heritage Month, visitors to OHS sites and museums can see Native American Indian artifacts on display and learn now those objects were preserved by family members, archaeologists and communities as a link to the past.

"From its early days, the OHS recognized the importance of collecting and sharing artifacts representative of the American Indian tribes whose cultures impact Oklahoma. Through partnerships with tribes, families and other community groups, the OHS houses significant items that help tell the story of American Indian settlement in the state."

The Lewis and Clark papers were brought to the OHS by Joan Aitson, a member of the

Otoe Missouria Tribe who had served as a librarian to the Oklahoma Legislature. The two documents were kept in her grandmother's trunk and had been preserved and passed down in the family for generations, said Jeffrey Briley of the History Center staff.

"The first document was a six-page manuscript of a speech written by William Clark and delivered to a gathering of Otoes with Lewis and Clark on Aug. 18, 1804," said Briley. "Worded in a unique mixture of diplomacy and paternalism, the speech was a description of what the Louisiana Purchase meant to inhabitants of that vast parcel of land."

The second document was a paper certificate of friendship presented to "Big Axe, Warrior of the Otoes," said Briley. Big Axe was the direct ancestor of Joan Aitson and her brother, Joe Dent. The document was inscribed, signed and sealed by both Lewis and Clark. Only two of these certificates are known to exist - one at the OHS and one in the Huntington Library, said Briley.

"They are national treasures," said Briley, "and documentary glimpses into the truly extraordinary story of the Lewis and Clark expedition and our nation's history."

At the George M. Murrell Home the artifact is the home itself. George M. Murrell was a white man who married Minerva Ross, the niece of Cherokee Principal Chief John Ross. The Murrells traveled the Trail of Tears to Park Hill, Indian Territory, where they built a large frame house known as the Hunter's Home in 1845.

When Minerva died in 1855, Murrell married her sister Amanda. When the Civil War began, the Murrells fled to Virginia. Most of the plantation houses were burned, but the Murrell Home was spared, possibly because George Murrell supported the Confederacy, whereas his wife's family sup-

ported the Union.

The George M. Murrell Home is a National Historic Landmark, a certified Trail of Tears Site, and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It is the only surviving antebellum plantation home in Oklahoma and was purchased by the State of Oklahoma in 1948.

The Pawnee Bill Ranch was the home of Gordon W. Lillie, who developed the Wild West Show as Pawnee Bill. The 1910 cradleboard on display was used during the Wild West Shows inside and outside the arenas, said Ron Brown, facilities manager of the Pawnee Bill Ranch and Museum.

"The cradleboard is a wonderful piece of history and a reminder of how amazing these individuals were in traveling and performing in Pawnee Bill's shows," said Brown. "In 1908, it was reported that Comanche, Pawnee, Sioux and Ute Indians participated in the show."

The sausage mill was brought in an ox wagon from Mississippi to Linden, Texas, during the late 1840s by John and Rebecca White, who was one-fourth Choctaw. John White, their youngest son who later was known as Uncle Joe White, moved with his family to Swink, Okla., in 1906 in a horse-drawn wagon and brought the mill.

"They settled one-half mile south of Old Fort Towson and three miles west of the Choctaw chief's house," said John Davis, director of Fort Towson and Doakville. "Joe served 17 years as justice of the piece in Choctaw County. The mill was added to the Fort Towson collections in 1976. It is now part of the Doakville exhibit at the Fort Towson Museum."

These remarkable items preserved by the OHS tell the stories of how American Indians helped develop what became the state of Oklahoma, said Blackburn, and show the importance of collecting those artifacts and stories.

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

This past week, on November 1, the Church celebrated the Feast of All Saints. Halloween, or "All Hallows Eve," is a derivative of this Feast day, a celebration on the eve of All Hallows Day, or All Saints Day. Two weeks ago, six men and one woman became the newest saints of the Catholic Church. They were from Mexico and France and Argentina and Spain and Italy.

One was called the "gaucho priest" because he rode a donkey to minister to his people. One was a little Mexican boy who was martyred for his faith in Jesus. Another was a French woman, known for her love of prayer and her spirituality. These were men and women who lived very different lives. But what bound them together was their love of the Church and their constant spiritual nourishment - the Body and Blood of Jesus in the Mass.

They gathered often, as we do, to repeat the actions of Jesus, to transform the bread and

wine into real spiritual food, to transform these simple actions into deeds of goodness, to transform their ordinary lives into lives of extraordinary holiness. You and I are called to be saints. But we won't be saints in the same way that these men and women are saints. We will not be saints in the same way that Jesus was a saint either, or Mary, or St. Joseph or Peter or St. Theresa.

Remember the parable that Jesus told us so that we might become more compassionate (Luke 10). The Good Samaritan found the man in the ditch. He felt compassion, and came to him and bandaged up his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them; and he put him on his own beast, and brought him to an inn and took care of him. On the next day he gave money to the innkeeper and said, "Take care of him, please." Jesus ended by saying "Go and do likewise (in a similar way)." He did not say "Go and do the very same thing."

We have to learn how to

become saints in our own style and with our own talents. We pray today that we might become more holy in the way that belongs to each of us. May the Holy Spirit lead us into a manner in which we become more clean of heart, that we may love peace more than strife, that we may have the courage to fight for justice in our own small way, and that we may be completely transparent, and poor in spirit. In this way, we too will become part of that great communion of saints.

First Friday Benediction and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will be this Friday from 7-9 p.m. Confessions are available for the last hour.

Keep safe cooking in mind this Thanksgiving

Everyone has holiday recipes they can't wait to make during the holidays.

Cooking is the main cause of home fires and fire-related injuries, with Thanksgiving being the leading day for injuries.* The U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) hopes you will keep cooking safety in mind while you prepare your holiday meals.

Make these tips a part of your holiday tradition:

- Keep your cooking area clean and safe. Move things that can burn away from the stove. Wipe up any spills as they occur. Turn pot handles toward the back so they can't be bumped.

- Keep an eye on the food you are cooking. If you are frying, broiling or boiling food, plan to stay in the kitchen. Use a timer when roasting or baking a turkey.

Be prepared. Keep the pot lid or baking sheet handy in case you need to smother a pan fire.

Wear short sleeves when you cook, or roll them up. Don't lean over the burner. Use potholders and oven mitts to handle hot cookware.

- Deep-frying turkeys has become a popular way to prepare the holiday bird. Turkey fryers get hot all over, so they need to be handled with great care, and only by an adult. Before getting started, thaw the turkey completely so ice crystals won't splatter the hot oil.

When you set up the fryer, place it outside on a flat surface that can't burn, such as cement. Place the fryer several feet from

anything that can catch fire and don't let children or pets anywhere near it.

Be sure that you use a fryer with thermostat controls or the oil can heat to the point of catching fire.

There's nothing more satisfying than cooking a good meal for the people we love. Make safety a priority in your kitchen, at Thanksgiving, and

all year long.

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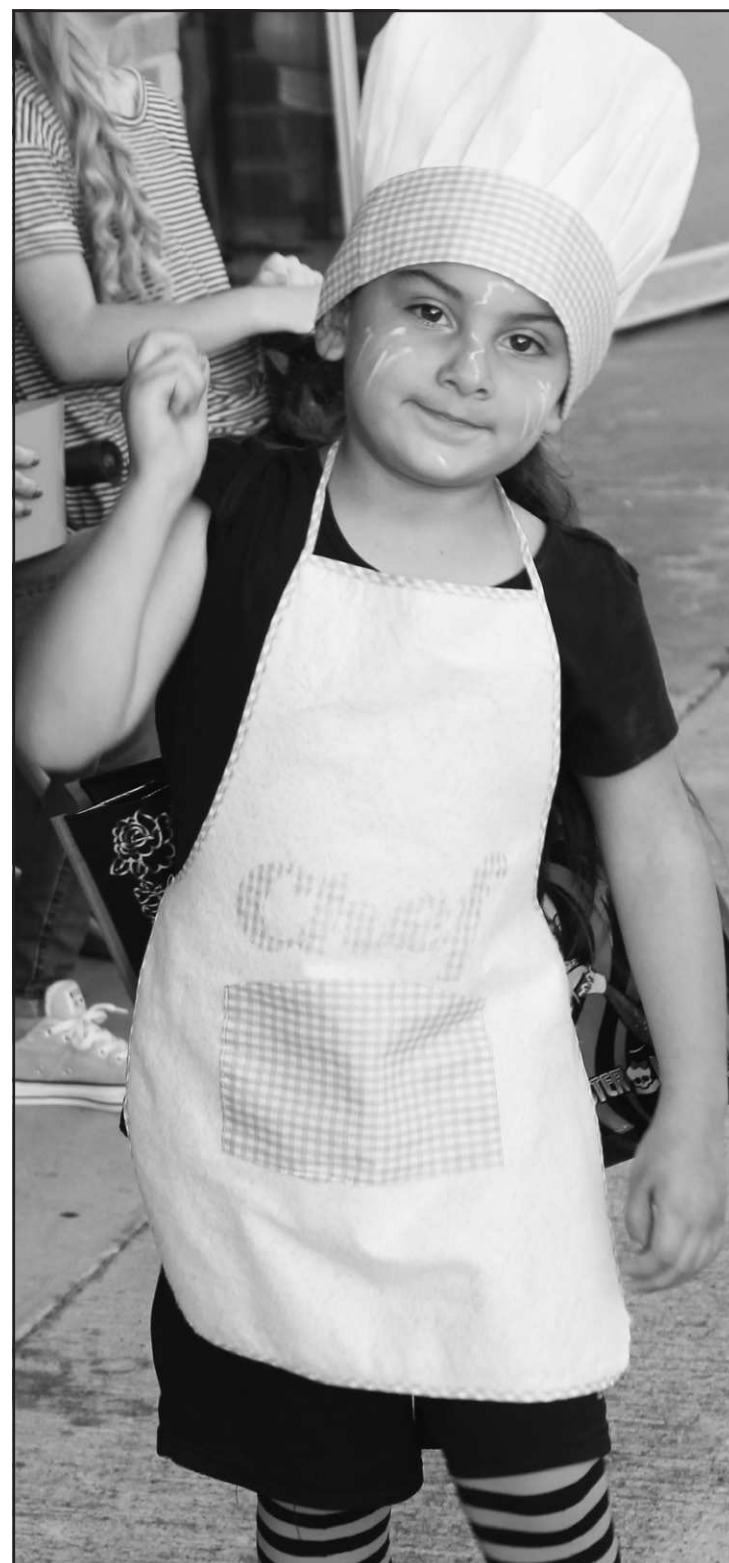

Are public schools failing dyslexic children?

Learning to read is one of the fundamental concepts that schools are expected to teach.

But parents of children with dyslexia say public schools in Oklahoma are failing to identify and educate these students. Many turn to expensive private tutoring for the dyslexia-specific lessons their child needs, with out-of-pocket costs often running to \$10,000 or beyond.

The students are at risk of failing the state's third-grade reading test, which requires students who don't pass to be held back. Parents say the stakes are too high to wait for the school to intervene.

"It is the parents who are educating the schools right now about dyslexia," said Michelle Keiper, who started the group Decoding Dyslexia Oklahoma, which supports parents of children with dyslexia and advocates for students.

Dyslexia is a neurological disability that causes poor spelling and word recognition. Nearly one in five people have it. The disorder can make words appear jumbled, but it's a common myth that dyslexics read or write backwards. Although there's no cure for dyslexia, students with it can learn to read and write well, according

to the International Dyslexia Association.

When Kendra Anderson's son, Nathaniel, was struggling to learn to read, she discovered no one at his school in Grove knew how to help him. Intervention programs available to struggling readers often don't specifically target dyslexia.

First grade ticked by, and Nathaniel was no better off. "I put 100 percent of my trust into the school system and who I felt were the experts. I just assumed they would know what to do to help my son learn to read," Anderson said.

Living in a town of 6,800 in the northeast corner of the state, she determined the nearest trained tutor was an hour-and-a-half away. So Anderson purchased the reading curriculum herself, at a cost of \$2,500, and persuaded his teacher to use it.

By the third grade — the year the state expects all children to read at grade level and retains those who can't — Nathaniel's reading skills jumped from below grade level to above grade level, and he passed the

high-stakes test.

Anderson didn't stop there. Encouraged by getting her son on track, she started advocating for other students in the district. She used her frequent flier miles to send his teacher to a national dyslexia seminar, donated the curriculum she purchased to her son's school and helped the school apply for a grant to offer the curriculum to more students.

Keiper, whose son is also dyslexic, recognizes that the parents who have both identified their child as dyslexic and have the resources to afford help outside the school system are fortunate. But the burden is significant.

Families are deferring college savings and retirement to pay for tutoring, Keiper said. A survey by Decoding Dyslexia Oklahoma conducted this month of 103 parents of children with dyslexia across the state found more than half

had invested \$500 to \$10,000 in the past five years to pay for dyslexia services.

The most common expense was private tutoring. Tutors cost \$30 to 70 an hour, and most students need several sessions a week.

Among the comments from parents the survey received: "I have asked every teacher since kindergarten if she could be dyslexic, only to have my concerns dismissed. I trusted the professionals and ignored my gut feeling."

Dyslexic, and Unidentified

The first time Rep. Mike Shelton, D-Oklahoma City, heard the term dyslexia was on an episode of The Cosby Show called "Theo's Gift," which aired in 1989. The next time was 2012 on the floor of the Legislature, as lawmakers considered a bill to create a dyslexia pilot program at state universities.

Listening to a speaker describe dyslexia, he had an "aha" moment. That description mirrored the struggles his

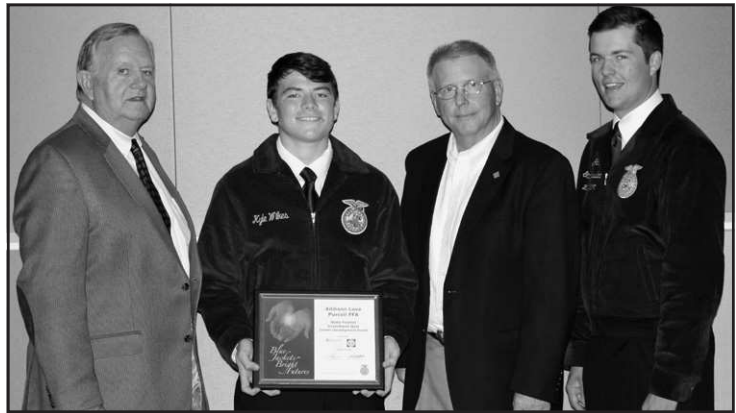

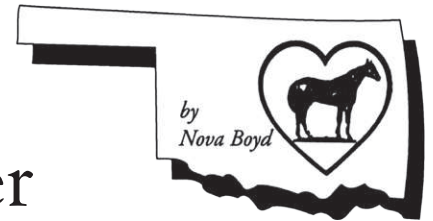

2016 All American Quarter Horse Congress Results

The All American Quarter Horse Congress, held each year in Columbus, Ohio, celebrated its 50th year at this show. This year, held from October 6-30, Congress is the largest single breed-horse show in the world. The show had over 21,000 entries made with more than 6500 horses, generating more than \$225 million for the central Ohio economy.

The show attracts more than 650,000 people to the Columbus area. Nearly \$3 million is given away in cash and prizes, including trucks, trailers, trophy saddles, sterling silver buckles and the coveted Don Bell bronze trophies. The largest Collegiate and Youth Judging contest is held at the Congress, with more than 60 teams of college students, 4-H, FFA and Quarter Horse youth members. A few over 200 registered Quarter Horses are sold at the Congress Super Sale.

Since its very first year, the All American Quarter Horse Congress has encouraged participation by the future generation of the Quarter Horse industry through a variety of youth activities. Aside from competing on a horse, there are many skills professional horsemen and women must possess. These youth activities help prepare young participants for a bright future, whether it is in or out of the equine industry.

Contests include horse judging, in which all teams in both youth and intercollegiate place four halter classes and eight performance classes, with specific classes designated as "oral reasons" classes; Horse Bowl, where contestants answer equine-related questions in a "game show" format; Hippology, which covers many of the same topics as Horse Bowl, but asks students to apply their knowledge in a written exam, identify slides, identify different equine-related items from bones to types of grass, judge four horse show classes, this culminating in a single question requiring an impromptu answer or prep an explanation. The Congress also holds speech and demonstration contests to help develop public speaking skills and self-confidence.

The Congress offers demonstrations and lectures from professional trainers. Two of our areal trainers gave demonstrations this year, Angie Cannizzaro, Cannizzaro Show Horses, Purcell, on Western Pleasure and Alyse Roberts, LAS Show Horses, Tuttle, on Hunter Under Saddle. Our historic center of Oklahoma's horse industry has been very well represented at this show over the years in this area of demos and lectures, and with judges for the show.

Although the Congress is billed as the largest single breed show in the nation, it draws the best horses and top trainers to showcase the horses they have trained over the past year, and to earn a Congress Championship is a hallmark any horse owner and trainer strive for, it is for some disciplines only a regional show.

Our historical horse capital of Oklahoma is always very well represented and trainers from here annually bring the pride home. Following are results for several disciplines. More next week.

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son had been having in school. Reading remediation wasn't working, and it wasn't until his son started receiving tutoring for his dyslexia that the boy's trajectory changed.

"We don't do a good enough job giving teachers the tools. They may be able to see the child has problems, but schools are strapped and may not give students the extra help they need," Shelton said.

Shelton said his family shouldered the cost of the tutoring and didn't ask the school for help; it costs about \$400 a month. He recognizes that many families in his community, which includes a large population of low-income African-Americans, aren't able to do the same.

Although he's term-limited and this is his last year in the Legislature, Shelton vowed to continue to work to educate northeast Oklahoma City residents about dyslexia.

"They don't even hear the word dyslexia over here. I made a commitment to this community that I would make sure parents are more aware of what dyslexia is," he said.

Unaddressed Needs

Dyslexia is categorized as a specific learning disability

under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. School districts have the responsibility to evaluate students at no cost to parents and determine if the student needs special education services.

Dyslexia advocates say while schools are complying with the disabilities act, the reading services provided are often not specific to dyslexia. What dyslexic students need is structured literacy, a type of instruction that has shown to be effective for all children learning to read, not just dyslexics, according to the International Dyslexia Association.

Students with dyslexia are often very bright and excel in subjects other than reading. (Among the well-known dyslexics are director Steven Spielberg, actor Henry Winkler and Cher.)

This creates an educational hot potato, advocates say. Classroom teachers assume special education will help dyslexic students, and special education teachers assume their needs are being met in the classroom.

Training for teachers in Oklahoma is scarce. None of the state's colleges or universities offer a program accredited

by the International Dyslexia Association; these programs can be found in a dozen states, including nearby Arkansas and Texas.

The state Department of Education has a professional development program called Language Essentials for the Teachers of Reading and Spelling, but it's optional and has been completed by just hundreds of the 42,400 educators in the state.

A grant pool that included a \$200,000 grant to train teachers to remediate dyslexic students was cut this year, a casualty of the state budget crisis.

Elementary teacher Renee McFarland, who teaches in Sand Springs Public Schools, developed a passion for working with students with dyslexia as a general education teacher, and went back to earn a certification in special education. The program still didn't address dyslexia.

She has sought out professional development on her own, and a few years ago, convinced her school district to purchase a reading, spelling and writing curriculum that is specifically for dyslexic students.

"It's so different from anything else I've seen. I've been

a teacher 20 years now, and it's the only thing I've seen like this," McFarland said.

Zero Sign-Ups for Pilot Program

A proposal to develop a pilot program with state universities to train higher education faculty to teach structured literacy has fallen flat. The Legislature signed the program into law in 2012. The Payne Education Center, an Oklahoma City nonprofit that trains teachers to work with dyslexic children, secured a \$50,000 grant to get the program off the ground.

Of the six major universities the Payne center invited to participate, none got on board. Executive Director Carrie Brown told legislators during a hearing at the Capitol October 12. The grant money was eventually returned to the funder.

Additional proposals by Shelton and Rep. Ann Coody, R-Lawton, were introduced in 2014 and 2015 that would have required screening for dyslexia in kindergarten, but the measures failed to advance.

Other states are doing more to address gaps in reading education for dyslexic students. In Missouri, for instance, the state's Decoding Dyslexia advocacy group spurred a new

statewide requirement to screen all students for dyslexia starting in the 2018-2019 school year. The law also mandates two hours of training for all teachers.

Arkansas' legislature passed a law with similar requirements in 2013.

On the federal level, Congress passed the Research Excellence and Advancements for Dyslexia (READ) Act earlier this year. The program requires the National Science Foundation to dedicate at least \$2.5 million annually to dyslexia research.

No Exemption from 'Read or Fail'

As part of the state's Reading Sufficiency Act, schools are required to screen all students beginning in kindergarten for reading skills, and those at risk for reading difficulties must be given remediation.

The Education Department doesn't recommend or require

specific reading curricula; those decisions are left up to individual districts.

Dyslexia advocates are critical of the retention aspect of the reading test. Students who fail the test are retained in most cases; there is no exemption for dyslexic students.

"Now that we have the RSA ... our families start calling us in first or second grade. They are desperate," Keiper said.

Keiper doesn't believe children with dyslexia need to be retained.

"We want accountability somewhere, but it's not falling on the school to change what they are doing. It's falling on the parent and child," she said.

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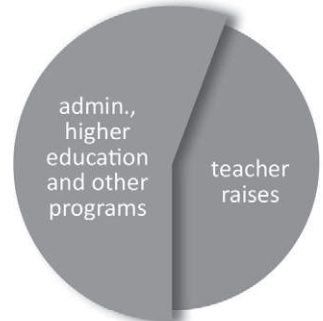
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Native caucus creators accept art, keep working

If you inquire where to locate the Native American Caucus Room, quizzical looks are plentiful but answers are scarce.

That is changing thanks to the two members behind its creation: Reps. Lisa Billy, a Chickasaw, and Paul Wesselhoft, a Citizen Pottawatomie. Both are retiring due to state term limits. Billy represented District 42, in the Purcell area, and Wesselhoft District 54, located in the Oklahoma City/Moore area.

The pair were first elected in 2004. In 2006, they began talk of establishing a bi-partisan Native American caucus. While both saw the importance of its creation, it wasn't apparent how important the caucus would be until House Bill 2172 dissolved the 43-year-old Oklahoma Indian Affairs Commission and transferred the commission's authority solely to the executive branch in 2011.

"When that happened, this caucus became the most important body for Native American tribes in the state of Oklahoma," Wesselhoft said emphatically October 24. Though House Bill 2172 makes it possible for Gov. Mary Fallin to name a cabinet-level position for Indian Affairs which has not come to fruition.

Currently, Fallin's chief of staff Chris Bengel serves as a liaison between the state's 39 federally-recognized tribes and the governor's office.

Since the Native American Caucus was formed in 2006, it was bandied about from one meeting room to another until finally – thanks to renovation at the Capitol – it found its permanent home at 112.2, next to the Clerk of the Oklahoma House of Representatives.

Billy and Wesselhoft are dedicating themselves to decorating the room with Native American art and artifacts before their final farewell.

Renowned, award-winning Chickasaw/Ponca artist Brent Greenwood became the first Chickasaw artist to contribute.

His elk-hide, hand drum will adorn a wall of the room.

On the drum face is a photograph of Chickasaw Legislators taken in approximately the 1890s. Among them is Greenwood's great, great grandfather William Hawkins.

"It is a photographic transfer onto the hide," Greenwood explained. "I thought it was perfect for something like this," he added. "The drums are functional. It is not merely a nice piece of art; it can be used."

A Chickasaw beaded sash is painted on the sides of the drum, an addition inspired at the Chickasaw Cultural Center when beadwork was displayed and Greenwood attended.

"I am fascinated with the beadwork that went into the sash. It is painted in the tribe's colors of red, white and black,"

the artist said.

Two Enoch Kelly Haney relief sculptures are located on one end of the meeting room. Haney, a former Seminole Nation chief and former state senator, also is responsible for "The Guardian" sculpture atop the Capitol building; the Chickasaw Warrior statue at several sites throughout the Nation's 13-county tribal territory; a Chickasaw warrior on horseback at Remington Park, and the statue of Piominko, located at the Chickasaw Nation Historic Capitol in Tishomingo.

The highest number of legislators in the caucus has been 26, Billy said. "We are not sure what it will be in the next session," Wesselhoft said.

The caucus meets once a month. One of the tribes will sponsor the meal and a guest

speaker will be invited. Interestingly, Billy's father, Frank S. Johnson, was the first Native American who addressed the caucus. Johnson is executive officer for the Chickasaw Nation's Tribal Utility Authority.

Greenwood's drum is particularly moving to Billy.

"For me, when I look at it – when Brent first showed it to me a few weeks ago – I was in awe because these are the elected officials. It reminds me of days gone by when our tribes were in authority here on this land," Billy said of then Indian Territory. "Those opportunities were removed when statehood arrived."

"As a female, I'm also very excited because we are now a part of it, where in this particular time period women weren't sitting at this table, but we are now."

Deadly month

September traffic toll released

Preliminary information from the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety shows 50 traffic-related fatalities in September, compared to 57 from one year ago.

Forty-six of those killed were Oklahoma residents.

The death tally includes 27 drivers, 10 motorcyclists, five passengers and eight pedestrians.

Sixteen died on U.S. highways, 15 on state highways, six each on interstate highways, four on city streets, four on county roads and three on turnpikes.

Forty victims were male and 10 were female. Fridays accounted for 12 traffic deaths, followed by 10 on Sundays,

seven on Tuesdays, six each on Thursdays and Saturdays, five on Mondays and four on Wednesdays.

There were three fatality-free days in September.

Oklahoma County had the greatest number of traffic fatalities with seven, followed by Tulsa County with five.

Five of the victims were 20 years old or younger. The deadliest age bracket was 21- to 25-year-olds with eight fatalities. Six traffic deaths occurred in both the 26- to 30-year-old and 71- to 75-year-old age groups.

According to the DPS, 58.6 percent of those killed weren't wearing safety belts at the time of the crash.

Chickasaw Cultural Center 'hoop greenhouse' to assist monarchs

Chip Taylor is saving monarch butterflies one at a time with the help of a whole lot of people.

The gray-haired, distinguished former University of Kansas professor serves as Director of Monarch Watch, a research, education and conservation group that awarded seven Oklahoma tribes grants to assist monarchs. Restoration of habitat will help butterflies rebuild dangerously low population numbers.

The Chickasaw Nation and representatives of Citizen Potawatamie, Osage and Choctaw tribes, spent Oct. 19 constructing a "hoop greenhouse" on property near the traditional village at the Chickasaw Cultural Center (CCC). Taylor, Jane Breckinridge, an Oklahoma Native American butterfly expert from Bixby, and Thalia Miller, Chickasaw Nation director of horticulture, watched the specialized green-

house take shape.

The 18X36 aluminum-framed building is the brainchild of Kingston resident Leon Sloan. It offers an enclosure for milkweed- and nectar-producing plants and a way for monarchs to enter and depart the structure safely. A specialized heat-venting system invented by Sloan keeps crops and critters safe when temperatures soar.

For more than a year, the Chickasaw Nation has been involved with Monarch Watch. Prior to joining the University of Kansas initiative, the Nation was involved in assisting monarchs, and other pollinators, thrive.

David Correll, CCC greenhouse supervisor, counted more than 400 monarchs in October and – while driving a golf cart from the parking lot to the greenhouse – he didn't finish a single sentence as he expressed glee at seeing but-

terfly after butterfly.

"You know, this project is ... MONARCH," he suddenly screamed. "Actually three monarchs! See. Right there on the lantana," he pointed as Osage official Shane Rencountre scanned the yellow blossoms searching for them.

"Well, the project is just proving to be ... ANOTHER ONE," Correll yelled, slamming on the brakes and pointing. "How many have we counted today, Shane? Probably 25?" he asked his passenger.

"I think 28," said Rencountre, director of the Osage Nation's Bird Creek Farms.

Rencountre traveled south from Pawhuska, Oklahoma, to see the hoop greenhouse go up. All seven tribes involved in Monarch Watch will be furnished a hoop greenhouse,

Monarch:

Taylor explained.

Rhonda Sellers, ecological resource coordinator for the Chickasaws, is excited to see so many monarchs migrating south to Mexico making a stop at the cultural center. "We always knew we could make a difference for butterflies, bees, insects, and other pollinators," she said. "When you see them in numbers you didn't expect, it is satisfying. The tribe is making a difference."

Taylor traveled from Lawrence, Kan., to witness construction. He was in constant conversation with Miller, who manages all horticultural efforts for the Chickasaws.

"I am thrilled to be here (CCC) involved with the best people in the world," Taylor said. "The cultural center is world-class. To be involved with Native Americans on a project involving natural resources is a pleasure. The tribes not only work as a team, they help each other. They make it interesting and exciting," Taylor explained.

The Monarch Watch leader is non-Native. He is learning, too, about stewardship of natural resources from the Native Americans involved in the project. "We will be working gathering seeds of native plants and these wonderful people are working shoulder-to-shoulder.

They share the history and traditions of their tribes and 'best practices' they have discovered to help all living things," Taylor said.

"I am so pleased we approached the tribes to take part in this," he added. Seven Oklahoma tribes are planting native nectar plants and milkweed for monarchs. The orange, black and white butterfly dines on nectar and reproduces on milkweed plants. When eggs hatch, they consume the milkweed plant to begin their lifecycle.

Tribes are planting "islands" throughout their territories. At the Chickasaw Cultural Center, flowerbeds throughout the 184-acre campus contain the types of plants that will attract monarchs. Milkweed is abundant at the CCC so the creatures may reproduce.

Additionally, Chickasaws have partnered with the Tishomingo National Wildlife Refuge to produce several "islands" to sustain and grow the butterfly population. Now, with the hoop greenhouse, the tribe expects to see more success.

"Manpower and commitment are two elements tribes bring to this project that inspire others," Taylor said. "With their innate love and understanding of stewardship, we are seeing real success in just two years," he added.
