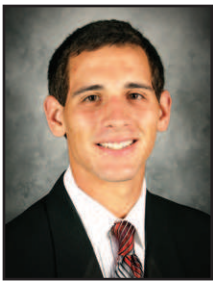

County, dozen towns see gains

The June distribution of sales tax collections to cities and towns by the Oklahoma Tax Commission was \$137,995,252, an increase of \$8,482,216 from the \$129,513,036 disbursement a year ago. Use tax revenue returned to municipalities in June totaled \$12,855,499. Oklahoma’s counties received \$23,859,242 in sales tax returns, as well as a use tax disbursement of \$2,390,569. The disbursements were based on sales from April 16-30 and estimated sales from May 1-15.

Every state with a sales tax has a companion tax for outside the state. In Oklahoma, that tax is called “use tax.” Those having purchased items for use in Oklahoma from retailers who do not collect Oklahoma sales tax, the buyer owes the state use tax on those items. The use tax in the state was first enacted in 1937.

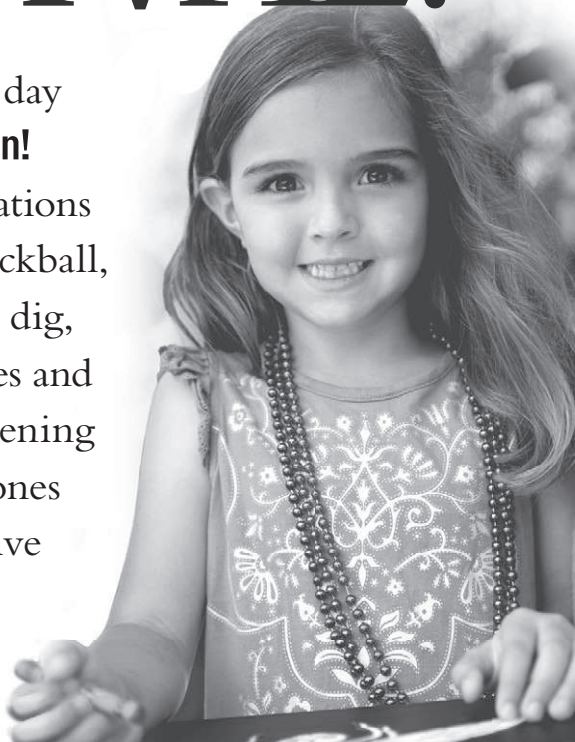

NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

The US is a leader in veterans funding

Since becoming president, Donald Trump has consistently vowed to rebuild our national defense and to improve the services we render to our veterans.

Last week, the House of Representatives took the first step for helping the president make good on that promise. When it comes to funding veterans' programs, our nation spends more on veterans than any other country in the world.

Each year, Congress is responsible for maintaining that funding, and just this past week, the bill to fund the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and military construction was introduced in the House. It includes funding for VA health programs, oversight measures, facility development and construction, as well as funding for the numerous military construction projects across the country.

The Military Construction and Veterans Affairs (MIL-CON/VA) bill is one of the 12

bills that will fund the government for fiscal year 2018 (FY 2018). This will fund military hospitals, family housing, and training and operational facilities just to name a few.

These projects are essential to the well-being of our service members, and the continued readiness of military installations. Reflecting on our commitment to service members and their families, this legislation provides \$10.2 billion, which is a \$2.1 billion increase over current funding.

Oklahoma continues to see military construction dollars come to the state for the KC-46A Tanker program and \$4.9 million was included in this bill.

Also included in this legislation is \$78.6 billion for the Department of Veterans Affairs, which is an increase of almost \$4 billion over current levels.

Of the total amount, \$69 billion is for medical support, traumatic brain injury treatment, mental health care, homeless veteran treatment, opioid abuse prevention and

rural health initiatives.

There is a substantial amount of funding set aside for oversight and accountability, to help veterans book appointments, receive timely services and quality care.

It will also help reduce the backlog of disability claims and cut through the red tape that veterans face in getting their claims settled. Further, it will support the construction of medical facilities, so that they are up to date and accessible for veterans' needs.

A measure to put aside funds for the modernization of health records will be included, which will help with the transfer of data between VA centers, the Department of Defense and private entities.

Congress has no more basic responsibility than providing the resources necessary to support our soldiers and veterans. The legislation put forth last week reflects that priority, and I look forward to supporting it when it comes to vote on the floor of the House.

Drive through memory lane

A couple of Saturdays ago, we had a miniature family reunion at my sister's house near Fitzhugh.

She and her husband live less than a mile from the two houses where I did most of my growing up, if we can accept as a fact that I actually have grown up, so I drove the nostalgic back way.

This included driving past the house where we lived when I was a first grader and ran the tine of a pitchfork through my foot one morning while running to the school bus.

There's a long story behind that incident. The summary is that hurt a lot and turned me off frog-gigging for the rest of my life.

I also drove past Vanoss and Lightning Ridge and past the place where my Grandma and Grandpa Solomon farmed for 40 years.

They worked 110 acres

along the Sandy Creek bottom and had 11 kids, 10 of whom lived to adulthood and graduated from Vanoss High School.

That was quite a feat, considering their child-rearing years were punctuated by the Great Depression.

Many families struggled through those years, but Grandpa kept his family fed and clothed primarily by selling cream and butter from his small herd of Jersey cows.

He also kept bees and sold their honey, and he raised and sold upwards of 600 turkeys a year.

Grandpa also was one of the first people in Pontotoc County to graft pecans.

He had a lot of native pecan trees along the creek bottom and grafted improved varieties of papershells onto them.

Every fall, my mother told me, they would pick up pecans and put them in tow sacks

stacked on top of each other as high as they could reach on the porch.

Eventually, she would come from school one afternoon and the pecans would be sold and the tow sacks hauled away on a truck.

That Saturday as I crossed Sandy Creek, I marveled at the massive pecan trees still growing in the bottom.

It was then I realized those would have been the trees my grandpa grafted way back when.

I slowed down and stared at them across the barbed wire fence and tried to imagine the scene 70 or 80 years ago with a family of Solomons on their hands and knees, picking up pecans.

And I thought: those pecan trees make a neat family legacy.

Care of ownership

Dear Editor:

Readers of this newspaper need to know it is the best of its size in Oklahoma, and there's an overwhelming reason why:

The care of its ownership.

Earlier this month **The Purcell Register** was awarded -- once again -- the top Sequoyah award in the "Better Newspaper Contest" sponsored by the Oklahoma Press Association.

Among weekly papers with a circulation of more than 2,100 copies, **The Register** also won first place in the contest's individual categories: news content, layout and design, advertising series, news writing, photography and community leadership. That's six top finishes for **The Register** among 13 categories in the contest. No other paper had more than two first-place finishes. That's why it is the Sequoyah Award recipient in 2017, as best in its class in the state.

All credit goes to the Montgomery family, now deep into their third decade of ownership, for producing a newsy, attractive paper that has must-read coverage of all things large and small in Purcell. I've known John D. and Gracie for years, and have seen how they have poured their collective heart and soul into **The Register** -- and in turn, into Purcell as well.

It's their community leadership, recognized in the individual categories of the newspaper contest, that is the most important role of a responsible news organization. What makes a good community consists of multiple factors, from schools to churches to businesses that provide local jobs. On that list, more often than not, is an engaged newspaper that understands its leadership role in moving the community forward, in ways that benefit everyone.

The Montgomerys do that as well as anyone in the news business in Oklahoma. As proof, Gracie was named the 2017 recipient of the press association's Milt Phillips Award, named for the late publisher in Seminole, who was a leader as a newspaperman and community leader. John D. received the Phillips award in 2005. Both he and Gracie also are in the Oklahoma Journalism Hall of Fame.

And they are a rarity, as a family owning a newspaper. That's hardly the case in many places across the state. And with John Denny and Emily actively involved in **The Register**, and Matt and his wife, Caitlin, in nearby Norman to provide support, the second generation of Montgomerys is firmly committed to providing readers and advertisers what they need for years to come.

In its 130 years of publication, **The Register** has had but eight owners, a remarkable record of stability. Since 1990 the Montgomery family has provided their own version of stability, giving Purcell a newspaper that provides outstanding leadership for its community early in the 21st century.

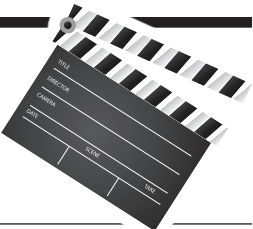
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MOVIES WITH DAVE

Not only did this mom and dad bring a baby to the movies, they took him to a horror film featuring blood, sharks and victims shrieking at the top of their lungs.

This isn't even the first time this has happened though. Earlier this year I remember a parent bringing a crying young child to see the latest Resident Evil film, an R-rated horror movie.

I just don't get it. Anyway, now that I got that off my chest, here's what I saw this week.



First up is "Cars 3."

Lightning McQueen (Owen Wilson) is back in this third film in the "Cars" franchise.

After becoming outmoded by a new generation of blazing-fast race cars, Lightning finds himself forced from competing in the sport he loves.

Not content in giving up racing, Lightning, along with his eager new trainer Cruz Ramirez (Cristela Alonzo), set out to prove he can still contend with the young guns.

I have to say, when I first saw the trailer for this film, it certainly got my attention.

Seeing a wrecked, broken Lightning in the midst of a seemingly devastating crash definitely gave the impression that the series was taking a different, and in my opinion, much needed change in direction for the franchise.

Unfortunately for me, this film ends up being just more of the same.

Sure, the big crash from the trailer was still a really good moment, probably the best scene in the whole movie in fact. The film robs it of any emotional impact though.

Instead of seeing the consequences of what would seem like a life changing moment, the film immediately skips forward months and the only impact the crash seems to have is the lack of Lightning's shiny red paint.

Why even have a scene like that if you're just going to waste it? Was showing any kind of aftermath deemed too rough for kids? The crash made for a good teaser trailer if nothing else I suppose.

I know this is a cartoon largely made for children in mind, but that has never stopped Pixar or Disney from making movies that have appeal for all ages.

This film feels like it's just for very young kids, especially with the writing and performance of the dialog.

Some of the lines feel like something out of Disney Junior. Again, great for if you're a six-year-old, not so great if you're a 28-year-old Disney junkie like myself though.

The story ended up feeling like one big long obituary for

Paul Newman, who played Doc Hudson in the first movie. Don't get me wrong, I have a lot of respect for the deceased actor and it's nothing new for sequels to pay respects to actors who have since passed on.

It feels really excessive here though. In fact it ended up being a pretty huge plot point.

Lightning flashes back multiple times to his time spent with Doc, reusing tons of Newman's old dialog from the first film.

It almost felt like they were exploiting the dead they did it so much. For whatever reason it just didn't set right with me.

I do have to admit though, I did like where the story ended up, specially with Cristela Alonzo's character. I just wish I could say I liked the movie leading up to that conclusion.

I guess at some point I just have to accept that this series of films aren't made with me in mind.

If you have kids wanting to see this, I'd say go ahead and take them. I'm sure they'll come out having had a good time.

Adults looking for entertainment for the whole family should probably look elsewhere though.

Next up I saw "The Book Of Henry."

Living in a small suburban town, 11-year-old child prodigy Henry

(Jaeden Lieberher) and his younger brother Peter (Jacob Tremblay) are raised by their single mother Susan (Naomi Watts).

In between managing the family's finances and making over complicated machines, Henry also has a crush on his next door neighbor Christina (Maddie Ziegler) who lives with a physically abusive stepfather (Dean Norris).

Unable to stand by and do nothing while Christina suffers, Henry hatches a plan to rescue her from her reprehensible guardian and save her from her plight.

What a pile of garbage.

I had no idea what I was getting into with this movie, beside some negative buzz online.

Hey guys look! It's Kate McKinnon making funny faces and walking silly just like every other single movie she's in! You still like that right?

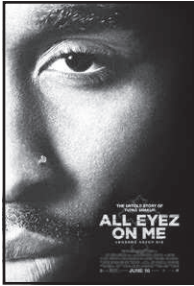
That's all this movie is. Heck that's all every R-rated comedy has been for the last few years.

In fact I think they have

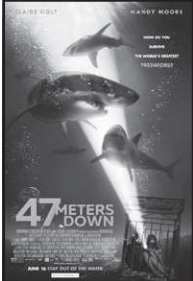

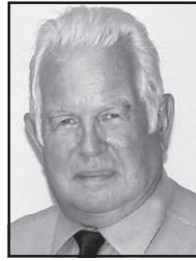

What To Bring If You Are Filing A Claim

If you ever have a question about your claim, please come by Veterans Corner and the ODVA representative will be able to look up your claim on the computer.

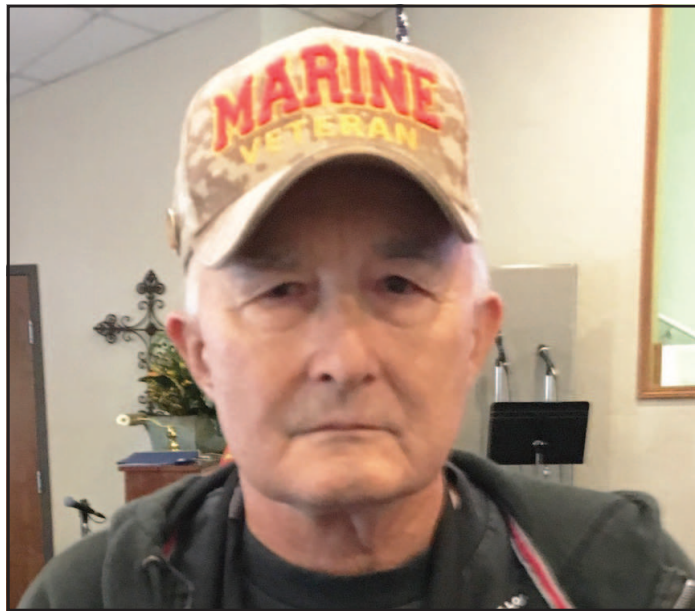

Mr. Crook expressed his gratitude by presenting us with about 40 trout he and his family caught. These gestures honor us and we appreciate the kind words he gave to our volunteers.

We are moving forward with our plans to have a place of our own. We have signed a lease on a building in Robinson Crossing shopping center, located at 1268 North Interstate Drive in Norman. Last week our plans were submitted to the City of Norman requesting permits. We hope the city will expedite our request.

On average, we see 30 or more from Norman each week. I'm looking forward to being able to provide our services in a facility of our own. As we continue to grow, there will be a need for others in our community to join us in this mission. You can make a difference by becoming a volunteer. Applications are available online and any Tuesday or Thursday at Faith Pointe Baptist Church.

As a 501(c)(3) non-profit we provide our services at no charge. We specialize in as-

sisting veterans and surviving spouses to receive VA benefits. We also may provide food sacks, transportation to VA appointments, utility payments, rent, medical testing and other items based on income and other unforeseen circumstances.

Last week our drivers Clayton and Louie volunteered 40 hours transporting 17 folks 700 miles. We can provide these and other services due to the donations that people like you make. We are a local organization and help those in our communities who need a hand up not a handout. Your tax-deductible donation is making a difference in the lives of the people whom we serve.

Last Tuesday another record was broken that I had hoped would not be on my watch. I am saddened to report we assisted five surviving spouses of veterans whose husbands committed suicide in the last six months. By the time the day was over all of us who help surviving spouses had tears in our eyes. I don't know of any veteran who visited us then took their own life. My philosophy has always been that a person who is receiving VA compensation for a disability will be less likely to do so.

I know that many of our veterans need counseling and medication. The problem I see in some of them is the amount and types of medication prescribed by some of their treating physicians. Another thing that might help is for the VA to assign a doctor of the same nationality as the veteran to help the veteran and their VA physician communicate with each other.

As I remember when I returned from Vietnam, many of us were very troubled. The VA treatment program back then was to give the veteran a prescription of Valium and send them home. I don't think any of us have the answers to the problems that are facing the men and women who served in the military today. I do know that with the support and watchful eye of their families many of them will be able to move forward with their lives.

Last week was a very busy one for all our volunteers. There were 225 veterans and surviving spouses assisted by our volunteers with their VA claims and questions. One of them had driven from Kentucky for help with a VA claim for compensation due to the injuries that had occurred while serving in the first Gulf War.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive the rating decisions on all of the veterans and surviving spouses that visit us. Last week 14 veterans were awarded a 100 percent VA rating for their service-connected disabilities. Their combined annual income will be \$523,698 per year. Twenty-three veterans received VA rating decisions ranging from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These veterans will receive an annual combined income of \$314,227.

Two surviving spouses were approved for DIC or Pension benefits, and will receive an annual combined amount of \$30,173.

Our ladies who assist the surviving spouses of veterans helped 29 of them with their applications for DIC or Pension benefits. I don't have the words to describe what it means to me when they can help this group of spouses receive the benefits that so many of them need. One of the things all spouses should know is that if their veteran is service-connected for a disability, it needs to be listed on their death certificate as a primary or a contributing cause of death. If this is done, they will probably be eligible to receive DIC death benefits from VA. Please visit with Shirley or one of our other ladies with your questions.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

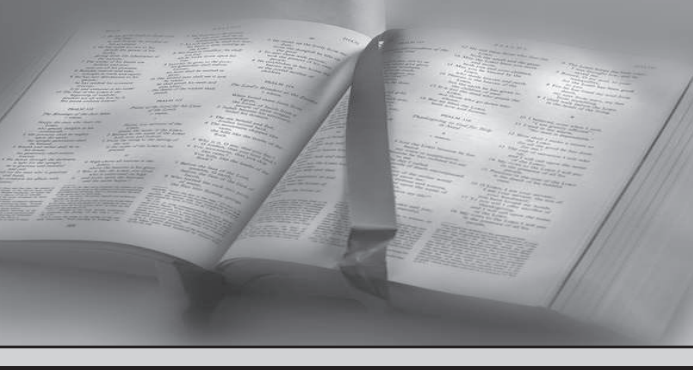

Good week to all! Welcome to the “front porch.”

Father’s Day, without fail, makes me think deeply of one thing: the faith of my children. It’s remarkable, isn’t it, that—as we grow older—we don’t worry nearly as much about our children’s income, job promotions, or hobbies as we do about their faith! That tells us something about priorities, I am sure.

So as each time Father’s Day comes around, we feel compelled to stand before the congregation and teach on this topic as if we are standing in front of our own children in the living room and saying, “All right, kids, here’s what I want you to know!”

We stood in such a place this past Lord’s Day, and we posed the question we have searched a lifetime to answer: What is it that we want to teach our children?

I think we have to begin with the importance of faith. We have to start there because that, most of all, is what I want my children to know.

I do not want them to know “about” faith but, rather, to have a great faith, to “experience” faith in a real way, not just in walking in the church doors at the appointed time but walking out of the church doors and living what they hear, and read, and see in the gospel.

Faith includes the worship of the church – it demands it, in fact, and our coming together for worship is one of our greatest privileges – but faith must extend beyond that. We cannot check faith in like a library book when we get in our cars Sunday morning to go home.

Sometimes, perhaps, we fail by emphasizing getting to the building more than emphasizing what we do and what we ARE after we leave the building. In fact, I am sure that is one of our

greatest failures.

But, again, to be clear, we have to find a balance. Outward demonstrations of faith and obedience – such as being at the Lord’s house at the appointed time, the “first day of the week” (Acts 2:42; 20:7; Hebrews 10:25) — is one of our greatest responsibilities.

Though it is an “outward” work, making our way to the “Lord’s house” is not something that parents “leave up to” the children. She never had to, but—had it come down to it—Mama would have grabbed me by the ear and “led” me gently to the church house on Sunday morning. I have not seen too many good outcomes when parents give 10-year-old or 15-year-old children that choice. Now, they might give them a choice whether they want to listen to their I-pad, or talk on their cell phone. But going to church is not a choice, and behaving and staying awake while we are to be worshipping the Lord in “spirit and truth” are not choices, either (John 4:23-24).

Yes, we have the responsibility to teach many, many outward behaviors to our children, both when they’re young and later when they are grown. In fact, God’s Word tells us we must do such teaching. In the middle of his letter to the Ephesians, Paul—under the direction of the Holy Spirit—pauses, and says, “Fathers . . .” (Ephesians 6:4).

It is as if the Spirit is doing what we said earlier, calling us into the living room and saying, “All right, fathers, I want you to listen to me for a minute!”

What is the message the Spirit has for us fathers? “Fathers,” He says, “provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord”!

Bring them up, the Spirit says! Raise them! Teach them!

What is it that we need to teach them? Teach them – set the table for them – both the nutrition (“nurture”) and the discipline (“admonition”) they need. Such teaching, I am sure, covers more than the books in this world could hold. It covers endless matters of the heart, and it covers a thousand matters of the hands and feet.

But, in that process of teaching, I am sure we must emphasize the spiritual principles that make up the foundation – that is, the principles that tell what it means to have faith, to live by faith, and to walk by faith.

It is not an easy sermon to preach nor demonstrate. But it is the first chapter, and it is the last.

Where do we begin to undertake such a monumental task?

Perhaps we can begin with that great prologue in John’s gospel: “In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God” (John 1:1). There are many starting places, but I can think of none better than that.

Children, young people: Please know that Jesus Christ is the Word, the authority, the essence, the power, and the glory of God. That truth, indeed, is the world’s most academic and fundamental lesson.

We teach that, and we instill that in our children, then they will readily understand they must open up God’s Word and examine – for a lifetime – what the Lord Jesus Christ would have us to learn, to do, and to be.

It is not an easy job – neither for the teacher nor the student – but it is a father’s greatest assignment, and also that of a son, a daughter.

“The National Survey link will initially be distributed through equine organizations such as the American Quarter Horse Association, United States Equestrian Federation, Certified Horsemanship Association, American Paint Horse Association, and more,” said AHC President Julie Broadway. “We hope everyone that receives the survey link will participate. This is an opportunity to showcase how important the vast equine industry is to the United States economy, and the more horse owners, breeders, riders, trainers, racetracks, shows, rodeos and other industry suppliers that participate, the better the data will be that is included in the final results.”

The 2017 Economic Impact Study will contain expanded demographics with youth participation and additional segments of the industry, including Equine Assisted Activities and Therapies, Equine Sanctuaries and Rescues, Equine Academic Programs, and Equine Youth Organizations. Representatives of these institutions and organizations, along with Equine Competition Organizers, will be receiving targeted and individualized surveys.

The main survey is designed to capture the impact of individual horse owners (whether commercial or recreational) and industry suppliers of equine-related goods and services. A separate data request is being sent directly to Racetracks, OTBs, and Advanced Deposit Wagering businesses.

The surveys were designed by the Innovation Group and a supporting team of equine industry experts. They were further vetted by key industry stakeholders as well as a Steering Committee composed of AHC staff and five outside experts. The 2005 Economic Impact Study established that the horse industry in all its segments, including racing, showing, and recreation, had a \$39 billion effect on the US economy, involved more than 4 million Americans and 9.2 million horses, and supported 1.4 million full-time jobs.

The study provided invaluable demographic data and insights into professions and other industries that are impacted by equine ownership. It also proved to be extremely helpful to the industry’s efforts in documenting size, diversity and economic importance to public officials, the press, and other media.

Now more than ever, it’s important for the equine industry to have access to data from all segments to ensure the most comprehensive, impactful portrait possible of our diverse and longstanding industry.

Safe handling of eggs from small backyard flocks

Interest in backyard poultry has increased substantially in the past few years, especially since chickens were allowed in Norman several years ago. Much of this interest stems from an increase in food awareness and the farm to table movement.

People are interested in agriculture, and small flock poultry production is one way to take part. Typically, most people rear backyard flocks for the purpose of egg production. Many may remember the commercials on television about “The Incredible, Edible Egg.” Not only are they delicious, eggs are extremely good for you.

According to the American Egg Board, a large egg contains 70 calories, provides 6 grams of protein while also supplying 13 essential vitamins and minerals. It’s no wonder so many people are interested in having their own egg producers close at hand.

Raising poultry for egg production is fairly simple; however, there are some steps one can take to keep their egg source healthy and safe.

Nesting Boxes and Roosts Make sure there are enough suitable nesting boxes in your

chicken coop. One nesting box for four-five hens is sufficient. Hens often prefer to lay eggs in nests that are in low light areas and this is sometimes why certain nesting boxes are preferred over others.

Each nesting box should contain some bedding material such as hay or straw. This is not to provide hens with a comfortable sleeping place, rather, to help keep eggs clean when they are laid and to reduce breakage. Over time, litter may accumulate in these boxes and the bedding should be changed to maintain cleanliness.

Collect eggs from nesting boxes no less than once daily. Roosts are a popular addition to chicken coops, giving hens a place to sit while not in the nesting box.

To avoid hens roosting on and soiling into the nesting boxes, provide a roost higher than the nesting boxes in a separate location in the coop.

To Wash or Not to Wash

In the U.S., Food and Drug Administration regulations require that USDA-graded eggs be carefully washed and sanitized. For this reason, consumers should know it is not necessary to wash eggs purchased from a retail outlet.
