## Swimming Pools

Permits are required prior to installation of swimming pools. There is a \$19.50 fee for above-ground and \$29.50 fee for in-ground. No permit is required for children’s blow-up pools. Outdoor swimming pools.

An outdoor swimming pool, including an in-ground, above-ground or on-ground pool, hot tub or spa, shall be surrounded by a barrier (fence) at which shall be at least 48 inches high.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2009 children one to four years old have the highest drowning rates. Among children one to four years old who died from an unintentional injury, more than 30 percent died from drowning. Among children one to four years old, most drownings occurred in home swimming pools.Conference

One factor that influences drowning risk is lack of barriersConf, such as fencing, which prevent children from gaining access to the pool area without a caregiver’s awareness.

A four-sided isolation fence, separating the pool area from the house and yard, reduces a child’s risk of drowning by 83 percent, compared to a three-sided property-line fencing.

# Deployed

## Lex Guard unit heads to Kosovo

It was a bittersweet Mother’s Day morning as nearly 30 Oklahoma Army National Guardsmen bid farewell to their loved ones during a deployment ceremony Sunday at the Muldrow Army Heliport east of Lexington.

Soldiers with Detachment 1, Charlie Company, 1st Battalion, 169th Aviation Regiment, 90th Troop Command, deployed to Kosovo.

They will be attached to 1st Battalion, 185th Aviation Regiment out of Mississippi.

First though, the 169th will move onto mobilization training at Fort Hood, Texas before heading overseas.

The detachment provides medical evacuation operations using UH-60 Blackhawk helicopters in support of Operation Joint Guardian.

That international peace-keeping mission started in 1999 and that seeks to build a secure environment within the Serbian province.

“We’ll be providing MEDEVAC [medical evacuation] support for NATO and U.S. Forces,” said 1st Lt. Matthew Richardson, commander of the deploying unit.

This is a first deployment for Richardson, who is leaving behind his wife and two children.

For him, this being his first deployment, as well as commander is a little nerve-racking, but he is excited and up for the task.

“It’s a huge responsibility,” Richardson said. “It’s stressful, but I’m ready to get out the door and get past this first hurdle.”

Though the 169th is primarily a medical evacuation unit, while home, they also provide fire suppression operations to assist local firefighters during wildfires.

From here, the 169th will move onto mobilization training at Fort Hood, Texas before heading overseas.

# Dynamic Chickasaw Nation Women

## Mistress of Ceremonies at conference was former State Rep. Lisa Billy

Chickasaw women from across the nation learned the “Chickasaw experience” is a powerful tool in their quiver as they embark upon careers, tackle life and soar to reach personal goals.

A panel discussion was conducted on the topic at the 2017 Dynamic Women of the Chickasaw Nation Conference at the Artesian Hotel & Spa.

The panel included Chickasaw artist Brenda Kingery; Kristina Kirtley, education department producer for WNET (PBS station for the greater New York City area) and Katie

Callaway, former Oklahoma City Thunder Girls entertainer and CrossFit competitor.

“Don’t let failure define you,” Callaway told conference attendees, “even if you’re not quite sure where your passion lies yet. Whatever you do, as long as you’re giving it your best effort (that) is what matters. And, welcome those feelings of discomfort. Discomfort is where you will find (personal) growth,” she added.

The theme of this year’s conference was “Celebrating the Past to Empower Future Generations.” Panelists also

shared personal stories and brief moments when they realized life is what you make it.

“Growing up, I thought you had to pick something; like you had to be a teacher, a doctor or a lawyer, like that was what was going to define my life,” Kirtley said. “Somewhere along the way, I realized that’s just not really the way it works. I can be a lot of different things and I don’t have to pick just one. I realized I could be a writer, a film producer, a mother, a wife and all these things are a part of the complexity of my identity.”

The two-day conference

was attended by Chickasaw women from across the country. Attendees learned valuable lessons on topics as diverse as being creative on a shoestring budget to improving literacy for Native children.

Established in 2006 by Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby, the conference has grown from an evening forum to a two day conference that recognizes the strength and leadership of Chickasaw women from all walks of life and salutes their valuable contributions, talents and skills.

The inspiring event was led by Mistress of Ceremonies Lisa Billy. Mrs. Billy served 12 years in the Oklahoma House of Representatives. She was the first Native American, as well as first woman to be elected in district 42, where she helped create the first Oklahoma Native American Caucus.

Mrs. Billy was honored as the Chickasaw Nation Dynamic Woman of the Year in 2007, and two years later was inducted into the Chickasaw Nation Hall of Fame. Mrs. Billy is also a former educator in the Department of Continuing Education at University of Oklahoma.

The 2016 Chickasaw Nation Dynamic Woman of the Year, Shelby R. Rowe, was keynote speaker at this year’s event. Rowe is manager of Education and Prevention Programs for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

She has been a leader in suicide prevention since 2007 and has more than 20 years of experience in the public health system. Ms. Rowe played a major role in the Arkansas State Plan for Suicide Prevention by expanding the statewide crisis hotline.

In conjunction with the conference, an art show showcasing the creations of Chickasaw Woman was featured at the ARTesian Gallery & Studios.

The Oklahoma Tax Commission reported on sales and use tax returns to municipalities and counties in May.

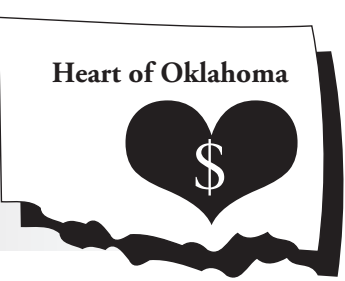
The figures represent local

Fertilizer analysis

Now is the time of year we begin making fertilizer recommendations for lawns and gardens. I started the fertilizer program on my yard this week based on a soil test. When you are ready to fertilize what type or grade is best for your situation?

There are so many different kinds or grades of fertilizers available, it can become overwhelming as to which one is best for your situation. This article may help make the language on the fertilizer bags start to make sense.

All fertilizers are labeled with three numbers. These three

numbers in order give the percentage by weight of nitrogen (N), phosphate (P2O5), and potash (K2O). Therefore, a bag of 10-20-10 contains 10 percent N, 20 percent P2O5, and 10 percent K2O. Another way of stating it would be 100 pounds of 10-20-10 would contain 10 pounds of N, 20 pounds of P2O5 and 10 pounds of K2O.

Nitrogen is important for leaf and stem growth and provides the rich green color in a plant. Phosphorous (derived by the plant from phosphate) provides for root and flower growth. Potassium (derived by the plant from potash) helps build plant tissue and aids the production of chlorophyll.

A fertilizer is said to be complete when it contains nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. Examples of commonly used complete fertilizers are 10-10-10, 10-20-10, and 13-13-13. An incomplete fertilizer will be missing one of the major components. Examples of commonly used incomplete fertilizers are 34-0-0, 18-46-0 and 0-0-60.

Slow-release fertilizers release nutrients, making them available to the plant over

an extended period of time. It usually takes two to three months for all the nutrients to be released.

The main difference between slow release and regular fertilizers is that the slow release has an additional component that is somewhat resistant to water. This can be an advantage when applied to turf, as the slow release often gives a

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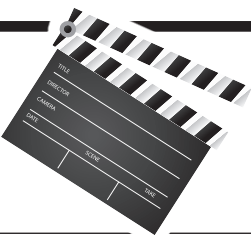






# MOVIES WITH DAVE

First up was "Everything, Everything."

Everything changes for Maddy though when a boy named Olly (Nick Robinson) moves in right next door. Despite her confinement, the two start communicating and soon form a budding romance together.

It's been awhile since a new romantic film has come out. Nice to have a change of pace.

This movie is the definition of a mixed bag though.

It started out pretty good. I liked the way Maddy explained her lot in life and the scene

where you get introduced to Olly was pretty charming.

Along the way, they discover a different, much closer planet which on paper seems like the perfect place to settle down.

Their potential paradise turns into a nightmare though as the crew finds themselves fighting for their very survival on this mysterious planet.

Let me start out by saying that I did enjoy this movie. It was a fun film and is far from the worst film in the series franchise.

I also found some parts of the movie pretty hard to follow.

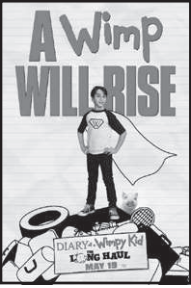

But since Lennox Valley High School merged with West High in Springfield to form West Valley High School, extracurricular activities were kept to a minimum. It was an 11-mile drive and most of us didn't want to use up our gas by taking extra trips back and forth from the school.

Those of us on farms woke up early to do chores. Once the school year began, most of our parents let up on afternoon chores so we could enjoy an hour or two of free time after classes. Our problem was obvious. There was nothing to do. That changed when Frank Bell moved to town in October.

Frank came to The Valley from the big city, Terra Haute, Indiana. There, he was the third ranking barber in a three-chair shop. He saved his money, knowing the day would come when he would leave to start his own business.

That day came in August as he read a story in American Barber Magazine titled, "Towns Without Barbers." Apparently Lennox Valley was featured, along with a dozen or so other places, as a town with no barber shop. "True," the writer mentioned, "they have Caroline's Salon, but according to the owner, there are only two men in town who frequent her establishment."

It wasn't always this way. For four decades, Bill Curtis cut hair in his shop on the town square. After his passing in 1996, most folks either went to Springfield or had a family member cut their hair at home.

Frank, a sophisticated, good-looking 38-year-old, came into town unannounced and set up shop in the space previously occupied by Bill's Barber Shop. With one barber's chair, eight chairs for customers, a table for checkers and a window overlooking Main Street, Frank had all he needed.

## Drug:

age should your health decline and you require medication.

After you pick a plan that meets your needs, call the company offering it and ask how to join. You may be able to join online, by phone or by paper application. Don't be alarmed when you're asked to provide the number on your Medicare card during the enrollment process. In this case, it's OK.

The plan that's best for you this year may not be the best next year. If so, you can switch to another plan between October 15 and December 7 each

year. Indeed, it's smart to check all your options every fall to make sure you have the plan that best fits your needs and pocketbook. Your new coverage then begins on January 1.

If you're having difficulty affording medications, you may qualify for the government's "extra help" program. Your annual income can't be more than \$18,090 if you're single or \$24,360 if you're married.

Also, your resources can't exceed \$13,820 if you're single or \$27,600 if you're married.

Generally, you'll pay no

more than \$3.30 for each generic drug and \$8.25 for each brand-name prescription in 2017. Thirty-two percent of Oklahomans with a Medicare drug plan get extra help.

by restoring choices for patients and by harnessing market forces to help lower premiums.

The American Health Care Act removes the costly taxes imposed by the ACA, and it nullifies the individual and employer mandates. It creates a tax credit system for families to participate in private insurance. And those who are currently enrolled in Medicare will not see any changes.

Additionally, Medicaid Expansion enrollees will be grandfathered, and Medicaid beneficiaries will see no changes in coverage through 2020. The AHCA will allow states to apply for a waiver from certain regulations, giving them the flexibility to deliver the most care at the lowest cost.

The House passed AHCA must now be taken up by the Senate. It is a certainty

that what the Senate passes will be a different, and hopefully improved, version of the House bill. Health care is a very complicated public policy challenge. We are dealing with people's livelihood and indeed, their very lives.

The impact of both of those has a profound effect on every other aspect of our national interests. That's why it's so important that we get it right.

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# Summer and after-school care out of reach for many families

Two years ago, Erin DeVoe sent her son, Hayden, to summer camp at a private school at a cost of \$250 a week, which crunched her budget.

It wasn't even full-day, and she had to pick him up mid-afternoon. That can be tough for a working parent, particularly for a single mother like DeVoe, who is a teacher.

"I couldn't do it again," she said. "He'd asked about it a couple of times, but I couldn't do it again."

When school's out, many parents face a struggle. Research shows that children without access to a summer and after-school learning activities can suffer academically and slip backward in important subjects like reading and math.

But finding programs that are both enriching and affordable is an arduous task.

For one thing, there is no state funding for out-of-school programs in Oklahoma. And the state ranks low in tapping the main source of federal funds for extended learning—the 21st Century Community Learning Centers.

In fiscal year 2015, Oklahoma schools and nonprofits received \$11.9 million in grants for the program, federal data shows. That was \$12.41 per child in the state, the 13th lowest rate in the country.

The needs and risks are especially great for low-income families. Their children are more likely to struggle in school, yet parents can't afford the often steep cost of summer camp and after-school programs. If left at home unsupervised for hours, the students face greater risks of getting into trouble, given the higher rates of crime, gangs and drug abuse in impoverished areas.

Extended learning programs differ from those with a remedial or punitive focus and often include science, technology, engineering and math, or STEM, as well as art and career exploration.

Sheryl Lovelady, executive director of the Oklahoma After-school Network, said if the state were to match federal funds, programs could be expanded to many more children.

"Our state should be funding expanded learning," she said. "Our kids are falling behind. We're underfunding education at every turn."

Now the federal program is at risk of being eliminated, alarming advocates and providers alike.

**The Cost Hurdle**  
As early as January, working parents begin scouring the internet and making calls in search of a summer camp.

Some want a science program, or one focused on arts, depending on their child's interests. If parents work five days a week, a camp on just Tuesday and Thursday may not suffice.

There are waiting lists and deposits for many camps. Reading negative reviews about a camp on Facebook could cross it off the list.

But the biggest barrier is often cost.

Affordable summer camps are "rare as unicorns," wrote Lily Eskelsen Garcia, president of the National Education Association, in a February column on parents' annual ritual of hunting for summer camps.

Nationally, summer programs cost an average of \$288 a week per child, and after-school care costs \$105 per week, according to the Afterschool Alliance. That's a burden for even middle-income families, especially those with multiple children.

Low-cost programs do exist,

such as through nonprofit organizations like the YMCA or Boys & Girls Club. A handful of free programs also exist, such as through schools receiving federal grants. But they aren't in every community and struggle to keep up with demand.

According to The Wallace Foundation, which works to improve learning for disadvantaged children, the average cost of a high-quality out-of-school program is \$4,320 per student per year. Programs are typically covered through a combination of federal, state



and local grants, foundations, private donations, community organizations and families.

Parents, though, pick up most of the tab, even in high-poverty neighborhoods.

This is true even for programs like the YMCA's, though the nonprofit gives partial scholarships to low-income parents.

More than 2,200 children attended a summer program through the YMCA of Greater Oklahoma City in 2016, and 1,400 participated in their after-school programs. Summer costs \$100 to 145 a week, and after-school runs \$65 to \$95 a week.

Due to increasing demand, summer camp will be offered at 31 locations this summer, up from 26 last year, said Jill Goyette, director of youth development. Still, some locations filled up the first day of enrollment, and that was in February.

Parents shoulder nearly all the costs of the Community After School Program, which provides after-school care and a summer camp for children in the Norman Public Schools district. Director of Child Services Brenda Birdsong said aside from a grant that helps fund a homework club and tutoring, the remainder of costs are picked up by parents, who pay \$250 a month per child for a Monday through Friday schedule. Low-income parents can qualify for a discount, but they still pay \$200 a month.

Some parents have discovered free or low-cost summer programs through colleges, universities or technology centers. Typically, these are week-long camps with an emphasis on math or science.

Examples are the University

of Oklahoma's architecture and meteorology summer academies and Cameron University's high school summer science academy. The programs are free to participants and expose students, who are typically high-school age, to STEM subjects. They also are long-term recruitment tools for the schools.

**Making the Hours Work**  
Balancing program schedules with work hours, especially with multiple children, is also a challenge.

For parents in most school districts, summer break is 10 or 11 weeks long.

Summer camps run anywhere from one week to three months. Some are five days a week, others part of the week. Some last from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., others from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

After-school programs also can vary, though most end at 5:30 p.m. or 6 p.m.

Melody Denton, a nurse, enrolled her 12-year-old son in a STEM-based summer camp at a technology center. But the challenge is getting him there and back.

"It takes a lot of coordination. If something goes wrong, either your patient is waiting or your kid is waiting. I wish there was a kid taxi," she said, adding that she often gets transportation help from a neighbor and family members.

Some districts are adjusting schedules to ease the burden on parents.

Oklahoma City Public Schools has adjusted its calendar to reduce its summer break to a little over eight weeks.

Santa Fe South, an Oklahoma City charter school, typically has a summer break that is just six weeks long because most of its students are low-income and can't afford summer camps, said Superintendent Chris Brewster.

This year the break will be longer, at nearly nine weeks, because of construction at the school's new site inside the Plaza Mayor mall.

Parents, he said, will cobble together activities like church camps, sports camps and visits to grandparents. High school students often work part-time jobs.

"The families we serve are very resourceful and very resilient," he said.

Tulsa Public Schools has a longer summer break, at 13 weeks. It offers free summer school at selected sites for students attending low-income schools, and promotes to external programs that often cost and last up to a week.

**A Threatened Program**  
This year, 13,443 Oklahoma children are participating in the

## Older adults can guard immune system with healthy lifestyle

Most people probably are not overly familiar with the sprawling network of tissues and organs that make up the body's immune system, much less the very important job that system does. The immune system is basically the body's defense against bacterial and viral infections, inflammatory conditions like arthritis and other health issues such as chronic diseases and cancer.

As we age, our immune system's function tends to decline while the risk of infections, inflammatory conditions and cancer tend to rise. The immune system includes the thymus gland, bone marrow, spleen, tonsils, adenoids,

lymph nodes, lymphoid tissue and lymphatic vessels.

Other adults can guard and maintain their immune health by getting enough physical activity, watching their diet and following safe food handling practices.

Lacking many nutrients in the diet can negatively affect the way the immune system works. Deficiencies in nutrients such as calories, protein, vitamin A, vitamin E, vitamin C, zinc, copper, selenium, magnesium and iron and impair immune function.

To make sure they are getting enough important nutrients, older adults should especially concentrate on consuming lots of nutrient-rich foods. Follow the recommendations of the My Plate Daily

Checklist for developing a healthy diet.

Since the immune system's function tends to decline with age, the risk of foodborne illness rise. As a result, it is especially important for older adults to closely follow safe food handling practices to reduce the risk of foodborne illness.

Some safe food handling practices include washing hands; thoroughly rinsing vegetables and fruits; avoiding cross-contamination of raw, cooked and ready-to-eat foods; cooking foods to safe internal temperatures; and safely storing foods.

As Moore pulled over, Littlefield reportedly grabbed Sheeler's cell phone from her hand and a backpack from her lap.

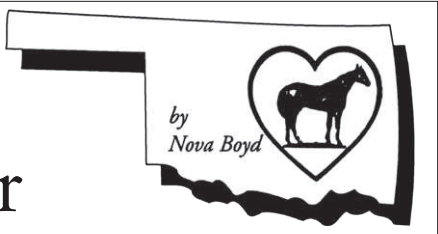
Littlefield then allegedly opened a rear door, forcing Sheeler from the vehicle.

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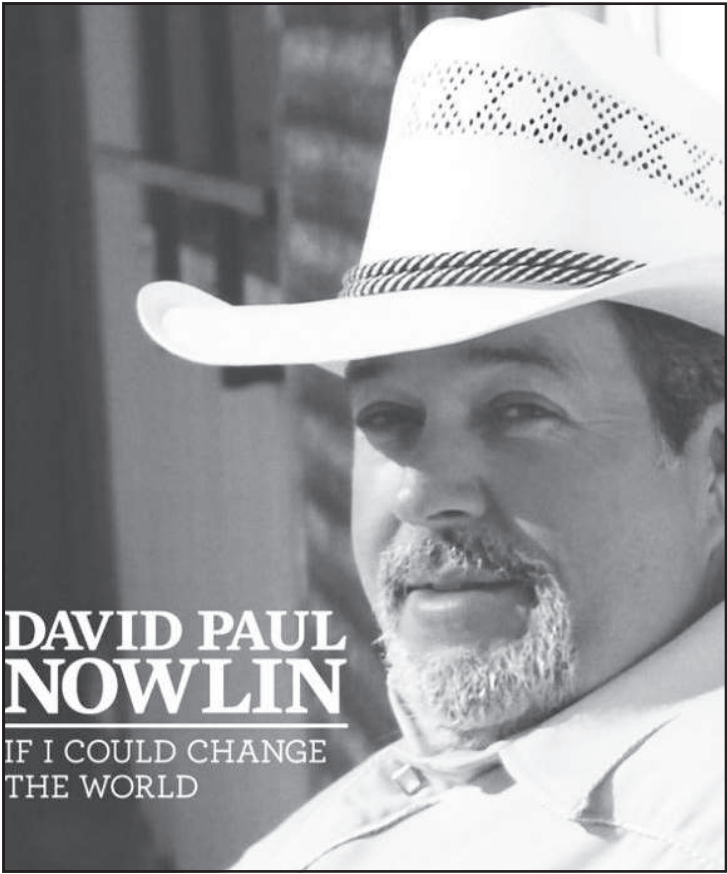

decades-old federally-funded program aimed at expanding academic enrichment during non-school hours nationwide.

An additional 230,198 would be enrolled in the 21st Century Community Learning Centers and similar programs if they were available, according to the Oklahoma Partnership for Expanded Learning.

Last year, 55 schools, non-profits and churches in Oklahoma applied, but there’s only enough money for about 12 new grantees.

President Donald Trump’s proposed budget called for eliminating the federal program.

That worries Robert Hampton, director of Colcord Public Schools’ after-school program, one of 11 Oklahoma school districts awarded a new five-year Community Learning Center grant this school year.

The school district, located near the Arkansas border, used the funds to start an after-school program in which hundreds of students in pre-K through high school now spend hours tinkering with robots, creating art and playing games.

Most of the children come from low-income families. They all receive help with homework, if needed, a snack and a bus ride home, at no cost to their families. For the first time, the school will provide a full-day summer camp this year, also for free.

“We’re a rural community, and there’s not much here in the town for kids to do,” Hampton said.

Demand for such programs far exceeds availability.

In an April 4 letter to congressional leaders, the After-school Alliance urged them to maintain the \$1.2 billion in funding for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers program. The letter is signed by more than 1,000 organizations.

The program has drawn scrutiny. A Government Accountability Office report this month said it needs more oversight to ensure it is effective.

### Students Lose Ground

Every summer, low-income children lose two to three

months of reading, while more affluent students make slight gains, reports the National Summer Learning Association. Most children, regardless of family income level, lose two months of math skills in the summer.

By fifth grade, low-income students are often 2.5 to 3 years behind their peers.

“It’s just good for kids to be in activities through the summer, and so many families just can’t afford it,” said Lovelady, of the Oklahoma Afterschool Network. “It’s a safety issue, it’s an enrichment issue, (and) it’s an academic issue.”

It’s also a workforce issue, she said, because if good, affordable care is available while children are out of school, parents can stay engaged in the workplace.

“We do expect families to work ... yet we don’t align our school day with our workday,” Lovelady said. That misalignment, and the cost of programs that fill the gap, exclude many families from participating.

One in five Oklahoma children were unsupervised for an average of 6.6 hours a week in 2014, according to the Oklahoma Partnership for Expanded Learning, which works to raise awareness of the need for such programs. The percentage is higher in rural areas.

With more than 90 school districts now utilizing a four-day school week, there is even more potential for children to be out of school and unsupervised.

“In a traditional community with a five-day school week, there’s already a gap in services,” said Megan Stanek, network director for the partnership. “Now that we have a lot of districts that have gone to four-day, we have an even bigger gap of kids not having anything to do and unsupervised.”

# Fallin signs bill to penalize protesters

Despite protests from activists, Gov. Mary Fallin signed a second bill that cracks down on trespassers and anyone who financially supports them.

House Bill 2128 steepens the penalty for people who get arrested, but not necessarily convicted, for property damage. State Rep. Mark McBride, R-Moore, said during the House committee that he authored the bill after seeing the havoc wreaked during Dakota Access Pipeline protests in North Dakota. He wanted to prevent a similar situation from unfolding here in Oklahoma. He noted how widespread the protests were and how long they ended up lasting, and he attributed that to donations.

That’s why the measure also seeks to punish any individual or organization affiliated with protests resulting in property

damage. Either the protester or the sponsor can be held liable for any costs associated with the damage.

Barbara VanHanken is the chairwoman for Green Country Sierra Club, and she said the bill would have a negative effect on political action in the state, even if protesters don’t cause property damage.

“We think this is a very dangerous step to take,” she said. “We don’t intend nor advocate (for) anyone to do an action that would be illegal. (The measure) would certainly put a damper on a lot of the young activists who want to stand up and have their voices heard.”

The American Civil Liberties Union in Oklahoma voiced similar concerns when criticizing another trespassing bill earlier this session, noting property damage is already illegal and that any further laws against it would likely serve as

intimidators.

The Oklahoma Oil and Gas Association, a trade group for large-scale producers in the state, supported the measure, saying that damage can be expensive, and those who cause it should have to pay.

The oil and gas sites most susceptible to protester damage are pipelines, said Arnella Karges, the organization’s executive vice president. Although industry statistics indicate pipelines operate without incident more than 99 percent of the time, activists will cause damage to the lines in an attempt to illustrate their danger. Others will cause damage in order to get arrested, which brings the protest more media coverage and exposure.

“There are additional incentives,” she said.

The equipment and infrastructure the industry uses are expensive, she said, and

pipelines are used to deliver products either indirectly or directly to end users. If the protesters don’t cover the damage costs, someone else will.

“Those costs then will be passed onto the consumer,” she said.

The bill addresses trespassers who are arrested or convicted, not arrested and convicted. Critics raised the issue during debates, but McBride insisted innocent people wouldn’t be affected.

House Bill 1123 went into effect immediately after Fallin applied her signature a few weeks ago. It increases the punishment for trespassing on sites with what it calls vital infrastructure, such as water treatment plants or oil and gas pipelines. If there is property damage, the penalties are even stricter. The ACLU announced it was weighing its options to challenge the measure.

more uniform green color.

Caution is needed when slow release fertilizers are applied around trees or shrubs, as the later nutrient release may keep the plants growing into the fall when they should be hardening off for the winter.

Slow release fertilizers are fairly new to the market and are somewhat more expensive than traditional fertilizers.

Cottonseed meal, blood meal, bone meal, hoof and horn meal, fish emulsion and all manures are examples of organic fertilizers. Organic fertilizers usually contain relatively low

concentrations of actual nutrients, but they perform other important functions that the synthetic formulations do not.

These functions include increasing organic content of the soil, improving physical structure of the soil, and increasing bacterial and fungal activity. Whatever form of fertilizer you choose, be sure to follow directions or apply according to soil test recommendations.

**Applying for VA Benefits**  
On the day he was scheduled to be discharged, a young airman dropped by Veterans Corner.

He was hoping to learn about the benefits available to him once he left active duty. He had damaged his knee during his time in the service and was worried about how he would take care of the injury over his lifetime. Any injury or illness that is revealed in the first year after release from active duty is considered service-connected. Veterans Corner completed a claim for the airman. Even if the VA rates the veteran with an initial zero percent disability, it will establish the service connection of the injury and make it much easier to get an increase in disability if the condition worsens later in life. The airman was also encouraged to take advantage of the VA medical system for the year that he will be eligible. Any other condition that shows up during that time will also be documented by the VA as being service-connected. All the veteran will have to do in the future is show that the condition has worsened and is interfering with his quality of life.

The military does not always explain the VA benefits available to their members as they are exiting active duty. If you know a recently discharged veteran, we hope you will encourage them to come by Veterans Corner if they are in need of assistance. We will do everything we can to help them receive the VA benefits they are

## Dealing with armadillos

One of the most common wildlife damage complaints during the summer months concerns armadillos. Armadillos usually cause problems during the late hours of the night as they dig for insects and larvae in lawns.

Armadillos may be active year around, but they are most active during the warmer months of the year. During the heat of the summer, homeowners begin irrigating their lawns. This makes lawns especially attractive to the armadillo.

The lawns are usually mowed and thus there is little vegetation to impede foraging. Additionally, the irrigation results in the soil being loose and easy to dig. Finally, the irrigation often keeps larval insects close to the soil surface.

Once armadillos find a suitable foraging spot, they normally will return repeatedly. Many times the damage is only superficial as the holes are seldom more than a few inches in depth.

In the case of sod forming turf such as Bermuda, the damage is typically repaired by the turf rather quickly. In the case of cool season grasses such

as fescue, the damage is more long-term.

While exclusion fences or other barriers may provide relief for small garden beds, lawns are normally too large for this to be a viable option. Modification of the habitat, such as removal of ground vegetation can work. But this is usually not a good solution for most residences as the vegetation is likely ornamental.

If possible, the homeowner might consider decreasing irrigation of their lawn to attempt to interrupt the foraging cycle of the armadillo. This will sometimes provide relief and may work for drought tolerant lawns.

There are no known repellants that are effective for armadillos. Soil insecticides for grubs are promoted to reduce the food source for the armadillo.

However, this is a poor practice unless you have a serious grub problem as you will be eliminating many beneficial insects and other soil dwelling creatures in the process.

Shooting is very effective, but limited by local ordinances within city limits. Thus, trapping is the primary method of control in many situations.

Fortunately, armadillos can be trapped. The first step is to identify what areas of the lawn are being most visited by the animal(s). A live catch trap measuring 10" x 12" x 32" should be set in that area. No bait is needed, but funnels can be used to direct the animal into the trap.

You can make a funnel by setting a 1x6 or larger board on its edge and directs the animal to the trap. They have very poor eyesight and once they bump into the board, they will either go left or right hopefully towards your live trap.

You might also use natural barriers such as fences or landscape materials as a funnel. Close the traps during the day to help avoid catching pets and other wildlife.

Set them at dusk and check the traps early in the morning for armadillos.

In Oklahoma, armadillos may be controlled all year without a special permit. Do not handle the armadillo once caught as they can become infected with the bacteria that causes leprosy. Once caught the animal can be humanly euthanize or released into a suitable area with permission of the landowner.



There were also power interruptions caused by wind-tossed tree limbs landing on electrical lines. “It was out of our hands,” Phillips said. “It was pretty violent with the lightning.” The first outage was on the morning of May 17 when a lightning strike burned out a primary switch on a pole. ## Ticks:

nuisance, they can pack some nasty diseases that may infect their victims. According to an Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension Service fact sheet, Oklahoma is home to basically two types of ticks – those with soft or hard bodies. Hard ticks are the nasty vampires capable of infecting their hosts with serious diseases. Black-legged or deer ticks are vectors for a host of diseases, including Lyme disease and human granulocytic anaplasmosis. HGA symptoms include fever, headache, muscle aches and fatigue. Symptoms of Lyme disease are a rash that appears in 50 to 65 percent of cases. The “bulls eye” rash occurs 3-21 days following a bite by an carrier tick. The flu-like ailment comes with fever, chills, headache, stiff neck, backache and significant fatigue. The infection may remain dormant for up to a year after the disease onset. Victims may experience arthritis-like pain in the joints, tendons, muscles and bones.

Less common symptoms are numbness or tingling in extremities, partial paralysis of facial muscles and heart issues. Early treatment is important as untreated infections can cause permanent disability. The American dog tick is the only known tick to carry Rocky Mountain spotted fever. Untreated cases have a 20 percent mortality rate, but the disease responds well to tetracycline antibiotics. Symptoms appear 3 to 14 days after a bite and include sudden fever, chills, muscle aches and headaches. A spotty rash on the hands and feet follows the fever in two to three days and may spread to the trunk. The Lone Star tick transmits ehrlichiosis, southern tick-associated rash illness (STARI), tularemia and the heartland virus. STARI produces a rash similar to Lyme disease, but isn’t linked to any neurological or chronic symptoms. Ehrlichiosis symptoms range from mild to severe and patients may require hospitalization. The symptoms include fever,

chills, headache, joint aches and pain, appetite loss, eye pain, nausea and vomiting. Tularemia is a flu-like illness in which severe fever is followed by a temporary remission and then the fever returns for two weeks. Pulmonary complications are common. Patients may have localized lesions, conjunctivitis and enlarged and tender lymph nodes. According to the fact sheet, fewer than 1 percent of ticks are infected with any pathogens. Also, they must remain attached for several days in order to infect the host. The best protection is to avoid areas heavily infested with ticks, especially in the spring and summer. Wear protective clothing and use an insect repellent that includes DEET. Keep your lawn mowed and clear of weeds and brush, especially around fence lines and shrubbery. Treat pets and premises and frequently inspect yourself and family members for the presence of ticks, paying close attention to the head and hairline.

## Preparing in case of tornadoes

When potentially deadly tornadoes threaten Oklahoma, residents know the importance of taking cover. But, what is the best way to prepare before dangerous storms take aim at the state?

It is so easy to put off getting ready for something that may never occur. But, tornadoes can develop very quickly. Having a plan and provisions already set aside will save time as you and your family seek safety.

Three easy actions families can take ahead of a tornado include creating an emergency kit, developing a family communications plan and signing up to receive emergency alerts.

A basic emergency kit contains supplies such as nonperishable food and water for at least three days, a flashlight and extra batteries and a first aid kit. For a complete list of basic

supplies, visit [www.ready.gov](http://www.ready.gov).

The emergency kit should also include items related to any special needs of family members and pets, such as formula and diapers for babies or food and a water bowl for pets.

Begin building the kit at home by checking shelves, drawers, closets and cabinets for useful items, then consider trading any extra items with other family members and friends for items to complete the kit.

When it comes to creating a communication plan in case of emergency, families can download and print out a template for a customized plan at [www.ready.gov](http://www.ready.gov). As you are developing your plan, think about where you should go and how you will communicate with each other in different situations.

The plan also should designate a friend or relative out of

the state who family members can contact to report they are safe.

Each family member should know the emergency contact and program the number into their cell phones as "ICE" or "in case of emergency."

Finally, families should sign up to receive local alerts and warnings via cell phones, smartphones, tablets and other devices. For instance, the National Weather Service provides timely updates via its website ([www.weather.gov](http://www.weather.gov)) app and social media platforms.

The more you prepare in advance, the more quickly you and your family can take cover in the event of a dangerous storm.

Agent, I'm able to review the VA claims folder on all of the men and women we represent. Having access to this vital information enables us to know exactly what needs to be done to do the most for each veteran and spouse we represent. I don't think there is a place in this United States that can compete with what our volunteers do for veterans and surviving spouses each week. The claims approval rate for the veterans who we assist is going to be in the 90 percent range. For those of you who have not been working with us and had your claims denied by VA, maybe it's time to come see us.

As always, we provide our services at no cost to everyone. We are a 501(c)(3) non-profit where your donations are certainly appreciated and tax deductible. We are spending an average of \$30,000 each month in direct support of the veterans and their families.

Last week Clayton Lee, one of our drivers, spent 42 hours transporting 18 passengers 814 miles. One of the programs that has been very positive to our veterans and their families is when we have cars and trucks donated to us we give them to families in need of transportation. During the last several months there were three families of veterans who donated their used cars or trucks to us to be recycled back to another family. It has been a win-win for everyone involved.

We have several handicap items that are available to veteran or spouse including an electric wheelchair that is in good condition, several aluminum walkers and an almost new window air conditioner.

On our wish list we are always looking for new or gently used laptop computers, printing paper, and H-P 1109 laser printers. I would also like to invite our readers who would like to become a volunteer to please visit us any Tuesday or Thursday morning. We are making a difference in the lives of thousands of veterans and their families each year.

The number of veterans and surviving spouses who visit our organization each week continues to increase each week. Last Tuesday and Thursday morning there were 218 who visited us for help with their VA claims and questions. Our ladies assisted 32 surviving spouses with their

applications for VA DIC or Pension benefits. Some of these ladies will receive from \$1,250 up to \$1,500 if approved for DIC benefits. This benefit may be payable if their veteran died from a service-connected disability or one that was presumptive to his military service. The pension benefit for surviving spouses is dependent on when their veteran served in the military and the surviving spouse's income level after all medical expenses are deducted.

One of the things I have found to be imperative for surviving spouses to know is if their veteran had a service-connected disability, and what type it was. When the service-connected disability is listed on their death certificate as a contributing condition, the spouse will probably receive the VA DIC benefits.

Over the years, I have found that many times the Doctor who signs off on the veterans Death Certificate does not know about the service-connected disabilities that may have contributed to the veteran's death. I encourage all the veterans we serve to make sure their family members are aware of any medical conditions that are VA service connected.

Recently I have been writing about the increased number of veterans and surviving spouses from the Norman area who are visiting us each week. Of the several hundred who visit us each week, we see from 30 to 40 who are residents of our town. I have been assisting veterans for over 20 years and have never seen so many from this area who are coming to us to file their first claim for VA benefits.

One of the things that influence the continued increase is the personal stories from their friends and neighbors who we have helped receive their VA benefits.

Many of us who retired 15 or 20 years ago have seen our cost of living increase without an increased retirement benefit. Maybe the veterans and surviving spouses we help

receive VA benefits won't be applying for a part-time job to supplement their income.

Last week seven veterans received a VA disability rating of 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual combined compensation payment of \$246,955.42 per year. Twenty-six veterans received VA disability ratings from 10-90 percent. Their combined annual compensation will be \$393,407.28. One of our surviving spouses was granted Pension benefits based on her spouse's military service. She will receive an annual combined payment of \$12,000 per year.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda at (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

# Chickasaw Nation Tribal Election filing period

The Chickasaw Nation Election Commission announces filing period opens June 5 and continues through June 7, 2017 for the 2017 General Elections.

Candidates must file in the election secretary's office, located in the Government Services building, 2015 Lonnie Abbott Industrial Boulevard, in Ada.

Candidates may file between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

Legislative seats to be filled are Seat 3 of Pontotoc District; Seat 4 of Pontotoc District; Seat 2 of Picens District; Seat 3 of the Tishomingo District.

Seat 3 of the Chickasaw Nation Supreme Court is also up for election this year.

Legislative candidates must be registered Chickasaw voters at least 25 years of age, residents of the Chickasaw Nation for at least one year and of their respective district for at least six months immediately preceding the election.

Legislators must remain residents of their elected district during the tenure of their office. Term of office is three years.

Filing fees are \$500.

A judicial candidate must be a registered voter of the Chickasaw Nation at least 30 years of age. Judges must be residents of the Chickasaw Nation during their three-year term of office. Filing fees are \$500.

Candidates must bring verification of physical and mailing address, such as a utility bill or homestead exemption, filing fee and upon filing must complete a financial disclosure statement. Statements are also due at the end of every month during the candidate's active campaign period.

Candidates will receive an electoral packet containing election rules and regulations, the Chickasaw Constitution, financial disclosure forms, biography form for the Chickasaw Times, and watcher form. Candidates must not have been convicted of a felony. Background checks are conducted on all candidates.

Primary election is July 25 and run-off election is August 29, if applicable.

# Shackleford looks to past for futuristic “twist”

Chickasaw women perfected a particularly difficult hand-woven textile design centuries ago.

It’s making a comeback as a celebrated Native artist attempts to rediscover ancestral heritage through her art, giving it a futuristic twist.

Tyra Shackleford is working on an elegant shawl she hopes will be her signature piece of art at the Fourth Annual Artesian Arts Festival which kicks off May 27 in Sulphur.

“I hope to finish it in time for the show,” she said. “The technique is called ‘sprang’ and it is intricate and time consuming.

“My ancestors made these in the Mississippi homelands. It is important not to lose sight of the old ways,” said Shackleford. “The technique takes me closer to my roots and to ancestors before me.”

“Sprang” was introduced to Shackleford by internationally acclaimed Chickasaw weaver Margaret Roach Wheeler, whose fashions and loomed textiles have dominated the genre for years.

Any number of garment styles can be created with sprang, including elegant women’s finery.

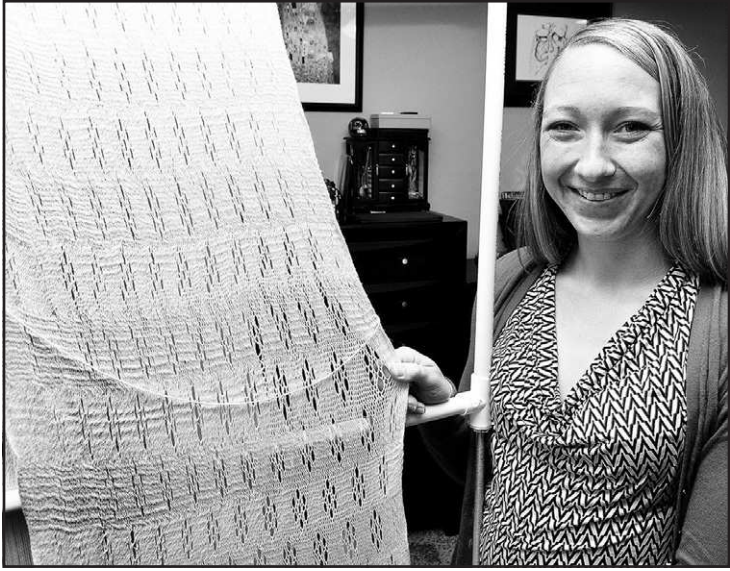
A Shackleford sprang shawl won First Place and Best of Division at the prestigious Southwest American Indian Art (SWAIA) show and market in 2016. Held annually in Santa Fe, N.M., SWAIA is a prime art competition venue for Native Americans.

“My intention was to create a garment that could be worn on the ‘red carpet,’” Shackleford said of the award-winning shawl.

“All of my creations are woven by hand and it is very time-consuming. I don’t use a loom. I do have a frame for the technique but all the weaving it still performed by hand,” she said.

The frame is six feet tall. The artist sits in a chair in front of the frame; the material hanging loose until she begins the process of weaving and twisting it to make the shawl.

The shawl taking top honors

in New Mexico was woven loosely. The garment Shackleford is working on now is a much tighter weave, therefore it requires more material. The “threads” making up the shawl are considerably finer as well.

Shackleford said she is still learning the sprang technique. She points to the award-winning shawl as an example. “I was weaving the shawl loosely and when I removed it from the frame it expanded a lot more than I expected,” she said. “I was expecting it to be about 3 feet wide. In reality, off the frame, it expanded to almost floor-length.”

For more than a year, she did not show the shawl because she was disappointed in how it turned out. She made modifications to the garment, but it still did not meet her high quality standards.

When she finally did show it, awards rolled in.

“The technique has a very rich history all over the world. Native Americans used it. The possibilities with the technique are endless,” Shackleford said. “It is going to be a classy and very fine piece.”

While the technique may be ancient, Shackleford’s vision is “contemporary, innovative and new. For a long time, my work has represented the traditional

and I still enjoying doing those pieces, but now I am asking ‘what else can I do with this technique,’” she said. “It is the direction I’m moving in now.”

If the shawl is not completed in time for the Artesian Arts Festival, Shackleford’s signature piece will be a hand-woven bag – using a technique called twining – with an ornate red rose, decorative leaves and long fringe. The strap is a beautiful decorative red and blue and it is finger woven.

The bag is titled “oshiitiik,” which means daughter in the Chickasaw language. Shackleford was expecting daughter, Zora Rose, when she began the bag. She did not finish it until Zora Rose was approximately a year old. It looks embroidered but it isn’t. It was entirely completed by hand.

Her art also is a part of an effort by 15 Chickasaw artists who will show their talents in a 2018 national traveling exhibit called “Visual Voices.”

The task will be to create more modern Indian art. “One of the big challenges of the show is art will be more contemporary,” Shackleford said. “Being accepted into this makes me push myself to create more modern and less traditional items.

“I love that. It really intrigues

me how I can take these very traditional techniques and create innovative pieces. I’m having fun exploring all these avenues.”

The Artesian is the first of five shows planned by Shackleford in 2017.

In June, she will travel to the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art located in Indianapolis, Indiana, as part of the Indian Market and Festival. She has been accepted into competition at SWAIA in August. She returns to ready herself for competition at the Chickasaw Nation-sponsored Southeastern Arts Show and Market (SEASAM) in October. One week after SEASAM, Shackleford will be competing in the Cherokee Art Market in Tulsa.

Her greatest joy is getting “our voice out there about the Chickasaw Nation and Chicka-

law art,” Shackleford said.

“It (art festivals) is one of the best experiences. You meet artists from other tribes and you share your heritage. You have the opportunity to introduce buyers to the Chickasaw tribe and artists. That pleases me very much.”

Hosted by the Chickasaw Nation at the Artesian Plaza, more than 100 esteemed artists representing 25 Native American tribes throughout the United States and Canada will be featured during the Artesian Arts Festival, Saturday, May 27. The Artesian Plaza is located adjacent to the Artesian Hotel and Spa, 1001 W. First Street. Festivities begin at 10 a.m. and end at 6 p.m.

## Lexington Westside Church of Christ

For this week’s “front porch” visit, we come to one of life’s true realizations: Sometimes when our life- boat is torn to pieces, we have to cling to “Splinters and Planks.” Please read on.

As the years pass, the more I understand how our Lord feels when He turns around one day and sees – as the apostle John records – that “many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him” (John 6:66). That moment must have deflated the Lord, because He immediately turns to His disciples with that classic, heartbroken response: “Will you also go away?” (v. 67).

A very similar feeling comes over us today, doesn’t it, when we look from the deck of the ship out over life’s churning waters: Too many good people – great friends and loved ones – who once sailed on that blessed old ship of Zion are no longer on board. Somewhere along the way, when life’s storms blew in, they fell overboard amidst the strong, swirling gales.

We originally wrote these thoughts back in 2008, inspired after we had listened to an eloquent black preacher tell one of the Apostle Paul’s stories late one night. Sometimes you can tell early on in listening to someone when he has a special lesson, so, quickly, you grab your notepad and listen intently.

So was it this night. The fiery preacher was talking about the voyage of the apostle Paul to Rome. Paul had long desired to

go to Rome to preach the gospel, and the Lord had promised he would go. But the sailing would not be easy.

I suppose it never is.

A contrary wind is there to greet the ship, and the sailors finally have to throw everything of value overboard. Nothing is more valuable than their lives. Still, the ship bound for Rome appears to be destined for the bottom of the ocean, so the sailors panic and prepare to jump – just as it is, sadly, with many wind-tossed souls today.

But the apostle Paul hollers out a life-saving command, similar to what he had done some years ago to a flailing jailer a moment away from entering unprepared into eternity (Acts 16:28).

“Stay on the ship!” he says: Don’t jump! (Acts 27:31).

Oh, that was about as sound of advice as these men would ever hear!

Today we want to sound out the same alarm, offer the same plea: Let’s stay on that old ship of Zion. Get in – and STAY in – the grand old church that Jesus purchased graciously with his own precious, life-giving blood (Acts 20:28; 1 Peter 1:18-19). There’s not a safer place to be than in that old ship. Don’t jump overboard. There’s safety on this well-traveled, battered vessel. There’s blessing, forgiveness, and hope.

Things may seem better for the moment in the world’s smooth, satisfying waters, but they’re not. There’s a deadly

drop somewhere up ahead. But the God who rescued us from those smooth, hypnotizing waters and made a way to get us onto Old Zion will make a way to get the ship to shore.

The ship that Paul and over 200 others sail on finally gives way to the boisterous wind and waves, and the ship is torn apart. They are close enough to shore that some could swim in, for God had promised that none would perish who stayed on board. Oh, what a promise that is!

The rest hold on the best they can, “some on boards, and some on broken pieces of the ship,” and they make their way safely to shore (verse 44).

Our late-night preacher described that scene eloquently, saying, “They made it to shore on splinters and planks.”

Ah, isn’t that the way it is with us. Sometimes we have to cling to a splinter of faith. That’s all we may have, but – with God’s help – that’s enough. Sometimes all we can do is hold on to what we have. It may not be much, just a splinter here and a splinter there.

But God is always true to His promise. No, He didn’t say Paul and those sailors would make it to shore in a yacht. And they didn’t roll in on a cruise ship or in the love boat. They made it in the most humble way, the way many of us will have to make it, too.

They make it on splinters and planks.
