Hope's salvation ministry

Texan walking it one step at a time across the country

Long before Donald Trump first declared only he could make America great again, Stephen Hope was walking the land with a singular purpose – to share that only God will be the United States' salvation.

His latest trek – Fort Worth to Oklahoma City – found him in Purcell last week.

"I do two to four journeys a year," Hope said.

Wednesday (October 18) was his 49th day walking with a 16foot cross on his shoulder and a message on his lips.

"America can be great again," he said. "We need to trust God more than we ever have. I walk to bring awareness to the message Jesus signified by his death and resurrection."

Hope began his unique ministry in May 2008. That September he was carrying his cross around his hometown of Corpus Christi, Texas.

"I was half way around when Ike hit," Hope said, adding that the hurricane hammered Galveston, but spared Corpus Christi.

It wasn't his first encounter with a hurricane.

"I went to New York in 2011,"

Prussic acid and nitrate poisoning are concerns after a light frost

Although late October has been very warm and "summerlike," the average first frost date for much of the Southern Plains is now. Soon a cold front will bring near freezing to sub-freezing nighttime temperatures. These temperatures could stress plants making them potentially toxic to livestock.

It was discovered in the early 1900s that under certain conditions sorghums are capable of releasing hydrocyanic acid or commonly called prussic acid. Prussic acid, when ingested by cattle, is quickly absorbed into the blood stream, and blocks the animal's cells from utilizing oxygen. Thus, the animal dies from asphyxiation at the cellular level.





A noteworthy problem

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Sadly, that's noteworthy in Oklahoma.

Nationally, one in four women will be a victim of domestic violence. And Oklahoma ranks fourth among the 50 states in cases where abuse results in a woman's death.

In addition to the physical and emotional price paid by victims and their children, there's a tariff in dollars too. Domestic violence calls cost the Oklahoma City Police Department an estimated \$8.5 million annually.

The threat is so great that the YWCA Oklahoma City website has a link at the top of the page labeled "Quick Escape." Clicking it opens the Google homepage on top of the YWCA site. It is there so a victim searching for help can hide what she's doing if the abuser happens to enter the room unexpectedly. Trying to get help is almost always viewed as a punishable offense; the link's label is just sadly ironic. The Oklahoma Coalition Against Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault has a similar link on its website and instructions for clearing one's browsing history to obliterate the trail. Statistically, the most dangerous moment for a woman trying to get away from an abuser is when she's walking out the door.

Women are afraid for themselves and their children. Sixty percent of men who abuse women also abuse children.

Family justice centers like Oklahoma City's Palomar can help, but according to a 2011 study by the Oklahoma Domestic Violence Fatality Review Board, 18,686 adults and children sought help from Oklahoma's 30 certified domestic violence programs in 2009. Of those, 72 percent were women, 25 percent were children, and 3 percent were men.

Abusers prey on the vulnerable. More than 80 percent of women with disabilities have been sexually assaulted, and half of them had been assaulted 10 or more times.

The Oklahoma City YWCA runs the only certified shelter for abused women and their children in Oklahoma County. Last year, it served 3,812 victims; had it not been at capacity more than 99 percent of the time, it surely would have offered safety to even more victims.

When you see someone wearing a purple ribbon this month, she is helping people remember what a huge problem domestic violence is in Oklahoma. Stop to consider that she might be the one in four. Or she might have a friend who is the one. Maybe it was his mother. Maybe you should be wearing one, too.





tain xylitol, an artificial sweetener. Even in small amounts, xylitol can dangerous for your dog," she said. "Although xylitol toxicity in cats hasn't been established, you should play it safe and not let your cat eat chocolate or sugarless treats."

If possible, keep your pets indoors a couple of days before and after Halloween. Many neighborhoods will have increased foot and vehicular traffic, which may pose a danger to animals.

Unfortunately, black cats are especially at risk from pranks or other cruel incidents, so it is best to keep all pets inside.

"If your pet, especially dogs, get very excited at the sound of the doorbell, having lots of ghosts and goblins ringing the bell all evening may be too much excitement," Giedt said.

"In the best interest of the pet, pet owners and young visitors to your home, keep your pets confined to a room away from the front door. This also will help prevent your pet from darting through the open door when trick-or-treaters are there."



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Chickasaw Explorers connect with history, excavate historic homelands site

An archeological dig in the Mississippi Homelands proved exhausting, but emotionally uplifting for eight Chickasaw Explorers who labored at Butler Mound for two weeks in July.

The Explorers employed dirt sifters, shovels and trowels to unlock the secrets hidden within the mysterious mound located near the Tombigbee

Chickasaw Explorers is a specialty program created by the Chickasaw Nation to find a historical link between Chickasaws and the first European conquistadors.

Chickasaw students Jason Burris, Patrick Cravatt, Alyson Chapman, Price Rowe, Ashlee Solice, Faithlyn Seawright, Chestine Underwood and Taloa Underwood, were immersed in Chickasaw heritage and culture throughout the two-week endeavor.

Students and experts discovered a platform mound to support community structures on the southeast site of a plaza dating to the 14th or 15th cen-

The site does not appear to have been occupied very long. Explorers and experts found no evidence of European influence.

A fire-destroyed structure was discovered in a field near the mound.

Dr. Brad Lieb, director of Chickasaw archeology and a Mississippi resident, identified the site as a massive charcoal daub deposit. It was located below a modern-day plow zone. Inside the destruction, explorers discovered a crushed pottery jar tempered with river mussel shell and fragments of other vessels.

Carbonized timbers, used as the structure's rafters, were also discovered.

A battered, worn-out greenstone Celt – a prehistoric stone or metal implement with a beveled cutting edge used as a tool $or \, we a pon-was \, found \, on \, what \,$ would have been the structure's floor. The platform mound was constructed in at least two stages and a radiocarbon date of 1470 was obtained, nearly 70 years before Chickasaws and Spanish conquistador Hernando de Soto faced off in 1541.

It was also discovered the mound was built over a surface that once supported a walltrench structure predating the mound. The mound was possibly an open-ended temple facing southeast.

The people who established the site may have been from Moundville chiefdom, more than 100 river-miles away. Explorers and experts are unsure if these indigenous people were involved in Chickasaw migration to the region.

Learning by Doing

The Chickasaw Explorers use archeology to uncover answers concerning the past.

They also assist in the historic preservation of the Chickasaw people who lived and thrived here for centuries.

Collected artifacts were shipped to universities in Mississippi and Florida where they will be cleaned, analyzed, cataloged, photographed and identified.

Radiocarbon samples will determine age of artifacts.

Pottery shards will be refitted to reconstruct vessels used at the site. Plant and animal remains will be identified to determine the diet of the people who constructed the mound, as well as what natural resources were utilized in differing sea-

Experts will examine and interpret findings. They artifacts will ultimately be stored at the Chickasaw Cultural Center in Sulphur, Oklahoma.

Chickasaw students also measured and mapped archaeological finds at Butler Mound. The students worked alongside archaeologists and graduate students from the universities of Mississippi and Florida to learn the basics of archaeological fieldwork on Native American sites dating back to at 1300 A.D. or earlier.

Excavating and analyzing artifacts allowed Chickasaw Explorers to step back in time and learn about past cultural landscapes, lifestyles, technologies and cultural adaptations related to the long history of the Chickasaw migration.

"The basic research design is to reconstruct the ecological history of the land and the adaptations of the people to those changing times, Dr. Lieb said.

"We want to discover why they moved to the prairie from their riverside environment, which is so far from navigable streams. By excavating this site we hope to determine when

Findings

"Archaeology is a cumulative science," Dr. Lieb said. "Each project builds on those before. You have to analyze your data. You also have to publish your work and read the publications of others. Through that accumulation of knowledge, better interpretive models emerge that can explain the past.

"The findings will be available for Chickasaws or other researchers to study for perpetuity. That's very important because sometimes people will come out and dig on sites like this, and take it back to their houses," Dr. Lieb said. "They usually never publish their work, show very few people, and sometimes they sell artifacts. If they don't write a report ... the artifacts and their information are lost forever. The permanent safe curation of the collections and records associated with archaeological excavations, such as this dig, is a huge and never-ending





"I have enjoyed learning so much about archaeology, a field that I knew nothing about. It is really cool to experience something outside of my field of study," East Central (OK) University student Alyson Chapman said. "Experiencing my cultural homeland, learning more about my heritage, and seeing the artifacts like old pottery made me feel incredibly proud to be Chickasaw."

For many students, this was their first Chickasaw Explorers trip. For Jason Burris and Ashlee Solice, it marked their second scientific foray.

"This trip has been completely different from the last time," Ms. Solice, a University of North Texas graduate student, said. "You never know what you're going to find."

The 2016 Chickasaw Explorers trip in Starkville, Mississippi yielded thousands of artifacts, and delivered entirely different working conditions.



"Who won the most games is still a bone of contention among us," Ewing continued. "We had a traveling trophy called the Little Brown Jug.



"Defensively, we had our most physical night," Berglan said. "Anadarko has one of the best running games in all of high school football. They run the counter scheme better than anyone in the state. We were able to not only to contain their run game, but we also forced several fourth down plays that we were able to make key stops on."

Lexington actually had the advantage in total offense over Anadarko as the 'Dawgs outgained the Warriors, 312-301. Anadarko had 247 yards rushing compared to Lex's 185.

After reeling off six straight victories to begin the season, Lexington has now lost two straight games. Things certainly don't get any easier this week, either.

The 'Dawgs will try to contain the mighty John Marshall Bears at 7 p.m. tonight (Thursday) on the artificial turf at Taft Stadium in Oklahoma City.

The Bears are 7-1 overall and 4-0 in district. Their only loss was to Class 4A Heritage Hall, 41-20, in the season opener.

John Marshall (currently ranked No. 3 in Class 3A) has scored 365 points this year – or 45.6 points per game.

As explosive as the Bears' offense has been, their defense has been pretty good, too.

They've given up 166 points this season, or 20.8 points per game.

"They very well could end up as (Class 3A) state champions," Berglan said. "They are as complete of a ball team as we will see all year. They are extremely athletic and are very balanced.

"They are very dominant up front and they have some big linemen. They can spread the ball around.

"They have a pretty good mix of running the ball and throwing the ball. They can hit you on the inside or the outside. They'll throw the quick stuff and the deep stuff.

"The key to the game will be eliminating the big play and forcing them to drive the ball the length of the field. We will need to control the clock and put points on the board. We do not want to get into a situation where we have to match touchdowns with them."

The Bears' junior quarterback Jerod Leviston has completed 72-of-141 passes for 1,099 yards and 14 touchdowns this year with only six interceptions. He has almost a dozen quality receivers to throw to.

His favorite target is sophomore Timothy Stephens with 338 yards and four TDs on 19 receptions.

There is no doubt, though, that senior running back Devonte Lee is the Bears' top weapon.

He has rushed for 1,406 yards and 22 touchdowns on 108 attempts. He averages 13.1 yards per carry and 175.8 yards rushing per game.

"Their running back is tremendous," Berglan said. "We haven't seen one as good as him all season. He has gone to the house against everybody and has yet to be caught. He is very impressive and one of the best in the whole state."

Lexington Notes: Head coach Dale Berglan nominated two of his players for offensive Player of the Week honors - quarterback Toby Prevost and running back Zach Smith. Prevost was 11of-18 passing for 127 yards and one touchdown. Prevost also had 77 yards rushing on 11 carries.

Smith, meanwhile, had 108 yards and two touchdowns rushing on 12 carries. "Toby Prevost did a tremendous job running our offense," Berglan said. "Zach Smith was Zach Smith. He never fails to amaze me with his skill, speed and toughness. When you need a big play, Zach is there to provide the excitement."

"Hunter Findley had a strong performance offensively with four receptions and two key interceptions defensively," Berglan said. "Andre Ibarra led the receivers with five receptions for 62 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, he had one of the plays of the night. On punt coverage, he was able to punch the ball out of the returner's hand and the ball was caught in mid-air by Zach Smith in full stride for a touchdown."

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



Counties that had the highest number of veterans and surviving spouses were Oklahoma County with 5,519, Cleveland County with 3,136, and McClain County with 1,094 veterans assisted.

> Each week I receive the VA decisions for the veterans and surviving spouses we represent. This allows us to review each one for accuracy and determine what action needs to be taken by the veteran or the surviving spouse. We then send out a letter giving directions on what they should do next. One of my favorite jobs is

> to read each decision letter when a veteran receives a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. Last week nine veterans were awarded that rating. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$347,382 per year. There were also 34 veterans who received disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their





Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Good day to all! Welcome again to the "front porch."

One of the greatest things any of us can do is share the gospel – nothing more, nothing less. Just the gospel. We do it here from week to week, and we do it, we trust, in the community and the worship assemblies.

That, precisely, was the business of the apostles and preachers of the Bible days. In the eighth chapter of Acts, remember, we have the simple account where Philip and the eunuch from Ethiopia settle in that chariot, and the wheels of the gospel begin churning. For how long, we don't know; but we know it must have been a beautiful sermon as the preacher begins right where the student is, in the fifty-third chapter of Isaiah.

The power of that subject alone tells us the sermon must have been soul-stirring. But the preacher still must wonder how his student will respond when he reads Isaiah's ominous words about our Lord, "He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed him not"

Philip knows well that the gospel is not always appealing, that oftentimes along the way a listener will back off slowly and blend back into the crowd where it is a bit more comfortable and easy. So when the chariot passes a certain pond of water, the chills must run down Philip's spine when the Ethiopian blurts out, "See, here is water; what does hinder me to be baptized?"

The world will give you a hundred reasons not to be baptized: The eunuch asks for just one that would prevent him from do-


Once the gospel of Jesus Christ convicts this gentleman of his sins, he desires to be baptized immediately. He has heard the same gospel Peter had preached in that first gospel sermon back in Acts 2, and he has heard the same command that Peter had shared with thousands of Jews: "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38).

In just a few glorious moments, this eunuch is dripping wet from head to toe, because the preacher leads him down into that pond of water – the only hesitation being to secure his confession of faith (Romans 10:9-10) – and "he baptized him" (v. 38).

Philip bids him goodbye and goes on his way to share the gospel in the next place – as we hope to do here and beyond – and our dear friend and brother "went on his way rejoicing" (v. 39), concluding the greatest chariot ride of his life. We hope you and I have – or will have – such a ride that has the same clothes-dripping ending as well.

God bless you in your hearing of the gospel, and may the Lord give you the courage and strength to say immediately and with great conviction: "See here is water. What does hinder me ...?" Then refuse to let anything get in the way of your obedience.



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
