

## Items tabled

Jake brakes and hotel tax

From an ordinance that might prove difficult to enforce to a proposed hotel tax that no one claimed, the Purcell City Council on Tuesday took the cautious way out and tabled action on both agenda items.

Carol Andes had asked the council last month to adopt an ordinance prohibiting

use of jake brakes inside the city limits and the topic was revisited this month.

City attorney Ted Haxel said the city can adopt such an ordinance that would include Interstate 35 as that is within the city limits.

“But it’s almost impossible to enforce,” Haxel said, describing any meaningful

## A new year

City budget comes in at \$25.4M-plus

The City of Purcell gave itself a raise Monday night.

The 2017-18 budget approved by city council members totaled \$25,439,659 – 10.75 percent more than the 2016-17 budget’s \$22,969,965.

The new fiscal year begins July 1.

The new budget esti-

mates total resources in the city’s general fund at \$8,116,955. That is an increase of \$551,555 over the existing \$7,565,400 for growth of 7.3 percent.

In addition, \$12,417,927 is earmarked for Purcell Public Works Authority, a slight 1.5 percent increase of \$178,856 over this year’s \$12,239,071.

For the second year run-

ning, special revenue funds will see a double-digit percentage increase.

Coming in at \$4,904,777, the category is 20.9 percent or \$849,283 greater than the current \$4,055,494.

The increase was 17.9 percent from 2015-16 to 2016-17.

Departments in line for more spending in the coming fiscal year are police,

fire, administration, parks and recreation, code enforcement, general government, cemetery, emergency management and safety, communications, IT, purchasing, customer service, water, sewer, public works miscellaneous, solid waste, capital improvement, rural

## Fairy rings

Any time we get a few wet years back to back I start receiving calls about white mushrooms that pop up in a circular pattern within the lawn. These, sometimes perfectly round rings of mushrooms, can show up seemingly overnight.

The name for this phenomenon is the common fairy ring. Centuries ago people thought that the mushrooms appeared where “fairies” had danced the night before-hence, the name, fairy ring.

Fairy rings can appear in any lawn, golf course or other turf areas during the spring and summer months. Fairy rings begin as a dark green or brown circular band ranging in size from a few inches to 50 feet in diameter.

The fairy ring fungus grows outward from a central point at a rate varying from a few inches to as much as several feet a year. Where several distinct rings converge, fungus activity stops at the points of contact. As a result, the circular shape of the original rings is replaced by a scalloped effect.

Mushrooms may or may not be associated with the rings. When they do develop, they usually form in a circle outside of the dark green or brown ring during spring and fall after a period of heavy rainfall or

irrigation.

Any one of a number of soil-inhabiting fungi causes the fairy rings. Development of a fairy ring begins with the germinating spore followed by rapid growth of mycelium (white, threadlike strands) that grows outward in all directions and throughout the soil to a depth of 10-12 inches. The fungus feeds on organic matter in the soil.

I usually find them growing where a high level of organic matter is in the soil. This could be areas with excessive thatch buildup or decaying tree roots. As the fungus grows, the first visible evidence of a new fairy ring is a cluster of mushrooms (the fruiting structure of the fungus) or a tuft of stimulated dark green grass. Later, as the fungi spread outward from the point of origin, the ring-like pattern develops.

The initial tuft of dark green grass and the ring of stimulated grass that develops later result from the nitrogen released after the fungus breaks down the organic matter in the soil. A ring of brown or dead grass may also develop, caused by the depletion of soil moisture in the area where the fungus is concentrated.

If you dig into the area of brown or dead grass, you will find a dense growth of white mycelium. Water will not

penetrate this zone of dense mycelial growth.

During periods of unfavorable conditions, both high or low temperatures and drought, mushroom production and fungal activity stops and may not resume until conditions become favorable again. In Oklahoma, our temperatures usually shut down fairy ring growth by mid-summer. The spores can lay dormant in the soil for several years if conditions are not appropriate.

Fairy rings are very difficult to control with fungicides since the soil in the infected area is almost impervious to water. Masking the symptoms of fairy rings is most effective option.

Aerating and drenching the soil with a wetting agent will help prevent the development of the zone of brown or dead grass in the area of dense mycelial growth.

Keeping the fertility level of the turf high will also help to mask the appearance of the ring of stimulated, or dark green growth.

In addition, regular mowing removes the mushrooms, the other symptom of the fairy ring disease.

Many of the species of fairy ring mushrooms are edible but a few can be toxic. Unless you are an expert at identifying mushroom species, I would avoid the temptation to consume them.

But one of the most self-indulgent things to me is the use of baseballs in a major league game.

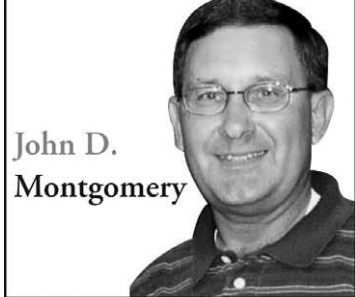
If a ball is pitched in the dirt whether the catcher catches it or not the ball is sent to the showers.

### The financial CHOICE Act will restore balance in the financial sector

This week, the House of Representatives will consider legislation that will provide badly needed regulatory relief to community banks, credit unions and consumers.

The Financial CHOICE Act (Creating Hope and Opportunity for Investors, Consumers and Entrepreneurs) will fundamentally alter the Dodd-Frank Act, which was enacted in 2010 in response to the financial crises of 2007-2008. Originally intended to minimize the risk to banks, it also had the unintended consequence of contributing to the slowest economic recovery in well over 50 years.

Dodd-Frank was initially focused on the largest financial institutions in the country, those with \$10 billion plus in credit assets. Not surprisingly, its jurisdiction rapidly spread to community banks and credit unions.

The financial crisis that spawned Dodd-Frank was caused, in large part, by risky, sometimes illegal, activities by the largest Wall Street Banks.

It was appropriate to impose tighter restrictions on the organizations who caused the crisis.

However, no credible evidence exists which would implicate community banks or credit unions in contributing to the financial crisis. By subjecting them to additional regulatory burdens, Dodd-Frank harmed small businesses and consumers.

When an entrepreneur decides to open a business, they are not likely to look to Wall Street for their loan. When a consumer decides to buy a new car, they also are not likely to seek financing from Goldman Sachs or Lehman Brothers. No, the aspiring small business owner, or would be homeowner, usually look to their hometown bank or credit union.

In many cases, these people know their banker, and their banker knows them. Moreover, they have a shared objective of making good loans that allow the business owner and the consumer to pursue their dream and for the bank to recoup their loan.

Holding small banks to the same standard as the largest

banks ignores the obvious differences between Wall Street and Main Street.

The Financial CHOICE Act will bring regulatory relief to small banks, credit unions and consumers while holding Wall Street accountable. It will spur economic growth by simplifying regulations on smaller banks while still requiring transparency and imposing strict penalties on institutions that commit fraud or deception on their customers.

And, finally, it will end taxpayer-funded bailouts and once and for all end the concept of any company or institution being "too big to fail."

America's greatest economic engine is, and always has been, small businesses. This success story has been fueled by the partnership between entrepreneurs and their fellow small businessmen who own and operate community banks, and the similar partnership between credit unions and their member / owners.

Ending Dodd-Frank will strengthen those partnerships and, in so doing, strengthen America.

## Learning from difficult session

This was my first year in the House of Representatives, so I don't fully know how this year's budget process compares historically. I'm told by many current and former members that this was the hardest session they have seen. That rings true.

While nobody liked the circumstances we faced, and the process was extremely challenging, there are some good results. We were able to fill an almost \$900 million budget hole, holding 15 core government services flat, meaning they received almost the same amount of funding as last year. Other agencies took an average cut of 4.2 percent. Earlier in the

year, many expressed fears that agencies might receive up to 30 percent cuts across the board.

Services held flat in the \$6.9 billion budget include K-12 education, healthcare, public safety, the Department of Corrections, the Department of Human Services, the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services and others.

Common Education received 1.6 percent more this year than last, slightly bumping the per-pupil expenditure formula. We also fully funded teachers' flexible benefits allowances – part of their health insurance coverage – and we made up for mid-year cuts to education.

This budget also allowed us to fully fund Medicaid provider rates and secure federal matching funds for rural hospitals and nursing homes, helping to keep the doors open on these facilities that allow patients to be treated closer to home.

The budget also keeps transportation's eight-year roads and bridges plan intact. It allows Highway Patrol troopers to return to work keeping people on our highways safe without having their mileage capped or fearing furloughs. And, it continues funding for children in foster care and those who

## Legislative update

#### By Sen. Paul Scott

As expected, this session was not an easy one due to the budget issues in our state.

At the beginning of session, we faced a \$1 billion shortfall. The FY18 budget held harmless the budgets of common education, the Department of Corrections, the Department of Human Services, the Oklahoma Health Care Authority and the Department of Public Safety while other agency cuts were on average less than five percent.

The FY18 budget provides approximately \$21.6 million more for schools than the original FY'17 budget.

Like most General Appropriations bills passed by the Legislature, the FY18 budget is not a perfect bill – but it is an incredible accomplishment considering House Democrats refused to compromise and the Legislature had to deal with a budget hole of \$1 billion.

The Senate approved a tobacco cessation program (SB 845) to hopefully help save lives and improve the health of Oklahomans by encouraging people to quit smoking. We need to set a good example for our young people, especially children.

We also passed legislation to show our veterans how much we appreciate their sacrifices and service.

- SB 35 (David): allows active military members and those who are in the Reserves or National Guard who are 21 years of age or older to carry a handgun without a handgun license. Military members' extensive training with weapons makes the requirement of having a gun license unnecessary.

- SB 227 (Simpson): increases service members' financial and contractual rights by allowing members in the Armed Services or National Guard to cancel services like cell phone contracts, utilities, and health club memberships without penalty when mobilized or deployed.

- SB 233 (Simpson): adds provision stating that hourly employees shall not miss out on the first 240 hours of their pay when called to active service.

- SB 543 (Simpson): directs ODVA to establish a state cemetery for veterans addressing a national shortage of space for veterans' cemeteries and providing a way to honor veterans with a dignified final resting place.

The Senate will continue to work toward a framework so that as the economy improves and the budget stabilizes, funding will be available to pay for teacher raises and provide more funding for vital state services.

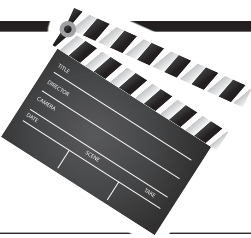

First up I saw "Captain Underpants: The First Epic Movie."

Based on the popular children's book series,

this film follows two elementary school pranksters George (Kevin Hart) and Harold (Thomas Middleditch).

When the pair aren't pulling gags on the local faculty, most notably against the school principal Mr. Krupp (Ed Helms), the two of them are busy writing and illustrating comic books featuring a hero of their very own creation, Captain Underpants.

In an attempt to avoid punishment for one of their many pranks, the boys end up hypnotizing their mean principal, causing Mr. Krupp to think he's the underwear clad hero from their comics.

I went into this film knowing next to nothing about the book series it's based on. Sure I knew they existed, but for whatever reason I never read them as a kid.

That didn't stop me from enjoying this movie though.

The first thing that struck me was animation.

I'm not just talking about the 3D style that makes up the majority of the film, though it is cute and works well for the movie's characters.

It's nothing new for a 3D animated film to begin with a stylized 2D opening, but this movie takes it to another level.

The other movie I saw this weekend was "Wonder Woman."

Gal Gadot is back, reprising her role from "Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice" as the well-known heroine.

Set well before the events of her last film, Wonder Woman, or Diana as she was better known back then, is an Amazon princess raised on the isolated island of Themyscira.

Her life changes forever though when a pilot named Steve Trevor (Chris Pine) crash lands on her remote home, bringing news of the greatest conflict the world had ever known at the time, World War I.

Unable to stand by and do nothing with such strife engulfing the planet, Diana joins Steve on his mission, vowing to do whatever she can to bring peace to the world.

For anyone unaware, this movie is the latest film in DC's attempt to create a contiguous series of superhero films, much like what Marvel did with Iron Man, Captain America and The Avengers.

DC's version of this, known as the DCEU (DC Extended

Universe) includes 2013's "Man of Steel," 2016's "Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice" & "Suicide Squad" and now this year's "Wonder Woman."

To say I've been lukewarm about this series would be putting it mildly.

Overall I had mixed feelings about "Man of Steel," but I absolutely despised "Batman v Superman" and was very disappointed with "Suicide Squad." So it's no surprise that I went into "Wonder Woman" with quite a bit of apprehension.

With all that said though, I am very happy to report that I dearly loved this movie.

This film is everything I've been hoping for from DC.

First of all this movie is chock-full of likeable characters. Out of everyone though, Chris Pine completely steals the show for me. He's charismatic, he's funny, and unlike in DC's last few movies, they actually make you care about what happens to him along with all the other characters in the film.

Gadot plays really well off of Pine here, with her playing the role of naïve, straight woman to the antics of the other characters. That doesn't mean she's just a stick in the mud though.

The most refreshing thing about this movie is the superhero in it actually acts like a hero. I'm so sick of the mopey, sulking and brooding heroes DC has been featuring in their most recent movies.

They actually make Wonder Woman care about human lives. In this film she's willing to risk everything just to save as many people as she can.

Honestly, it's ridiculous that her heroism is what stood out to me the most, but DC's heroes have been so uncaring and cold lately. It's so nice to finally have a hero who cares.

The overall story, while not terribly original, is also a lot of fun.

Both of those story elements are things I enjoy though, so I ended up really engrossed in the film despite it being over 140 minutes long.

Plus unlike DC's last few movies, the plot actually makes some kind of sense and isn't an editing disaster.

And I haven't even gotten to the action yet. Some of these scenes, especially the big combat sequence in the middle of the film, are just breathtaking.

# Lots and lots and lots of legislation

598 pieces of legislation. That's how many measures the Oklahoma House of Representatives heard on the House floor this session. Lawmakers considered hundreds more during committee meetings where we weeded out unnecessary legislation.

I read every single one of those bills, whether they were two pages long or 57. We voted on bills scaling back wind industry tax credits and replacing the controversial A-F grading system. Lawmakers sent Gov. Mary Fallin bills to create a smoking cessation fee and make Oklahoma a REAL ID-compliant state.

We worked on the budget for months on end, having open hearings and budget meetings with agency directors. And at the end of the day, we fulfilled our constitutional mandate to pass a balanced budget. Better yet, we kept funding flat for 15 state agencies.

It wasn't an easy session by

any stretch. Despite the House of Representatives' dedication to funding a teacher pay raise, the Senate stalled the legislation and ultimately killed the bill until next session. We had to cut dozens of state agencies in order to balance our budget.

And, above all, we lost our good friend and colleague Rep. David Brumbaugh, who passed away suddenly in April. David was a staunch conservative who was dedicated to family values and enacting smart reforms. He was missed in the final six weeks of session, and I'll miss him dearly when we return again next year.

Many representatives and members of the public have called the first session of the 56th Legislature a doozy, saying it was the craziest they had ever seen. And to be honest, I think I would have to agree.

There were moments of frustration unlike I have ever experienced at the Capitol. When those moments came up though, I would simply remind myself that I represent the great

people of House District 20. You are worth any headaches the Legislature might cause.

We're now officially in the interim period of the Legislature, where we get to spend more time in our districts. But the work is far from over – my colleagues and I have filed dozens of interim study requests. Specifically, I want to spend time looking at special education in our classrooms, Pre-K, school activity fund expenditures and a few Department of Corrections policies.

Once those are narrowed down, studies will be assigned dates for the fall. Lawmakers will then spend months studying policy. Those studies will be used to craft legislation to make our state a stronger, safer, more prosperous place to live, raise a family and own a business.

Once again, representing you at the state Capitol is the honor of my life. I enjoy standing up for my constituents, and I don't plan on backing down any time soon. Thank you, and may God bless our great state.

need mental health services.

I wasn't fond of all of the ways revenues were raised this year to piece this budget together, and I voted no on several of them. As I explained in a previous column, the governor promised to veto any budget that did not have new revenues.

Without the minority party's support to reach the rare three-fourths vote for new revenues, the governor's mandate became one for increased fees and repealing tax exemptions that do not require a three-fourths vote.

We did get rid of some tax credits and incentives that were no longer working for the state, which is the area I am most proud of this session. I'd much rather see us delve into agency budgets to find

ways to remove duplicative services and areas of waste. I am pleased to see that House leadership is working on just such a plan to improve this process for next year.

Beginning next month, House Republican Leadership Policy Working Groups will begin developing conservative policy proposals to reduce government waste and increase efficiencies in spending, enhance personal freedom and grow economic opportunities for Oklahomans. Among the topics to be studied are:

- Agency, board and commission consolidation and efficiency
- Budget reform
- Business development, commerce and regulatory environment

- Education support and reform
- Healthcare and mental health
- Transportation, and
- Public safety and corrections

I plan to participate in these voluntary groups. Only by building a solid conservative foundation can we truly reform our spending and restructure our budget to work for us for the long-term.

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# Dozen charges

Byars man’s bond raised to \$300K

The count of charges against a Byars man initially arrested May 15 on a domestic abuse complaint now totals seven felonies and five misdemeanors.

Felony charges in McClain County District Court against Phillip W. Collett, 51, include first-degree rape, kidnapping, trafficking in illegal drugs, possession of a sawed off shotgun, possession of a firearm after a former felony conviction, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon and possession of a firearm during commission of a felony.

The list of misdemeanor charges prosecutors filed includes domestic abuse, reckless conduct with a firearm, threatening to perform an act of violence, possession of a controlled dangerous substance and unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia.

A preliminary hearing conference was Wednesday (June 7).

Since his arrest on May 15, Collette had been held in lieu of \$200,000 bond.

At an initial appearance May 26, that bond was increased to \$300,000. In addition, Collett has been declared indigent.

Collett initially came to the attention of the McClain County Sheriff’s Department on April 25 when Deputy David Childress answered a domestic assault call at 12065 Camp Arbuckle Road.

According to an affidavit in that case, Childress contacted a 21-year-old woman who said Collett picked her up at her residence and drove her to his home on Camp Arbuckle Road where they argued.

Collett allegedly punched her in the face, arms and upper body before twice driving her to her home before he released her. The affidavit states he also allegedly threatened to kill her and burn her house if she reported the assault.

Asecond affidavit the following week includes a statement from the victim that Collett awakened her May 15 by striking her leg with his closed fist.

He then followed her into the bathroom, allegedly knocking her into the bathtub and striking her several times in the head.

When she went to put a movie on for her son, Collett reportedly got a pistol and used the weapon to strike her on the arms, according to the affidavit.

The victim said he threatened to kill her and fired the pistol towards the closet while holding her down.

He subsequently raped her, the affidavit alleges.

According to a third affidavit filed May 26, a deputy early on May 16 transported the victim to Norman where authorities obtained a rape kit.

During the return drive to McClain County, the victim said Collett, fearing arrest, had removed several items from a safe and placed them in a plastic bag which he left in the grass along 130th Street.

Investigators retrieved the bag which contained a box of syringes, more than 20 grams of a substance that field tested positive for methamphetamine. Also in the bag was marijuana, a used syringe and a spoon.

A special agent with the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation served a search warrant on Collett’s home. The search turned up 16 firearms.

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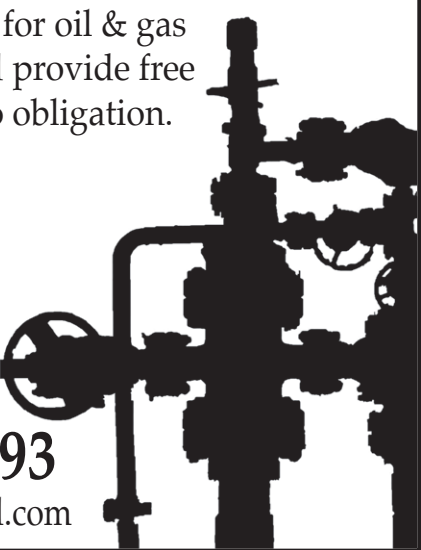

## A walk a day can help keep the doctor away

The benefits of a simple daily walk are endless. A 30 minute jaunt can lead to improved blood pressure, blood sugar levels and cholesterol. It also can reduce the risk for heart disease, type 2 diabetes disease, osteoporosis and some cancers.

It's no secret that physical activity is good for you. Walking has the lowest dropout rate of any exercise. It's an easy low-risk, low-cost way to stay active.

With warmer temperatures settling in and with May being National Physical Fitness and Sports Month, now is the perfect time to start a new healthy habit of walking.

According to the American Heart Association, walkers should consider layering loose clothing and wearing shoes designed for walking or running. Walkers should lightly stretch before and after walking.

Each walk should start slowly, then increase in speed and include a cool down. Beginning walkers should start with a comfortable distance and gradually work on increasing distance or time each week.

The 2008 Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans recommends 150 minutes of moderate-intensity or 75 minutes of vigorous-intensity aerobic activity every week for adults. The recommendation is the same for individuals 65 years and older who

are generally fit, and with no limiting health conditions.

The guidelines of 150 minutes breaks down to 30 minutes a day, five days a week, or a total of two hours and 30 minutes. That's how much time you might spend watching a movie. Even shorter 10-minute sessions can be added up over the day and throughout the week to reach the recommended amount of time.

Walkers should take care to keep the volume down if they choose to wear headphones. They also should stick to sidewalks. If unable to walk on the sidewalk, walkers should consider using streets with lower speed limits.

Pay close attention to your surroundings and use well-traveled streets. Walking with friends or family can make it fun as well as add a measure of safety.

According to data from the U.S. Centers of Disease Control and Prevention's National Health Interview Survey, in 2014, 30 percent of U.S. adults reported being inactive during leisure time, while 49 percent reported physical levels in line with recommended guidelines for aerobic physical activity.

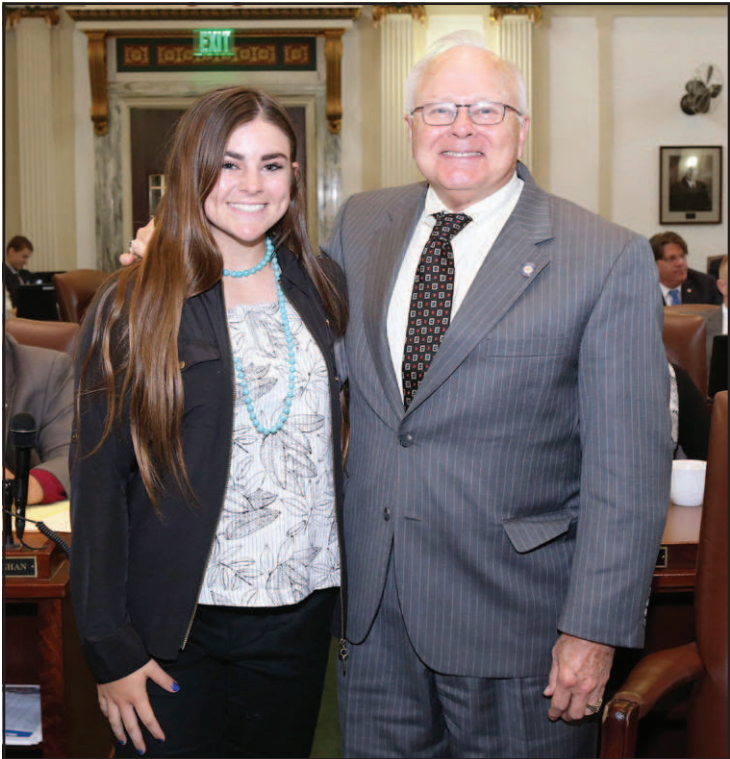

# Cash fund provides budgetary cushion

Analysts on both ends of the political spectrum said it’s fairly common for Oklahoma lawmakers to use a special fund to shuffle around millions of dollars while building the budget.

For fiscal 2018, more than \$100 million in spending came out of the Special Cash Fund. That holds a few kinds of money, including that taken out of agencies’ revolving funds and the bit of normal revenue officials set aside to hedge against midyear cuts.

Budget writers used most of the Special Cash Fund allotments on mental health services, human services, Medicaid and education.

About \$20 million in education funding came out of the Special Cash Fund. For perspective, common education will get \$2.4 billion in 2018.

Special Cash Fund spending is less about ensuring the agency has enough money for the year and more about ensuring it has enough money for immediate costs,said Jonathan Small, president of the Oklahoma Council of Public Affairs, a conservative think-tank based in Oklahoma City.

General revenue fund spending, the kind that gets apportioned to most agencies, covers long-term costs.

“If you look at state law, general revenue fund apportionments are essentially done in 12-month allotments,” he said. “There are some expenditure items that are larger than a 12-month allotment would be at the beginning of a fiscal year.”

That would especially apply to education, he said. It’s common for school districts to have more costs when the

school year starts than they do the rest of the year.

When lawmakers take money out of agencies’ revolving funds, which often act as savings accounts, they put it into the Special Cash Fund before dispersing it out.

There is often debate over whether taking money from those accounts harms agencies. That came up when the Senate debated this year’s general appropriations bill on May 26. Budget Chairwoman Sen. Kim David, R-Porter, said that officials including herself check the monthly reports on each revolving fund to ensure there is enough money to spare before taking funds out of the budget.

Agency officials have blamed revolving fund raids for several drops in services, such as the Corporation Commission’s program to plug non-producing wells and the Department of Environmental Quality’s experimental program to build roads from recycled tires. State programs have been reduced or nixed after revolving fund raids. Although the money is technically sitting in savings accounts, it can be encumbered, earmarked for specific costs.

For 2018, the County Improvement for Roads and Bridges Fund topped the list for money removed at \$50 million. The secretary of state’s revolving fund lost about \$7 million, and the state insurance commissioner’s fund lost about \$6 million.

“It is common that if they’re going to pull from a revolving account, they’ll put the money into the Special Cash Fund first,” Small said. “They have been doing that for decades now.”

He said in addition to being

the norm, that kind of borrowing is better for Oklahoma residents than the alternative. If lawmakers couldn’t depend on this money, they would likely raise taxes, he said.

Gene Perry, the policy director for progressive think-tank Oklahoma Policy Institute, said that the Special Cash Fund originally had a different purpose, but the way lawmakers have used it this year is becoming common.

When finance officials announced a revenue failure this February, they said agencies

would have to make cuts because the shortage came in at more than 5 percent below projections. That 5-percent cushion comes from the Special Cash Fund.

“Because they can only appropriate 95 percent of the projected revenues, (the fund) gets that extra 5 percent,” Perry said. “That’s our buffer to prevent midyear revenue shortfalls.”

During years when there is no revenue shortfall, the Legis-

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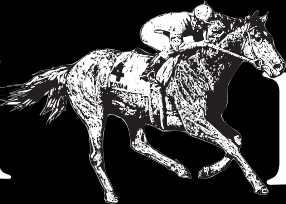

lature can take whatever is left in the fund and use it for the budget. That has become rare in recent years, he said.

However, it hasn’t become rare to use some money out of the fund for the budget. It now comes out of revolving funds instead of leftover general revenue funds.

The Oklahoma attorney general has made distinctions in which kinds of revolving funds can be used to fill budget holes, he said, and that comes down to whether the revenue comes from taxes or fees.

That decision came from Attorney General Scott Pruitt in

November 2014. He said that a revolving fund measure passed that year didn’t make the cut legally because it borrowed from a tax-generated fund and that it wasn’t truly surplus because the agency could have used the money.

As Oklahoma continues to see revenue shortfalls midyear and spend the last few weeks of the session trying to find ways to fill budget holes, revolving fund spending is going to remain common, Perry said.

“All of the extra money that helps keep our budgets liquid and that cover expenses when revenues are a little weak in one month, for example, have gotten harder and harder to find,” he said.

enforcement as “unfeasible.” Mayor Ted Cox agreed, saying any enforcement would not be “the best use of our (police) officers.”

Andes countered, asking why so many towns and cities have banned the use of compression release engine braking if the ban can’t be enforced.

Haxel agreed many municipalities have ordinances against jake brakes, but said in a dozen years as city attorney for Newcastle he has never seen a ticket for the offense written by Newcastle police.

“There’s nothing wrong with having it on the books,” Haxel said of a proposed ordinance. “But I’m not sure this lady is going to be happy.”

Jimmy New, a former long-time Purcell police officer, who now works code enforcement, said he believes construction projects on Interstate 35 is contributing to the noise problem caused by jake brakes.

“I think you need to wait until they finish the construction on Interstate 35. That’s a lot of it (problem),” New said.

An ordinance would be easier for police to enforce on Green Avenue. However, jake brakes aren’t an issue on the city’s main north-south thoroughfare. And the city can’t post signs on the interstate that the use of jake brakes is prohibited.

Council members agreed to continue consideration of Andes’ request.

The council was reluctant to consider a hotel tax when no one stepped up to speak in favor of it and it wasn’t clear where the agenda item came from.

Cox and others indicated a willingness to support such a tax if it were proposed by the Heart of Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce.

In other business, the council:

- agreed to pay Dillon & Associates up to \$25,500 for an audit;
- directed Haxel to draft an ordinance to close a platted alley in Block 92 of the original township of Purcell;
- tabled action on the preliminary plat for Westbrook Addition Phase III;
- approved a contract for \$17,574.14 per year with Purcell Public Schools to lease space to Purcell Public Library;
- declared a 1994 Elgin sweeper surplus property;
- approved 2017-18 budgets for the City of Purcell and Purcell Municipal Hospital; and
- approved a \$62,250 budget amendment for the purchase of a used pumper.

In addition, the Purcell Public Works Authority approved a sanitary sewer improvements chlorination/dichlorination engineering report to be submitted to the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality.

Trustees took no action on average utility billing.

## Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Good week to all! Welcome to the "front porch."

On our last front-porch visit, we introduced you to a rugged Roman jailor, a brutish man who slings Paul and Silas abruptly into the inner cell of his inhospitable prison and binds them with undeserved chains. This calloused soul had heard many things in the middle of the night in his unenviable tenure as a prison guard.

He had heard shrieking, screaming, swearing, and cursing. But he had never heard souls lifting their voices in prayer and songs of praise to God inside one of his cold, dark cells – not until these two traveling gospel preachers come calling!

Then at midnight the jailor has another shock: There is an earthquake! He jumps up and thinks that all the prisoners are escaping. He knows what his fate will be at the hands of the ruthless Roman government, so he draws his sword and is about to kill himself.

But before he can separate his soul from his body, he hears a voice. It is a voice of love, the voice of the apostle Paul. The apostle calls out to the hard, calloused man: "Don't harm yourself, we are all here!"

The hardened heart of that man softens immediately. He calls for a light – ah, reminding us of the glorious "gospel light" – runs in to the prisoners, and falls at the feet of Paul and Silas.

The jailor's next words are some of the sweetest words ever to flow from the lips of a man or woman, and the most sincere and genuine. "What must I do to be saved?" he

pleads.

I don't even know how he knows to ask such a great question. Perhaps Paul and Silas had done more than pray and sing down in that cell. Maybe they had done some preaching to the guard as he roughly tossed them down into that deep dungeon. Maybe they had preached the glorious story of this Jesus to some of the other prisoners.

Whatever the case, he knows the question to ask these men with the bleeding backs. "What must I do to be saved?" It is the world's greatest question.

Paul answers by introducing him to the man of Galilee: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved, and thy house" (v. 31). That's the very core of our salvation, coming to know and believe on Jesus, the Christ (Acts 4:12).

Paul and Silas go home with the jailor and share more of the gospel with him and his family. Then in the late-night hours or the early-morning hours before dawn – after he and his family hear the apostle and Silas expound on the gos-

pel story – these evangelists take this jailor and his whole family down to a nearby creek or pond.

There the family washes the stripes the jailor had administered mercilessly to these two weary preachers, and the preachers baptize them mercifully in the name of Jesus Christ. They "wash them" for the remission of all their sins in the name of Jesus Christ! (Acts 2:38; 22:16).

I would love to hear the jailor's emotional account of this night and these early morning baptisms. It was the greatest night of his life. Not only did he come to believe in Jesus, and not only was he baptized into that blessed relationship (Matthew 28:19-20), but so was his entire household – children, wife, perhaps even his father and mother and grandparents.

He would never know such a morning as this, for on this morning they became Christians (Acts 11:26).

And life, certainly, would never be the same.

We can say these things: First, the Holy Spirit is everywhere in our world. The Holy Spirit is all around us, waiting to be found. I remember my first day in public high school. I had been going to Catholic grade school, up to the eighth grade – a small school where I knew everyone and had good friends. And now I begin in this big public high school, with lots of strange faces and even a few rough kids. I was afraid.

After a few weeks, I found a few people that I could be friends with. They were fun. We had similar likes and interests. We connected. The spirit of friendship was always there . . . I just had to be open to it.

I had to be open to meeting new people. In a similar way, the Holy Spirit is here. He is all around us, present in all things. We only need be open to him.

Secondly, we do not see the Holy Spirit, we only see the fruits of the Holy Spirit. It is like the wind that blows the seeds from field to field, and moves the moisture in from the sea. The wheat

grows and the flowers bloom. We only see the work of the wind, the fruits of the wind. And since we do not see the Holy Spirit, how do we know when we are being directed by the Spirit?

The work of the Holy Spirit is always to direct us towards greater love of God through love of our neighbor. This is how we recognize the Holy Spirit – by recognizing the motivation behind our work. We ask ourselves: “Why am I doing what I am doing?”

In my work at the OU WATER Center, I spend a lot of time teaching college students about how to do the work of development in poorer countries. I have to ask myself “Why are we doing this work?” Are we doing this so that we will have a better program than other universities? Are we doing this to attract more students paying tuition so that we have more income to help close the budget deficit?

Or, are we doing this work so that others may have good drinking water and may live more fruitful and healthy lives. If our motivation is this, then we can be sure that we are being guided by the Holy Spirit. Through the indwelling of

the Spirit, God is drawing us into deeper knowledge, love and service.

We only need to be open to that and to be aware of our motives. The fruit of the Spirit is desire that is pure and unselfish.

And finally, the Holy Spirit is a profound force that inspires us to do small acts of love. If we live in the Spirit, we can become aware that even the smallest, the simplest acts of love are manifestations of prayer, of communion with God.

We might see pictures of a natural disaster on television, or we pass by the scene of an accident, and we pray for the victims. We write a short note to someone, thanking them for a favor, or complimenting them on some quality that they have.

Whenever we pass by a Catholic church, we make the sign of the cross, acknowledging that Jesus is present there in a special way, and praying for the members of that church.

When we are anxious or angry or frustrated, we stop and spend 15 minutes in silent prayer in front of the mystery of God. And so, we rest our-

selves so that we may return to life, renewed and more willing to serve others. These are all manifestations of the work of the Spirit.

As we grow in the spiritual life, we can make ourselves more aware of the inclinations that come from the Spirit and those that do not. At the end of each day, we can look back over the day, and we can see which parts were led by the Spirit of love of God and neighbor, and which parts were not. We can ask God's help for greater discernment and understanding, and for strength in avoiding the mistakes of fear and selfishness. And we can thank God for the times when we really did respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

Fr. Jim will be teaching an OU course in Uganda, June 6-30, at the orphanage of Sr. Rosemary Nyirumbe. Please pray for the success of this important work.

# USDA Farm Service Agency county committee nomination period begins June 15

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today that the nomination period for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees begins on Thursday, June 15.

“County committees allow farmers and ranchers to make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally to best serve their needs,” said Acting FSA Administrator Chris Beyerhelm. “We strongly encourage all eligible producers to visit their local FSA office today to find out how to get involved in their county’s election. There’s an increasing need for representation from underserved producers, which includes beginning, women and other minority farmers and ranchers.”

County committees are made up of farmers and ranchers elected by other producers in their communities to guide the delivery of farm programs at the local level. Committee members play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA.

Committees consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month or as needed to make important decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide

there are over 7,700 farmer and ranchers serving on FSA county committees.

Farmers and ranchers may nominate themselves or others. Organizations, including those representing beginning, women and minority producers, may also nominate candidates to better serve their communities.

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program, and reside in the local administrative area where the election is being held.

After the nomination period, candidates will encourage the eligible producers in their local administrative area to vote. FSA will mail election ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 6, 2017. Ballots will be due back to the local county office either via mail or in person by Dec. 4, 2017. Newly-elected committee members and alternates will take office on Jan. 1, 2018.

To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at [www.fsa.usda.gov/elections](http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections). All nomination forms for the 2017 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by Aug. 1, 2017. 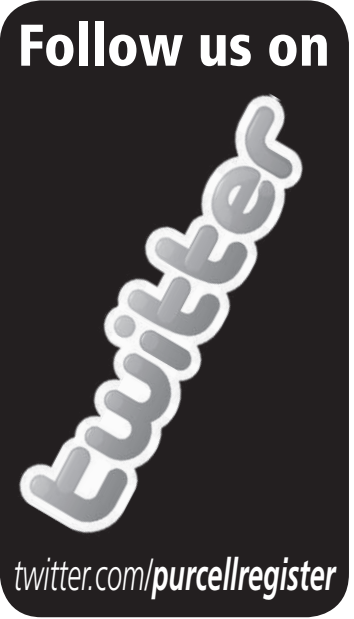

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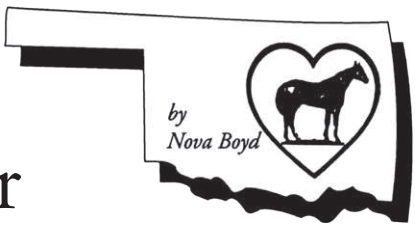

## 2017 National Reining Breeders Classic Results

The 2017 National Reining Breeders Classic was held April 26-23 at the Great Southwest Equestrian Center in Katy, Texas.

The National Reining Breeders Classic was born in the fall of 1997 when an elite group of reiners, Tom McCutcheon, Tim and Colleen McQuay, Pete Kyle, Dick Pieper, Carol Rose, Gary Putman and Robert Chown, got together and created the National Reining Breeders Cup. Other early members of the team were Mike Christian and McClain County’s own Cheryl Magoteaux-Cody, Byars.

Cheryl Magoteaux-Cody, secretary-treasurer for the NRBC, is an award-winning writer and photographer. Her company, Pro Management, has produced and managed some of the world’s most prestigious performance horse events. She is the President of Rein In Cancer and has been chosen as the Reining Manager for the 2018 World Equestrian Games.

The first NRBC was held in Guthrie and paid out over \$210,000. In 1998, the organization’s name was changed to National Reining Breeders Classic to reflect the growing prominence and importance of the event. The NRBC set out to provide a place to show 4- and 5-year-old (and later 6-year-old) reining horses for lucrative purses that pay deep into the placings.

The NRBC has now officially enjoyed two decades of success. Along the way, the show has grown from a four day event in one arena to a show that has competition spanning seven days with classes going on simultaneously in three separate arenas. There were even more winners in 2017, as the top 30 in every Open and Non Pro division advanced to the clean-slate finals. By the time the dust settled in the arena in 2017, this prestigious event has paid out \$20 million over the span of 20 years.
