Should you find yourself in Lexington for the 89er Day Festival on Saturday, close your eyes

for a moment and consider how it must have been at high noon on that day 128 years ago.

From an account on the Oklahoma Historical

Society website: "April 22, 1889, dawned bright and clear upon the estimated 50,000 people who surrounded the Un-assigned Lands. As noon

approached, horsemen and wagons crowded forth to positions on the

Wayne man finds jaw bone

Believed to be from 100-year-old Native American

A Wayne man discovered more than the arrowheads he was looking for last Saturday afternoon.

The McClain County Sheriff's Department reports Joseph Harper, 33, of Wayne was searching for arrowheads on the South Canadian River near Wayne last Saturday when he came across what looked like a human jaw bone.

Sheriff Deputy James Goins was dispatched to the scene around 5:30 p.m., who then requested Lt. James Richardson.

"He found a bone with teeth and it appeared to be a human jaw bone," Richardson said.

The teeth were worn down indicating it was an

You might say Henry Ketchum has printer's ink running through his veins.

Or through his soul. Henry, 76, will mark 51 years at **The Purcell Register** next month.

A native of Grady County – he grew up and graduated at Alex – Henry was a young man married and working as a linotype operator at Sapulpa when his father-in-law mentioned there was an opening at the newspaper in Purcell.

Henry looked into it and was hired by then-publisher James Nance.

He got the job and in May 1966 began setting hot type for the paper here.

It was a far cry from **The Purcell Register** today.

"They had a flatbed press and ran eight pages, all hot type," Henry recalled. "We'd make the pages up and set them on the press."

The pressman then was a man named Frederick Jones who was perhaps most notable for his "colorful" vocabulary on the job.

"He'd cuss from the time he started until he finished printing the paper," Henry recalled.

Rosie and Maxwell McCurdy were the next owners Henry worked for.

Henry took pleasure in his work and in watching the McCurdy children grow up and do well.

In addition to his work in production, Henry was a part-time photographer for the newspaper.

A McCurdy son, Tom, brought the newspaper out of the hot type age and into the future by embracing offset printing.

The transition, though, came close to running Henry

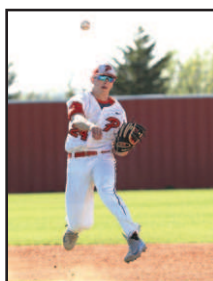

Tax losses mount up in area

The April distribution of sales tax collections by the Oklahoma Tax Commission was \$135,168,890 in April. That is a decrease of \$1,905,579 from \$137,074,469 a year ago. Municipalities shared a use tax disbursement of \$10,698,418. Counties shared in a \$23,392,928 sales tax disbursement and a \$2,002,712 use tax disbursement. The disbursements are based on sales between February 16-28 and estimated sales from March 1-15.

Mini equines vie for big stakes this weekend

The horseflesh may be pint-sized, but the stakes are not at this weekend's Red River Shoot-Out Miniature Horse Show in Purcell.

The competition at the McClain County Expo Center is being sponsored by the Oklahoma Miniature Horse Club Inc., said show manager Ruby Priore.

Judges will be Sid Hatchcraft of Florida, Tom Parkinson of Wyoming and Austin VanWyck of Arizona.

Measurement times will be from 3-8 p.m. today (April 20) and 7-7:30 a.m. Friday through Sunday.

The schedule calls for two shows over three days. The first show will open at 8 a.m. Friday and end Saturday morning.

On tap will be pony contests ranging from halter and showmanship to driving, hunter/jumper and liberty classes.

There will even be a Roman chariot class.

The second show is slated to start at 9 a.m. Saturday and run through Sunday with a lineup of miniature horse competitions that includes costume class, driving and halter classes for mares and geldings in three divisions – youth, amateur and open.

Highlighting Saturday's show will be a raffle for a miniature horse during the lunch break. Raffle tickets will be \$5 each or \$20 for five tickets.

On Sunday, spectators will see stallion halter classes, driving, liberty classes, showmanship and in-hand jumping.

Admission is free and the OMHCI youth program will benefit from the raffle and a silent auction.

The miniature horses will be back in Purcell May 26-28 for two more shows.

But thanks to retired Ardmore Dentist James Young, the Science Fair will survive at least one more year.

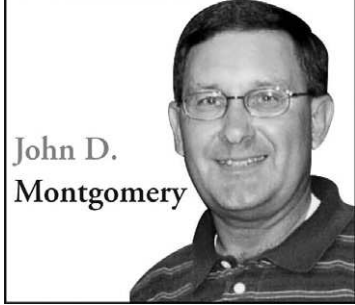
Young’s \$50,000 donation has pumped new life into the Science Fair, but his generosity shouldn’t have been called for in the first place.

For Syria, an AUMF is needed

For the past 16 years, the United States has been engaged in several military conflicts, primarily, but not exclusively, in the Middle East. Unfortunately, after eight years of President Obama’s erratic and uninformed foreign policy, the threats to the United States have only grown.

President Trump has declared a more aggressive approach to fighting terrorism, and his actions give every indication that - unlike President Obama - when this President draws a line in the sand, crossing it will have consequences.

Following the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, President Bush asked for, and received, an Authorization for the Use of Military Force (AUMF) against those responsible for the attacks. The authorization granted the President the authority to use all “necessary and appropriate force” against those who “planned, authorized, committed or aided” the terrorist attacks.

The following year, President Bush sought, and was granted, a separate AUMF in

Iraq. Despite being in a state of war for the next 15 years, no President has sought further authorization.

I applaud President Trump’s decision to act swiftly and decisively against the Syrian regime of Bashar al-Assad after the dictator killed dozens of his own citizens, including women and children, with a deadly chemical attack.

Similarly, I think the President was justified in his decision to take out one of the largest base camps of ISIS in Afghanistan.

However, President Trump is bound by law and the Constitution to seek an AUMF before he embarks on any sustained engagement with any nation or organization.

After President Obama expanded our engagement to places like Libya, I was among the first to call for him to seek an AUMF. I have no doubt Congress would have granted it.

Unfortunately, President Obama not only refused to seek authorization, but also made the absurd claim that the 2001 and 2002 authorizations allowed him to use military force as he saw fit.

I am a firm believer that

the President and his military advisors ought to be given maximum flexibility when it comes to the strategy of waging war. However, I am also a firm believer that the Congress has a role in committing our troops to battle.

The War Powers Resolution of 1973 states clearly that the President cannot commit the United States to an armed conflict without the consent of the U.S. Congress.

Going forward, President Trump needs to seek an AUMF from this Congress before taking further military action. If he does, I am again confident that it will be granted, and that he will be given maximum flexibility to exercise his best judgement when combatting terrorism.

America has effectively been in a state of war for the past 16 years. We are literally fighting to protect our freedoms and our way of life. And we have laws in place that make clear Congress is the only branch in our government who can declare war.

If a president can ignore the federal law and the Constitution, by waging war whenever and wherever he sees fit, what are we fighting for anyway?

A dangerous bill

Wouldn’t it be wonderful to own an industrial waste site that wasn’t subject to pesky government regulation? Or a power plant with no limit on emissions? Maybe you’d like to invest in a chemical plant that could discharge waste as it saw fit or an oil well that didn’t have to care what happened to the produced water.

Wouldn’t everyone? Wouldn’t that be the very manifestation of prosperity?

Property owners in the McClain County town of Criner might disagree. That’s where the Hardage Superfund Site is, ranked second only to Tar Creek on the Environmental Protection Agency’s cleanup priority list. But from 1972 until 1980, the site took in all manner of toxic substances at a healthy profit; it only stopped when the EPA discovered the

groundwater and surface water were contaminated along with the monitoring wells.

That operation might have been prosperous for Mr. Hardage, but there wasn’t much prosperity for the town of Criner.

House Bill 2132, now being considered in the Oklahoma Senate, would establish a system of non-regulation that would be an extraordinary opportunity for corporations to profit at the expense of their neighbors without fear of recourse. The bill was drafted by Houston-based, libertarian-leaning Compact for America under its Prosperity States initiative. It would establish so-called prosperity districts - a name that could have only been the product of a disinformation lab - in which one or more property

owners could petition for the designation. County officials would have just 20 days to consider the request and if they didn’t proactively deny it within that time, the self-governing district would be formed.

The legislation has been shopped to Arizona, Mississippi, Missouri, Arkansas and North Dakota, none of which have passed it.

The bill runs 88 pages, but the most critical phrase appears on Page 16: “... every Prosperity District shall have exclusive governing jurisdiction within its boundaries ...” It goes on to say that all other governmental entities are barred from exercising jurisdiction within the district’s

He is afraid of dogs and of the doorbell, of coathangers that fall on the floor, of the Thunder announcers on tv and of 9-month-old babies.

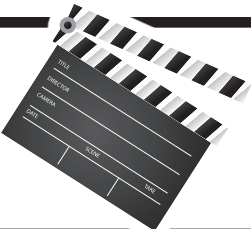
He is uneasy around anyone he hasn’t known for at least three years and he spends much of his time under my bed, waiting for the monsters to subside.

Fortunately the final action scene all makes up for it. These films really know how to bring it together in the end.

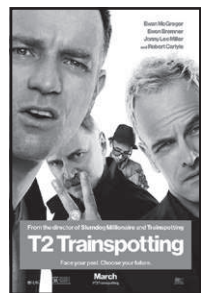
My favorite thing about this movie though has got to be Dwayne Johnson. This man is a national treasure. The filmmakers absolutely struck gold when they added him to

The Good Folks of Lennox Valley

October 1998 - Raymond Cooper was quickly learning running a newspaper took a lot more time than running a broadcast operation. With the radio station, he could flip on a couple of switches at sunrise each day and "Turn Your Radio On" would fill the airwaves. Within minutes, recorded programming would fill the airwaves until "Renderings with Raymond" went on the air at noon.

Just down the road in Springfield, deejays were preparing for "morning drive time," the busiest hours of the day. They were hurriedly preparing news bulletins, weather advisories, and light comedy routines to cheer up their early morning audience.

Most days, Raymond left for breakfast about 15 minutes after flipping the last switch. During those 15 minutes, he was listening to the drive time broadcast of FM 95.7 in Springfield, getting the news and weather forecast to share with his listeners later in the morning.

Radio stations in small towns like ours were interesting places. Before radio gave way to streaming audio on the World Wide Web, stations were hubs of activity. Raymond liked to refer to his station, Talk 880, as "500 Watts of Valley Power."

Hearing him say those words brought chills down the spines of many Valley residents. We were proud to have such capacity to influence the world right there in our own community.

I suppose that changed for me one morning while drying my hair. I noticed a number on the handle of my blow dryer that said, "1200 Watts."

It was hard to imagine my blow dryer held more horsepower than Raymond's station. Truth be told, my hair dryer probably produced just as much reliable information as Talk 880, but not as much hot air.

Cooper quickly learned he wasn't going to make a profit from his new journalistic endeavour. The initial edition was hailed by his fans. Most believed it was only a short matter of time before Raymond received his first Pulitzer Prize and The Hometown News was relegated to history books.

A major problem for Raymond's paper

was advertising. He had given most of the ads away to his friends to fill space. Farley Puckett sponsored the sports page, filled with news about the "Bowling match of the century" between Lennox Valley and Pleasant Hill, for free.

Those who did pay for ads paid very little. The first issue included three long-time advertisers from Hometown News. In exchange for agreeing to stop advertising in Iris Long's "rag," they paid one-third the amount they paid previously.

Somebody had to write the news. Raymond spent weeks creating the dribble filling the pages of his first issue while he took time away from his radio duties. Now he was back on the air, something had to give.

Raymond quickly recruited his best friends to help write stories for the paper and cohost his daily radio show. This made for some interesting banter. Somehow, the Thursday topic steered toward "favorite Bible verses." Callers seemed to love the topic.

"What's your favorite Bible verse?" a caller asked Marvin Walsh, who was manning the microphone.

Marvin paused for a moment to ponder his response.

"I believe," he murmured, "it would have to be either 'The Lord helps those who help themselves' or 'Everything happens for a reason.'"

Listening to the broadcast over lunch at the Hauffbrau, Brother Jacob, associate pastor at the Lutheran church, barely escaped spitting his coffee across the booth onto Sarah Hyden-Smith.

"Good Lord," Jessie, their waitress, exclaimed. "Even I know those aren't in the Bible and I haven't been to a church in 20 years."

Back at the station, Marvin and his cohost, Raymond, smugly admired their scriptural prowess as well as broadcast skills.

"What about you, Raymond?" asked Marvin. "What's yours?"

Cooper, realizing the spiritual influence he held over his listeners, gave serious thought to his response.

"I believe," he answered, "it would have to be 'What comes around, goes around.'"

"Oh, that's a good one!" Marvin shouted. "I don't know why I didn't think of that one."

State tax collections drop in March

State finance officials and local economists said that when it comes to the state's economy, there is good news and bad news.

Economic indicators show Oklahoma is on the mend, but that's not yet evident in tax collections, state Treasurer Ken Miller said.

His office released March collections data on Tuesday. Although the state is worse off now than it was at this time last year, Miller said he feels optimistic about the coming months.

March collections dropped 2.7 percent from last year, coming in at \$915 million. Before January, receipts were down for 20 consecutive months. January and February fared better, but last month brought in \$25.5 million less than March 2016.

"The average decline in gross receipts has slowed and the unemployment rate is shrinking as rig counts rise, along with business conditions and consumer confidence," Miller said during a press conference.

Economists weren't on board with the cheery consumer assessment, but they did say that Oklahoma is on a path to recovery.

Because the treasurer's office doesn't handle budgeting and allocations, the figures were compared with historical data instead of projections. The Office of Management and Enterprise Services will release projection numbers next week.

In February, Oklahoma's jobless rate was about 4.6 percent, slightly lower than the

national average, Miller said. During the recent bust, Oklahoma's rig count dropped from 214 at the height of activity to 57 in May 2016, according to federal data. As of March 27, that count rose back to 118.

March's gross production tax revenue on oil and natural gas more than doubled from last year, growing from \$24.2 million in 2016 to \$47.9 million this year.

Individual income tax receipts were up 6 percent from last year, coming in at \$306.5 million.

Now for the bad news. Overall gross receipts were \$632.8 million lower over the last 12 months than they were in the 12 months ending March 2016.

Corporate income tax revenue for March dropped by 64 percent year over year, dropping to \$28.1 million this year. Sales tax revenue fell to \$335.3 million for March, a 4.9-percent drop.

The sales tax drop left economists asking why the treasurer's office believes

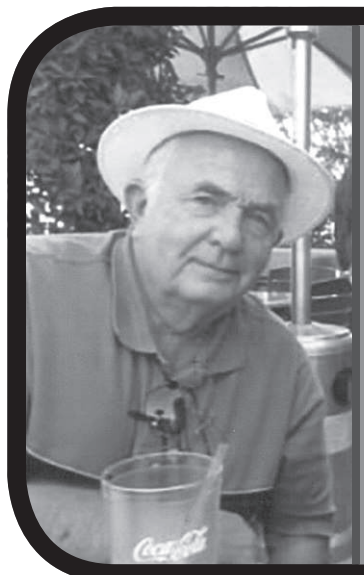
consumer confidence is high. Although energy, finance, construction and manufacturing employment is on the rise, retail, hospitality and transportation is dropping, said Chad Wilkerson, an economist at the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, Oklahoma City branch.

He said it's encouraging that the growth has been in high-paying sectors, but that the drop in the other sectors is going to manifest sales tax.

"You see them come through in the state budget in sales tax primarily," he said. "There may be something particularly going on in retail."

Jonathan Willner, an economist at Oklahoma City University, said recovering economies tend to have low sales tax revenues.

"Basically people who have been through rough times have accumulated debt," he said. "What they do is pay off debt. Because (they) don't spend it, you don't see it in sales tax revenue."

Local church planning mission trip

In September as Oklahoma temperatures cool towards another autumn, a team from Memorial Assembly of God in Purcell will travel by plane and boat into the sweltering Amazon spring to build a church.

It's a mission the congregation has embraced before – though never so far from home.

The Rev. Duane Elmore, pastor, will lead 20 hard-working volunteers on the multi-leg trip that will begin at Will Rogers World Airport in Oklahoma City.

From there, the group will fly to Dallas and then on to Miami, Fla.

Elmore said the \$15,000 for materials needed to build the church has already been raised.

The meal – barbeque brisket sandwich, potato salad, baked beans, dessert and drink – will be served at 5:30 p.m.

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Lost health insurance due to life change may be allowed for special enrollment

Oklahomans who lose their health insurance in a job layoff, divorce or other significant life change may qualify for a special enrollment period in the Health Insurance Marketplace.

The special enrollment periods typically last 60 days from the significant events, listed below. To find out if they qualify, interested persons in the Norman area should call certified Navigator Sandra Denton at 360-6631.

Denton is a paralegal in the Norman Law Office and has been trained and certified by the state and federal governments to assist people with health insurance information and enrollment through the Marketplace.

In addition to a job layoff or divorce, which results in loss of health coverage, several other common situations

can cause people to lose their health insurance and trigger a special enrollment period in the Marketplace outside of open enrollment.

The list of such events includes:

- Getting married or having a baby, adopting a child or placing a child for adoption or foster care;
- Being ordered by a court to provide health insurance coverage.
- Losing your dependent health insurance due to divorce, legal separation or death of a spouse.
- Losing job-based health insurance through layoff, termination, becoming self-employed, or early retirement.
- Aging off of a parent's plan by turning 26, or losing SoonerCare at age 19.
- COBRA coverage expir-

ing.

- Permanently moving outside your health plan's coverage area.

- Gaining US citizenship or lawful presence.

- Release from incarceration.

Legal Aid Services of Oklahoma is a not-for-profit law firm, which provides free civil legal assistance to eligible low-income individuals and their families and to elderly persons in the areas of family, consumer, housing, health and employment.

Cleveland's concerns to lead to thousands in cost savings

The Oklahoma Department of Corrections (DOC) is set to realize potential cost savings as a result of the state's response to concerns raised by State Rep. Bobby Cleveland.

In today's meeting of the Government Modernization Committee, Oklahoma State Purchasing Director Ferris Barger told committee members that central purchasing officials are asking for a re-issuance of DOC purchasing contracts previously awarded by the State Use Committee.

The department shared concerns about the contracts with Cleveland, who used the occasion of a February Government Modernization purchasing hearing to share the issue with Barger. Following the February hearing Barger instituted the

review and confirmed Cleveland's findings.

"You can't find these types of savings by sitting behind a desk at the state Capitol," said Cleveland, R-Slaughterville. "I was able to learn about these costly expenditures by going out and touring prisons. The reissuance will save the Department of Corrections thousands of dollars. It's an easy fix that came about after I took the time to step away from the Capitol and into the correctional centers across our state."

Barger said the re-issuance is expected to lower costs by 30 to 40 percent and provide thousands in savings.

In today's hearing, Barger told committee members that the state plans to institute new policies to ensure Use Com-

mittee contracts stay closer to market rates.

He also said that state officials could potentially institute claw-back provisions on behalf of the state agencies that are required to abide by Use Committee contracts.

"Today's hearing demonstrates the importance of legislators acting on the information they receive. Rep. Cleveland's example shows that meaningful cost savings result when legislators take their oversight responsibilities seriously," explained committee Chairman Jason Murphey, R-Guthrie.

"This also demonstrates the willingness of state purchasing and other shared services officials to respond straightaway to legislative oversight and savings opportunities."

FFA to assist in hog trapping

Ongoing efforts to reduce feral swine population

Last Thursday, during the feral hog trap demonstration at the Campaign for Conservation at the Capitol, the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry (ODAFF) gave 11 hog traps to conservation districts across the state of Oklahoma to aid with the ongoing efforts to control the feral swine population in the state.

Due to a great reception, ODAFF is now partnering with FFA chapters to provide more traps to the remaining conservation districts.

Wildlife Services at ODAFF presented the feral swine trap to members of the Oklahoma Conservation Commission (OCC), the Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts (OACD) and legislators on the lawn northwest of the capitol last Thursday.

Due to a tremendous response, all 85 districts will receive a welded head gate for the trap in addition to the assistance they were receiving for trap supplies.

Numerous FFA Chapters across the state have committed to helping with this project. The head gates will be paid for by a combination of sponsorships and fees collected from the captive feral swine hunting licenses as part of the Feral Swine Control act. The Oklahoma Soybean Association is sponsoring fifty of the next 100 trap gates. The traps will be

made available to landowners by their conservation districts. To contact your local conservation district office, visit https://www.ok.gov/conservation/Directory/Directory_of_Conservation_District_Offices/.

The feral swine are lured into the six or eight-panel trap by bait (usually corn) and trapped in the pen after triggering the trip wire which drops the gate. A variety of techniques are used by Wildlife Services to manage feral swine, but

Sexting case nails Blanchard cop

A 31-year-old Blanchard police officer who allegedly had a sexting relationship with a 16-year-old girl in late 2016 now faces a felony charge in McClain County District Court.

Jordan T. Jones is charged with violation of Oklahoma statute via computer.

He was freed April 10 after posting a \$5,000 bond. A preliminary hearing conference will be at 9 a.m. June 14.

According to an affidavit, Jones was one of two Blanchard police officers who reportedly had sexual relations with the girl.

The relationship was first re-

ported to an investigator with the Sixth District Drug and Violent Task Force for District Attorney Jason Hicks.

The investigator contacted Grady County Assistant District Attorney Kara Bacon who turned to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation for assistance.

On December 28, two OSBI agents received copies of messages between Jones and the girl.

The messages, which included nude photos of both the girl and Jones, were allegedly exchanged between December 1 and 15, according to court records.

The second Blanchard police officer hasn't been identified or charged as of Tuesday.

Trapping:

trapping is considered one of the most effective methods in states like Oklahoma with high populations because of the ability to eliminate multiple hogs at one time. Last year, 11,206 feral swine were eliminated in Oklahoma.

Bill would require long-term suspension of elementary students

Students as young as pre-K can be, and are, suspended from Oklahoma schools for as long as the remainder of the school year for violating school rules.

A proposal working its way through the Legislature would expand that by mandating lengthy suspensions for elementary students as young as third grade for assault or attempted assault against a teacher, school employee or volunteer. Currently, a default punishment of suspension for the rest of the semester and entire next semester starts in sixth grade.

If Senate Bill 81 by Sen. Ron Sharp, R-Shawnee, is passed, there will likely be more elementary-aged students kicked out of school long-term.

In 2015, Oklahoma schools reported 96 suspensions of elementary-aged students for assaulting a teacher or staff member, state Education Department data shows. Of those, only two students were suspended for the remainder of the school year.

Professional Oklahoma Educators, an association for school personnel that requested SB 81, collected testimonials from a dozen unnamed teachers about their experiences with physical violence in the classroom. Those include a fourth-grade teacher in Guymon who placed herself between students involved in a violent altercation while she was pregnant, and an Okmulgee teacher who says she was punched in the face by a third-grader, resulting in a black eye and fractured cheekbone.

Despite such incidents, increasing the number of young students suspended long-term takes Oklahoma in the wrong direction, said Gene Perry, policy director for the

Oklahoma Policy Institute, an independent policy think tank.

We should be investing what's needed in our schools to actually control the classroom and to provide the services to these kids who are acting in ways that show they are struggling," Perry said.

There are good practices and programs happening in Oklahoma and elsewhere that do that, he said. The Jenks Public Schools district, for example, opened cool-down rooms in its two largest elementary schools this year, where students strug-



gling to cope can go to receive extra counseling outside of the classroom.

Unfortunately, funding for alternative education has been reduced and some school districts have eliminated support staff positions, such as counselors.

The law does provide parents an opportunity to appeal a long suspension, but one problem is the default punishment is suspension whether or not a teacher was harmed, Perry said.

Often, students facing suspension are the ones with the most difficult issues at home, such as food insecurity. Those problems are likely to get worse if the student is removed from school, Perry said.

Another major issue with school suspensions is they are given disproportionately to students of color. Oklahoma City

Public Schools is under federal oversight related to racial disparities in its student discipline. An audit by the school district, the state's largest, found black students are two to three times more likely to be suspended than white students.

Suspensions also can have ripple effects. A 2014 study of 17,000 Kentucky students found that in schools with high suspension rates, there was a negative effect on the math and reading scores of students who hadn't been suspended. Frequent suspensions impact a school's culture, one of the researchers theorized, causing anxiety and disconnect among students.

Sharp, a retired educator, agrees that suspension is not ideal and children are better served by alternatives. But, he says, options are limited.

"We cannot have that child with anger management issues in the classroom bodily assaulting a teacher or a teacher's aide. We have to do something to address this," he said.

Other incidents reported by Professional Oklahoma Educators were a special-education student kicking the knee of a Bridge Creek teacher, who required surgery, and a teacher in Western Heights school district who was "bit, kicked and punched by 4-year-olds to the point of bruises all over."

The Senate approved SB 81 on March 20 by a 38-7 vote; the bill is awaiting action by the House Common Education Committee.

Septic system care

With the number of homes built outside the reach of city sewer systems, septic tanks are a significant component of waste management systems. They are used with nearly every wastewater device including lateral fields (conventional septic systems), lagoons, approved wetlands, and the mechanical spray systems.

Improperly installed and/or maintained septic systems threaten Oklahoma's water quality. Maintenance improves performance and prolongs the life of all septic systems.

One of the most common misconceptions I hear is that if everything is working properly you should never have to worry about your septic system. Since septic systems are underground (out of sight, out of mind), they are often ignored until the toilet stops flushing or sewage surfaces in the yard. By that time, it is usually too late for an easy, inexpensive fix.

The truth is, a septic system requires more than just flushing the toilet, they need regular upkeep. Following are a few tips on installing and maintaining a septic system:

- Install correctly by using a certified installer. Call the Department of Environmental Quality for Help.
- Install in the right location which is at least 100 feet from a well or spring.
- Divert water from downspouts and foundation drains away from lateral field.
- Use a garbage disposal

sparingly or not at all.

- Hire a licensed pumper every 4-6 years or when the tank consists of 50% solids. The more people in the house and the more a garbage disposal is used the more often pumping is required.

- Don't allow vehicle traffic over the septic tank or drain field.

- Don't use septic tank additives or strong chemicals (toilet paper and normal household cleaners are okay).

- Don't plant trees or build buildings on the drain field.

Of these, the single, most effective tip is to have the tank pumped out regularly. Since septic system replacement could cost up to \$5,000, the

\$200 or so spent on tank pump-out is a smart investment.

If solids fill up in the tank, they will move out into the lateral drain field. This plugs the system and can foul the field making it unusable. I have seen situations where a completely new lateral field had to be installed in another location.

This could require taking out trees, moving outbuildings, or purchasing adjoining property.

If you have a private septic system, due yourself a favor by checking the tank regularly. Pump out the solids when necessary or every four to six years.

Mulch is one of the most common and practical tools a gardener can have. It can be relatively cheap, even free in some cases, comes in an array of sizes, shapes and colors, is easy to install, and has many benefits.

Benefits of using mulch may include: reduced surface evaporation, improved water penetration and air movement, control of soil temperature fluctuations, protection from freeze damage, improved soil structure and nutrient availability, preventing weed growth, and improved aesthetics.

There are two types of mulches, organic and inorganic. Organic mulches include such things as wood and bark chips, straw, grass clippings and seed hulls. Inorganic or inert mulches include polyethylene film, gravel and weed-barrier fabrics. I like to focus on organic mulches as they are usually better for the plant and environment. There are occasions though when good inorganic mulch is the right thing for the job.

The ideal mulch does not

compact readily and breaks down slowly.

Selection
The selection of mulch should depend on the intended use. Appearance is sometimes the goal and either organic or inorganic types would work, but is largely based on personal preferences. When the goal is to improve soil conditions, organic mulches that gradually break down work well. The size of the area in relation to the cost of materials and availability should also be considered.

If the area is used primarily for annual flowers, it often is more practical to use temporary organic mulch that can be turned under each fall. A few of my favorite mulches include: Cocoa-bean hulls, Cottonseed hulls, Shredded Cypress or Shredded Cedar.

When to Apply Mulches
Mulch is best applied soon after the emergence of the crop seedlings or following transplanting. A delay in application of mulch may be desirable if the soil has not warmed sufficiently during the spring.

If the mulch will be used to protect fall transplants by keeping soil temperatures above

freezing longer into the fall (permitting better root growth), apply soon after transplanting.

Depth of Mulches
When using organic mulch, most should be applied to a depth of three to four inches. One cubic yard of mulch will cover about 80 square feet four inches thick. Some mulch, particularly straw and loose leaves, may harbor rodents. When using these mulches, do not place closer than six inches to the base of woody plants. When these types of mulches are placed next to the plant, rodents living in the mulch will chew the bark of the plants, girdling and killing them.

Preventing Nitrogen Deficiency
As organic mulches decompose, the breakdown organisms use some of the soil nitrogen in contact with the mulch. Consequently, nitrogen deficiency may occur. A sign of nitrogen deficiency is a yellowing, primarily of the lower leaves. When this occurs, add fertilizer containing nitrogen

Cook was 3-4 with two RBIs. Sweeney drove in a pair of runners and Collateta had a hit

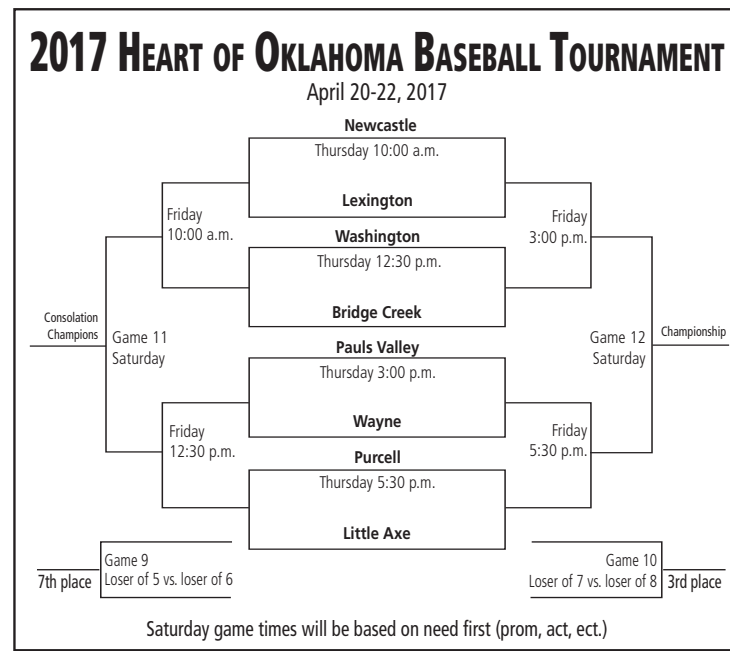

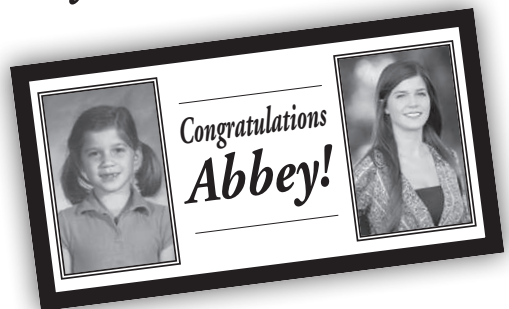

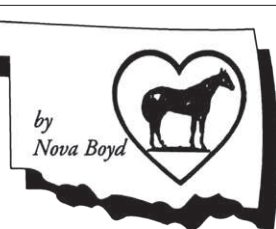
Lexington's home game with Maysville and road game at Marlow were both rained out.

Want a Career in the Horse Industry?

Today's column was inspired by an article in the January-February issue of The Equine Tom Grabe, Publisher/Editor.

This article, written by Taylor Fabus, explores the many and varied job opportunities available to someone who loves horses and would like to make a career in some segment of this industry. The Chronicle graciously gave me permission to use their article.

I was drawn to use this article because it ties in very tightly to the historic Heart of Oklahoma horse industry that we have here in Purcell and in the 35-40 mile circle around us.

There are only a few places in the US that have the number of equine and equine-related businesses that we have here. According to the AQHA, the Aubrey-Pilot Point, Texas, area, our Purcell area and the Ocala, Fla., area are the top three. And that is just AQHA. We also have Thoroughbreds, Paints, Pintos, Buckskins, Palominos, Appaloosas, Morgans, Mules, Miniatures Horses and Burros, Arabians, Draft breeds, Gypsy Vanners, Tennessee Walkers, rare Kiger Mustangs, rarer Bashkir Curlies, the only breeding Fresian in Oklahoma, and more! And more! All of these breeds have their own associations and breed registries.

Then there are the single-discipline associations, like the National Reining Horse Association and the National Cutting Horse Association. And when it comes to training for any discipline in the show ring or racing, you can find a trainer right here. There are a large number of veterinarians in the area, some doing general vet work, some who do only breeding, but all on the cutting edge of the newest and best treatments available. If you need it for your horse, it is most likely here.

I keep a book in my office in which I record every horse person, every horse-related business and every breed I hear about. I now have over 400 in that 35-40 mile circle. So this area is very rich in horses and the horse-related industries that support these horses.

Everyone who lives in this area should be very proud of the large horse industry we have here. Horse people all over the world know about Purcell. Some of the biggest names in the show world and in racing are right here. When they win, it just reinforces this area's bright and shining reputation, and more and more horse people move here because of it.

Here's the article. After each section, my comments and information about this section will be in brackets.

Equine Industry Career Guide

I'm sure you've heard about the best way to make a \$1,000 in the horse industry? Start with \$5,000. Unfortunately, there is a vein of truth in that statement. Many of us work unreasonably hard throughout the week to pour nearly all of our disposable income into some activity involving our equine companions each weekend. But this industry that you love so dearly has much more to offer than just recreation. Many equine enthusiasts have successfully melded their horse passion into a lifelong career. What many don't realize is that there are far more career opportunities beyond being a horse trainer or veterinarian. If you scratch beyond the surface, the depth of career choices may surprise you.

First things first, let us explore the industry, by the numbers. According to a recent nationwide study conducted by the American Horse Council, there are 9.2 million horses in the United States. 4.6 million Americans are involved in the industry as horse owners, service providers, employees and volunteers. 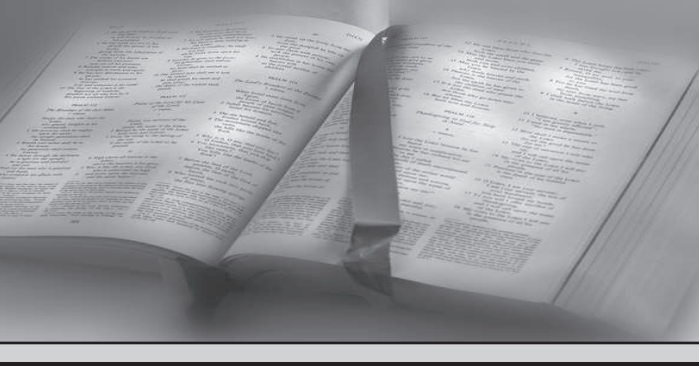

Welcome to the “front porch”! For this week’s visit: The Preacher’s Voice (Part 2).

Several years ago when we were put “out of commission” for several weeks due to vocal cord surgery, we had a chance to reflect a great deal about the power of our “voices” in our work for the Lord. Sometimes we take the most simple things for granted, don’t we! It was during that time that my son Mal inspired us to write a daily chronicle called “A Preacher’s Voice.” We could not speak even a single word for a week, but it was almost a month before it didn’t hurt to speak much; so we had a great deal of time to reflect. It also may have been the best and quietest week of the amazin’ blonde’s life. That, of course, is my wife of 41 years.

We liked my son’s idea, and it was not long before we realized something important – and that is the theme for today’s front porch visit: Our voices for the Lord, indeed, cannot, must not, be silenced. We all – whether in our daily speech or in a light-shining walk – must proclaim the glory of our Lord each day (Matthew 5:16).

For a man who has been redeemed by the gospel of Jesus Christ to hold his peace – why, the very stones, as it were, “would immediately cry out” (Luke 19:40). This great message cannot be held in. As Jeremiah said long ago when he thought he had come to the end of the preaching road, “... his word was in mine heart as a burning fire shut up in my bones ... and I could not quit” (20:9).

From last week we reflected on how the preacher’s – no, every man and woman’s – voice

should be filled with praise and prayer, and his voice – and heart – should give God the glory continually, not himself.

There’s something else about the voice of one who trumpets God’s gospel: It should be heard in the “byways and highways.” The greatest sermons, no doubt, are the ones few ever hear. They are the sermons preached on front porches, in living rooms, in break rooms at work, and driving down the road. And even before that sermon can be preached, the messenger – the Christian – must spend many hours building confidence and trust.

A sinner is very unlikely to hear our message if our light hasn’t shone in his life long before the introduction to the sermon. We hear many great sermons in the early church, but few are in the pulpits. In Acts 16 alone, we get glimpses of three great sermons: one down by the river, one riding in a chariot, and one that began in a jail and continued on to the man’s home. Each sermon ended with rejoicing. The early preachers didn’t need a pulpit to preach, for sure!

One more thing: The preacher’s voice should share the greatest message of all: the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. That theme is the apostle’s greatest: “I determined not to know anything among you, “says Paul, “save Jesus Christ, and him crucified” (1 Corinthians 2:2).

We offer this encouragement to every man – young or old – who answers the Macedonian call to preach the gospel. If you should take on such a work, preach the gospel. Preach it first and foremost, beginning to end. Do not preach it generally

or vaguely, and do not begin with the restrictions. Tell the story directly and powerfully. Take each listener up Calvary’s hill, drawing a picture with every breath of a love that is longer and wider, higher and deeper than we can even imagine (Ephesians 3:18-19).

Then – with that portrait vivid in power and grace – step away and explain the cost (Luke 14:18). The cost seems so small when laid beside the story of Jesus Christ. Yes, some will walk away – as does the rich young man (Mark 10) – but they do not walk away because the story is insufficient, for it never is (Romans 1:16). The gospel can drag a calloused sinner – even a godless jailer – from the edge of a hopeless tomb to a saving, watery grave (Acts 16:27,33; Romans 6:3-4).

But let no hearer walk away because we failed to preach the death, burial, and resurrection of 1 Corinthians 15:1-4 as well as the DBR in Romans 6:1-7. If they choose to walk away, may it only be that they cannot reach down deep enough in their souls to draw a resolute, decisive line in the sand (Luke 15:18).

Surely, a preacher’s voice – and the voice of any Christian who offers a gospel of salvation to all they can – is a beautiful thing, and it is the voice put to its greatest use. We encourage all to use it with passion: Use it in praise to our God and in prayer, and use it courageously in every corner and nook of your life to share the great message of “Jesus Christ and him crucified.”

Such a message, and such a voice, cannot – must not – be silenced!

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

On Easter Sunday morning, the angel said to the women in the empty tomb, and to all of us, “Be not afraid.” Jesus said to the women, and to all of us, “Be not afraid.” The absence of Love is not Hate, but Fear. Fear sometimes grips us, holds us, paralyzes us. And we cannot love when we are gripped in fear. We fear change, and so we hold on tightly to way we have always done it. We fear being vulnerable, and so we hold onto the anger we have against another person. We fear having to admit that we are wrong.

Our teenagers tiptoe in fear around their parents who argue like selfish adolescents, parents who never grew up. Their parents refused to accept that marriage is about compromise, and we grow in the very act of compromise. As we get older, we cling all the more tightly to things – because we fear what we will soon have to give up.

When we pray the Hail Mary, we end it with “pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death.” Because it will be at the hour of our death when we will most be afraid, when we will most need the quiet strength and the peacefulness of Our Blessed Mother.

But fear can be transformed into courage. It is transformed into courage when fear is met with conviction – belief in ideals that are bigger than ourselves. Courage doesn’t mean not being afraid. It means doing what you have to do in spite of being afraid.

When the Catholic nuns went to march in Selma, Ala., on behalf of civil rights for all black citizens, they were insulted and yelled at and called all sorts of ugly things. But they had a conviction that all people should be treated with dignity.

When St. Thomas More refused to sign the oath of loyalty to the King of England, he had a conviction that Christ’s Church should stay as one church, united with Rome.

When Fr. Stanley Rother, Oklahoma priest, returned to work among his poor parishioners in Guatemala, he was afraid for his life, but he had a greater conviction that, like a good shepherd, he could not run. And for this he was killed.

When fear is left on its own, it becomes the devil’s playground. The devil will enhance the fear and make us paralyzed to inaction. But when we invite God into our fear, it can become trans-

formed into courage – the courage to act, the courage to love. Whenever we make the sign of the cross, we are inviting God into those things that make us afraid. In the early Christian centuries, this sign began on the forehead. Gradually it became larger, so that all the world knew that we believe in the power of the Cross of Jesus that began in fear but ended in an act of love and redemption.

When we make the sign of the cross, we are doing two things. First, we are setting ourselves apart from the corrupt ways of the world. We are choosing a new standard – the standard of the Cross of Jesus. And, second, we are asking God’s protection against those things that we fear. We are asking God to transform our fear into courage, just as He transformed the fear of Jesus on the cross into the Risen Lord.

When we are living an Easter faith, we will still have fear, but our fear will not keep us from acting. Our fear will not keep us frozen or silent, but will be transformed into love. Let us ask for God’s help – “In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.” Amen.

Our Veteran of the Week is a disabled Marine we have been working with the past year assisting him to apply for VA benefits. Billy McGill and his wife Pam Shelton make their home in Cleveland, Okla. Last year he was injured and has not been able to return to his job in the construction industry.

One of the things we have had success with is putting people together when there is a need. Last week I wrote about Virginia and Ken who wanted to donate their Chevy Suburban to a veteran in need. Last week that vehicle was presented to Billy and Pam.

They were very appreciative to have a vehicle to use on a daily basis. While talking with them after the presentation, I told them I could not get the air conditioner to blow really cold air. Billy said there wasn't any air conditioning when he was walking either. We are happy to have been of service to get this couple on the road instead of the sidewalk.

Last week on both Tuesday and Thursday, by 9 a.m. we reached the maximum number of veterans and surviving spouses we could accommodate. There were more than 230 men and women our volunteers were able to help. When we are dealing with that many people, some of them will be in wheelchairs, on oxygen or using other types of appliances such as walkers and crutches. When they meet those kinds of criteria, we try our best to process their claims for VA benefits ahead of others. I know that some of the veterans we help have a difficult time waiting their turn to be assisted because of PTSD or other issues.

For those who have problems in crowds or with waiting, please visit with one of our other volunteers or me to see what we can do to help you more quickly. Something for everyone to think about is why so many veterans and surviving spouses make the trip to see us for help with their VA claims for benefits. The reason is the success that we have in helping them receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible. We encourage the veterans we assist to supply medical evidence of a disability that occurred in the military.

The VA has what is called a Disability Benefits Questionnaire for most of the injuries and illnesses that occurred in the military or were aggravated by military service. If a veteran obtains this type of evidence or another written diagnosis of a condition that occurred in the military it is likely they will be approved for service connection of that disability the first time they apply for VA benefits.

We also encourage veterans to tell their story of what happened and how to use the VA Form 21-4138 Statement in Support of Claim. I want to make sure the VA has enough information to approve the veteran's claim for benefits.

I have been helping veterans receive VA benefits for almost 30 years. During that time, many things have changed. Today's veterans have more access to health care while on active duty. Better health care

also means better treatment records. When applying for VA benefits, we use those records and a current diagnosis of a condition that occurred or was aggravated by military service.

For veterans who file for VA benefits within one year of their discharge date, the VA will need only their military medical records to process their claim. That is certainly a much better option than that available to someone who has been released for more than a year.

While we are writing about disabilities, there are some of them that are presumptive to a veteran's military service. An example could be veterans exposed to Agent Orange during their service. There are a number of diseases that are presumptive to exposure to that chemical. If you are a surviving spouse of a veteran who served in Vietnam or served during the Vietnam Era please consider visiting with Shirley or another one of our specialists about possible VA benefits. Please call Shirley at (405) 361-9322 for your questions about surviving spouse benefits.

If you need a ride to come see us, or to travel to your medical appointments, please contact Clayton at (405) 550-8806 extension 105 or Louie at (405) 642-7100. They set a record this week spending 87 hours transporting 26 veterans 1,464 miles.

There were 207 veterans and 23 surviving spouses assisted by our volunteers last week. Many of them were there to file their first claim for benefits. It will take on average from 30 days to 180 days for these veterans and surviving spouses to receive VA decision to approve or deny benefits. Some of them will be approved the first go around while some may take longer. There is usually a small percentage that we will file a Notice of Disagreement if they have been denied three times.

Personally, I want to keep a veteran's claim out of the appeals process as many veterans have died waiting for a decision from the Board of Veterans Appeals. It is not uncommon for claims that end up in Washington, DC to take three or more years for a decision. Most of the claims that we file the veteran is eventually approved. As always, the key to success is always giving VA the evidence in support of your claim.

As an Accredited VA Claims Agent. I receive all the rating decision letters on the veterans and surviving spouses we represent. The first thing done is to review each decision for accuracy. We then send a notification letter for each of them describing what extra benefits may be available from the VA or from the State of Oklahoma. Our letter also tells them what they should do next concerning their VA claims. This has helped many veterans receive everything for which they are eligible.

Last week there were six veterans who received a 100 percent VA rating for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual benefit of \$188,373.12 per year. There were 21 veterans who received disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women veterans will receive an annual combined benefit of \$283,522.44. In this 10-90 percent group, three of those veterans live in Norman, and they will receive \$68,209.92 in annual benefits for the year.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to

apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

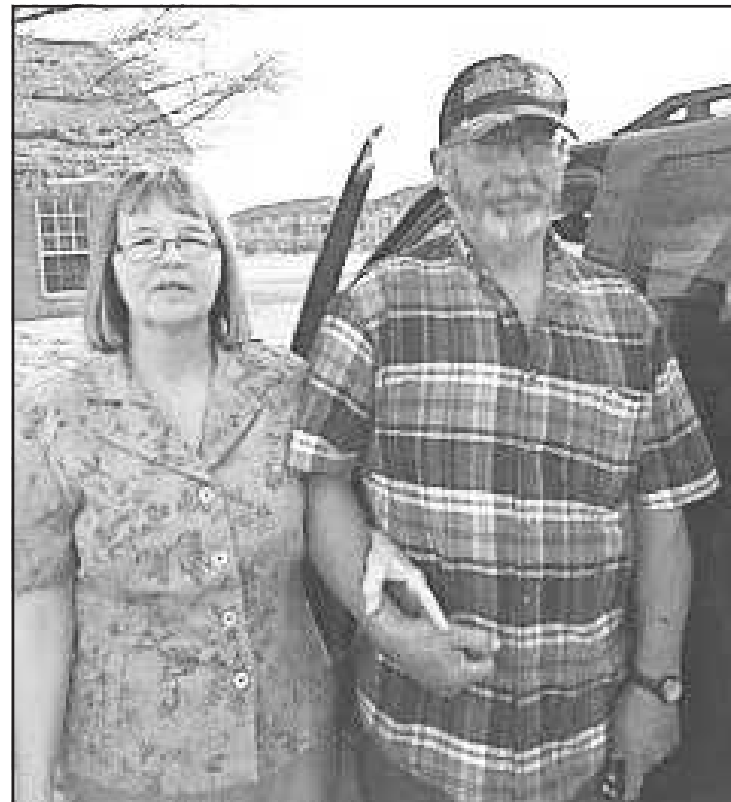
