## Homicide details

Co-defendants  
charged Friday

One murder defendant is being held without bail in the McClain County Detention Center and an arrest warrant is outstanding for her alleged accomplice.

Prosecutors charged Sherry L. Lowe, 49, of Purcell, on Friday with first-degree murder.

Also charged was Logan Thacker, 22, of Oklahoma City.

They are accused in the shooting death June 7 of David Allen.

According to an affidavit, Allen called the McClain County Sheriff's Department on June 6 and reported he'd allowed his roommate, Lowe, to borrow his Toyota Tundra pickup the day before and she hadn't returned the vehicle.

The following day, Allen again called the sheriff's department to report Lowe had returned the vehicle.

Then on June 12, the sheriff received a call from Steven Moxley who reported he'd found Allen, a friend, dead outside his home at 21217 Lilac Road.

Investigators found Allen's badly decomposed body in a field west of the residence. He had been shot in the head.

Allen's pickup and Lowe were missing.

Moxley told investigators that Lowe had called him on June 7 or 8 and said she and Allen were in Allen's pickup and were stuck in the field. Lowe asked Moxley to pull them out, according to the affidavit.

When Moxley arrived, only Lowe was present and she told him Allen had gone to an auction.

## Rationed water

Goldsby order  
in effect now

The Town of Goldsby is implementing odd-even water rationing that will remain in effect until further notice.

With the lack of rain and increased consumption, the town's municipal water system is hard pressed to keep up with demand.

A proclamation by mayor Cindy Andrews states "an emergency exists whereby the municipal water system is unable to supply the commercial and domestic need of users ...including adequate fire protection if usage continues at present volumes."

Among activities prohibited at certain times and days under the water rationing are using water from the municipal system to water lawns or grounds; hose sidewalks, driveways, parking areas, other paved surfaces and building exteriors; and fill or refill swimming pools, ponds or fountains.

Those activities will be permitted from 7 to 11 a.m. and 7 to 11 p.m. on even numbered days at even numbered street addresses.

On odd numbered days at odd numbered street addresses, the water usage restrictions are lifted during the same hours.

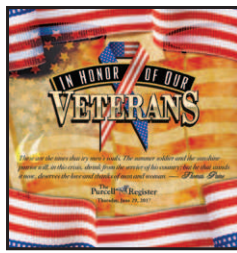

# Tips to have a safe and happy Fourth of July

It's time for Fourth of July celebrations – a time with family, friends, fireworks, a backyard barbecue, and maybe a trip to the lake. However, this American holiday is also one of the most dangerous.

The Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH) offers the following safety tips for preventing injuries and illness during this year's Fourth of July activities:

#### Firework Safety

- Obey all state and local laws regarding the sale, possession and use of fireworks.
- A responsible adult should supervise all firework activities. Never give fireworks to children.
- Wear safety glasses when shooting fireworks.
- Make sure you, your kids and others watch fireworks from a safe distance.
- Use fireworks outdoors in a clear area, away from buildings and vehicles.
- Always have a bucket of water and charged water hose nearby.
- Never throw or point a firework toward people, animals, vehicles, structures or flammable materials.
- Dispose of spent fireworks by wetting them down and placing in a metal trash can away from any buildings or combustible materials until the next day.

#### Safe Food Preparation

- Clean: Wash hands for 20 seconds with soap and running water before, during, and after handling food. Hold friends and family accountable by asking them if they washed their hands. Wash all surfaces and utensils with hot, soapy water before and after preparing each food item.
- Separate: Avoid cross-

contamination. Use separate cutting boards, plates and utensils for fresh fruits/vegetables and for raw meat, poultry, seafood and eggs. Also make sure to keep these items separate when shopping at the grocery store, storing in the refrigerator and during preparation.

- Cook: Grill and cook all meat products to the correct temperature. Use a food thermometer to correctly measure temperatures. Hamburgers should be brown throughout, with no pink in the center and reaching at least 160 degrees. Whole poultry should reach at

or anything flammable.

- Use long-handled tools especially made for cooking on the grill.
- Never add charcoal starter fluid or any other flammable liquids when coals have already been ignited.

#### Lake Safety

- Always wear a life jacket when in the water or on a motorized water vehicle such as a boat or personal watercraft.
- Stay alert for local weather conditions.
- Check for warning signs or flags.
- Protect the neck – don't dive headfirst into the water. Walk carefully into open waters.
- Never let your children swim alone. An adult should always be present and paying attention.
- Always have a phone handy should an emergency arise.
- Follow safe boating practices: use an observer if towing a person, stay a safe distance from the shore and use good judgment operating around other watercraft.
- Chart a safe course. The Fourth of July is sometimes the first and only time people venture out on the water after dark. Visual navigation markers you rely on during the day may not be visible.
- Designate a sober driver. The side effects of alcohol are impaired judgment, reduced balance and poor coordination, which are magnified by the boating environment. It is illegal to operate a boat or water ski with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of 0.08 percent or more.

#### Sun Exposure

- Try to limit sun exposure between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. when UV levels are the highest.
  - Always wear a sun protective factor (SPF) of at least 15 with UVA and UVB protection and reapply every two hours, even on cloudy days.
  - Stay hydrated and watch for signs of heat stroke – high body temperature, hot, red, dry or damp skin, headache, nausea, and/or passing out. A heat stroke is a medical emergency; call 911 if someone is showing these warning signs.

least 165 degrees; and leftovers should also reach 165 degrees when reheated.

- Chill: Leaving food sitting out all day to snack on can cause abdominal discomfort and diarrhea. To prevent illness, refrigerate easily spoiled foods within two hours. If the temperature is 90 degrees or higher, refrigerate within one hour.
- Illness: Do not cook food for others when you are ill. If you have had vomiting or diarrhea, wait at least 72 hours after symptoms have stopped before preparing food for others.

#### Grilling Safety

- Always supervise a barbecue grill when in use.
- Never grill indoors – not in your house, camper, tent or any enclosed area.
- Grill out in the open, away from the house, tree branches

Voters can sign up for reminders of upcoming elections on line

A new service launched this week will allow voters to sign up for e-mail or text messages reminding them about upcoming elections in their county, Oklahoma State Election Board Secretary Paul Ziriaux said. The GovDelivery service will also let voters sign up for reminders to renew their annual absentee ballot requests, receive press releases and get a digest of the agency’s official Twitter feed.

To sign up, voters can visit the Oklahoma State Election Board’s website at www.elections.ok.gov. An overlay will pop up allowing website visitors to sign up for the service. Voters can also sign up via a permanent request box on the site’s home page. Subscribers can choose to receive e-mail or text alerts. To get election reminders, a voter will also need to list their county of residence. A few days before each election, an alert will be sent to subscribers in any county that is having an election. The alert will include links to the board’s upcoming elections web page, where they

can view the elections taking place in their county, and to the Online Voter Tool, which will allow the voter to see a sample ballot if they are eligible to vote in the election. This is the latest online tool we’ve developed to help Oklahoma voters,” Ziriaux said. “Along with the Online Voter Tool and the online absentee

ballot request form, this service makes it easier than ever to make sure your vote gets cast and counted on Election Day.” To sign up for notifications from the Oklahoma State Election Board or for any other information about Oklahoma elections, visit www.elections.ok.gov.

### Restoring confidence with tax reform

The last time Congress made significant changes in the tax code, Ronald Reagan was president.

A lot has changed since then, and it is long overdue for an overhaul of the tax code that reflects our changing economy, trade practices and societal priorities.

When Speaker Ryan delivered his speech on tax reform last week, he made it clear that Americans must have confidence in our economy, their jobs, and their ability to care for themselves and their families.

Our current tax code is overly burdensome and complicated. We need to replace it with something that is fair and simple, promotes economic growth and lets hard working Americans keep more of their earnings.

In the proposed Republican plan, reducing the number of tax brackets from seven to three will make tax returns simpler and shorter - perhaps as short as a postcard.

The plan will also reduce the top individual tax rate to 33 percent, create a larger standard deduction, a larger child tax credit and repeal the unfair estate tax, sometimes known as the death tax.

The new tax plan will not only help individuals, but it will help American businesses and manufacturers.

Eight out of 10 small businesses are taxed under individual rates, and the most successful of these pay nearly 45 percent.

Currently, the corporate tax rate in the United States is one of the highest in the world at 35 percent. This incentivizes corporations to take their

businesses overseas for lower tax rates, costing thousands of jobs here and stifling economic growth.

By lowering the corporate tax rate, we can promote American industrial leadership, capital and job creation on our home soil.

Each year that we put off tax reform, our nation continues to lose capital, businesses and jobs, and families lose thousands of dollars. With a new tax code, jobs in Oklahoma alone are projected to increase by nearly 20,000, and the average taxpayer home in Oklahoma will receive about \$4,000 in tax relief.

The end result of this permanent tax plan is clear. It will restore job growth across the nation, retain American-based businesses and improve confidence and simplicity for the American taxpayer.

## Correcting fiscal irresponsibility

There are plenty of federal government programs that manage the money from taxpayers well. Americans want safe water, good highways, and a strong, well-prepared military to keep us safe.

But there are programs that leave taxpayers scratching their heads. Two members of Oklahoma's congressional delegation are trying to correct one such bit of fiscal irresponsibility: the federal subsidization of sports stadiums.

According to research by the Brookings Institution, 36 of the 45 stadiums built or renovated since 2000 were financed with public money, typically municipal bonds. Since municipal bonds are tax-exempt, the IRS missed out on an estimated \$3.7 billion in revenue. Fifth District Rep. Steve Russell and Sen. James Lankford wrote bills this year to end that practice.

Prior to 1953, sports stadiums were privately built. But

that year, the Boston Braves moved to Milwaukee in large part to take advantage of a new stadium built with public money and with that the horse was out of the barn. Oklahomans gained nothing when the New York Yankees got a new \$2.3 billion stadium in 2009 but paid their share of the \$431 million federal subsidy nonetheless.

The economic development argument is that a sports stadium is good for business, that the public spends more in nearby restaurants, that more hotel rooms are booked and that the panache of having a major league team carries with it such a powerful intangible benefit that the whole community benefits. Economists disagree.

"Few fields of empirical economic research offer virtual unanimity of findings," economists John Siegfried and Andrew Zimbalist wrote in The Journal of Economic Perspectives. "Yet independent work on the economic

impact of stadiums and arenas has uniformly found that there is no statistically significant positive correlation between sports facility construction and economic development."

Oklahoma cities chose the fiscally conservative course; arenas here were built without debt, including the Chesapeake Arena. That good sense can't be forced upon other municipalities, but when a local government in another state decides paying for a new stadium is a good idea it doesn't mean Oklahomans should help foot the bill.

Russell's HR 811 and Lankford's Eliminating Federal Tax Subsidies for Stadiums Act would eliminate the effective subsidy by making it illegal to build stadiums with tax-exempt bonds but they would also make it possible to subsidize stadiums with taxes on tickets and in-stadium purchases.

That would shift the burden to the community that benefits, and that's exactly where it should be.

He also kept bees and sold their honey, and he raised and sold upwards of 600 turkeys a year.

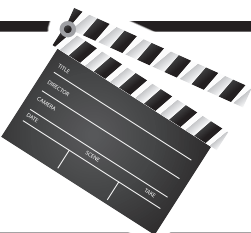
Grandpa also was one of the first people in Pontotoc County to graft pecans.

# MOVIES WITH DAVE

Only one new release at the Warren, or Regal whatever they're calling it now, so this week I went out of my way to see a couple smaller films also released this week.

One of which interestingly enough got partially financed through a crowdfunding campaign on Kickstarter.

So without any further ado, here's what I saw this week.

First up is the latest installment of the Transformers series "Transformers: The Last Knight."

Reprising his role from the previous film in the series, Mark Wahlberg is Cade Yeager, an intrepid inventor and friend of the Autobots.

While seeking out other Transformers in need, Cade finds himself entrusted with an ancient talisman. Said talisman leads Cade on a quest for a powerful relic, the likes of which has the potential to change the fate of the entire planet.

Also along for the ride is Vivian Wembley (Laura Haddock), an English Literature professor at Oxford, Sir Edmund Burton (Anthony Hopkins), keeper of ancient knowledge about Transformers, and Izabella (Isabela Moner), a young woman with a knack for repairing machines.

Every time a new Transformers movie is released people always hope it'll be the one. A Transformers film that's actually better or at least on par with the first one.

Sadly it still hasn't happened. In fact these movies somehow keep getting worse.

Let's start with the story. I'll never understand how movies featuring robots beating up other robots can be so darn complicated.

Next up I saw "Neither Wolf Nor Dog."

Based on the book of the same name, this film follows Kent Nerburn (Christopher Sweeney) a Minnesotan author who, at the time, had made a bit of a name for himself transcribing stories and memories of Native Americans.

Kent ends up taking on way more than he bargained for though after receiving a call from an old Lakota man named Dan (Dave Bald Eagle) looking for someone to write down his story.

What follows is a life changing journey through Lakota territory that changes Kent's perspective forever.

As I mentioned at the beginning of my article, this is the film that got a large chunk of its funding through a crowdfunding campaign on Kickstarter.

And though it's pretty obvious this movie was filmed on a shoe-string budget, it does a decent job telling a pretty compelling story.

Technically the star of the film is the writer Kent Nerburn, but the character who completely steals the show is Dan, given life by Dave Bald Eagle who has sadly passed since the filming of this movie.

He's by far my favorite part of the film and is at the heart of everything good in this movie, including the humor.

For as deep of a subject as this movie tackles, it ends up being surprisingly funny. This film has better comedic timing than a lot of comedies I've seen recently.

It isn't a comedy though. This movie deals with the very hard subject of reservations and how Native Americans are regarded in history.

And that brings me to one of my biggest problems with this film.

The performances can be very hit or miss and unfortunately the emotional scenes suffer from this fact the most.

One scene in particular falls completely flat towards the end of the film. It's supposed to be this big emotional moment between Kent and Dan's granddaughter Wenonah (Roseanne Supernault), but the scene doesn't have nearly the impact it needs.

Nothing personal against the woman in this role, but her performance just doesn't have the weight to pull off such a pivotal scene.

The other problem I have with this film is that it can be plain boring at times.

It's one thing to be slow and

meticulous, but this movie gets downright dull towards the end.

It's a shame too, because this film does have a good message and an interesting story to tell about reservation life, despite the boring parts.

This film definitely isn't one to take young children to, I can tell you that much. Not only will kids be bored out of their minds, but there's enough four letter words in this movie to give it at least a PG-13 rating even though the film isn't officially rated.

Honestly, I hate to be too hard on this movie. I am glad I saw it, it's just a shame the performances weren't more compelling.

Check it out yourself if you want. You may have a bit of a hard time finding a theater playing it though. As I'm writing this, the only location I can find in Oklahoma with showings is the Harkins Bricktown. It may just be worth the trip though if the subject matter interests you.

I guess the performances are fine. Hayek and Lithgow take on their respected roles with enough conviction to make their performances believable.

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## PRO grilling tips for summer barbecues

tion (FDA) found that only 24 percent of the public uses a food thermometer when cooking hamburgers and only 42 percent do so when cooking chicken.

You can prevent and avoid foodborne illness this summer by following these three easy steps when cooking meat or poultry on the grill:

P—Place the Thermometer!

When you think your food is cooked, check the internal temperature by inserting the thermometer into the thickest

clue (the state flag of Oklahoma). This will activate an augmented reality experience revealing the second clue, which they will then find and scan.

This process continues until a participant solves all the clues. Clues are spread throughout the Cleveland and McClain County area including the towns of Moore, Norman, Noble, Purcell, Lexington and south Oklahoma City.

In conjunction with app clues, video episodes of Folk Secrets will air at 10 a.m. each Friday from June 30 to September 1 on [facebook.com/folksecrets](https://www.facebook.com/folksecrets) (and FolkSecrets.com).

The video episodes provide background on the treasure; where it came from, how it ties into our local history and hints to help solve the clues.

“This is an opportunity to get out and explore where

we live, learn about our history and help charity at the same time,” said Brent Wheelbarger, CEO of Trifecta Communications. “It’s also a local summertime adventure families can do together and maybe win cash.”

As an Oklahoma-based developer of emerging technologies including augmented and virtual reality, Trifecta Communications created the Folk Secrets project as an experiment in storytelling. By broadcasting live TV-style episodes on social media and allowing viewers to participate with an augmented reality app, Folk Secrets tells a story in an entirely new way.

Folk Secrets is a collabora-

tive effort between Cleveland/McClain county media outlets including Moore Monthly, Norman Transcript, Moore American and **The Purcell Register**.

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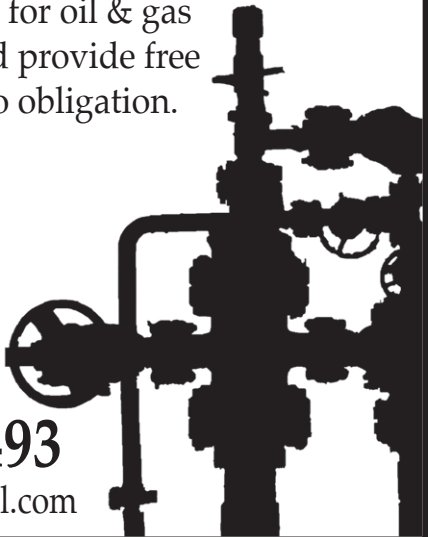
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## Youth EBT deadline extended

Families with children who receive free or reduced school meals are eligible for free food this summer through a program offered by the Chickasaw Nation.

Chickasaw Nation Nutrition Services has extended the application deadline to July 1 for the summer Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) for children program, which aims to enhance children’s nutrition by compensating for the lack of school meals during the summer months.

Qualifying families will receive approximately \$30 of food per child, per month for the three summer months.

This federally-funded program is open to the public and is in its fifth year of operation. Last year, the program served over 23,000 students.

Program officials said only half of all eligible families tend to apply, though funding is planned to cover everyone who is eligible. This program does not overlap with any other program in the area and will not disqualify a family from any other benefit.

To qualify for this program, a child must be enrolled in a participating school district in grades Pre-K–12 and receive free or reduced meals at school. Qualifying school districts are within the Chickasaw Nation and parts of the Choctaw Nation.

Once approved, families will receive Summer EBT cards

**Powers:**

"There were probably 40 to 50 of us there at the same time," he said. "We went to Leon, Nicaragua."

The Purcell church members left on a Friday night, arriving at Leon around 1 p.m. that Saturday.

They stayed one week, making friends, changing lives, saving souls and left the following Saturday in the morning.

During just one week, Powers said 630 "gave their lives to the Lord."

"I cried," he said of the souls saved. "And there were a lot who didn't want to be Christian, but they wanted you to pray over them."

Although he doesn't speak Spanish, the language difference was never a barrier.

God likely saw to that.

The Voice of Hope, an ongoing mission in country, provided interpreters when an open smile and an inviting handshake wasn't communication enough.

Though very poor - most

people lived in primitive conditions. Crude shacks and dirt floors.

Still the people are proud. "They are clean," Powers said. "Their kids are clean."

One resident he met was a local woman who has worked for years with Voice of Hope.

She lived in a single room in a rural area and had prayed for years for a house.

A previous mission team started the work that was finished by the Purcell team.

The woman's new home

was 18-by-20-1/2 feet with concrete block walls, a metal roof, two windows and two doors, and a poured concrete floor.

The team also wired the house with four electrical plugs and an overhead light.

Then they took up a collection to buy furniture for her new abode.

"It was more than I thought," Powers said. "Just to see the people give their lives to the Lord makes me want to be a better Christian."

Moxley began trying to contact Allen without success. Then on June 12, Moxley saw a post on Facebook from Allen's son seeking information about his father's whereabouts because family members hadn't been able to locate him.

Moxley contacted the son and together they returned to the property where the son discovered his father's body.

Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation Special Agents David Gatlin and Josh Dean found Lowe and Thacker in Oklahoma City later that day.

Lowe reportedly told the agents that she was Allen's caregiver and they lived together, but she was in love with Thacker. She said she wanted to steal Allen's pickup so she and Thacker could drive to California to see her family.

According to the affidavit, Thacker went to the mobile home on June 8 and told Lowe to take the dogs outside.

Lowe said she was outside when she heard a gunshot. When she went back inside, the house was empty and there was blood on the floor.

Lowe told the agents Thacker came back inside, wiped up the blood and then drove to a Walmart in Oklahoma City where they left Allen's pickup.

When questioned by agents, Thacker said he briefly lived with Allen and Lowe for about a week four or five months ago.

During that time, he and Lowe had a sexual relationship, but he said he hadn't seen her since.

Lowe reportedly told Thacker's stepfather on June 12 that Allen was missing.

However, according to the affidavit, Thacker later told him Allen wasn't missing, but that Lowe had shot him.

# Rep. Cleveland receives Minuteman Legislator Award

State Rep. Bobby Cleveland this week received the Minuteman Legislator of the Year Award, given by the Oklahoma 2nd Amendment Association.

The award is given “in the highest recognition of the legislator who aggressively defends the God-given right of the individual to self-preservation and who advances significant legislation to restore the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms.”

“It is an honor to support the Second Amendment,” said Cleveland, R-Slaughterville. “I am a staunch believer in an American’s right to keep and bear arms, and I was thrilled to see Gov. Mary Fallin sign the legislation I authored this session to protect that right.”

During the 2017 legislative session, Cleveland authored House Bill 1104, which allows licensed elected county officials to carry firearms inside their own courthouses.

He was also the coauthor of Senate Bill 40; the measure allows citizens to legally point a firearm in self defense at an intruder. Currently, individuals may be charged with a felony for doing so.

The Oklahoma 2nd Amendment Association maintains a daily presence at the state

Capitol during the legislative session, bringing together legislators, attorneys, law professors and Second Amendment experts to craft public policy.

The group also provides

research to legislators and seeks to educate lawmakers, the public and the media on the nation’s founders’ intent concerning the Second Amendment.

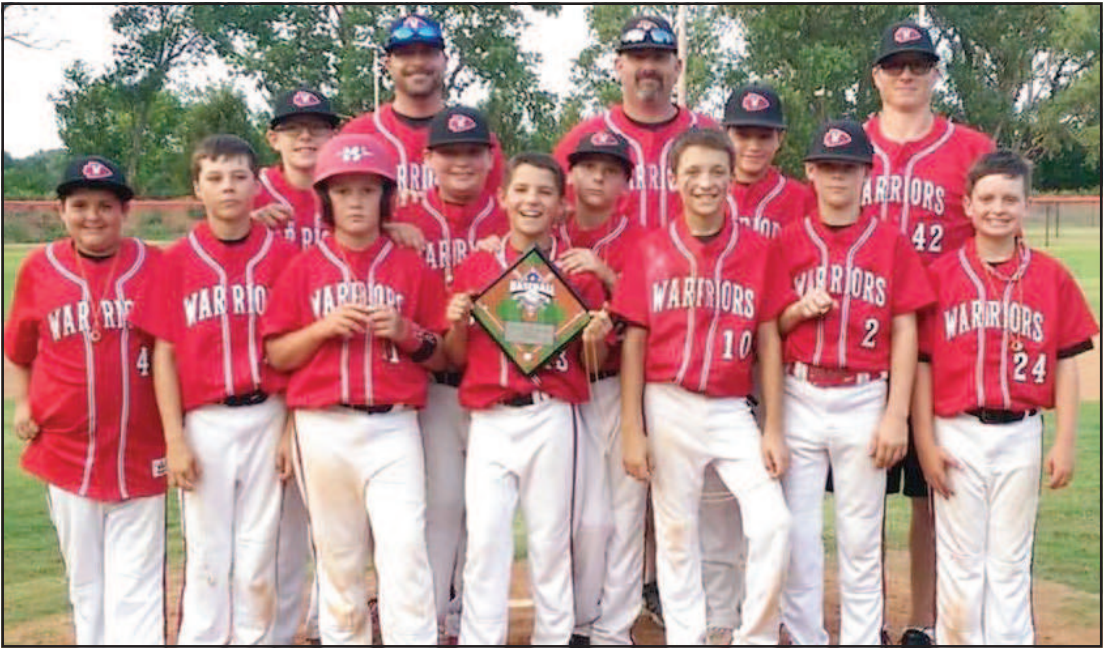

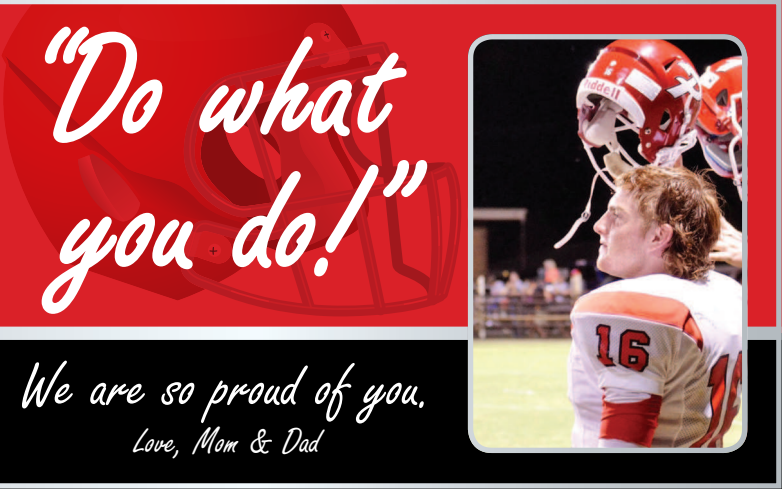

A PROCLAMATION OF THE MAYOR OF THE TOWN OF GOLDSBY, OKLAHOMA DECLARING THAT AN EMERGENCY EXISTS BY REASON OF INADEQUATE WATER SUPPLY AND ORDERING TEMPORARY RESTRICTIONS ON THE USE OF WATER FROM THE MUNICIPAL WATER SYSTEM WHEREAS, the Mayor of the Town of Goldsby has determined from evidence presented to her by the operators of the municipal water system that the Municipal Water System will become unable to supply the commercial and domestic need of the users thereof, including adequate fire protection; if usage continues at present volumes; and

WHEREAS, it appears that continued usage at present volumes creates an immediate threat to public health or safety; and  
WHEREAS, it appears that the immediate threat to public health and safety can be mitigated by reasonable temporary restrictions on the use of water from the municipal water system;  
NOW, THEREFORE, I, Cindy Andrews, Mayor of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, do hereby:  
1. Proclaim and declare that an emergency exists whereby the municipal water system is unable to supply the commercial and domestic need of the users thereof, including adequate fire protection; if usage continues at present volumes.  
2. Proclaim and declare that the emergency so reduces the availability of water and water pressure as to create an immediate threat to public health and safety if usage continues at present volumes.  
3. Call upon all customers and users of the municipal water system to reduce water usage by following sound water conservation measures and practices.  
4. Order that, except as specifically allowed in Section 4.f. and 4.g. below, use of water from the municipal water system shall be restricted by prohibiting the following uses not essential to public health and safety:

- a. Watering lawns or grounds by use of any water from the municipal water system;
- b. Outdoor landscape watering or irrigation by use of any water from the municipal water system; provided that this prohibition does not apply to containerized plants and commercial plant stock in trade;
- c. Hosing or washing sidewalks, driveways, parking areas, other paved surfaces by use of any water from the municipal water system;
- d. Hosing or washing down the exteriors of buildings by use of any water from the municipal water system;
- e. Filling or refilling a swimming pool, pond or fountain by use of any water from the municipal water system; provided that:
- f. On even numbered calendar days between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. and again between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. the foregoing prohibitions do not apply to properties having a street address ending in an even number, and
- g. On odd numbered calendar days between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. and again between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. the foregoing prohibitions do not apply to properties having a street address ending in an odd number.

5. Order that this proclamation be posted in ten (10) prominent public places within the Town of Goldsby and that telephonic notice of this proclamation be given though the municipal emergency and nonemergency mass notification call out system.  
6. Proclaim that the foregoing orders shall be in full force and effect immediately upon the posting of notice and implementation of telephonic notice through the municipal emergency and non-emergency mass notification call out system.  
7. Order that this Proclamation be published in a newspaper of general circulation.  
8. Proclaim that the Code Compliance Officer of the Town is hereby authorized and directed to enforce this Proclamation.  
9. Give notice that each violation of Goldsby's Water Shortages ordinance is an offense punishable by fine as set forth in the Water Shortages ordinance.

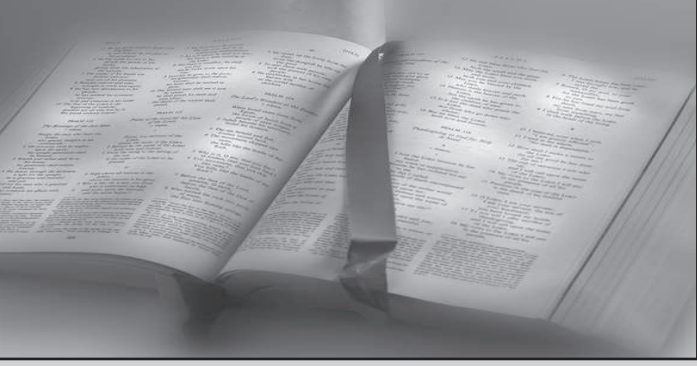

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

One cold February afternoon, a young doctor, still in residency, was driving behind a Bronco SUV that suddenly slammed into a pickup truck. While the driver of the Bronco was not hurt, the driver of the pickup was trapped in his vehicle. He was unconscious and not breathing - and reeking of alcohol.

The doctor knew he had to do something to open the man's air passage or he would die - but, without knowing the extent of the man's neck injuries, to move him could result in paralyzing him. Aware that he risked a lawsuit that could end his career, the doctor decided to save the drunk driver's life. The man survived and fully recovered.

A few days later, the resident told one of his senior professors the story. The professor peered over his glasses and his eyes narrowed. "Well, you did the right thing medically of course. But, James, do you know what you put at risk by doing that?" he said sternly.

"What was I supposed to do?" the young doctor asked. "Drive on," his professor replied. "There is an army of lawyers out there who would stand in line to get a case like that. If that driver had turned out to be a quadriplegic, you might never have practiced medicine again. You were a very lucky man."

The young doctor, now practicing rehabilitation medicine in New York, reflects:

"The day I graduated from medical school, I took an oath to serve the sick and injured. I remember truly believing I would be able to do just that.

But I have found out it isn't so simple. I understand now what a foolish thing I did that day. Despite my oath, I know what I would do on that cold roadside near Gettysburg today. I would drive on."

While our hearts and spirits yearn to do what is right and good, any number of circumstances compels us to think twice about the consequences of our involvement - and then to shrug our shoulders and walk away.

Three times in today's Gospel, however, Jesus tells his disciples not to be afraid, that we have nothing to fear before God who has proven his love and acceptance of us unreservedly. Fear is most destructive when it chokes us off from creating or accomplishing what is right, - but the realization that we have nothing to fear from any person, group or institution is the ultimate liberation and empowerment. We become faithful disciples of the Gospel Jesus by "fearing" nothing but God. We become faithful disciples of the Gospel Jesus by being concerned only in seeking God's will in all things do.

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus encourages his disciples to be open and courageous in their preaching of the Gospel. The disciple who faithfully proclaims the Gospel will likely be denounced, ridiculed and abused; but Jesus assures his followers that they have nothing to fear from those who can deprive "the body of life." Their perseverance and courage in proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus will be rewarded in heaven.

We have a dog who had been previously abused. He has been with us for five years in what can be termed "doggie heaven." He has absolutely no reason to be afraid at our house. Yet, at times, when we stand up too quickly or raise our voices, he cowers with ears back and eyes appearing fearful. The reason for his fear is long gone but he continues to carry it within him.

I think many of us are like our fearful dog. We carry within us a past event which made us fearful. The person or the event are gone but the fear remains.

Fear can be paralyzing. It can stop us from doing what we want to do or trying something new. Jesus says "do not fear."

Asking Jesus to remove our fear or anxiety may involve getting counseling to better understand our fear. The same Jesus who tells us not to fear, will give us the courage to seek counseling to better understand our fear and our anxiety. Jesus does not want us to be miserable. Seek his guidance to help get at the root of our fear and get rid of it.

Lord, help us to find the happiness you promise us when we follow you. Give us the courage to understand the fears that hold us back. Guide us and lead us to learn how to let go of our fears and anxieties. Amen.

Really, they are “immovable.” It doesn’t matter the rank of the officer or the size of the warship, the lighthouse is not going to move to accommodate a ship. Ships must alter their course, adjust their direction, change their purpose in relationship to the lighthouse.

We get the point. There are some principles, some standards, some morals that must set as immovable lighthouses in our lives. We cannot trust our lives to somebody standing on the shore waving a flashlight. We need lighthouses! We need tall, steady, dependable, life-directing lights to guide us, to keep our ships from washing violently into the rocky shoals of the shore.

I wonder: Do you have such lighthouses today? Have you

located – and do you continue to locate – lighthouses to guide you along?

I know this: As a father and a grandfather, I want my children and my grandchildren to learn the importance of these lighthouses and then to spend their young lives and their adult lives locating them – and not only locating them but using them to guide them all along the way.

The key here is not that you feel you have such unchanging principles already firmly established in your life. I want you to understand that. They key is probably the opposite: You understand that you do not have those principles established as you need and want them; and you are willing to work toward building something worthwhile and long-lasting to guide your ship through choppy water on dark, foggy nights.

There are a good many lighthouses we need to locate, and we’ll look forward to identifying them from time to time as we visit here on the “front porch.” Until then, God bless you in your work and studies.

If you have not asked us to review your claims folder in the last 12 months, please consider bringing it by. Many times, we can reevaluate a service-connected disability to help you receive an increased rating.

For veterans who served in Vietnam, many diseases are presumptive to service in that country. Veterans diagnosed with some of them could receive VA compensation and health benefits. Another list of presumptive disabilities is available for those who served in the Gulf Wars. For those who served in either war, please

note the VA has a registry that could be useful in diagnosing the presumptive conditions. We have these registry applications available with us each Tuesday and Thursday.

We want the work of our organization to continue to grow and to serve veterans and surviving spouses in the future. To do so, our Board of Directors has brought in an executive director that will develop a plan to keep our program going after we meet our makers. Today I would like to introduce each of you to Lora Malone who has agreed to lead us forward. She has an extensive background in leadership in the 501(c)(3) community. Lora will be out and about visiting in our town with her message on who we are and what we do. For those of you who have questions, Lora can be reached at (405) 742-8079.

We have lots of good news to share with our readers today about our upcoming move to 1268 North Interstate Drive in the Robinson Crossing Shopping Center of Norman. Last week I spoke with Landon Gum and Amber Armstrong who work at Norman City Hall about the applications to add two restrooms to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act, handicapped Accessible. Our permits should be ready this week with the work starting soon afterward.

We are currently seeking bids for the plumbing required for these restrooms. One of our Texas veterans purchased two of the commodes we need through his local Lowe’s store for us to pick up at the Norman location. Howard McMahan of Waters Electric stopped by to offer their services to add the electrical services that will be needed. As a veteran himself, he said that there would be no labor charge for his fellow veterans. We will need to provide the material for this project. If any of you would like to help with the items needed, we will have an itemized list very soon for the electrical needs.

As we move forward with our plans to improve our services, there will be a need to add volunteers to our staff at the new location. A background check is required of everyone who joins our team. Applications are available on our website and also at the front desk on Tuesday and Thursday mornings.

Last week we assisted another 220 veterans and surviving spouses with their applications for VA benefits. Seventeen surviving spouses were assisted with their applications for VA benefits. They were applying for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance based on their spouse’s military service.

Surviving spouses may be eligible for the DIC benefit if the veteran dies from a service-connected condition or one that is presumptive to their military service. The Pension Benefit is based on when the veteran served and the spouse’s income. If you need transportation to see us, please phone (405) 550-8806 extension 105.

Our drivers Clayton and Louie logged 62 hours driving 1,002 miles transporting 16

folks last week.

As the Accredited Claims Agent for more than 15,000 veterans and spouses, I received the following rating decisions from VA. Seven veterans were awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. These veterans will receive a combined annual payment of \$447,496 per year. Twenty-one veterans received rating decisions ranging from 10-90 percent. They will receive a combined income of \$254,735 annually. One surviving spouse received DIC and will receive an annual combined amount \$15,095 a year.

I don’t know how long it will take us to help every veteran and surviving spouse in Cleveland County, but we are working on it. There is an average of 15-20 each week from just the Norman area. Personally, I believe that every person who served in the military should consider applying for VA benefits.

It appears that the VA is on the right track to be more responsive to the needs of the men and women who have served in our military. I do know that one of the most common problems was the inability to reach VA at the 1-800-827-1000. Where it did sometimes take days to contact them with a question they are now answering the phone in just a few rings. Maybe not the biggest fix, but certainly one worth mentioning. On the claims side, the VA decision-making process has certainly gotten much faster. We are now seeing many claims worked in a couple of months when a few years ago it would take VA a year or more to make a decision.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

# The brothers Gullion

Military service was a family tradition for three of four Purcell brothers

The Gullion family of Purcell is well represented in the military world.

Three of four brothers served on active duty and are listed on the Veterans Memorial on West Main Street.

Harvey and Paul were in the Navy; John was Army.

Harvey Gullion served from 1964-68.

Following basic training at San Diego, Calif., he received training to be a ship fitter and was assigned shore duty at the Command Fleet Activities Facility at Sasebo, Japan.

His duties there were in support of the Navy's 7th Fleet which was participating in the Vietnam conflict.

From Sasebo, Harvey transferred to the wooden hulled USS Enhance, a minesweeper performing dangerous coastal patrol duties in the Gulf of Tonkin during the war.

His last assignment was shore duty at the Long Beach Naval Shipyard where he was discharged in 1968 with the rank of Petty Officer 2nd Class.

John Gullion was a career soldier serving between 1966 and 1987.

He was initially ordered to be inducted into the Army in 1966, but enlisted before that in order to have a bet-

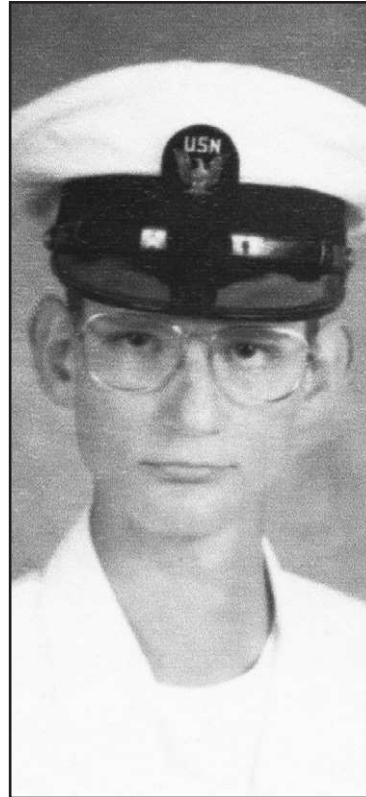
ter choice in training and assignment.

John opted to serve in military intelligence.

He completed his basic training at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., and that was followed by advance training as an intelligence analyst at the Army Security Agency Training Regiment at Ft. Devens, Mass.

He also received additional training at the National Security Agency at Ft. Meade, Md.

John's first duty station in 1967 was to Chitose, Japan. He transferred to Pleiku,

Vietnam in 1968.

In Vietnam, he was involved in supporting counter offensive operations during the infamous Tet Offensive.

He was awarded six campaign stars (also known as battle stars), as well as two Meritorious Unit Citations and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Palm.

After Vietnam, John returned to Oklahoma where he served in an inactive role for a time.

He returned to active duty and Japan in 1971. Initially sent to Hakata, he

was transferred to Okinawa when Hakata was marked for closure.

John returned to Ft. Meade in 1974, serving at NSA.

In 1977, he left the NSA for a post supporting the 7th Army Corps in Ludwigsburg, Germany.

The Army next sent him to Goodfellow Air Force Base near San Angelo, Texas, in 1980. He served there as a master instructor in his career field, helping train hundreds of new analysts in both the Air Force and Army.

His last move was in 1984

when he was assigned to an advisory role to the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Intelligence at Headquarters U.S. Army Europe/7th U.S. Army at Campbell Barracks in Heidelberg, Germany.

He was recommended in 1987 for promotion to master sergeant as Operations NCO-in-Charge of a newly formed military intelligence group at Ft. Monmouth, N.J.

But he declined the promotion and assignment, retiring with the rank of sergeant first class.

Paul Gullion served in the Navy from 1973-75.

He completed basic training at San Diego, followed by advance training at the Treasure Island Naval Training Center near San Francisco.

Training there was as an electronics technician, as well as fire fighting and damage control procedures and methods.

He was then assigned for sea duty aboard the USS Edsen, a destroyer escort.

The Edsen was assigned to a duty station in the Gulf of Tonkin where Paul assisted in the ship's participation in the evacuation of Vietnamese nationals fleeing the collapse of South Vietnam in 1975.

Paul was discharged from the Navy soon afterwards.

# World War II MP

## Hughes Hottel served in 87th Infantry Division

When the Army activated the 87th Infantry Division on Dec. 15, 1942, among its members was longtime Purcell resident Hughes Hottel.

Hottel served in the military police platoon.

Training for two years in various cities in the U.S. covered the range of controlling race riots in Detroit to traffic patrol in Mississippi and Tennessee.

On Oct. 1, 1944, the platoon got

orders for overseas duty where the MP's were to establish traffic control for the division as it advanced across Europe, as well as process all prisoners of war captured by the regiments.

The division suffered heavy losses during the war, including 1,310 killed in action and 4,000 more wounded.

Hottel remained with the division until it returned to the States and was deactivated.

# Home is the sailor

## Wesley Maxwell served aboard aircraft carriers

For Wesley "Wes" Maxwell, Purcell now is home.

But during the Korean War in 1951, Maxwell enlisted in the Navy at Indianapolis, Ind. He went through basic training at San Diego, Calif., and in October 1951 he was sent to Great Lakes Naval Station near Chicago.

There he trained in the operation and maintenance of ship's boilers and in February 1952, graduated as a boiler technician.

The Navy subsequently sent Maxwell to Norfolk Naval Station, Va., where he was assigned to the aircraft carrier USS Coral Sea.

The carrier has been undergoing extensive refitting at Norfolk.

Maxwell stayed with the Coral Sea for three cruises between 1952-64. The ship put into multiple ports in the Atlantic and Mediterranean, including layovers in Cuba, Gibraltar, Portugal, Spain, France, Italy, Sicily and Yugoslavia.

In 1954, Maxwell was transferred to the aircraft carrier USS Hornet, which was to set out on a world-wide cruise.

Maxwell sailed around the world aboard the Hornet and crossed the equator into the southern hemisphere.

The globe-circling voyage began in Norfolk and crossed the North Atlantic into the Mediterranean before passing through the Suez Canal to the Indian Ocean.

There he sailed to Hong Kong, Manila in the Philippines and Yokosuka, Japan.

For a time, the Hornet conducted air operations in the Sea of Japan in support of combat operations in the Korean War.

The Hornet's aircraft were credited with shooting down three MIG-15 fighters.

The carrier continued to Hawaii and then San Francisco before making port at San Diego where Maxwell was honorably discharged.

During his enlistment, Maxwell received the China Service Medal, Navy Occupation Service Medal, National Defense Service Medal and Navy Good Conduct Medal.

It was not Maxwell's only time spent in uniform, however.

In 1980, he served in the Indiana National Guard where he held the rank of sergeant first class.

# Capt. Tom McCurdy

Infantry to Army investigator chasing AWOL GI's

Among the veterans answering **The Purcell Register's** call to share their military experiences was Tom McCurdy.

Here is what he wrote:

"My name is Tom McCurdy and I received my Army commission in May 1962 following my 4-year participation in ROTC at the University of Oklahoma.

"I entered active duty at Ft. Benning, Ga., in July 1962 as a second lieutenant and went through the infantry basic training.

"The most eventful training was 'escape and evasion' maneuver that began at midnight.

"My company had to complete the 10-mile 'escape' through a jungle-type course and not allow 'the guards' to catch us.

"We had to dodge police dogs, spotlights, try to conceal ourselves in the

trees, creeks and undergrowth areas. I could reflect back on my experiences at Walnut Creek growing up in Purcell and it sure helped – especially my Dad's hint about putting mud on my face to escape the bugs!

"Following my Ft. Benning assignment, I was sent to Ft. Holabird in Baltimore where I became an Army investigator. And while I was there, I had the opportunity to play basketball for the Holabird team. That was fun and we won the League championship.

"I have to say I missed the Oklahoma winters. Nothing here compared to the deep snow/blizzards there in Baltimore.

"I was then sent to Ft. Sill in Lawton and my commanding officer was Col. Greaser. I was a first lieutenant by then and when he retired some months later, I became the commanding officer.

"I was head of the unit when President Kennedy was killed in 1963.

"My personal duties/assignments were to chase Army GI's who were AWOL (absent without leave) and had security clearances in their classified missile units. I also worked closely with the military police and CID (Criminal Investigation Command) members in a variety of investigations.

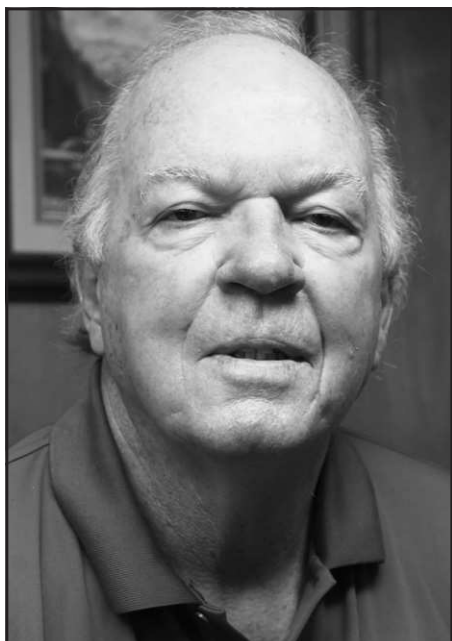
"After my active duty ended in July 1964, I became a member in the Army Reserves and my unit was the 4003rd Headquarters Company in Ardmore. It was there that I was promoted to captain."

# Dedicated to service

Purcell native Alva Pace's Army career spans tumultuous decades

Before the Army became his career, Alva L. Pace was growing up in Purcell.

Pace, who would attain the rank of lieutenant colonel, entered Oklahoma State University in August 1977.

He accepted an Army ROTC scholarship and was a Distinguished Military Graduate. While in college, he completed Airborne and Air-Assault training and graduated with a bachelor's degree in business administration and a minor in military science.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in July 1981, after which he attended Infantry Officer Basic Course and Flight School with an Aeroscout qualification.

In March 1983, Pace reported to Camp Humphreys, Korea and the 201st Assault Helicopter Company as a section leader. Eleven months

later he returned to Ft. Rucker, Ala., for the CH-47 Qualification Course and then to the 14th Combat Aviation Battalion at Ft. Sill.

His duties at the Oklahoma post included platoon leader in B Company, 2nd Battalion, 179th Aviation Regiment. He would also serve as the battalion's S3 training officer and flight operations officer.

In December 1986, he attended the Aviation Officer Advanced Course, returning to Korea and an assignment to the 271st Aviation Company (Assault Support Helicopter).

While there, he held the positions of executive and operations officer.

In July 1988, the Army sent Pace to Ft. Hood, Texas, where he served as Squadron S1 to the 1st Squadron, 6th Cavalry Regiment, 6th Cavalry Brigade.

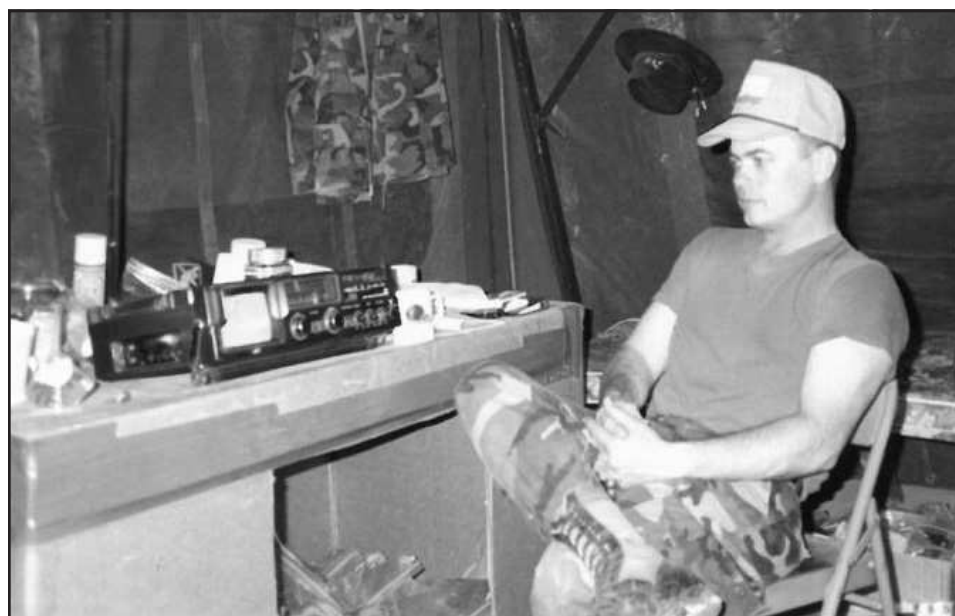
He attended the Combined Arms Services Staff School in January 1989, returning to B Company, 2nd Battalion, 158th Aviation Regiment as a platoon leader.

He assumed command of the regiment's Headquarters and Headquarters Company on Nov. 15, 1989 and deployed with that unit to Saudi Arabia and Kuwait during the Persian Gulf War.

In August 1991, Pace relinquished that command to become the 6th Cavalry Brigade's operations officer.

From there he assumed command of A Company, 5th Battalion, 159th Aviation Regiment "Big Windy," followed by S3 of the 5th Battalion, 158th Aviation Regiment.

During this time, he went to school

nights, earning a master's degree in human relations from the University of Oklahoma. He was then selected to attend the Air Command and Staff Course and later the Air War College at Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery, Ala.

Pace was assigned to Special Operations Command Atlantic Command in July 1996. During his assignment there he attended the Armed Forces Staff College and deployed as the lead for a "Partnership for Peace" exercise in Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, and Kirgizstan.

He was reassigned to the Pentagon in 1999 as the Army's aviation personnel staff officer and was instrumental in the Vice Chief of Staff's Aviation Transformation Task Force and the fielding of seven AH-64D Longbow battalions.

Pace survived the attack on the Pentagon on Sept. 11, 2001, where he lost 26 coworkers and his boss.

In June 2002, he was assigned to the Defense Supply Center Richmond as the Army division chief.

Pace married Joanne Houff in October of that year and has two boys, Alexander and William.

His military awards include the Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with three oak leaf clusters, Air Medal, Army Commendation Medal with one oak leaf cluster, Joint Services Achievement Medal, Army Achievement Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, Overseas Service Ribbon, Kuwait Liberation Medal, Senior Army Aviator Badge, Parachutist Badge, Air Assault Badge and Air Force Command Award for Valor.

# Join Navy to see world

... unless you are at sea in a submarine

The year was 1971 and the draft was still something to be reckoned with, even more so when the government made it a lottery based on birthdates.

"I figured that was the only lottery I would win," Stull recalled.

If he were drafted, the greatest chance was he would wind up in the infantry.

"Somebody to be shot at," he put it.

So to avoid the draft and the lottery, Stull enlisted – in the Navy.

"I figured the Navy was better odds (of surviving)," he said. "I am considered a Vietnam veteran, but I never went to Vietnam."

Stull opted for submarines since he wanted training in electronics and that was the only way the Navy would guarantee he got that training.

He did his basic training in Orlando, Fla., and was then sent to Damneck, Va.

Next stop was Groton, Conn., for submarine school, followed by fire body school at Newport, R.I.

He was assigned to a submarine tender and sent to Holy Loch, Scotland, for 18 months.

## Commendation

On his return to Groton, he joined the USS Stonewall Jackson, a ballistic submarine.

"We hid under the ocean," Stull said. "Our patrols were a little over 50 days followed by a 5-day turnover. I did five patrols on the Stonewall Jackson."

"We were always in the Atlantic. We were supposed to stay hidden so we could launch missiles."

Things could be tense during the Cold War, but Stull recalls no close calls for the Stonewall Jackson.

The thing about submarines is there

are no visible landmarks. Well, nothing visible outside the sub when it is submerged really.

Most sailors never know where in the ocean they are. That information is classified.

"I knew more about where we were," Stull said, referring to his work in the navigation center.

With his Navy electronics training, Stull worked with the first computers – "a big 4K of memory, teletypes input and output."

Stull never felt closed in on a sub-

marine.

In fact, he "never thought I was claustrophobic until they put me in an MRI."

Then the Navy made him an instructor for the next three years.

Although he grew up in the Dallas area, Stull now lives on property east of Lexington that his great-grandmother, Emma Claunch, settled on in the 1889 land run. She later married Josiah Stull.

Forty-six years have passed since Stull enlisted in the Navy. He's glad he went and "probably would do it again."

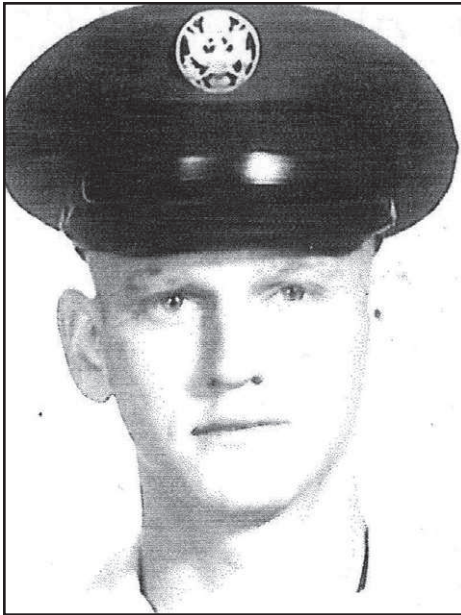

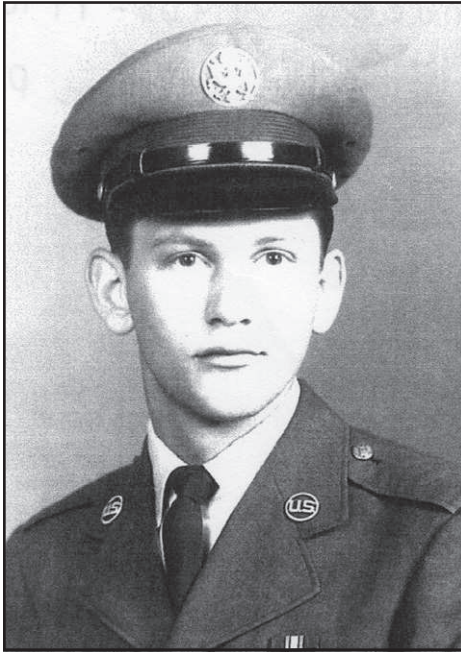

# Korea memories

A man's journey from farmer to cannoneer

Bill and Ada Ince had barely settled into married life when the notice came in the mail.

"They drafted me," Ince said. "We were married one year and eight months."

The Maysville native was a farmer and was working at a service station when the notice arrived.

"We were just renting at the time," Ada said. "I moved in with my parents."

The Army sent Ince to Ft. Bliss, Texas, for basic training in the field

artillery.

"I was on a 105mm howitzer in the field artillery," he said.

After six months of school that included leadership training, the Army packed Ince off to Korea for 14-1/2 months.

It was April, 1953.

"He'd just spent my birthday with me and then they sent him to Tacoma, Wash.," Ada recalled. "A lot of boys went at that time from Maysville and Lindsay."

"I was barely 19 when I married and turned 21 in the Army," Ince said.

Ince recalls the rugged conditions

that faced soldiers in Korea.

"It was cold; it got down to 47 below," he said. "There was a lot of running and hiding and a lot of shooting."

The rule was if you were fired on for three consecutive days, you received a month's combat pay.

"I got three months combat pay," he added.

Ince's first job on the howitzer crew was to cut the powder bags. He later was made gunner and then chief of section.

It was six months before his pay records caught up with him. During that time, he went without pay and borrowed \$20 from his lieutenant.

The officer was later killed by enemy shelling while the two were in a gun pit with other GI's.

"The good Lord said, 'Run, it's fix-ing to blow up,'" Ince said. "I ran and he didn't. I didn't get hurt and they picked him up in a basket. I lost 13 friends that one time. How did I know that gun pit was going to blow up?"

Ince was awarded the Bronze Star in Korea.

Meanwhile, back home Ada was working at the Ben Franklin store in Lindsay. She would later work 15 years for TG&Y in Oklahoma City.

An uncle, a 20-year man, tried to talk Ince into staying in the Army.

"I kind of wanted to stay in, but I didn't want to leave the country anymore," Ince said. "I was getting \$150 a month and she was getting \$150 a month."

"The oil field was paying about \$240

a month take home.

Ince took a job hauling drilling mud.

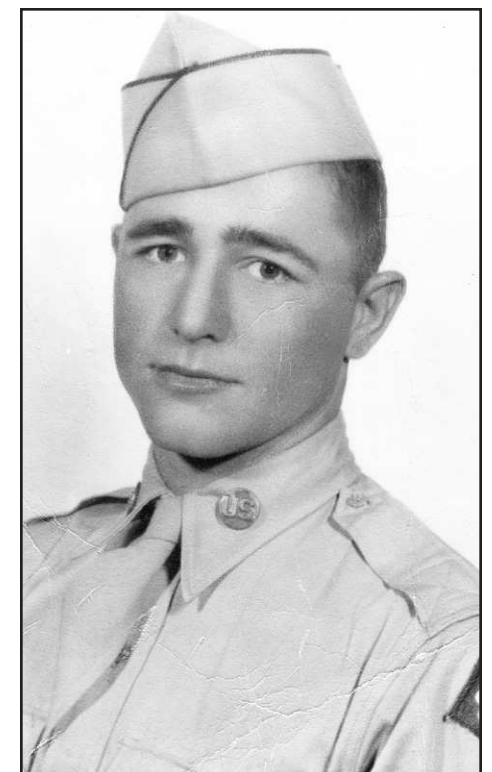
He left the oil patch in 1965 and took a job at Tinker Air Force Base working on KC-135 tankers. That turned into a 20-year career during which the Inces lived at McLoud and Harrah.

Ince retired from Tinker in 1984 and in September 2012, the couple moved to Purcell to be near his sister who lived at Lexington.

"We're enjoying retirement now," he said.

Ince recommends the military and is glad he served.

"I'd say for a young guy, it makes a man out of him and helps him grow up. It helped me grow up," he said.

# ‘It was like infantry in the Air Force’

David Scott reflects on 20-year career in USAF security forces

David Scott comes from a military family.

His father was in the Navy during World War II and he has uncles who served in Korea.

So when the United States found itself in yet another war in Vietnam,

it just seemed it was his time to continue the family tradition.

He was growing up in DeKalb, Ill. “I tried to drop out of school to enlist and go to Vietnam,” he said.

After all, his father was just 18 when he fought in the Battle of Okinawa.

But perhaps it was just that experience that kept his father from ap-

proving Scott’s plans to skip finishing high school and go off to war.

Once he graduated, though, Scott’s determination to enlist hadn’t waned.

In fact, the Army rejected him – not once, but five times – because of high blood pressure.

When he and a buddy tried and failed to find a place in the Coast

Guard, Scott found the Air Force recruiter was more receptive. It was August 1973.

For the next 20 years, the Air Force was home.

Scott was assigned to the security forces which turned out to be the next best thing to the Army.

“We were like the infantry of the Air Force,” he said.

His first assignment was to Minot Air Force Base in Minot, N.D., the home of the Strategic Air Command.

Scott held a secret clearance.

Next, he volunteered for an assignment in southeast Asia, close to Communist Laos. There he did aircraft security and helped defuse a hostage situation.

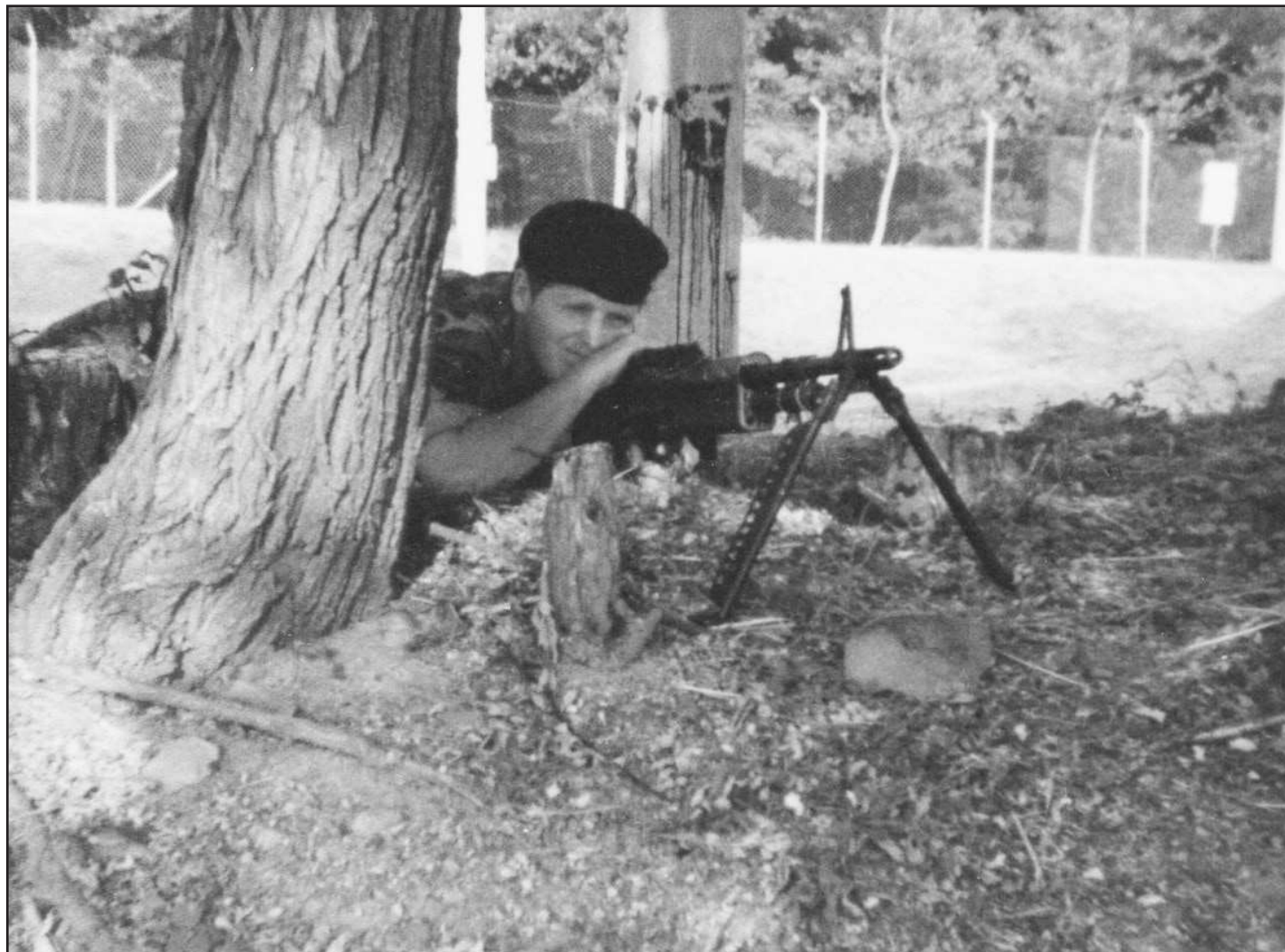
It was the height of the Cold War and there were flare ups or what Scott calls “secret wars” in Laos, Cambodia and Thailand.

By the fall of 1989, Scott was Delta flight chief stationed at Lajes Field in the Azores.

One night close to midnight, a C5A Galaxy landed at the field. Scott contacted the pilot to determine the cargo on board, expecting it would be nuclear weapons being removed from Europe.

Instead the pilot referred him to a Marine guard who directed his attention to the actual cargo – Marine One, the presidential helicopter.

“It was the first time I saw a helicopter that polished,” Scott recalled.

After the brief stopover at Lajes, the plane continued to Malta. Vice President George H.W. Bush was already there to meet with Soviet president Mikhail Gorbachev.

"Within a month, the Berlin Wall fell," Scott said.

He still vividly recalls his own small part in ending the Cold War.

"I'm a footnote in history," he joked.

It was a different time in America then.

"Our friends acknowledged us. Our enemies feared us. Our word meant something," he said.

His final assignment was at Tinker Air Force Base. He retired on Sept. 1, 1993.

Scott had met his wife, Sue (Sung Mi) while stationed in Asia. When he retired from the Air Force after 20 years, she persuaded him to attend college. He received a degree from

Langston University.

He initially wanted to be a teacher, but switched his major to psychology.

"I use it here every day," Scott said of psychology.

Here is D&S Petro in Purcell.

He and Sue have owned the store for 19 years.

"It seems like yesterday or a year ago that we got it," he said.

The couple live in Moore and commute daily to the convenience store in Purcell.

Now they are contemplating a second retirement and the store is for sale.

Scott has two children. Angela is the business manager for Tyler Media in Oklahoma City. An adopted son, Andrew, is a chef at the Wynn Hotel in Las Vegas.

One grandson is a student at Rose State College in Midwest City and another wants to major in business.

# Go to war and it's all about the logistics

Graham Fishburn's experiences in the Global War on Terror are a tale of these times

For Purcell native Graham "Rocky" Fishburn, an Army career began in the ROTC program at the University of Oklahoma.

Fishburn, who majored in business marketing, received his commission as a second lieutenant in December 1995.

He began branch detailed to the infantry for 2-1/2 years and then moved into logistics.

His active duty career began at Ft. Benning, Ga.

He was then sent to Ft. Riley, Kans., where he was assigned a platoon leader for three years.

"After my four-year obligation was complete, I left active duty and joined the Reserves," he said.

He took a job working for Blue Bell in Broken Arrow and drilled with a civic affairs unit in Tulsa.

After almost two years in the Reserves, he got his first overseas assignment – 17 days to Sata Cano Air Base in Honduras.

A short time later he returned to active duty.

It was right after 9-11.

By then he was a captain and went to Ft. Lee, Va., for the logistics officer advanced course.

The Army then sent him to Stuttgart, Germany, where he was a company commander.

During his 3-year assignment to Germany, Fishburn was deployed for six months to Central Command at McDill Air Force Base, Fla.

From Germany, he moved to Blanchard and was assigned as active duty advisor to an Oklahoma City unit charged with evaluating National Guard and Reserve units across the region.

"I spent a lot of time at Ft. Sill," he said. "Our main mission was deploying National Guard and Reserve units to Iraq and Afghanistan. We trained the units before deployment."

Fishburn was promoted to major and after two years with the unit, he drew a one-year deployment to Kuwait where he was branch chief over services and supply operations in support of troops in both Iraq and Afghanistan.

"It was an extremely large operations," he said. "There was one warehouse that was 11 football fields long."

The warehouses were run by contractors.

"Our job was to make sure the contractors did the job ... effectively and efficiently. That the contractor wasn't spending money he didn't need to."

The success of that mission is found in the savings.

"We were able to decrease the contract by about \$85 million through restructuring organizations and contract negotiations.

"We looked out for the best interests of the U.S. government and American

taxpayers. It was a very difficult year, but rewarding as well."

On returning to the States, Fishburn attended the Command and General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth, Kans. There he finished his master's degree.

Next, he was sent to Baumholder, Germany for 1-1/2 years, followed by a return to Edmond.

He next deployed for one year to Afghanistan where he served on a security forces assistance team training the Afghan army and police to keep the peace and defend their own country.

About 40 served on Team XO, mentoring 500 police in Panjwai near Kandahar.

"We were embedded with the police and district governor," he said. "But it was a war zone and the government lacked the ability to collect revenue. They relied heavily on the U.S. Army."

"Our job was to make them as self sufficient as possible. They could be trained to do anything and were very good at security missions. They knew how to defeat the Taliban, but it was difficult to sustain themselves with equipment, fuel and vehicles."

"I think the Taliban will always be there. It will take generations to weed that ideology out of their society. ISIS is the new threat."

After a post-deployment period in Alaska, Fishburn returned to Ft. Leavenworth as a distance education instructor at the Command and General Staff College.

After almost 18 years active duty –

17 years, 11 months and 15 days, to be precise – Fishburn took the Army's offer of early retirement.

He returned to Purcell where he was appointed and then elected to a seat on the city council and public works authority.

He also used his GI Bill benefits to help pay for law school at OU. He graduated in May and will take the bar exam in July.

During law school, Fishburn worked for the district attorney's office in McClain County. He looks forward to continuing that.

"I like to support the police. It's what I did in the military – police and law enforcement, peace and order, governance. I really enjoy that."

"Criminal law itself is fascinating. I also like to see justice being served to help keep peace and order and see people turn over a new leaf and use the penal system for rehabilitation."

"I do my best to serve my community."

Fishburn married his now ex-wife, Deborah when he was at Ft. Benning.

They have six children.

The oldest, Jeron, was born at Ft. Riley.

Twins Faun and Georgia were born at Broken Arrow.

And triplets Manon, Pehrson and Johana were born while he was advising that Oklahoma City unit.

The children live in Phoenix, but spend summers with their father in Purcell.

The oldest, Jeron, has expressed an interest in the military.

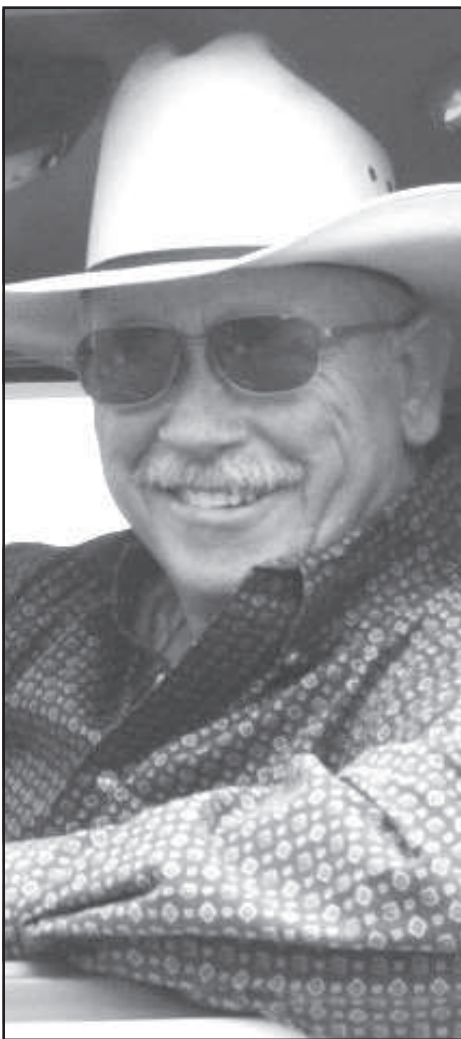

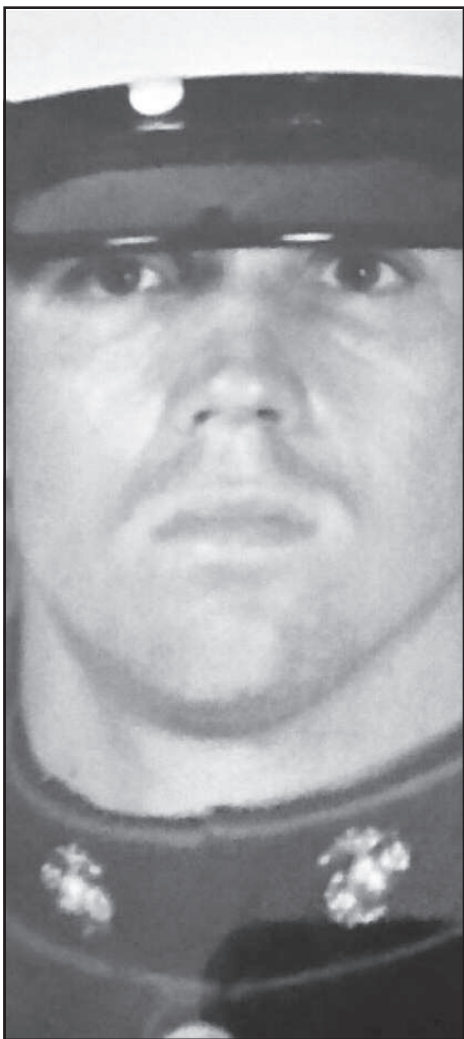

# Surviving America's most unpopular war

Roy Beason: 'No respect whatsoever for the Vietnam veterans and what we went through'

It was called the Battle of the Slopes.

And Roy Beason was there.

It changed his life forever.

Beason was born in Purcell on Oct. 6, 1947, to Carl and Mildred Beason.

He graduated from Lexington High School in 1965 and then joined the Army.

"I was the youngest dude in my class," he said. "My buddies were getting drafted. I just decided one day to enlist."

"I felt deep in my heart I perhaps kept my brother from going to that place."

Draftees were in for two years, but enlistees had to serve three years.

"My dad was real upset," Beason said. I told him 'Dad, I'm coming home.' My mother and my sister Joeann and my church (Rose Hill Pentecostal Church of God east of Lexington) prayed me through Vietnam."

He did his basic training at Ft. Polk, La., followed by advanced individual training at Ft. Ord, Calif., and jump school at Ft. Benning, Ga.

He was 19 when sent to Vietnam. He arrived in country on Aug. 14, 1966.

"Within a month, I was in combat," Beason said. "There was no front lines in Vietnam."

I've walked all over Vietnam; we called it humping."

As a 112P (infantry airborne), he jumped from planes and helicopters and in the span of 14-1/2 months in Vietnam, he served with three combat units – 1st Cavalry, 173rd Airborne and 82nd Airborne.

He was first assigned to 1st Cavalry Air Mobile's base camp located in the central highlands between Hanoi and Saigon at An Khe.

He would go out on 5-man long range reconnaissance patrols. These patrols stayed in the field five days at a time.

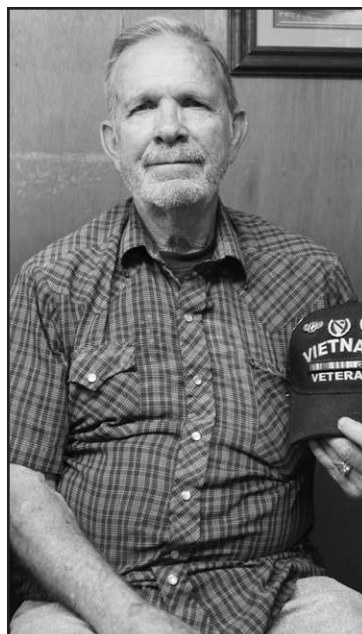
"And Lord willing, the Viet Cong didn't find you," Beason said.

There were also eagle flights – 25 men and five helicopters landing on multiple hilltops.

"You never knew where you were going til you got there," he said. "Ninety-eight percent of the time we were in the boondocks – triple canopy jungles so thick you couldn't see the sky or the person five feet in front of you."

"Many times we walked in the jungle single file and walked up on a base camp of VC. That's when the firefight would start."

The North Vietnamese

Army or NVA was well trained and well supplied.

"They were very fierce fighters. We'd find some chained to machine guns so they couldn't run. The VC weren't so well trained. If they got too overwhelmed, they would run on you," he said.

The United States tried to fight and win a war on the basis of body counts – the number of enemy dead or wounded.

But, Beason said, the NVA was good at hiding their dead so there was never an accurate body count.

"If we killed 100, they (the brass) would report 200," he said. "They were fighting the French before we ever went there. It was a police action."

They never called it a war. It was such a waste – 58,479 who did not come home from Vietnam.

He knew and served alongside many of them.

And that brings his story to the Battle of the Slopes.

Beason's company had been on one of those nameless hilltops and were being relieved. But on the way down, the 100 men crossed paths with an NVA battalion.

Just 17 men made it off that hill alive. Beason was one of them.

"I'm 69 now. It's been over 50 years since Vietnam and it still lives in me," he said.

Beason is rated 100 percent post traumatic stress disorder that can be triggered by a loud noise or a smell. The Fourth of July is especially hard on him, with firecracker sounds so reminiscent of a firefight.

"I'm a praying person," he said. "I thank God each day for one more day."

When his enlistment was up, Beason said he "went crazy."

"Civilian life wasn't active enough. I would fight anyone. I messed up my hands and my life. Alcohol caused it. They would throw me in jail and Dad would bail me out."

Over time and with much praying and the support of

Norma, his wife of 45 years, Beason was able to straighten his life out.

He went to work as a corrections officer at Lexington Assessment & Reception Center and Joseph Harp Correctional Center.

At the time, the Oklahoma Department of Corrections allowed officers to use dogs they trained on their own.

Beason, accompanied by his Doberman pinscher and armed with a .357 Magnum, transported mass murderer Roger Dale Stafford from LARC to McAlester.

Stafford asked him if the dog was bad, whereupon the Doberman turned its head, curled its lip and growled.

Stafford had nothing more to say.

Beason worked 20 years at the prison.

Beason lost a daughter, Trulie, who was one of five killed in a car wreck near Wayne in 2010.

A son, Jory, 36, works construction.

"He makes me proud," Beason said.

He has three grandchildren from his daughter – Blayden Beason, Briana Walker and Destin Churchwell – as well as two great-grandchildren, Kayde Ann Fulbright and Kamrynn Fulbright.

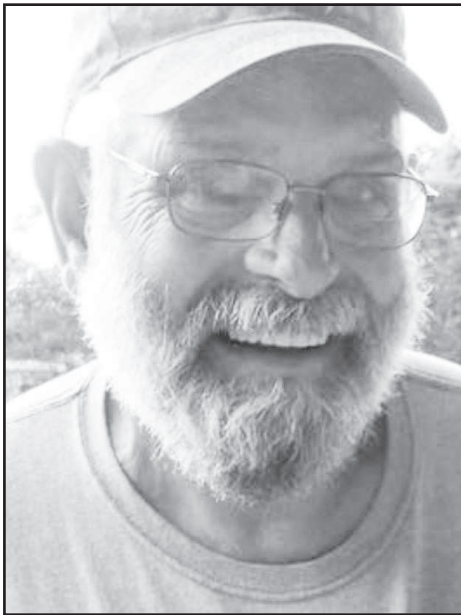

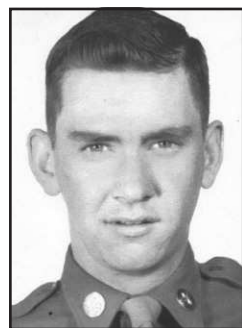

# The American spirit

## Harold Harvell recalls rising to the challenge

Goldsby resident Harold Harvell's memories of his time in uniform are as vivid now as they were when he

was living them some 66 to 70 years ago.

He was in his early 20s in the years 1947 through 1951 – an age when he was filled with

uninvincible spirit and nothing was too challenging for him to handle.

"The Army Air Corps, later the United States Air Force, offered that challenge," he shared. "After a year of technical training as a radio operator, I was assigned as a flight crew member on a two-engine transport aircraft. It was a fun assignment between World War II and the Korean War.

"Our first mission was to help save stranded livestock in Nevada. It was a record-shattering blizzard, threatening the lives of thousands of livestock.

"Over a million cows and sheep were isolated in the Nevada ranges. The only access to the cattle was by air.

"Our two-engine aircraft were called into action. Over 1,800 tons of baled hay were dropped, one bale at a time, by a crew member and a rancher, saving over 300,000 cattle.

"All of our Air Force flight crews were made Honorary Citizens of the State of Nevada by Gov. Pittman.

"Later our aircraft fleet was upgraded to four-engine transports and an urgent need developed in Korea.

"The enemy was rapidly getting

into the position to over run the large Korean city of Pusan. Standby and Reserve combat forces were immediately activated and dispatched to the war zones.

"The best and quickest way to get them to the area was by aircraft transport. The point of embarkation was at Ft. Lewis and McChord Air Force Base, both in Washington state.

The aircraft were equipped with canvas and metal support rods commonly called 'bucket seats'. The route was through Alaska, Aleutian Islands and Tokyo.

"A total of approximately 25 hours in the bucket seats was a very unpleasant ride. The aircraft was unloaded and ground transportation was provided the passengers to the combat areas of Korea.

"Our aircraft was then converted to air-evac, i.e., stretchers, medical supplies and nurse assignments as part of the crew.

"Hospitals in Japan and Guam were full and it was necessary to take the long flight to Hawaii for advanced care.

"I remember many cases of severe wounds that required casts from chin to ankles. It took six of us crew members to lift each of the stretchers aboard the aircraft. The stretchers were only eight inches apart vertically. The wounded were often some of the same combat crews we had brought to the war zones on previous trips.

"After 60-plus years, what I remember best is the predominant spirit of some American heroes that insured freedoms for our great country."

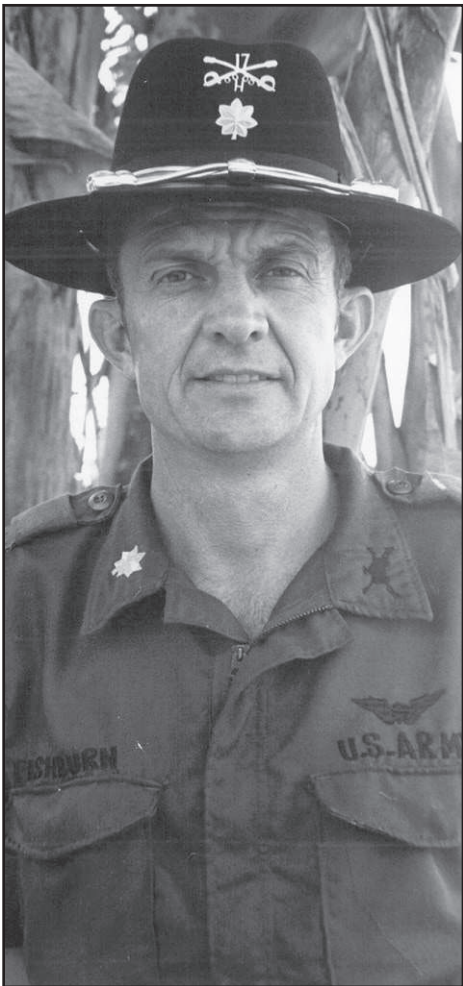

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# Facts about the Wall

Monument includes the names of 58,272 fallen

Some history about the Vietnam Veterans Memorial that most people will never know:

With the addition of six names

added in 2010 the total is now 58,272 names listed on the Memorial. Approximately 1,200 of these are listed as missing (MIA's, POW's, and others).

The names are arranged in the order in which they were taken from us by date and within each date the names are alphabetized. It is hard to believe

it is 61 years since the first casualty. The first known casualty was Richard B. Fitzgibbon, of North Weymouth, Mass. Listed by the U.S. Department of Defense as having been killed on June 8, 1956. Also listed on the Wall is his son, Marine Corps Lance Cpl. Richard B. Fitzgibbon III, who was killed Sept. 7, 1965.

There are three sets of fathers and sons on the Wall.

Of those who died and are on the Wall, 39,996 were just 22 years old or younger.

The largest age group – 33,103 – were 18 years old and 8,283 were 19 when they died.

A dozen soldiers on the Wall were 17 and five were 16 years old. One soldier, Pfc. Dan Bullock, was only 15.

There were 997 soldiers killed on their first day in Vietnam and 1,448 soldiers on their last day.

## Wall:

Listed are 31 sets of brothers.

The dead include 54 soldiers who attended Thomas Edison High School in Philadelphia.

Eight women, nurses all, are on the Wall.

Of 244 Medal of Honor recipients during the Vietnam War, 153 paid the ultimate price and are on the Wall.

The tiny town of Beallsville, Ohio (pop. 475) lost six of her sons.

West Virginia had the highest casualty rate per capita in the nation. There are 711 West Virginians on the Wall.

From the little Arizona copper town of Morenci (pop. 5,058), nine

graduates enlisted in the Marines as a group. Their service began July 4, 1966. Only three returned home.

In Midville, Utah, LeRoy Tafoya, Jimmy Martinez and Tom Gonzales were boyhood friends. They lived only a few yards apart. They played ball at the adjacent sandlot ball field. And they all went to Vietnam.

In a span of 16 dark days in late 1967, all three were killed. LeRoy on Nov. 22, the fourth anniversary of John F. Kennedy's assassination. Jimmy died less than 24 hours later on Thanksgiving Day. And Tom was shot dead assaulting the enemy on Dec. 7, Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day.


