Purcell Schools close to calling for bond election

After lengthy discussion Monday evening, the Purcell Public Schools Board of Education is poised to adopt a resolution calling for a \$16.139 million bond issue. The board will meet in special session at 5:30 p.m. Monday to call for the election on October 10.

Included will be three propositions. The largest, at \$12 million, would pay for building a new junior high school south of the high school. The library/media center in the new school will also serve as a storm shelter.

Armed robbers

Pair steals cell phone at gunpoint

Two purported members of the Universal Aryan Brotherhood are charged in McClain County District Court with robbery with a weapon after allegedly confronting a Texas man at a Purcell gas station and taking his Samsung cell phone at gunpoint. Prosecutors charged Clifford D. King, 33, of Purcell, and Sean R. Tyson, 27, of Norman. King is free after posting a \$25,000 bond. His preliminary hearing conference will be at 9 a.m. August 16. Tyson, who was charged after former felony convictions, remains in the McClain County Detention Center in lieu of \$20,000 bond. His preliminary hearing conference will be at 9 a.m. August 9. According to an affidavit, Matthew Matheny of Fort Worth was carrying his 2-year-old daughter to the entrance of Star Travel Plaza, 2425 State Highway 74, around 10 p.m. July 23 when

the defendants, who were parked at one of the pumps, asked to use his phone. Matheny told Purcell police the men asked if he was in the Irish Mob and then told him they were in the UAB. Matheny said he dialed a number for the driver later identified as King and handed him the phone. When the call ended, Tyson, who was the passenger, allegedly pointed an Uzi at Matheny and said the phone was now his. Matheny said he told the men to take the phone and stop pointing the weapon at his daughter. King and Tyson turned south on SH 74 and drove away. The robbery was witnessed by Matheny's wife, who was in the family's vehicle with four other children. When police arrived, Matheny told them he heard King tell the person he called

Gardeners must take precautions to avoid heat-related illnesses

It takes standing outside only a short time to get the full effect of the summer season. While many gardeners enjoy their time in the garden, extreme temperatures can lead to heat-related illnesses.

Although heat-related emergencies are fairly common, they can be avoided, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension consumer horticulturist.

"Even though there may be weeding, harvesting or watering to be done, during the hottest part of the day it's a better idea to find a good garden magazine and enjoy the coolness of your air conditioning," Hillock said.

"Whenever possible, work outside in the early morning hours or later in the evening when it's not so hot. However, if you must be outside during peak temperatures, make sure you stay hydrated, dress in light-colored clothing, apply sunscreen and take frequent breaks."

Heat-related illnesses can be very serious and range from sunburn to heat stroke. In the event your sunburn blisters, there are a number of ointments available to help ease the pain. However, extensive sunburn should be checked out by a doctor.

Heat cramps are painful spasms, typically in the legs, but also can occur in the ab-

domen. These cramps will usually go away on their own. If you experience heat cramps, go inside immediately. Drink a sports drink to replace lost electrolytes and salt. If no sports drinks are available, sip on cool water.

Hillock said heat exhaustion symptoms include heavy sweating; weakness; or cold, pale and clammy skin. A person also may experience fainting or vomiting. If this happens, get out of the sun, loosen your clothing and apply cool, wet cloths to your skin.

While the symptoms of heat stroke are similar to heat exhaustion, heat stroke is the most serious of heat-related illnesses. Other symptoms may include confusion, staggering, seizures or the person may become unconscious. It is a severe medical emergency and must be treated immediately. A delay in medical treatment could be fatal.

"It's important for gardeners to know their limits when it comes to spending time outdoors in the heat," he said. "Although we all want our landscapes to look their best, it's not worth a medical emergency."

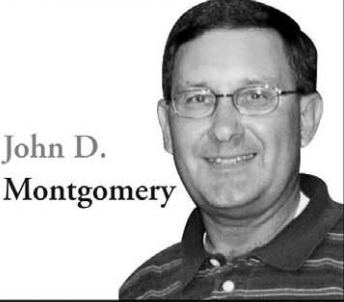
Pardon me for standing up for public education but let me see a show of hands of all of you who are products of public education.

If the FFA's not broke, don't try to fix it

Since 1958, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has overseen the standards and regulations of the airline industry. In that time, the magnitude and complexity of air travel has increased exponentially.

Today, air travel is still one of the safest modes of transportation thanks to the training and professionalism of America's Air Traffic Controllers (ATC).

The FAA is a federal agency, funded and overseen by Congress. As such, it is necessary to enact legislation to reauthorize the funding levels and update the policy priorities of the agency.

Last year, Congress passed the reauthorization of the FAA for another year, under the FAA Extension, Safety and Security Act of 2016. At that time, some in Congress advocated to privatize the FAA and replace the federal workforce with private contractors. In my opinion this was a terrible idea, and fortunately the effort was unsuccessful.

Congress has always provided key oversight of the FAA and ATC to keep our skies safe

and efficient. Because of its balanced approach to regulation and operational standards, the FAA has made our skies the safest and most reliable airspace in the world.

Proponents of FAA privatization want to move forward with a corporate-like entity to regulate the airline industry. However, rather than an independent regulatory body, the proposed structure of this corporate entity would allow the airline industry to control the makeup of the board of directors. Not only would this proverbial fox watch the hen house, it would also have the authority to set fees and dictate regulatory policy.

Financially, a privatized FAA would be unfair to the American taxpayer. It is simply wrong to take billions of dollars' worth of assets purchased by federal funds and put them in the hands of private interests—a recipe for lost accountability and possible misuse of funds.

Not only does this endanger the system financially, it will have policy implications that range from issues such as general resources to the operation of rural airports and contract

control towers. It will also raise fees for travelers by incurring excess costs to support a monopolistic system.

This has been evident in other nations like Britain and Canada, where a privatized system is in place.

The FAA plays a major role in Oklahoma's economy. Oklahoma has over 4,700 Air Traffic Control employees at the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center (MMAC) and various airports around the state. The transition to a privatized system could potentially damage the dedicated workforce that has sustained safe and transparent skies in Oklahoma and across the nation.

Just as our national interstate highway system benefits from federal funding and oversight, our skies benefit greatly from the FAA and the air traffic controllers who direct the traffic of our airlines and general aviation. It protects the airlines, its employees and travelers, as well as our overall national security.

The FAA has worked well for our nation for many years. If it's not broke, then don't try to fix it.

Everyone with Medicare has rights and protections

Remember how you learned back in your high school civics class that you have certain rights as an American. As we all know, those individual rights make up the first 10 amendments to our Constitution.

But now that you're older, you may not realize you also have certain rights as a Medicare beneficiary.

Let's go through the most important ones so that you can protect yourself, if need be. As someone with Medicare, you have the right to:

- Be treated with dignity and respect at all times. That should

be so obvious that it doesn't bear repeating. Even in the most stressful situations, there's no excuse for anyone in the health care system — from health care professionals to insurers -- to treat you with anything other than care and concern.

- Be free from discrimination. Every company that works with Medicare can't treat you differently because of your race, color, national origin, disability, age or sex. If you think you haven't been treated fairly for any of those reasons, contact the government's Office for Civil Rights at hhs.gov/ocr.

- Have your personal and health information kept private. If you're enrolled in the traditional Medicare program, your privacy rights are spelled

out in your "Medicare and You" handbook, which you receive each fall. If you have a private Medicare Advantage plan, your rights are outlined in your health plan's materials.

- Get clear and simple information about Medicare to help you make health care decisions. You should be told what services and items will be covered, what portion of the bill Medicare will pay and how much you'll be expected to pay yourself. You should also be told what to do if you want to file a complaint or an appeal.

- Have your questions about Medicare answered. You can

Clearing the air

Dear Editor:

This letter is in response to an article in the July 27 issue as well as a letter to the editor in that edition.

The thing I wish to address is the "proposing a customer charge" as letter states or the "options" as the article states. The meeting where OMPA presented these options was a discussion only meeting. It is my opinion, as I do not speak for the entire council or city management, that currently the City of Purcell is trying to be proactive in this area.

It is my understanding there have only been a handful of requests concerning solar power at this time. This meeting and discussion was informational. It was to allow the city council and staff to begin to evaluate several approaches to structure rates that account for the fixed costs of the transmission line delivery of electricity to the home or business when ever needed and to do that the fairest way to all customers.

If citizens are concerned about this issue or the expenditures of the city, there is an annual meeting for citizen comments on the proposed upcoming city budget. This year's meeting, held in June, as well as all the ones in previous years since I have been on the council have had almost zero citizens attend.

As a point of clarification concerning property taxes, I have been told that by state law, Oklahoma is the only state in the country that does not allow cities to collect property taxes for operations. In many communities, those taxes commonly cover about one-third of city operations.

As much as I respect the coverage of **The Register** of city council meetings, concerned citizens should attend these and other public meetings rather than depend on an article to understand my position, my opinion and the issues facing the City of Purcell and its council.

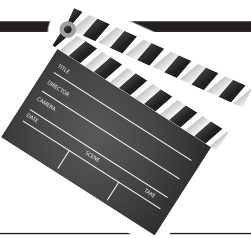
I'm concerned about the fairness of the five options being suggested for a change in electric rates for Purcell residents due to the effects of solar panels being installed to generate electricity.

MOVIES WITH DAVE

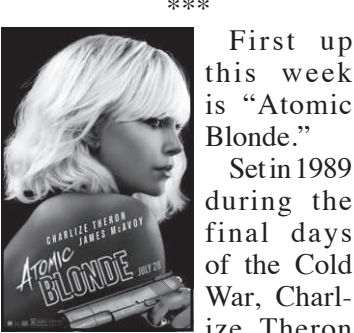

Don't see "The Emoji Movie." Please for the love of everything good in this world don't see "The Emoji Movie."

Keep reading if you want to know why you shouldn't see it, but I just had to get that out there first thing.

It's that bad. Now that I got that out of the way, here's my reviews.



First up this week is "Atomic Blonde." Set in 1989 during the final days of the Cold War, Charlize Theron plays Lorraine Broughton, an MI6 agent sent to Berlin to investigate the murder of a fellow agent.

There she meets her contact, David Percival (James McAvoy), a British operative who has adapted to life in the long divided city.

Forming an uneasy alliance, the two try to track down the people responsible, while also seeking information that has the potential to influence the result of the entire Cold War.

I've always wondered what a James Bond movie would be like if it was rated R.

It's pretty hard not to make 007 comparisons to Theron's character in this movie.

Both are MI6 agents during the Cold War, both have an affinity for vodka, and both have a knack for bedding beautiful women.

This movie is far more violent than any Bond film though and that's part of what really sets this film apart.

The action here is brutal and the camera definitely doesn't shy away when things get bloody.

One scene in particular towards the end made my jaw drop. The whole sequence is filmed from a single perspective and goes on for what felt like over 20 minutes.

To say I was impressed would be a massive understatement.

The way that one scene was shot completely immersed me in the action in a way I haven't felt since watching Keanu Reeves' action masterpiece "John Wick," which makes sense since both films share a director (David Leitch).

Just when I thought it was over, the scene keeps going, getting more and more intense all while keeping that same single camera perspective.

While the movie isn't quite as action packed towards the beginning, that scene alone made the entire film worth the price of admission.

Overall, the action here is leagues better than something like last year's "Jason Bourne" where the film cuts between so many shots you can barely figure out who's fighting who.

I'm liking this trend of action movies like "John Wick," "Kingsman: The Secret Service," and now "Atomic Blonde" where the films actually let you see what's happening during the fights. It's so refreshing after suffer-

ing through over a decade of movies imitating the style of "The Bourne Identity" with its quick cuts and frantic style. I only hope more filmmakers continue this trend.

Circling back around to the performances, Theron plays the role of secret agent pretty much perfectly. Sure, her character is impressive and definitely a force to be reckoned with, but she also feels very vulnerable at times, especially since the film isn't afraid to show our heroine bloodied and bruised.

It's also nice to see James McAvoy popping up in more movies lately. The man's a solid actor with an impressive range. I'm glad to see he's getting work.

I'm not going to lie though, while the action in this movie was great, the actual story confused the heck out of me.

There's so many backstabs and betrayals in this film it'll make your head spin.

I know that's not too uncommon for spy movies, but still there were a few too many twists and turns at the end for my taste.

Also, I know I mentioned that there wasn't much action in the beginning, but in reality the entire first half of the film feels pretty slow in general.

Plus there's a lot of things that happen early on which don't make much sense at the time, adding more to the confusion and I could see it causing people to lose interest.

It didn't ruin the film for me though, in fact it kind of makes me want to watch it again, if only to see if I could understand the plot better a second time through.

I don't know what else to say. The story isn't the easiest to follow, but the action at the end more than makes up for it in my opinion. If you're dying for some espionage action look no further.

All your favorite apps including Facebook, YouTube, Twitter, Spotify, Instagram, Dropbox, Candy Crush and Just Dance not only get mentioned, but they feature heavily in the plot. One heroic app even swoops in to save the day at the end. I hope the producers got a decent sized check for that scene.

I guess to give the movie some credit, the animation is somewhat competent. It's not great, but at least it doesn't sink to the levels of "Rock Dog," an animated stinker I reviewed earlier this year.

The voice acting also isn't too bad either, with the exception of Anna Faris whose performance is noticeably flat for an actress starring in a film about emotion.

A film needs more than just mediocre animation and passable voice acting though. You need likeable characters and a moderately engaging story. This movie has neither.

Maybe I'm just an old curmudgeon though.

People in my theater didn't seem to hate it. In fact some of them actually clapped at the end of this pile of garbage.

Iris Long may have been the only person in the Valley who wasn't surprised by the strange series of events taking place among the various congregations on Bearden's Corner that fateful Sunday in late October. She had a hint something was up on Saturday as she caught a glimpse of Raymond Cooper and his minions making plans in the lobby of Talk Radio 880.

What their plans were, she couldn't be sure. But as she overheard Marvin tell Raymond he would see him in church, she had a feeling they were up to no good.

The next morning, as she sat on the back row during the 8:30 a.m. contemporary service at Lennox Valley Lutheran Church, she was unaware Lutherans weren't the only Christians who were in for a surprise that fateful morning. As Iris turned to see what kind of commotion was taking place at the back door, she heard the keyboard playing, "Mighty is Our God," as the 14 congregants stood and raised their arms in the air.

That's just the kind of thing which would take place in the 8:30 service, but would never transpire two hours later in the traditional worship upstairs. - Get emergency care when and where you need it. You can get emergency care anywhere in the United States. If you have a Medicare Advantage plan, you don't need to get permission from your primary care doctor first. But if you're admitted to the hospital, you or a family member should contact your plan as soon as possible.

- Request a review of certain decisions about your claims or services. You can file an appeal if you disagree with a coverage or payment decision by Medicare or your Medicare Advantage plan. rate of 19.6 cents a kilowatt (470x.09+50=92.30 divided by 470=19.6...and at double the average use (1882KWH)aPurcell resident in a larger home would see a 2% decrease in their electricity cost to an effective rate of 11.7 cents per kilowatt (1882x.09+50=219.38 divided by 1882=11.7).

Regardless of which of the five options are selected between \$30 and \$50 per month service fee, the greatest per-

centage increase in cost for Purcell residents will tend to be for those with smaller homes and who are lower income residents. The lower income Purcell residents would tend to pay a lot more per kilowatt for electricity compared with the higher income Purcell residents if electric rates are changed to any of the five options being suggested.

I live in Purcell. I've been serving residents in Purcell for

a long time as an air conditioning-heating contractor. I'm not aware of anyone who has solar panels installed in their home to generate electricity. A change in Purcell electric rates now because of solar panels doesn't seem reasonable to me.

The city of Purcell needs to mark up its cost for electricity to cover the cost of providing this service to Purcell residents. But with our own electric utility we have the option of keeping

our electric rates as low as possible if we choose to set rates only high enough to cover the cost to provide the service. If we feel though our electricity cost is too low then we should encourage higher rates so this service can help fund other functions of city government.

I don't favor an increase in the monthly service charge of \$5.70 for electric service. If a fee increase is needed I favor only increasing the cost per

kilowatt as has normally been done over the years. Then the cost increase will be evenly given to all Purcell residents rather than mainly those who are low income and struggle to pay for their basic needs. A low monthly service fee means there is greater cost savings on electricity for Purcell residents if we do more to make our homes energy efficient and require less electricity.

AC, car vandalized

71-year-old woman charged

An arrest warrant is outstanding for a 71-year-old woman who allegedly vandalized her neighbor’s car and air conditioner.

Charged in McClain County District Court with malicious injury to property, under \$1,000, is Barbara J. Sturm of Purcell.

Experience eclipse at the library

“Truth is like the sun. You can shut it out for a time, but it ain’t going away.” - Elvis Presley

Indeed, the sun is going to go away – at least in part, in the early afternoon on Monday, August 21, as for the first time in nearly four decades, the United States will be affected by a total solar eclipse.

In central Oklahoma, there will be about a 90 percent eclipsing of the sun, with maximum eclipse coming at 1:05 p.m.

A path running from northwest to southeast from Washington State through Nebraska and eventually South Carolina will see a total eclipse lasting about two to three minutes.

The last total solar eclipse in the continental United States came on the morning of Feb. 26, 1979.

There’s another good chance to see a total eclipse in Oklahoma on April 8, 2024. But don’t wait up because after that, there won’t be another occurrence until Aug. 12, 2045.

Contraband

Recordings lead to felony charge

A former corrections officer at Lexington Assessment & Reception Center was charged July 21 in Cleveland County District Court with bringing contraband into a penal institution.

James Larrick, 51, of Noble, allegedly brought a recording device into the prison on numerous occasions between Sept. 1, 2015, and Dec. 26, 2016.

Bond was set at \$5,000.

He subsequently posted three videos taken inside the prison on You Tube, prompting an internal investigation by the Oklahoma Department of Corrections.

According to an affidavit, Larrick was employed at the prison from September 2015. He resigned in December 2016.

When questioned by a DOC investigator, Larrick reportedly said he purchased a spy watch with night vision to record male staff using “foul” language in the presence of female em-

ployees.

By Larrick’s admission, he singled out three supervisors in the recordings – Capt. David Kerr, Sgt. Catlin Tullis and Cpl. Lars Rodal.

He also allegedly recorded video of two inmates, who gave their consent. But neither knew when the recordings were being made.

According to one of the inmates, Larrick also brought different kinds of meat into the prison for the inmates to eat.

The second prisoner told the investigator he was unaware of Larrick recording his conversation that was later posted to You Tube.

That inmate said he was contacted by his mother who was upset at the content and language he used in the posted video, according to the affidavit.

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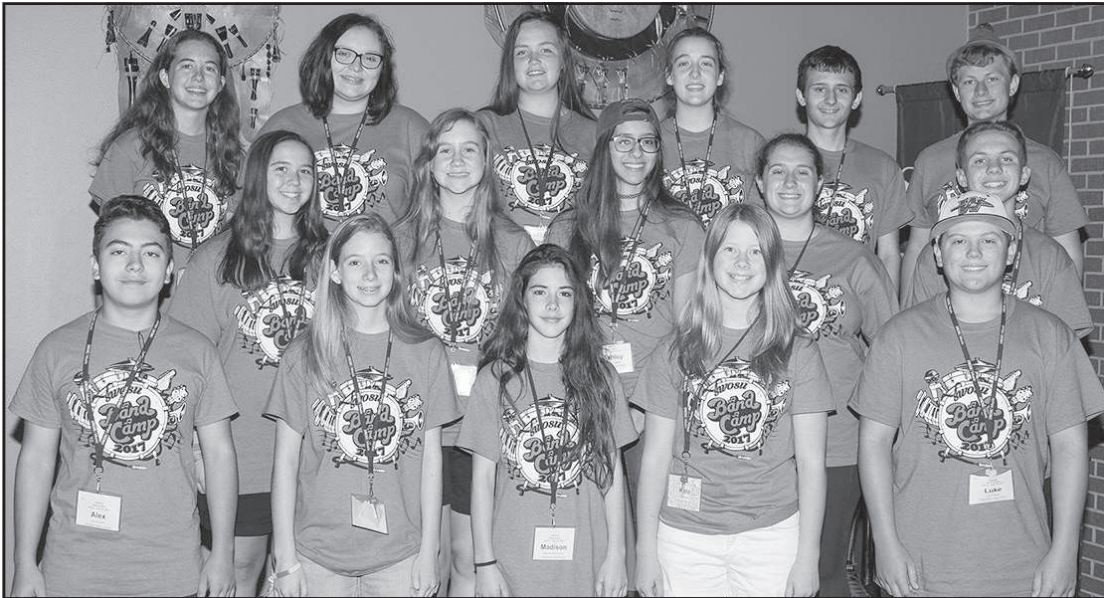

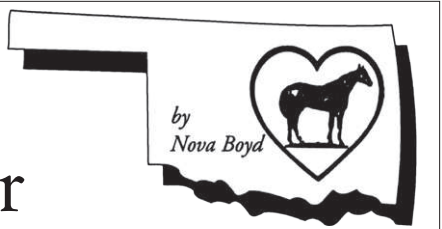

2017 National Reining Horse Association Derby

Purcell's Thiago Boechat wins Level 3 Open Derby

The National Reining Horse Association held the 51st annual Derby from June 24-July 2 at State Fair Park in Oklahoma City. The Derby showcases some of the most talented 4-, 5-, and 6-year-old horses and riders, plus special classes for 7-year-old horses, all trying for their part of the \$181,000 added money.

Purcell's Thiago Boechat, manager and head trainer for Xtra Quarter Horses, Purcell, rode to first place in the Level 3 Open Derby with a score of 223.0 riding Ruf Lil Magnum, owned by Silver Spurs Equine.

The Derby hosted the 15th

Annual Interscholastic Equestrian Association Western Finals on the final two days of the show. Nearly 200 middle school and high school student-riders from across the nation competed.

The IEA was organized to promote and improve the quality of equestrian competition and instruction available to middle and secondary school students and is open to public and private schools and barn teams. Riders do not need to own a horse, because the IEA supplies mounts and tack. Classes for this show were reining, horsemanship, western riding and huntseat equitation.

The Derby annually hosts the Collegiate Reining Championships. This year the title of Champion took a run-off to decide the winner. Hannah Mitchell, a freshman at Oklahoma State University, took the blue ribbon and trophy with a score of 222.5 riding The Boominator, donated by James Hotz. The Collegiate Reining Championship consists of 12 riders – four from the National Collegiate Equestrian Association (NCEA), four from the Intercollegiate Horse Show Association (ISHA), and four who are selected by the NRHA. The Collegiate Championships are the ultimate catch-ride, as riders are provided horses by reining horse owners.

This show and the Futurity held in November are the two largest and most prestigious that the NRHA holds. They draw exhibitors worldwide. Economic impact of this show is as follows: (# horses x 3.5 people per horse) X (# days of show plus haul-in and haul-out days x \$325 per day). Therefore: (792 horses x 3.5 = 2772 people) X (11 days x \$235 = \$2585) = \$7,165,620 pumped directly into the OKC area economy.

You can bet that some of those exhibitors spent some of their money here in our Heart of Oklahoma horse country, as many come early to tune-up just before the show, and that means they spend some money here. This is the time of year that you can hear many different languages spoken if you listen closely where you eat out.

Members of the NRHA Youth association from around the country participated in events held just for them during the Derby. Members met each day to create a craft, play bingo, make new friends and competed in a scavenger hunt. They put their speaking skills to the test as competitors vied to talk their way to the top in the Speaking Contest.

Competitors had the choice of entering three different categories, including General, Prepared Public Speaking, and a Community Service Presentation. Categories were divided into age groups 13 and Under and 14-18. An Art and Photo Contest was also available.

Applications available for Chickasaw Princess Pageant

The Chickasaw Nation is now accepting applications for the 2017-2018 Chickasaw Princess Pageant. Applications must be submitted by August 25.

Chickasaw Princess candidates must be 17 to 25 years of age to compete, while Chickasaw Junior Princess candidates must be 12 to 16 years of age and Little Miss Chickasaw candidates must be seven to 11 years of age.

Chickasaw Princesses are selected each year at the Chickasaw Princess Pageant during the Chickasaw Festival. Chickasaw Princesses serve as goodwill ambassadors at a variety of events and functions across the U.S.

Candidates must reside within the 13-county jurisdictional boundaries of the Chickasaw Nation, be predominantly Chickasaw with at least one quarter blood quantum and be a registered citizen of the Chickasaw Nation.

Chickasaw Junior Princess and Little Miss Chickasaw contestants must attend school to be eligible for pageant entry. A minimum 2.0 grade point average (GPA) is required and the candidate must be in good standing with the school.

Chickasaw Princess candidates must either attend school, be high school graduates enrolled in higher education or specialized training classes, or be employed to be eligible for pageant entry.

If a princess candidate is employed, her schedule must be somewhat flexible to accommodate her participation in tribal-related functions and other events.

In addition to the application, candidates must also include a copy of their Certificate of Degree of Indian Blood (CDIB) and citizenship card/certificate, a digital photo, a brief essay and three references from individuals not related to the candidate.

Candidates are also responsible for providing their own traditional dress, which includes a cotton dress and apron.

The Chickasaw Princess Pageant will be 6 p.m. Monday, October 2, at Ada High School Cougar Activity Center, 1400 Stadium Drive.

School:

The new school will have 37,650 square feet and a construction price tag budgeted at \$6.97 million. Added to that will be \$455,000 for the tornado safe room, \$45,000 for an entrance canopy, \$1.935 million for parking and driveway, \$100,000 for a retaining wall with railing at the south end of the high school parking, \$1.71 million for contractor’s overhead, insurance

and bonds, and \$785,000 for the architect’s fee, civil engineer, survey, permit cost and printing. Superintendent Jason Midkiff told the board that the \$12 million total has “some cushioning” built in. The present junior high school has 90,600 square feet. Cost to renovate the existing building is estimated at \$7.057 million. The board also opted for a proposition that will renovate the WPA football stadium at Conger Field at a cost of \$3.64 million, instead of \$8.05 million for a new football stadium at the same site. Renovation will include de-

molishing the concrete bleachers, press box, concession stand and storage buildings. A new aluminum grandstand with press box will provide seating for 1,640. In addition, a new 14-foot tall retaining wall will be built and there will be paving under the bleachers. New visitor bleachers are also in the plans. The renovation will also include a new concession stand, ADA rest rooms, new locker rooms and weight room and electrical upgrades and reworking the field lights. The final proposition will be a \$675,000 transportation bond issue.

We appreciate the sacrifices that he along with the countless others made that have helped to keep our country free.

During the next few weeks we plan to move to our permanent home at 1268 North Interstate Drive in Norman. For any of you who would like to check out our new location take exit 210 on I-35 (Robinson Street) we are on the Northwest side of the interstate just north of the Domino’s Pizza in the Robinson Crossing Shopping Center.

Since there are many places to eat in that center I’m going to ask each of them for a 10 percent discount project. The electricians from Waters Electric should wind up their part of the remodeling project in a few days. Last week I inadvertently listed another electrical contractor instead of Waters Electric. For those

of you who know Howard McMahon of Waters Electric express your appreciation to him for helping us with the electrical updates. I would like to see us open in the next few weeks to be able to accommodate the hundreds of veterans and surviving spouses of veterans who visit us each week.

As we increase the number of our trained volunteers, we plan to offer our services more than the current two days each week. For more than 20 years I wanted to have a place where veterans and their families could find the help they needed with their VA claims and questions. It looks to me like that this is going to happen within the next few weeks.

All of us at Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation appreciate the support we have received from the men and women we serve. Without your generous donations to this organization, many folks would be doing without the necessities, and many families would be on the streets or in homeless shelters.

Our primary mission is to help veterans and surviving spouses receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible. As always, our services are free to all veterans and their families. As we continue to see an increased number of veterans who need our assistance, we will be applying for grants to help pay for some of the expenses that are incurred.

If each person we helped would help us with a monthly contribution to assist the next veteran, there would be no one doing without. Hopefully, some of the people whose lives we have helped to change will help us to continue this mission. I believe that we are on the right path to make a difference in the lives of all veterans and their families who we represent.

Last week five veterans received VA disability ratings of 100 percent for their service connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual VA compensation of \$189,431 per year. There were 34 veterans who received disability ratings ranging from 10-90 percent for their service connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual VA compensation amount of \$418,542.

There was one surviving spouse of a veteran approved for VA DIC or Pension benefits. This spouse will receive an annual combined amount of \$15,095 per year.

Some of the Oklahoma State benefits available to those who received a 100 percent

VA compensation rate are property tax exemption on a primary residence, sales tax exemption, reduced auto tags, free hunting and fishing licenses. The reduced auto tags and fishing license are available to disabled veterans who rated at the 60 percent service connected rate.

We continue to meet men and women who served in the 40s and 50s who have not filed a claim for VA benefits. If these men and women would visit us now, it could prove beneficial to their spouse or dependents. One of the things I have learned over the years is that many times the surviving spouse will not have enough money to live out their life. When the primary provider is gone the income of the surviving spouse will probably be reduced by 50 percent, yet their living expenses will be the same.

If a veteran is receiving VA benefits and their service-connected disability is listed as a contributing factor to their death the surviving spouse may be eligible for VA DIC benefits. This benefit could be from \$1,250 to \$1,500 per month. A different option for some surviving spouses is if a veteran passes away from a disease that is presumptive to their military service they might also be eligible for DIC benefits.

There is also a VA Pension benefit. This benefit is based on when the veteran served and on the surviving spouse’s income and assets. Lots of ways to change a person’s life when they follow up with their application for VA benefits.

I received a decision letter last week from the VA on a surviving spouse from Pennsylvania who had traveled to Norman for help with her VA claim. She was approved for DIC payments and is eligible to receive the Champ-VA medical Insurance. As always we are pleased she was approved. Guess that airplane cost was worth the trip for her. If you have not visited with one of our surviving spouse specialists please do so. Shirley can be contacted at (405) 361-9322.

If you need transportation to visit us, please call our drivers, Clayton and Louie. This week they traveled 1,298 miles transporting 23 veterans and worked 71 hours. You may contact them through our main line at (405) 550-8806. Clayton’s extension is 105 and Louie’s extension is 106.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. 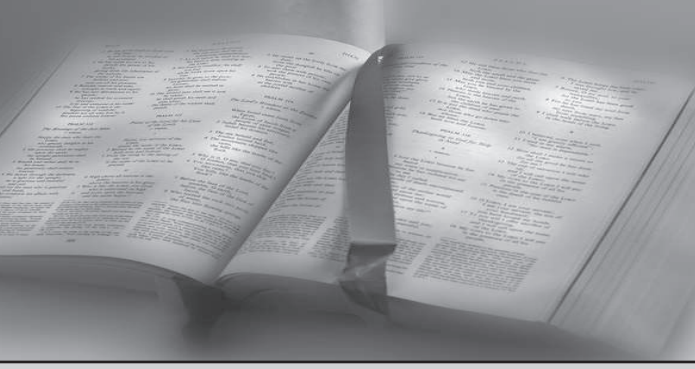

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Our youth group from St. Catherine of Siena Parish in Pauls Valley has just returned from its mission trip to Haiti.

We lived and worked at an orphanage near Les Cayes on the peninsula that was hit hard by Hurricane Matthew in 2016. I knew that Haiti was the poorest country in the western hemisphere – 60 percent live on less than \$1 per day.

I also knew that many orphaned children still live on the streets of Port-au-Prince. I expected a lot of sad people, downtrodden, over-burdened by the bad luck of a major earthquake, hurricanes, and decades of iron-fisted dictators who would kill or imprison those who disagreed with them.

Instead, what I found over the week was a people who were very proud of their country and who they are. Are they proud because their island is so beautiful? Or proud because they have endured so much and still open to the beauty of the earth and the love around them?

It seemed as if it were only yesterday that they threw out the French and became the only nation on earth that was successfully founded on a slave revolution. The Haitians have been formed into a people by their history. They know who they are and where they have come from. This gives them a sense of pride and self-confidence as a people.

The Israelites have also been formed by their history. With God's help, they were released from slavery to the Egyptians. Throughout their 40-year sojourn in the desert, God was forming His people – a proud and confident people. He would guide them with a cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. He would give them water from the rock and manna in the morning that they may not go hungry or thirsty, but that they should also not desire more than what they need for the day.

The Jewish people became a proud people, proud of their heritage and their faith. They became that way through their experience of God – As One who delivers them from slavery, as One who provides just what they need each day, as One who asks that they observe a day of rest each week from their labors.

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us to order our lives around the Kingdom of Heaven, "heaven on earth." It won't look like an earthly kingdom, where a man rules with an iron fist, like an Egyptian pharaoh, or a Latin American dictator. It won't look like the current version of the U.S. Congress, where people divide themselves into factions of self-righteousness and ideology, unable to dialogue and work together towards a common good.

What it will look like is a tiny seed that is focused on one thing only - to bearing the fruit of peace and justice in the world. When we are living in God's kingdom, then we will give food to the hungry and drink to the thirsty, and we will welcome the stranger. When we are living in God's kingdom, we will not divide ourselves into competing groups.

We will let God's angels, at the end of time, divide the great net of fish into the wicked and the righteous. When we are living in God's kingdom, we will get tiny glimpses which will bring us great joy, the joy that makes you so giddy that you can hardly sleep at night. (Matthew 13) Or even the kind of joy that turns your heart into somersaults - as it did to our students as they held small orphan children in Haiti, children that were only half the size they should be because of severe malnourishment.

Welcome this week, as always, to the “front porch.” The “amazin’ blonde” and I spent a few nice days down South this week in my native Georgia-land. On Saturday evening, we and our Thompson friends weaved through the winding Georgia, Alabama roads to a gospel meeting to the little town of Piedmont, Ala. I could not help remembering as a child riding through narrow, winding roads to gospel meetings regularly as we grew up on this Georgia red clay. Usually friends and family would pack a car and drive up together. I remember something special about those times, especially the preaching. The preaching seemed different back then. Those old-timey gospel preachers—some of whom are still driving those back roads to preach an old-timey gospel today—didn’t preach anything fancy. It was just a simple gospel. They quoted enough scripture to convert an infidel if they could; then they’d finish strong by offering the gospel plan of salvation with courage and passion. I loved those days, and I miss them. Today, we may be seeing a change. Maybe we’re tiring a little of the old-fashioned preaching. Maybe we want a new gospel. But the Apostle Paul never tired of it. He preached it to the poorest or to the richest. It didn’t matter. Ah, I’ve loved his declaration to the Romans: “I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek!” (Romans 1:16).

Are we growing ashamed of it today? Are we tiring of the simple gospel plan of salvation, the very core of the gospel? When we begin to drift from a love for the plain gospel plan of salvation, we begin to drift from true faith. Paul was amazed at some in his day, wondering how they could be “so soon removed from him that called you into the grace of Christ unto another gospel?” (Galatians 1:6). I wonder the same today. A gospel where the plan of salvation is seldom preached and upheld, or is brushed over casually, is “another gospel.” Today it seems we’re more apt to hear on Lord’s Day morning the type of sermon a tele-evangelist would preach than the pure gospel preached in simplicity and power. When Peter preached it on the Day of Pentecost, there was no misunderstanding of what the gospel required:

“Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit” (Acts 2:38). Nobody walked away on the Day of Pentecost wondering what the gospel required. Peter wasn’t ashamed. And he wasn’t afraid it’d be unpopular with some in the audience. I’ve heard people say too many times: “There’s nothing we can do to get God to save us!” I raise my eyebrows at that and wait to see if maybe I’m missing something. Oh, it’s true that in and of ourselves we’ll never be able to cleanse our sins. That’s done only through the precious blood of Jesus! “O precious is the flow that makes me white as snow. No other fount I know! Nothing but the blood of Jesus!” How sweet is that sound! And sweeter still, if possible, is the knowledge that His precious blood was offered for us freely at Calvary. But, listen: There IS something that we must do. We must come repenting and confessing and being baptized in the name of Jesus Christ! How could we ever preach Jesus and His marvelous grace and leave that out or brush over it causally? Remember that we can preach “another gospel” by what we don’t preach as well as what we do! Why would a gentleman stand in the pulpit—often before large crowds of newly-converted Christians and non-Christians—and not boldly declare the gospel plan of salvation before he sat down? Has it become unpopular? Ah, friends, surely we aren’t beginning to forget that there’s power in the blood!” No, not just power: “There’s wonderworkin’ pow’r in the blood of the Lamb!” How often that song rang through the country air on those still Georgia and Alabama nights, inspiring the preacher then to stand up boldly and declare all the counsel of God. How often would they quote Paul’s beautiful explanation in Romans 6:3-4! “So many of us,” he says, “as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death. Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life” (Romans 6:3-4). Again, what a sweet sound! When we come forward in obedience to the gospel, and we’re lowered into that watery grave, we’re being baptized into the death of our Lord! How beautiful! It is there, at the point of baptism—there beneath that crimson flood—that the Lord reaches down, as it were, and applies to our hearts the precious blood of Jesus! Our sins are then washed away, and we come up out of the water a new creature!
