



Online retail giant Amazon from Oklahoma customers in March – a move that will send tens of millions of dollars to state and local governments.

Gov. Mary Fallin on Thursday confirmed the arrangement, first reported by Oklahoma Watch the day before, and said collections will begin on March 1. State, city, town and county governments will receive their first extra revenues as early as May. With the change, Oklahoma will become the 40th state where the Seattle-based e-commerce company collects and remits sales and use taxes.

However, the additional tax revenue will not impact Oklahoma's current fiscal year budget or the \$870 million projected shortfall for next year's budget. Fallin said that's because budget officials included the anticipated sales tax money in the state's revenue estimates while secret negotiations with Amazon were underway.

But Oklahoma's current budget woes would be even more dire if the agreement with Amazon didn't go through. And the state can count on a new steady revenue stream for years to come.

The state has been in confidential talks with Amazon since the passage of last year's Retail Protection Act.

That measure requires online retailers to either start voluntarily collecting the sales tax or notify their customers of the existing law, seldom followed, stating that it is the customer's responsibility to



pay the tax when a merchant doesn't have a physical presence in the state.

Oklahoma Tax Commission spokeswoman Paula Ross said the agency has notified the top 500 online retailers of the new law and has been talking with a number of firms, including Amazon.

Ross said the state doesn't provide estimates for how much revenue the state is missing out on annually from specific companies. But a seven-year-old report, which hasn't been updated, pegged the total at nearly \$300 million if all out-of-state internet sales and use tax revenues were collected each year.

She said the amount of new revenue the state could see if all major online retailers came on board is likely lower now because many smaller retailers are already voluntarily collecting the tax. But she said the total gain in funds the state is currently foregoing will still likely be in the "hundreds of millions" of dollars.

Oklahoma's cites, towns and counties, which levy their own sales and use taxes, also will benefit from the move. Ross said, as a whole, they can expect to receive tens of millions in extra funds each year.

- 3. State funding for common education has fallen under both the present and former state superintendent of education and the cuts are expected to grow in 2017 as the state faces another \$900 million shortfall. What steps can your school district take to cushion the impact of these cuts?

PURCELL

Bevill – Navigating the current financial climate will be challenging to say the least. However, we must find ways to save money in every area we can without compromising the quality of education or the teachers within our district. We should investigate any source of federal or private grants that may be available to help ease the burden that is placed upon the school district. I'd also like to explore how we can better implement technology into everyday classroom work district wide as a replacement for typical paper/books/supplies usage and whether or not this is a realistic option considering the current financial constraints. One priority for me is to meet with teachers, parents and principals to gain a better understanding of what their goals, necessities and wishes are so we can try to better tailor a budget around the most significant needs af-

fecting our schools. **Smith** – The last two years in spite of the cuts in funding, Purcell has been able ask for community help and unsecure our campus is. With to maintain or improve their state grade. Jason Midkiff, the current superintendent, along with all the teachers have done more with less. The new Oklahoma LED lighting program is a perfect example. According to an article published in **The** Purcell Register, the district could save more than \$1 million over the next 10 years. Getting the most out of what we have is crucial in lessening the impact of these cuts.

LEXINGTON **Dierking** – Without having seen the budget it is hard for me say what the school can do to cushion the blow. However, I have no doubt our school is underfunded along with most schools in our state. One suggestion would be to look at neighboring schools who have made adjustments, like 4-day weeks, to see how their bottom line was truly impacted with the changes. Again, without seeing the budget I cannot give specifics at this time.

Sample - The first step would be to eliminate any waste possible. We should consider alternative sources of funding such as grants or corporate donations. We should explore e-technology for textbooks as a cost-effective way to get textbooks into the classrooms and replace the practice of making paper packets for the students. We could develop a tutoring program that utilizes retired individuals in the community who want to volunteer their services in various fields of expertise.

DIBBLE

Corley – Being in some sort of management and ownership in the oil and gas business the last 16 years has been a real eye opener. The industry is as up and down as any you will see. The lessons I have learned from this is that you have to always prepare for a financial decline. When finances are good you store a little away for a rainy day and plan for market downturn. You prepare for the future. Right now though, we have to be creative in our thinking and come up with ways to find funding. We can look for grants, we can understanding through this difficult time.

Lee – The school has to be creative. It has to minimize further cuts to staff. I believe the school should look at non-traditional scheduling opportunities, ways to cut energy costs and strategies that simply provide for greater efficiency.

4. What is the most pressing issue for your school district?

PURCELL

Bevill – The budget crisis as well as massive teacher shortage affecting our state are the most pressing issues for our district currently. Any time funding is in jeopardy, it becomes even more difficult to meet the needs of not only the students, but the teachers and staff. It is vitally important to take good care of the teachers we have by creating a positive, encouraging and supportive environment that seeks to not only provide these things, but also to serve as an example to the community of our appreciation for the excruciatingly difficult job they perform day in and out. The most important thing the board can do is to be very thoughtful, careful and understanding when creating a budget and policies that are going to affect not only everyone in the schools but also the community. We must be very mindful of our decisions so that we are maintaining a high quality education without compromising the morale within the district.

Smith – In this current climate the most pressing issue will continue to be the State funding. The State money makes up the majority of the School's budget. We need to continue to support our teachers and staff. As a community we should be advocates for public education. The goal is to provide our children with the opportunity to learn and achieve here in Purcell so they can be successful in whatever they choose to do.

LEXINGTON

Dierking - Right now, for me personally the most pressing issue is the safety of the students. My boys are young, solicit corporate funding, and I have seen and still see how

We must find a way to keep our teachers and give them the tools they need to teach. My kids are very active in sports, FFA, cheerleading, and other extracurricular activities. I don't want Dibble to lose anything that we have right now, but the focus must be on their education and future. Dibble kids are the future of our community and we have to support them. Together as a community we have to communicate with each other and work side by side to get to a common ground.







We hope you will come and visit and give us a try. You may find friends and neighbors you know and if not, you can make some new friends. Many smiling faces will greet you when you come.



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

Look at this candle. A candle gives light, right? But this candle has no wick. How can it give light? Each of us is a child of God because we have been baptized. Each of us is a candle that is able to give light to the world. We give light by putting our faith into action.

We do not falsely accuse anyone. We do not speak a malicious word about anyone. We give bread to the hungry, drink to the thirsty (Isaiah 58:7-10) Where there is despair, we give hope. Where there is sadness, we give joy. And by doing these things, we give glory to God who is in the heavens.

a family, the natural bond between a mother and her child, or between two cousins. Secondly, there is the love between friends. It is called philia, and is the love between two people who share common interests, values, and/or activities. The attention is outward towards a common goal.

Eros is what we mean when we say we are "in love" with another person. That person becomes the object of our attention. We are deeply attracted to some quality in her, or are drawn to some aspect of his nature. Agape is the fourth and greatest of loves, because it is the unconditional love we choose to give regardless of changing circumstances. In agape we love not out of selfishness but for the sake of love itself. This is the Christian virtue to which we are called and for which Jesus was an example as He carried His

Sawtooth Oak is one of the fastest growing trees in its youth. It is an attractive shade tree with dark lustrous summer foliage and clear yellow to golden brown fall leaves. These trees grow to be 40' to 60' tall and about 40' to 60' wide.
