

Grinding accident injures two

Three vehicles involved at mile marker 97 southbound

Two people, injured in a grinding three-vehicle accident last Thursday, reminded in critical condition in an Oklahoma City hospital.

The pair were mediflighted to Oklahoma City hospitals after the accident in the southbound lanes of Interstate 35 early last Thursday morning.

The accident occurred at 8:18 a.m. near the 97 mile marker and was first reported as a fatality. So far the two critically injured people were fighting for their lives at OU Medical Center.

A 2000 Toyota, driven by Victoria Richartz, 54, of Oklahoma City was the vehicle where the two injuries occurred.

Richartz was mediflighted

After a previous town hall-style meeting in October, district officials and representatives from Waldrop Construction Inc., the construction manager, identified 10 projects as must-haves.

Those projects have a combined price tag of slightly more than \$4 million.

Two things brought Weatherford native Cody Penner to Purcell in April of 2014.

One, his wife, Randi, was hired to teach second grade at Purcell Elementary School.

And, two, his former boss at a Clinton water park reached out to him with a job offer to join Purcell's parks and recreation department as maintenance supervisor.

Penner accepted the job offer from Chris Griffith.

"I knew Chris from another job I had at the Water Zoo in Clinton," Penner said. "I was a lifeguard and night manager. I did pretty much everything."

Before Griffith left his post as parks and recreation director at the end of November to take a job at Altus, he recommended Penner be his successor.

Penner is still settling into his new role as department head.

On Monday he met with the recently appointed parks and recreation citizens advisory board.

"It will be my first meeting without Chris," he said earlier in the day.

Among ideas being considered will be a community garden near the lake.

If it comes to fruition, the community garden would provide Purcell residents a plot of ground on which to grow vegetables and flowers, Penner said.

There's also the ongoing issue of the swimming pool that Purcell doesn't have.

The city council voted to close the existing pool because of a leakage problem at the close of the 2015 season.

Then a proposed sales tax to pay for construction of a \$6.8 million water park failed to win voter approval.

Now the council is rethinking the closure and has

The Holiday Fine Arts Mar-

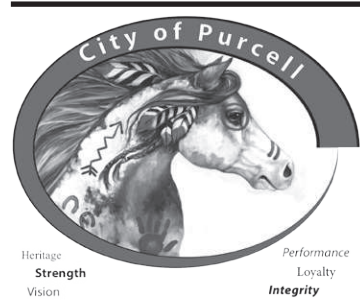
ket features an array of art by Chickasaw artists.

Count them down but not out. With the defeat of State Question 779, which proposed to raise the state sales tax by one cent for education, some

supporters say their voices will be even louder at the Capitol next year.

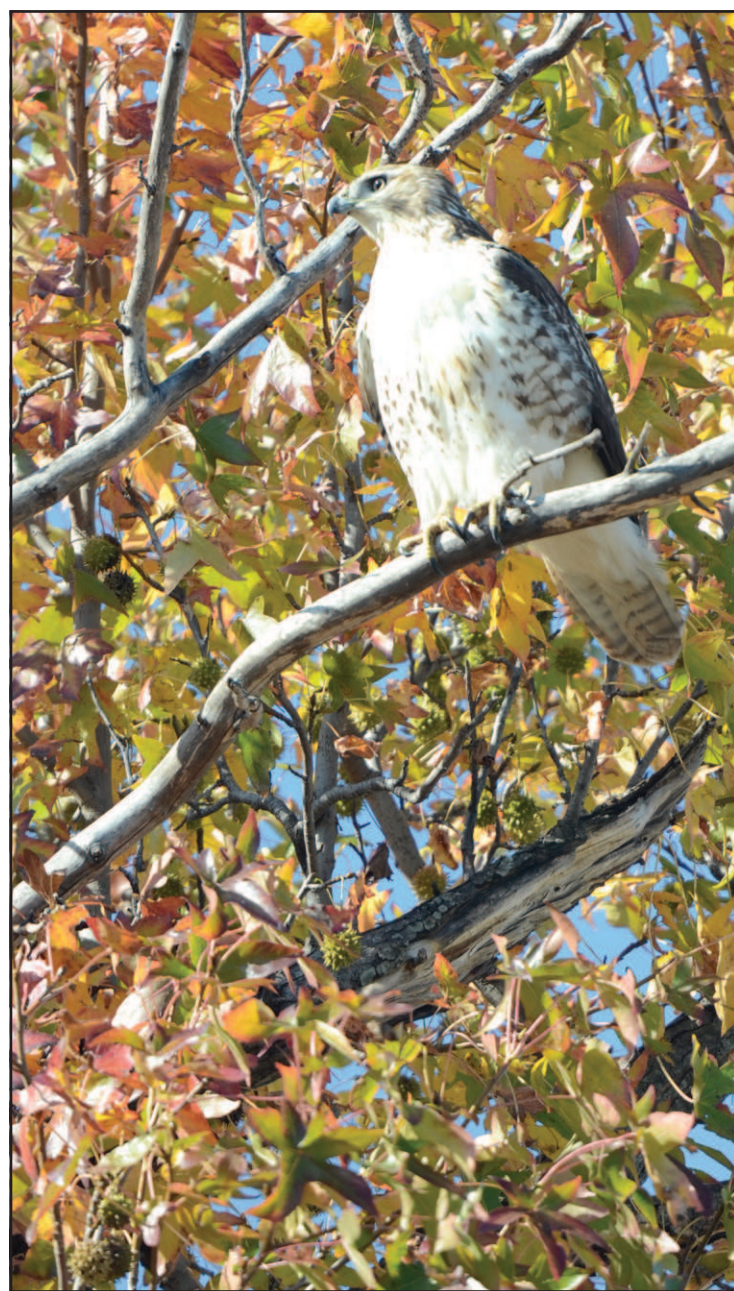
State Superintendent Joy Hofmeister was among them.

"I will be back before state lawmakers this next legislative

session, fighting for kids and a regionally competitive wage for teachers — one that reflects their work as highly trained professionals who change the lives of nearly 700,000 students every day," Hofmeister said.

The outlook, however, is somewhat bleak in the short term because of state budget pressures.

Checking your credit after the holidays

It is hard enough to think about what is going to happen during the always hectic holiday season, let alone what to do after the wrapping paper stops flying and the refrigerator is bursting with leftovers.

However, one task that should be at the top of everyone's post-holiday to-do list is checking their credit report.

Monitoring your credit is the kind of small but important task that can easily slip to the bottom of the priority list, but not doing so can lead to unpleasant consequences.

The frequent use of electronic payment methods and online shopping only reinforces the importance of paying close attention to what appears on credit reports, said Cindy Clampet, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension resource management specialist.

"Whether it's for a job, a new place to live or a new car, someone will check your credit

and that is the wrong time for surprises," she said. "Regularly reviewing your credit report can help prevent identity theft and catch errors serious enough to possibly trigger a loan denial or higher interest rate on a credit card."

Equifax, Experian and TransUnion are the three major credit reporting agencies. These agencies collect information from their members – businesses and organizations that provide regular reports on the payment behaviors of their clients – and publish that information in credit reports.

A person's credit score is based on the information on the credit report. The score is a measure of how risky it is to offer credit to that person. The higher the score, the lower the risk.

Consumers are legally entitled to one free credit report each year from each of the three agencies. Copies of the reports can be ordered at www.annualcreditreport.com.

"You can monitor your credit for free year-round by requesting a report from a different agency every four months," Clampet said. "Victims of identity theft who have a notation added to their credit histories are eligible to receive more than the three reports annually."

Many credit card companies also offer free credit scores to account holders, but consumers should be aware these scores can be different than the score used to assess credit worthiness in some circumstances.

"If you need help understanding your credit report, make an appointment with a non-profit credit-counseling agency," Clampet said.

State unveils plan for A-F school report cards

Oklahoma schools would continue to receive a single letter grade from the state Department of Education under a new plan for school accountability released Tuesday, but the components of the grades would be expanded.

The new system, if adopted by the state Board of Education and the state Legislature, will add measures of chronic absenteeism, post-secondary opportunities and academic growth of English language learners, in addition to student assessments in math, English and science.

The proposed system eliminates the "bonus points" currently awarded for meeting benchmarks in high school graduation rates and attendance. Instead, all measures

are weighted within the total calculation.

Schools would receive simply an A, B, C, D or F (no pluses or minuses) unless fewer than 95 percent of students in a particular group, such as special education students, participate. In those cases, schools would have a minus added to their letter grade.

A 95-member task force met multiple times to develop the proposal.

The Legislature adopted the A-F school grading system in 2011, and though it has been tweaked previously, this proposal represents the first major overhaul. Currently, school grades are calculated based on student performance, overall student growth and growth of students in the bottom quartile.

Many of the changes are being made to comply with Every Student Succeeds Act, the new

federal education law. Early versions of the law did require states to give schools a single rating or grade, but final rules released Nov. 28 give states the option of using a dashboard or



other "user-friendly" approach.

Not all states give schools a single letter grade; some use more of a dashboard like approach with multiple grades or use another type of rating scale.

Association also disagrees with the use of a single letter grade, said Vice President Katherine Bishop.

"There's such distrust in our educational community — parents and stakeholders — on what this means. We would truly like to see it called something different," said Bishop, a task force member.

The Board of Education is expected to vote on the final proposal at its December 15 meeting.

Under the plan, elementary and middle schools would be graded on performance in English language arts, math and science; growth in English language arts and math; proficiency of English language learners; and chronic absenteeism, which is defined as missing 10 percent or more of the school year.

While growth isn't a recommended indicator for high schools, the system would add graduation rate and postsecondary opportunity, such as college course enrollment or industry certification, to the other measures.

Report card scores would be calculated with a maximum of 90 points and converted to a letter grade on a scale intended to reserve As and Fs for a few schools on each end of the spectrum. Most schools would fall in the B, C and D range.

Hofmeister said the new

system will look even more like an actual report card, where schools' grades are displayed on each measure plus additional information such as demographics and per pupil spending.

Task force members represent teachers, students, parents, higher education, Career Tech, business and community leaders, tribal leaders, legislators and other stakeholders.

The task force is being led by Marianne Perie of the University of Kansas.

Notably absent from the task force are the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University researchers who issued a report critical of the state's accountability system in December 2015.

Patrick Forsyth, lead researcher for the study, said after the report was issued, the state Education Department discontinued the three-year contract it had with the universities.

"When we issued a report that, once again, suggested A-F was meaningless and caused harm, she (Hofmeister) suspended the contract," he said, adding, "She was under a great deal of pressure to not naysay or in any way cast aspersions on the A-F system."

Hofmeister terminated the contract in March. In a letter to the University of Oklahoma,

she explained it was to reduce the Education Department's expenses following state revenue failures.

Bulky winter coats can interfere with seat belts

Warm puffy jackets can protect from cold winter weather, but they can pose a danger when they are worn underneath a seat belt putting occupants, especially children, at risk of injury in the event of a crash.

Seat belts for people of all ages are best worn close to the body and have long been proven to help the body slow down and protect the brain and spinal cord in the event of impact.

According to AAA Oklahoma safety experts, for a child's car seat to offer the maximum protection in a crash, the harness or seat belt needs to be snug and as close to the child's body as possible.

The more layers of padding or clothing between a child and the harness, the harder it is to properly fit the restraint.

The seat belt can end up fitting to the puffy jacket, and when impact occurs, the jacket compresses and creates a gap between the passenger and the seat belt.

That gap is like a loose seat belt that can cause a passenger to slip through the restraint or worse be ejected from the seat.

The same concept applies to children riding in booster seats and adults in seat belts. Harness straps should lay flat and not have any twists. The seat belt should be snug enough that you cannot pinch any extra webbing or strap material at the child's shoulder.

"Car crashes are the number one killer of children up to age 13," said Chuck Mai, spokesman for AAA Oklahoma. "Parents should buckle their kids in car seats and seat belts without jackets first, then either tuck a blanket around them or have kids lay their jackets on their laps or wear it backwards. Seat belts need to be fitted to the passenger, not the jacket."

Another important consideration is that children do not need to wear heavy coats, hats and gloves in a warmed-up car.

Too many layers can cause the child to become overheated and cranky, potentially causing a distraction for the driver.

Even the smallest babies need only one more layer of clothing than their parents to remain comfortable.

Voter registration

Deadline is January 20

January 20 is the last day to apply for voter registration to be eligible to vote in the February 14 annual school and Purcell municipal election.

McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said the requirements for registering are that the individual is a U.S. citizen, Oklahoma resident and at least 18 years old.

Those who have never been registered to vote, who aren't currently registered in their county of residence or who need to change their registration information may apply.

They need to fill out and mail an Oklahoma Voter Registration Application in time for it to be postmarked no later than midnight on January 20.

Applications postmarked after that deadline will still be accepted and processed, but won't be approved until after

the February 14 election. The county election board responds in writing to every person who submits an application, Haley said.

The response is either a voter identification card listing the new voter's precinct number and polling place or a letter explaining why the application wasn't approved.

Anyone who has submitted a voter registration application and who hasn't received a response within 30 days should contact the county election board office in the McClain County Courthouse.

Application forms are available at the county election board, as well as most post offices, tag agencies and public libraries in the county, Haley said.

Backers:

After two revenue failures last fiscal year, appropriations for common education were trimmed 2 percent. General revenue fund collections are down 9.5 percent (\$130 million) in the first three months of the fiscal year compared to last, according to the state treasurer. A revenue failure is a very real possibility again this year. Other agencies that deliver core services, from corrections to human services, will also be seeking more funding.

But teachers here remain among the lowest paid in the country, and, at least anecdotally, many have been leaving the state. Some were holding out hope for SQ 779 to signal a tide changing.

Jessica Pierce is one of them. The high school biology teacher in Walters vowed to leave Oklahoma for higher pay elsewhere if the measure failed. On Tuesday night, Pierce said the vote's outcome may drive her to look for a new job out of state next year, even though she doesn't want to.

"I love my state, and I don't want to abandon my students. But I also have to think about my own children," she said.

Pierce blamed the loss on a poorly written proposition.

"If it had been like a half-a-cent tax, and only going to teacher salaries, I think we would have had a better chance," she said. "But with it being a full percentage and with it split with other departments, I think that hurt us."

"People have been burned out," she continued. "We passed the lottery, we passed the casinos, and schools are still hurting."

No Words of Regret

Hindsight and regrets have not marked public statements by leaders who backed the sales tax.

On Tuesday night, University of Oklahoma President David Boren, who led the campaign supporting the tax, said in a written statement, "While the results did not come back in our favor, we've succeeded in starting a conversation across Oklahoma about education and the need for adequate funding."

"We won't stop fighting to improve funding for our schools," Boren added. "We won't stop fighting for our children. Our work is not done."

The failure of the proposal came as a shock to many. Proponents were well organized

and well funded. A political action committee to support the measure, Oklahoma's Children, Our Future, had raised \$4.2 million by Sept. 30.

While many city leaders opposed the tax, early polling showed support hovering around 60 percent. Schools had cut their budgets and dozens went to four-day weeks. The pro-779 group pumped out TV, print and digital ads up until election day.

In the end, the gamble failed. And in the process, college and universities, which stood to get 19.25 percent of the tax revenue, suffered a 16 percent cut in state appropriations this year. Some observers said it was a direct hit from the Legislature because of the penny-tax effort.

Agreement on Pay Hike

If there is one thing to build on for proponents, it is that both sides seemed to agree teachers deserve a raise.

"Oklahomans want money to get to the classrooms," said Estela Hernandez, vice president of engagement for Oklahoma Council of Public Affairs, which opposed the tax and whose affiliated organization, OCPA Impact, sued to keep the proposal off the ballot.

"Oklahomans just weren't willing to have their taxes raised to the highest in the nation to achieve that teacher pay raise. There are wiser and more effective ways," she said. OCPA has proposed trimming what it views as "wasteful spending," such

as wind energy credits and certain school administrative costs as a way to find more revenue for teacher pay.

Teachers haven't had an across-the-board salary increase in eight years. At \$44,921, Oklahoma ranks 49th in the country in average teacher salary among states and the District of Columbia, according to National Education Association data. The figure represents

total compensation, including paid health and retirement benefits.

Republican state Sen. David Holt said 779's failure should be interpreted as voters' demand for a better proposal, not a rejection of a teacher pay raise.

"I will absolutely introduce new ideas in the 2017 session to support a \$10,000 pay raise," he posted on Facebook. "I understand anyone who has skepticism about the Legislature's ability to deliver, but I can only speak for myself, and addressing teacher pay will continue to be my number one priority..."

Holt in January presented a \$400 million plan to fund teacher raises by overhauling tax breaks, consolidating school districts and diverting a portion of future budget growth to education, but the bill did not pass.

'We Will Be Relentless'

Educator groups such as the Oklahoma State School Boards Association and Professional Oklahoma Educators made similar promises

about aggressively pursuing a pay hike.

"We will be relentless in securing a pay increase for teachers this session," said Ginger Tinney, Professional Oklahoma Educators' executive director. "And I do think our legislators will give that to teachers. I don't know if it will be packaged the same as the state question. I don't see higher ed getting a chunk. We will put every ounce of strength into achieving that goal."

Hofmeister, who didn't publicly endorse the sales tax until late October, is asking for an additional \$282 million for the Education Department's budget to give teachers a \$3,000 salary boost and add four days of instruction to school calendars. Although she is now under a cloud of criminal charges for alleged campaign violations, she has pledged to fight the charges and press ahead with her plans aimed at improving education.

Gov. Mary Fallin considered calling a special session of the Legislature this summer to address teacher pay as an alternative to the state question, but the plan received a lukewarm reception and was scrapped. In a statement Tuesday, Fallin said she'll revive the issue in the upcoming session.

"The voters have spoken, and I'll be meeting with our new legislative leaders to discuss a course of action on the issue of teacher pay raises," Fallin said.

Tips for traveling with your pets over the holidays

For many families, traveling is a big part of the holiday season. It takes some planning ahead to ensure everything goes smoothly.

For pet owners, whether traveling with your pet or boarding it while you are out of town, planning ahead is essential.

Dr. Elisabeth Giedt, director of Continuing Education, Extension and Community Engagement at the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences at Oklahoma State University, said if you plan to travel with your pet, following these tips will help make the trip less stressful for you and your pet.

"Many people may not realize it, but interstate and international travel regulations require your pet have a health certificate. "Your veterinarian will have information about the regulations of all the states you may be traveling through."

When it comes to traveling by car, drivers and passengers do not think twice about buckling up for safety measures. This same train of thought is needed for the safety of your pet.

Giedt said using a proper restraint such as a secure harness or carrier placed clear of the vehicle's airbags, is a must. She also pointed out your pets should never be transported in the bed of a truck. Everyone knows dogs love to put their

faces in the wind while riding in a vehicle, but keep in mind a bump in the road or an accident can cause the animal to be thrown from the vehicle.

"While pet owners realize their furry friends shouldn't be left in a vehicle in the heat of the summer, reality is they should never be left in a vehicle in any weather," she said. "If your holiday road trip requires an overnight stay at a hotel, call ahead and make a reservation at a place that is pet friendly. Life is much easier when you crate train your pets.

For those traveling by air and who are considering taking their pets with them, consult your veterinarian first. Air travel can put some pets at risk, especially short-nosed dogs.

No matter what transportation method you choose for holiday travel, be sure to pack all essentials for your pet, just as you do for yourself. Include your pet's food and any medications, as well as copies of medical records, first aid supplies and a couple of favorite toys.

Giedt said it always is a good idea to have a recent photograph of your pet available should the animal get lost during your travels. Take a picture of you with your pet to help confirm ownership.

"For those who may not have the option or desire to take their pet on a holiday trip, finding a reputable kennel is a must. For

some owners, getting home care is even better since the pet sitter can look after the house, as well as your pets," she said. "If that's not an option, get recommendations from your pet-owner friends and family to see what area boarding kennel they use. If possible, visit the kennel before making a reservation for your pet. Ask to see the kennel's license or certificate showing the kennel meets mandated standards."

As you tour the facility, check to see if it looks and smells clean. Ask the staff questions about how they care for the animals and see if outdoor runs and exercise areas are protected from the wind, rain and snow. Something else to consider is if the kennel provides bedding or if you need to bring your own.

The kennel will most likely require your pet's up-to-date veterinary records before allowing the animal to stay. The facility also may require the vaccine for canine kennel cough. Be sure to ask about bringing your pet's own food. Some kennels offer a variety of services such as grooming, training and bathing, but keep in mind these services will come at a price.

"Traveling during the holidays can be stressful, but knowing your pet is being well taken care of can help ease your stress level of leaving your pet behind."

comes and tries to sell you a different plan.

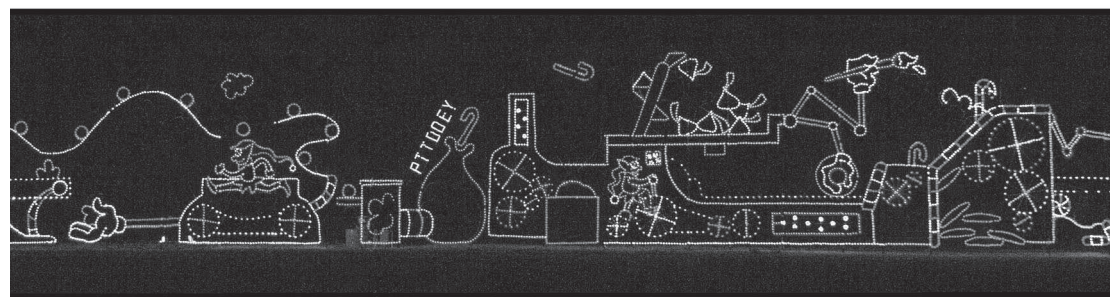

We will be closed from December 23 until we open on the morning of December 26.

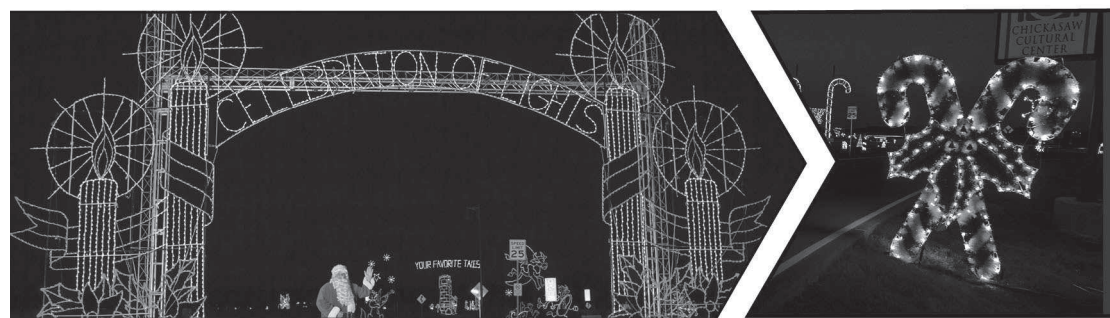

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CCC hosts top Chickasaw artists December 17 in Sulphur

Nationally and internationally acclaimed Chickasaw artists are poised to display works of fine Native American art December 17 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Chickasaw Cultural Center's Holiday Art Show and Market.

Sixteen artists will be on hand. They include:

Joanna Underwood-Blackburn is a celebrated potter whose artwork is inspired by early Chickasaw culture and ancient designs from the southeast, where the tribe thrived until removal to Indian Territory in 1837.

Oka' Chokmasi, a tranquil, water-themed park across the street from the Artesian Hotel and Chickasaw Welcome Center in Sulphur, is filled with bronze artwork crafted by Underwood-Blackburn commissioned by the Chickasaw Nation.

She has placed in many art competitions compiling many awards. Her pottery was judged "Best of Division" and awarded first place at the Southeastern Art Show and Market in Tishomingo; "Best of Division" at the famed Red Earth Festival in Oklahoma City and first place at the Santa Fe Indian Market in Santa Fe, N.M.

Underwood-Blackburn earned a bachelor's degree in Fine Arts from the University of Oklahoma.

Margaret Roach Wheeler is an award-winning weaver, fiber expert and textile artist. She served as the artist-in-residence at the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian in New York.

Wheeler exhibited works at the Museum of Art and Design and the Institute of American Indian Arts, among others. She won numerous awards including the "President's Award" at Red Earth Festival and textile awards at the 2009 Southeastern Art Show and Market in Tishomingo.

Wheeler is the owner of Mahota Handwovens, where she designs contemporary fashions and traditional Native American regalia. Wheeler's loom work is a permanent fixture

of the ARTesian Art Gallery in Sulphur where visitors may watch as artisans loom and weave beautiful textile colors into works of art and functional fashions.

Daniel Worcester is an award-winning blade smith. Eight times he has won first place awards at Santa Fe Indian Market, Santa Fe, N.M.

His work has been selected by the Museum of Arts and Design, in New York for the "Exchanging Hands II" exhibit. Worcester knives have also been exhibited at many major museums across the United States including the Institute of American Indian Arts Museum, Santa Fe; Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art, Indianapolis, Indiana; Naples Museum of Art, Naples, Florida; Anchorage Museum of History and Art, Anchorage, Alaska; Philbrook Museum of Art in Tulsa; Museum of Arts and Design, New York, N.Y.; Weisman Art Museum, University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minn.

Dustin Mater is a sculptor, painter, master craftsman of gorget finery and eclectic visionary.

Mater's "The Unextinguished Fire" took top honors in the Sculpture Division at the Southwest Association of Indian Arts (SWAIA) Indian Market, one of the most prestigious Native American art shows in the nation.

Mater's art has been displayed and sold at Orenda Art International in Paris, France, and Indigenous Brilliance in Edinburgh, Scotland, as well as accepted nationally by several venues, including the National Museum of the American Indian in Washington, D.C.

Brent Greenwood is a multi-medium artist in several disciplines.

Greenwood's painting "Native Sisters" was named "Best in Show" at the 22nd Annual Coors Western Art Exhibit and Sale in Denver, Colo., during summer 2015. Greenwood is the first Chickasaw artist to provide commissioned work for the Oklahoma Native American Caucus Room at the

Oklahoma State Capitol, which found a permanent home next to the Clerk of the House of Representatives. Greenwood's functional and decorative ceremonial hand drum is adorned with a photograph of early Chickasaw legislators circa 1880s.

He also was commissioned by Oklahoma City University (OCU) for a painting of three women gathering healing herbs — one his grandmother and another famed Chickasaw medicine woman Bicy Walker. It is proudly displayed in OCU's school of nursing.

A native Oklahoman, Greenwood is Chickasaw and Ponca. He is a graduate in fine arts disciplines from the Institute of American Indian Arts and Oklahoma City University.

Ellen Etzler is a citizen of the Chickasaw Nation. She is self-taught and began her journey as an artist just a few years ago when the last of her five children left home.

Her strong suits are painting, collage and print-making. She

is strongly influenced by a California childhood and says her paintings include "sunshine, beaches, bright colors and hippies." Etzler's current work is focused on the history and stories of the Chickasaw and other Native people while exploring other areas of artistic interest.

Ten additional artists will be featured. They include Tuttle resident Misti Butler who specializes in 3D art; Melvin Burris, a Stonewall resident who crafts fine jewelry and basketry; Billy Hensley, a Norman native, will show paintings inspired by Chickasaw culture and heritage. His goal is to be a part of a movement to help Chickasaw artist gain a foothold in the global art community.

Also Nancy Johnson of Oklahoma City will bring a diversity of art to display; E. Dee Tabor, a Tulsa resident also specializes in 3D art and is inspired by Nature and her Chickasaw heritage. E. Dee designs and creates unique hand-crafted

jewelry. As an artisan jeweler, she works with a variety of natural stones, pearls, glass, and metals.

And Chickasaw elder Pat Cox, an Ada resident, will bring leather-tooled art; Mariah Greenwood-Adair, also of Ada, is a master beadwork craftswoman with beautiful earrings and bracelets; Brian Landreth, a Midwest City painter who has drawn Native

American inspiration for full-blood Chickasaw and Choctaw grandparents; and Jeremy and Ashley Wallace, also of Ada, specializing in weaponry, drums, flutes, fashion, purses and other art of various genres.

Among those projects are access control for the entire campus, redirected morning traffic flow at the intermediate and elementary schools, renovation of the elementary and junior high administration, a safer room building and improvements to the high school.

Another \$1,271,181 has been figured for three projects deemed critical or pressing need.

These include replacing the middle school roof, renovating the existing gymnasium and cafeteria/kitchen.

On the list of projects still to be prioritized is work totaling \$1,873,158.

That includes an addition to the band room, sixth grade rest rooms, new competition flooring in the practice gymnasium, a new concession

building, field house addition, re-stripping and traffic control in the parking lot at the competitive gymnasium, wrestling locker room, new visitor rest rooms, converting the existing concession space to storage and upgrading the all the district's lighting to LED lights.

It's possible, board president Doug Northcutt told the audience, that other financing exists for the LED lights.

Anticipated electricity savings would pay off the \$397,941 for the lights in five years, he added.

Bass and the board believe that with a guaranteed water source for east of Lexington, the town can anticipate more homes will be built.

The superintendent said she's been told by the district's bond adviser that property

owners will likely see no tax increase due to the bonds.

The district is also committed to using bond proceeds to pay for \$500,000 for textbooks, \$300,000 for technology, and \$100,000 for architectural and engineering fees, as well as general requirements of the construction.

The cost estimates don't include any funds for asbestos, lead or mold remediation or major relocation of utilities.

While some worried that the morning traffic flow suggestion will be inadequate to keep children safe, others worried that the elimination of one gymnasium would leave the elementary school without a place for physical education.

"We need three gyms" was heard more than a few times.

"All the projects we listed, there's not enough money to

do all of them," Bass said. "We know the number one thing parents and teachers want is safety and security. That creates a domino effect."

"We all love Mr. (David) Craig (band teacher), but the band room expansion is a luxury at this point."

She said the district consulted with an expert to do a walk-through the cafeteria and point out problems in the kitchen.

"He thought the vent should be in a museum. It's that old," the superintendent said.

She added there's also an issue with the freezer, possibly jeopardizing thousands of dollars of food.

Those in the audience got the message.

"We're not trying to build Norman North here," one man agreed. "This is Lexington."

request to sell the equipment through Big Iron Auctions.

Midkiff said the items are the contents of buildings that will be sold at a later date.

The auction will be December 28 and the list of consigned items includes chairs with and without wheels, metal lockers, carpet rolls and scraps, a non-working washer, books, filing cabinets, soap and towel dispensers, projectors, tape players, kitchen appliances, oil fryers, pianos, tables, televisions, a sofa, basketball shooting machines, drums and other band instruments, wheeled plastic cart, battery backups, chemical dispensers, John Deere and Massey brush hogs, Woods trim mower, weed trimmers, 500-gallon water tank, welder/generator, buffer, vinyl floor tile and a band saw.

Midkiff anticipates a second auction to sell the buildings on January 20.

During a brief meeting, the board also gave Midkiff a go-ahead to solicit bids and hire a commercial custodial service on a month-to-month basis for the remainder of the 2016-17 school year.

Midkiff said both the junior

high school and high school need two full time custodians.

However, the district has had difficulty hiring and keeping a full-time custodian at the high school.

Also approved was a \$37,080 contract with Standard Roofing to re-roof the maintenance facility located between Education Station and the elementary school.

Midkiff said the company's offer was the best of three bids received. The work is expected to take 21 days.

In his report, Midkiff said an update to the district's website should be more user friendly and will also link to the district's social media outlets on Facebook and Twitter.

Turning to finances, Midkiff noted the district is awaiting the mid-term adjustment from the State Department of Education.

He added there's been a slight uptick in oil and gas revenue in Oklahoma, welcome news after 22 straight months of income and sales tax deficits blamed on the falling price of oil and gas.

The board also adopted a foster care plan for the district and revised board policy on student residency.

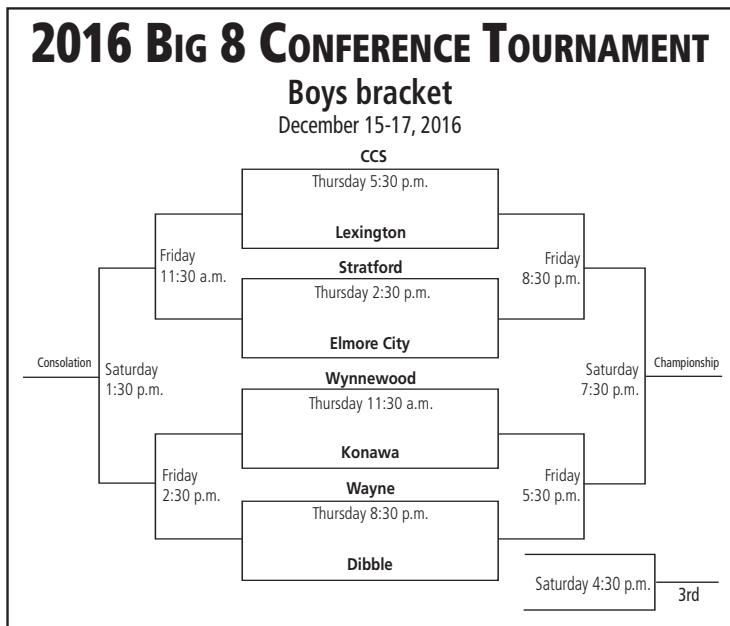
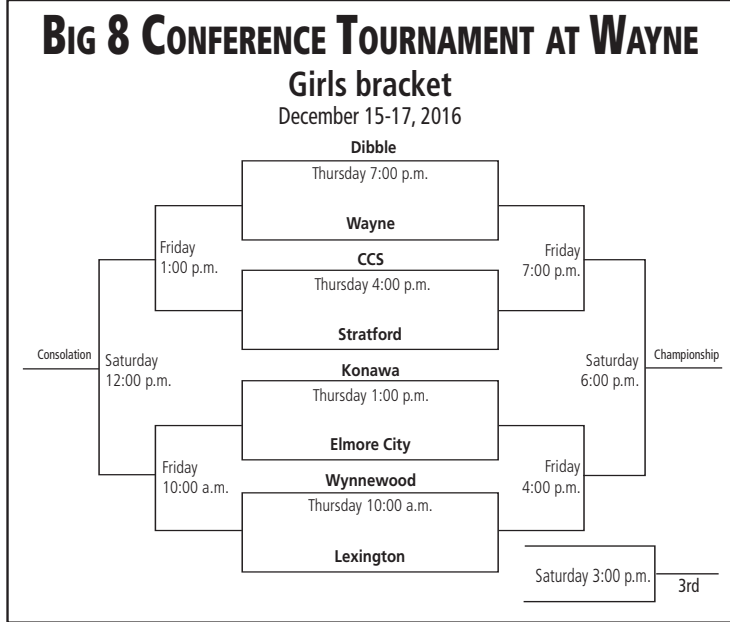

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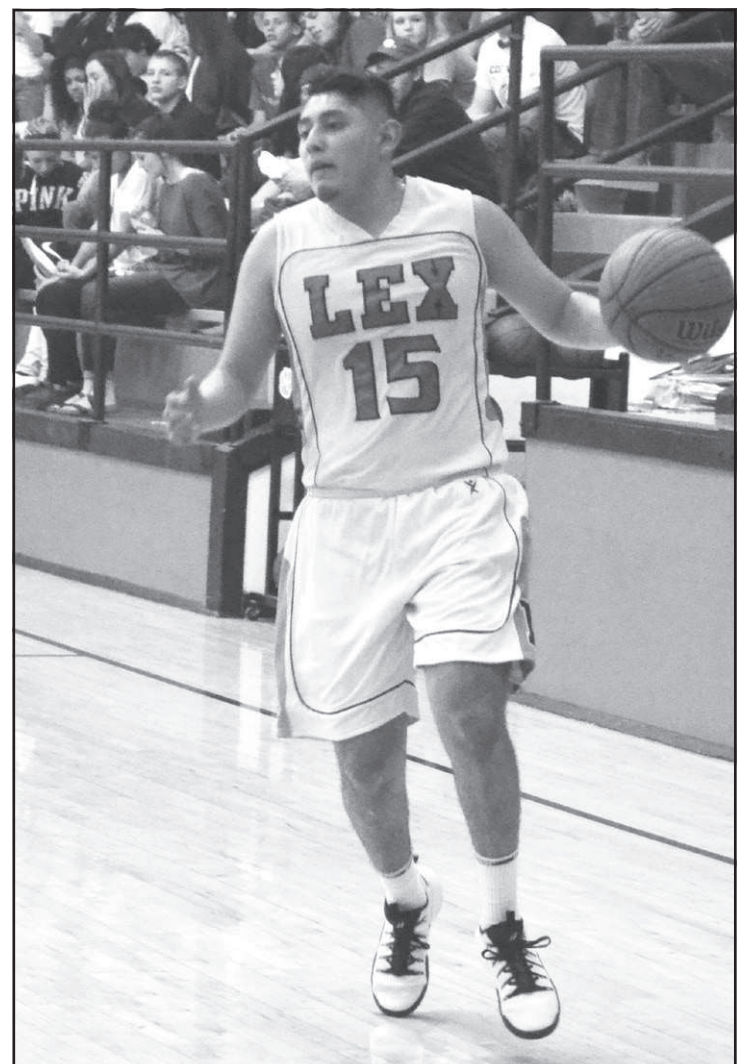

A New Year’s resolution

In Article I, section 7, clause 1 of the United States Constitution, our Founding Fathers laid out the framework for the Congressional “Power of the Purse.”

Congress has the fundamental responsibility for raising revenue and appropriating spending. It has done so for more than two centuries, but the job has become more complicated than need be in recent decades.

Over the past several years, passing a budget and funding the government has grown more difficult, and has even resulted in government shutdowns. Just last week, Congress passed a continuing resolution at the 11th hour, just narrowly avoiding yet another government shutdown.

Failure to pass appropria-

tions bills and reliance upon continuing resolutions is an irresponsible way to govern and a dereliction of duty on the part of our elected officials.

We are fortunate that we did not witness another government shutdown last week, but the struggle to appropriate funds for our government programs is still real. You see, we must, and should, pass new appropriations bills each year to reflect the changing circumstances in our government programs and agencies.

The needs and priorities of our government agencies are constantly changing and the annual appropriations process is the only responsible way to address these changes.

Along with appropriations legislation, we have authorization bills, which authorize the funding for government

programs and agencies.

Forexample, we just recently passed the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for the next Fiscal Year 2017. It is one of the most critical, comprehensive bills that Congress considers every year, and it is must-pass legislation. That was one huge step forward.

However, all too often the one step forward is followed by two steps back. This year, in the House, we were successful in passing all 12 appropriations bills that fund the broad spectrum of our government out of the Appropriations Committee.

But this is simply not enough. We need to get back into the regular order of things, and take all 12 of these bills to the House Floor, each year. When we fail to do that, we end up back to a continuing resolution, like the one passed last Friday.

Continuing resolutions cause a great deal of inconvenience to our federal agencies, our military and ultimately, to the American taxpayer. Although a shutdown is costlier, a continuing resolution simply puts the federal government on autopilot and ignores the changing circumstances and priorities of the nation.

It is disappointing that Congress once again failed to do the job and had to settle for yet another continuing resolution. We should not wait until April 28 – the expiration date of the current continuing resolution.

Congress needs to finish the job of funding the government for Fiscal Year 2017 immediately.

No more kicking the can down the road – let this serve as our New Year’s resolution, and get the job done.

Monarch Habitat Initiative Cost-Share Program

Funds are available for

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service working with the Oklahoma Conservation Commission have provided

limited funds to our conservation district to help landowners implement measures that protect and enhance the Monarch Habitat.

The district will be accepting applications through Dec. 30, 2016.

Last Sunday, we celebrated Gaudete Sunday, the Third Sunday of Advent. "Gaudete" is a Latin word that means "Rejoice!" and reflects the mood of the liturgy as we rejoice in the expectation of Christ's coming, the light that shines in our darkened world. The pink candle was lit on the Advent wreath, alongside the first two purple candles.

There are just some things we cannot change and we never will. A woman once complained about the change to Daylight Saving Time. She said "that extra hour of sunlight is burning up my tomato plants!" We cannot change the hours of sunlight in a day. And we cannot change the will of God for our salvation. We cannot hurry it along. It will happen in God's time.

What we can do—is to be patient. When a woman and a man are expecting their first child, they wait for nine months. They wait—but they do not wait in stillness. They are busy in preparation! They prepare a room or a crib. They clean the house and paint the walls. They invite friends over to receive gifts and to share in their joy. As the day of birth approaches, they get more and more excited. They are preparing for the coming of the new baby.

Farmers too know what it means to wait (James 5:7-10).

They wait for the right time to plant. They wait for the first seedlings to appear. They wait for rains to water the crops and make them grow. They wait in patience, but they are busy as they wait.

In the Advent season we wait for Jesus. We wait for the Prince of Peace, the One who will come to rule the world. We wait—but we do not wait in stillness. We are busy in preparation! We spend moments of silence in prayer. We read of God's promises, revealed to us in his holy Word, the Bible. We gather as a community to watch and to listen and to learn.

We also turn our energies towards people in need, as Jesus did. We feed the hungry as Jesus did. We pray for the sick as Jesus did. We turn our gaze towards the poor and the widows and the orphans, as Jesus did. We may even gather Christmas gifts to give to those families in need. Our salvation—our return to wholeness—will happen in God's time. We wait with confidence and with faith.

In the early 1900s, an American preacher, named Reinhold Niebuhr, wrote a prayer that we have come to know as the Serenity Prayer. It was given to servicemen and women in WWII and adopted as the official prayer of Alcoholics Anonymous.

This is the prayer: "God,

give me grace to accept with Serenity the things that cannot be changed, The Courage to change the things which should be changed, and the Wisdom to know the difference. Living one day at a time, Enjoying one moment at a time, Accepting hardship as a pathway to peace, Taking, as Jesus did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it, trusting that You will make all things right. If I surrender to Your will, so that I may be reasonably happy in this life, and supremely happy with You forever in the next. Amen."

As we wait upon the Lord this Advent, we pray that we may know the things we cannot change, and have the patience to trust that God will make all things right.

Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Very good day to all! Welcome to the "front porch."

One sublime feeling that seems to be more common in these cold days of December, and this is a good thing, is that of peace. After all, it is one of the key messages the gospel-writer Luke records from those angelic messengers who visited a Bethlehem hillside two millennia ago: "Glory to God in the highest," he writes, "and on earth peace, good will toward men" (2:14).

Here in the latter days of 2016 and with a prospective eye to 2017, it is good that we spend some time doing some personal examination, particularly spiritually. Reaching for your outward goals may be worthy, but it is far more important to reach for something special within.

Peace, we all agree, is that one precious inward gym that we all should search for at such a time of the year. It's greater than money, fame, even health.

Peace is something we develop gradually through both good and difficult times. The Apostle Paul says that peace the Lord gives is a peace "that passes understanding" (Philippians 4:7). That's the kind

of peace I want. I know you do, too.

For one of our final visits of 2016, let's pause together to emphasize this powerful element. There are few stories that illustrate the power of peace more than the story of an old-time songwriter named H.G. Spafford.

In 1873, H.G. Spafford wrote one of the most beautiful gospel hymns ever written. When I've considered the words of his great hymn through the years, I've often thought Mr. Spafford must have been well-acquainted with difficulties. It would be many years after first singing his hymn that I would learn that he was right.

In 1870, Mr. Spafford and his wife Anna lost their only son to pneumonia. He was four. A year later, tragedy struck again as Mr. Spafford, his wife, and their four daughters lost most of their income in the great fire of Chicago. They held their lives together for the next couple of years, and in 1873 decided to take a trip to England to re-energize themselves. Mr. Spafford stayed back in Chicago a few days to attend to some urgent business, and he sent his wife and daughters

on ahead. Halfway across the Atlantic on their voyage, an English vessel struck their ship, and it went down in less than 15 minutes. Spafford's wife survived miraculously, but the four daughters—Tanetta, Maggie, Annie, and Bessie—did not. Spafford immediately boarded a ship to join his devastated wife in Wales. As he sailed, he spent many difficult hours on the deck of that ship grieving over his great loss. It is said that when the ship came near

Using heirloom textiles during the holidays

With the holiday season in
full swing, many people are
decorating for this special time
of year. As tubs of ornaments
and other festive decorations
come out of storage, it is likely
there are a lot of memories at-
tached to them.

Some of these decorations
may be fragile, so you take extra
care with them in order for the
tradition of these decorations
to continue.

Other special holiday items
may be in the form of tex-
tiles that bring back special
memories, said Mary Ruppert-
Stroescu, Oklahoma State Uni-
versity Cooperative Extension
clothing specialist.

“When you open the cedar
chest and see your great-
grandmother’s linen tablecloth,
don’t sigh and complain about
all the wrinkles, or say ‘I wish
I could use that,’” Ruppert-
Stroescu said. “Just as with
other heirloom holiday things
you use, these special textiles
just require a little extra care.
The fact that the tablecloth is
wrinkled can be a sign of true
linen and true quality.”

In order to make that table-
cloth look exquisite on your
holiday table, set aside some
time to iron it. Dampen it a
little with a spray bottle, or
simply by dipping your hand
in a bowl of water and flicking
water droplets over the fabric.

Ruppert-Stroescu also sug-
gests using a little bit of spray
starch to keep the fabric crisp
and flat longer. Spray starch
also will help protect it from
food stains.

“Don’t worry too much if
your guests get an oil-based
stain on the linen. Simply put
an absorbent white towel under
the spot and blot it with a clean,
white cloth until all obvious oil
is absorbed,” she said.

“Next, immediately sprinkle
the spot with salt or nonper-
fumed baby powder and let it
sit for about 5 to 10 minutes, or
until you see caked-up powder.
Brush off the powder with a
small brush, such as a clean
toothbrush.

“Repeat this process until
there is no more caking. This
step should be followed by rub-
bing the spot with a heavy-duty
liquid detergent and laundering
immediately,” she said.

Tannin-based stains, such
as wine or coffee, should be
treated in the same manner as
an oil-based stain to blot away
the excess liquid. However,
only use the salt method, not
powder.

Once the excess wine or cof-
fee has been absorbed, stretch
the stained area of the tablecloth
over a bowl, secure with a rub-
ber band and pour boiling water
over it. Next, pretreat with a
stain remover and launder right
away in hot water.

Candles have long been a
favorite way to dress up your
dining table. If you happen
to drop wax on the heirloom
textile, the best thing to do is
wait for it to dry.

Try putting an ice cube on the
spot to make the wax brittle.
Then, take a dull knife and
scrape away the wax.

“Despite what you may
have heard, don’t iron the
wax spot between two paper
towels. The heat will drive the
wax deeper into the fibers,”
Ruppert-Stroescu said. “As you
prepare to set your table for this
year’s festivities, go ahead and
use those heirloom linens and
cherish the memories.”

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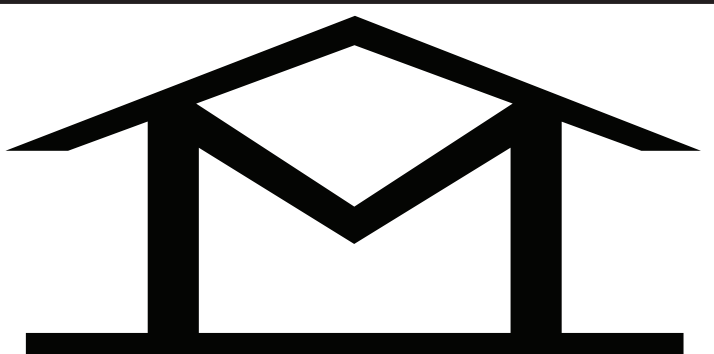

Keep your pets warm and healthy this winter season

Just because they have a fur coat does not mean your pet can endure extended time outdoors when the temperature is frigid. Dogs, like other animals, must be out of the wind and dry for the insulating properties of their coats to be effective.

Dogs that evolved in warm climates have short hair coats to protect them from the sun and help them stay cool, versus dogs that evolved in cold climates and have longer hair coats. If you are cold, your short-haired pet may be cold, too.

Just as people add extra layers of clothing, bump up the thermostat or throw an extra log on the fire to keep warm, pet owners must take action to ensure their four-legged friends stay warm and healthy through the winter season.

"Oklahoma experienced record-breaking warm temperatures this fall, but now we're finally starting to experience some winter-like weather," said Dr. Elisabeth Giedt, director of Continuing Education, Extension and Community Engagement at the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences at Oklahoma State University. "These frosty temperatures require pet owners take extra care of their pets. And remember, the wind chill affects our pets, too."

During the frigid winter weather, the best and safest option is to keep pets indoors. If this is not an option, make sure they have adequate shelter to shield them from the wind, moisture and cold.

Position the opening of the shelter so it is not facing the wind. If possible, cover the opening with a drape of some sort to help cut down the wind. Make sure the animal can easily get in and out of its shelter and it is roomy enough.

Giedt also pointed out pet owners can purchase safe, heated floor mats or nonelectric warm bedding to provide extra warmth. Clean hay, straw, cedar shavings and even old blankets provide an insulating layer in

the shelter. Be sure to regularly clean or replace bedding. Moist areas can grow bacteria and mold and external parasites can set up housekeeping in the bedding.

"Sometimes people think just because the pet has a fur coat, the animal will stay warm. If your pet's fur is matted, it doesn't keep them warm," she said. "It's important if your pet must stay outside, keeps the animal's coat well groomed."

Short-haired dogs, elderly and very young pets should be kept indoors for their safety. An animal's ears, tail and paws are more susceptible to frostbite. If you suspect frostbite, cover your pet with warm towels taken right out of the dryer, gently pat dry the affected area and contact your veterinarian.

Aside from the cold weather, pet owners also need to be aware of the increased possibility of antifreeze poisoning.

"This is both a winter and summer problem because cats and dogs are attracted to the sweet smell and taste of antifreeze," she said. "If you spill some in your garage or driveway, clean it up right away. Antifreeze is highly toxic and absorbs rapidly into your pet's system. In fact, initial signs such as vomiting or being very unsteady on their feet can present themselves in just an hour after ingestion."

The kidneys are most adversely affected, often shutting down completely with 12 to 24 hours in cats and 36 to 72 hours in dogs. If you suspect your pet has ingested antifreeze, contact your veterinarian immediately.

On occasion, Oklahoma finds itself in the middle of a deep freeze, complete with ice on sidewalks and roadways. While putting down salt can help ensure you do not slip and slide while trying to navigate the roads and sidewalks, salt can cause irritation on an animal's foot pads.

"Pets also may drool more than normal if they've licked their salty paws," Giedt said. "Check around for more pet-friendly options to treat your slick sidewalks around your

home."

Giedt said outdoor pets often seek warmth in places that can be dangerous, including under a car hood or inside a wheel well. Check your vehicle before starting it to make sure no animal has taken shelter.

Food and water are two other aspects of which pet owners need to be aware. Pets likely are burning more calories to stay warm, so a little extra food is necessary. Make sure your pet has plenty of fresh, clean water, too. Check the water bowl several times a day to ensure it has not frozen.

"Romping in the snow with your pet can be a lot of fun during the winter. Just make sure you're providing your pet with the best possible care this winter to ensure Roofus or Miss Kitty remain safe and healthy," she said.

As we draw closer to Christmas, many people need a hand up. The Edmond Elks Lodge partnered with our local Wright's IGA grocery store managed by Tommy Wilson and donated over \$600 to us for our veterans and their families. Their generosity will help us provide food items for

10 families. Our food baskets are an important part of who we are and what we provide for veterans and their families.

One of the most expensive items that we provide for veterans is the cost of medical testing used in support of a diagnosis of a disability. We are not financially able to help every person who applies for assistance with the cost of medical screening. We do help those veterans and surviving spouses who meet our income thresholds.

I know that some of the men and women we assist have a difficult time staying more than a few hours. As we move forward, we should be able to cut the wait time for many of them in half. Our goal is to improve our processes we use to help veterans and their families.

Our volunteers are there each Tuesday and Thursday morning to help each person to receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible. If you are a veteran, chances are pretty good that we can help you receive VA benefits. I have had veterans tell me that it was too big of a hassle to file for VA benefits. We have changed the lives of thousands who we have assisted with their VA claims and questions.

Over the years that I have been assisting veterans and surviving spouses I have found that most veterans will receive either compensation or pension benefits if they only apply. The easiest way for a veteran to receive the compensation benefit is to file a claim for service connection of hearing loss and tinnitus. Most veterans were exposed to the acoustic trauma of gunfire, artillery, aircraft engine noise or other types of very loud noise while on active duty. If you were exposed to these loud noises, please consider visiting with one of our volunteers about possible VA benefits.

Our ladies who assist the surviving spouses of veterans continue to help from 12 to 25 apply for VA benefits each week. If you are a surviving spouse, please consider stopping by to visit with one of our ladies or call Shirley at (405) 361-9322. For those of you who know a surviving spouse of a veteran, please let him or her know about what we do to assist them to possibly receive VA benefits.

One of the most frequently asked questions I receive from spouses and veterans alike is "Will a spouse be able to receive VA benefits when the veteran dies?" There are several answers to that question. The one that I like the best is if a veteran's service-connected disability is listed on the death certificate as the primary or secondary cause of death the surviving spouse is likely to be approved for DIC. I encourage all veterans who are married to tell their spouse and family

members about this.

On each visit, veterans should bring all their DD-214's (discharge papers), all VA rating letters, and all VA forms that have been filed. For privacy reasons, Dale K. Graham's Veteran's Corner does not keep your information on file and does not have access to any of this information. A couple of things are sometimes needed to file for VA benefits are D214 discharge papers, bank account information (voided check), marriage information, social security information, and all VA rating decisions.
