

Gas line BREAK spurs EVACUATIONS

Three homes evacuated and two schools placed on lockdown

Three homes were evacuated in the 1000 block of north 8th and two school buildings in the area were locked down Tuesday morning after a backhoe struck a natural gas line. Purcell Police and Fire units responded as well as a crew of Oklahoma Natural Gas employees to 1003 north 8th. The 900 and 1000 blocks of north 8th were cordoned off by police with fire units up and down 8th Street.

PurcellAssistant Fire Chief Rocky Claunch said the call came in at 9:53 a.m.

"ONG responded quickly and got the gas shut off," Claunch said.

Last month, parks and recreation director Chris Griffith and council member Danny Jacobs shared with the council details from their fact-finding visits to area swimming pools. Residents in Ada ap-

On Jan. 28, 2010, there was that sometime Oklahoma winter weather event. Anice storm. Areally severe ice storm.

By the time the storm passed and skies cleared, Purcell residents could see the damage left behind.

The weighty covering of ice was devastating for the city's trees. And particularly hard hit was Purcell's pride - Bradford pears that graced the median on North Green Avenue for close to three decades.

Broken beyond saving, the trees' remains were taken out the next month.

And city officials set into motion a new beautification plan for the now stark median.

GreenScape and a companion project Main StreetScape were born.

So far both projects have existed only as architect's renderings.

Soon, very soon, that will change.







The City of Purcell does free brush pickup two times per year in the fall and again in the spring. These schedules will be published in The Purcell Register and can be obtained at Purcell City Hall.

During the remainder of the year, the City of Purcell will do brush pickup by work order only. This means that the customer has to call in to City Hall to request pickup with charges to be assessed to the customer utility account.

The charges may range from \$15 for a small load up to \$50 for a large load.

The garbage company, WCA, does bulk waste pickup on the fourth Monday of each month. This includes small loads of brush. The brush needs to be cut in three foot lengths and bundled with twine.



Election Day finally arrived. Thursday, August 20, 1998, was perhaps the most awaited date in Lennox Valley history. In a year filled with anticipation, featuring visits from celebrities of all types, the mayoral race between current mayor, Dick Bland, and his opponent, Raymond Cooper, had created a greater stir than any event in the 148-year history of the Valley.

Who would have thought an election could draw more attention than Todd Cecil, celebrity evangelist from Joplin, Missouri, or an appearance at the upcoming Spring County Fair by Tangi Blevins & the Heavenly Hosts? Perhaps the only event to rival this campaign was the appearance of the first female pastor in the Valley just two months earlier.

Knowing the majority of ballots were entered near the end of the day, Cooper wasted no time in swaying any fence-sitting voters. Raymond began his daily show, "Renderings with Raymond," three hours early, at 9:00 a.m., under the guise of informing the public of any breaking news on Election Day.

The morning buzz at Caroline's Beauty Parlor focused on one topic: Juliet Stoughton's campaign rally on the square just 18 hours earlier. With the help of Rhonda Goodman and Caroline (who were both persuaded to attend the rally after hearing Stoughton supporters referred to as "stupid" on Cooper's Wednesday show), along with Jessie Orr, waitress at the Hoffbrau, more than 120 women

- plus a handful of men - showed up to hear Stoughton speak. You might remember it was Jessie who originally planted the idea of running for office in Juliet's mind as she sipped tea at "the 'brau" just a few weeks earlier.

As customers discussed the rally, "Renderings with Raymond" could be heard playing on Caroline's speakers.

Realizing Farley Puckett's "stupid" comment might have hurt his standing among female voters, Cooper attempted to heal any wounds by tending to the sensibilities of women listeners.

"I believe a woman has just as much right to

run for mayor as anyone else," Raymond muttered as he began hour two of his "special edition." "However," he continued, "it's obvious that a vote for Stutin," purposely mispronouncing Juliet's name, "is a wasted vote in this race.'

"What kind of name is Stutin anyway?" interrupted Raymond's guest, Earl Goodman. "It sounds kind of Russian to me.'

Unbeknownst to the listeners, Earl and Rhonda Goodman slept separately the previous evening for the first time since her mysterious impetigo attack seven years earlier. Earl could not believe his wife of 32 years had been swayed by that "conniving woman."

Raymond was acutely aware that he needed more than 50 percent of the vote to win the election outright. If Juliet could acquire enough votes, she could force a runoff between him and Bland. Even though Cooper had a substantial lead in the Spring County League of Women Voters poll, he could feel his support shrinking with each passing day.

The poll showed him with 39 percent of the voters on his side. If he could draw just half of the 28 percent who declared themselves "undecided," he would win the election handily.

"If she were to get just a few votes," continued Raymond, "she could force a runoff between me and Sliver Tongue," purposely twisting Bland's nickname. "And even though I would defeat the so-called mayor easily, it seems like a huge waste of taxpayer time and money to hold another election next week."

"Just think of all the things that money could be spent on besides an election," Earl chimed in.

"That's right," said Cooper. "I'd hate to think of all the extra taxes our voters would have to pay to stroke the ego of one self-centered woman."

"The women of our city need to talk to their husbands. Voting against them is like wasting both of their votes," shouted Goodman.

"You know, Earl," offered Raymond, "after dealing with our corrupt Valley government for years, I believe you are the only public servant we have that makes any sense," referring to Goodman's role as mail carrier to the good folks of Lennox Valley.

Several listeners thought they heard a sniffle as Earl whispered, "Thank you, Mr. Mayor."



Schools:

Oklahoma's largest online charter school is on a track of explosive growth, nearly tripling its enrollment over three years, to almost 8,500.

That pursuit of lightning growth by Epic Charter Schools – a goal affirmed by its co-founder – shows no signs of letting up. Epic officials predict enrollment will near 10,000 by mid-school year.

But the trend is raising concerns from one top online charter-school regulator about whether there is too much turnover of students. And at least one national report warns that rapid expansion at virtual charter schools can compromise academic achievement.

Epic's unconventional efforts to drive enrollment also have raised eyebrows. Among other tactics, it gives out concert tickets, vacations and other prizes to students' families as rewards for referrals of students. The school also spurs referrals by depositing bonus money into "learning fund" accounts that families can use to buy their curriculum or computers or defray fees for extracurricular activities such as dancing or club sports. Epic told state officials the rewards are not paid for with state funds.

Epic administrators say their system is growing rapidly because parents and students love it. Parents of some students applaud the program, saying it gives them the freedom of home-schooling with some of the benefits of a public school.

"Clearly, we're providing a quality of service and education that families are enjoying and appreciate, or we wouldn't be continuing to grow year after year," said Superintendent David Chaney.

But Epic's academic performance is average or low, as measured by the state's standard assessment tools. Just over a quarter of Epic's students last year graduated within four years, compared with 82 percent statewide. Its elementary, middle and high schools received a C-, D and C on the state A-F report cards.

Those marks contrast with Epic's posting a 100 percent attendance rate for the 2015trying to close. Epic co-founder Ben Harris said the school is working on improving its graduation rates and A-F letter grades. He added the number that matters most to him is enrollment.

"The statistic that matters to us is how many parents say our school is the best choice for them every year. We feel like real accountability is choice," Harris said.

Epic's Rise

Epic Charter Schools was the first statewide online charter school to form in Oklahoma. At the time, in 2011, it was sponsored by the small Graham-Dustin School District in Weleetka.

Epic, founded by Chaney and Harris, began classes with an enrollment of more than 1,700 for the year. Its tenure has been marked by controversy, including Epic suing the state Department of Education over funding and the release of its report card. In both lawsuits, Epic prevailed. The school also is dealing with an ongoing state investigation into allegations of fraud, which Epic denies.

Epic Charter Schools is the brand name for Community Strategies Inc., a nonprofit that receives state and other education funds. The nonprofit contracts with Epic Youth Services, a for-profit company that manages the school for a fee of 10 percent of Epic's gross revenue. Epic Youth Services, in turn, contracts with Advanced Academics, a division of Connections Education, a Pearson company

Chaney is both superintendent of Epic and chief executive officer of Epic Youth Services.

Like other charter schools, Epic receives state aid based on enrollment. And that enrollment began taking dramatic leaps in 2014-2015, when the total number of students soared by 50 percent, to nearly 4,400.

This year, Epic also became the first Oklahoma charter school to expand to another state when school leaders opened an online school in California last month.

dents in many situations, such as athletes, musicians, teenage moms, chronically ill students and victims of bullying.

Matthew Whittington, of Edmond, said leaving the four walls of his high school was about rearranging time for his passion: gymnastics.

His freshman year, he'd routinely follow a day of classes with four or five hours at the gym. Then, tired, he'd come home to a mess of homework.

He learned of Epic from another competitive gymnast and thought it sounded like a good fit.

Matt is now in his third year, his senior year, with Epic. He's preparing to graduate and is eyeing college.

While his mom, Peggy Whittington, speaks highly of the education her son has received at Epic, she acknowledges that online school isn't a good fit for every student. In fact, Matt's two brothers (he is a triplet) attend their neighborhood brick-and-mortar school, Edmond Memorial High School.

"You have to be very selfmotivated and self-disciplined," Peggy Whittington said. "You have to realize that just because you're not ruled by the bell ... you have to have structure to your life.'

To help Matt succeed in virtual school, she had an arrangement with his teacher the past two years in which he and the other students spent Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at the teacher's home from about 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., where the teacher facilitated learning and answered questions.

Matt's dad was able to arrange a flexible work schedule to stay home with him some days and teach him math and science.

"We made it work in our family, but it wasn't without some sacrifice," said Whittington, a teacher at Edmond Memorial.

An additional recommendation was to curb enrollment growth.

The alliance proposed that states consider eliminating open enrollment and setting criteria for admission of students who can best benefit from online education. It recommended setting maximum enrollment levels for any school so "operators will focus on enrolling students who will flourish in this type of environment, rather than just getting students in seats.'

Some states, such as Maine and Illinois, have capped the growth of virtual schools based on poor academic performance and setting limits on how many virtual schools can open each year.

As estimated 15 percent of Epic students are returning to school to achieve a high school diploma, Harris said. Many times, these students aren't able to graduate on time, which lowers the school's graduation rate.

"The norm we're fighting there is it only takes four years to get out of high school," Harris said. "But what we're finding is normal is rare now. Everybody has their own unique circumstances."

State law allows high schools to enroll students up to age 21.

Epic enrolls any student at any point in the year and has never had a waiting list. Harris said he's especially proud to serve victims of bullying and other students facing significant hurdles in a traditional school setting.

He said he's tired of people criticizing their school model.

"We're going to serve thousands and thousands of kids this year, and we're really getting tired of being maligned," Harris said.

Some parents and online school leaders say many parents are migrating to virtual schools because they are fed up with local schools.

More than 80 percent of Epic students previously attended a neighborhood public school, according to a survey of 350 Epic parents in May, conducted by The Office of Educational Quality and Accountability. Nearly 22 percent had been home-schooled, and 10 percent had attended another online charter school. Some students had multiple prior schooling experiences.

The most common reasons parents sought a virtual school was that their child was not succeeding academically, was being bullied or needed flexibility due to traveling, health issues or sports.

"We saw that the schools were getting worse, not better and didn't want our child in that environment," one parent wrote. "My child was bullied and no (one) seemed to care," another wrote.

These parents may be searching for alternatives when they hear about virtual schools.

One way virtual schools and their affiliates maximize enrollment is by engaging in aggressive recruitment.

K12, the Virginia company, which provides curriculum for two Oklahoma virtual charters, spent \$31.2 million on advertising last year, including public television ads aired in localities.

Epic's recent contests for parent-to-parent referrals included prizes such as a package of concert tickets to see Selena Gomez and a family getaway to Great Wolf Lodge.


The school also adds \$100 for each referral into a student's learning fund, a schoolcontrolled account that starts with \$800 each year and that parents "spend" on curriculum, laptops, and activities such as sports and dance (which qualify as physical education.) The list of qualifying vendors includes piano studios, dance academies, soccer and martial arts, even equestrian clubs and an archery range.

Noting the "irresistible" lure of online schools and their innovative potential, the report urged policymakers not to rush to embrace them "without first fully understand and controlling for the potential peril."



Student retention, or how many students return to the school in subsequent years, will be the focus of an audit the Virtual Charter School Board plans to conduct next month.

Wilkinson said she hopes the data will address whether there are certain times of the year when students are dropping from the rolls, such as just before spring testing or just after October 1, when enrollment is measured by the state for funding purposes.

National studies have shown that many times, virtual students end up back in their traditional neighborhood school. One of the problems with that is the funding for that student stays with the virtual school.

Epic leaders say about twothirds of their students return the next year, leaving one-third who leave the school and enroll elsewhere.







Oklahoma River Equestrian Park Staking Ceremony Held

Civic leaders and community officials gathered near Stockyards City and the Oklahoma River September 29 to announce plans and stake ground for an equestrian park in celebration of the city's and Oklahoma's rich Western heritage.

At this point, the park's facilities are in the wish-list category, but do include a visitor's center, a corral, open and covered outdoor arenas, an exercise area and a riding stable open to the public. Trails are to be developed up and down the south bank of the Oklahoma River, all the way to the Indian Cultural Center in the east to Crystal Lake in the west, with the trail-head at the Stockyards.

Plans also include a horse hotel so that horsemen traveling to horse shows anywhere north, south, east or west of the crossroads of I-35 and I-40 will have an easily-accessible place to off-load their horses from trailers to rest in a safe, comfortable environment that has been planned for them. The park also has plans for a sanctioned-size polo field.

Oklahoma City has long been the horse show capital of the nation, having some of the largest and most prestigious horse shows in the nation. This includes the AQHA World Championship show, the National Reining Horse Association's Derby and Futurity, the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Association's Red Bud Spectacular (largest horse show in the nation in number of judges and in horses and exhibitors), two national-level Barrel Racing events, the Morgan Horse Grand National show, The AQHA Youth World Championship show, the USTRC Team Roping Nationals and the Arab Youth World Championship show, to name a few. Plus the horse shows held during the State Fair, which includes the National Championship finals for North American Six Horse Hitch Classic Series during the Draft Horse Show.

The Oklahoma River has become a magnet of activity for Oklahoma City residents and tourists alike, looking for fun and excitement. The equestrian park is destined to be the next big attraction along the Oklahoma river, which is becoming a national destination point.

The idea of this park is a positive enhancement to the reputation and image of the State of Oklahoma, to the numerous equine activities at State Fair Park and at many other horse show locations around Oklahoma, and to the long-standing and outstanding horse industry around Purcell and all over Oklahoma, both on the show side and racing side.

It started as a thought that Rhonda Hooper and a couple of people had at a chamber retreat four years ago, then grew from idea to real concept, then to the forming of the "Committee of the Willing." Stakeholders in this represent Stockyards City, State Fair Park, the OKC Convention and Visitors Bureau, Oklahoma River Redevelopment Authority, the City of Oklahoma City, and the equine industry.



Legal Aid Services' new

program

Legal Aid Services of Oklahoma (LASO) has introduced a new online program to help people expunge criminal records, if they meet the legal requirements. This innovation helps users understand their criminal backgrounds and work with pro bono attorneys to seal criminal records.

This program is designed to improve the housing, education and employment opportunities for many low-income Oklahomans. It is funded by Legal Services Corporation; Pro Bono Net is the technological partner.

Oklahomans are more likely to have a criminal record than citizens of other states. The National Institute of Corrections reports "Oklahoma (2014) has a rate about 79 percent higher than the national average of incarcerated (in prison) adults per 100,000 people."

LASO has observed that many Oklahomans with criminal records have trouble finding a job, experience difficultly obtaining housing, and find their records to be a barrier to accessing education. That is, long after criminal records have been addressed by the legal system, they continue to exact a financial punishment on those who have served their time.

Legal Aid Services of Oklahoma, together with Pro Bono Net (probono.net), has developed online technologies to guide Oklahomans with workshops and gain ideas for making holiday gifts and decorations.

After 23 years in the child-care industry, Laura Hatcherisedging toward a decision she doesn't want to make.

The 51-year-old Antlers resident runs one of the four licensed day-care facilities in Pushmataha County in southeast Oklahoma. But she questions whether she can keep her doors open beyond another year or two because running the business is getting more expensive and difficult.

"It's a struggle and I'm working 11, 12 hours a day," she said. "If it continues the way it is, I'm not going to be able to keep going."

Hatcher's problem reflects a larger trend of rising financial pressures that have caused increasing numbers of child-care facilities across Oklahoma to close their doors. Since 2008, the number of child-care homes or centers has declined by 34 percent, to 3, 409, and the number of spaces in these facilities has dropped by 20 percent, according to Oklahoma Department of Human Services figures.

The decline is placing a burden on parents because it means fewer choices for child care and, with a tighter supply, higher prices.

A2015 survey released earlier this year by DHS found that 44 percent of parents who were looking for child-care experienced difficulty during their search – up from 31 percent in 2013 and 22 percent in 2011.

The reasons for the decline are somewhat in dispute. Childcare providers attribute it to a tightening of state regulations; government aid that lags, and difficulty in recruiting and retaining workers.

State officials, however, question providers' assertion that regulations have become too burdensome; they suggest other factors are at work.

"We are very proud of our standards and oversight here in Oklahoma," said Lesli Blazer, director of child care services for the Department of Human Services.

She pointed instead to another problem affecting the industry here and nationwide: low pay for child-care workers, which has led to staffing shortages.

"It's a really hard job and the pay is low," she said.

advocates say parents who are Education Center in Norman, patient, determined and oftentimes lucky can still usually find care, especially in more populated areas.

But Paula Koos, executive director of the Oklahoma Child Care Resource & Referral Association, said finding care often means paying more or compromising on location, quality or what type of day-care center a parent prefers.

It is especially a challenge for parents looking for after-hours care, help with special-needs



children or available spots in rural parts of the state, Koos and child-care providers said.

"In certain counties in the state it is virtually impossible to find care," Koos said. "In some counties there might just be one facility in the entire county. Every child needs care, and if the number continues to slide, eventually we won't be able to find care for anybody."

Low-Profit Industry

A report released in July by Child Care Aware of America found that to a certain degree in every state, access to quality child-care programs is "hard to find and difficult to afford." The report noted that many providers operate on low profit margins, which increases their vulnerability to market or regulatory changes.

But many Oklahoma childcare providers argue that unlike in some other states, Oklahoma is over-regulating the industry and making it too hard for some to stay in business.

Oklahoma ranks among the most stringent states in the country for standards and oversight of child-care centers, according to Child Care Aware of America, which tracks child-care trends.

But Cosper said facilities are not given much flexibility to follow the rules or abide by constantly changing mandates and requirements.

As a result, many providers are constantly worried about getting hit with violations, which can hurt their reputation, make them ineligible to accept subsidized care or lead to revocation of their license, Cosper said.

In 2008, the state imposed tougher regulations in the wake of high-profile incidents, including the death of a 2-year-old at a Tulsa child-care home. The changes included:

• Instructing DHS to maintain a publicly accessible online database of child-care facilities, along with their quality rating and any complaints or inspection violations.

• Mandating background checks for child-care facility owners and employees.

• Increasing or setting new training and other licensing requirements.

 Requiring facilities to notify parents of a failure to maintain liability insurance coverage of at least \$200,000 for each occurrence of negligence in which a child is injured while on the premises.

At the start of this year, DHS put in place a series of new regulations over objections from the Licensed Child Care Association. Those include new teacher qualification rules, medication dispensing standards and removal of new hires' ability to work under supervision while their background check is being processed.

The association and dozens of providers signed letters asking Gov. Mary Fallin and the Legislature to revoke the rules.

Rep. Josh Cockroft, R-Wanette, authored a bill to revoke them but it didn't advance out of committee. He and other lawmakers did successfully lobby for an interim study on child-care licensing rules, to be held later this year.

State officials defend the state's regulations, both old and new ones.

Child-care providers and the McGee Bright Start Early Blazer, of DHS, adding that the rules were created in close said she and others support collaboration with child-care providers.

> Regarding the decline in facilities, she noted, "Since the start of 2016, we really haven't seen a decline in providers, so I don't think you can tie the rules to the decrease."

She cited instead the low wages and staffing shortages.

According to a report by the Center for the Study of Child Care Employment at the University of California, the average child-care worker in Oklahoma makes \$8.90 an hour-the eighth lowest rate in the country and more than a dollar below the \$9.77-per-hournational average.

Lagging Subsidies

Kathy Cronemiller, president of the Oklahoma Child Care Association and owner of six child-care centers in the Oklahoma City area, said the low pay is partly an offshoot of a larger problem: The state's child-care subsidy benefits, a main source of income for many facilities, have been stagnant for years.

The benefit program uses state and federal funds to pay all or a portion of child-care costs, depending on the parent's income. It also requires the parent to choose a facility with a one-plus star or higher quality rating and be working, attending school or taking training classes.

For those with one child in care, families began to qualify if their monthly household income is lower than \$2,426, which equates to wages of less than \$14 per hour. Such families would pay a monthly co-pay of \$189, according to a state schedule that hasn't been updated since 2008.

"Almost no one can qualify anymore," Cronemiller said.

As regulations drive operating costs up, Cronemiller said, it becomes harder to survive, unless a center is already established.

"We're basically at a stalemate because we are making the same amount of money with no (subsidy) increases, so we can't give our employees any money and we lose our employees to other positions," she said. The result is that "centers are going

Oklahoma's budget situation isn't helping.

Because of last fiscal year's budget shortfall, DHS was forced to freeze applications for two months. In August, the agency said it plans to reduce its already limited funding for training, scholarships and professional development.

The department also plans to reduce staff, saying in a news release that this will affect "oversight and quality of child care homes and facilities, which may result in safety issues for children."

Further cuts are possible because the agency faces a shortfall of more than \$55 million for the 2017 fiscal year.

Tough Decisions for Parents Bethany Soler, a Tulsa resident and working mother, had her third child in April.

She knew to start looking for daycare while pregnant. After encountering centers with long waiting lists and unaffordable prices, she settled on a new center run by friends. Then her child kept catching colds at the center.

Soler gave up and began paying her mother to stay with her child while she was at work.

"I would be paying as much as a mortgage just to have one infant in day care," Soler said. ... "There are no easy choices."

In Kathy Williamson's 90-capacity center, Cross Creek Early Learning Center in Jenks, she said conversations with parents get difficult when she informs them her wait list is a year to 18 months.

Some parents have quit their jobs to stay home because they can't find child care, she said.

Koos, of the resource and referral association, said more affluent parents have fewer problems. If there are no openings in nearby centers, they may turn to more expensive care provided by an outside individual or service in the child's home - which is exempt from licensing rules.

She added she worries most about families who make just above the subsidy's salary threshold.
