

# Nearing completion

### Investigation into hit and run

According to Purcell Police Chief Kevin Williams, the investigation into the July 3 hit and run is beginning to take shape.

The person of interest was interviewed Monday, Williams said.

His name has not been released but will be when the final report is filed.

"Technically, he's not a suspect in any criminal matter," Williams said of the driver of the pickup that was pulling a trailer with a John Deere tractor on it.

Investigators believe the trailer is what struck and killed 13-year-old Rafael de Jesus Garcia Andrade, Jr. on Green Avenue.

"It appears to be just an accident," Williams said.

Once completed, the report will be given to the district attorney to make any decision, Williams said.

# Three fatalities CONFIRMED

# I-35 closed for over 3 hours

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol (OHP) has confirmed at least three people have died from injuries sustained in a grinding two-vehicle accident at mile marker 91 on the south edge of Purcell.

A 2014 GMC Yukon, driven by Erin Van Horn, 40 of Tulsa, slammed into the back of a northbound 18-wheeler just before 3:30 p.m. Monday afternoon in the northbound lanes of Interstate 35.

Political unrest and poverty may have scarred the country of Uganda, but not the souls of its people.

"The people there are very happy," said Dr. Jim Chamberlain, co-director for education and outreach at the University of Oklahoma's Water Technologies for Emerging Regions Center and pastor of Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church in Purcell.

He accompanied three other OU faculty members and a dozen students majoring in engineering, education and business to the poorest area of Uganda last month.

In addition, OU Health Sciences Center sent 12 first-year medical and nursing students together with one faculty member.







1. A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall for each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.

2. A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.

3. Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.

4. Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility pole or street sign, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.

5. All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale. 6. If you have any questions, call 527-6561 daytime from 8

a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission, call them at (405) 521-3274.

Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.



My mother had bought a little storage container that held our makeup and hair accessories.


Although small, it limited our ability to walk to the closet.



fluid intake to two to four glasses (16-32 ounces) of cool fluids every hour. If you are on water pills or restricted fluid limit, letes and those with physical consult a physician first.

Avoid liquids with alcohol or large amounts of sugar; they contribute to the loss of more body fluid. Very cold drinks can cause stomach cramps and should be avoided as well.

Dress appropriately. Wear lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing as well as sunscreen with SPF 15 or higher and broad spectrum or UVA/UVB protection.

Closely monitor those who are more vulnerable. Infants, children, people older than 65 years of age, those with mental illness, outdoor workers, athillnesses such as heart disease or high blood pressure should be closely observed.

Never leave anyone in a vehicle. Never leave anyone, especially children and the elderly, in a parked vehicle, even if the windows are cracked.

Distributed generation (DG) brings with it potential threats to municipalities like Purcell. These include lost revenue, utility cost recovery issues, the intermittent nature of solar and wind and reliability and safety issues.

OMPA recommends increasing the customer charge for DG customers.

"The old thinking was we sell electricity in kilowatt units," VanZant said."Alot of the costs are fixed. The new thinking is we also sell reliability."

The notion of separate rates was troubling to mayor Ted Cox.

"I don't want to discour-OMPA supplies electricity to age solar panels," he said, "or keeping customers from being environmentally conscious,"

One option posed by OMPA would raise the monthly customer charge from the present \$5.70 to \$50, while also lowering the average energy rate from the present 11.61 to 9 cents per KwH. That would reduce the city's net revenue loss on that meter from \$30.35 per month to 77 cents per month.

"I think there's a way to have a demand charge," council member Tom McCurdy said, adding he wants to ensure Purcell's electrical rates remain competi-

now with the great blind man of faith from the ninth chapter of John. He has been such an asset to our study on faith, helping us establish some of the key fundamentals of faith. He reminds me of our old basketball camp dribbling, defensive, and form-shooting drills. You have to establish the fundamentals well before moving on to other skills. So it is here.

Before we pick up the blind man's story, I want to remind you of something very unique about the book of John that makes the blind man's stories and other stories in John's gospel have even greater meaning. Almost all the stories in this gospel have a "deeper" meaning. In a way, they are "allegories" – that is, they are true stories, but they have a secondary meaning. We can see this quality, for example, in the story of Jesus' turning the water into wine (John 2), or in Jesus' raising Lazarus from the dead (John 11).

That "deeper meaning" comes out powerfully in this 2016 when we were blessed to

Register readers. We clome to carefully as this poor blind soul goes from a life of utter We have traveled for a while darkness to a life filled with an amazing light. Even as we read it, we know the Lord has an eye toward showing us how we emerge into spiritual light river water. from spiritual darkness.

I encourage all to consider carefully the simple obedience involved in this great transition. I will tell you that to find truth you will have to ignore much of the world's teaching on the subjects of salvation and baptism and rely on the Bible and the Bible alone.

Now, the blind man has just returned from the pool of Siloam. Oh my, how different is his return trip than the trip to the fountain of water! On the way, someone leads him gently by the arm from his spot where he meets Jesus. Finally they come to the Pool of Siloam, where his assistant takes him by the hand and guides him carefully to the water's edge, perhaps even into the water:

"Watch your step, now," I can hear his friends saying, as he comes to the water's edge. That scene reminds me of a beautiful setting in October

Good week to all of our blind man's story! We watch walk with a sweet young lady to the river flowing down from near the church in Grassy Fork, Tenn. The bottom of the narrow river was slushy and slippery, so several good brethren led her down to us into that cold

Then, with both of us going "down into the water" (Acts 8:38), we baptized her "into Jesus Christ," into "his death" (Romans 6:3). The young lady whom the brethren helped out of that chilly water was not the same lady who went it -no, not at all – for her sins had all been cleansed, washed away by the blood of Jesus (Revelation 1:5). What a happy day! What a blessed hour!

I think of her as I think of the blind man who eases his way to the pool of Siloam, reaches down and takes that water in his hands, and washes that old mud from his eyes! The only thing preventing him from seeing, it seems, is that mud clogging his eyes. Once removed, he opens his eyes, and the light of day streams into his eyes for the first time. He is not a blind man any more. His faith, you see, has made him whole. coachbowen1984@gmail. com

Some of his love takes root in the hearts of those who are prepared to receive Him. And when it does, these disciples will bear much fruit. They will be the bearers of love to other people." (Matthew 13:1-9)

God's love is being offered to us each day in many ways, in many little "seeds" that are planted. It might be a passage in Scripture or the verse of a song that touches our hearts. Or the kind act of a stranger. Or a quiet moment in prayer when we feel God's friendship. These are little seeds of God's love that call upon us to respond. When we ignore them or forget about them, they are like seeds planted on rocky ground. They never take root.

When we are too busy to return kindness, then the seeds of God's love are as if they are planted among the "thorns" of distraction and busyness. But when we respond to these seeds with generosity and charity, then the touch of God has borne much fruit, the kind of fruit that the Sower wants to reap.

Our task, as disciples, is to create rich, fertile ground in which God's love can take root and bear fruit. We can do this in our homes, our families, our churches. One doctor in Colorado works at a Catholic hospital. Late one night he was called to treat a homeless man in the emergency room. When the patient was checking out, the doctor noticed that the man had no shoes. So he gave his shoes to him, and drove home that night in his stocking feet!

When asked later why he had done this, the doctor replied that "he was taught to respond in the same way as Master Jesus would have responded. And Jesus washed the feet of his disciples. So surely he would have given them his own shoes to wear." The doctor was learning discipleship in the context of a Catholic hospital.

Our parish church, too, must be a fertile ground for God's love. This week I am traveling to Haiti with nine members of our youth group from St. Catherine's parish in Pauls Valley. These students have experienced God's love in their families and in their church community. Now they are bearing the fruit of this love by serving some of the world's poorest citizens at a children's orphanage that has been devastated by earthquake and hurricane.

The touch of God's love will always bear fruit and will not return empty to Him (Isaiah 55:10-11). But it becomes abundant only if we are open and allow it to take root in our hearts.



### **Completed Results from the 2017 Oklahoma Quarter** Horse Association's Redbud Spectacular Horse Show

Last week had the first half of the OQHA's Redbud Spectacular Horse Show's results for people and horses from this area. This will complete the results.

This year's show had a total of 899 horses making 16,143 entries in 214 classes. The economic impact of these numbers are as follows: (899 horses x 3.5 people per horse = 31,465) X (13 days x \$235 per day = \$3055) = \$9,612,557.50 pumped into the Oklahoma City area economy.

Some of the money spent by exhibitors makes its way to our area. Owners come to their trainer's places a few days before the show to tune up their horses and themselves. They may stay with the trainer or in our motels. People come to visit friends or to buy and sell horses, or maybe they visit our Realtors to look at ranches to buy. They eat in our restaurants, buy gas, visit Wal-Mart and other businesses. They leave some of their money here, and we appreciate them very much.

People in the horse business all over the world know about Purcell, and the large and very important horse industry we have here, and have had since the late 1940s. When you see some of our horse people out and about, thank them, because every time they go to a show or to a race meet, they represent not just themselves and their customers, but they also represent us, and do it extremely well.

Some of these results may not show eight placings. All competitors had the opportunity to show under eight judges for eight sets of AQHA points. Some many not have shown both days, and some may not have placed under certain judges because the classes were large.

# Consider costs before creep feeding

Creep feeding is a management tool utilized by cow-calf operations to increase the effectiveness of creep feeding will vary from one operation to the next but the ideal situation to creep feed is when feed costs are low and calf prices are high.

While simply increasing weight may mean more money at sale time, added gain may not necessarily mean more profit. Situations may differ from one operation to the next and producers should sharpen their pencils to determine if creep feeding will benefit their individual operation.

Feed availability and cost should be the first factors analyzed to determine if creep feeding will be profitable. In Oklahoma, a producer will have a number of feed options to choose from including commercial program feeds, bagged feed, byproduct feed blends, and conventional grains.

The most common creep feed is high in energy and about 14 to 16 percent crude protein. Typical creep feeding utilizes a creep or self-feeder where calves are allowed free-choice access to feed at all times.

The texture of the feed should be somewhat dry yet have minimal fines to ensure calves sell for an average price flow through the feeder. As in of \$1.74 per pound and a group all free-choice feeding situations, producers should closely monitor consumption to ensure value of those 46 additional target intakes are maintained. pounds is \$1.05 per pound.

Consumption over expected levels reduces efficiency and can easily whisk away profit. The University of Nebraska reports calves in traditional weaning weight of calves. The creep feeding situations will

eat 2-6.5 pounds per head daily. Efficiency of gain will average about one pound of gain from six pounds of feed. Creep fed calves will average 0.3 pounds of daily gain greater than noncreep fed calves.

Availability of feed and cost are only half of the puzzle as one determines the feasibility of creep feeding. The other, equal if not more important part, is the value of the additional weight gain. As the weight of beef calves increases, their value on a dollar per pound or cwt decreases.

For example, the price per pound for calves that weigh 500 pounds will be less than calves weighing 400 pounds. Because of this, the weight gain from creep or any type of supplementation cannot simply be priced at market value. To be more precise, the value of each individual pound gained should be analyzed.

Let's look at an example of this using weight and prices from the Oklahoma combined weekly auction summary on June 23.

If a group of 476-pound of 522-pound calves sell for an average price of \$1.68, then the

1) 476 lb. x \$1.74/lb. = \$828.24

2) 522 lb. x 1.68/lb. =\$876.96

3)\$876.96-\$828.24 divided by 46 lb. (weight difference) = \$1.05/lb. value of gain

If we consider that calves fed creep would gain an additional 46 pounds per head and it takes 6 pounds of feed to produce each additional pound, then it would take  $276 (6 \times 46 = 276)$ pounds of creep feed to produce that gain.

If the cost of creep is \$250 per ton (\$0.125/pound), then cost of feed to put on 46 pounds of weight is \$34.50 (276 x \$0.125 = \$34.50).

The total dollars generated from 46 pounds of additional gain from creep feeding is \$48.30 (46 pounds x \$1.05 value of gain = \$48.30).

In this example, the return to creep feeding is \$13.80 (\$48.30 34.50 = 13.80. In this particular example, creep feeding will provide some value, however, not to a level that will work for every producer.

Keep in mind, this example does not include costs of labor or equipment that are essential parts of the calculation. Also, realize that value of gain will change on a daily basis as the market changes and calculations should be looked at periodically to ensure accuracy.

I challenge producers to do these calculations with their specific values to determine if creep feeding is right for their operation.


