Keeping the doors open

Purcell voters overwhelming approved a penny sales tax to assist in the funding of Purcell Municipal Hospital. PMH has a huge economic footprint on Purcell and the surrounding area. The hospital was awarded a 4-star rating by Medicare earlier this year.

Compiled by The Register Staff:

The August vote to designate a penny sales tax to save Purcell Municipal Hospital by a landslide margin, 987-142 topped the news stories in 2016.

The sales tax will generate needed revenue to meet operational expenses at the hospital.

The day after the election, life-long Purcell resident Ralph Wall said, "It's hard for me to imagine there were 142 people that did vote against it."

According to **The Purcell Register**, the vote was not only a vote for PMH but also

Dense fog Saturday

Line of storms on
Christmas Day

Dense fog snarled traffic Christmas Eve morning until it started burning off around 10:30 a.m.

The fog was so dense, visibility as about 1/2 block for most of the morning.

And once the fog started lifting, more rolled in for about another 20 minutes before finally clearing off in central Oklahoma.

Friday here .20" of rain was recorded to go with .05" on Sunday bringing the yearly total to 33.98". The rain came in a rare Christmas Day squall line.

Oklahoma City has recorded 26.30" with the normal year-to-date total 36.29".

Fire’s out

A traffic accident started a small grass fire Wednesday afternoon on State highway 74. Purcell and Wayne fire departments responded and no structures were affected.

Accident sends 2 to hospital

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol reported a Maysville woman was taken to Norman Regional Hospital following a one vehicle accident last Thursday.

Investigating OHPTrooper Jeff Cummings said Ashlei Stewart, 30, of Maysville was transported to the Porter Campus of the hospital after the vehicle she was driving crashed on US Highway 77 one half mile south of Cemetery Road in Slaughterville.

The 2012 Chrysler 200 was northbound on 77 and departed the roadway for unknown reasons to the right, Cummings said.

The vehicle struck a culvert, went airborne for approximately 30 feet before striking the ground and overturning 1 1/2 times coming to rest on the driver’s side, the trooper reported.

Stewart was admitted to Norman Regional in good condition with arm, trunk internal and head injuries.

A five-year-old female passenger in the vehicle, also of Maysville, was treated and released at Norman Regional.

The name of the juvenile was not released by the OHP.

Assisting Cummings was the Cleveland County Sheriff’s Department and the Slaughterville Fire Department.

The City of Purcell does free brush pickup two times per year in the fall and again in the spring. These schedules will be published in **The Purcell Register** and can be obtained at Purcell City Hall. During the remainder of the year, the City of Purcell will do brush pickup by work order only. This means that the customer has to call in to City Hall to request pickup with charges to be assessed to the customer utility account. The charges may range from \$15 for a small load up to \$50 for a large load, this includes Christmas trees. The garbage company, WCA, does bulk waste pickup on the fourth Monday of each month. This includes small loads of brush. The brush needs to be cut in three foot lengths and bundled with twine.

Preparing for a New Year

Many families take this time of the year to look back at their finances from the last year, and look forward to the coming year.

Maybe this is the year they plan to start a business, change jobs, buy their first home, get out of debt, or start saving for a child's college. It is certainly a great time to reflect on the past, learn from both failures and success, and set goals for the future.

A similar cycle exists in state government with the

state Board of Equalization. The Oklahoma Constitution established the board chaired by the governor and composed of elected officials.

The board includes the state's Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Treasurer, Auditor, and Superintendent of Public Instruction. The board is charged with providing an estimate of all revenues that will be available to the legislature for appropriation in a fiscal year.

The governor will form her budget proposal based on the

board's estimates and present it to the legislature as well as her state of the union address, setting forth her policy agenda for the session.

The state Board of Equalization confirmed last week that this Legislature will have \$692 million less in revenues than was appropriated last session. The amount of \$692 million for the next fiscal year is a little higher than has been discussed in recent weeks.

The good news is, \$692 million is not as dire as the \$1.3

billion shortfall the Legislature faced last year. Additional good news is oil and gas prices appear to be on an upward trend, along with other signs of economic recovery. I've often said that the government has no money. Only the people have money. When the people in Oklahoma prosper, create jobs, earning more and spending more, it generates more tax revenues to provide government services back to the people.

Current economic conditions have required state agencies

to be more efficient with the people's money. I can say from many conversations in our district, this season in state government is not unlike the season our local families and businesses have been through with their own budgets.

It forced them to operate on a leaner scale and to develop better management practices, something Oklahomans have been able to do through many

Iris Long shook her head as she tallied the votes on her note pad. She realized this was going to be another long night.

1 teaspoon chili powder
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
3 cups water

In a large saucepan, cook the bacon until crisp. Remove the bacon, crumble, and set aside to use as a topping for the peas. Sauté the onion in the bacon drippings until tender.

Add the peas, diced tomatoes and green chiles, salt, chili powder, pepper and water.

Cover and cook over medium heat for 45 minutes to 1 hour, or until the peas are tender. Add additional water, if necessary. Serve garnished with crumbled bacon.

Howard

local firefighter, the family business came calling. **Fast Forward** “I guess it’s always been the adrenaline rush,” Howard said, unfolding the story of his fast-paced career options. Quick. Fast-paced. Steep learning curve. Howard doesn’t shy away from challenges. Everything he chooses to do it’s all fast-forward. For the past few years Howard has manned the cath lab at OHH South as manager. He transferred there from an OHH outpatient clinic just two months after the new hospital opened. He’s been with the OKC fire department even longer. For the past 20 years he’s served Oklahoma City as an EMT. Now at Station 35 he’s a staple to the city’s south side. Just after getting married Howard became a tech working in mental health. He fell in love all over. “I just saw what the nurses got to do and what they got paid to do,” Howard said. But before anything Howard was a nurse. It was while he was attending nursing school at Oklahoma State University-Oklahoma City that a friend talked him into hiring on with the fire department after he finished his third semester. Now he literally takes people door-to-door in the continuum of care. “It helps you can see both sides,” Howard said of the EMT and hospital role. “You can see the emergency side of it and you know what the patient can look forward to when they get to the hospital.” Howard still calls Purcell home. He and wife Stephanie have raised two kids, daughter and a son. His 26-year-old son just hired on with the Norman Police Department after a career as a Marine and a bachelors in criminology. The couples’ 22-year-old daughter has her sights set on medical school and then a career in oncology. Four years from now, Howard sees himself retired. Sort of. “I’ll probably get into travel nursing,” Howard said. Why so? “It’s probably just finally going on vacation and getting paid for it,” he said. Vacations are a rarity for Howard. Between the two

jobs he estimates he works between 48 and 72 hours each week. Now and then he and Stephanie take the boat to Lake Texoma just to hang out. The cath lab is challenging, for a number of reasons. “The hardest part is probably just working with the doctors,” Howard laughed. “We have 25 different doctors and they all want to work at the same time.” The cath lab is where Howard controls chaos. He runs a staff of about 20 each day who make sure between 25 and 30 patients flow smoothly in and out. It’s all about flow. “We’re busy here,” Howard says. “We’ve got a really good group, lots of experience, flexible and hardworking.” Under Howard’s tenure cath lab volume at OHH South has skyrocketed. Volume went from 10-15 patients per month when the facility first opened to between 600 and 700 each month. Howard usually gets about one day a week off. He’s already counting down retirement with three years and 10 months to go. His wife doesn’t seem to mind. Maybe that’s because she works as the day patient manager at Oklahoma Heart Hospital South. Oklahoma Heart Hospital is Oklahoma’s first dedicated heart hospital, and the first all-digital hospital in the nation. Opened in January of 2010, the South Campus at I-240 and Sooner Road is a three-story, 163,000 square foot facility with three open-heart/peripheral vascular surgical suites, four cardiac and peripheral vascular catheterization labs, and a full-service emergency room. OHH South has 46 private patient rooms equipped with critical care technology in comfort able and peaceful surroundings. The Oklahoma Heart Hospital South Medical Office Building is located adjacent to the OHH South Hospital Campus facility. This \$12 million, three-story, 70,000 square foot medical office building was constructed in 2010 and houses diagnostic, clinical and cardiac rehab services on the Oklahoma Heart Hospital South Campus. Howard is the son of Norma and the late Kendall Howard of Purcell.

Welcome to the “front porch,” and welcome to our last visit of 2016.

Over the past two decades, we have been so blessed to share many articles, memories, and stories both in this space and in a number of other newspapers -- most of this before the modern tools of communication were dreamed of. Of all our columns, one of our favorites is the writing about an “inspiration point” (fitting the title of our 1997 book) that occurs each New Year’s Eve in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, not far from us here. We want to share this account with you once again, as we wish and pray for all a happy new year ...

Excitement has filled the air every New Year’s Eve for as long as I can remember.

It’s not the balloons and horns sounding and “Auld Lang Syne” and kissing. It’s something better. It’s the singing of “Rock of Ages.”

I’m reminded of this inspirational moment every New Year’s when I – along with a thousand others – go up to Oklahoma City for a church meeting similar to the one in Sulphur except this one is often accompanied by snow and ice while Sulphur’s trademark is heat and sweat.

Still, folks come from all over just the same to get a glimpse of what heaven must be like with all the preaching and singing. Those thousand folks – coming in from Georgia to California -- will congregate in a high school auditorium there in Oklahoma City the last few days before the old year reluctantly passes the banner on to the new. With so many people there, it’s a fine chance to see people you only see a couple times a year.

The renewal of old acquaintances is a nice part of the meeting, but it’s not the best part.

You’ll also get a chance to hear a fellow named Lynwood preach, should you happen up there for the meeting one

year. Lynwood is in charge of the meeting and has been for most of the fifty years the meeting has been going on. Without a doubt, he’s the best storyteller I’ve ever heard. He can describe a scene better than you’ve ever seen, such as that wayward prodigal boy headed home to his father with his father coming out to meet him.

He draws the picture so well that you’re bound to see the smile on the father’s face from way off and the dust on the boy’s feet, all at the same time. Naturally, he takes every opportunity he can to say a few words and dip down into his deep well of nostalgia (he’s in his seventies now, so that well is plenty deep). If you need some inspiration, Lynwood could supply about a year’s worth right there in Oklahoma at the end of the year.

But, still, that’s not the best part.

One of the most inspiring scenes you’ve ever seen occurs at about 11:30 p.m. on New Year’s Eve. Everybody gathers in the auditorium for the last time during the meeting and for the last time of the year, and a friend of Lynwood’s named Johnny Elmore leads the singing of just about every old hymn you can think of. The Elmore’s are well known for their singing ability, but -- in my way of thinking -- Johnny is the best of all. Lynwood sometimes calls him the “sweet singer of Israel,” and for good reason, too. On that last night at 11 p.m., Johnny will lead the thousand plus crowd in singing those old hymns --and it’s all done a cappella, of course.

One by one, a gentleman from the crowd will suggest a good old hymn he’d like to hear, and Johnny will lead it and those thousand tongues will fill the air with the most inspirational sound you can imagine. If the apostle Paul himself could attend, I imagine he’d say that the singing is so beautiful that it’s

not lawful to utter it.

But, still, the best part is yet to come.

About five minutes before the bell tolls midnight, Lynwood will reflect a moment on the past and a moment on the future, reflecting on the victories and defeats that both contained, just like it was with the children of Israel. If you can listen to him get nostalgic that way -- with his seventy years back in his rearview mirror -- without a little tear popping up in your eye, then you’re a bigger man than I am.

But even that’s not the best part.

At 11:59 p.m., Lynwood will pass the baton back to Johnny who’ll lead the people in a final song to sing the old year out and the new year in. The crowd, sometimes with choked voices and always with blurry eyes, will blend their voices to perhaps the grandest old song of them all, and in so doing will usher in another year full of victories and defeats, and joy and sorrow, all the things that a new year brings with it.

I bet you’ve sung that old song yourself a time or two:

“Rock of Ages, cleft for me,
let me hide myself in thee.
Let the water and the blood,
from thy wounded side which
flowed. Be of sin, the double
cure. Save from wrath, and
make me pure.”

And now you know the best part of all. ~ January 5, 1998

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Our parish celebrated Christmas with two beautiful Masses on Christmas Eve – a family Mass at 6 p.m. and a Midnight Mass later that evening. It was good to see so many young adults returning home for the holidays to be with their families and to worship God together on this Feast day of the Gift of His Son.

It was the early 5th century in Europe. Latin was the language of the time. So he was known as Patricius. But we remember him as Patrick. Patrick was a young boy – 16 years old – when he was kidnapped from his home in Britain. The Irish people were rough, barbaric, sea-faring warriors who would snatch sleeping children from

their homes on the mainland of Europe and carry them back to the island as slaves.

For six years, Patrick was enslaved as a shepherd, and spent many days and nights isolated, alone, in the cold damp hills of Ireland. He had not been very religious, but now he remembered the Catholic faith of his grandfather. And so he prayed. He prayed constantly. He prayed to God for deliverance from his constant hunger. He prayed to God for deliverance from his cold, damp isolation. He prayed to God for his freedom.

Patrick wrote: “Tending flocks was my daily work, and I would pray constantly during the daylight hours. The love of God surrounded me more and more, and the Spirit was roused within me, even while I remained in the woods and on the mountain.”

Patrick began his slavery as a young boy without faith, but he ended it as a holy man of God. On his last night as a slave, Patrick heard a voice in his sleep. It said “Your hungers are rewarded. You are going home.” The next day he escaped from his Master, walked 200 miles through unknown territory towards the coast, where he boarded a ship sailing to England.

But after a few years back home, Patrick heard the voice again in a dream – “The Irish people beg you to come and walk among them once more.” Patrick knew that the Irish were warlike people because they lived always in fear. They were afraid. They were afraid of the invisible spirits that moved through their world. The Irish people told stories of these evil spirits. Their world was a world of chaos and disorder, and they were always afraid. There was no order in this invisible, dangerous world.

But Patrick taught them an alternative way. When he returned to them, as a priest and bishop, he was a man of peace. He admired their loyalty and their courage. He showed them that a man could be loyal without being afraid. He showed them that there was an unseen world of spirits, but that the spirits were good and loving. And there was only one spirit. The spirit was a God who loved them.

The Irish were good storytellers. But he gave them different stories to tell. He gave them the story of Christmas. In just a few decades, while the

Last Thursday we were honored to give a truck donated by Jerry and Nadine Jewell to Amy

Hanel, the daughter of one of our deceased veterans. We appreciate Mr. and Mrs. Jewell for helping us make a difference in the lives of veterans and their families.

Since moving to Faith Pointe Baptist Church in August of 2015, we have been able to help more than 12,000 veterans and their families receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible. I thought over the last 15 years we would have assisted all the veterans in Norman with their VA claims. As it turns out, each week we are seeing many veterans and surviving spouses from our town who had never filed a VA claim.

I don’t know why there are so many veterans in Norman unaware of our services for them and their families. If any of you have ideas on how we could spread the word to more of them, please help us to make a difference. If you need a ride to see us, or go to your medical appointments please contact our transportation department. These dedicated volunteers spent 75 hours traveling 1,345 miles last week transporting 19 passengers. We appreciate Clayton and Louie!

One of the first things many of the veterans who we have helped to receive a 100 percent rating for their service connected disabilities do is to purchase that new truck that they have always wanted. I would venture to say that there have been many hundreds of veterans who have done just that. If memory serves me right, one of the first to start that tradition was Raymond Jaco of Norman in 2006. Most of our veterans have been hard working men and women who always put their families first. Now that many of them have a little extra money from their VA benefits they are making purchases that were put off for many years.

I wish that we would have asked those that bought the trucks to request that their truck dealer donate to support our veteran’s organization. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit we spend the donated funds supporting veterans and their families. Currently that cost is averaging \$30,000 each month. We appreciate those of you who have signed up for an automatic monthly donation. We are working to reach a point where we will be able to have enough monthly donations to cover the cost of veterans medical testing and transportation.

Currently we are looking to expand the number of health care professionals who would review medical records, examinations and fill out a VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire diagnosing physical or mental health issues. The cost for these examinations is averaging \$300 plus \$50 for each secondary disability. The Mental Health Provider examines patients who may be suffering from PTSD or other Mental Health conditions. A VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire is also required to be filled out by the provider.

We would also like to have several more audiologists who can provide a hearing test using the Maryland CC and to write a short paragraph of the veteran’s history of noise exposure in the military. For those who would be interested in helping veterans please send your responses to dalekgrahamveteranscorner@gmail.com.

Last week there were only 155 veterans and surviving spouses who made the trip for assistance. Of that number, there were 52 who filed their first claim for VA benefits. As always, we use the VA form 21-0966 (Intent to file) that establishes the following month as their start date for VA benefits. We then request that the veteran obtain their medical records that pertain to the disability that they are filing for. We also will ask them to visit one of our audiologists as that is

the quickest and easiest method to obtain service connection of a disability.

Many times, a veteran who is service connected for hearing loss and tinnitus will have difficulty understanding people. One of the most obvious signs is when they are watching TV or listening to the radio the volume will be very loud. Personally, I cannot understand women or children due to the severity of my high frequency hearing loss that occurred due to my service in Vietnam.

Last week there were four veterans who received a service connected disability rating of 100 percent. These veterans will receive a combined annual income of \$151,899 per year. There were 37 veterans who received disability ratings from 10-90 percent. These veterans will receive an annual combined income of \$420,117.

Over the years, we have found there are certain things that need to be done to help a surviving spouse of a veteran to receive VA benefits. The DIC benefit may be paid to a spouse and dependents if the veteran died from a service connected disability or one that was presumptive to their military service. What no one tells you is that if a service connected condition is listed on the veteran’s death certificate either as the primary cause of death or as a contributing factor the spouse should be able to receive VA DIC payments of from \$1,250 to \$1,450 per month.

There are many ways for our veterans and their families to possibly receive VA benefits. For more information please stop in to visit with Shirley (405) 361-9322 or one of our other ladies about VA benefits. On each visit, veterans should bring all their DD-214’s (discharge papers), all VA rating letters and all VA forms that have been filed. For privacy reasons, Dale K. Graham’s Veteran’s Corner does not keep your information on file and does not have access to any of this information.

A couple of things are sometimes needed to file for VA benefits are D214 discharge papers, bank account information (voided check), marriage information, social security information, and all VA rating decisions.

rest of Europe was descending into more and more chaos and disorder – the Dark Ages – all of Ireland had accepted the Catholic faith and was changing from chaos to order and to peace.

Preventing outdoor falls

Slips and falls can happen so fast, especially outside in snowy or icy conditions. Of course, there are no guarantees against the occasional accident, but taking a few simple precautions could cut the chances of taking a tumble while outdoors this winter.

It doesn’t matter if you’re outside for fun or you need to clear the sidewalk of snow, it’s important to be prepared for the elements. Keeping sidewalks, driveways, walkways and steps in good repair throughout the year is one of the easiest ways to protect against falls outside. In the winter, it makes the process

of clearing snow and ice easier and safer.

When the time comes to shovel snow and ice, try not to wait until it piles up. Clear your stairs, driveway and sidewalks as needed to reduce the risk of falling. When you’re shoveling, push loads when you can. If you must lift some piles, keep them light. Work at a steady even pace and avoid over exerting yourself.

While walking through snowy or icy areas, take shorter steps and move at a slower pace to give yourself time to react if you lose your balance. Proper footwear can also help prevent falls. Specifically, waterproof boots and shoes with deep

treads can provide excellent traction. For an added layer of protection, sprinkle cat litter or sand on icy patches.
