The projects Purcell Public Schools hopes to tackle with proceeds from two bond issues totaling nearly \$30 million will come at a price – albeit a very small one.

Property owners would see a 1.75 percent increase on their taxes. Someone paying \$1,000 in property taxes would pay \$1,017.50. A \$100 property tax bill would increase to \$101.75.

District voters will decide the bond issues in a special election October 10.

Conger Field facelift

The issue also includes \$17.965 million for construction of a new junior high school and \$300,000 for technology equipment and new band uniforms. A \$675,000 transportation bond will be voted on separately.

New bridge construction

1.4 miles west of Washington

McClain County District 2 Commissioner Wilson Lyles reports construction will soon begin on a new bridge over Sandy Creek.

Lyles said the bid for the project was awarded to K&R builders for \$935,712.23 for the bridge on 240th, spanning 195 feet 1.4 miles west of Washington.

Lyles said there were seven bidders for the project and all very close in numbers.

The project was programmed with state and federal dollars through the County Improvement for Roads and Bridges (CIRB) and the Surface Transportation Program (STP). Lyles said the state funding also paid for engineering and environmental studies.

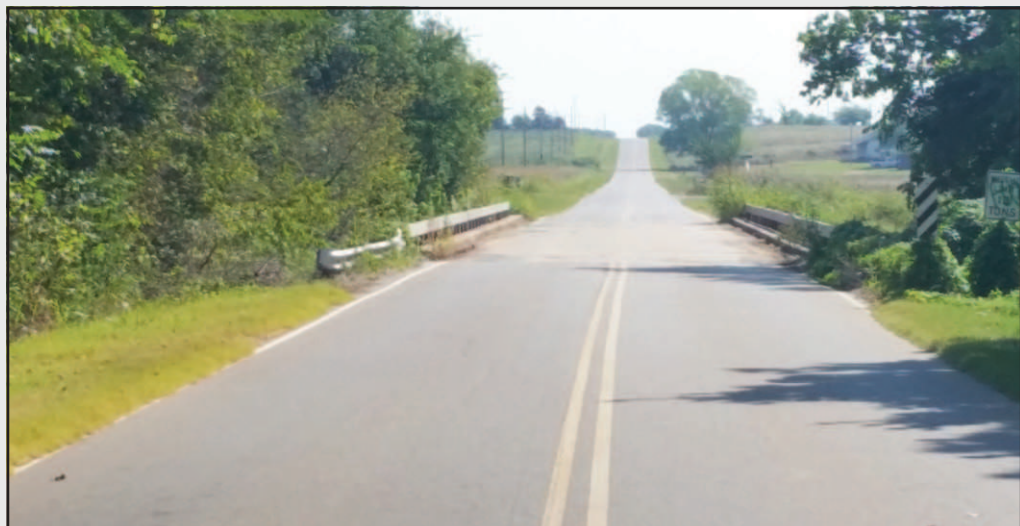
"The existing bridge was built in 1960 and has an average daily traffic count of over 500 vehicles on a major collector route and

having a low rating of 13 tons got the project moving forward," Lyles said.

The commissioner expects construction to begin around December 4.

"We ask all of our local residents and commuters in the area to be patient during the construction process and drive carefully through any work zones," Lyles said.

For free Open Records Seminars across state beginning September 28

Oklahoma Attorney General Mike Hunter will collaborate with the Oklahoma Press Association to host open records and open meetings seminars in six locations across the state beginning next Thursday, Sept. 28.

The seminars are free, open to the public and require no pre-registration.

Attorney General Hunter said the meetings will be a great way for the public or officials who are serving on local or state boards to ask questions and stay up-to-date on the state's open record laws.

"These seminars will provide highlights to the most recent open-government laws in our state," Attorney General Hunter said. "I strongly encourage ev-

eryone who serves the public attend these meetings and ask questions.

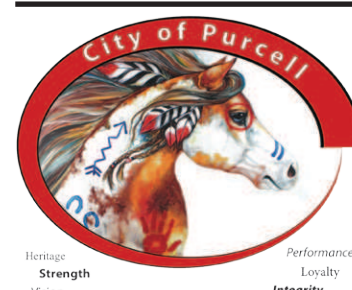

Collection, Hauling and Disposal of Municipal Solid Waste Change in Collection Time

The City of Purcell has an exclusive contract with WCA of Oklahoma to collect, haul and dispose of municipal solid waste within the city's corporate limits.

Collection Time—Pick up is now the last Monday of the month beginning in October. Items are not to be put out by the curb until that weekend prior.

Bulk Waste—Brush or limbs shall be bundled in no larger than three feet x three feet bundles. No furniture larger than a pickup bed or or that exceeds 75 pounds. Appliances must have refrigerant/compressor legally removed and shall not exceed 75 pounds. Yard waste such as leaves and grass clippings must be bagged. All items must be bagged and no loose items will be picked up.

Hazardous Waste—Solid waste identified or listed as a hazardous waste by the administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) or so classified by any federal or State of Oklahoma statute, rule, order or regulation should not be put out for collection. This includes tire, paint or oil products.

Election rules and reminders

Following tips will simplify voting experience

Purcell voters will go to the polls October 10 for a special election on two Purcell Public Schools bond issues, McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said Tuesday.

Haley offered the following information and tips for those voting:

- Early voting will be available at the County Election Board office from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., October 5 and 6. On election day, polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

- Lines are possible at peak voting times. Wait times will likely be shortest at mid-morning and mid-afternoon. Anyone in line to vote at 7 p.m. will be allowed to cast a ballot.

- Anyone who needs to look up their polling place, verify their registration information or view a sample ballot can do so online. The Online Voter Tool can be accessed on the Oklahoma State Election Board's website: www.elec-

tions.ok.gov. Those who vote by mail can also check the status of their ballot using the Online Voter Tool. Sample ballots are also available at the County Election Board office.

- Oklahoma law requires every voter who votes in person at the precinct polling place or during early voting at the County Election Board to show proof of identity before receiving a ballot. There are three ways for voters to prove their identity under the law (only one proof of identity is required): Show a valid photo ID issued by federal, state or tribal government; show the free voter identification card issued to every voter by the County Election Board; or sign an affidavit and vote a provisional ballot. (If the information on the affidavit matches official voter registration records, the ballot will be counted after Election Day.)

- Physically disabled voters who cannot enter the polling

place, need help marking their ballots, blind or visually disabled voters and illiterate voters may be assisted by a person the voter chooses.

In all cases, a person providing such assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of the employer or an officer or agent of the voter's union.

A person providing assistance also must swear or affirm that the voter's ballots will be marked in accordance with the voter's wishes.

Alternatively, all blind, visually impaired, and physically disabled voters in McClain County may use the audio-tactile interface (ATI), a feature offered on all Oklahoma voting devices, to vote privately and independently, either at McClain County Election Board during early voting or at their assigned polling place on elec-

Power of the press is in being the Way to Know for news consumers

October 1-7 is National Newspaper Week

The power of the press rests in the ability of journalists to hold government accountable, to mobilize public opinion on matters that are important to individuals, communities or the nation, and to provide necessary information of value.

Notice in those words not a mention of celebrity content, mobile devices nor "aspirational" reportage that feels good without doing any good.

But also notice in those words the key to the future for newsrooms across the nation: A visible role in the daily life of the nation rooted in real benefit and sustained credibility.

Newsprint may not be the medium-of-choice today for many readers, and perhaps certainly not the one for the desired next generation of readers. But the news organizations behind what certainly will be a blend of printed and electronic pages must be again the mediums-of-choice for that group, whether they be thought-leaders in

society, officeholders in government or voters.

The nation – our audience – needs facts, presented clearly, accurately and completely. For those who are held rapt by the comings and goings of the Kardashians and turn away from discussion of policy in the Keystone Pipeline System debate: Well, perhaps it's time to say "goodbye" and leave them to vacuous talking heads, unreal "reality" shows and the assortment of cable TV geek-fests that offer a chance to feel superior just by sitting on a sofa.

"Targeted circulation" indeed. Let's leave behind the prideful ignorant who proclaim little faith and demonstrate even less actual consumption of news, and target those readers and users who want news and data and informed decisions – and who will pay a reasonable fee to get it.

Ok, it's not as easy to gather in and report out as feature items and single-interview chats. It means bucking the system to

place journalists in seats where daily decisions are made and social issues discussed – from City Hall to church pews. It means bringing the news of the day in new ways, but with the same old standards that separated opinion from fact, news pages from editorials and commentary from reporting.

The Newseum Institute's latest State of the First Amendment national survey, published on July 4, showed that 70 percent of respondents disagreed with the statement that "overall, the news media tries to report the news without bias."

To be sure, the charge of bias has been leveled at journalists since the nation began – and was, in fact, welcomed by many in the first "journals of opinion" and later by media moguls making no pretence at publishing anything but "news" filtered through their own views.

But over time, and by dint

Trump's UN speech defines America's leadership

In his first appearance to the United Nations (UN) General Assembly, President Trump delivered one of his most consequential and effective speeches since he assumed the presidency. The world had been exposed to the firm rhetoric that President Trump has used in the past, and it is partly the reason why he was elected President of the United States.

He is not afraid to speak his mind and has always been dedicated to his message to put America first. At the UN, President Trump once again rededicated himself to that mes-

sage and reaffirmed America's leadership on the global stage.

For decades, the United States has grappled with the despotic regime of the Kim family in North Korea. MOVIES WITH DAVE

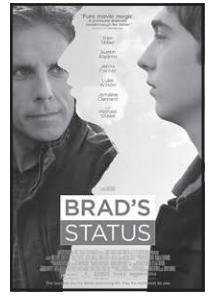
Well I guess there's always a first time for everything.

This week, while watching the latest Lego movie, I had the pleasure of sharing a theater with a woman who thought it was appropriate to take a selfie smack dab during the middle of the film.

With the camera flash on.

I swear the thoughtlessness of some people just completely baffles me.

Regardless of others though, I had a heap of films to review this week, so here's my thoughts on them.



First up is "Brad's Status." When Brad Sloan (Ben Stiller) travels cross country with his son Troy (Austin Abrams) to look at prospective colleges, he's confronted with an internal crisis as he reminisces on his life's many regrets, comparing his failings to his more successful college friends.

This film is basically the old saying, "the grass is always greener on the other side," in movie form.

The whole movie is told completely from Stiller's character perspective, intercut with voiceovers of his internal monologue seemingly every five minutes.

It's an interesting way to tell a story, and I am a sucker for a good internal monologue, but with everything revolving around Stiller's character, his performance really has the potential to make or break the entire film.

This is made even more difficult, considering his character could easily come across as an unlikeable, insatiable jerk with no redeemable qualities whatsoever if performed poorly.

Luckily, Stiller manages to pull off the character with flying colors.

He definitely still comes across as a cynical, bitter man overcome with jealousy, but Stiller makes it work. He somehow manages to make Brad come across as relatable, and at times, even likeable.

Also delivering a solid performance is Austin Abrams as Brad's son. He's very subdued and kind of quiet, but he's supposed to be a shy teenager with an overbearing father, so he makes for a very believable character.

I really enjoyed the pair's journey together here and despite the overall story being pretty predictable, their journey made for an interesting, thought-provoking film that had me engaged practically the whole way through.

This is a Ben Stiller movie though. Sure it's a drama, but it has to have some comedic elements, right?

Well you'd be correct, this film does have it's fair share of really funny moments.

It far from a traditional comedy though. I'm not exactly sure how to explain it, but the way the jokes were delivered here just felt off to me for some reason.

It's almost like you're not supposed to be laughing during these clearly funny moments. It's a very strange, awkward feeling and I'm not sure why those moments were like that.

Also, the ending kind of took me off guard for how abrupt it was. In retrospect it was a fine place to end the film, and it worked for Stiller's character looking back on it. I was just surprised in the moment.

Overall I enjoyed this movie quite a bit. It's a simple concept, but Stiller's performance really makes it work. If you enjoy non-traditional drama/

comedies I say go check it out. "Brad's Status" is rated R.



Next up is "The LEGO Ninjago Movie." This adaptation based on the popular toy series, follows Lloyd (Dave Franco).

Unfortunately for Lloyd, he's the son of the evil Garmadon (Justin Theroux), a megalomaniac warlord bent on conquering the city of Ninjago. Despite the two not being on friendly terms, the city hates Lloyd for his parentage and shuns him at every occasion possible.

What the city and Garmadon both don't know is Lloyd is part of the Secret Ninja Force, a group of teenage warriors, lead by Master Wu (Jackie Chan), dedicated to protecting the ninja themed metropolis and thwarting Garmadon's evil plans.

Wow, it hasn't even been a year since the last one and we already have another Lego movie.

I was actually really looking forward to this film going into it.

Not because I have some kind of deep affinity for the Ninjago toy line or anything. Before watching this movie, I didn't know the first thing about those particular building sets.

No, it's the fact that the track record for these Lego movies has been shockingly good.

You'd think a film series with such heavy branding would just be a glorified cash grab, made only to sell more toys and nothing else.

But the past two movies (The Lego Movie & The Lego Batman Movie) have been chock-full of fun, memorable characters, beautiful stop motion-esque animation, and some of the smartest, subversive writing I've ever seen in an animated movie.

Unfortunately this film doesn't nearly live up to the quality of it's predecessors.

Sure, it still has the same animation style and it still looks fantastic, but the writing and the quality of the characters have taken a massive nosedive compared to the previous two films.

The main character is about as generic as they come, with Dave Franco's performance being more annoying than endearing.

Garmadon just feels like a discount version of Will Ferrell's Lord Business character from the first Lego film. He's not bad, in fact he's probably the best part of the whole movie. He's just not nearly as memorable as the villains from the previous Lego movies.

Even Jackie Chan, a man who I love in just about every role he plays, feels like he's phoning it in here. Heck, I'd say Chan gave a better performance in the second Nut Job movie earlier this year, at least compared to what he did in this film. Very disappointing.

None of the other characters are really worth mentioning. The remaining members of the Secret Ninja Force somehow manage to be more bland and forgettable than even Franco's character.

Not necessarily because of the voice talent, they're decent all around as far as I can tell. They're just never given a chance to shine, and because there's so many of them, they only end up cannibalizing each other's screentime.

The story is an unfocused mess and it takes forever for the film to go anywhere with the plot. It's like a third of the way into the movie before the filmmakers finally decide to

send the main characters off to do something. An eternity for a kid's film. All in all, it gets very dull, very quickly.

Worst of all though, this movie just isn't as funny as the other Lego movies.

I'm not exactly sure why. It still has the same subversive sense of humor as the first two, and to be fair there are still a couple hilarious scenes.

But for every joke or gag that works, a dozen more fall flat on their face. Maybe the comedic timing is off, maybe the jokes just aren't nearly as clever this time around, all I know is this movie is a massive letdown coming off of the comedic heights of the previous Lego movies.

I don't know. Maybe I'm being too hard on this film. It's certainly better than the likes of "The Emoji Movie" or "The Nut Job 2."

It's just such a bummer after how amazingly good the other Lego movies were. I can't help but feel disappointed.

"The LEGO Ninjago Movie" is rated PG.



This week is "Kingsman: The Golden Circle." In this sequel to the 2014 action spy movie, Eggsy (Taron Egerton) and the Kingsmen face their greatest threat yet.

With their headquarters destroyed and organization in shambles, the remaining members seek help from an allied spy group in the United States.

To survive, the two organizations must combine forces if they have any hope of defeating a ruthless common enemy (Julianne Moore) and saving the world yet again.

If you've ever bemoaned the loss of the classic 007 spy movies with their over-the-top villains, ridiculous stunts, and gadgets that border on silly, if not still awesome, then oh boy do I have a film series for you.

These Kingsman movies are basically what James Bond films would have been if they were rated R.

Not like the current Daniel Craig era films. While a couple of those have been good in their own right, they have more in common with Jason Bourne movies than they do with the classic 007 films with Roger Moore, Sean Connery, or heck even Pierce Brosnan.

There's nothing quite like a movie that not only accepts, but embraces its over-the-top nature, and these Kingsman movies do just that.

The action, while excessive, is also very well choreographed. The real star of the show here though is the camera.

The way the filmmakers flow around the action, capturing every punch, shot, and explosion is just mesmerizing. This style of action is quickly becoming my new favorite.

All this, plus some really memorable musical moments, thanks in no small part to a guest appearance from Sir Elton John, make for some of the best action scenes you'll see in theaters period.

The villain here is just as wildly over-the-top as the action, and boy do I love her for it.

Her secret hideout is completely outrageous, she's ruthless in the most ridiculous ways possible, and her evil plan would border on cartoonish if the result wasn't so horrible.

But for how excessive everything is, the film also manages to throw in some social commentary in there as well.

1/2 cup sour cream

Flu vaccinations Available starting Monday

Flu vaccinations will be available at county health departments across Oklahoma starting Monday.

The McClain County Health Department operates two locations - 919 N. 9th Ave., in Purcell and 600 N. Main in Blanchard.

The Oklahoma State Department of Health recommends everyone over the age of 6 months be immunized against the flu.

"We are especially encouraging those in the age group 18-64 to get their flu vaccination," said State Health Commissioner Dr. Terry Cline. "During the 2016-17 flu season, there were 715 hospitalizations and 28 deaths among this age group."

People 65 and older and those with chronic health conditions are encouraged to ask their health care provider about being vaccinated against pneumococcal pneumonia as well.

Pneumococcal pneumonia is a common and potentially

serious complication of the flu.

Cline said the pneumococcal vaccine doesn't need to be given every year and is available at the county health departments.

County health departments accept SoonerCare, Medicare, all private health insurance, cash, checks or credit cards as payment for flu vaccinations.

The following fee schedule applies:

- Individuals who have health insurance should bring their cards. The insurance company will be billed for the vaccine and an administrative fee.

- Children age 18 and younger who have no health insurance or whose insurance doesn't cover flu vaccines and who are eligible for SoonerCare or are Native American or Alaskan natives may receive a flu vaccination at no charge through the Vaccine for Children Program.

- All others will be charged \$25 to cover the cost of the vaccine and administering it.

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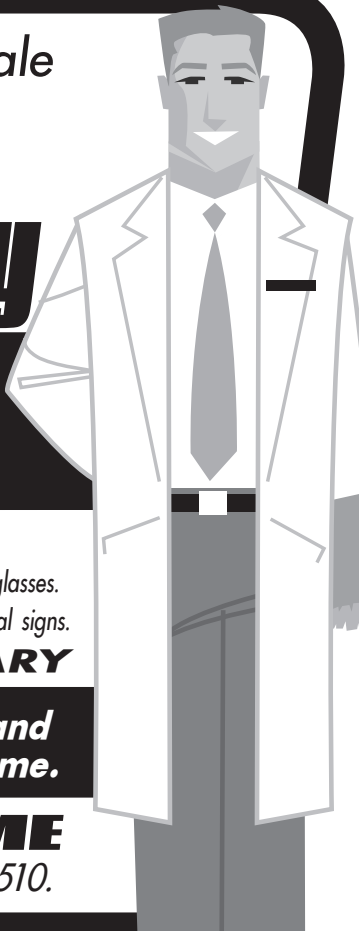

Here are some of the reasons your local newspaper is the most trustworthy source for news and information:

— Newspaper newsrooms are staffed with real people — people you know — reporters, photographers, editors — gathering the news, conducting interviews, covering meetings, attending events, writing, editing, fact-checking and making sure every day you can trust what you read.

— Newspapers rely on recognizable sources. Quotes in the articles you read are attributed to real people and can be easily verified.

— Newspapers work hard to stay away from single source reporting, giving read-

ers context and balance.

— Newspaper websites have legitimate URLs ending in .com or .org extensions, listing contact information, the names of staff members and the media organization's leadership team on the website.

— Newspapers correct mistakes. Everyone makes mistakes at times, but there is a big difference between an error and intentionally and knowingly publishing a false report because of some political or social agenda. Spurious websites, blogs and social media do not correct errors. They thrive on them.

In the United States newspapers have a long and important legacy of holding the powerful accountable, de-

fending the First Amendment and advocating for government transparency.

Democracy is protected when the newspaper provides checks and balances as the Fourth Estate of government from city hall to the courthouse to the statehouse to the White House.

Newspapers are committed to the neighborhoods, cities, counties, states and coverage areas they serve.

Straightforward news reporting and thought-provoking commentary give a voice to the voiceless and empower the powerless. Newspapers hold government accountable because at our very core we believe that government belongs to the governed and not to the governing.

Don't be embarrassed because you shared some sensational, agenda-driven report on social media only to find out it is totally fake. Get your news where real news has always been found: Your local newspaper, the real deal.

dangerous actions of North Korea, President Trump was right to identify Iran and Venezuela for their actions at odds with basic human rights and international law. Iran, a nation known to harbor, support and fund terrorists, has attempted to undermine peace efforts in the Middle East for years. Its theocratic dictatorship has oppressed its own people and destroyed its economy.

President Trump's state-

ment on the validity of the Iran deal is an important warning to Iran and its terrorist allies that we are committed to preventing Iran from developing a nuclear weapon - a weapon which it most certainly will use if it acquires one.

In Venezuela, the country and its citizens are collapsing under the socialist policies of Nicolas Maduro. President Trump gave an eloquent and honest assessment of how dire

of the hard work and credible reporting by tens of thousands of journalists — in newspapers, and later in radio, television and now online — readers, listeners, views and users gave their loyalty to news operations that brought them what they needed.

As emotional as one can be when waxing about ink-on-newsprint, it was the information that was printed with that ink, on those pages, that made newspapers strong and powerful — and that information was the stuff — not the fluff — of life.

Of course there is room for entertaining, uplifting stories and reports on that part of the day that makes us chuckle, smile or simply shake a head. But editorial decisions ought not to start and end there. "Click-bait" ought not to squeeze out real debate. "Metrics" ought not to rule over meaning. And the challenge in thorough reporting on the county's budget next year ought to mean finding a new way — perhaps through the new studies of gaming technology as applied to news reporting — of telling a complex story. Decades ago, USA TODAY showed us how color weather maps and national sports rankings could be fun while still bringing needed information to commuters, gardeners and golfers — and while also reporting on AIDS, national security issues and unsafe military vehicles.

Consider that most news today still originates with mainstream media — and that the value for those aggregators was simply in finding a new way to package and deliver the content. A simple text-and-

photo site called Craig's List wreaked havoc on the financial underpinnings of a massive industry just by finding an easier way to post and peruse the same information. Can not we collectively continue to find such innovation within newsrooms as well?

Journalists have learned many hard lessons over the last two decades: Nobody really loved us because of our nameplates, innovation was not just a good idea but a daily consideration on survival, and we no longer are the gatekeepers anymore between news makers and news consumers.

But in those tough, even brutal, decades, we've also discovered how to make our pages come alive — literally, via the Web — and found new ways to know about and be in contact with those interested in news and information. To the old axiom about being "Clear, concise and accurate" those who have survived have added "responsive."

The power of the press was, is now, and will be in the future, bringing consumers the news they need — and having the fortitude to seek and report the news they don't even yet know they need, but will.

Ignorance and apathy is the challenge. Credibility and necessity are the means to overcome those challenges.

- Why a new Junior High Facility instead of Remodeling current facility?
 - The Purcell School Board considered a remodel of the current facility but decided the safety concerns with Green Ave., Foot traffic by the building, and almost a dozen entry ways into the school were a hazard and safety concern. Also the ability to share services with the high school for Child Nutrition programs, Shared teachers for Ag, Art, Athletics, Computers, etc. made building a new Junior High the preferred decision.
- Is there growth figured into the bond issue?
 - The bond issue has a 2% growth factor for half the life of the bond figured into it. The Purcell School District has averaged 4.7% growth for the last 25 years and the last 5 years. This conservative factor will help make sure the impact on taxpayers is small or nonexistent.
- Will the new Junior High have safe rooms?
 - Yes, the new Junior High will be built with two safe rooms, one on each end of the facility. It will have enough room to keep all the Junior High & High School students and staff safe in the event of a tornado.
- Will building a new Junior High make the district have two unused buildings?
 - No, The current Human Resources Building (old middle school) is currently utilized. The upstairs is leased to the public library, health department, and TSET program. Downstairs is used by Education Station, Expand after school, Special Ed Services, High School Concurrent Enrollment, Central Office Staff, Maintenance Department Headquarters, and the District Technology Services. Gym and locker rooms are used by high school athletes daily.

- Any violation of election law will be reported to

Electioneering is not allowed within 300 feet of a ballot box. It is also unlawful to remove a ballot from the polling location, possess intoxicating liquors within half a mile of a polling place or to disclose how you voted while within the election enclosure.

Pumpkin:

Herman and her husband, Ben. Bea, who goes by the moniker The Busy Bee (read on, you'll see why), said that first year they had fewer than 50 pumpkins and 10 bales of straw. "We sold out in one evening," she said.

Which got the Hermans to thinking they may have tapped into an unmet need.

And so they promptly set about to meet it.

Fast forward 15 years and Bea is doing Halloween on a commercial scale, buying on average 6 pickup loads of pumpkins from growers in Floydada, Texas, a town that bills itself as Pumpkin Capital, USA. (For the sake of this article, we will ignore the Circleville, Ohio, Pumpkin Show's claim to being the biggest festival in the country that is dedicated to the pumpkin.)

Anyway, each load is comprised of seven or eight bins "depending on the size of the pumpkins."

They come in all shapes, sizes and colors. And they take up a fair amount of space in a field south of the Herman home.

Fact: nursing homes, day cares, schools and just ordinary passersby were finding it irresistible to pass by the Pumpkin Patch without stopping.

And they come back year after year after year.

Bea said it's rare that there are any leftover pumpkins after Halloween.

She tries to close the Pumpkin Patch by November 2.

One regular customer from Dibble buys leftovers and feeds them to deer. A woman takes a few to feed her chickens.

Fall is Bea's favorite season and the Pumpkin Patch has a role in that, too.

"I look forward to seeing my customers," she said. "One couple comes down from Nebraska to celebrate their grandkids' birthdays and they always come to the Pumpkin Patch."

Surprisingly, thievery and vandalism hasn't been a problem.

Bea recalled one incident years ago when the pumpkin patch was actually in her front yard.

She heard the mischief, but was home alone and didn't go outside.

The next morning, she found one youth's wallet and driver's license.

She called the school and left a message that if he wanted it back, he could call her.

"I was going to ream him out," she said.

She never got a call.

And she's a little philosophical about these things.

"If they steal, they are the ones who have to pay the consequences for being a thief," she said. "I've got so many (pumpkins), I don't miss them."

Admission to the Pumpkin Patch is free, but Bea charges kids a dollar to ride a train around the property.

But even that can be free if a kid is lucky in the corn bin.

The bin is actually a 10-foot diameter stock tank that is filled five to six inches deep with deer

corn. That's more than a ton of deer corn, by the way.

And hidden amid all of those kernels is about \$15 in coins.

Kids can search to their hearts' content and whatever they find, they keep.

Bea adds more coins as needed.

She buys the corn in bulk. It's never been treated with any chemicals so it is safe to play in.

When the Pumpkin Patch closes, Bea will sell the corn for \$1 a bag.

She and Ben also keep bees and sell their own branded honey.

In past years, she's also sold produce, buying from local growers to keep the shelves stocked.

"This will be the last year," she said of the produce sales.

Seven years ago, she started a craft fair on the third Saturday in October. There is just one hard and fast rule. Everything sold must be made in the U.S., or be handmade.

This year's craft fair date is October 21. A food truck will be on site, as will a chainsaw artisan woodcarver.

Not one to be content with idle hands, Bea runs a catering business during the winter.

Her menu includes soups, casseroles, cakes, pies and just about anything else you can think of.

With the exception of the pie shells, everything is homemade from scratch, using the finest and freshest ingredients.

Both measures must receive at least 60 percent of the vote to pass.

Proposition 1 totals \$29.270 million and includes \$17.965 to construct and equip a new junior high school on land south of the high school.

Once vacated, the existing junior high school would be leased.

According to a fact sheet published by the district, both the City of Purcell and McClain County have shown an interest in leasing the building.

However, the Boney Matthews Fieldhouse and the auditorium would remain under control of Purcell Public Schools "for further school and civic use."

The \$17.965 million price tag for a new junior high school is 61.4 percent of funds from Proposition 1.

Improvements to Conger Field totaling \$11.005 million will account for 37.6 percent of the bond issue proceeds.

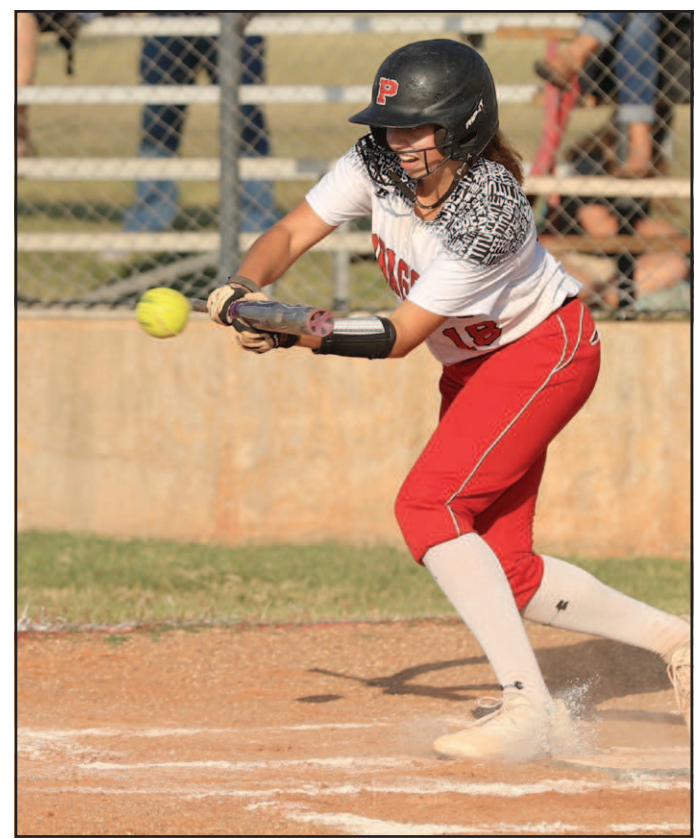

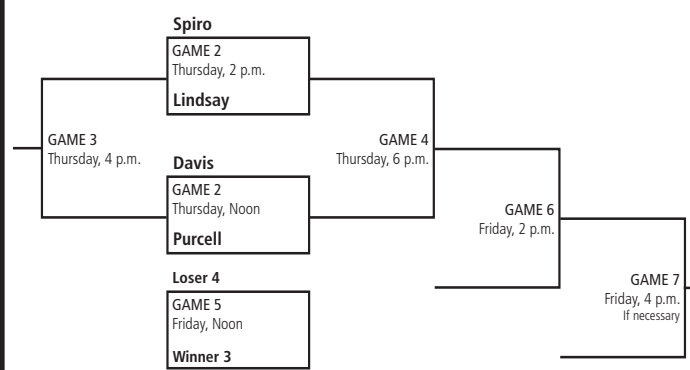

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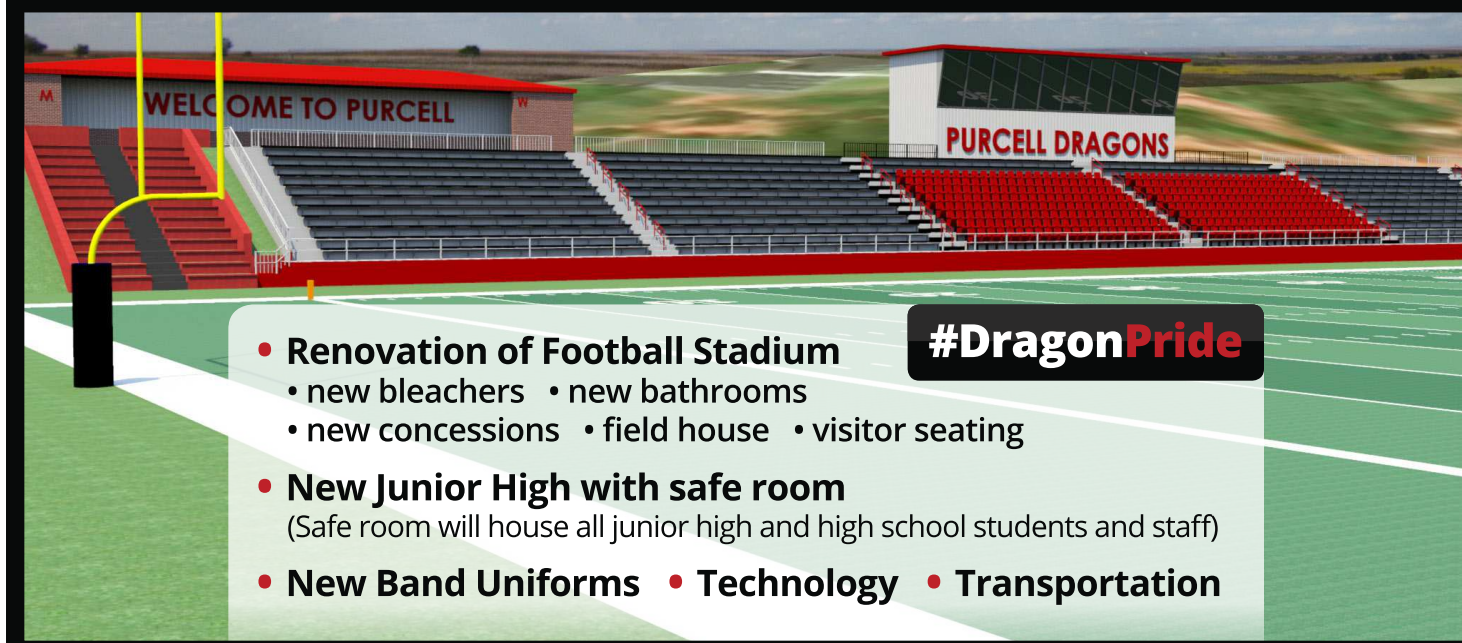

tight end.

“Shea and Cooper played well in the offensive line. We had some communication issues but the problems were dealing with the defenses they were running,” Higbee said.

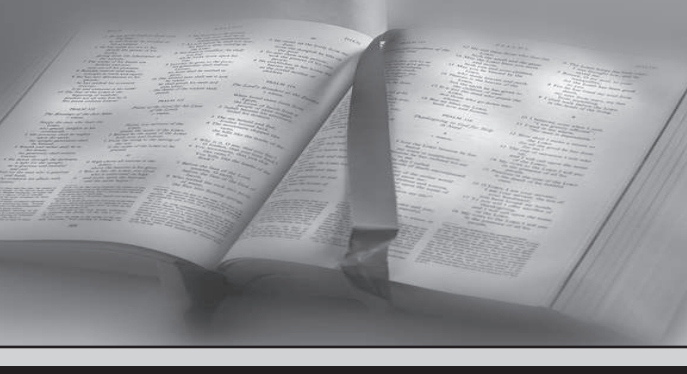

Our worldview is important. The way we think about the world will influence the way we act in the world. For example, many years ago, people thought the world was flat. They were afraid to sail too far out to the sea, because they might fall off the edge of the world.

Many years ago, people thought that the sun revolved around the earth. From what they could see, it was a reasonable belief. The sun rises in the east, crosses over the sky, and goes down in the west. Thus, the sun must revolve around the earth. If this is so, then we are the center of our universe. We are important, and God created everything to revolve around us.

But now we have learned that this is not true. The earth actually revolves around the sun. We as human beings are simply part of the circle of life that revolves around the star that gives us light and energy.

Perhaps this would lead us to acknowledge that God is the center of our universe, for he has given us the sun which sustains us by giving us light and food and energy. We form our worldview based on what we see and observe.

Welcome, as always, to the "front porch."

One morning in this week as I continued working on my book on faith, I picked up Lee Stroebel's book called "The Case For Faith." Sometimes I carry the book with me on my journeys, always finding its reading intriguing.

In one section toward the end, Stroebel interviews an elderly Canadian teacher, writer, and scholar named Lynn Anderson. This interview was one of Stroebel's most important, because Mr. Anderson expresses in one of his books the true experience of "doubt." Stroebel, the journalist and researcher,

wanted to see how such a man of knowledge and reputation had wrestled with the doubts that seem to be inherent in any faith.

At one point, Stroebel's investigation into "how can faith doubt?" takes them to the area of "experience."

Anderson introduces the topic by emphasizing the need to establish an "object" of faith - that is, a person's faith must be in something very solid. Faith needs, as we would say it, some "substance," even as the inspired writer says as he defines faith as "the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1).

On that point, Mr. Anderson says this:

"We Canadians know there are two kinds of ice: thick and thin. You can have very little faith in thick ice and it will hold you up just fine; you can have enormous faith in thin ice and you can drown. It's not the amount of faith you can muster that matters up front. It may be tiny, like a mustard seed. But your faith must be invested in something solid."

How true! The more we think on those thoughts, the more we have to realize there is an urgency for every man to do

the research, the digging, the seeking and examining of the scriptures, and the thoughtful meditation on the truths of God's Word to make sure of his faith and to make sure that faith is on "solid ice."

You can drown easily spiritually with a strong faith in the wrong things!

"Ultimately," says Anderson, "you must embark on your experiment of faith by doing what faith would do."

Faith you see, is a "doing." Sometimes we tend to forget that. Faith is an experience, a real experience, and we must experience faith by doing the things the great redeemer Jesus has said for us to do in His word.

But, Anderson warns, there is a danger in any man's faith.

"Knowing the truth," he explains, "doesn't mean filling your head with knowledge." Instead, he points out, our faith is experiential knowledge. "Like Adam knew Eve," he says, "he didn't just know her name and address; he experienced her."

By the same token, he goes on to say, "To experience the truth ... you have to be a following learner. In other words, do what Jesus says and you'll

experience the validity of it. It's kind of like riding a bicycle. You can't watch a video or read a book about it; you've got to get on one and get the feel of it.”

The truths here remind us that – staying with the bicycle metaphor – we need to make sure we get on the bicycle and experience the joy involved in that experience. No one can fully explain the experience of getting those pedals to work well enough to allow us to stay upright for three, four, five seconds before falling down.

You can't explain that. You have to experience it. With faith, our experience comes,

blessedly, through the obedience of One who is far greater than we.

But there is still one more issue to address: How, exactly, do we do that?

Anderson summarizes that question – and, in a way – the entire interview – saying that the more you experience the phenomenal acts of faith, “the more you will experientially be woven into a web of faith.”

We see, then, the fallacies that many unfaithful friends

are living: They are waiting to experience something, and then begin their walk with the Lord.

But now we understand that we have to begin our walk by our obedience and response to the gospel, then we will grow experientially in our faith journey.

In other words, we can't just stand there and imagine what it is like. We have to get on the bicycle and pedal.

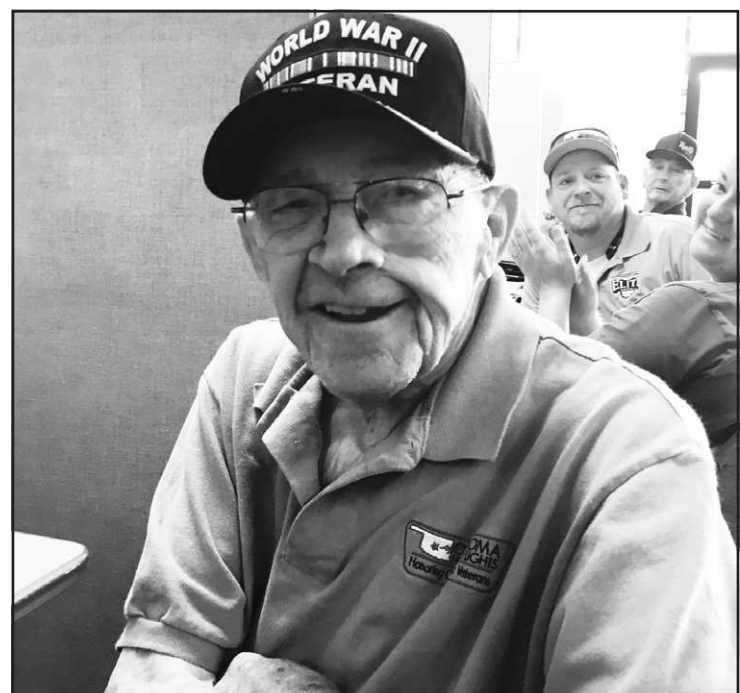

individuals who would like to be a part of what we do for veterans and their families. A grand opening will be held to show our community what we are doing. I have never found a more rewarding job than that of helping the men and women who have served in the military. Many of those we work with were never the same after their military service. Some of them wear scars on the outside like badges while others are scarred on the inside from the traumatic events that occurred to them while serving.

One of the things I encourage veterans to do is find a doctor or a therapy group where they can talk out how they are feeling and why. From my own experiences as a Marine in Vietnam, I would have been much better off had we been able to talk about what happened and how we felt. It was over 30 years after serving before I found out that most veterans felt the same way as I did.

In 1992 several of us went to the Vet Center in Oklahoma City for a class called A Walk Thru Vietnam. That is where I first realized that most of us were dealing with the same PTSD. That was the beginning of the changes in my life that helped me to be where I’m at today. There have been too many lives ruined by the things that happened to many of our military members.

Veteran suicides continue to be a major problem for too many of the men and women who served in our military. My

suggestion for veterans and their families is to continue looking for that person who understands what is going on in the veteran’s head.

One of the reasons I started helping veterans is the fact that many of them do not have any money and don’t see time in the future when they will have. Currently, there are over 16,000 veterans who we have helped with their VA claims for benefits.

Last week we assisted 240 veterans and surviving spouses with their applications for VA benefits. I received rating decisions on 11 veterans who were rated at 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual amount of \$411,375 per year. Twenty-five veterans received disability ratings from 10-90 percent. These men and women will receive a combined amount of \$421,946 annually. One of the female veterans we have been assisting was approved for a 70 percent rating back to 2002. Needless to say this veteran has been suffering for the last 15 years with injuries that occurred to her while serving in the military.

Our volunteers who assist surviving spouses were very busy last week helping 22 of them with their applications for VA benefits. Shirley can be reached at (405) 550-8806, extension 103 with any questions you may have on spousal benefits.

From there, it turned into an early blowout. Ibarra ended the half with a punt return to the 1-yard line of Comanche with less than a minute left before halftime. Lexington then took a knee and showed some mercy to the Indians.

"Our starters did not play a down in the second half," Berglan said. "It was a good opportunity to get the younger players some quality playing time. Offensively, we are starting to understand the concepts and the execution of the spread offense.

"Our spread offense is designed to do exactly what the wording says. We are going to spread the defense out and make them defend sideline to sideline.
