Construction clock ticking

Work on school bond projects coming in mid-2018, Midkiff says

Look for construction around Purcell High School to begin sometime in mid-2018.

Superintendent Jason Midkiff told the board at a meeting Monday evening he has begun meeting with the architect and construction managers on projects which will be paid for with bonds approved by

the voters last month.

"We have a loose time line laid out with construction projects starting in late summer or early fall," he said. "We believe we will be able to start on the football fieldhouse since it does not require as much detail as the

The council approved an ordinance creating a planned unit development status for certain properties.

Discussions regarding the city's need for a PUD ordinance arose after the city council affirmed the planning commission's recommendation to rezone a 5.9 acre tract at 1111 Chandler Road from agricultural to light

industrial.

The site will be the future home of Premier Truck Rental, an Indianabased company. The ordinance sets

forth P U D review criteria for those tracts and reads in part, "The Planned Unit Development is a special zoning district category that provides an alternative approach to conventional land use controls.

Cooper's favorite class is Amber Findley's Honors English IV. After graduation he plans to attend the University of Oklahoma.



In case you missed it, you missed a lot.


Thompson knocked the ball completely out of the park telling a compelling story about a trip to Dachau, Germany.

But the man said Thompson, now a Brigadier General and soon to become the Adjutant General of the Oklahoma National Guard, represents the U.S. Army that saved his life.

The survivor told Thompson the day the Americans took control of the camp was the day he was supposed to die.

Back in 2014, the James C. Nance Memorial Bridge in Lexington and Purcell closed down. There were infrastructure problems that caused officials to shut down the bridge until repairs were made.

As soon as I heard what was happening, I marched right into the governor's office and sat down until she agreed to talk about House District 20's

transportation problem. Fortunately, Gov. Mary Fallin did right by the people in our district. Now, I can be the sturdiest bridge our com-

critical of our governor, but I munity has ever seen! believe in giving credit where credit is due.

Fallin came through for us and pushed to get the bridge fixed so we could minimize inconveniences for our residents. The governor and I banded together to re-open the bridge in the early summer of 2014.

But the work was far from

Years have gone by, and we've chugged along with plans to build a new bridge that will serve the people in Lexington, Purcell and the surrounding communities for decades to come.

And finally, a contractor has been selected and we have broken ground on the new bridge. Construction is underway in Purcell, and I'm happy to say workers are moving trees and digging up dirt.

In an effort to keep our citizens safe, the bridge will have wide shoulders on either side of the four-lane stretch.

I expect it to be well lit and

As I've said before, the Department of Transportation promises the old bridge is going to stay put until the new one is completed.

Routes should not be interrupted during the duration of construction.

This project has gone on for a long, long time, and we're finally at the tail-end. Everything should be wrapped up in the spring of 2019, and I'll be cheering on those construction workers every step of the way.

As a lawmaker, it can be rare to feel like you are truly helping your community. Partisan gridlock at the Capitol is at an all-time high, and good ideas often get stuck in the mud.

But when it comes to the Lexington-Purcell bridge project, I am confident the state is doing something to drastically improve the quality of life for residents in Cleveland County.

Sure, it has taken a long time, but that will only make the bridge's grand opening that much sweeter in 2019.

That all changed though in the movie's final scene.

In the end I'd actually go as far to say that I enjoyed this movie more than the first "Daddy's Home." Granted, that's not a terribly high bar in my opinion, but still.

In a small town like Lennox Valley, residents find entertainment in ways that would seem foreign to someone growing up in the big city. Sure, we had clubs, like the Auburn Hat Society, and church-related events, but our entertainment wasn't limited to these activities

As editor of Hometown News, Iris Long liked to do her part. One way she did this was through her Weekly Readers' Poll.

The subjects of her polls could include just about anything. Sometimes it was something as innocent as "What is your favorite ice cream flavor?" Other weeks it was downright controversial, like the time Iris posed the question, "Do you think egg price inflation is related to the Federal

This issue of Hometown News included more than enough serious stories. With the controversy surrounding the annual men's breakfast and turkey shoot, along with the possible appearance of A.J. Fryerson a few nights earlier, Long felt a bit of levity would be good for her fellow citizens.

On Tuesday, as she sat at her desk contemplat ing the topic for the weekly poll, her primary objective was to come up with a question to amuse her readers. She considered:

What is the funniest movie you've seen this

· How many donuts could you eat at one sitting? What is your favorite in-state vacation spot?

She contemplated something about the favorite menu item at the Hoffbrau, but didn't want to risk the possibility that "beer" might earn a place on the list. As the only restaurant in town serving alcohol, Iris realized it was a possibility

Eventually, she settled on a poll question that was sure to provide amusement, as well as good memories, to many of her friends in The Valley: 'What is the best love song of the past 35 years?

Iris felt certain there would be a lot of votes for "Unchained Melody," by the Righteous Brothers, and "When a Man Loves a Woman," by Percy Sledge. What she didn't expect was any controversy arising out of her innocent poll question. One would think, by October 1998, she would have known better. You may be surprised to learn it's sometimes

difficult to find exciting stories to fill the pages of a small town newspaper each week. This week was an exception. Iris had a difficult time determining which would be the main story on Page 1. It would be hard to discount the possible sighting of A.J. Fryerson the previous Friday night. However, the controversy surrounding Saturday's

competing breakfasts directly affected a good portion of the population.

When the paper came out on Wednesday, the front page was divided in half with a thick, 3-point line running the entire length of the broadsheet page. The A.J. story filled the left half of the page. A story about the competing breakfasts filled most of the right half of the page. The only front page item, other than these stories, was a small box underneath the breakfast story with the headline,

By Friday, Caroline's Salon was buzzing with hair dryers and chatter as Valley women prepared to look their best for Sunday services. For weeks, A.J. Fryerson had been a primary topic of discussion, but the story of his possible appearance took a back seat to the Weekly Readers' Poll

After much discussion, it was decided that everyone present, other than Ellie Jarrell, who had already placed her vote in Iris's box, would cast their ballots for "I Never Promised You a Rose Garden," an almost 30-year-old song by Lynn

Earl Goodman stirred those assembled at the VFW hall later that evening, when he shared that the women of The Valley were conspiring to fix the weekly poll by selecting a "feminist" song with the theme "men don't try hard enough.

Frankly, only a handful of members remembered the song from 1970, but it didn't take much to get tempers flaring in my hometown in 1998. After two hours of heated debate, the assembly agreed to cast all of their ballots for Tammy Wynette's "Stand By Your Man."

Never mind the song, recorded in 1968, was really about overlooking men's faults, the men of the VFW were giddy with excitement, thinking the song held the perfect message for the women who were trying to "fix" the weekly poll.

It was common knowledge Iris kept office hours on Saturday morning from 9 a.m. until noon. As she worked on the paper, she was surprised, pleasantly at first, by the number of townfolk stopping by to drop their votes into the poll ballot box. At 12:05, Long locked the front door and peeked

at a few ballots. She quickly realized what was happening as almost every slip had either "Stand By Your Man" or "I Never Promised You a Rose Garden" written on it.

Leaning back in her weathered leather seat, Iris sighed, then whispered, "Oh, brother. I've done it again.'



Treasurer Teresa Jones said Monday her office mailed 26,140 statements on November 9.

That is an increase of 211 over the number of 2016 property tax bills mailed a year ago.

The taxes are due on December 31. Because that is a Sunday this year, Jones said her office will accept payment in full in person or postmarked by January 2.

If no payment is received by that date, taxes must be paid in full. Interest will begin accruing on January 15 at the rate of 1.5 percent per month. Taxpayers also have the op-

tion of paying property taxes in two equal installments, the first of which is due in person or postmarked by January 2.

The second half of property taxes is typically due on March

However, that falls on a Saturday in 2018 so taxpayers will have a brief grace period until April 2 to make their final payment in person. Tax payments mailed with an April 2 postmark will also be accepted as paid on time, Jones said.

Property owners who haven't yet received their annual tax statement from the county should contact the treasurer's office at 527-3261.





The PUD requires complex analysis and is subject to special review procedures and, once approved by the City Council, becomes a special zoning classification for the property

SECTION 2. Chapter 122, Article 2, Division 13, Subdivision IV of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Purcell is amended by adding thereto the following as Sections122-485, 122-486, 122-487, and 122-488 which shall read in their entirety as follows:

PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT

I. SECTION 122-485 - OBJEC-TIVES AND USE.

The Planned Unit Development is a specialized district as defined in Section 1 above and in Chapter 122, Article 1, Section 122-6, Paragraph 135. The PUD is intended to maximize flexibility and innovation in development by utilizing area sensitive site planning and design to achieve a desirable mixture of compatible land use patterns that include elements such as efficient pedestrian and vehicular circulation systems, enhanced residential amenities. and allowances for the provision of usable open space.

A. Purpose and Intent. The purpose and intent of the Planned Unit Development is to:

(1) Encourage innovative land development while maintaining appropriate limitations on the character and intensity of use and assuring compatibility with adjoining and proximate properties.

(2) Permit flexibility within the development to maximize the unique physical features of the

- (3) Encourage efficient use of land in the placement and clustering of buildings and open areas. provision of circulation systems that achieve greater connectivity, and the conservation of natural features, natural topography, wooded areas, areas of historic significance, and environmentally sensitive areas.
- (4) Achieve a continuity of function and design within the development, encourage diversified living environments and land uses and provide a development framework that will create, strengthen and/ or enhance a strong sense of
- neighborhood and community character. (5) Provide a vehicle for negotiating modifications in standard development requirements to both encourage innovative development, and protect the
- health, safety and welfare of the community. B. Goals and Objectives. The PUD shall achieve the following
- land use objectives: (1) Minimize adverse effects upon surrounding property, the character of the neighborhood, traffic conditions, parking, utilities

or any other matters affecting the

public health, safety and general

(2) Contribute to the revitalization and/or redevelopment of areas where decline of any type has occurred.

(3) Promote infill development that is compatible and harmonious with adjacent uses, both existing and planned. (4) Maintain consistency with

the City's comprehensive plan, this chapter, and other applicable plans, policies, standards and regulations.

(5) Provide a development that contributes more to the general prosperity, health, safety and welfare of the community than would otherwise be provided through the standard zoning and development process

II. SECTION 122-486 AUTHO-RIZED PLANNED UNIT DEVEL-OPMENTS.

A. Appropriate - Use of a Planned Unit Development.

(1) The PUD is appropriately used when flexibility is desired that is not allowed under the zoning code in return for a coordinated development that provides greater public benefits, as outlined in the Purpose and Intent and is not otherwise part of the development process.

(2) The PUD is a design and planning tool that is not to be used to circumvent policies or used in lieu of seeking variances to regulations.

(3) Rezoning to a PUD within a special design district or design overlay district may be appropriate in cases where a use or a mix of uses within the design district is prohibited, but may be appropriate to a specific site. Where rezoning is proposed within a special design district or design overlay district, the PUD should:

i incorporate the development regulations and guidelines of the design district; and

ii be subject to the design review process for the design district.

B. Preliminary Review.

Applicants are encouraged to request preliminary review by staff prior to formal submittal for rezoning to a PUD. Preliminary review is most effective at the conceptual design phase, so that traffic, circulation, drainage, infrastructure, and other contextual impacts of the proposal may be considered for conformance with the comprehensive plan, and applicable policies, guidelines, and regulations.

C. Authorized Planned Unit Developments.

A PUD may be authorized by an amendment to the Official Zoning Districts Map after public hearings by the Planning Commission and City Council, provided it complies with the following requirements.

(1) Location and Uses. A PUD shall be considered a special zoning district, and may be authorized for any use, or combination of uses, permitted in this Chapter or such use that is unique in nature approved as appropriate by the approval of the PUD by the City

(2) PUD Requirements. The basis for review and approval of a PUD application shall be the Design Statement, Master Development Plan Map and related exhibits, which shall be adopted as a part of the rezoning nance, in conformance with the requirements described in these regulations. i Planned Unit Development

shall be a written report containing a minimum of the following elements: · Title of the PUD.

- commercial, office, and research development uses; common open space, natural resource areas public buildings, schools, and other public uses, and any other proposed uses.

· A list of all development regulations that will be applied, including conventional zoning district regulations, requested variations

to the subdivision regulations, and any other special development regulations.

· A statement on the existing and proposed streets, including right-of-way standards and street design concepts.

C. Application Process. 1. Upon receipt of a completed

application and application fee for the PUD, the staff shall transmit the application and all supporting material to the various City departments involved with the review process, and to appropriate officials or agencies of the City, County, adjoining counties or municipalities, school and special districts, and other official bodies as deemed necessary or mandated by law, including any review required by regional or State bodies under applicable State or Federal law. Each department, official, agency, or other official body shall consider all pertinent information and shall provide staff with a report of their findings, comments and recommendations in sufficient time for said findings, comments and recommendations to be incorporated into the Planning Commission Staff Report. 2. Upon final approval by the

City Council of the PUD Design Statement, Master Development Plan Map and the subsequent ordinance of rezoning, the PUD shall become a part of the Official Zoning Districts Map. The ordinance of rezoning shall adopt the PUD Design Statement and Master Development Plan Map by reference, and it shall be attached to said ordinance and become a part of the official records of the City.

3. The PUD Design Statement and Master Development Plan Map shall control the use and development of the property, and all building permits and development requests shall be in accordance with said Design Statement and Master Development Plan Map until it is otherwise amended by Modifications to PUD of the Code or by the City Council.

4. Approval of the PUD zoning district and related Design Statement and Master Development Plan Map shall establish the basic uses, locations, densities, and intensities for the PUD. However. for all Planned Unit Developments, site plans and building and occupancy permits for specific uses and buildings shall not be authorized until a Specific Plan has been approved for all or part of the land area covered by the PUD.

D. Application for PUD Specific Plan. A Specific Plan shall be submitted for review and approval by the Planning Commission at a regularly scheduled public hearing for the entire area or a phased portion of the property included in the PUD prior to approval of site plans and building permits for any structure or building. The Specific Plan shall be drawn at an appropriate scale, at a maximum of one (1) inch equals one hundred (100) feet, on one or more 24"X36" sheet(s). Specific plans shall include the llowing information

1. A summary showing how the Specific Plan conforms to the Design Statement and Master Development Plan Map, the total dwelling units in the Specific Plan by type, the square footage of non-residential uses, and a parking calculation of the required and provided spaces by use.

2. All elements of the Master Development Plan Map shall be incorporated into the Specific Plan. with additional detail as follows:

i. A preliminary site plan for each building site in the Specific Plan.

ii. Lot layouts for residential uses and for single-family dwellings, a typical site plan can be included.

iii. Preliminary site plans shall show areas to be developed, landscaped and paved, and existing and proposed buildings indicating: The maximum and minimum

distances between buildings, between building and property or building site boundaries. Percentage of building cov-

erage. · Preliminary elevations for all proposed structures. They shall

indicate building heights, materials, colors, and the general appearance of proposed structures. A parking and loading plan. Preliminary landscape plan.

· Fencing, trash disposal, and related storage areas. Sign program and sign design

iv. If the PUD is within a special design district or design overlay district and is subject to design review, additional information shall be submitted to the level of detail required for design review within

al or recreational in nature, where no structures or few incidental or similar techniques to: structures totaling no more than two thousand (2,000) square feet are proposed; developments. b) Screen incompatible uses.

III. SECTION 122-487 PUD

A. Purpose. Because the PUD provides the opportunity for greater design flexibility, mixed land uses and improved marketability. the applicant should be prepared to provide amenities and services that might not be required or possible in a conventional zoning district and subsequent development plan. Review and approval is. therefore, a process of negotiation between the City and the applicant to achieve the intent and purpose of these regulations and the City's Comprehensive Plan. The factors within this section

should be specifically included as review criteria for the evaluation of a PUD application. Other factors not listed herein may also be considered in the review process to respond to specific design and land use proposals. B. Design Standards. 1. The proposed PUD shall be

5. The maximum number of dwelling units within a PUD shall be based on calculation of gross density, which shall be established in the PUD Design Statement and Master Development Plan Map. Gross density shall be calculated by dividing the total land area of a residential tract, exclusive of arterial streets, by the number of dwelling units. 6. Location and type of housing

shall be established in a general pattern and shown on the Master Development Plan Map (where applicable).

C. Minimum Design and Construction Standards for Streets and Alleys. Streets and alleys

for both urban and non-urban PUDs and shall be designed and constructed in accordance with City standards and specifications for right-of-way width and paving cross sections. If modifications are proposed they shall be consistent with the following criteria and must be companion with the appropriate subdivision plat.

1. Public Streets and Alleys. Proposed public street and alley modifications shall satisfy the following criteria: i. Street right-of-way and pav-

ing widths shall be adequate to provide a traffic carrying and utility istallation capacity re design of the overall street system, the function of the individual street and the land uses served. ii. Paving cross-sections shall be designed to be adequate to

provide acceptable drainage in conformity with the drainage plan for the PUD, to receive loading commensurate with anticipated traffic, based on the design of the overall street system, and to have a maintenance level commensurate with that of facilities constructed to regular standards. 2. Private Streets and Alleys.

Proposed private street and alley modifications shall satisfy the criteria for public facility modifications listed above, and the owner applicant shall provide any ongong and long-term maintenance of private street and alley facilities hat will not be provided by the City. D. General Design and Develop-

ment Guidelines. 1. Density. Proposed residential

densities should conform with the City's Comprehensive Plan and should be allocated in a manner, and at a scale, that will be compatible with adjacent developed neighborhoods. 2. Amenities. Amenities should be considered an important jus-

tification for development and City approval of a PUD. Where gross or net densities are to be increased to promote economy of development, or where other methods of land use intensification are proposed, usable open space should be furnished, along with provisions for its permanent retention and continued maintenance.
