Pursuit starts here, ends in Norman

Car rolls and catches fire at Gray and University

A pursuit that began in the 2000 block of South Green Avenue in Purcell about 11:30 p.m. last Friday ended in a roll over crash and fire at the intersection of Gray and University Blvd. in Norman.

None of the four juveniles in the stolen SUV were injured.

In addition to Purcell Police, Norman Police and Firefighters responded to the pursuit.

When Purcell Officers noticed the reported stolen 2003 Yukon travelling south on Green they turned their lights on and the SUV took off.

Public Information Officer Lt. Scott Stephens said the vehicle was attempting to get on Interstate 35 at the mile marker 91 exit but missed the exit and ramped down the embankment.

"I thought the car would flip over then but they were able to get on the interstate," Stephens said.

Josh Hardage has successful internship at Duke University

Producing outstanding biology students is not foreign to East Central University.

Courtney Karner, ECU alumnus and assistant professor and research faculty member in the Department of Orthopaedics Research at Duke University, can attest to that.

Josh Hardage of Washington, currently in his senior year as a molecular biology major at ECU, spent 12 weeks of his summer at the prestigious institution in Durham, N.C., working as an intern in Karner's lab.

"It was fantastic...an awesome experience," said Hardage. "The facilities were as good as it gets. It was not only good to be at the university but the area around it (in Durham, North Carolina)."

It was the first go-round for an ECU student in this capacity.

"Without a doubt, this initial run was an outstanding success," said Karner. "Josh functioned at a level commonly associated with senior graduate students or junior postdoctoral associates and far surpassed

the expectations I had for him. This is truly outstanding when one considers my expectations are exceedingly high to begin with."

The internship program was the brainchild of Dr. Gerald Williamson, who had a 38-year run at ECU in various positions, but more recently was advancement officer for the ECU Foundation, Inc.

Williamson visited Karner at his lab during the spring of 2016.

"We were discussing the quality, or lack thereof, of undergraduate students that I had in my lab at the time," Karner said. "Dr. Williamson opined ECU could provide students of better quality and work ethic and inquired if I would be interested in a pilot summer internship program, he could get it funded. His tireless efforts resulted in this becoming a reality."

According to Karner, Hardage was able to work autonomously on his project, which focused on the regulation of the enzyme glutaminase (GLS) during osteoblast differentiation.

"Josh began studying the role of hypoxia. However, he quickly discovered hypoxia

does not regulate GLS activity in osteoblasts. This is one contradiction to recently published data in the field," said Karner. "This forced him to change directions and led him to become interested in the potential role of WNT signaling regulating GLS activity."

Karner indicated that Hardage took the initiative to learn about a new unrelated pathway and apply this knowledge to his project.

"Impressively, he was able to pivot and determined the WNT/mTORC1 pathway was responsible for regulating GLS activity," Karner said. "More importantly, Josh began to characterize a compound that stimulates GLS activity in vivo which has the potential to be a novel lead compound in the osteoanabolic agents to treat osteoporosis."

Karner says Hardage will be an author when these data are published. Moreover, these data form the basis for my upcoming NIH RO1 grant submission, underscoring the quality of his work in the lab.

"Dr. Karner is a great guy and demands a lot, but for everything he demands, he gives more. It was great to work with him," Hardage said. "Everyone in the lab was great to work with. They were all really awesome to work with and they helped a lot as well."

Hardage's co-workers in the lab included Hunter Newman, a technician from Boston College; Everett Knudson, an undergraduate at Duke; Yilin Yu, a technician from China and Leyao Chen, a graduate student who attended Vassar College in New York as an undergrad.

Work ethic and intellect played a lot in Hardage's success in the lab, but Karner also

Section R319 Site Address

R319.1 Address numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall be a minimum of four inches (102mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means should be used to identify the structure. This will allow emergency crews to locate the house number.

DA charges Dollar General manager

An arrest warrant is outstanding for a 34-year-old Blanchard woman who allegedly deposited \$1,468.63 of her employer's money into her own bank account.

Jesalyn Hanna is charged in McClain County District Court with embezzlement.

According to an affidavit, Hanna was a manager at the Dollar General store in Goldsby.

On August 15, Hanna allegedly took the previous day's

receipts and was supposed to deposit them at First United Bank on State Highway 9 west.

However, according to the district manager, Hanna never made that deposit.

Surveillance video from the bank confirmed that Hanna didn't drop off the deposit.

When contacted by McClain County Sheriff's Deputy Brandon Wheeler, Hanna reportedly admitted that she deposited the money into her personal account because she was behind with her bills.

Sex crimes

Abuse began when girls were 7

District Attorney Greg Mashburn last week filed 17 counts

ranging from child sexual abuse to first degree rape against Anthony S. Moser of Lexington.

An ex-convict, Moser, 47, is in the Cleveland County Jail in lieu of a \$1 million bond.

A preliminary hearing conference is scheduled for 1 p.m. Tuesday.

At his initial appearance November 20, a judge ordered Moser to not have any contact with the two reported victims.

The charges against Moser include four counts of first degree rape of victim under age 14, six counts each of child sexual abuse and lewd or indecent acts to child under age 16

and a single count of pattern of criminal offenses.

The rape charges stem from incidents occurring between December 2009 through June 2017.

The rapes began when both girls were 7 years old and continued until they were 13 and 14, respectively, according to court records.

The incidents reportedly occurred in both Cleveland and McClain Counties.

According to an affidavit by Lexington Police Chief Deana Allen, Moser met with Lexington and Purcell investigators at the Purcell Police Department on November 15 to answer questions regarding an open case being worked by both departments.

During the interview, Moser reportedly confessed to continued rapes of the two minors.

He told authorities the rapes

Just when you think you've heard all the excuses.


We had one car - a nice, new-model foreign made job - that didn't need an excuse.

North Korea belongs on the list

In late 1987, a Korean Air flight traveling from Seoul, South Korea to Baghdad, Iraq, was bombed by North Korean agents killing all 115 people on board.

This event, evidence of clear terrorist motives, prompted the Reagan Administration to designate North Korea as a state sponsor of terrorism.

Today, the United States still grapples with the often unpredictable and volatile nature of North Korea and the regime of its dictator, Kim Jong-un.

And earlier this week, President Trump made the decision to re-list North Korea as a state sponsor of terrorism, and promoted a new wave of tougher sanctions on the hermit state.

The list of state sponsors of terrorism began in 1979 and is managed by the U.S. Department of State. The nations that are placed on the list are alleged to have "repeatedly provided support for acts of international terrorism."

Although the list has remained small over the years,

it has been a symbolic mark of heightened pressure on our enemies and a measure of heavy, unilateral sanctions. North Korea joins Iran, Sudan and Syria on the current list.

After 20 years on the list, the Bush Administration made the decision to remove North Korea as a state sponsor of terrorism in 2008, in hopes that it would prompt talks toward peace and denuclearization.

But since then, it has not been evident that North Korea is making, or will be making any effort to reduce nuclear development, end its human rights violations and halt support of terrorism within its own borders and those of other nations.

It is no secret that in recent months North Korea has been staging a number of nuclear missile tests to strike fear and talks of war across the globe. The United States has taken each test and rogue action by the Kim regime very seriously.

Additionally, the untimely deaths of Kim Jong-nam, Kim Jong-un's brother, and Otto Warmbier, the American

student detained in the nation recently, have left no question that the Kim regime is capable of initiating harm against anyone anywhere in the world.

Along with heightened military presence in the Pacific and a slew of sanctions endorsed by Congress, a designation on the state sponsors of terrorism list is a definitive assessment that North Korea is an enemy of the United States, and is a national security priority.

President Trump is right to designate North Korea as a state sponsor of terrorism again, and I am encouraged by the approach Secretary Tillerson has taken to remain diplomatic, but fully engaged to exert pressure on the Kim regime.

Other nations in the region, like Japan and Australia, have also been encouraged by the move to put North Korea on the list again.

Until North Korea eliminates its nuclear arsenal, it will continue to receive tough sanctions from Congress, and will continue to remain on the state sponsors of terrorism list, where it belongs.

AIDS awareness critical

On June 5, 1981, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention published a *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report* describing cases of a rare lung infection in five young, previously healthy, gay men in Los Angeles. All five had other unusual infections as well, which suggested that their immune systems were not working. Two of the five had died by the time the report was published. That edition of the *Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report* marked the first official reporting of what became known as the AIDS epidemic.

The Associated Press, Los Angeles Times and San Francisco Chronicle reported the story the next day, which led

to an awareness of people with similar cases. By the end of the year, there were 270 reported cases and 121 of those patients had died. Prevalence escalated rapidly. By 1995, more than 500,000 cases had been reported in the United States and 311,381 of those people had died.

There is no cure for AIDS, no vaccination for HIV. There is a treatment that has reduced the mortality rate, and public awareness of how the virus is spread has slowed the rate of infection. But in the United States the South, which includes Oklahoma, has the greatest prevalence. Although Southern states account for 37 percent of the nation's population, the region has 44 percent of the HIV/AIDS cases.

In Oklahoma, someone is diagnosed with HIV every 30 hours. There have been 10,423 HIV/AIDS cases in Oklahoma. Of those, 4,469 have died. The other 5,954 Oklahomans are living with HIV/AIDS.

In 2016, there were 295 cases of HIV diagnosed in Oklahoma and 90 deaths attributed to HIV/AIDS.

Awareness remains critical. An estimated one in seven people infected with HIV don't know it, and that group is responsible for 30 percent of the diseases transmissions. This year the U.S. Centers for Disease Control updated its HIV testing recommendation to encourage everyone age 13-64

The hits just keep coming. With the exception of one, this was a fantastic week as far as movies go, featuring some of the best films I've seen all year. So, no reason to delay, let's get straight to the reviews.



First up is "Coco." Despite his family's generations-old ban on music, Miguel (Anthony Gonzalez)

dreams of becoming an accomplished musician just like his idol, Ernesto de la Cruz (Benjamin Bratt).

Desperate to prove his talent, Miguel finds himself in the vibrant and spectacular Land of the Dead. Along the way, he meets a fast talking hustler named Hector (Gael García Bernal), and together they set off on a dazzling journey to discover the true story behind Miguel's family history.

2017 has undoubtedly been a great year for movies.

From comic book movies that have elevated and allowed the genre to explore wildly different concepts like "Logan" and "Thor: Ragnarok," to horror flicks that have emphasized the importance of likeable characters over cheap scares like "Get Out" and "It," plus a sequel to a cult classic that, in my opinion, managed to be better than the original in "Blade Runner 2049."

That just barely scratches the surface and we're just now getting into awards season, the time of year where all the various studios release their best films for Academy consideration.

Yep, 2017 has been great. Great for just about everything, that is except animated movies.

Don't get me wrong, there's been a couple solid ones this year. "The Lego Batman Movie" and "Captain Underpants" were both very entertaining in their own right.

But beyond those, it's been nothing but mediocre flicks like "Cars 3" and "Despicable Me 3" to downright atrocities like "The Emoji Movie," "Rock Dog," and "Leap."

The year isn't over yet though, and thanks to Pixar and the creators behind "Coco," the animation world is looking a little brighter this week.

Starting with the animation itself, the world this movie creates is vivid with striking colors and gorgeous backdrops. The film is a site to behold, especially while visiting the movie's main location, the Land of the Dead.

This is no creepy or ghoulish vision of death. In fact I'd say that's one of my favorite aspects of this film.

Death is an ever present subject here and not only do the filmmakers not shy away from the potentially gloomy subject, they actually embrace it.

Not just that, but they do it in a way that won't scare children, and just might even comfort those who fear it.

The afterlife here is beautiful, filled with cheerful music and friendly people. Sure they're all skeletons, but that doesn't make them any less charming.

And by far the most dynamic of those characters is Miguel's guide to the Land of the Dead, Hector, voiced by Gael García Bernal.

For the large part, most the residents of the afterlife walk, talk, and act like regular people. Not Hector though. This man takes advantage of every opportunity his disjointed anatomy grants him.

The animators really went all out with this character and it's a massive reason Hector is so memorable.

And then there's the music. No surprise that a movie featuring a young musician would be filled to the brim with song, and just like the animators, the composers here knocked it out of the park.

From simple single musician guitar ballads, to grand over-the-top Vegas style stage performances, this movie nails everything and does it all with a Latin flair that all feels incredibly authentic.

Even young Anthony Gonzalez, who gives life to the film's main character Miguel, gives a fantastic and genuine performance, both on the big stage or even just one-on-one with his great-grandmother.

The story itself, while filled to the brim with common film tropes you've probably seen a dozen times in other movies, still managed to surprise me. Leaving me grinning ear to ear while sobbing like a little baby in the way only great Pixar movies can.

I don't know what else to say. This is easily the best animated movie I've seen this year. There's practically no competition.

My only complaint for the theatrical release is that they packaged it with a "short" titled "Olaf's Frozen Adventure." A 21 minute film they force you to wade through before giving a chance to watch the actual movie.

I'm sure the mini movie will please most "Frozen" super fans, and to be fair I did enjoy a couple of the songs, but 21 minutes is way too long for a cartoon preceding the movie.

If you can manage to sit through 21 minutes of Olaf's antics, I highly recommend "Coco" to just about everyone. This one's gonna be hard to beat as far as family films come this holiday season.

Next up is "Lady Bird." Set in the not so distant past of the early 2000s, this movie follows Christine "Lady Bird" McPherson (Saoirse Ronan), a senior at a Catholic high school in Sacramento, California.

What follows is a coming of age tale as Lady Bird struggles to find her place in the world, all while pursuing new romances and butting heads with her equally strong-willed mother (Laurie Metcalf).

I don't even know where to begin with a film like this.

It's like it's not even a movie at all, more just a glimpse of this teenage girl growing up.

Everything about this film feels so authentic. From Lady Bird's parents and their struggles with raising a free spirited, nearly adult daughter, to Lady Bird's relationships and various friendships explored throughout the movie.

Even Lady Bird herself, a young woman desperately trying to become her own person all while fighting against the expectations of her mother and the people surrounding her. Everything about it feels so real.

It doesn't just feel like actors portraying characters here. The people in this film seem far more real than that. Which I suppose is testament to the quality of their performances.

It was like I was a fly on the wall watching this drama play out. So personal that it almost felt like I was invading this poor fictional family's privacy. And despite the movie's seemingly mundane story, this film manages to stay captivating throughout thanks to some practically perfect pacing.

It's really quite amazing just how gripping the day-to-day

life of a teenage girl can be. A huge amount of credit goes to the film's director/writer Greta Gerwig.

This movie is Gerwig's first time flying solo in the director's chair, and wow, if this film is any indication I can't wait to see more of her work.

Don't be surprised when you start hearing Gerwig's name thrown around come awards season. This movie has Oscars written all over it.

If you like good film, go see "Lady Bird." If you've ever been a mother or daughter at some point in your life, heck if you've even been a teenager you'll find something to relate to here.

This movie is one of the year's best. I can't recommend it enough.

her daughter's murder case, Mildred Hayes (Frances McDormand) takes matters into her own hands by renting three billboards with a personal message directed at the town's sheriff William Willoughby (Woody Harrelson).

This battle of wills is only exacerbated when the sheriff's second-in-command Jason Dixon (Sam Rockwell) gets involved.

This movie has a way of taking even the most tragic of circumstances and making them funny.

Sure, the film's story revolves around the tragic murder of a teenage girl, but this comedy manages to mix it's dark tone with humor quite masterfully, leading to some truly hilarious moments throughout. Moments thanks in large part to the movie's leads, Frances McDormand and Woody Harrelson.

Both actors are perfect in these roles and this film is at its best when the two of them are butting heads, waging a war of words against one another.

But the actor that took me the most by surprise was Sam Rockwell's. His character's arc is by far the most substantial and transformative, despite just being a bully with a badge at first glance.

Between these three characters this movie has scene after scene of side-splitting moments. Scenes that might be a tad dark for some, but I found hilarious.

Don't go into this movie expecting a crime drama, or murder mystery. That's not what the filmmakers are going for here.

This is a movie about a mother dealing with an unthinkable tragedy in the only way she thinks she can. And the shocking and often hilarious results of her actions.

I'd say my only complaint with the entire film would be with Lucas Hedges and his performance of Mildred Hayes's son.

I thought he was shockingly bad, especially in the more emotional scenes. Thankfully he's not in the movie that much, but every time he showed up, his acting completely took me out of the film.

Though to be perfectly honest, I didn't care for him much in last year's "Manchester by the Sea" either and he was nominated for a whole slew of awards for that performance, so what do I know.

The Good Folks of Lennox Valley

One thing was certain about the place I grew up: The ministers who served our community were respected and admired by just about everyone.

Most, like Brother Billy Joe Prather and Father O'Reilly, had been in The Valley for some time and were greatly appreciated not only by their congregations, but others as well. While news of church scandal in other places was almost commonplace on network news, the clergy leadership of our town was something of which we could be proud.

Even newer clergypersons were welcomed with open arms. Following his Psalm 50:9 fiasco early in his preaching career, Brother Jacob seemed to find his footing and was soon well loved by most folks throughout the area. For a while, it seemed as if he might become too closely associated with Raymond Cooper, but he soon realized his time was better spent shepherding his flock instead of appearing as guest on "Renderings with Raymond."

After two years, folks still wondered why he preached in his bare feet, but after the novelty wore off, we all came to accept it without much fanfare.

Sarah Hyden-Smith had a rocky welcome, not due to anything she had done. She just happened to arrive when The Valley was overcome with fear of the Federal Reserve System. Getting their cues from none other than Raymond Cooper himself, Valley residents were wary of any outsiders, wondering if they might be in collusion with the federal government.

Eventually, however, Sarah overcame any early misgivings concerning her loyalties and was warmly embraced by most of the community. Sure, there would always be a few who were uncomfortable with The Valley's first female clergyperson, but even most of those had come to accept the Methodist pastor as a valuable member of the community.

For some, the pastor takes on a less obvious role. It's a role they don't speak of often, if ever, during sermons. It's a commitment they often see as one of their most sacred - that of counselor and trusted confidante.

During his brief courtship of Sarah Hyden-Smith, Frank Bell had come to learn a few things concerning the life of a pastor. He learned that

Creamy Turkey and Noodles

16 oz. pkg. farfalle (bow-tie pasta), uncooked
1/4 cup butter
1 onion, chopped
(16 oz. pkg. frozen mixed vegetables (carrots, corn, green beans, peas)
6 Tbsp. flour
2 cups milk
2 cups turkey, chopped
2 cans cream of chicken soup
1 cup sour cream
8 ozs. Kraft Shredded Three Cheese with a Touch of Philadelphia

Heat oven to 350°. Cook pasta as directed on package, omitting salt.

Meanwhile, melt butter in Dutch oven or large deep skillet on medium heat. Add onions; cook and stir 4 minutes or until crisp-tender.

Add frozen vegetables; cook 4 minutes or until thawed, stirring frequently. Stir in flour until blended; cook and stir 1 minute. Gradually stir in milk; bring to boil. Cook and stir 2 minutes or until thickened. Remove from heat. Stir in turkey, soup and sour cream.

Drain pasta. Add to sauce; stir until evenly coated. Spoon into 2 (13x9-inch) pans sprayed with cooking spray; top with cheese. Cover.

Bake 30 minutes or until heated through, uncovering for the last 10 minutes.

American Quarter Horse Association 2017 World Championship Show

AMERICAN QUARTER HORSE ASSOCIATION 2017 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP SHOW

Alice Holmes wins Reserve World Championship in Pleasure Driving after several years out of the show ring.

The 2017 American Quarter Horse Association's World Championship Show was held November 2-18 at State Fair Park in Oklahoma City. The AQHA World Show is the pinnacle event for AQHA owners and exhibitors from around the world, who must qualify for the event by earning a pre-determined number of points, different for each discipline, in order to compete in classes representing halter, English and western events.

Total number of entries this year was 4,840, and were from 45 of the United States, Argentina, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, 5 Canadian provinces, Columbia, Switzerland and the United Kingdom. These exhibitors competed for 99 World Championships in Level 3 (the highest level) and 90 Level 2 World Championships, and more than \$2.3 million in purses and awards.

This is the second year for the Level 2 to be completely separated from the top professional's Level 3. The aim of the AQHA leveling program is to level the playing field, with the overall



Night time versus day time feeding influences time of calving

It is generally accepted that adequate supervision at calving has a significant impact on reducing calf mortality. On most ranching operations, supervision of the calving process will be best accomplished during daylight hours.

The easiest and most practical method of inhibiting nighttime calving at present is by feeding cows at night; the physiological mechanism is unknown, but some hormonal

effect may be involved.

In a recent study, 1,331 cows on 15 farms in Iowa were fed once daily at either early morning or dusk. Of those fed at dusk, 85 percent of the calves were born between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. Cows fed in the morning had only 49 percent born during daylight hours.

Whether cows were started on the night feeding the week before calving or two to three weeks earlier made no apparent difference in calving time.

On many large ranches, it is

physically impossible to feed all of the cows after 5 p.m. In those instances, the ranch manager should plan to feed the mature cows earlier in the day, and then feed the first calf heifers at dusk.

The heifers, of course, are the group of females that are of greatest need of observation during the calving season.

Currently, evening feeding of cattle seems to be the most effective method of scheduling birth so assistance can be available during daylight hours.

Suspects admit to crimes

Robberies in both Moore and Purcell

Quick action by the Purcell Police and other law enforcement agencies led to the arrest of three Fort Worth men after an armed robbery earlier this month at Long John Silvers.

Witnesses told police a black male about 5'8" wearing a dark hoodie got in a silver four door vehicle, possibly a Honda or Toyota, and headed south on Interstate 35.

According to police, the suspect entered the store and placed an order. After receiving it he left the restaurant.

About two minutes later he came back in and placed another order. When the witness rang up the order the suspect displayed a gun in his waist-

band and told her to give him all the money.

She complied and the suspect left the store. At the same time a second suspect was in the connected convenience store making another purchase.

After putting out the bulletin, just 11 minutes after the 11:04 robbery was turned in Purcell was advised a unit with the District 21 Street Crimes Task Force had stopped the vehicle at mile marker 76 on the interstate and had three suspects under arrest.

Police here also received information the same suspects were believed to have committed a robbery and larceny in Moore.

Arrested were Jaharie Irving, 19, Tyrone Freeman, Jr., 20 and Camron Roberson, 20.

A search warrant serviced on the vehicle by Purcell investigators revealed an air gun pistol which would give the appearance of a real firearm.

Also in the vehicle was a large quantity of marijuana and cash believed to have been taken in the two robberies.

Police said there was evidence recovered that connected the suspects to the larceny.

During the booking process at the Purcell Police Department, suspect Irving spit out about 25 grams of marijuana he had been holding in his mouth. Another 26 grams was found in his shoes.

During interviews conducted by Moore detectives at the Purcell Police Department the three suspects admitted their roles in the crime spree.

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New roadside scanner contract brings uninsured drivers closer to automatic tickets

Oklahoma has finalized a deal with a Massachusetts company to use license-plate scanners to catch uninsured drivers, and the firm expects to issue 20,000 citations a month starting as early as next year.

The program, believed to be the first of its kind in the nation, involves setting up automated scanners on highways around the state to detect uninsured vehicles and mailing their owners a citation with a fine of \$184, according to the District Attorneys Council.

Gatso USA, a Beverly, Mass.-based company that specializes in red-light-running and speeding detection systems, will initially get \$80, or 43 percent, of each fine. Its cut will decrease to \$74 after two years and \$68 after five years, according to a contract approved by the state after months of legal review and negotiation.

The company could expect to bring in \$1.6 million a month, or \$19 million a year, if the 20,000 citations are issued monthly. Gatso is a subsidiary of a Dutch company.

Drivers who pay the fees will avoid having a charge of driving without insurance on their permanent record.

When the first citations will be issued remains unclear. Gatso executives were unavailable for an interview.

The purpose of the Uninsured Vehicle Enforcement Diversion Program, approved by the state Legislature in 2016, is to reduce the high number of uninsured motorists in Oklahoma. A 2015 Pew Charitable Trusts survey found that 26 percent of all drivers in the state are uninsured — the highest rate in the nation — which can push up insurance premiums and hit-and-run accidents.

But another incentive underlies the program. It will be overseen by the District Attorneys Council rather than law enforcement, and the state's 27 district attorneys' offices are expected to receive millions of dollars in citation revenue a year, although no estimates were provided.

District attorneys have complained that their revenue sources are diminishing because of state budget cuts and the drop in bounced-check fines.

Before citations are issued, technical details need to be ironed out, and testing will be done. Ultimately, both mobile and fixed cameras will be placed around the state. There are no startup costs to state government, and Gatso will handle a public-awareness campaign that will precede implementation of the program.

Details gleaned from public records, including the contract and Gatso's proposal, shed further light on what Oklahomans can expect.

Program Rollout

The cameras will be deployed on a small scale initially. Vehicles with scanners will be sent into the Oklahoma City and Tulsa areas to get traffic counts, gauge noncompliance and gather data on the first locations for cameras.

Within six months, Oklahoma County, Tulsa County and 13 other counties in those areas will be mapped and studied, with the cameras in place, the company estimates. The mobile enforcement units will then drive to other parts of the state, looking for high-volume areas of noncompliance that

could be potential spots for camera installation.

Within the first year of the program, about 26 cameras will be in place throughout the two metro areas. Another 10 cameras will be installed throughout the rest of the state.

Additionally, there will be two or three mobile enforcement units mounted on vehicles, bringing the total to nearly 40 cameras statewide.

"The first program of its kind in the country is certain to attract scrutiny," Gatso says in its plan. "Our program manage-



ment is designed to limit the number of issued citations in the opening months, in concert with an inclusive and extensive public awareness campaign."

Even so, the number of violations is expected to be highest during the program's initial months. The company recommends that the council limit citations to 5,000 a day during the first three months of the program. After the program is fully in place, the company estimates that each camera will capture 15 to 20 violations a day, or about 20,000 a month.

How It Works

The cameras will scan license plates of vehicles, comparing them against a database of insured vehicles. Owners of uninsured vehicles will get citations in the mail, regardless of who the driver was at the time the scanner caught them.

Citations will come from the company, not district attorneys. If vehicle owners don't pay the citations, the information gets forwarded to district attorneys for potential prosecution.

Those paying and getting insurance also avoid other penalties that would come from a traditional citation, like a license suspension, said Trent Baggett, executive coordinator of the District Attorneys Council.

"All we want is for people to get their insurance," he said.

Vehicle owners who receive inaccurate citations can avoid payment by showing that they were insured at the time they were scanned.

Baggett said the five-member council will determine how the funding from citations from the scanners will be dispersed among district attorneys.

While the number of cameras will be relatively low, they will be moved around the state. Officials are focusing more on high-traffic areas where more vehicle plates can be scanned.

"It's not envisioned to be a

circumstance where there's going to be a camera every five miles down the road on every single road in Oklahoma," Baggett said. "We anticipate having them moved around the state and they would be in some fairly high-traffic areas. It doesn't do a whole lot of good to have one of these set up in a place where there's not a lot of traffic."

Kevin Buchanan, president of the council and the district attorney for Washington and Nowata counties in northeastern Oklahoma, said the program will benefit the state as a whole as scanners rotate to different areas.

"Each of our districts is going to be able to have coverage through this program as it goes on," he said.

The enforcement program sends \$20 from each citation directly to the District Attorneys Council for administrative purposes. Of the \$20, \$5 goes toward processing costs for payments, \$10 toward operating and maintaining the program's insurance verification database, and \$5 to a state pension fund.

The \$84 left over after the vendor's cut will also go to the council, but how that will be allocated hasn't been decided.

District attorneys will be watching to see if revenue from the program covers the funding losses they've faced. Baggett said as of now, the potential revenue from the citations is unknown.

"It could be significant, but it also depends on a number of things," Baggett said. "Just because you identify owners of vehicles that have no insurance doesn't mean that they respond to you."

Early on, Baggett said, there were "big concerns it was going to be big brother looking over your shoulder and watching everybody going down the road."

But the data is intended to be kept secure and will be deleted once the scanners determine a vehicle has insurance, he said. Gatso says in its proposal that none of its data has ever been altered or hacked.

Gatso's business focuses on speed and red-light enforcement, but its roadside camera technology is likely to apply easily to catching uninsured drivers. The key is connecting the system to a continually updated database with insured vehicle owners.

Oklahoma is one of about two dozen states that do not allow cameras for detecting speeders or red-light runners, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety. Oklahoma does operate scanners on tollways to catch drivers who use the highways without paying.



Bakers garner national FFA honors



According to Adobe Digital Insights, a company that publishes research on digital marketing to marketers and business leaders, reported online sales during the 2016 holiday season hit a record \$91.7 billion in sales, up from \$82.5 billion in 2015. Researchers anticipate even more online sales in 2017.

The FBI's 2016 Internet Crime Report stated recently, loss from cybercrime exceeded \$1.3 billion in the United States last year.

Attorney General Hunter said rapid advancement in technology brings sophisticated scams that could target unsuspecting Oklahomans who are trying to get their

shopping done online.

"Data breaches in 2016 increased by 40 percent from the previous year, hitting an all-time record high," Attorney General Hunter said.

"Cybercriminals view the holiday season as an opportune time to take advantage of individuals looking to find good deals and save money.

"Though it is convenient and easy to make holiday purchases online, I am urging

COPD:

Know COPD and the symptoms. COPD, which includes chronic bronchitis and emphysema, is a chronic lung disease that makes it hard to breathe.

The main cause of COPD is smoking, and common symptoms include breathlessness even after mild exertion, chronic coughing, frequent clearing of the throat, chest tightness, wheezing and an increase in the production of sputum — a mixture of saliva and mucus.

Get tested for COPD. If you are at risk for COPD or have symptoms, you should be tested through spirometry, a simple test of how well your lungs work.

For this test, the patient blows air into a mouthpiece with tubing attached to a small machine that measures the amount of air you blow out and how fast you can blow it.

Spirometry can detect COPD before symptoms develop. Your primary care physician (PCP) may also use the test results to find out how severe your COPD is and to help you set treatment goals.

In addition, your PCP may want you to have a chest X-ray and/or other tests, such as an arterial blood gas test, which measures the oxygen level in your blood. This test can show how well your lungs can move oxygen into your bloodstream and remove carbon dioxide from your blood.

Recognize the benefits of quitting. Quitting smoking improves heart rate, blood pressure, circulation, decreases the

risk of coronary heart disease, decreases the risk of stroke and decreases the risk of lung cancer.

The timeline for seeing real benefits to smoking cessation is much faster than most people realize. Health benefits begin in as little as an hour after the last cigarette and continue to improve. When a person quits smoking, the body will start to naturally heal and regain the vitality of a non-smoker over time. The sooner a smoker quits, the faster they will reduce their risk of cancer, heart and lung disease, and other conditions related to smoking. Some effects, such as lowered blood pressure, are seen almost immediately.

Get help to quit smoking. There are proven treatments to help smokers who want to quit, including advice from your PCP, counseling, behavioral therapies, nicotine replacement products and non-nicotine medications.

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Our Veteran of the Week is Wilford Ray Boling who served in WWII. We are honored to recognize him for his military service and to present him with a cap representing that war. Mr. Boling makes his home in Norman. When we stand one of these veterans up in front of more than 150 of his military brothers and sisters, it is the first time many of them have ever been recognized.

Every day someone will ask us why so many veterans and surviving spouses visit us. The answer is summed up in two words - our volunteers. With their dedication to our mission, this organization averages 50 volunteers on duty each week.

Some of the men and women who visit us are suffering from injuries or illnesses that occurred while in the military. Others may be suffering from PTSD, depression or other mental health conditions. Our volunteers encourage them to seek health care for both physical and mental conditions.

We have medical professionals who may be able to

diagnose a veteran's disability using a VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire. Some folks who assist veterans with their claims will just file for service-connection of a disability without sending in any evidence. I have found that when evidence is not included, the veteran will receive a denial of many disabilities claimed on their application for benefits.

Each week I receive the VA rating decisions on all the veterans and surviving spouses whom we represent. This allows us to know what types of claims are being approved or denied. The most common claims approved by VA are for hearing loss and Tinnitus.

Veterans who are approved for the Tinnitus will usually receive a 10 percent rating and about \$133 per month. Hearing loss can be rated up to 100 percent depending on the severity. A veteran who is rated 100 percent for hearing loss will receive a little more than \$3,000 each month.

Veterans who have profound hearing loss have a very difficult time communicating with anyone. There is a free phone system that allows those of us with hearing loss to read what people are saying on the phone. We have a person who comes in each Tuesday and Thursday to sign up anyone who would like to have this equipment for free. Please stop by and learn more about this great opportunity.

Last week we worked 145 veterans and surviving spouses on Tuesday and then closed for the Thanksgiving holiday.

This season of giving is a good time to invite you to become a volunteer. We are always looking for men and women to join us.

As a 501 (C)(3) your donations are tax deductible. Without the help of the men and women we assist, it would not be possible to help the thousands of veterans and surviving spouses who are in need.

We have been accepting the donation of cars and trucks that can be given to veterans or sold to raise funds to provide services to veterans and their families. Many times, the veterans we have helped to receive VA benefits will purchase a new or used one.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation has food boxes available to those in need. An application for this type of assistance will be available on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. A DD-214 or military discharge will be necessary to apply. Please contact Rhonda (405) 550-8806 Extension 103 to request a food box.

But even if we run up on some hard times, we don't have to look far to offer thanks. Mainly, just look back a ways, and you'll find a reason or two to hit your knees.

I don't know exactly why, but I when I close my eyes after that big Thanksgiving feast, my dreams always drift away to a simpler time.

My mind goes to a modest wood-frame house at 901 Juniper in LaGrange, Ga. We learned a hundred times more in the years in that old house than we'll learn the rest of our time. We lived there from my first memory until a cool autumn day in 1973 when my red Chevy Nova and I pulled out on the Roanoke Road to head west to Texas.

I didn't realize it at the time, but everything - not just the house - was modest back then. We never drove a car that wasn't built three or four presidents ago. You might have even

called us poor, but we weren't. We had a surplus of gold and silver all around us, so much so that good folks who lived in some of LaGrange, Georgia's fancy three-story mansions with a hundred pines in the front yard might consider themselves paupers in comparison.

Nobody ever had a Sunday afternoon feast like we had every Sunday at Grandma's: fried chicken and macaroni and cheese - I mean, the real kind - fresh beans and corn and tomatoes, probably picked the day before from my best friend Coca-Cola Mike's parent's garden or some other church member. There was always hot cornbread and buttermilk, mashed potatoes made-from-scratch, hot apple pie or a red velvet cake for dessert - and it was all the real thing!

Looking back after all of these years, I now realize Grandma offered something more than even a great feast and fellowship on those Sunday afternoons.

She taught us that every day really is Thanksgiving.

Last Sunday, the Church ended the Church year by celebrating the Feast of Christ the King. Psalm 95 bids us to: "Come let us worship and bow down. Let us kneel before the Lord our God." When we are in the presence of the Lord, we bow before him. We kneel in his presence. We cross ourselves with the sign of the cross by which we have been redeemed. By these gestures of respect, we are showing respect for our King. And to our King we owe honor and reverence.

Recently there have been mass killings in this country. Innocent people have been killed at an outdoor concert, walking on a greenway, or even praying in church.

Not much is known about the evil men who have committed these crimes. But usually one of two things is true - Either the killer belonged to a terror group, like ISIS. Or they didn't belong to any group at all. People who knew them would say "He was a loner. He didn't belong. He didn't fit in. He didn't have a family which accepted him."

We choose who we follow.

If Christ truly is our King, then our loyalty to Him will transcend all other loyalties.

Keep your pets safe during winter weather

For those pet owners whose pets spend a good deal of time romping in the back yard or passing the time in a patch of sunshine on the deck, the arrival of winter may be a rude awakening for those furry friends.

Although Oklahoma has not experienced a deep freeze just yet, it is time to make sure your pets are well-cared for when the temperatures begin to fall, said Dr. Elisabeth Giedt, director of Continuing Education, Extension and Community Engagement at the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences at Oklahoma State University.

"As pretty and soft as your pet's fur is, it isn't necessarily the perfect insulator, especially when the temperatures are extreme or when the fur gets wet," Giedt said. "Compare it to being outside wearing a t-shirt when it's below freezing. Your pet's toes, nose and ears are especially susceptible to winter weather, too."

If you suspect your pet has frostbite, cover the animals with warm towels. Gently pat dry the affected area and contact your veterinarian.

While winter weather can be hard on any pet, very young

animals, as well as older dogs and cats, should not be kept outdoors. Giedt said these young pets simply do not have the fat, metabolism or the full fur coat they need to stay warm.

The best option for pet safety during the winter is to keep them indoors. If your pet is a full-time outdoors animal, it is imperative to provide adequate shelter from the elements. A covered enclosure with blankets or clean hay/straw/cedar shavings is a must. Another option is a heated floor mat. Check with your local pet store to see what is available.

"Try to face the opening of the shelter away from the wind. Also, if it rains and the bedding gets wet, replace it with dry bedding," she said. "Wet bedding can grow bacteria and mold, which are not healthy for your pet."

It is no secret exercise is good for both humans and their pets. For those who enjoy a nice walk with your pet, sidewalks and walking trails are likely to have been salted if there is ice or snow on the ground. While this is beneficial for humans to help keep them from slipping and sliding, salt can cause irritation on an animal's foot pads.

Not only is the weather itself a concern for your pet, but the chances of exposing your pet to life-threatening chemicals also increases. Leaky radiators can leave pools of antifreeze in your driveway and is both a winter and summer issue. Although the sweet taste of antifreeze is appealing to your pet, it can be deadly, even in very small doses.

"Antifreeze is highly toxic and absorbs quickly into your pet's system. The kidneys are the most affected organs and can shut down completely within 12 to 24 hours in cats and 36 to 72 hours in dogs," Giedt said.

Another outdoor danger is animals who seek protection from the winter weather in dangerous places. Before starting and moving your vehicle, check under the hood and in the wheel wells to ensure there are no animals hiding.

Because it takes a few more calories to keep warm in the winter, your pet may need a little extra food. For pets who stay outside, make sure the water in their water bowls is not frozen.

"Winter weather will mean your pets require a little extra care to ensure their safety," she said.



Chickasaw Nation honors Vietnam War veterans

Several Chickasaw Vietnam War veterans have vivid memories of the disdain some members of a divided nation exhibited toward them almost 50 years ago.

They are seeing a different attitude now.

The group of 18 Chickasaw Warriors witnessed the 35th anniversary commemoration of the Vietnam Veterans War Memorial in Washington, D.C. during a tour of the nation's capital sponsored by the Chickasaw Nation to honor their service, dedication and bravery.

During the memorial, Chickasaw veterans received thanks for their service and sacrifice by top military officials, Department of Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke and passersby who swarmed the area located immediately northeast of the Lincoln Memorial on the National Mall.

Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby said Veterans Day should serve as a reminder to recognize the commitment of those who serve in the armed forces.

"It is important to acknowledge the great debt we owe to the men and women who place their own safety and security on the line to defend our freedom," said Gov. Anoatubby. "While Veterans Day offers a unique opportunity to personally thank these individuals for their service, it is always fitting to express our appreciation for the work they do to protect our way of life."

For retired U.S. Army Lt. Col. Durward "Dee" Rushforth, a Fairfax, Va., resident and Purple Heart recipient, it was an opportunity for introspection.

"I volunteered (for) two tours in Vietnam," he said. "I did one (tour) for myself and the other for somebody who chose not to serve."

Lt. Col. Rushforth and his wife, Barbara, moved 17 times in the first 15 years of his military career. Today, those memories evoke a smile. When it was occurring, smiles were few, he admits.

After 22 years of service, Lt. Col. Rushforth retired from active military duty. He continued working in the Pentagon for a private contractor and may have died Sept. 11, 2001, when terrorists flew a passenger airliner into the building, but for the fact he was assigned new office space in June 2001.

Two Chickasaw Warriors served as a Navy Hospital Corpsman and an Army Medic

— different titles for the same job. They treated wounded soldiers in the field. It is one of the most dangerous duties a soldier can be assigned.

"The enemy had three primary targets," said Donald Bourland, a resident of Monroe, Wash. "They (targeted) commissioned officers, radio communication specialists and medical personnel," he said in subdued tones.

Mr. Bourland served in the U.S. Navy and was called a "corpsman."

Ronald Allison was in the U.S. Army and was a "medic." The soldiers called them "Doc." Mr. Allison served from 1966-69. Mr. Bourland served in combat from November 1966-67, but did not leave the military until 1970.

Bonnie Moore is shy concerning her Vietnam War-era service, but received a rousing round of applause from her fellow Chickasaw Warriors when the group visited Arlington National Cemetery.

It was there they learned Mrs. Moore is included in The Women in Military Service for America Memorial. It is the nation's only major memorial honoring all servicewomen, past and present.

Mrs. Moore, of Edwardsville, Ill., is joined in the memorial by late Chickasaw Warrior Beaulah Shavney, a Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC) veteran of World War II. Mrs. Shavney passed away in February 2014. Mrs. Moore was stationed at Ft. Jackson, S.C.; Ft. Sheridan, Ill., and Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., entering the service in 1966 and completing her duty in 1971.

Three Chickasaw warriors served aboard aircraft carriers and another served on a Nitro-class ammunition ship. Robert "Bob" Nichols, a resident of Garland, Texas, was stationed on the USS Kitty Hawk; Gary Cooper, a resident of Robinson, Texas, was aboard the USS Lexington and Barry Allen, of Owasso, Okla., served on the USS Haleakala.

William Hilton, a Lake City, Florida, resident, served four tours in Vietnam. He joined at age 17 and his mother signed the papers for him to enlist. Mr. Hilton was aboard the USS Hancock and served 20 years in the military, retiring in 1985.

Another U.S. Navy veteran, James Priest, was in the Navy Seabees and served as a draftsman in Yokosuka, Japan. Don Goldsby, a Goldsby, Okla., resident, served in the Navy as well for one year. His ances-

tors founded the community of Goldsby. He was stationed in Jacksonville, Fla., serving in the Atlantic Fleet from 1967-68.

Larry Paul, a Georgetown, S.C., resident, was the only Marine represented in the 2017 class of Chickasaw veteran honorees. He was a sergeant and served from 1966-72. He saw action in Vietnam from 1966-68.

U.S. Marines are part of the U.S. Navy. Sgt. Paul's immense sense of humor, coupled with his pride in having served, persuaded him to join all U.S. Navy veterans at the Navy Memorial for a group photo. His fellow brothers-in-arms teased him goodheartedly about being included in the "Navy" photo.

Larry Hogland, a Corinth, Miss., resident, served from 1966-70 and was awarded the Air Force Commendation Medal. Mr. Hogland did a tour of duty with specificity. He was involved from 11-2-1967 to 11-2-1968. Now retired, he spends as much time on the golf course as he can.

Several Oklahoma veterans saw action in locations far from Vietnam. Bill Green, a Goldsby, Okla., resident, was an aviation mechanic in Guam, Okinawa and Thailand in addition to a couple of stops in European bases. He was stationed at Mather Air Force Base in California serving from 1965-68.

Johnny Young, a Marietta resident, saw action in Vietnam with the U.S. Army. He joined in 1964 and was honorably discharged in 1971. He was stationed out of Ft. Ord, Calif., during basic training.

George Davis, who resides in Blanchard, served his country at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, as a sergeant in the U.S. Army. He trained soldiers for combat from 1966-68.

Richard Nichols, an Achille, Okla., resident, served both in the U.S. Navy and the U.S. Army Reserve. During Vietnam, his military activity began in 1966 and ended in 1970. He joined the Army Reserve in 1977 and continued service the country until 1996.

Vancouver, Washington, Chickasaw Warrior Robert Andrews served 38 years in the U.S. Army, from 1966 to 2004. He was stationed in bases throughout America and Germany during this time. Capt. Andrews was severely injured in Vietnam when the helicopter he was flying ran out of fuel and crashed. He spent six days alone in the midst of the enemy before being rescued.

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
