





Tougher reading test means more students could be held back

Oklahoma is raising the bar on its pivotal, high-stakes reading test administered to third graders, which is likely to leave more students at risk of repeating the third grade.

Twelve percent of third graders, those who scored "unsatisfactory"-the lowest level-did not meet criteria for automatic promotion in 2016.

Beginning in 2017-18, students will have to score "proficient" in reading to receive automatic promotion to fourth grade — a level above what is required now. Twenty-eight percent of third grade students. or about 14,900, did not score proficient on the English/language arts exam, a portion of which determines their reading

A disproportionate number of low-income, black and Hispanic students have scored poorly on the test each year since 2014 and were subject to retention.

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

Fifth District Rep. Steve Russell on Saturday told members of the Oklahoma Press Association that privatizing air traffic control was a dumb idea. We couldn't agree more.

As Russell said, there are plenty of ways to reduce the role of government by eliminating the things government does poorly. Air traffic control isn't one of those, and when the government is good at something – national defense, food safety, and space exploration come to mind – the best idea is to let the government do it.

The president has cited Canada's privatization through Nav Canada, which has been successful by any measure. But as Russell pointed out, Canada's vast land mass is populated by fewer souls than California claims and only slightly more than Texas. The United States is home to eight of the world's 10 busiest airports. Canada has just one in the top 30; Toronto Pearson International Airport comes in at No. 16.

"After billions and billions of tax dollars spent and the many years of delays we're still stuck with an ancient, broken, antiquated, horrible system that doesn't work," Trump said.

Jessie overheard the conversations of just about everyone in town as she refilled coffees and served blue plate specials. Between Jessie's insights and A.J. Fryerson's complaints, Maxine always seemed to have enough material for her weekly column.

Those who didn't know Jessie very well might have been surprised by her thoughtful insights. More than once, Maxine picked up on something Jessie said and wrote it as her own.

Maxine's column was already showing signs of decline. Her juiciest tidbit involved Frank Bell. "It seems our new barber found a place on the second row at the Methodist Church this week," she began. I hope the only memories of me, are the joy you readily gave me, the fun of shared laughter and finally, the love of family. Bye y'all!

Merle Marie Glover

Merle Marie Glover of Lexington, Oklahoma was called home to the Lord on June 4, 2017. Merle was born on the Osage Lands at Pawhuska, Oklahoma on July 25, 1935 to William and Nellie (Brumble) Brasier. She spent several years with her family near the Concho Sand and Gravel Facility where her father was the superintendent. The facility supplied materials for WPA road building and crop fertilization during the Great Depression. When demand was finished there, they moved to a new plant near Homestead, Okla. The only available housing was a group of boxcars that had been remodeled into living quarters for the workers. The growing Brasier family had the use of two box cars but the only water had to be hauled from near Okeene and installed in a large cistern.

The family was later able to purchase a farm near Cane Hill, Arkansas and Merle rode the school bus to attend her first few years at the Cane Hill school. After living in the western Oklahoma sand, she was so happy to walk in a shady lane to attend Sunday School at the old Fly Creek school building, stopping to play in the creek after church.

World War II caused the need for able-bodied men to work in the mines at Pitcher, Okla., while young men went off to war, so the family moved back to Oklahoma on Quapaw Lands near Lincolnville. The kids enjoyed many excursions with picnics and exploration along the nearby Spring River. Merle's father and brothers had joined the call to the mines until her older brother was drafted. Her brother had bought a garage and had three children by that time. Merle's father left the mines to take over the garage when his son was drafted.

Merle's mother had thought the farm would be an ideal place to live as some of the girls were in high school by then. When the children, left behind by Merle's brother, needed more food than was available during rationing, the decision was made to move them and their mother to the farm also. The garage was sold and William and Nellie rented a farm in the same general area of the property the family still owned in Akansas. In a beautiful valley called "Greasy Valley" the family raised broiler chickens, tomatoes for the canning factory, and all the farm produce they needed. Plenty of water was available with a spring house nearby and hard-working little Merle carried small buckets of water to the house.

Merle was always in on the fun of teasing with the family and seemed to find joy in almost everything. She was an obedient little worker helping with chickens, farm chores, and carrying wood into the house. One of her favorite chores was feeding the new chickens that the hens hatched. However, her favorite chicken, Roanie, was pecked on because it had many red feathers. Merle decided to make a little sun suit for it with her newly acquired Home-EC skills. The family teased her unmercifully. She loved to walk the four miles to New Hope Church where she and her sisters sang together.

Her father had to seek a job in Oklahoma City when the income was not sufficient from their farm endeavors. Her mother had developed a blood disorder, so needing closer medical care, they left the farm and moved the family back to Oklahoma. Merle finished Webster Junior High and during her teenage years found many things to do in the big city with her sisters. Taking a city bus to Spring Lake and Lincoln Park were great outings to go with friends. 



in direct support for these services for our veterans and surviving spouses. One of the main reasons claims get approved for the veterans we assist is because we don't file a claim without a diagnosis of a condition by a medical provider.

I receive the VA rating decisions on all veterans and surviving spouses who are represented by us. This information gives an opportunity for each decision to be reviewed by us and to send a letter to the veteran or surviving spouse identifying their next options. Before becoming a VAAccredited Claims Agent, the only way I knew what decisions were made was if the veteran returned with their VA award letter. It was almost impossible to know whether we were doing the right thing on veterans' applications for benefits.

Most of the people assisting veterans elsewhere will never know if they helped veteran or not. The VA has improved its decision-making process to the point that some of the claims I send in get decided in less than 30 days. Eight veterans received a VA disability rating of 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These veterans will receive an annual combined compensation amount of \$293,386.08 per year. Eighteen veterans received a VA disability rating from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive a combined annual compensation amount of \$237,972.12. 





One of the great men of old who is well known for a blazing fire deep down inside is the great prophet Jeremiah. He is often called the "prophet of fire," and for a reason! 

Sam Noble's 'Ugly Bugs' exhibit extended through Labor Day

Originally set for departure on June 18, the photographyfocused exhibit, "Ugly Bugs! Celebrating 20 Years of the Oklahoma Microscopy Society's Ugly Bug Contest" now will stick around through September.

Open to all Oklahoma elementary schools, the annual "Ugly Bug" competition is designed to get students interested in microscopy and entomology at a young age. The rules are simple: Each school can submit one bug — the "uglier," the

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


