Defendant gets life without parole

A 27-year-old Moore man will spend the rest of his life in prison after a McClain County District Court jury found him guilty last week of first degree murder.

Jurors returned the guilty verdict against David L. Seely, an ex-felon, on Thursday at the conclusion of his trial before District Judge Leah Edwards.

In the county's first homicide of 2016, Seely stabbed

another Moore man to death on January 7, leaving his body seven miles south of Dibble in the intersection of State Highway 76 and 150th Street. The victim was Jackie T. Wesnidge, 28.

Seely's life sentence is without the possibility of parole.

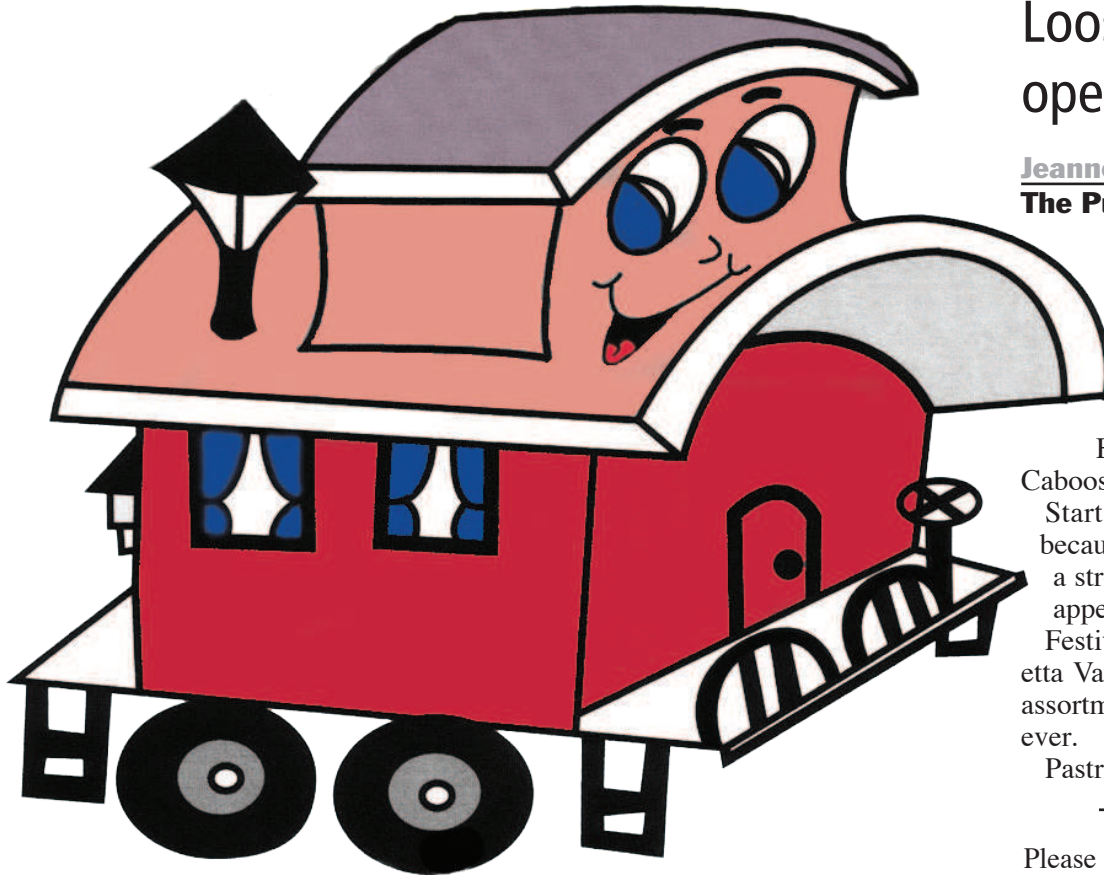
“I thanked the jury when they walked out,” Frank Wesnidge said Monday. Jackie Wesnidge was his son. “We are thankful to the district attorney, sheriff's office, EMS responders and, of course, the jury.”

“As a family, we are very grateful for the verdict.”

Misty Benefield, whom investigators identified as Wesnidge's girlfriend, was with the two men when the stabbing occurred.

DA's office: No crime committed

Parents in Texas on a warrant accusing them of kidnapping their 18-month-old daughter will not face any criminal charges, a spokeswoman for the Cleveland County District Attorney's Office said Tuesday.

It was determined that no crime was committed, the spokeswoman explained.

Bryant Schivers Jr., and Tara Springfield and their four children were sought after authorities issued an Amber Alert for 18-month-old Bracie Schivers at the request of the Department of Human Services.

The family left the state August 4 after a Cleveland County judge severed the couple's parental rights for the toddler.

DHS wanted custody of the child because of the parents' reported drug use.

According to information at the time from the Cleveland County Sheriff's Department,

Purcell PD on alert

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over

The Purcell Police Department is once again participating with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and the Oklahoma Highway Safety Office to keep drunk drivers off the roads during the end of summer and the Labor Day weekend.

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over began August 16 and runs through Monday.

The long Labor Day weekend is historically one of the deadliest on America's roads with impaired drivers endangering themselves and others.

During the high visibility campaign, law enforcement will show zero tolerance for impaired driving.

"We're stressing the dangers of driving impaired to our community," said Sgt. Heather Kaluzny. "Impaired driving is a massive problem in Oklahoma. If you are out on the roads and you see someone driving drunk, please call us. You could help

save a life."

Kaluzny added over the 2016 Labor Day holiday period in Oklahoma, there were nine fatality wrecks in which 10 people were killed.

"Nationwide, 40 percent of the fatal Labor Day crashes involved drivers who had been drinking," she continued. "Of those alcohol-related fatal crashes, one third involved drivers who were legally drunk with a blood alcohol of .08 or higher."

According to NHTSA, 10,265 people were killed in impaired driving crashes in 2015. That is a 3 percent increase over the 2014 toll of 9,967.

In fact, there is one impaired driving traffic death every 51 minutes in the United States.

"That's the equivalent of 20 jumbo jets crashing each year with no survivors," Kaluzny said. "Drunk and drugged driving is not only illegal. It is a matter of life and death."

Stating impaired driving is "not acceptable behavior," Kaluzny advised if you are going to party over the Labor Day holiday, remember to plan for a sober ride home.

The Purcell Police Department reminds these safe alternatives to drinking and driving:

- Even if you consume just one alcoholic beverage, designate a sober driver or plan to use public transportation to get home safely.
- Download NHTSA's SaferRide mobile app on Google Play or Apple's iTunes. SaferRide allows users to call a taxi or pre-determined friend and identifies the user's location where he or she can be picked up.
- If you see an impaired driver on the road, contact local law enforcement.
- Have a friend who is about to drink and drive? Take the keys and make arrangements to get your friend home safely.

Sam Noble Museum transforms Centennial Prairie into Monarch Butterfly Waystation

As fall nears, now's the time to see monarch butterflies flitting about the Oklahoma skies. But this year, researchers at the Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History hope the Danaus plexippus find the museum grounds a little more accommodating when they make their annual Oklahoma pit stop as they migrate from Canada to Mexico.

Conservationists turned their attention to the museum's Centennial Prairie as they planted native milkweed in a small section of the land located behind the museum.

They intend to increase the monarch butterfly population by turning the field into an official Monarch Waystation — a native plant-rich plot of land (certified by MonarchWatch.org) that's perfect for a lepidoptera layover.

Founded by the University of Kansas, the nationwide monarch butterfly waystation program aims to provide shelter and increase nectar sources for butterflies as well as the native milkweed plants on which the larvae hatch and that caterpil-

lars use for sustenance.

Museum researchers hope that continual efforts to build up the waystation, or increase the number of milkweed plants and flowering nectar sources year by year, will help bolster the monarch population, which has taken a nosedive in the past decade. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service currently is evaluating the species for protection under the Endangered Species Act.

"The population is only a 10th of what it used to be and the numbers continue to drop for several reasons," said Katrina Menard, Ph.D., the museum's curator of recent invertebrates. "The biggest reason is habitat loss, both in Mexico, where they winter, and here in the U.S. There just isn't enough milkweed here and trees for them to roost in Mexico."

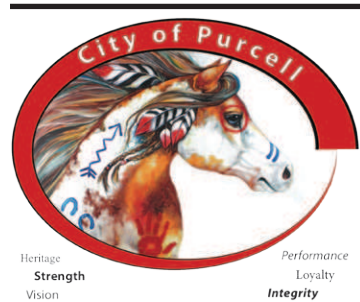
A butterfly garden, located at the front of the museum, beckons adult butterflies and provides food in the form of flowering nectar plants. Caterpillars, on the other hand, need a host plant such as milkweed for sustenance.

To realize the waystation at the Sam Noble Museum, dozens of volunteers and museum staff spanning multiple disciplines united to ready the Centennial Prairie for this fall's monarch migration. In spring 2017, the group of conservationists spent hours raking the prairie and planting native milkweed.

In addition to Menard, others leading the charge are Nicholas Czaplewski, Ph.D., curator of vertebrate paleontology; Priscilla Crawford, Ph.D., conservation specialist for the Natural Areas Registry; and Amy Buthod, botanical specialist for the Oklahoma Biological Survey.

The 18-acre prairie also is registered with the National Areas Registry as it's home to a rare flower, the Oklahoma penstemon.

"Small patches of native prairie like this one in suburban areas can make a big difference, not just to sustain larval monarchs, but native wildflowers like the penstemon and other native pollinators as remnants of prairie ecosystems," Czaplewski said. "They help fill gaps along the migration routes, especially southbound

fruit was Wally Watermelon over the favorite going in to the election, Adam Apple.

Wally Watermelon carried the election by nearly a 2-to-1 lead, garnering 179 votes or 65.3 percent of the 274 counted ballots.

Adam Apple struggled in the polls with just 95 votes.

"Wally Watermelon rolled over Adam Apple and juiced him by 84 votes," McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said when she announced the results Monday.

Haley reported the election board received 286 ballots, but a dozen weren't properly marked

and so weren't counted.

Seven voters apparently found the decision too difficult to reach and marked a preference for both candidates. Five youngsters found their way

around a similar dilemma by turning in blank ballots.

Adam Apple held out over the weekend before conceding. In a brief statement, he faulted the election's August date for his loss.

"Everyone knows that apples are at their peak in the fall, the later the better," Adam Apple said. "I don't know how it was done, but those watermelons saw to it the election would be hard on the heels of that big melon to-do over at Rush Springs."

Basking in his surprise victory, Wally Watermelon pooh-poohed the accusation.

"Like I said before the election, no one ever made a contest of spitting apple seeds," he said. "I think Adam Apple's complaints are just a big bowl of sour grapes."

Father charged

Toddler alone in locked car at casino

A father who allegedly left his 2-year-old child alone in a locked car outside the Newcastle Gaming Center on Aug. 20 has been charged in McClain County District Court.

Tyler J. Snapp, 29, of Oklahoma City posted a \$10,000 bond in the misdemeanor case. He is charged with leaving unattended children in a vehicle.

According to an affidavit, a Lighthorse Police officer was sent to the casino's parking garage at 6:10 a.m.

A security guard had found the toddler standing in the driver's seat playing with the steering wheel. The car was locked with the windows up.

Snapp was contacted by security and was at the vehicle when the officer arrived. He told the officer he'd been inside the casino about 15 minutes.

He said he was searching for his fiancée. They'd had an argument and she usually goes

to the casino when they fight.

However, video surveillance showed Snapp arrived at 4:04 a.m., parked in the central lot and entered the casino. He walked around for about 45 minutes.

He returned to the vehicle and moved it to the first floor of the parking garage.

Then he re-entered the casino and began gambling, according to the affidavit.

At first glance many would think the facility is home only to the Superintendent's offices.

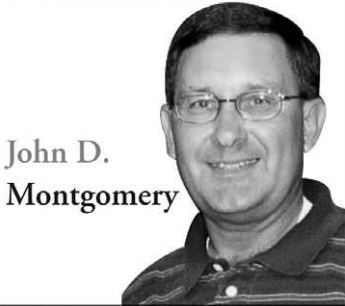
Not the case. The building is 90 percent occupied with only two rooms currently not in use.

However, one is a storage facility leaving only one room vacant but there is tugging going on to occupy that space.

The Purcell Public Library would jump at the chance to have it but Midkiff and the board of education are hanging on to it for a specific purpose.

"We would like to expand our

concurrent enrollment to two OCCC professors instead of only one," Midkiff said.

That would take the final room and again enhance education in the Purcell Public Schools.

There are leased spaces that include the library's portion, the McClain County Health Department and the McClain County TSET Program.

The remainder of the space is occupied by the Administrative offices that includes the Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Treasurer, Human Resources, Encumbrance Clerk and Activities Clerk.

But that's not all.

The District Technology Director and District Servers, Workroom for repairs and camera monitoring system are there.

Also, Special Education Services including the Director and testing;

And, Maintenance Director, for all building plans, computer program for overseeing all HVAC systems;

Also, Education Station, the district's three year old program;

And, Expand After School Care;

And, dressing rooms and gym for baseball, softball, track and cross country;

And, after school Technology Club spearheaded by Paul Wollenberg for his students' robotics competitions. They have qualified for national competitions numerous times.

Those programs and offices will continue to occupy those spaces after a new proposed junior high is built on the north end of town.

The building of the new junior high depends on the vote of the citizens for the suggested bond election in October.

A winning strategy in Afghanistan

For 16 years, the United States has been engaged in military conflict in Afghanistan and has maintained a presence there to prevent terrorists from taking over the country and recreating the conditions that led to 9/11.

Throughout our time there, our men and women in uniform have diligently eliminated terrorist threats, protected local civilians and supported rebuilding the Afghan defense forces. But as terrorism across the globe changes and grows, we still are facing the challenges of preventing another attack from occurring on our soil.

When President Trump announced the new US strategy in Afghanistan and South Asia, it was made clear that our mission to eradicate terrorism in Afghanistan will continue until the job is done.

School Bonds

As you may have heard, the Purcell School's Board of Education has called for a school bond election on October 10. In the coming weeks, as the bond gets closer, we will print, have public meetings and send out the specifics of the bond. For this article I would like to go over what a school bond is, what you can do with it, and how it works financially.

A bond issue is one of the three possible ways for districts to "borrow" money. A school bond is the most common way that schools borrow money. It is

done by bond issues, or a series of issues, once a school district has approved a bond issue by a 60 percent passage rate.

Bond issue proceeds must be spent for improving or acquiring school sites, constructing, repairing, remodeling and equipping school buildings, and acquiring school furniture, fixtures, equipment, uniforms, technology and transportation equipment.

No less than 85 percent of all bond issue proceeds must be spent on the list of projects included in the bond resolution and approved by the voters. The

remaining 15 percent can be spent on similar-type projects as approved in the bond issue election or can be used to reduce the sinking fund debt. By law, no salaries, benefits or related costs can be paid with bond fund proceeds or interest earnings.

Bond principal and interest are paid from ad valorem tax revenues. Districts collect ad valorem taxes through a tax levy assessed on real property, personal property and public

MOVIES WITH DAVE

Not really any big releases this week and boy did it show in the box office receipts over the weekend.

This weekend the movie industry as a whole saw the most revenue it's had in 16 years. The lowest it's been since the days following the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

Still, there's always new movies to review even if they aren't making any money, so here's what I saw this week.



First up is "Good Time."

After a botched bank robbery lands his mentally disabled younger brother (Benny Safdie) in jail, Connie Nikas (Robert Pattinson) sets out on an insane quest through New York City to get his brother released.

This is another film from the studio A24, which for those who don't know, are responsible for bringing some of the highest acclaimed, most thought provoking, and the weirdest movies to theaters in the past few years.

For example, just last year they distributed "Moonlight," a movie that won the Oscar for best picture, but in the same year they also distributed "Swiss Army Man," a film where Daniel Radcliffe plays a cadaver that functions similar to a Swiss Army knife.

Like I said, when you see the A24 logo before a movie, you know you're probably in for something a little more off the beaten path.

And this film is no exception, beginning with the way this movie's shot.

Much of the time, the camera is placed right smack dab in people's faces. It's like the filmmakers have you invading the actor's personal space. It's uncomfortable, but at the same time the style adds a ton of atmosphere and makes the film feel incredibly intimate.

They even do shaky cam well. Usually that'd be something I'd complain about, but like the film "Detroit" earlier this month, this movie does it really well. Somehow both films were shot in a way that adds to the frantic nature of the movies, without making everything a confusing mess.

The performances are also really good. Robert Pattinson is incredible here. I didn't even recognize him at first. Despite his character being a jerk who wrongs pretty much everyone he runs into, he still comes across as likeable and his performance is a huge reason this film works so well.

Also, I have to mention the music. Holy crap is this film's soundtrack good. It's pretty much all electronic music, and just like the camera work it adds to the frenzied nature of the film and elevates this movie to whole other level.

This film definitely isn't for everyone though. Like I said, Pattinson's character is a scumbag and his crazy journey to free his brother leads him to some pretty dark and uncomfortable places.

Personally, I found it incredibly gripping and was engaged the whole way through, but I could see many people put off by the content of this movie. In a sense I guess that describes many A24 films.

If you can get past that though, I'd say you're in for a good time. "Good Time" is rated R.

Next up is "Birth of the Dragon."

Set in 1964 San Francisco, this movie takes inspiration from the legendary and controversial showdown between



kung fu master Bruce Lee (Philip Ng) and Shaolin monk Wong Jack Man (Yu Xia). A battle that gave birth to a legend.

What a bunch of nonsense. Even saying this film takes inspiration from real events is a leap. Sure Bruce Lee and Wong Jack Man fought back in 1964, but pretty much everything else in the movie is wholesale fabricated.

Bruce Lee isn't even the main character in this movie for crying out loud. For whatever cockamamie reason this film focuses on one of Lee's students, Steve McKee (Billy Magnussen), a person that as far as I can tell never even existed.

What the heck? This movie's called "Birth of the Dragon" not "Birth of the White Guy." How do you make a movie about Bruce Lee not about Bruce Lee? I just don't understand.

Sure, the big fight does eventually happen, but it's basically a footnote. The main focus of the movie is McKee trying to save his love interest Xiulan (Jingjing Qu) from a Chinese gangster. Talk about false advertising.

Whatever, it's a kung fu movie. At least the fight scenes should be good right? Sadly, the action scenes in this film are few and far between and what action we do get is mostly dull and has a bunch of random slow-mo or sped up for no sensible reason. The fight between Bruce Lee and Wong Jack Man by far being the worst offender.

They did finally have a decent action scene towards the end of the movie, but by then it was just too little too late.

The acting itself is okay I suppose, Philip Ng certainly looks the part of the kung fu master if nothing else and Yu Xia's character is charming in a way that only a peaceful monk can be.

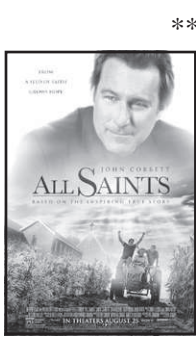
Despite my ranting on him earlier, even Magnussen's acting is perfectly fine. His story is garbage, but there's nothing wrong with the man's actual performance.

The filmmakers also try their darndest to add humor to this movie, but the comedy timing is just a little off. With a few scenes, all it would've taken is some tighter editing or a slightly quicker cut and they would have gotten a much bigger laugh. Sure, this film still has a few chuckle worthy moments, but there could have been so many more.

I'm honestly not sure who I'd recommend this movie to. I doubt Bruce Lee fans would care for it since the story is basically all made up and hardly focuses on Lee at all. Fans of martial arts films will be disappointed too with the lack of good action.

Ignoring the historical inaccuracies, this movie isn't that bad, but it just isn't very good either. And with the massive amount of options for entertainment we have these days, mediocre just doesn't cut it.

"Birth of the Dragon" is rated PG-13.



The last movie I saw this week was "All Saints."

Based on a true story, this film follows Michael Spurlock (John Corbett), a salesman-turned Anglican Pastor, assigned to a failing church with the responsibility closing the house of worship down.

But when a large group of aid seeking Southeast Asian refugees suddenly join the congregation the pastor hatches a plan, and with the help of his new members, attempts to save the declining church from bankruptcy.

This is certainly an inspirational movie, especially considering all the real life events this film's based on. It also has a great message about a community coming together despite cultural differences, an idea I hope many people will take to heart.

Indeed, this movie is a crowd pleaser all around, and I'm sure most people seeking faith-based entertainment will enjoy this film quite a bit. This movie is not for me though.

I guess I'll start with the story. It's hard to fault the narrative of a movie based on real events, but the plot here feels so cliched and predictable. It's not bad, but this story is so played out in my mind. I've seen it a thousand times and this film doesn't do much to set it above the crowd.

The writing also rubbed me the wrong way, mostly with the film's attempts at comedy. This movie is loaded with jokes, something I'm dubbing Christian one-liners. One character in particular, Forrest, (Barry Corbin) a cranky old member of the congregation, basically speaks in nothing but these jokes. Despite me rolling my eyes at just about every single one, most the people in my theater seemed to think they were hilarious. To each their own I suppose.

The other characters here are fine. John Corbett makes for a decent pastor and it's only slightly strange seeing the boyfriend from "My Big Fat Greek Wedding" play a man of God.

My favorite performance though has to be Nelson Lee, who plays Ye Win, the leader of the Burmese refugees. He just so earnest and likeable. The camaraderie between him and Pastor Spurlock is the heart of this film and it's easily my favorite aspect of the movie.

Also, apparently many of the people who played Burmese refugees in this film are real members of the All Saints church in Smyrna, Tennessee, and in fact they shot much of the movie on location at the actual church. That's pretty neat if I do say so myself.

Like I said, I think most people seeking out this movie in the first place will leave the theater having had a good time. This is certainly one of the better faith-based films I've seen in recent years.

If that's what you're looking for I say go check it out. "All Saints" is rated PG.

service property and place these collections in the "Sinking Fund." This tax levy is referred to as the "Sinking Fund mill levy", and is separate from the General Fund and Building Fund tax levies.

School bonds are limited to a 25 year term by state law. The Sinking Fund levy changes each year based on the total

property valuation in the district and the amount of bond principal and interest paid off during the year.

I hope this quick overview has helped in knowing a little bit about school bond issues. Purcell Public Schools will strive to make sure that all the accurate information gets out before the vote so that everyone

can make an informed decision. If you haven't registered to vote we hope that you will do so.

Beef Tamale Casserole

1 8-1/2 oz. pkg. corn muffin mix
 1 14-3/4 oz. can cream corn
 2 eggs
 1/2 cup milk
 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese, divided
 1 lb. ground beef
 1-oz. package taco seasoning
 2/3 cups salsa
 10 oz. can enchilada sauce
 Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Coat a 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking dish with nonstick cooking spray. Set aside.

In a large bowl, combine muffin mix, corn, eggs, milk, and 1 cup of the cheese. Pour into prepared baking dish. Bake for 20 minutes.

In a large skillet over medium heat, cook ground beef until no longer pink. Drain fat. Add taco seasoning packet and salsa. Cook for an additional 5 minutes. Toss beef in enchilada sauce. Pour beef mixture over cornbread and top with remaining cup of cheese. Bake for and 20 additional minutes.

Allow to cool for 5 minutes and cut into 6 or 8 squares. Top with favorite taco toppings.

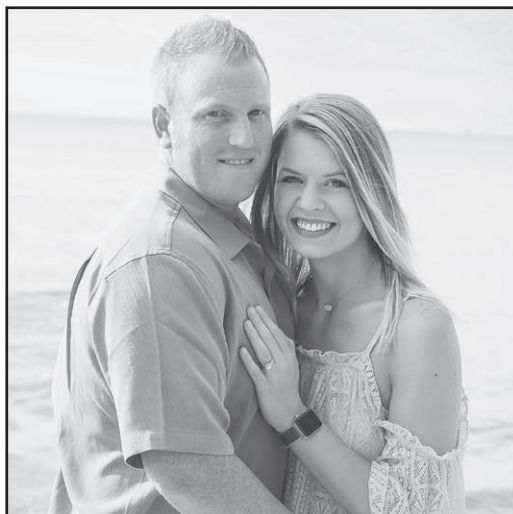

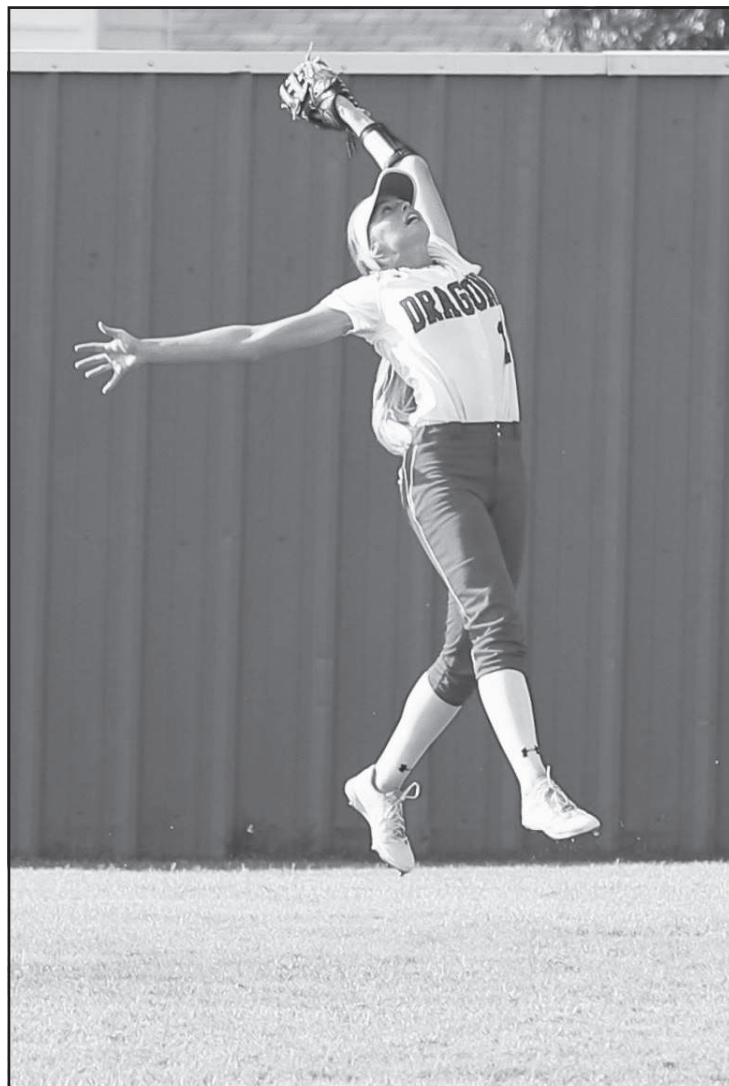

Use TSET to protect vital services

In the final hours of the 2017 Legislative session, lawmakers desperate to find revenue, passed Senate Bill 845 to impose a \$1.50 per pack tax on cigarettes. Except that, to get around constitutional limits on legislative power, they labeled the measure a "fee."

The Oklahoma Supreme Court unanimously struck down the revenue provisions of Senate Bill 845 earlier this month. This has left some elected officials claiming they must pass new and larger tax increases during a special legislative session.

To strengthen their case, they have the same doom-and-gloom predictions they trot out for every tax debate: nursing homes will close, rural hospitals will fail, health and human services will be depleted. All this supposedly because lawmakers couldn't constitutionally pass a tax on tobacco.

But if lawmakers want to use tobacco money to protect vital services, there's a better place to look.

It's called the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust, or TSET. This is a public trust

that manages money received by the state as a result of the tobacco lawsuit and settlement from years ago. This fund alone recently topped \$1 billion, and it gets \$50 million a year deposited to the endowment plus spends about \$50 million in earnings every year.

TSET does a few important things, but it also has plenty of questionable spending. Right now, TSET is spending around \$770,000 to lecture Oklahomans to drink more water. Last year, public outrage forced TSET to change course when it attempted to create a new administrative position with a salary of \$250,000 a year.

So, when you take a billion dollar bank account, growing every year and generating annual earnings around \$50 million, then factor in some questionable spending, it's obvious TSET offers state leaders an alternative to increasing the tax burden on working Oklahoma families. The money is already there to prevent all of the doom-and-gloom scenarios.

This is why OCPA has called on lawmakers to allow Oklahomans to vote on reforming TSET and accessing those funds to stabilize reimbursement rates for nursing homes and rural hospitals. This could also fund the Physician Manpower Training Commission. It could all be done without taking away from TSET tobacco cessation programs or the current endowment.

Believe it or not, some have ridiculed this suggestion simply because it's not a tax increase.

The state Constitution does say that reforming TSET requires a vote of the people. But so does passing any tax hike that has less than three-fourths support in both legislative chambers. Why not let Oklahomans vote to break down this funding silo, just a little, in order to shore up some basic services?

It's time to use TSET funds to protect rural hospitals, nursing homes, and other vital services instead of increasing the tax burden on working Oklahoma families.

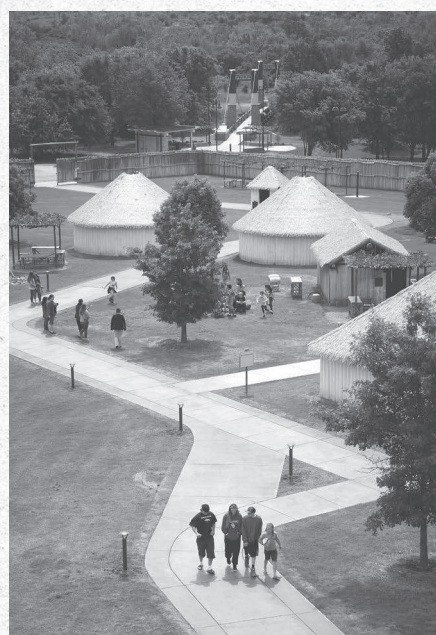

The officer again parked and watched and Bolner soon turned east on SH37. With the police again following her, Bolner turned back into the Walmart lot and parked.

When one officer questioned one of the passengers, he noticed a bulge in the man's pocket that turned out to be a baggie of marijuana.

The man said he met Bolner at Walmart to buy the marijuana from her.

Another officer ordered Bolner out of the car, but she refused.

Shown the baggie of marijuana, Bolner was asked if there was anything illegal in the car. She said no and then said she'd previously been assaulted by a police officer and was scared to exit the vehicle.

Assured she would not be assaulted, Bolner handed over a glass pipe that she was holding on her lap. It contained marijuana.

With Bolner out of the car, police found another baggie of marijuana between the console and the passenger seat.

Bolner told police she had about two ounces of marijuana in her bra and police also found digital scales in her purse.

Verdict:

She was never charged and on August 23 testified for the prosecution that she was unaware Seely planned to kill Wesnidge. McClain County Sheriff Don Hewett said at the time that investigators were told Wesnidge had been abusive to Benefield. Seely and Benefield were friends and planned to take Wesnidge to a rural area, put him out of the car and leave him. Benefield was in the back seat and the two men were in front when there was an altercation between Seely and Wesnidge. Seely pushed the other man from the car and stabbed him

numerous times as he lay on the ground. Leaving the dying man behind, Seely and the woman sped away. Due to the high speed, Seely missed a curve and the car crashed through a fence and into a deep creek bed. Seely and Benefield then fled on foot, going in opposite directions. Seely ran into a pasture, but was spotted by the pilot of an Oklahoma Highway Patrol helicopter who directed officers to his location. Benefield made it to a house about a mile from the wrecked car and residents called authorities.

came off errors but our defense didn't let that rattle them," she continued.

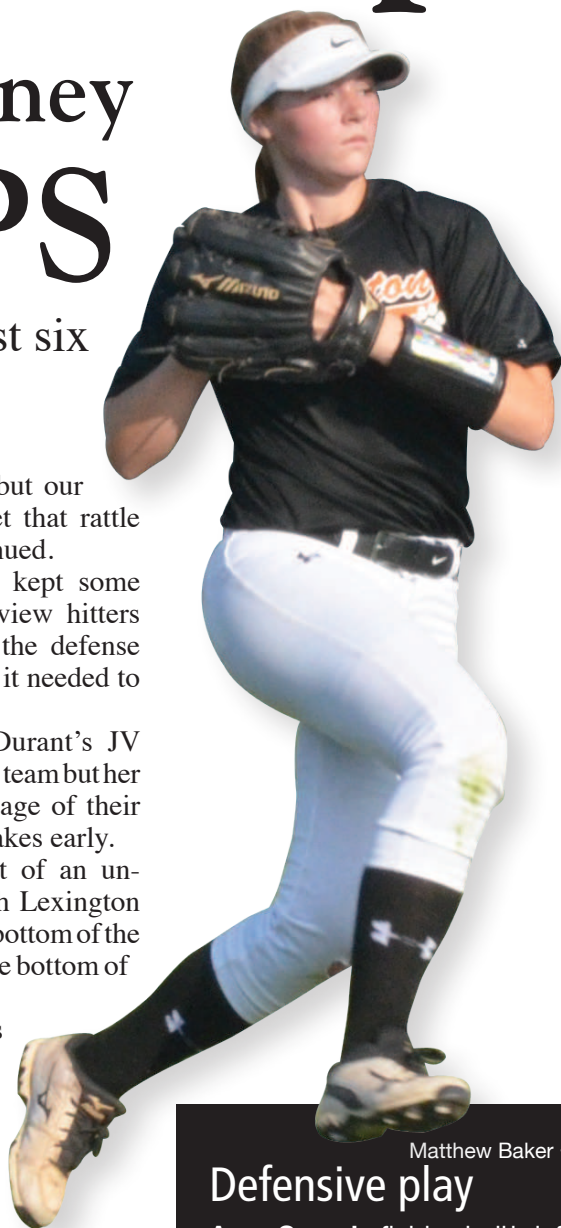
"Kaylee Fink kept some very good Plainview hitters off balance and the defense stepped up when it needed to behind her."

For a week zero week, coach Brad Beller's Washington Warriors answered some questions and left some with question marks.

But the one stat that means the most was an impressive 35-7 road victory at the always athletic Pauls Valley Panther's den.

Senior Tyler Stuever led the offensive explosion on the ground, personally rushing for 231 yards on 17 carries and four touchdowns.

He scored on runs of 83, 15, eight and 13 yards while Trevor had the other rushing score, a 12 yard scamper in

the second quarter.

As a team, the Warriors rushed for 402 total yards with junior quarterback Trevor Stuever rushing the pigskin 16 times for 89 yards and a touchdown.

"When it's Week Zero you never know if you are prepared," Beller said. "We had a mixed bag with some good and some bad but overall it was a really solid night."

Beller said his team knows the things that didn't go well are all correctable.

"We know we can get better," he confirmed. "We are going to have to get more efficient in our passing game both in pass protection and

passing efficiency."

The Warriors were 3-10 for 71 yards against the Panthers but it really didn't matter due to the prolific rushing game.

"When you have those kinds of stats that you average nearly 10 yards a carry (45-402) there are others involved in addition to the backs," Beller said.

The coach pointed to the play of tight end Zach Tague, fullback Shane Spaulding and his offensive line including Cale Winton, Conner Bruce, Tyler Beller, Tanner Thompson and Logan Lile.

"We controlled the line of scrimmage," Beller said. "We tried to run our spread offense

but we didn't have the type of success we wanted. Pauls Valley is a solid very multiple defensive front.

"We had to simplify everything blocking-wise so we used our zone and power plays which took the guessing away from our offensive linemen. We used the tight end and fullback as well and they all did a great job," Beller praised.

On defense against the Panthers, Beller said initially his group was a bend but don't break kind of deal.

HUGE WIN FOR LEX IN OPENER

Knocks off Lindsay 27-14 on the road

The Lexington Bulldogs made the debut of new head coach Dale Berglan a success last Friday night on the road when they pulled off a surprising 27-14 victory over the Lindsay Leopards.

"It was a great night," Berglan said.

"It was a packed house because everybody in Lindsay it seemed like showed up to debut their brand new stadium.

"There was a lot of pressure on us being on the road and this and that," Berglan said.

Lexington barely missed the playoffs a year ago despite a 6-4 record.

Meanwhile, Lindsay went 11-1 and lost to Luther, 35-32, in the second round.

The Leopards whipped the Bulldogs, 44-21, last season. This year, it was Lexington who posted a resounding victory—the Bulldogs' first over Lindsay since a 34-20 win over the Leopards in 2007.

The Bulldogs scored on the first play from scrimmage against Lindsay when junior quarterback Toby Prevost raced 84 yards into the end zone of the game's first touchdown.

Prevost, who ended up with 165 yards rushing on 12 carries, also had a 70-yard touchdown run that was called back because of an illegal block.

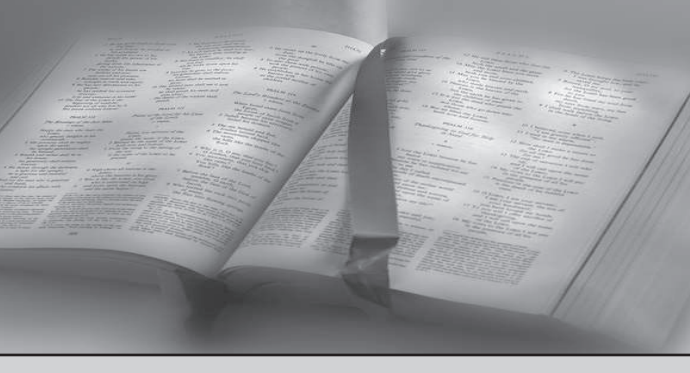

In Matthew's Gospel, Peter - the lovable fisherman-apostle - was often getting it wrong! He didn't always think in the way that God thinks (Mt 16:21-23) and he couldn't stay awake during Jesus's agonizing prayer in the garden (Mt 26:36-41). He sometimes let his fear get the best of him (Mt 14:22-33) and, on his worst day ever, he denied that he even knew Jesus (Mt 26:69-75).

And yet, in spite of all, Peter gave the clearest expression and understanding of who Jesus was. When Jesus asked "Who do people say that I am?" he received various answers, such as John the Baptist, Elijah, and Jeremiah or other prophets (Mt. 16:13-20). But when Jesus asked "Who do you say that I am?" it was Peter, that most bumbling of souls, who blurted out the truth: "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Even though his flesh was often weak, his spirit was willing and focused and sure. His sights were set on following Jesus, at whatever the cost.

Of all the chosen Twelve, then, Jesus chose Peter to be the leader, the focal point, the one who would be the "rock" of his followers. Truth about God

is like a rock. More precisely, truth about God is a rock that is immovable, unbroken and consistent throughout the ages, though the expression of this truth may have to change according to language and levels of understanding.

Modern holders of the Bishop of Rome (the Pope) are successors to Peter and bearers of the responsibility he was given to uphold the truth, to decide against what is false and misleading. Each modern Pope does this according to his own style and with his own particular passions within the Gospel. Thus, Pope John Paul II upheld the dignity of life and the gift of the human body. Pope Benedict XVI was a promoter of evangelization, the kind of "new evangelization" that is relevant to a world in which many people are already Christian by name.

And Pope Francis is a champion of the church of mercy, especially in regards to mercy shown to the poor and to sinners. All of these successors to St. Peter are representative of the unity of the Church, a unity that we pray for each Sunday with the Church throughout the world. When we see the Pope, the Holy Father, we are looking

at Peter, upon whom Christ is building His Church.

One story we ran across during this time was about a young man who wanted knowledge. The eager boy's story quickly went into our "good stuff" file.

The young man goes to his teacher one day and asks if he would give him knowledge. The teacher said he would see what he could do, but that he would need the young man to meet him down at the nearby

river that evening. The request perplexes the boy, but he obeys, nonetheless, and meets his teacher down at the river a little while before the sun goes down. The teacher takes the puzzled boy by the arm as soon as he comes to him and leads him out into the river chest deep.

He stops there, takes the boy by the back of the neck, and dunks him in the water for a good 10, 15 seconds. He finally pulls the boy up - just for a moment so he can get a little bit of a breath - then dunks him again the second time, then the third. When the boy comes up out of that water after that third dunking, he is sputtering and gasping for air, and he cries out, "Sir, I need air! I need air!"

The teacher waits until the boy catches his breath - at

least somewhat - and says to him calmly, "Son, when you want knowledge the way you wanted air just now, then come back and see me."

Then the teacher walked out of the water to his home, leaving the young man in the middle of the river to ponder the lesson on his own.

It may have taken awhile, but he did learn the lesson, even if he had to learn it the hard way. It is one thing to want knowledge, and it is another thing altogether to thrive, yearn, and long for it. It is not until we become desperate for truth, and knowledge, and righteousness that we will take the steps necessary to achieve them. We have to want

Personally, I would rather have most any job than one serving on an unarmed ship that was a prime target for the Japanese submarines.

The remodeling of our new facility is progressing well. This week the plumbing, electrical, drywall, painting and the installation of cabinets should be complete. When these things are complete, we will install the panels for each cubicle needed for our volunteers.

We will continue to provide our services on Tuesday and Thursday mornings only for the current time. When we have more trained volunteers, we plan to staff more days and be open more often. Hopefully, this will enable us not to have to turn veterans away and serve 300 per week.

We have two vehicles available for a veteran or surviving spouse in need. Applications are available. Please stop by Tuesday or Thursday to fill one out.

Our drivers, Clayton and Louie, put in 65 hours last week transporting 18 folks 1,264 miles.

The number of veterans and surviving spouses from Norman is averaging from 25 to over 30 each week. I wish we had an accurate number of the number of military who live in our town. One thing I do know is that many of the folks from Norman are filing their first ever claim for VA benefits.

Many local veterans and surviving spouses who we have helped have already begun

to receive a VA check for the injuries that occurred to them while serving in the military. Our goal is to help each veteran and surviving spouse receive all of the VA benefits for which they are eligible.

One of the things that surprises me over the years we have been helping veterans is the number who are traveling to see us from the East Coast to the West Coast and all states in between. I don't know why people in other states have so much trouble receiving their VA benefits. I have found if a veteran supplies the medical evidence showing the injury occurred in the military along with a diagnosis of a disability and a nexus letter linking it to their military service their VA claim is probably going to be approved.

Some people assisting veterans only file a claim requesting service connection of a disability and don't supply any evidence. Those types of claims will probably be denied more often than not. Maybe that's why we continue to see an increase in the number of people denied VA benefits after going to other places for help.

Last week we assisted a total of 239 veterans and surviving spouses with their applications for VA benefits. We had some who arrived after we had closed and were asked to return next week. Our sign in time starts at 5:30 a.m. and we encourage everyone to be signed in by 8 a.m. as we have usually reached the maximum number of veterans that our volunteers can work. When I arrive at 5 a.m., there will be from 20 to 30 people already there waiting for the doors to open. As we operate on a first come first serve, the early birds are usually finished by 7 a.m.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive a copy of all of the VA rating decisions along with all of the letters that VA sends to the people who I represent. Those award letters contain the information we publish each week about the number of veterans and surviving spouses who were approved for VA benefits.

Last week seven veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service connected disabilities. This group of veterans will receive a combined annual amount of \$295,703 per year. Twenty-two veterans received disability ratings ranging from 10- 90 percent. This group of veterans will receive a combined annual amount of \$268,793. One surviving spouse was approved for DIC. She will receive an annual income of \$15,095 per year.

Before becoming an accredited Claims Agent, we would never know if what we were doing was working unless the veteran or spouse returned for a follow-up visit. Now we have three ladies whose only job is to send out letters to everyone who we receive a decision on, instructing them on what they should do next. This has proven to be a very positive thing for many of the people we help as they did not know that other benefits may be available after receiving a 30 percent or higher VA rating.

One of the things that we don't have time to talk about daily is the veterans who were present during the atomic testing or were part of the cleanup crews. A little-known fact is that the Justice Department has a \$75,000 payout for veterans diagnosed with certain types of cancers. That money may be paid to the veteran, spouse, children or grandchildren if the veteran died from one of the approved diseases. Some veterans who were involved in that received documentation on their discharges showing that they were a part of those programs.

Our volunteers who assist surviving spouses are available

to receive a VA check for the injuries that occurred to them while serving in the military. Our goal is to help each veteran and surviving spouse receive all of the VA benefits for which they are eligible.

play to go and where it went. I really thought we could get it.”

Then, the Dragons were driving again when a personal foul penalty had them shooting themselves in the foot.

“We had two personal fouls that didn’t help at all,” the coach said. “Then we have Jake Berrey running down the field on a fade and just over throw him.

“It is good to know you have a 6-5 receiver that can go up and get the fade as he did on one play,” Higbee said.

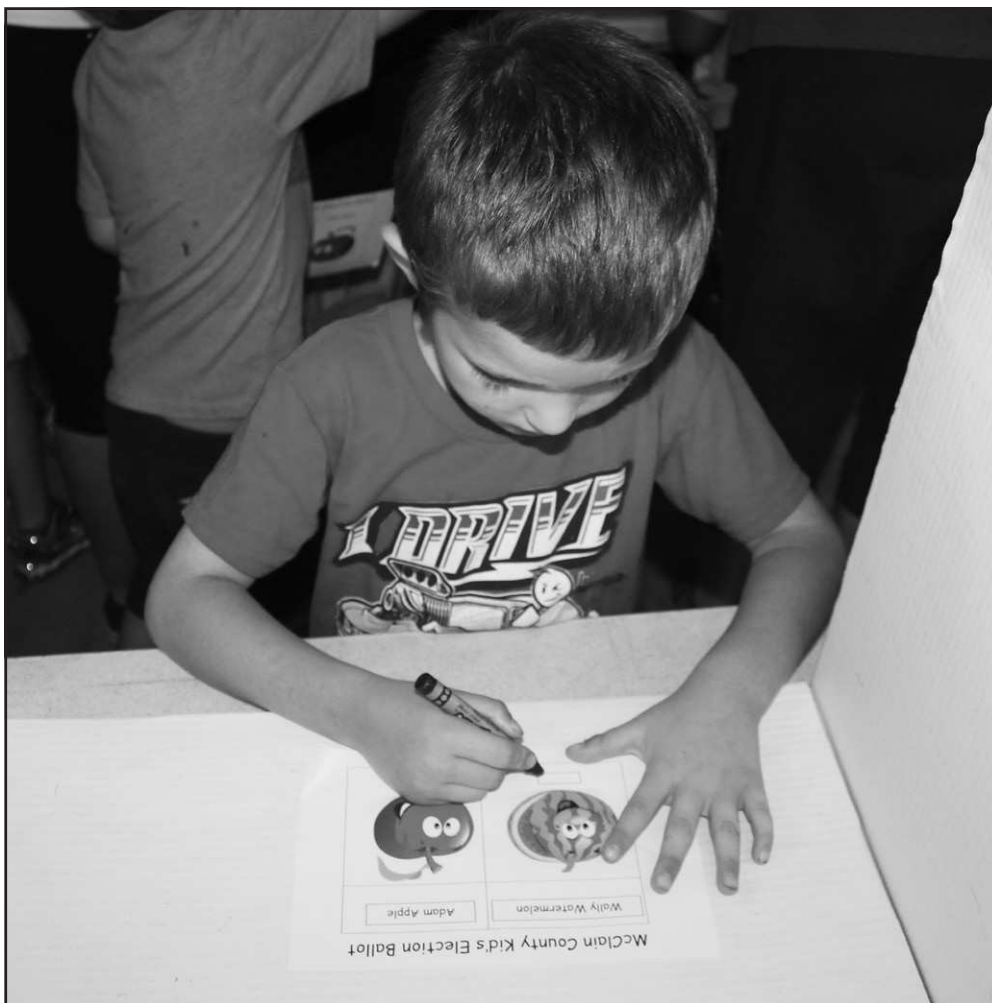

Eyes:

vision exams are especially important for children because their vision can transition rapidly.

“From ages six to 18, children’s vision can change very quickly,” said Dr. Welch. “Oftentimes that can lead to unexplained changes in academic achievement, difficulty focusing or problems completing reading and writing assignments. It’s important to diagnose and correct those vision problems before they really start to hold a child back at school.”

Electronic devices can also

irritate the eyes and lead to vision problems, said Welch.

“Computers, iPads, smart phones and other screen-based technologies are great learning tools, but they also put a lot of strain on the eyes,” said Welch. “As these devices have entered the classroom, kids are more likely to experience what we call ‘Computer Vision Syndrome.’”

Computer Vision Syndrome, or CVS, includes symptoms like eye strain, headaches, fatigue, burned or tired eyes, loss of focus, blurred vision,

double vision or head and neck pain. Nationally, parents report that two-thirds of all children use devices for homework that can cause CVS.

To avoid CVS, optometric physicians recommend following the 20-20-20 rule: when using technology or doing near work, take a 20-second break, every 20 minutes and view something 20 feet away.

The OAOP encourages all parents to include a visit to your local optometric physician and a comprehensive vision exam as part of every child’s back-to-school checklist.

Medicare can help you find the right hospice

Medicare’s “Compare” websites have helped millions of Americans find the right nursing home, hospital or home health care agency for themselves or their families. Now, a new Medicare online tool is available to help terminally ill patients and their loved ones find the right hospice service as well.

The “Hospice Compare” website – at www.medicare.gov/hospicecompare – displays information on almost 3,900 hospices nationwide and allows patients, family members and health care providers to get a snapshot of the quality of care each hospice service offers. The site contains data on 335 hospice agencies in Oklahoma.

Terminally ill people who choose hospice services receive care and support for their physical, emotional, social and spiritual needs. They’re no longer seeking a cure, but they do want to live out their last weeks and months as comfortably as possible and with dignity. Hospice care is typically provided within the patient’s home.

Hospice Compare lets patients and their caregivers see how the hospice services they are considering stack up against the national average when it comes to such quality measures as managing pain, treating symptoms and respecting patients’ beliefs and values. Plans call for more measures to be added.

In time, after additional qual-

ity measures are posted, the website will feature star ratings similar to those now available for nursing homes and hospitals. Each hospice agency will be rated from one star (poor) to five stars (excellent) so that consumers can more easily compare facilities. The site will be updated quarterly.

Though Hospice Compare can’t tell the whole story about where to go for care, it can serve as a useful screening tool. Patients and family members can search the website by using their ZIP code or city to find all of the nearby hospice services. Or they can type in the name of a particular hospice provider they’re considering.

To qualify for Medicare’s hospice benefit, you must be eligible for Medicare’s Part A hospital insurance, and your physician and your hospice medical director must certify that you have six months or less to live, assuming your illness runs its normal course. The benefit is available to people with traditional Medicare or private Medicare Advantage plans.

Hospice programs follow a team approach. The specially trained team typically includes doctors, nurses, counselors and social workers. A doctor and nurse are on call 24-7 to care for you and support your family when you need it. If your hospice team determines you need hospital inpatient care, it will make the arrangements.

As long as the hospice care comes from a Medicare-approved hospice, Medicare will cover the physician services, nursing care, drugs, medical

equipment and supplies, and physical and occupational therapy. Medicare will also continue to pay for the treatment of other conditions unrelated to your terminal illness.

You can receive hospice care as long as you’re recertified. After 90 days of care, you’re re-evaluated by the hospice’s medical director or other hospice doctor to determine if the care is still appropriate. Another re-evaluation is done after another 90 days and then every 60 days.

Patients and family members who want to learn more about hospice programs in their area should talk to their doctor or call their state’s hospice organization. The number for Oklahoma is 1-405-513-8602. The Hospice Compare website also contains a list of questions you may want to ask when looking for and choosing a hospice program.

They include: When I call with an urgent need, how long will it take for someone from the hospice team to respond? How will the team manage my pain or other symptoms that arise?

Can I still see my regular doctor? How will the hospice team prepare me and my family for what to expect? How will the team support my family through the grieving process?

Like Medicare’s other Compare websites, the new Hospice Compare site will give patients and their families an important tool for making informed decisions at an especially challenging time.

Choosing the right hospice service isn’t about giving up; it’s about making every day count.

Seniors beware after suspicious phone calls about Medicare

With Medicare open enrollment less than two months away, the Oklahoma Insurance Department is asking seniors to be on alert. The warning comes after several Oklahomans have reported questionable phone calls from people claiming to represent or partner with Medicare.

“These callers are insistent on getting personal information from our seniors,” said Oklahoma Insurance Commissioner John D. Doak. “We urge Oklahomans to never give out personal details such as date of birth, bank account numbers or their Medicare number over the phone. There are just too many cases of fraudulent activity in phone calls and new scams cropping up on a regular basis.”

In one case, a man reported the caller asked for his birth date and Medicare costs. The caller implied that she was

working with Medicare to audit Medicare supplement costs.

In another instance, the caller told a senior he could get free supports and braces for his back and legs even though he did not need them.

Seniors should beware of any promises of 100 percent coverage for medical equipment by Medicare. Medicare only covers durable medical equipment that is medically necessary and ordered by a doctor.

Purchasing medical equipment over the phone or internet and without involving your physician could actually cause more harm than good. The same is true for purchasing insurance.

To avoid potential scams, never buy insurance over the phone from an agent you do not know. It’s safer to use a local agent who you either personally know or who has been recommended to you by

family or friends.

Here are a few more tips to protect yourself:

- If you don’t recognize the number on your caller ID, don’t answer the phone. If it’s important, the caller will leave a message.

- If you answer the phone and realize it’s someone trying to sell you something or asking for your personal information, hang up. Seniors were raised to be polite, but in these situations, safety is more important.

- If someone shows up at your home claiming to be from Medicare or claiming to partner with Medicare, close the door. Medicare will not come to your house, and Medicare does not endorse any particular policy or insurance company.
