## Lightning strikes Purcell home

Third time in last two years

The home of Purcell resident Doug Butler, located at 128 S. 10th, was struck during the tremendous electric storm early last Sunday morning.

At least two waves of intense lightning moved through the Purcell area starting just after 1 a.m. bringing with it a very welcome 1.6" of rain.

Another .55" was recorded last Thursday night bringing the total here for the year to 26.25" compared to 17.03" at Oklahoma City's Will Rogers World airport.

The normal year-to-date total is 22.34".

Butler said the lightning knocked out two televisions, disabled his pickup that had to be towed away to free up Butler's car, which was not damaged by the jolt.

"I could hear (the electricity) it make a sizzling noise and then I smelled something," Butler said. "So I went up in my attic to make sure my house wasn't on fire."

The lightning also knocked out his water softener system and his telephone.

The pickup sustained damage to six on board computers, he reported.

### Residents protest rezoning land to welcome new industry

An Indiana truck rental firm plans to break ground within 60 to 90 days on a nine acre tract located between Purcell Lake and the interstate.

In a 3-2 vote Monday night, Purcell City Council approved a zoning change for the site from agricultural to light in-

dustrial.

The vote was 2-2 until mayor Ted Cox cast the deciding vote in favor of rezoning.

That followed a lengthy protest by residents living across Chandler Road from the vacant land, most of whom said they favor new business in Purcell, but not in their neighborhood.

That sentiment re-sounded with council members Graham Fishburn and Tom McCurdy.

Premier Truck Rental President Rob Troxel said Purcell will realize between \$200,000 and \$320,000 in annual sales tax revenue from

## Chickasaw Nation election results

Chickasaw Nation Election Secretary Rita Loder announced results of the July 25, 2017 general election.

Pickens District Seat 2 incumbent legislator Connie Barker of Marietta received 1,578 votes to defeat challenger Michael Thomas Watson of Ardmore, who received 583 votes.

Pontotoc District Seat 3 will be filled by J. Lisa Impson of Ada, who received 2,321 votes to defeat Kymberly Hazlett of Purcell, who received 737 votes.

Tishomingo District Seat 3 incumbent Steven Woods of Davis will retain his seat as he was unchallenged.

Pontotoc District Seat 4 will be filled by Karen Goodnight of Goldsby, as she was unchallenged for the seat.

Incumbent Supreme Court Justice Cheri L. Bellefeuille-Gordon of Sulphur was unchallenged and will retain Seat 3 on the court.

Elected officials will take the oath of office Monday, Oct. 2.

**School Begins**

When school bells ring to signal the start of the 2017-18 school year bells should also go off inside drivers' heads to drive safely.

Thousands of students will be hurrying to their respective schools most likely not paying much attention to the vehicles on crowded streets. We are reminding drivers to be careful in school zones, follow the traffic laws as well as the directions given by crossing guards. Remember to stop for children and adults at crosswalks. Please keep our children safe.

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## National School Lunch Program

Washington, Purcell, Wayne, Dibble, Lexington and Wanette Public Schools have announced their policy for free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program.

Local school officials have adopted income criteria and household size for determining eligibility.

Children from households whose income is at or below the qualifying levels are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school.

The information provided on the application is confidential

and will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps, "Temporary Assistance for Needy Families" (TANF), or "Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations" (FDPIR) must list the child's name, his/her food stamp or TANF or FDPIR case number, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you do not list a food stamp or TANF or FDPIR case number for all the children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member,

and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for free and reduced-price meals or free milk regardless of the child's income. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals or milk for them, contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, a school official will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents or guardians wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to the school for a hearing to appeal the decision. The school's policy statement contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

The household of a child currently certified to receive food stamps, TANF or FDPIR benefits will be notified of the child's eligibility and that the child will be provided free benefits unless the household notifies the school that it chooses to decline benefits.

In accordance with federal law and United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) policy, these institutions are prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability.

## Extracurricular activities help kids make the grade, learn life lessons

Books and lectures are not the only ways students pick up important lessons and skills during the school year.

Extracurricular activities provide a range of benefits to participants almost as limitless as the slate of options available to them.

Whether it is playing video games, hanging out with friends or reading a book, children always find ways to fill their time.

However, extracurricular activities can channel that time in constructive directions, said Ron Cox, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension marriage and family specialist.

"Extracurricular activities help kids spend their time in positive ways and allow them to develop life skills they wouldn't easily obtain in other ways," Cox said.

Music, theatre, sports, debate and similar activities do an excellent job of keeping children occupied throughout the late afternoon and early evening hours until working parents can make it home.

These activities also serve as real-time labs where students can develop critical life skills such as leadership, teamwork and dealing with adversity.

"As an example, 4-H includes lots of service projects that give kids hands-on experience with helping others, generosity and self-sacrifice,"

Cox said. "There aren't a lot of places where kids can learn these types of lessons."

Turns out, extracurricular outlets also can have a positive effect on students' performance in the classroom as children active in outside activities post higher grades compared to those who are less involved.

Involvement in activities beyond academics also gives students a chance to connect with positive adult role models, something research shows comes with a slew of benefits.

"Students who have at least one other caring adult in their lives, in addition to a parent, tend to do better in several ways, such as academically,

socially and in terms of avoiding drug use and teen pregnancy," Cox said.

With plenty of extracurricular programs available through schools, community groups, churches and other organizations, families should be able to find activities that fit within their schedules and budgets as well as meet kids' interests.

"Start by allowing kids to experience a variety of activities and eventually allowing them to gravitate to the ones they most enjoy," Cox said. "Extracurricular activities can be incredibly important to kids growing into positive role models and contributing citizens of our state."

Even more unusual is the cool and wet August we are enjoying.

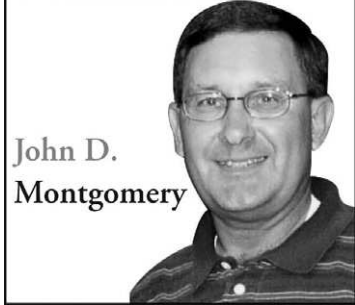
Folks in the far northwest are sweltering while we are getting welcome rainfall and temperatures up to 20 degrees lower than most days this time of year.

## NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

### Reaffirming American strength through sanctions

In recent years, the geopolitical landscape has dramatically shifted, with past threats re-emerging. After nearly a decade shying away from the world stage, hostile regimes feel emboldened and are threatening our safety and way of life.

As congressional investigations continue to look into the actions of bad actors around the world, Congress must take action to protect the safety and security of the American people.

In order to maintain stability and reassure our allies around the world, it is important to counter those who wish to undermine the United States and the values of democracy. That's why the House recently passed a sweeping package of new and updated sanctions against Russia, Iran and North Korea: H.R. 3364, the Countering America's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act.

Although the investigation is ongoing, there is strong evidence that Russia attempted to interfere in the 2016 U.S. election. In addition to penetrating our cyberspace, Russia has been a supplier and supporter for the Assad regime in Syria and a disruptor of peace and

stability in Europe.

As a response to its cyber attacks and its military aid to Syria, our legislation will impose strict and strong sanctions against Russia, with authorized funding of \$500 million over the next two years to combat Russian aggression on all fronts. It will target any persons or entities that have assisted with the cyber breach of our election system with economic sanctions, as well as keep the current executive sanctions that are already in place.

Furthermore, there are measures included to prohibit American companies from investing in energy projects that have significant Russian ownership. It also restricts participation of American companies from participating in some international projects.

In the Middle East, Iran has consistently posed a serious threat to our national security, and to stability in the surrounding areas. It is widely known that Iran has been a supporter and sponsor of terrorist activity, as well as maintaining a robust ballistic missile program.

Sanctions on Iran are nothing new, but the country has violated many of those through financial and weapons support of terrorism. This sanctions

package would expand existing sanctions and will weaken Iran's capability of financing and creating a weapons and missile program.

Lastly, our legislation broadens imposed economic and human rights sanctions on North Korea. Since February, the Kim Jong-un regime has tested 18 missiles, including two intercontinental ballistic missiles. This nation is a growing threat, and cannot be ignored.

The sanctions will carefully examine banks and trade organizations that have done any business with North Korea, and ensure that those who have supplied missile elements to them are punished.

Passed with overwhelmingly bipartisan support in both the House and the Senate, H.R. 3364 also restricts the President's ability to lift or weaken sanctions against Russia without consulting Congress.

The threats facing the world only grow stronger without significant pressure from America. Our national security must be our fundamental priority. Now that it is law and signed by the President, this is a significant first step to holding violators accountable and reaffirming the strength of the United States on the global stage.

## A construction update for Cleveland County

Anytime I travel the country, I make sure to tell people they'll never find friendlier folks than the ones who call Oklahoma home. But when I'm out and about in our great state, I always brag on the people of House District 20 specifically.

I'm confident no other representative has constituents quite as kind, understanding and patient. And when it comes to construction projects within our district, House District 20 residents are no different.

There are two big projects I'd like to update you on with some timelines. I know we've

been waiting a long time to see these things come to fruition, and I appreciate everyone's patience as we navigated our way through the red tape.

First off, bids for the Lexington rural water development project will open up on August 7. An agent from the USDA's Rural Development team will then evaluate whether we have enough money to begin the project.

If we need to secure additional funding, the agent will handle the paperwork. I'm hopeful we will be able to skip that step though so we can move straight to closing on a loan and signing a con-

tract with the company who receives the bid.

This is a large project, and there will be four contracts that go out to bid. If all goes as planned, I expect test holes will be drilled prior to October 1. The other contracts concern issues like water storage, building pipelines and constructing three water wells.

Everything is tentative, but those in charge believe the pipeline contract will take roughly one year to complete. Construction of the wells should only take six months.

I wiped off yonder egg, which my psyche felt should be slimy even if it wasn't, and put it in an incubator along with a few other eggs.

Given the close call, I surmised that the egg, which you and I named Egg, might be the Chosen One to lead turkeys to ascendancy over snakes and other ground-dwelling creatures.

Much has happened since then.

Rex the Snake and I encountered each other a few more times, but I began to warm up to him (if such is possible with a snake) when I discovered that he might be responsible for the decline in the pygmy rattler population around my place.

It may be a product of aging, but I find myself coming to terms more easily these days with past failings. They're done with and over and we can't change them, so we learn from them and try to be better.

## Knowing when to trust a bean dynasty

Bush's Best baked beans. You've had them. Probably on the Fourth of July and every other time you had something cooked on a grill. Maybe you're partial to the brown sugar hickory baked beans, the country-style baked beans or the original baked beans, which are made from a secret family recipe. No, really. It's the recipe Kathleen Bush used at home, introduced in 1969. Although the company is responsible for about 80 percent of the canned beans sold in the U.S. — \$400 million worth — it's still a family affair. The company got going in 1904 and it's still in Knoxville, Tennessee. Founder A.J. Bush's sons grew the company substantially, and in the 1960s, Claude Bush expanded the company in part through the purchase of canneries. One of those was the Hyde Park Canning Company in Muskogee.

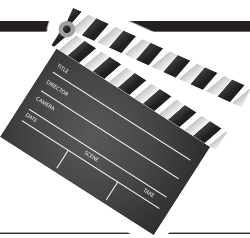
The company hit a snag this week when they discovered that some of their 28-ounce cans might have a defective seam. That would allow air into the can that could cause the beans to spoil or become contaminated. The company did what any responsible enterprise would do: It recalled the bad cans of beans and warned the public.

I was dismayed that within an hour or so of the announced recall I got a press release from one of Bush's few competitors. "As beans are an essential part of most of our diets, we can only assume this raises major concerns for many," the press release said. It went on to extol the virtues of their own plastic packaging. "Understandably, in the wake of all of the recent controversy, it is hard to not be skeptical when it comes to the food we consume — especially when it comes to beans," it ominously warns. "However, consumers need to know that there are brands out there that they can trust."

I am inclined to trust the company that's been reliably canning beans and a few other things for the past 113 years. But I don't particularly trust the company that rushes to capitalize on its

Iris began to feel the ache in her legs as the congregation sang their third "praise song" of the morning. "Don't Lutherans ever sit?" she mumbled to herself.

Iris thought back to Fryerson's final letter which began, "Dear Editor: If other citizens had suffered the way I've suffered, thanks to our chief of police and mayor, they would have left this town a long time ago. As for me, I will stay as long as I have breath in my body."

Yes, the movie focuses on a couple bad cops, but it also takes the time to feature the good ones as well.

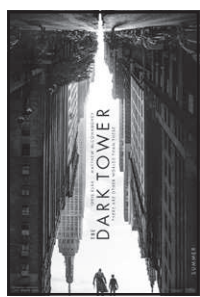
Most importantly though, the film shows how it only takes a few bad actors to escalate a situation from horrible to tragic. If anything, that's what this whole movie is about. Escalation.

Two sides feeling so threatened and backed into a corner that they lash out at each other. Each blow escalating the conflict until it boils over.

If you couldn't tell, this movie made me think and reflect quite a bit. If that isn't the mark of a great film, I don't know what is.

Please I urge you, if you can stomach the violence, see this movie. It's powerful, it's important, and even 50 years later, there's much to learn from this tragedy.

"Detroit" is rated R.



First up is "Detroit."

Set during 1967 Detroit Riot, this film is centered around the Algiers Motel incident, a police

raid that lead to the torture and murder of three black men.

Holy crap, what a film to start the weekend off with.

As you might guess from the description, this is not a happy-go-lucky flick where you'll walk out of the theater skipping and wearing a smile on your face. In fact, considering how this film had me sobbing by the end of it, I'd say it's the exact opposite.

But while it may not be pleasant, this is a powerful movie focusing on some truly horrifying historical events.

As someone who wasn't alive during the 1960s and as just a guy who's lived a pretty sheltered life in general, it's hard to believe these events actually happened in the United States.

Sure, I know there's been incidents like Ferguson fairly recently, but those don't hold a candle to the long hot summer of 1967.

That's the first thing that struck me while watching this movie. This isn't a war zone in some third world country, this is a city in the U.S.A. on fire, patrolled by National Guard with machine guns and tanks. Tanks!

That's only the setting though.

This film does an amazing job of bringing to life the people involved in this terrible incident.

Everything, from the writing to the performances are brilliant across the board and I was invested in everyone involved even before the actual events at the Algiers Motel.

It's the way this movie's shot that really sucked me in though.

The film almost has a documentary feel to it, not only in the cinematography, but in how it blends real historical video with movie footage.

Most of the film is shot in a disjointed, almost hectic handheld style with the camera panning and zooming nearly constantly. Normally I hate this type of camerawork, but here in this film it somehow works.

Actually, not only does it work, it adds a massive amount to the overall sense of the movie and makes the film feel much more personal.

Plus, unlike other movies featuring a shaky camera, I never once felt lost during the chaos. Bravo to the filmmakers for that.

To be clear, this isn't a movie whose only purpose is to harp on the evils of police officers and espousing the virtue of black people. The film starts off by showcasing mass looting for goodness sake.

Next up I saw "The Dark Tower."

Based on the Stephen King book series of the same name, this film follows Jake Chambers (Tom Taylor), an 11-year-old boy with visions of a man in black (Matthew McConaughey) on a distant world attempting to destroy a dark tower that protects the universe from destruction, as well as a gunslinger (Idris Elba) who seeks to stop him.

His visions prove to be true when Jake finds himself swept up in a battle of good and evil with the fate of all worlds in the balance.

You know, I actually was kind of looking forward to this movie.

I've heard so much praise for the book series. Some people I know even say it's King's best, which is impressive considering his body of work.

I may even have to check out the books for myself one day. Hopefully they're better than this boring, confusing mess of a movie.

To be fair, the universe the film is set in is kind of interesting. It's just so poorly fleshed out though.

It's like the movie starts in the middle of the story and doesn't bother explaining who anyone is or why any of this is happening. The Man in Black and the Gunslinger are supposed to be in this ongoing battle and apparently have a massive history with each other.

Shame we didn't get a movie about that. Nope, we just get a single blurry flashback and a bunch of boring dialog telling us about it.

It doesn't help that most of the film is shown from the perspective of the 11-year-old kid. Not that he's an especially bad actor, but he's just not a very good one either. He's particularly terrible during any kind of emotional scene.

I don't get it. They have award winning actors like Matthew McConaughey and Idris Elba, but nope, they decide to focus the story on the kid. Why?

Also, for a movie based on an epic series like The Dark Tower, this movie is remarkably short. Only an hour 35 minutes long.

Honestly though, I'm glad it wasn't any longer. With as boring as the film was, I'd hate to see what the people behind this movie would do with an extra hour. Probably more talking about cool stuff that happened in the past we'll never see.

To the movie's credit, it does pick up towards the end and the film finishes on a decent action scene. The filmmakers never got around to giving me a reason to care about any of the characters though. Why should I worry about the destruction of

the universe when I don't like anyone in it?

I don't know. Maybe you'll get more out of this film if you read the books? Supposedly this movie is intended to be a sequel to the 7th book in the series. That'd explain why the plot didn't make a lick of sense.

Everyone else would probably be better off watching something a bit more exciting, like paint drying.

Last this week I saw "Kidnap."

A typical day at the park turns into a nightmare for single mother Karla Dyson

(Halle Berry) when her young six-year-old son is kidnapped.

Not having time to wait for the police, this mom sets off in hot pursuit of the kidnappers, stopping at nothing to rescue her son.

I don't think I've ever seen a movie quite like this.

You know how superhero movies are wish fulfillment experiences for kids? Films where extraordinary people do amazing things you could only dream of doing yourself in real life?

That's what this movie is, except instead of for kids, this film is a pure wish fulfillment experience for moms.

And it's a pretty poorly made one at that.

The story in the movie is about as bare bones and straightforward as you can get. Boy gets kidnapped, super mom stops at nothing to rescue her kid, kidnappers are ugly and also over-the-top white trash caricatures, so they're easy to hate.

It's like something out of an old fashioned Saturday morning cartoon.

Not that there's anything wrong with that. Simple premises are made into great movies all the time. It's just been a while since I've watched a film with zero subtlety.

With the exception of Halle Berry, performances in this movie are terrible all around. Luckily, the film barely has anyone else speak, so that worked out in the end.

In fact a large chunk of the movie is basically a one woman show. The film dishes out monologue after monologue from Berry by herself, sitting behind the wheel of her minivan.

Her dialog wasn't poorly performed, but the constant talking to herself started to wear on me after the third or so speech. I guess it saved me from hearing any of the other actors try to perform at least.

Those are all minor gripes in the end though.

In fact, I may have even had a good time if it wasn't for the film's obnoxious and all around terrible editing.

This is easily some of the worst editing I've ever seen in a movie.

It's like the editor went out of his way to make the action as confusing and hard to follow as humanly possible.

Anytime something dramatic happens, the camera cuts to Berry's face, then maybe a super closeup of her van, followed by an even closer closeup of the kidnapper's car, and maybe back to Berry's face for a reaction shot.

All that happens in the span of about two seconds in quick flashes and repeats every single time there's any kind of action on the screen.

The editing alone takes what

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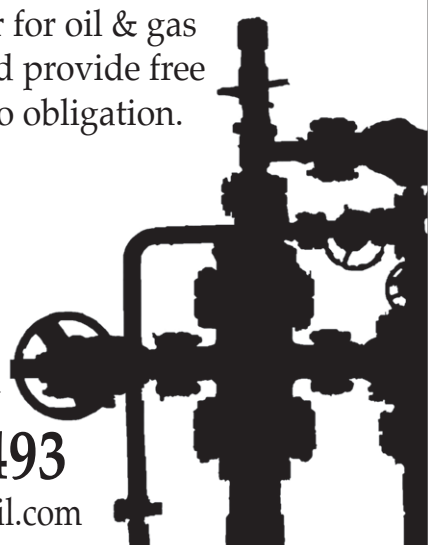

the facility, which will mirror the company's shop in Fort Wayne, Ind.

Troxel said the business is family-owned and operated.

Trucks ranging in size from half-ton to two-ton are rented short term to "top tier" contractors in the areas of construction, electrical, oil and gas, government and wind/solar.

Premier also handles UTV and trailer rentals, as well as a wide range of add-ons such as trailer hitches and bumper guards.

"It's great you want to bring business to Purcell, but why this piece of land?" Fishburn asked.

Troxel said several parcels of land were considered, but the Chandler Road property met all of Premier's requirements—exposure to I-35, right size and right location (easy access to Texas).

Former mayor John Chilvers, who lives in the neighborhood, spoke for the protesters.

He questioned whether Chandler Road can handle heavy vehicle weights.

The city's maintenance supervisor, Tommy Mize, said the road was recently upgraded and handles daily runs by two McClain County semis which haul 25 tons each, as well as four county-owned dump trucks, each with loads between 18 and 20 tons.

Those trucks make "four to six" trips a day on Chandler Road, Mize said.

Troxel said the majority of trucks leaving Premier will be three-quarter ton pickups.

"There will be maybe 15 trucks in and out daily," he continued.

In addition, he said, Premier operates 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Chilvers wasn't swayed, charging Premier would "bring semis into our neighborhood."

"We don't want to see light industrial across the road from us," he said, suggesting the company "go to Wayne and buy land there."

McCurdy picked up Chilvers' argument that the proposed land use would spoil the city's plans to turn the lake into Purcell's focal point.

McCurdy noted the city's long range plans call for a \$15 million investment in developing recreational opportunities around the lake.

But he said he will oppose spending anything on those projects if the zoning change was approved.

"It's a quality of life aspect," he said. "This business I would love to have in Purcell, but the location bothers me. I'm willing to invest some money and help these guys find and buy some land."

McCurdy resigned his seat on the council Tuesday morning. The resignation was effective immediately.

Fishburn expressed concern

that the proposed land use will interfere with the existing R.V. park

Mandy Davis, chief executive officer of the Heart of Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce, brought the chamber's recommendation that the zoning change be approved.

She contacted the economic development director at the Fort Wayne chamber and was told Troxel and Premier are held in high regard in the city of 250,000.

"We'd be lucky to have him and his company in our town," Davis said.

Cox asked for a show of hands from residents in the packed council chambers who opposed the zoning change. Nearly everyone raised a hand.

But when he asked for a show of hands from residents who attended the planning commission meeting to protest Premier's request, all but two or three hands came down.

"These guys are ready to pull the trigger and if we keep putting them off, they will go to another town and pull that trigger there," Cox said.

"This could be opportunity to stay in Purcell and raise a family," one resident said in support of Premier. "From a young Purcell citizen, this looks like progress. I love the idea of progress coming to our town."

"I encourage you to think from the younger citizens' perspective. I see progress, growth and opportunity for years to come."

One homeowner in the neighborhood said she is in favor of the company's plans to build in Purcell.

"I welcome these guys," Norma VanWinkle said. "I don't think we can keep kicking businesses out of Purcell."

Council member Mike Pollok acknowledged the planning commission has the expertise to consider all implications before recommending a zoning change.

Herman Gray, the real estate broker handling the sale of the land to Premier, recalled another instance when residents' objections cost the city a new industry.

"This is not my first rodeo. You have a small group here," Gray told the council, "but how many people in town? The buyer of this property and the seller of this property want to do good for the city of Purcell. The opportunity is here."

Tim Johnson of Johnson and Associates is the engineer for the project.

Some residents said if the land is to be developed, they would rather see it turned to residential use.

Johnson pointed out that the current trend is to not locate residential development along interstates due to noise.

But if it were turned to residential, Chandler Road traffic would likely swell by 1,000 trips a day.

state Friday to keep DHS from removing the youngest from their care.

Both suspects are 37. There is an outstanding warrant from Murray County for Springfield's arrest on a charge of disposal of encumbered property, after a former felony conviction.

A spokeswoman with the Murray County Sheriff's Department said Tuesday they are awaiting word if Springfield will also waive extradition.

Burnett said a Cleveland County judge on Friday severed the couple's parental rights for 18-month-old Bracie Schivers at DHS request. The agency sought custody

of the toddler, who they believed was in danger due to her parents' reported drug use.

Schivers was served the judge's order when he went to DHS on Friday.

He reportedly told the DHS staffer he would surrender the girl at 5 p.m. at an address in eastern Cleveland County.

Burnett said when a social worker arrived to pick up the girl, no one was home.

The DHS contacted the sheriff's department and deputies began checking several addresses in Lexington and Purcell where the couple had been known to stay.

It became evident that they had fled with the toddler and three older siblings.

An Amber Alert was issued for Bracie at 1 a.m. Saturday.

In the wake of that, the judge granted an arrest warrant for Schivers on a complaint of kidnapping.

On Sunday morning, a law enforcement officer in Converse was running tags at a motel in Converse and got a hit on Schivers white Chevrolet pickup and the Amber Alert.

Both parents were taken into custody.

The children will be returned to Oklahoma and placed into DHS care.

Neither Schivers nor Springfield had been charged in Cleveland County District Court as of press time.

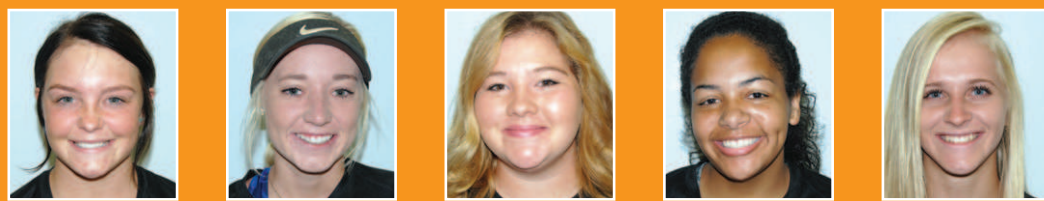

 Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation Veteran of the Week is Allen Hurst of Shawnee who served honorably during the Korean War. We appreciate Mr. Hurst for his service to our country. Each week we recognize a veteran by presenting a military cap and thanking them for their service.  
 Currently, we have several wheelchairs available as well as a hospital bed in good working order that we can provide to veterans who need them.  
 One of my favorite programs is presenting a donated car or truck to a veteran or their surviving spouse. Many of the veterans we help will purchase a new vehicle with the benefits received. This then allows them to donate their old one to our organization.  
 The remodeling of our new home is almost complete. We are hoping to be able to move our services there in the next few weeks. The electricians from Waters Electric are working long hours so that we will have 25 work stations.  
 Last week 240 veterans and surviving spouses were helped with their claims. Hopefully, the move to 1268 North Interstate Drive will allow us to help more veterans and their families.  
 It seems like word of our services is getting out because we had 32 veterans from Norman last week who were assisted with VA applications.  
 One of the surviving spouses we have been working with has been denied for DIC because the VA states she can't prove he was in Vietnam. He had applied for service connection of a disease that was presumptive to military service and was denied several years ago. When preparing to appear for a scheduled video hearing in Muskogee next week, we found a DD-214 that stated the veteran served in Vietnam after 1964. This document was in his VA claims folder at the VA Regional Office in Muskogee from the date the veteran filed his claim for VA benefits based on exposure to Agent Orange.  
 We filled out a VA Form 21-4138 identifying the evidence on his DD-214 and enclosed a copy. I requested a 100 percent rating for the veteran from the date he filed his original claim until his death and requested that DIC be awarded to the surviving spouse based on the fact that a Clear and Unmistakable Error had occurred due to the VA's failure to look at the veteran's DD-214. When VA

makes a decision on her appeal, I will give an update on the outcome.

Our volunteers who assist surviving spouses go the extra mile to help them to get approved for either DIC or pension benefits. Our lead surviving spouse specialist is Shirley, and she can be reached at (405) 361-9322 with any questions or concerns about spousal benefits.

When we move into the new facility, we would like to set specific days for our surviving spouse volunteers to review claims for benefits. Many times, the veteran's service-connected disability will be on their Death Certificate or an amended death certificate may be obtained listing their service connected disability as a contributing cause of death. As always, I encourage all veterans to apply for VA benefits.

Since becoming a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I have become the POA for over 16,000 veterans and surviving spouses. This enables me to receive and review each decision. The denied claims are the ones on which we spend the most of our time. Over the years I have found that if we provide the evidence needed a claim will be approved. To that end, we require evidence be sent in on all new applications for service connection of a disability.

When a veteran is already service connected for a disability, we can ask for a reevaluation of that condition one year from the date stamped on their last rating decision. Of course, if a service connected disability becomes more severe and the veteran has evidence in support, a reevaluation can be requested at any time. If a veteran's service connected disability requires surgery, and they will be incapacitated at least 30 days, a temporary 100 percent rating can be requested.

Last week we received the following rating decisions: Nine veterans were rated at 100 percent for a combined total of \$356,961 annually. Twenty-three veterans received a rating of 10-90 percent and they will receive a combined annual amount of \$396,885. We also had two surviving spouses awarded DIC and between the two of them they will receive \$30,191 yearly.

If you need transportation to visit us, we have two drivers. Clayton Lee can be reached at (405) 550-8806 extension 105 and extension 106 for Louie. These volunteers spent 62 hours transporting 19 passengers 826 miles just this week.

## Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Welcome, friends, to the "front porch."

For the next several months, the Lord willing, we will be teaching and studying together in the book of Romans on the first and third Sundays, at 10:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. We would love for you to join us.

In the early going, I have found Romans is more than a "theological" treatise but also a very practical discussion of how we should "think."

Paul longs to go to Rome personally, but he knows it may be several years before he can take that voyage. With an urgent message burning in his bosom, he sends his message by letter, stamped directly with the approval of the Holy Spirit.

You can hear the urgency in Paul's tone: Pay attention, Romans, he seems to be saying, you need to hear this! Your "thinking" has gotten out of whack, and you desperately need to get it straightened out.

In fact, it has gotten so bad, Paul is saying, that I have to ask: "What are you thinking, brethren? How have you gotten so confused?" And, today, I wonder if the great apostle might look at us and say, "By the way, brethren, what are you thinking?"

The apostle—as is his skilled manner—conditions the readers for his scathing rebuke by laying a gentle yet important foundation. He expresses his great love for this gospel that had joined them all together. He knows that gospel had reached down and rescued him from the road to hell years before and, as a result, made

him forever a debtor both to the Lord and to every man.

I am a "debtor" to all, he says, "both to the Greeks, and to the Barbarians, both to the wise, and to the unwise" (1:14).

It is there that he unveils his great thesis, one that flows from his pen as smoothly as a ship on still waters. "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ," he says, "for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek" (1:16).

Imagine the thrill the Romans feel as they hear that great thesis for the first time, the powerful theme that should be—must be!—at the heart of every preacher of the gospel.

Paul knows, though, that many there—including both the Gentile and the Jewish converts—have failed to understand the power of the gospel. And, more, they have failed to understand their vast debt to it!

The apostle understands that the minute any one of us forgets that we are nothing but extreme debtors to the Lord and to the gospel that our "thinking" is going to take a serious hit!

To make his point, Paul lays out the general purpose of the book of Romans: Brethren, he says, don't forget—no, not even for a minute!—that it is through the gospel alone and through faith that a man can get right with God. Putting our faith or confidence in any other means in an attempt to "get right with God" is futile! To the Gentiles he says:

Brethren, don't think you can get right with God while being attached in any form to the "unrighteous" deeds of the Roman world. No, the gross sins of the Gentiles will only incur the "wrath of God," not lead you into the peaceful shelter of "the righteousness of God"! (1:17-18). Do you want to be right, Gentiles? Then completely abandon every act related to these unrighteous behaviors. The "righteousness of God" comes from the purity of the gospel, nothing else.

And you Jewish Christians, he says: Don't think that you will be able to hand the Lord a long list of meritorious works on the day of Judgment and say, "Here we are Lord, this should do it." And don't think you are going to point the Lord to your distinguished pedigree, and say: "Lord, look at my heritage; consider, please, the Abrahamic blood I have flowing through these veins. That should be enough to get me through."

No, Paul says, the only power—the only "dunamis"—that will avail in saving our souls is the gospel of Christ. That includes both Jew and Gentile, you and me.

It is in this context that Paul—in the early words of Romans 2—takes his classic approach to get his point across, saying, "Really, brethren, what are you thinking?"

We will watch Paul lower his gavel to these Jews in our visit next week... here on the "front porch."

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

Last weekend we celebrated the Feast of the Transfiguration, when Jesus was revealed in a special way on the mountaintop. The first reading of the day was from the book of Daniel, an apocalyptic reading of a vision that was seen by the book's hero. This book comes at the end of the Old Testament and is an example of apocalyptic literature, a genre of writing that was common from ~200 B.C.E. to 100 C.E.

These writings were full of dramatic, vivid imagery—dreams and visions—and were meant to encourage a people who were undergoing persecution—real persecution. As such, it is difficult to understand for many of us who are not being actively persecuted for our faith.

But the Transfiguration of Jesus, followed by prediction of his passion, is very relevant to the experience of many of us. Peter's journey of faith was a roller-coaster of emotions. He had just finished confessing that Jesus was the Christ, the Messiah for whom they had all been waiting. Immediately then Jesus predicted his passion and Peter protested. Jesus' response was "Get behind me, Satan. You are thinking not as God thinks, but as man thinks." (Matthew 16-17).

The beauty of the religious experience on the mountaintop was then followed by another prediction of the passion. What was Peter to think? He was slowly but surely learning how to "think as God thinks", that is, the cross and the glory seem always to go together.

In many of our lives, a big event, such as a marriage commitment is followed by a time of disappointment. Perhaps the

marriage doesn't live up to the hype and high expectations of the wedding. Idealism can be a positive thing, but often it is not grounded in reality and awareness of the imperfect nature of people in our world, including our own selves.

In this case, if a marriage fails, then guilt and shame become two constant companions. Guilt is the result of making a choice among several options, and understanding how that choice has affected the people around you. You are still in relationship with those people, and very much aware of how your decision has hurt them. Shame is more destructive. It strikes at the core of our identity and deems the self to be unworthy.

If this happens there are several things to keep in mind to maintain Christian hope. First, have someone in your life who you will allow to be honest—a good friend, counselor, or minister. Let them remind you that there is more to your life than your own guilt and shame, that you have both weaknesses and gifts. It is good for someone to be a mirror to you.

Secondly, stay connected to something that is enduring and long-lasting—the sacraments of the Church. Stay connected to a faith community in which you will constantly hear the message of Good News, of God's love. Such is the antidote to shame.

And finally, don't take yourself too seriously. Don't expect your marriage or your spouse to be perfect. It never is, and no one promised that to you. Relax into your vocation.

In the end, there is always hope. The same Apostle Peter, reflecting back on the events

of Jesus' life, could say again: "This is my Son, my beloved, with whom I am well pleased." We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven while we were with him on the holy mountain. and so, we profess this prophetic message... You will do well to be attentive to it, as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts." (2 Pt. 1:16-19)

All of us—but especially those who deal with the guilt and shame of divorce and disappointment—will do well to listen to the Beloved Son of the Father.

The Vigil Mass for the Feast of the Assumption will be celebrated on Monday, August 14, at 7 p.m.

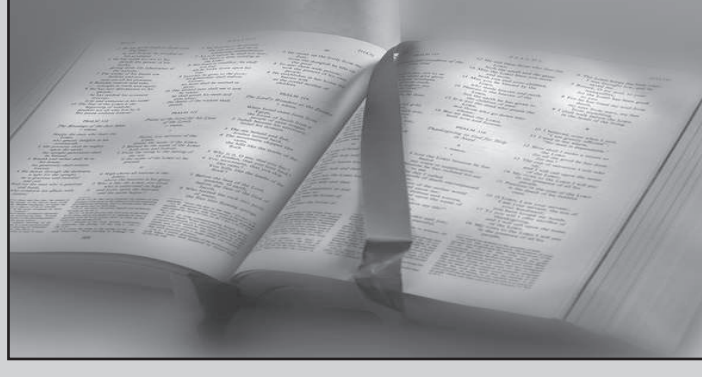

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
