Purcell's City Council approved the demolition of the defunct city swimming pool at its regular monthly meeting Monday night at the Community Room of the Police Service Building.

In the absence of mayor Ted Cox, vice mayor Danny Jacobs directed the meeting with Mike Pollok, Graham Fishburn and Tom McCurdy present.

The city received three bids to raze the pool with the city accepting the low bid of \$66,607 from the firm K&K Wrecking.

Other bids were submitted by MidwestWrecking(\$107,570) andM&MWrecking(\$79,322). The council was assured by

Hit and run turns DEADLY

Police continue investigating July 3 accident

What was initially being investigated as a hit-andrun accident has taken a tragic turn.

Purcell Police were called to the scene late Monday night on South Green Avenue at West

Huron Street where they found a male juvenile who had been struck by a vehicle.

The juvenile, who was transported to Children's Hospital in Oklahoma City, has been identified

as 13-year-old Rafael Garcia-Andrade of Purcell.

Officials at Children's confirmed to The Purcell Register the youth died early Wednesday morning at the hospital. He had completed the seventh

applying pasture herbicides at a different time of year or by an alternative method of delivery? Many times our busy spring schedule makes it hard to get around to spraying weeds during the early part of May as currently recommended.

Early May can also be one of the windiest times of year making many days if not weeks unsuitable for spraying. There are options available now that legally allow you to try to control broadleaf weeds with a pre-emergent treatment in March.

There are also different delivery methods available such as incorporated in granular fertilizer or with liquid fertilizer.

A herbicide demonstration plot was established this year to demonstrate the effectiveness of these non-traditional methods or times of application.

Independence Day has always been one of my favorite national holidays. From the parades, the cookouts, the flags and fireworks, and the outpouring of national pride and patriotism, it's simply a great day to celebrate with family, friends and community.

But it's also a time to reflect on our nation's Founding Fathers and documents, and to give thanks to providence for giving us the privilege of living in the greatest country in the world.

Work remains to be done after challenging session

With a nearly \$900 million budget gap, this session was indeed one of the most challenging. Keep in mind, it comes on the heels of having to deal with a \$1.3 billion budget gap last year – the largest budget hole in state history.

It hasn't been easy dealing with these ongoing significant budget challenges we face. It is definitely not an ideal budget. But we did prevent draconian cuts to critical services and kept government from shutting down.

Despite challenging circumstances, we were able to fund core mission services such as education, health and human services, and public safety.

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declared: "We hold these truths to be self evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with unalienable rights, that among them are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness."

The document in which these immortal words were contained was the Declaration of Independence - which, together with the Constitution, are the bedrock upon which the nation was founded. This document was drafted by "The turned out to be equitable.

Unfortunately, we missed an opportunity to reform our budget process - to address structural imbalances in the budget, fix problematic tax policies, and access more recurring and stable revenue. All topics I have repeatedly warned about; topics that do not go away just because we wish they would.

It's also disappointing the budget didn't include a teacher pay raise, but there were some members who refused to vote on a number of revenue ideas that would have helped pay for a teacher pay raise.

It was hard to get a budget done, forcing legislative leaders to rely on passing measures that produced revenue that required only 51 percent approval instead of the 75 percent majority required for tax increases.

About \$500 million of one-time funds were used in this budget, which means we're going to start out the next year with a shortfall of that amount. As a result, it will be another difficult year - plus add in that it's an election year and we know it will be nearly impossible to pass revenue measures.

So there is much work still to do to fix these structural issues that undermine our budget year after year. It is why I have emphasized smart reforms in areas from government accountability and efficiency to criminal justice - an ongoing top priority for me as many of my bills were held up in the Legislature this year.

I am disheartened we didn't get more of the criminal justice bills passed into law. A lot of people worked very hard on these recommendations.

We can do better in dealing with nonviolent offenders who have mental health conditions or who are addicted to drugs or alcohol by pursuing appropriate treatment, rather than felony prosecution and long-term incarceration.

Oklahoma has the second-highest imprisonment rate in the country. By 2018, we will have the highest incarceration rate in the country.

One of the bills that was held up this session was House Bill 2281. It included important sentencing changes to low-level property crimes, and would have had a particularly important impact on our female prison population. Without jeopardizing public safety, with these bills, we could have implemented smart, data-driven solutions to safely and prudently fix our criminal justice system. I will continue to work with lawmakers on this important topic, which I have strongly advocated during the past three legislative sessions.

On a bright note, lawmakers approved a fix for REAL ID compliance, reduced the revenue bleeding for overly general wind tax credits, and passed an oil and gas long lateral bill,

Our overuse of pain medication threatens our health

For years, Americans overestimated the benefits of opioids and underestimated the risks. • Since 1999, the amount of prescription opioids sold in this country has nearly quadrupled.

•Also since then, deaths from prescription opioids have more than quadrupled.

• Every day, 91 Americans die from an opioid overdose.

Older adults are especially affected. About 2.7 million Americans 50 or older abused pain killers in 2015 when they took them for reasons or in amounts beyond what their doctors prescribed. Also, people 65 and older have had sharp increases in opioid-related hospital stays and emergency room visits.

No one is suggesting that someone undergoing surgery, recovering from an injury or having major medical problems should be denied pain medications.

But 236 million prescriptions were written for opioids last year in this country – enough to give every American adult a bottle of pain killers.

The federal government is also providing states with nearly a half-billion dollars for prevention and treatment programs.Anotherhalf-billion dollars in grants will follow next year.

As important as the federal partnerships with states and communities will be in addressing this nationwide menace, stemming the increase in opioid-related deaths will demand the attention of all of us.

That means not just government officials and health care professionals. It means anyone who may be needing some form of pain medication, as well as family members and friends.

If the owner or person in possession of any building, sign, fence, post, gasoline pump, driveway canopy, tree, shrub, or other thing or structure on any right-ofway of or upon any street fails to remove such structure or thing as provided in subsection (A) of this section after receiving at least ten (10) days' notice from the city manager, or his designee, to do so is guilty of an offense against the city and subject to a fine in accordance with Section 1-12, as amended. Every day the owner or occupant fails, refuses, or neglects to mow and keep mowed such vegetation after the expiration of the ten (10) days' notice shall be and is a separate offense.

Let's go over to what I will say is probably my favorite book of the Bible: the gospel of John. We'll be in John quite a bit during this "camp" time together, so I hope you'll get familiar with it.

It is in the ninth chapter that our Lord encounters a blind man who is sitting outside the city of Jerusalem begging for money or food.Jesus and his disciples have a discussion about the blind man when they walk up to him, and the blind man, no doubt, listens to their conversation with interest.

Then, when the discussion is over, Jesus turns to the man – this is John 9:6 - spits on the ground, makes clay of the spit, rubs the clay on the blind man's eyes, and gives an unusual but simple command: "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (v. 7). I have always been amazed

He could have said, "Sir, what good is it going to do me to go wash in a pool of water? Besides, I can get some water over here in this basin a few feet away. Why do I need to go all the way over there to the Pool of Siloam? It just seems silly to me that you would rub this mud on my eyes and ask me to do something like that?"

Even though you may be young in age, you understand fully that this is the way many people think. Parents: you and your children can have a good discussion right here about that attitude. At some point, Lord willing, we will talk about a man who responds to the Lord just about that way.

As far as faith is concerned, we understand that a response like that one would demonstrate a serious lack of faith. Whatever faith is, we know it is not that!

Aren't you glad today, though, that the blind man does not say those things! Instead, he does something truly amazing. Listen to how the apostle John records it:

"He went his way therefore,

No, he goes. He just goes, without even a word, and he washes his eyes in the pool of Siloam.

Now, front-porch friends, we have just seen faith. A man can talk about faith, and he can try to put faith on a scale and measure and tell you how much he has inside of him; but if you want to know what faith is and know what faith does, you don't have to go any further than this blind man!

What we learn is something the world, generally, has a hard time understanding. It is a simple thing, really: Faith obevs!

Faith that sits and thinks about it without acting is not true faith.

Faith that needs a dissertation so we can fully weigh the pros and cons of what the Lord says is not faith.

Faith that has to understand all about it before it acts is not faith, either.

Faith is obedience. It is doing what the Lord tells us to do.

I believe our volunteers know more about VA benefits than any volunteers in Oklahoma.

As a VA Accredited Claims Agent, I receive all of the rating decisions on the men and women who are represented by us. This allows us to know what it takes to best help each person to receive VA benefits. From these decisions, I know

rectly or if we need to send in more evidence to support the veterans' or spouses' claim for benefits. Last week I received more than 100 rating decisions on the veterans and spouses who are represented.

Of that number, there were 14 veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. They will receive an annual combined amount of \$55,012 per year. Forty-three veterans received a disability rating from 10-90 percent for their serviceconnected disabilities. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$543,520. We had two surviving spouses approved for DIC or Pension benefits based on their veteran's military service. They will receive an annual combined benefit of \$30,191 per year.

Some more information that might be of interest to you concerns a re-evaluation of a service-connected disability one year from the date stamped on the top of their rating decision. Another way to seek review of a disability rating occurs when a service-connected condition becomes more severe, evidence in support allows a request for re-evaluation if that request is made before the expiration of one year from the date stamped on the last rating decision.

One of the easiest ways to receive an increase is to ask your medical provider to fill out a VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire and attach it to VA Form 21-526EZ. We have the required DBQ forms, or you can print one from the VA website at www.va.gov. There are many ways to increase your VA ratings.

If your service-connected disability has increased in severity and requires surgery or treatment that incapacitates you for over thirty days, this should be addressed. You may file for a temporary 100 percent rating during convalescence. Please remember if your service-connected disability has improved your VA rating may be reduced when re-evaluated.
