Injury rollover

Lex man airlifted to Texas hospital

A Lexington man was air evacuated to a Denton, Texas, hospital Monday after he was injured in a rollover wreck on I-35.

Robert T. Bousquet, 50, suffered back injuries and was reported in good condition on Tuesday.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Austin Ludwyck reported Bousquet was driving a 2015 Toyota RAV4 southbound on the interstate when the vehicle ran off the left side of the highway, struck an embankment, overturned and caught fire.

The wreck occurred at 3:20 p.m. near mile marker 44, approximately three miles north of Springer.

Bousquet wasn't wearing a seat belt, according to Ludwyck.

The cause of the wreck remains under investigation.

Assisting Ludwyck at the scene were Troopers Colton Robertson, Mike Shanholtzer and Chris Earnhart, Springer and Davis Fire Departments, Southern Oklahoma Ambulance Service, Lighthouse Police and Air Evac.

Bosse stay

AG wants Bosse case to remain in state court

The Oklahoma Court of Criminal Appeals granted a 45-day stay of the state's case against death row inmate Shaun Bosse, while the attorney general's office prepares to file a petition with the U.S. Supreme Court.

Attorney general Mike Hunter said the April 15 ruling means Bosse will stay in

state custody on Oklahoma death row, rather than be transferred to federal custody as previously mandated by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Hunter is arguing the state should have jurisdiction over Bosse, a non-Indian who murdered a Chickasaw family, and other non-Native

Americans even if the crimes were committed on tribal reservation lands.

"I want to commend Solicitor General Mithun Mansinghani and Assistant Attorney General Caroline Hunt for their exceptional

1991 swept tornado alerts into digital age

The Kid’s early TV magic included fun, fascinating shows, and weather bulletins when heavy storms started rumbling nearby. He knew to act fast when warnings showed where and when violent storms would hit and how to stay safe.

It was different for his parents or grandparents. TV or radio warnings then could be late or incomplete. Stations broadcast “all clear” just before a hidden monster devoured whole communities.

Disaster hit Udall, Kansas, in 1955 because radar lost the twister’s hook. Forecasters thought it was waning. Udall folks went to bed. The F5 tornado hit minutes later, killing more than 80 people in Kansas’s deadliest tornado.

New hope dawned April 26, 30 years ago. Forecasters unveiled two new radar technologies, activated early because grim indicators foretold of incredibly widespread violent weather the week of April 22, 1991. They pinpointed the most dangerous of the 55 tornadoes April 26 across six states from Texas to Nebraska, saving untold lives.

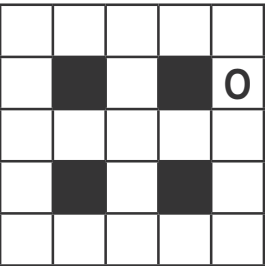
Federal forecasters, testing a new radar called NEXRAD, could identify hidden rotation. Because of the April 26 severe storms, forecasters activated it early.

They warned that a tornado would hit McConnell Air Force Base at 6:29 pm and Andover, Kansas about 6:40 pm.

Just as forecast, an F-5 tornado (the strongest category) struck Andover, killing 17, far fewer than the 80 who perished in Udall 36 years before. The McConnell warning allowed the B1B bomber fleet to be kept safe.

That same day, Tulsa TV forecaster Jim Giles and his team put another new system into service. Pathfinder radar showed the storm on TV along with its projected path and arrival time. It gave Oologah time to prepare as it tracked an F-4 tornado across NE Oklahoma. Damage exceeded \$60 million, but no one died.

Even modern warnings may provide just minutes to get inside before disaster hits. Don’t be in a car or on foot when it does.

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OMRF brain cancer study reveals clue for treating MS patients

A discovery by a scientist Foundation could be key to studying brain cancer at the improving multiple sclerosis Oklahoma Medical Research treatment.

OMRF scientist Rheel Town-er, Ph.D., is studying potential treatments for a deadly form of brain cancer. Towner discovered ELTD1, a protein key in producing new blood vessels, is present in aggressive tumors. In analyzing the genes of his brain cancer research models, he came across a pattern he recognized.

“A number of genes involved caught my eye,” said Towner.

Returns trail April 2020

This month the Oklahoma Tax Commission returned \$144,355,807 in sales tax revenue to municipalities across Oklahoma.

than a year ago.

Municipalities also received \$22,371,620 in a use tax disbursement.

Returned to counties was \$24,043,135 in sales taxes and

\$3,855,314 in use taxes.

The returns were based on sales from February 15-28 and estimated sales from March 1-15.

Composting proves good for gardening and reducing waste

One of the foundations of success when it comes to gardening is good soil.

For those who don’t have naturally nutrient-rich soil already, composting may be an answer that also reduces the amount of waste going to local landfills.

Compost is a natural, dark brown, humus-rich material formed from the decomposition or breakdown of organic material such as leaves, grass clippings, vegetable food scraps and twigs, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Extension consumer horticulturist.

“Not only is it a great addition

to your garden beds or pots, but also saves community waste-management resources because these things are now being composted instead of hauled to the landfill,” he said. “Compost can be used to improve soil structure, increase water-holding capacity of sandy soil, loosen clay soil and improve drainage, help with erosion control, mulch around landscape plants to retain moisture and more.”

Yard waste, especially grass clippings, typically are high in nutrient content. When composted, bacteria use air and water to break down plant materials into compost, which is great when applied as a mulch or used as a soil amendment.

Although commercial composting bins can be purchased, gardeners can make their own instead.

The easiest method is to make a pile of compost material in an out-of-the-way space in the landscape – the far corner of a yard, for example.

Another option is to build a confining structure about three to five feet in diameter and four feet tall. Hillock suggested using materials on hand such as concrete blocks, wire mesh, boards, old pallets or even old garbage cans with ventilation holes.

Gardens:

“Once the structure is put together, begin layering your green and brown materials. With spring in full swing, many people are in the process of cleaning up their yards and flower beds, so composting material should be plentiful,” he said.

Food scraps such as vegetable peels, eggshells, coffee grounds and tea leaves also can be used. Don’t use mate-

rials such as large branches, diseased plants, weeds that produce abundant seeds, pet or human waste, fatty foods and grease, meat, dairy products, bones or fish.

Hillock said alternating layers of materials helps ensure the correct carbon and nitrogen amounts required for decomposition. With water and air, bacteria and insects use the compost as a source of food

and energy. The process generates heat ranging from 140 to 160 degrees.

Aeration is done by turning the pile on a weekly basis. Be sure to wet the material thoroughly to begin, then sprinkle with water periodically.

The more turning, the more air the bacteria have available, making the composting process move more quickly.

When the temperature of the pile stays at ambient levels, even after turning, and the material is dark and crumbles easily, the process is done.

“Typically, it takes about four to six months to complete the process. If the compost pile is started now, you’ll have a great soil amendment ready when planting your fall garden,” he said.

MS:

“When we looked closer, we discovered several of them had close associations with multiple sclerosis, including ELTD1.”

MS is a complex autoimmune disease in which the body’s immune system attacks its own healthy tissues and is a significant research area at OMRF. More than 3,000 MS patients receive treatment in OMRF’s Multiple Sclerosis Center of Excellence.

Towner took his findings to Bob Axtell, Ph.D., an MS researcher at OMRF. The pair combed through MS patient

data to look at gene signatures from brain and spinal cord damage from MS patients.

“Lo and behold,” said Axtell, “ELTD1 was higher in brains of patients with MS.” When they looked at animal models of MS with active disease, they again confirmed the protein was stimulated.

This discovery could lead to more precise clinical care for MS patients because of ELTD1’s involvement in the blood-brain barrier, a layer of cells inside blood vessels that protects the brain and spinal cord. A damaged or disrupted blood-brain barrier is thought

to be an early indicator of MS.

“The blood-brain barrier runs a tight ship under the right circumstances, opening to allow required systems to function efficiently,” said Towner. “But it has to remain closed or be impermeable to prevent infiltration from potentially harmful agents.”

Ultimately, ELTD1 may prove to be an important indicator for MS, signaling the stage of the disease and guiding treatment.

“There is great potential here to improve how we use the medications we already have,” said Axtell. “ELTD1

may prove to be an important marker for therapy, allowing us better strategies and timing of medications for improved patient outcomes.”

The researchers will now investigate how blocking ELTD1 could affect disease progression in different types of MS.

“This is a great example of the cross-pollination that can happen at OMRF,” said Axtell. “Dr. Towner’s findings are rooted in brain cancer research but could ultimately shift the treatment of another devastating disease.”

Regulations for Garage Sales

A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall for each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.

A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.

Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.

Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility poles or street signs, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.

All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale.

If you have any questions please call 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission please call them at (405) 521-3274.

Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.

Need to see what energy companies are leasing land and where...you guessed it.

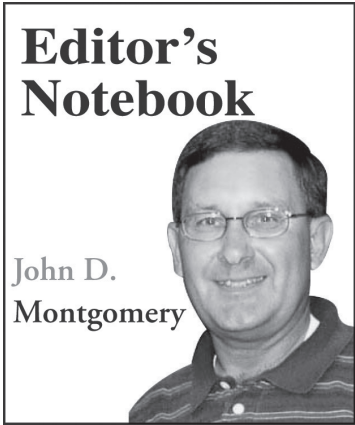
If you want to know the facts behind the social media gossip, buy a paper.

Update from the Capitol

A lot has been accomplished in our first 12 weeks with more coming. This Thursday is the deadline to report bills from the opposite chamber off each floor. We're working through the final 200 House bills, having approved around 125 last week.

Among the bills that aren't subject to this week's deadline are redistricting and appropriations measures, which we will continue to work on in the coming weeks.

Also, any bills that both chambers like, but can't agree on language for, will be sent to a conference committee to try to finalize. We'll see many bills assigned to these joint committees soon. Each committee will look at the issue and the proposed amendments and try to come up with compromise language that they believe will

be agreeable to both chambers.

The bills will then go before the House and Senate for final consideration. If approved by both chambers, they move on to the governor's desk. If not, they're considered done for the session.

Three of my bills were sent to the governor's desk this past week. SB 208 modifies procedure related to declaring the father on a birth certificate to include the husband's name if the couple was married at the time of birth, or any time during the 300 days before the birth.

If the mother wasn't married at the time of birth or throughout the pregnancy, the father's name will show up if both the mother and father have signed an acknowledgement of paternity.

The bill further authorizes the State Commissioner of Health

to secure electronic commission of information necessary to comply with the Uniform Parentage Act or to assist with Department of Human Services (DHS) programs.

HB 1059 will help speed up the process of issuing and renewing commercial driver licenses (CDLs) in Oklahoma. It removes provisions that currently allow commercial learner permit holders to take a CDL knowledge and skills test without training.

This change reconciles state statute with federal law set to go into effect in 2022. The bill also authorizes local tag agencies to issue renewals, replacements, change of addresses, and downgrades of REAL ID compliant and non-compliant

Biden's overreaching budget outline

Earlier this month, President Biden released his discretionary spending outline for fiscal year 2022 – also known as a “skinny budget.”

Unfortunately, instead of addressing issues facing Americans right now, what was instead laid out consisted of a series of progressive wish list items and disturbing cuts in our national defense.

Since taking office, between executive orders and massive legislative packages, President Biden has signed almost \$2 trillion of new spending into law.

Not only would the spending levels requested in his budget irresponsibly add to the national debt, it would have severe consequences on our economy in the long-term. Indeed, there is no fiscal responsibility in this outline.

Domestically, the president's outline proposes too much spending on unnecessary programs and far too little on defense. Along with a 16 percent increase for domestic spending, the outline includes far-left programs such as an environmental justice initiative and billions of dollars for electric vehicles.

The truth is, we live in an uncertain world right now. As China, Russia and Iran build up their militaries and become increasingly more assertive, America cannot afford to stand still or cut back in terms of its own defense spending.

At a minimum, we need to see three to five percent in annual increases beyond the rate of inflation for defense spending over the next several years. By contrast, with inflation, the general overview the president submitted would be an effective cut.

Last week, President Biden also made the misguided decision to withdraw all U.S. troops from Afghanistan by Sept. 11, 2021. Certainly, this could ultimately lead to more attacks on Americans and other nations around the world.

The United States should be maintaining our military during times like these instead of withdrawing troops and showing signs of weakness in our enemy's eyes. The relatively small number of remaining troops in Afghanistan maintain important onsite capabilities which will be more difficult and costly to accomplish remotely, if possible at all.

It's also worth noting that even the troop deployment on Capitol Hill has been significantly larger this year than the number of those remaining in

Update on my bills

As the Legislature continues to hear, debate and vote on bills, I want to highlight where some bills I authored or coauthored are in the legislative process.

On Monday, the Senate unanimously approved House Bill 1015. The bill cleans up language regarding medical care reimbursement for inmates, since the current language references a fee schedule from 2007 that no longer exists.

Specifically, the bill removes exceptions to Department of Corrections' reimbursement requirements to health care providers for medical care and treatment for inmates retained in county jails.

Sen. Greg McCortney of Ada carried my bill in the Senate, and I'm thankful for his work to pass it through the chamber. The bill has now been sent to the Governor for consideration.

The Senate also passed a second bill I authored, House Bill 1014. The legislation was requested by the legal division at the Oklahoma State Department of Health. The bill prohibits the attendance of students who have a communicable disease in public or private schools.

It also provides that all information created, received, investigated, held, or maintained by the State Department of Health concerning any person who has participated in a public health investigation are exempt from the provisions of the Oklahoma Open Records Act.

Also approved this week by the Senate was House Bill 1902, which would allow safety plan monitors to seek medical treatment for a child in their custody.

Safety plan monitors are an agreed upon person between the parents and DHS during the course of an investigation.

Currently, there is no legal authority for a safety plan monitor to seek medical treatment for the child, even for a checkup. This was a request bill from a nurse practitioner in a child advocacy center, and I am very hopeful it will be signed by the Governor.

On the House floor, I presented Senate Bill 136, which amends the State Department of Health's reporting period for activities completed pursuant to the Oklahoma Breast and Cervical Cancer Act from annually to once every five years beginning Oct. 1, 2021.

The health department will continue to collect this data and make it available upon request, but they will only publish said data every five years.

It also changes language related to the content of the report from mandatory to permissive and requires that the report on funding detail revolving funds expended. The bill passed with 96 votes and has now been sent to the Governor.

We'll hear many more bills on the floor next week, so I encourage you to reach out to my office with any questions or concerns about legislation we may be considering!

Executive Orders - Part III

All Americans should be concerned about President Biden's recent executive order on gun control. Try to forget for a moment, if you can, whether you agree with Biden or not and try instead to focus on the procedure.

Biden is falling back on the two justifications that other presidents have used to skirt the Constitution, that Congress is not doing its job and that he is only following the will of the American people.

However, is that statement true? In some ways, yes. But, historically speaking, presidents were never supposed to represent the people's will and sometimes non-action is action.

First, let's look at the idea of representation. Does the president represent the will of the people? The answer is no. That was never the Founders' intention when creating the Constitution. Biden did win the presidency, but he only won the popular vote by 51.3 percent. In other words, he really only represents about half of the ideas of Americans.

Even if the percentage was much higher, he represents the nation as a whole, not the people individually. That is the job of Congress. Congress is made up of both parties proportional to the political ideologies of the people. Congress represents the will of the people. Even if your representative is from a different party, congressmen represent all Americans virtually, so your ideas are represented – unlike the president who only represents his party.

This is exactly how the Founders envisioned it, but without the parties. The Constitution was written so that the president did not represent the will of the people. If the Founders had wanted a popular vote to choose the president, they could have done so. Instead electors are chosen to vote for the president. Although the people elect the electors today, that was not the case when the nation first started.

The point of the Electoral College is to actually separate the people from the president. Congress is where there is a direct vote, at first only in the House, but today in both houses of Congress. When a president makes an executive order, that goes against Congress. In fact, he is actually fighting the will of the people, not representing it.

Secondly, should the president act if Congress refuses to do so? The answer is no. The Constitution says, "All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States." No second clause stipulates, "or with the president in times of inaction or if things do not go the president's way." This is American Government 101. Only Congress can make laws.

Thirdly, sometimes inaction is action. The president assumes that Congress is not doing its job if Congress does not pass the laws that he desires. All presidents who make this claim assume action is agreeing with them. In today's particular case about gun control, however, Congress is not acting because it can't. Though most Democrats support gun reforms, not all Democrats do.

In other words, Congress is not making new gun restrictions because it does not have the votes in the Senate to pass any legislation. The Democrats would need every vote, plus the vice-president to pass with a simple majority, let alone 10 Republicans votes to pass the filibuster. The Democrats have neither. There are some moderate Democratic senators who oppose the current gun control laws. In this case, the action is the Senate saying that it does not support current gun law proposals, which is different from the Senate doing nothing.

If the Congress, which represents the will of the people, decided against new laws and the president used an executive order to circumvent Congress to pass laws anyway, that makes the president a tyrant.

The Founders were scared of a tyrannical president when they wrote our founding document, hence they put in checks and balances. Bypassing Congress goes against the very fabric of the Constitution.

Now that we have addressed procedure, let's quickly address the content. We need some common-sense gun laws. The mass shootings need to stop. However, the fact that one man and his pen can make such an important decision by himself, and against the wishes of Congress, is the reason we have the Second Amendment to begin with.

It was an armed citizenry that revolted against a tyrant in 1776. The Founders wanted Americans to have that right if needed again.

Class A, B or C licenses, making the process more efficient for customers.

It further authorizes agents to review identification documents for REAL ID compliant and non-compliant CDL's and allows agents to issue a REAL ID compliant and non-compliant ID card to a customer even if their license is expired or suspended as long as they have an existing DPS driver license file.

Third Party Examiners (non-DPS CDL examiners) will be allowed to test anyone with a CDL permit. Finally, the bill removes the cap on fees des-

ignated examiners may charge to administer a Class D skills test. These important changes will go into effect upon the governor's signature.

HB 1902 provides that the safety plan monitor of a child who is under such a plan with DHS may, if the child's parent is unavailable, authorize medical or dental treatment or examinations, which are necessary for the child's well-being.

In other news, we approved two extremely important bills for all Oklahomans. They address the \$4.5 billion in energy costs our state sustained during the historically low tempera-

tures in February.

We were given an example that if a utility customer typically receives a \$100 monthly bill that without legislative action, they could have seen their bill jump to around \$2,000 the first month, followed by around six months of slowly tapering bills.

This was simply not an option for Oklahomans, and the Legislature is taking action to spread out those energy costs and help monthly bills increase by only a few dollars on average based on individual customer's usage.

The Attorney General is also

continuing his investigation into price gouging and any possible market manipulation. If he finds anything, those recovered funds will be used to pay down the state's overall energy bill, further helping lower the impact to customers.

However, the fact is, when it comes to federal government spending, presidents propose but Congresses dispose, and President Biden's proposed

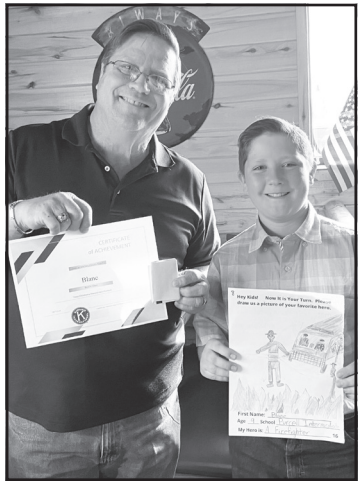
budget outline is very likely to be changed by Congress.

Cheesy Corn & Pasta Soup with Ground Beef

6 oz. macaroni
1 lb. ground beef
1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

1 medium onion, chopped
1 medium red or green bell pepper (or a combination), chopped

1 can (10 3/4 ounces) condensed cheddar cheese soup
4 ounces (1 cup) shredded cheddar cheese

3/4 cup milk
1 envelope (1 ounce) taco seasoning mix

Kosher salt, to taste
Freshly ground black pepper, to taste

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water following package directions.

In a large skillet over medium heat, brown the ground beef in the olive oil with the chopped onion and bell pepper. Cook while stirring until ground beef is no longer pink. Drain grease.

Add the cheese soup, shredded cheese, milk, and taco seasoning mix. Taste and add salt and pepper, as needed.

Stir in the hot drained pasta.

Variations:

Add sour cream to the finished cheeseburger macaroni mixture or serve it with sour cream on the side.

Add minced jalapeño peppers to the ground beef mixture along with the onions and bell pepper.

Replace the cheddar cheese soup with a can of condensed Fiesta Nacho Cheese Soup.

Brent Greenwood recently completed work on a mural in Sulphur intended to champion the Define Your Direction campaign and its impact on area youth. The mural is located on the wall of the 3rd & Broadway boutique in Sulphur.

Brent Greenwood makes another mark in downtown Sulphur

New mural aims to inspire young people

Chickasaw artist Brent Greenwood put the finishing touches on a new mural on the north wall of the “3rd & Broadway” boutique in downtown Sulphur March 27.

Greenwood said the painting is an engaging way to enrich the community with beauty and meaning. In this case, the meaning is expressed with contemporary imagery, and centered around family and Chickasaw cultural values.

“This mural is open for interpretation while having intent,” Greenwood said. “I wanted to reinforce the positive impact that the Define Your Direction (DYD) campaign is making in the area; instilling pride in oneself and community.”

The mural is easily spotted by those strolling downtown. Greenwood said he thinks having both of his Sulphur murals facing the downtown plaza stage adds to the overall aesthetic of the area.

“It adds a nice colorful vibe, while complementing the nostalgic downtown feel,” he said.

DYD made this mural possible and its message is at the heart of it.

DYD is a campaign and movement inspiring teens and young adults to be leaders in their communities while living healthy lifestyles. The aim is to steer them toward positive futures, and away from underage drinking and prescription drug abuse.

“By educating teens and

young adults about the dangers of both subjects, we are creating a generation of students eager to participate in their communities, live healthy lives and be positive role models,” the group’s direction statement reads.

DYD’s listed goals are to inspire leaders, raise awareness, educate individuals, provide resources and change attitudes. Greenwood kept these goals in mind while designing his mural.

That’s how he decided to focus on family and Chickasaw values.

The mural features a young Chickasaw looking over their shoulder to see their family in a field of flowers cheering them on. Swirls of wind and color fill the upper portion of the mural. Tribal water designs flow through the bottom portion.

“I always want to embody energy and movement through my process. From the swirling sky, which is on both murals, to the contemplative youth and traditional Southeastern references.”

Greenwood explained that while reflecting on family, the contemplative youth reinforces hope, smart decisions and pride in one’s self. The youth is a blend of graffiti styled traditional and contemporary—as depicted by a swan headdress, shell necklace and facial marking, but also a pair of headphones.

Reflecting the purpose of the mural, the youth’s shirt displays the DYD logo.

In addition to expressing what

DYD is all about, Greenwood said, as a personal goal, he hopes this public piece fosters a deeper appreciation of art for those who stop by and take it in.

DYD is grant-funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration in collaboration with the Chickasaw Nation and Southern Plains Tribal Health Board.

More information can be found at DefineYourDirection.com. This includes free resources to use when talking to teens about prescription drug abuse and underage drinking.

To sneak a peek of Greenwood’s mural, pedestrians and drivers can find the boutique on 3rd St. between West Broadway Avenue and Muskogee Avenue. It is a stone’s throw away from his previous Sulphur-based mural on the side of Mahota Studios.

The boutique is owned and operated by a trio of ladies, including young Chickasaw entrepreneur Madeline Jack and her Choctaw mother Julie Jack.

“We are excited about it! It adds a lot of color,” Madeline Jack said.

0and Oklahoma City University.

His artistic journey with the Chickasaw Nation began more than 20 years ago as a tribal artist.

He started teaching at the Chickasaw Arts Academy in 2013 and was appointed Chickasaw Nation Director of Fine Arts in 2017. He now facilitates the Chickasaw Arts Academy and other programming, including arts education, outreach, workshops and student initiatives.

“I’ve been able to employ what I’ve learned over the years. We have a lot of budding young artists that just need some direction, and I know exactly where they are coming from, because I was there too,” he said.

He also maintains work as an independent artist on commission. Even early in his career as a rural letter carrier with the U.S. Postal Service serving as a means to pay bills, he worked as an artist.

“I consider myself an artist first. That’s my passion. That’s

what I love to do. That’s always going to be there,” he said.

He is known for more than his murals. His figurative works in vibrant acrylic paints are a staple among his creations, but he also is known for his ledger, printmaking and mixed media art. His originals and prints adorn numerous tribal facilities and even have been applied to a Pendleton blanket sold exclusively at the Chickasaw Cultural Center in Sulphur.

As for his mural work and student mentorship, Greenwood said there are always new plans and tempting walls. He hopes to spark creativity in those who view public art as well as his students.

“Public art engages the community. It encourages and fosters the arts. It enhances the community, it spawns other projects, it leads to beautification. It’s a visual expression for the community in a public setting,” Greenwood said. “It’s free. It’s not in a museum. You don’t have to pay to see it. It’s there if you want to see it. That’s what makes public art so great.”

Teller III Return shows his class, wins featured allowance race

Teller III Return had raced only four times coming into Sunday night's featured allowance race at Remington Park, but in three of those starts, he had run against horses that qualified for this year's \$355,800 Remington Park Derby, including the winner.

As the 5-2 favorite, the 3-year-old gelded Oklahoma-bred son of High Rate of Return, out of the Teller Cartel mare Cartel Chica, Teller III Return broke 10th of 12 horses out of the starting gate. However, he picked up the pace swiftly, taking the lead before half the 350-yard race was over.

Under jockey Jimmy Brooks, he cruised to victory, holding off B Boujee (4-1) in the final strides by a head. Brooks rode this horse for leading trainer Eddie Willis and owner Ivonne Sanchez of Maysville.

Last year, Teller III Return raced in the Remington Park Futurity trials in his career debut against one of the best 2-year-old Oklahoma-breds on the grounds in Eye Work For You. All that horse has done is win seven-of-nine races in his career. So, Teller III Return was a little overmatched in his debut, running sixth.

In his next race, Teller III Return broke his maiden status, then he jumped back into the fire against Heritage Place Futurity horses in those trials. He ran the best race of his life in his Heritage Place heat, finishing second to a horse named Empressum, beaten only a half-length.

Empressum won last night's \$355,800 Remington Park Derby and has now won six-of-nine starts lifetime. So, the only surprise about Teller III Return winning against allowance non-winner of two horses on Sunday was that he was allowed to go off at 5-2 odds, as the wagering favorite. He paid \$7.20 to win, \$3.60 to place and \$2.80 to show.

Teller III Return stopped the timer for 300 yards in :15.398 on a fast track, earning a speed index of 90. B Boujee was a half-length in front of On a New Note (4-1) in third. He was bred in Oklahoma by Andy Knight.

Teller III Return was one of two Willis wins on Sunday night. The defending training champion and 11-time winner at Remington Park, increased his lead in this year's standings to four wins, 24 to Clint Crawford's 20.

Bosse:

arguments in front of the court today," Hunter said. "They illustrated precisely why a convicted murderer like Shaun Bosse should remain on Oklahoma death row, and why he doesn't deserve the chance of a retrial.

"The 45-day stay will allow us time to file for a further stay from the U.S. Supreme Court so they have time to consider whether to grant us the opportunity to argue our case."

Hunter said the high court's recent McGirt decision "has created confusion across governments, and many unanswered questions that can only be resolved by the U.S. Supreme Court."

"While we prepare our petition, my heart remains with the victims, including a family member of one of Bosse's victims who was in the courtroom today," Hunter continued. "I want to assure them we are doing everything in our power to uphold these convictions and deliver the justice they deserve."

Attorneys with the Attorney General's Office have already drafted the request for a further stay from the U.S. Supreme Court and plan to file it in the coming days.

SoonerSelect:

and usher in SoonerSelect, a managed care organization, on October 1. Opposing that implementation is a broad coalition of health care professionals, Stop the Health Care Holdup.

The Oklahoma Legislature wasn't consulted when the decision was made during the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Nor were the Oklahoma Hospital Association and state associations representing doctors, dentists, nurses, osteopaths and chiropractors.

Instead, the decision was pushed through the Oklahoma Health Care Authority whose members are appointed – and can be fired – by the governor alone.

Mead calls the MCOs "mangled care organizations."

There are three options in health care, Mead said. Those are quality care, low cost care and quality care for everyone.

"He (Stitt) talked to his accountants and he knew more than anyone," Mead said. "They are going for low cost."

Mead is upset that the state's overhead under the OHCA to run SoonerCare is 5 percent.

Under SoonerSelect, that overhead triples to 15 percent with those fees going to an out-of-state company with headquarters in Connecticut.

It's ironic, Mead said, that more than 1,000 health insurance companies have headquar-

ters in Connecticut, but that state doesn't have even one MCO.

SoonerSelect health plans include medical plans through Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Oklahoma, Humana Health Horizons in Oklahoma, Oklahoma Complete Health and UnitedHealthcare.

Dental plans are DentaQuest, LIBERTY Dental and MCNA Dental.

The OHCA touts the benefits of managed care – improved health outcomes, value-based payment, improved member satisfaction, cost containment and increased cost predictability.

The coalition – and Mead – disagree.

"Simply put, managed care puts insurance companies in charge of patient care – something Oklahomans do not want," a coalition statement reads. "The managed care plan will mean less access to care, a reduction in approved treatments and the loss of doctors and health care providers across the state."

"This ill-conceived plan would create delays for patients and allow insurance companies to ration medically necessary care for patients in Oklahoma. That's unacceptable."

The OHA noted in a news release that the OHCA's "own actuarial advisor" has stated to achieve savings under the managed care plan, Oklahoma would need to reduce services

to Medicaid patients by up to 40 percent.

"How do you think patients will react when the insurance companies tell them they cannot receive a necessary procedure or service?" the OHA asked.

Proponents of SoonerSelect argue MCOs provide budget stability and improved health outcomes. But the OHA counters "where is the demonstrable evidence?"

"The last time the state tried this, providers across the health care spectrum were unable to keep treating Medicaid patients under the new allowable service rate schedule," the OHA stated.

"The result was particularly evident in rural Oklahoma because patients had to travel further – often much further – to receive services."

The Legislature can opt to not fund SoonerSelect as it is proposed now.

House Bill 1091, the Ensuring Access to Medicaid Act, passed the House on March 11 on an 81-13 vote and is now before the Senate's Appropriations/Health and Human Services Committee.

In part, the bill sets reimbursement and prior authorization time lines for providers treating Medicaid patients.

If passed by the Senate and signed by Stitt, the bill's provisions would go into effect November 1.

"We are pleased to do our part to help put an end to this pandemic," said Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby. "Working together, we can help protect our family, friends and neighbors as we help speed our return to a greater sense of normalcy. Vaccinations, wearing masks, responsible distancing and washing our hands will help make our community and state safer for everyone."

The Chickasaw Nation began administering COVID-19 vaccines Dec. 16, 2020, to citizens and front line employees.

Rhonda Brown, a Chickasaw elder and laboratory phlebotomy supervisor with the Chickasaw Nation Department of Health fighting on the front lines of the battle against COVID-19, received the first official dose of the COVID-19

vaccination among Chickasaw Nation employees Dec. 16, 2020.

"Everyone should take the opportunity to take the shot," Brown said. "The vaccine is going to help a lot of us be healthier and more optimistic."

The Chickasaw Nation Emergency Operations Facility was opened as a location for drive-thru vaccinations and command center for emergency management.

The facility is pivotal for expanding vaccine distribution. The new facility is able to manage 16 lanes of traffic to serve as a COVID-19 vaccination site for the community.


"People we vaccinate constantly compare us to Chick-fil-A when it comes to our efficiency and customer service," said Chickasaw Nation Chief of Research and Public Health Dr. Daniel Molina. "Honestly, I think we're better – instead of

serving delicious chicken, we're saving lives!"

COVID-19 vaccinations were expanded to educators, then to Oklahomans and the general public in mid-March of this year.

"The COVID-19 vaccine, when combined with responsible public health measures such as masking, responsible distancing, hand and surface hygiene, limitation of group size and contact duration, and effective air exchanges, can result in significant protection from COVID-19 infection, and serious illness and injury," said Chickasaw Nation Secretary of Health Dr. Charles Grim.

Chickasaw Nation Department of Health Chief Medical Officer Dr. John Krueger said an exponential increase in supplies combined with a significant increase in the capacity to administer vaccinations has allowed the Chickasaw Nation to offer these vaccines to everyone.

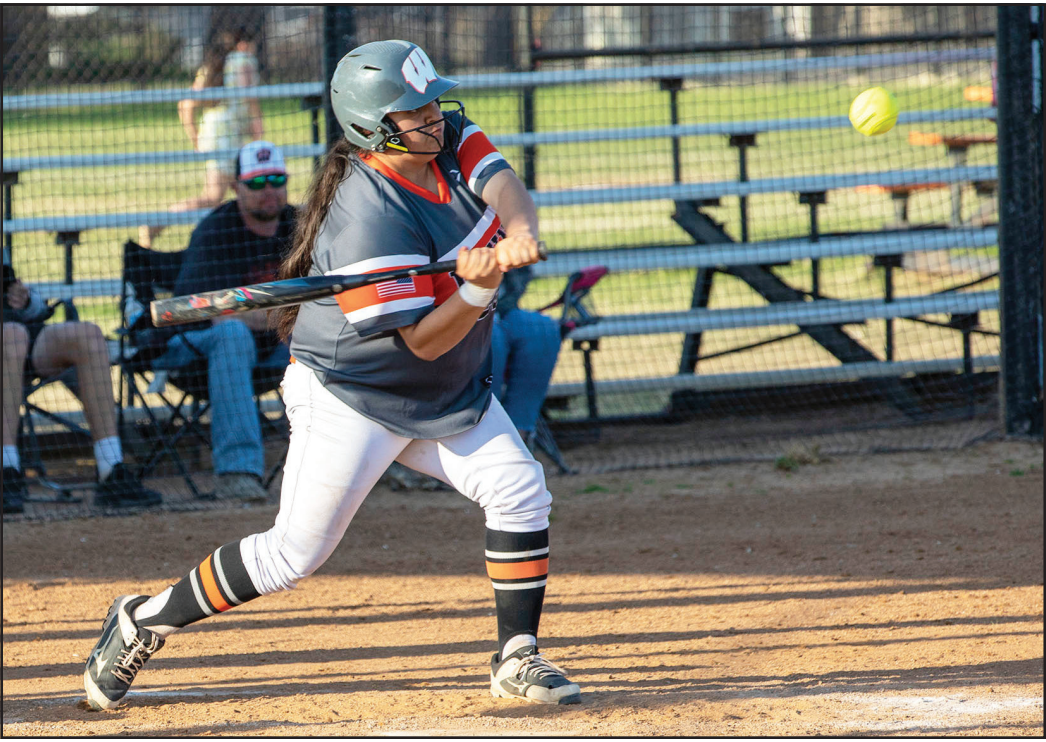

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Senate approves terminating parental rights of abusers

The Senate approved legislation Monday modifying rules to terminate parental rights. Sen. Jessica Garvin, R-Duncan, and Rep. Mark Lawson, R-Sapulpa, are the authors of House Bill 2318 to add findings of child abuse or neglect that is heinous and shocking as legal grounds for the termination of parental rights.

Under the bill, failing to protect a child, even if it is not their own, from such treatment could result in the termination of parental rights.

“Sadly, child abuse is a major problem in our state, and we must strengthen our laws to better protect those who can’t protect themselves,” Garvin said. “I’m proud to have carried this important legislation in the Senate to close this loophole and stop abusive adults from being allowed to continue parenting. Abuse is a vicious cycle that must be stopped for the sake of our state’s youth.”

Currently, parental rights can be terminated under a number of legal grounds, including, but not limited to

- the voluntary consent of the parent,
- the parent’s voluntary

placement of the child in DHS custody or to a child-placing agency for out-of-home placement, has not complied with the placement agreement or has not shown a strong intention to resume physical custody or to make permanent legal arrangements for the child’s care,

- a finding of child abandonment or that the child is an abandoned infant,
- a finding that the parent has failed to correct within three months the condition which led to the child’s deprived adjudication,
- a finding that the parent’s rights to another child have been terminated, and the conditions that led to that prior termination have not been corrected,
- a finding that a parent without custody of the child willfully failed, refused or has neglected to contribute to the child’s support for six of the last 12 months, and
- a finding that the parent has been convicted in another state of abuse or neglect, molestation, rape, etc.

“Current law only allows

We have been unable to continue accepting new clients until we can process the ones in our system. Hopefully, by June, we will have caught up enough to start helping more veterans to apply for VA benefits.

Currently, some of our volunteers, including myself, are working seven days a week to accomplish our mission. For those of you who do not have an open claim, I suggest you go to the VA website at www.va.gov click on forms and fill out a VA Form 21-0966 and submit it to VA by mail or set up an E-benefits account to upload it.

You can also call 1-800-827-1000 and ask VA to start an Intent to file (VA Form 21-0966) for you. By doing so you will have established a start date of the following month for VA benefits and will give you one year to submit a fully developed claim for benefits.

We should be able to help you to file your claim with the evidence needed to support your request for service connection of a disability within that timeframe.

We are adding more volunteers each week to help us to catch up on the veterans and surviving spouses who need assistance with their applications for VA benefits. I would like to see more of you consider being a part of what we do for veterans and their families.

Our drivers have started transporting veterans to their VA appointments and to our location. If you need a ride,

for the termination of parental rights if a parent is found to have abused or neglected their own children,” Lawson said. “However, abuse is often a life-long behavior, so House Bill 2318 will extend the definition to include any children that adult has been found to have hurt at any time in their life. This is

a commonsense measure that will better protect children from being victimized by those who should be protecting them, and I’m grateful for the wide support of this measure.”

HB 2318 now returns to the House for final consideration before moving on to the governor’s desk.

You are no Moses, sir!

One day some years ago, my Houston friend Chuck Sears teased me while we were talking about the greatness of Zig Ziglar. As I talked of Zig and some of the attributes of his that I like to try to apply to my own work, Chuck quipped, “Oh, but you are no Zig Ziglar, sir.” “No,” I quipped back, “not yet.”

Chuck conceded his point with a laugh, because of the optimism, I guess. But I must say that, while I answered quickly so as to put to rest any premature limitations, I realized the truth of my friend’s assertion. No, I’m no Zig Ziglar; but, then again, who is? It’s just that many folks I know are a great deal closer than I.

Thinking of that conversation now, some years later, I think I know how the old warrior Joshua must have felt during Bible times. I understand how easy it is to feel some degree of inadequacy because of so many great presenters,

orators, speakers, preachers with whom I’ve crossed paths. Joshua just happened to walk in the footsteps for years of the greatest leader the Lord ever had! When you have to pick up the slack after such a man as Moses, you have a powerful amount of slack to pick up.

But...the good news for Joshua, and the good news for you and me, is this: You don’t have to ‘be’ your great predecessor to do a great job. You really just have to be you – and lean on the Lord for the rest. In fact, our aim, in one sense, is not to reach the top but to reach the bottom. Read on.

“See you at the top” is the name of one of the early Zig-Ziglar books. But we’re about to see that the way to the top – in the Lord’s book – is strange, indeed. No one can deny that Moses certainly makes it to the top, spiritually. If any man ever reaches the pinnacle of spiritual excellence, this great leader does.

So, when the Lord approaches Joshua with the news that Moses is now dead, we are interested in how the Lord depicts Moses. The Lord’s opening to Joshua in the first verses of Joshua may seem casual to us, but I doubt it is a small thing to Joshua. For in the very first sentence of what appears to be Joshua’s first direct conversation with the Lord, the Lord tells Joshua and tells us the kind of man He is looking for in His army. He says, “Moses my servant is dead...”

Above everything we can say about a great man such as Moses, that he is God’s servant is probably the most important. It seems to rise above every other attribute that Moses seeks to attain. At his core, Moses is a mere servant. We feel a little guilty using the word “mere” in that description; but maybe that word will remind us that

April 25, 2021 will be the Fourth Sunday of Easter. The Gospel reading is from John, chapter 10, versus 11-18.

11 I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd giveth his life for his sheep. 14 I am the good shepherd; and I know mine, and mine know me. 15 As the Father knoweth me, and I know the Father: and I lay down my life for my sheep 16 And other sheep I have, that are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice, and there shall be one fold and one shepherd. 17 Therefore doth the Father love me: because I lay down my life, that I may take it again. 18 No man taketh it away from me: but I lay it down of myself, and I have power to lay it down: and I have power to take it

up again. This commandment have I received of my Father.

On the Fourth Sunday of Easter in 2006, Father Tommy Lane delivered a homily at Mount St. Mary’s Seminary, Emmitsburg, Md., which included the following. Jesus the Good Shepherd carrying us on his shoulders is symbolized in a beautiful way by the Pallium which archbishops wear over their shoulders while celebrating Mass. The Pallium is made from lamb’s wool.

Pope Benedict explained the significance of the Pallium beautifully in this way, “...the lamb’s wool is meant to represent the lost, sick or weak sheep which the shepherd places on his shoulders and carries to the waters of life. The human race – every one of us – is the

sheep lost in the desert which no longer knows the way. The Son of God will not let this happen; he cannot abandon humanity in so wretched a condition.

“He leaps to his feet and abandons the glory of heaven, in order to go in search of the sheep and pursue it, all the way to the Cross. He takes it upon his shoulders and carries our humanity; he carries us all – he is the good shepherd who lays down his life for the sheep.

“What the Pallium indicates first and foremost is that we are all carried by Christ. But at the same time it invites us to carry one another. Hence the Pallium becomes a symbol of the shepherd’s mission...”

This past Saturday, we fed 48 families, made up of 80 adults and 31 children. The next Food Bank Give-Away will be held Saturday, May 15, from 12 to 4 p.m.

As far as we know, the COVID-19 vaccines are effective against the new mutations. Most of the new infections are caused by the British variant of the COVID-19 virus. However, many Americans have chosen not to be vaccinated, whether out of fear or their belief in the conspiracy of observing our individual actions.

Therefore, we are still asking everyone to wear masks in protecting each other until most, if not all, people have been vaccinated against the COVID-19 virus and its variations. Masks can be provided if you do not have one. We continue to social distance, and hand sanitizer will be available.

In the New Living Translation of Paul’s writing to the Ephesians in Ephesians 4:21-24, we read: “Since you have heard about Jesus and have learned the truth that comes from him, throw off your old sinful nature and your former way of life, which is corrupted by lust and deception. Instead let the Spirit renew your thoughts and attitudes. Put on your new nature, created to be like God—truly righteous and holy.”

This “throwing off of our old sinful nature” is sometimes compared to putting on new clothing. We come to Jesus as if we are wearing our torn and tattered jeans. There’s nothing wrong with clean yet damaged jeans, but if we are going somewhere we want to wear intact clothing, we wear our new jeans.

We can represent our new life of following Jesus and in embracing our new life as God’s (re-) creation by our new jeans. They aren’t quite as comfortable as our old jeans because they haven’t been “worn-in” and begun to fit our bodies yet. Because of this, we are reminded that our new life will require new choices and new actions.

A different translation (the Common English Bible) of the same letter reads: “Since you really listened to [Jesus] and you were taught how the truth is in Jesus, change the former way of life that was part of the person you once were, corrupted by deceitful desires. Instead, renew the thinking in your mind by the Spirit and clothe yourself with the new person created according to God’s image in justice and true holiness.”

As part of this new life, we must learn a new way of being and interacting in the world. Continuing in Ephesians starting with Chapter 4, Verse 25, we need to “get rid of lying and tell the truth to our neighbor because now we are part of the same body” of Christ. We’re told to “be angry without sinning” lest the Devil use that anger against us.

We must give up the “foul words that come out of our mouth.” We don’t really need to use curse words for them to be foul. Those unwholesome thoughts may be the hateful things we say to our brothers and sisters to break their spirit, hurting them or causing them to sin.

“Don’t make the Holy Spirit unhappy...Put aside all bitterness, losing your temper, anger, shouting, and slander, along with every other evil. Be kind, compassionate, and forgiving each other, in the same way God forgave you in Christ.” (from Ephesians 4:25-32) These are the things that are a part of our new jeans.

Our humanity means that we on occasion choose to go back to those old, holey, worn jeans But we know we can reclaim God’s forgiveness by asking for it and putting on our new jeans again. For me, it’s when I take part in Holy Communion, remembering my sins and asking for God to again forgive me and allow me to renew my efforts to be the person God wants me to be. I return to my vow to follow Jesus and his teachings, recalling his crucifixion. I take my clean, new jeans and dress myself in them again as part of my spiritual renewal.

We may only need to wash our jeans, but sometimes we may have to buy new ones, depending on how far we’ve moved away from Jesus’s teachings. What does our conscience tell us about the state of our jeans? What kind of jeans do you need?

a servant – at least in his own mind – is not someone eating high on the hog, as they say, but someone who gladly sits at the table with the common man.

I like that the Lord is the One to note that Moses is simply a servant – Oh that he could see the same in us! – and while He could have provided any number of striking epitaphs for Moses to show the world his value, the Lord chooses the humblest of descriptions. He could speak of Moses, the great leader – or, Moses, the man who stood boldly before the angry Pharaoh – or, Moses, the flamboyant example who took the Israelites in the palm of his hand and carried them to the edge of the Promised Land with tremendous zeal and resolve.

But the Lord waves off those and a long list of other colorful epitaphs that rightly apply to Moses, and speaks to Joshua in a way that is as if to say, “If you want to do anything at all in My service, friend, try serving.”

We can only surmise as to what Joshua is thinking as he realizes that the Lord has just passed the mantle. He’s the one who has to run the final

leg of the race. The baton is squarely in his hands. We likely will not be far off if we suppose Joshua’s response is similar to that of Moses’ when the Lord gathers him around a burning bush and saddles him with one of the most difficult assignments the Lord has ever given a man.

Who can blame Joshua if he feels ill-equipped to step into the gap? To him, Moses is a hundred things he isn’t. Joshua has not stood for nearly half a century “face to face” with God repeatedly, enjoying a closer communion with God than perhaps any man who ever lived.

But, let us be clear, though: Joshua has his own abilities and graces, and the Lord is about to put those attributes to good use.

True faith, you see, is that servant who greets us at the door with a smile, kindly takes our coat, and then asks politely that we have a seat. “Sit over there by that pair of water,” faith says, “and take off your sandals.” They understand that “See you at the top” requires traveling a strange road.
