City steps back from PMH allegation

An accusation of nepotism at Purcell Municipal Hospital was shown to be unfounded at Monday's meeting of Purcell City Council and Public Works Authority.

Darlene Meskimen told the council three family members of PMH Chief Executive Officer Kem Scully were employed as nurses at the hospital in 2019.

PMH paid salaries totaling

more than \$294,000 to the four that year.

"They are skilled nurses. They could find work anywhere," she said, adding that the family connection is detrimental to staff morale at the hospital.

When she expressed being upset by contract details between the hospital and SSM, mayor Ted Cox stopped her,

Information requested with the payment includes the number and names of those attending.

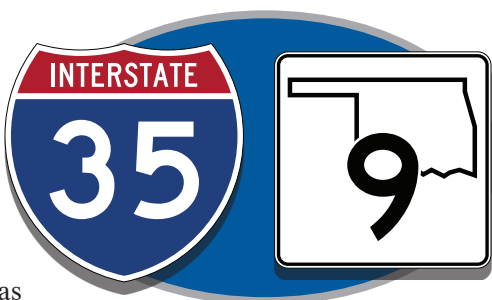

A \$22 million project between the Oklahoma Department of Transportation and the Chickasaw Nation, which engineers have said would alleviate backed-up traffic on Interstate 35 at SH 9, has been put on hold.

The reason, according to Transportation Commissioner T.W. Shannon, is because of political pressure from the governor's office. Secretary of Transportation Tim

Gatz said the reason is because of design needs for the overall I-35/SH 9 interchange.

The project, which Shannon says was approved twice by the commission and was originally described as "Interchange" work, is now being described by Gatz as "Operational Improvement."

Leadership roles unchanged

Ted Cox remains as mayor and Danny Jacobs vice-mayor

Purcell City Council’s leadership will remain unchanged. Mayor Ted Cox and vice-mayor Danny Jacobs were the council’s unanimous choices for another year.

The vote was taken during Monday’s council meeting. The council approved a facade variance for Heartland

Customs at 128 N. Canadian Ave., and tabled a similar request from Zeck Chevrolet, 1601 N. Green Ave. The dealership wants to add a building facing Grant Street and agreed to brick the structure on that side.

The request for a variance will now go back to the city’s planning commission. The council approved a new

ordinance setting time limits for parking on Main Street, but took no action on declaring the ordinance an emergency. City manager Dale Bunn stressed the ordinance only addresses parking in front of businesses and center parking is not affected. The area covered is between Canadian and 3rd Avenues, as well as 2nd Avenue to the alleys north and south of Main Street.

In other action, they:

- approved Purcell Public Library’s \$7,500 budget request;
- approved a \$50,294 change order for a water line extension for the new hospital;
- approved Parks & Recreation’s request to apply for a 50 percent restitution National Park Service Land and Water Conservation grant to replace playground equipment and Rotary Pavilion at Purcell Lake;
- tabled a resolution setting guidelines for special naming recognition;
- approved INSURICA’s employee health insurance renewal for 2021-22;
- approved a \$13,481.72 budget amendment to pay for a new building at the airport and a \$20,320.50 budget amendment for rural fire equipment;
- denied an injury claim;
- declared 47 pieces of equipment surplus property; and
- appointed Cindy Carmichael to the hospital board of directors.

Among those being honored at Academic All-State are Lucy Wilson, a Purcell High School student, and Evan Boothe, a Washington High School student.

The public is encouraged to view the awards ceremony broadcast at 3 p.m. Saturday, May 29, or 10 a.m. Sunday, May 30, on OETA Public Television. The broadcast will also be available on the foundation’s website at www.ofe.org. “Rising Above, Going Beyond” is the theme for this

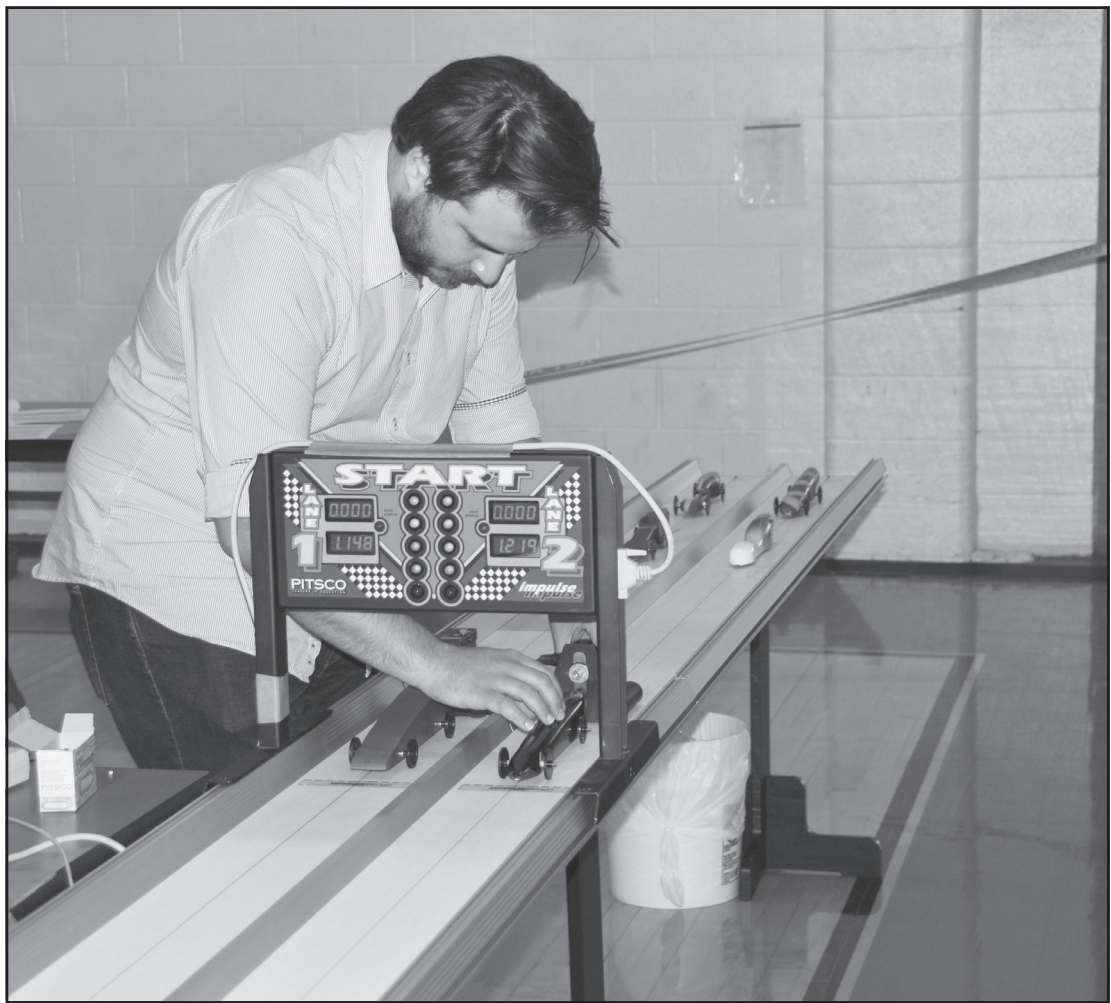

Regulations for Garage Sales

A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall for each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.

A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.

Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.

Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility poles or street signs, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.

All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale.

If you have any questions please call 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission please call them at (405) 521-3274.

Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.

I’ve been itching to get my mitts on the new census figures but the news from City Manager Dale Bunn is we won’t get the numbers until the end of September.

That’s when the Census Bureau will deliver the final redistricting data toolkit to all states and the public, Bunn said.

He said this will include digital tools which provides access to an integrated software browsing tool for official recipients.

It will also provide access to the online Data Explorer tool for both official recipients and the public.

The most up-to-date census data we have has McClain County as the second fastest growing county in Oklahoma behind only Canadian County.

The latest available data has

Canadian County growing at a 34.12 percent rate while McClain County is growing at a 19.9 percent clip.

Following McClain County is Logan County at a 17.79 percent rate.

Bryan County is growing by a 16.49 percent rate followed by Cleveland County at a 12.69 percent rate and Oklahoma County at 12.54 percent.

The latest data shows a total of 40 of the 77 counties lost population.

The county with the largest decrease in population is Cimarron at a negative 15.78 percent clip.

Information I have come across shows the median age in Oklahoma is 36.3 and that almost 1/4 of all Oklahomans are under the age of 18.

Update from the Capitol

We’ve made it to the final month of session. Budget negotiations are ongoing, and there should be an agreement announced soon.

We’re continuing to review and vote on House amendments on Senate bills, and committees are also working through executive nominations.

This week, the Senate will be voting on legislation outlining the proposed redistricting maps. Besides the budget, this is one of our main constitutional duties that must be completed by the end of session.

However, the census was delayed, and the final numbers won’t be available until sometime later this year, so population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau were used to redraw the Senate district lines.

We’ll convene in special session once those final numbers

are received to finish congressional redistricting and tweak the state legislative districts, if needs be.

I’m pleased to say that four more of my Senate bills were signed, along with six additional House bills. Since I’ve talked about these measures before, I’d like to tell you about some other major legislation that has been signed or is working its way through the process.

As someone in the healthcare industry, I was happy to see SB 674 go to the governor. This bill will ensure equal pay for physicians who care for patients using telemedicine, which has exploded during the pandemic.

Historically, insurance companies have paid doctors less for telemedicine visits versus in-person office visits for the same services. Governor Stitt issued an executive order call-

ing for payment parity last year, but he’s announced that he’ll be ending the state of emergency soon.

SB 674 will ensure doctors are paid the same regardless if they’re seeing patients virtually or in-person. This is great news because the use of telemedicine has skyrocketed. In 2019, SoonerCare members had nearly 12,000 telehealth visits, and last year, that number grew to more than 333,000, which is an increase of over 2,700 percent in a single year.

An issue that has been of great concern to rural districts like ours is the increasing number of foreign investors purchasing property around Oklahoma to get a piece of the booming medical marijuana

Biden leading America’s downturn

Last week, President Joe Biden delivered an address during a joint session of Congress on the eve of his 100th day in office.

While it is always an honor to listen to any president speak to Congress, the president’s message unfortunately missed the mark, especially since his actions thus far have been marked by partisan and progressive proposals and misguided unilateral actions.

Since taking office, President Biden has already proposed more than \$10 trillion in federal spending – a \$4.5 trillion annual budget, a \$1.9 trillion coronavirus relief bill, a \$2.3 trillion infrastructure program and now, as outlined during his address, a \$1.8 trillion expansion of America’s social safety net.

Unfortunately, his latest proposal yet again calls for massive tax increases and runs the risk of derailing America’s economic recovery that began to pick up in the third quarter of last year.

In his speech, President Biden stated, “America is on the move again.” However, enacting his expensive proposals would surely lead to America’s downturn in the months and years ahead.

Unfortunately, the president’s latest plan would transform America from a free market economy, based on hard work and individual initiative, into a European style social welfare state, replete with high taxes, reams of regulations and a suffocating bureaucracy to regulate our lives and harass hardworking taxpayers.

With the greatest tax increases in modern history, the growth in the economy he celebrated in his address would not last long. Indeed, we have already begun to see inflationary effects through rising gas prices and the increasing cost of goods.

While President Biden spent a great deal of time touting his so-called “American Families Plan” that would lead to higher taxes and irresponsibly add to the national debt, he chose to gloss over several urgent issues facing our country – like the

crisis at the southern border.

That is likely because he realizes the border emergency is a crisis of his own doing. Unfortunately, instead of reversing his misguided executive actions from the first days of his presidency and pursuing solutions to help our border patrol counter the flow of people, drugs and crime into our country, President Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris have essentially ignored the situation.

In fact, neither has even visited the border, further showing their disregard for this humanitarian and security emergency of enormous proportions.

Although I disagreed with much of what the president had to say during his speech, I was encouraged that he mentioned the importance of retaining a competitive edge against China.

However, he forgot to point out that while they are building up their military, he recently recommended an inflation-

Vote on medicaid bill

Good bills become law

House District 42 saw severe weather this week, including the overnight tornado in Pauls Valley and flooding throughout the area. I hope everyone stayed safe.

The Attorney General’s office has advised Oklahomans who have storm damage to be mindful when selecting a company to repair your property. It’s strongly recommended to get multiple estimates in writing from well-established, local companies who are insured and licensed.

The bad weather across our state this week didn’t stop your elected officials from continuing to work for the people of Oklahoma.

The Senate moved forward House Bill 2663, which would extend early voting opportunities for presidential elections. Oklahomans would have the chance to vote on the Wednesday immediately preceding a presidential election, in addition to the days of Thursday, Friday and Saturday already in practice.

In the 2020 presidential election, thousands were waiting up to four hours to vote early on these days. Expanding the days people can vote early would give more time and opportunities to Oklahomans. This bill would not affect the early voting days of Thursdays and Fridays during other elections.

Providing this additional time to vote early will hopefully encourage more Oklahomans to vote. HB2663 is currently on the governor’s desk.

The Governor has already signed legislation to help high school students become more informed and engaged citizens. House Bill 2030 would require

high school students to pass the U.S. Civics Test, which is part of the naturalization process, in order to graduate beginning in the 2022-23 school year.

This is the same test a person must pass in order to become a U.S. citizen. Fourteen other states have adopted similar requirements. These students will become better-informed citizens after taking this test.

Gov. Stitt has also signed multiple bills this session to uphold our most vulnerable citizens’ right to life, including a bill I authored.

House Bill 1904, which I passed through the House, would require that abortions be performed only by physicians who are licensed in obstetrics and gynecology. This will help lower the abortion rate in Oklahoma.

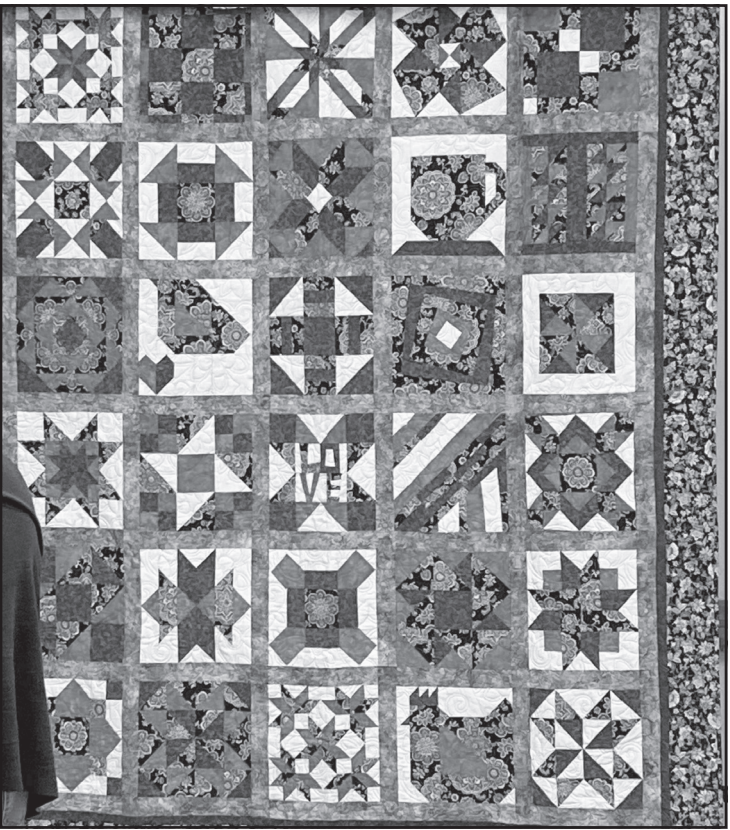
Another pro-life bill signed this week was House Bill 1102. This would revoke the medical license of doctors who perform abortions that are not medically necessary to prevent “irreversible physical impairment” or death of the mother.

The third signed this week was House Bill 2441 to prohibit abortions from being performed once the unborn child is determined to have detectable heartbeat. A heartbeat is proof that the child is alive and is deserving of all protections granted to any other person. The bill has an exception in situations where the life of the mother is at stake.

The Oklahoma Religious Freedom Act also became law this week. House Bill 2648 says that any government in-

2-3 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (chopped into bite sized pieces)

Dental services reopening at Chickasaw Nation Medical Center

Chickasaw Nation Dental Services have begun a phased reopening of routine services at the Chickasaw Nation Medical Center (CNMC). A dental representative will contact all non-urgent patients with previously canceled appointments.

Dental clinic hours will be from 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday-Friday. Patients must have a dental appointment to enter a Chickasaw Nation Department of Health (CNDH) facility. Walk-in appointments are not allowed at this time.

Patients who did not have an appointment prior to COVID-19 will not be scheduled at this time; patients with previously canceled appointments are being contacted and rescheduled. CNDH dental clinics in Ardmore, Purcell and Tishomingo will not be rescheduling non-emergency dental patients at this time but will begin reopening in the coming months.

COVID-19 testing is required for most dental procedures and preventative care treatments. Staff will navigate patients through the rapid testing process prior to appointment time.

Urgent dental care remains available to patients by calling the dental call center at (580)

421-4596, Monday-Friday from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. A virtual dental visit will be scheduled on the same day to determine next steps for emergent dental patients.

For dental questions or emergent issues, please call the CNDH dental call center at (580) 421-4596.

Urgent/emergent care (pain/swelling) appointments:

A virtual visit appointment with a CNDH dentist to assess the patient and urgency for an on-site appointment is the first step. Results of the virtual visit appointment will determine next step. Staff will communicate next steps based on the assessment and recommendation of the dentist.

COVID-19 testing for dental patients:

COVID-19 rapid testing will be required for the majority of treatment and preventative care provided. Dental staff will work with dental patients to coordinate a COVID-19 test at a CNDH facility. Required testing must be completed within 72 hours of a scheduled dental appointment.

Appointments will be rescheduled when clinically appropriate if a patient tests positive for COVID-19.

OHCE members set up to celebrate OHCE Week

Whether they are raising scholarship money, beautifying their communities or sewing cloth face masks for healthcare workers across the state, members of Oklahoma State University Extension's group, Oklahoma Home and Community Education, continue to make a difference every day.

Committed to making a difference, this group, established in 1935, will celebrate their service to Oklahoma May 2-8 during Oklahoma Home and Community Education Week.

This year's theme is Celebrating Your Helping Hands. This group certainly knows how to put their hands to good work.

With nearly 3,500 members statewide, club members work together to strengthen individuals, families and communities through education, leadership and action. Through the group's relationship with Oklahoma State University Extension, OHCE presents research-based information to its members.

The impact of OHCE is strong and felt far and wide. For example, when the COVID-19 pandemic began last year, there was a desperate shortage of face masks for workers in the medical field and other areas.

OHCE members stepped up to the plate and put their sewing skills to good use. They made nearly 75,000 masks that were donated to hospitals, clinics and other places.

McCurtain County OHCE made 9,007 masks, which was the most from any one county.

Suzette Barta, community engagement coordinator for OSU's College of Education and Human Sciences - Extension, Engagement and Continuing Education, said operating a sewing machine wasn't the only way club members were making their mark on their communities.

"The pandemic certainly didn't slow them down. OHCE members also made great strides in technology usage," Barta said. "Clubs held three district meetings by Zoom and afternoon workshops were prerecorded and posted on YouTube. Groups even held silent auction fundraisers that were posted on hosting counties' Facebook pages."

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, OHCE members continue to make a difference around the state. Other highlights include:

McClain County: OHCE member constructed more than 900 masks that were distributed throughout the

county to local schools, health agencies, emergency personnel and to family and friends.

Washington OHCE has a public display on personal health guidelines, ECHO is holding a OHCE information and membership booth at Blanchard's May's Days.

Washita County: Kristy Spalding, county OSU Extension educator and Extension director, put together mask kits that included all materials needed to sew masks for volunteers who wanted to donate their time and skill to sewing masks.

Masks were provided to a nursing home, home health agencies, hospice agency and a retirement center. OSU Extension handed out 166 of the free kits, utilizing all of the material, elastic and ribbon they had on hand. Also in Washita County, an OHCE club donated needed items for foster children.

Craig County: White Oak Public School Project - OHCE members collected school supplies for teachers and students throughout the year and gave each student a Christmas backpack filled with goodies, along with a wrapped gift from their wish list.

Members also volunteered as a group with Grand Nation for snack bags of food to be delivered for breakfast, lunch and dinner to families in need. In addition, they donated gas money for trucks to get the food from the food bank to Vinita.

Stephens County: Sunshine OHCE made more than 1,000 red ribbons for Duncan Public High School to use during Red Ribbon Week, which is a week set aside for drug awareness and education.

Beckham County: Sewed a quilt for a local veteran.

"This is just a small sample of what our thousands of members do for their communities every day," Barta said.

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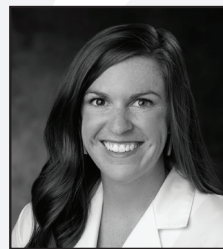

porters and patients before the measure went into effect.

In less than three years, the landscape changed from non-existent to crowded beyond anyone’s expectations.

Today there are licensed growers engaged in marijuana cultivation in all 77 counties.

To be precise, there are 7,477 growers.

The top five counties account for 1,803 – or 24.1 percent – of growers.

Those are Oklahoma County, 55; Cleveland County, 337; Tulsa County, 324; Grady County, 292, and Creek County, 284.

Interestingly, one of those in Creek County is the only

out-of-state licensee.

McClain County comes in at number 18 with 142 licensed growers. That homegrown percentage is 1.9.

There are 4,231 growers in those 20 counties. That comes to 56.6 percent.

Others in the top 20 are Logan, 280; Delaware, 215; Carter, 211; Lincoln and Muskogee, 208 each; Pottawatomie, 204; LeFlore, 195; Bryan, 182; Mayes, 156; Garvin, 155; Okmulgee, 152, and Pittsburg, 151.

More than a third of the state – 35.1 percent – consists of 27 counties that are each home to more than 100 grow operations.

The remaining 64.9 percent or 50 counties each have fewer than 100 licensed growers.

The Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority also licenses processors, dispensaries and transporters.

Of 1,400 processors in the state, 34 are located in McClain County.

That comes to 2.4 percent. McClain County’s 21 dispensaries account for less than 1 percent of the state’s 2,221 licensed dispensaries of medical marijuana.

The OMMA lists 83 licensed transporters working in Oklahoma. None are in McClain County.

the governor’s office.

During the Transportation Commission’s meeting Monday, Shannon was questioning whether Gatz was getting “political pressure” from the governor’s office. Shannon said the governor’s office called the interchange work a “pet project.”

Shannon said consulting with the governor’s office has delayed a kick-off event that was to be held for the project. He said the project was prepared by ODOT and is on the 8 Year Construction Work Plan.

“Why is it now insufficient?” Shannon asked. “The City of Newcastle is in support of this project, as is McClain County. The Chickasaw Nation is putting in \$10 million.”

Shannon said the project was progressing just fine until the governor’s office was consulted.

“If we continue down this path, the role of this commission is being diminished,” he said. He also was concerned with the protection of the 8 Year Construction Plan and its ability to be politically changed.

Gatz disagreed with Shannon concerning the project naming saying they were disagreeing on semantics, and that there had not been an overall alternative interchange design selected by ODOT.

He said the project was only placed on hold after this determination was made.

“The Operational Improvement only addresses part of it, but not the entire interchange,” Gatz said. “We need to fix the totality of that interchange and address all of the movements within it.”

Gatz said his consultation with the governor was over the impact of the McGirt v. Oklahoma ruling on tribal agreements and to make sure the State of Oklahoma’s interests are properly applied.

He said the governor only had one question about the I-35/SH 9 project.

Gatz said the governor asked, “Does this fix the interchange for all the citizens and the stakeholders in the area?”

Gatz said, “My answer was that this is only an operational improvement. It will ultimately

impact the interchange solution.”

Shannon asked for two separate votes and was turned down 7-2 both times. The first was for a resolution reaffirming the 8 Year Construction Plan, while the second was for a consult with the state Attorney General, asking what legal authority the Oklahoma governor has to require deviations from the 8 Year Construction Plan. The “Interchange” work is on the 8 Year Construction Work Plan in 2022 for Right of Way at a cost of \$4,032,450 and Utilities at a cost of \$927,000, and then in 2023 for “Interchange” at a cost of \$17 million.

Transportation Commission Chairman Gene McKown asked Gatz if ODOT could get the plans “modified and fixed” so the process could be continued.

“It needs to be done and there is some miscommunication in this,” McKown said. “Where we are is we need to fix this intersection, and I don’t want to see us fix it and then be in the middle of it and add to it.”

McKown asked Gatz if the project could be moved to the number one priority for ODOT.

He said, “Can we get this plan amended, and put it into construction as fast as we can, and find the money?”

Gatz said, “We will do everything we can ... as fast as we can, with a goal of meeting that schedule.”

Gatz said when the ODOT engineers’ work is complete it will tell what the preferred interchange alternative is.

“It will be challenging from a project planning and resource management standpoint,” Gatz said, adding that it will identify and execute the project that the stakeholders and the traveling public deserve.

He said a potential tribal partnership developed in the proper context is certainly possible.

"It should be a great day for baseball," Kulbeth said.

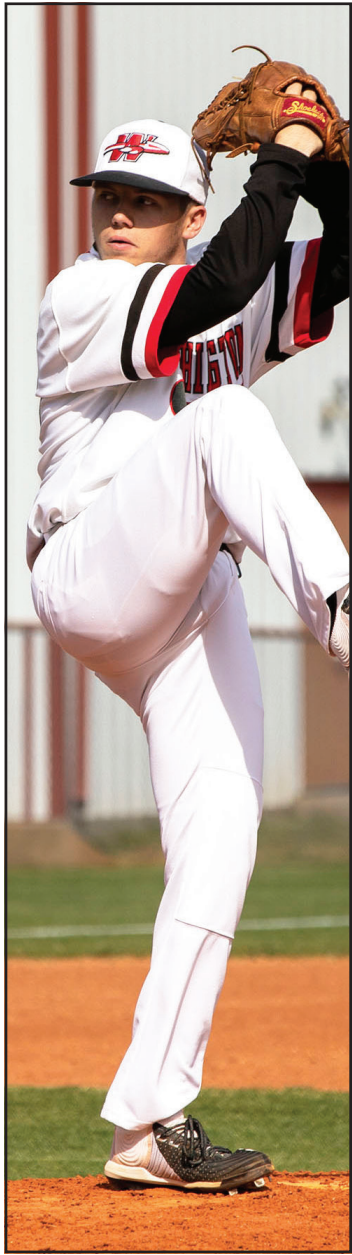
Lone Grove (33-0) and Perry (18-17) loom on the other side of the bracket.

Coach Collins said he’s sad to lose his seniors but that the future is bright for the Bulldogs.

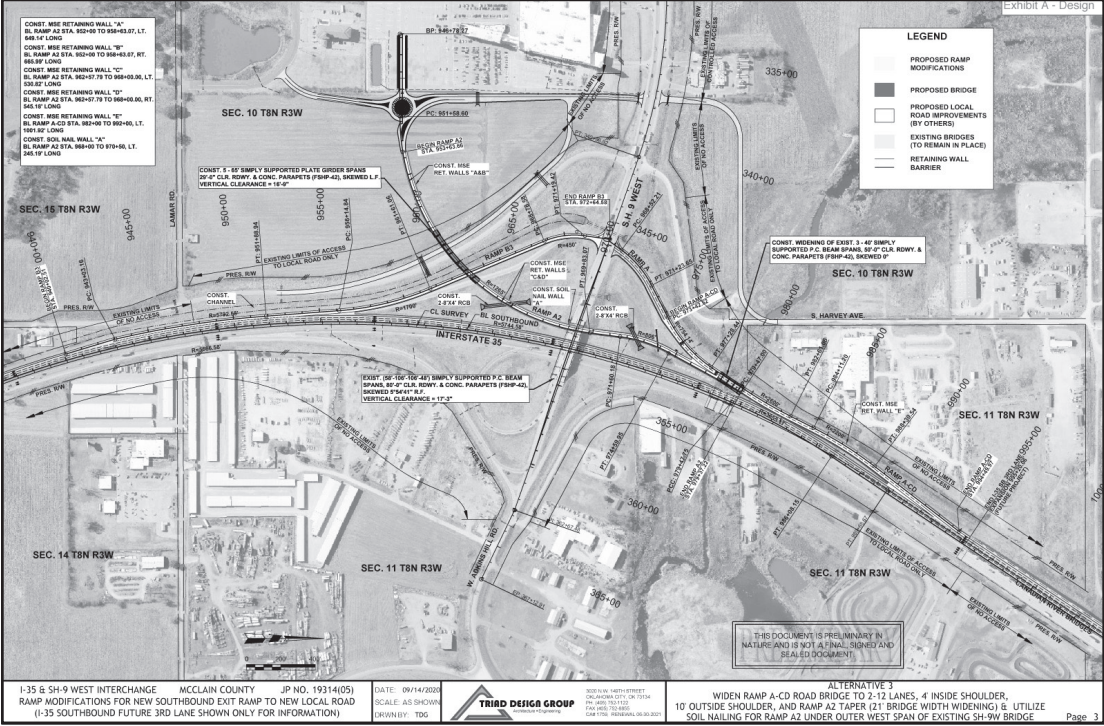
“We have a good group of guys and the kids coming up from the junior high can play. We should be looking good for the upcoming years,” Collins said.

The large hail severely damaged the pickup to include large dents and a cracked windshield. Our Chevrolet van had two windows blown out, both outside mirrors broken, as well as shattering all of the plastic molding. Hopefully, our drivers will be able to accommodate everyone who needs transportation to their VA appointments.

As our organization continues to grow, there are numerous opportunities to help us make a difference in the lives of our veterans and their families.

May 9, 2021 is the sixth Sunday of Easter. The Gospel reading is from John, Chapter 15, verses 9-17. “Jesus said to his disciples: 9 “As the Father loves me, so I also love you. Remain in my love. 10 If you keep my commandments, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father’s commandments and remain in his love. 11 “I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and your joy might be complete. 12 This is my commandment: love one another as I love you.

Is there any other word mis-used or overused as much as “love?” I love my dog, I love my new outfit, I love tacos, and on and on. The love we receive from Jesus is pure and he tells us to love in the same way as he loves. His love is not restricted. While it is easy for us to love those who love us, how do we do love those who don’t love us?

The problem is that people think of love as a subject matter to be discussed, a passing emotion, or just a vague romantic idea. St. John, in his first Letter, pleads with us: “Children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in deed and truth” (1Jn 3:18). Love is an action word. We cannot talk of love without action. And this is the miracle that should happen every day in this world: when we learn to love in deed and in truth.

A simple imagination will show us the great wonderful possibilities if we are able to do it: because of love, enemies are reconciled, warring countries re-establish peaceful and harmonious relationships, families are united and happy, the poor and hungry are attended to, criminals mend their ways, resources and blessings are generously shared among people, the truth is proclaimed, justice and peace prevail,

kindness and generosity rule in society. (Year B: Homily for the Sixth Sunday of Easter, Homily Theme: Love In Deed and Truth, by Fr. Mike Lagrimas.)

Maybe you have a similar problem to mine. I have pretty high expectations of myself. I easily ‘love’ others who also have high expectations of themselves. I am law-abiding, self-supporting, morally upright, blah, blah, blah.

When I encounter other people who seemingly don’t hold themselves to high standards, I tend to keep my distance. I am so glad that Jesus does not speak directly to me because I think he would probably say, “get out of your ivory tower, your soul is no more important than anyone else’s.”

Jesus tells us to love as He

This Sunday we will be celebrating Mother’s Day. Quite often we only think of physical female identities in this context. I want to pay attention to looking at some of the feminine attributes of God.

One of my favorite images of God is taken from Luke 13:34. Here Jesus says, “Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones God’s messengers! How often have I wanted to gather your children together as a hen protects her chicks beneath her wings, but you wouldn’t let me.” That is also quoted in Matthew 23:37-39. Similarly, in Psalms 91:4, paraphrased, “[She] will cover you with [her] feathers, and under [her] wings, you will find refuge...

I admit it: I like chickens, and I think of a hen hovering over her chicks when I read those verses. I always enjoyed watching and cuddling the baby chicks my grandma raised in the spring. It was always cold when she ordered them, and she would set them in the house in a big box near the stove that heated the dining room. They

also had a coal oil (kerosene) lamp in the box with them for additional heat.

It was comforting to hear them settle down for napping with quiet little cheeps. They didn’t have a mother hen with them because we wanted more chicks than we had hens. After the chicks grew into young pullets and became hens, I remember being able to touch the feathers on their backs and appreciating the softness of them. I think that softness is what I think of when I read about God sheltering “her” children beneath her wings.

There are other places in the Bible where we find feminine descriptions and poetry applied to God. Many of us have grown up with the masculine language describing God, but we can understand with our minds that God is neither male nor female. Or maybe more accurately, God is both male and female.

Both genders bring gifts to those roles, and we honor the female version this month. Next month we emphasize the male role on Father’s Day.

But for now, we think of the traits of a good mother. She is

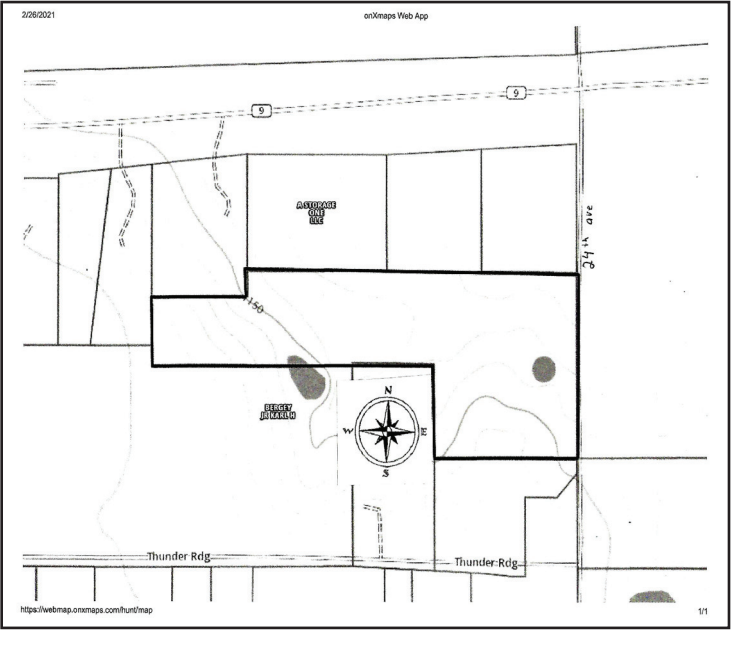

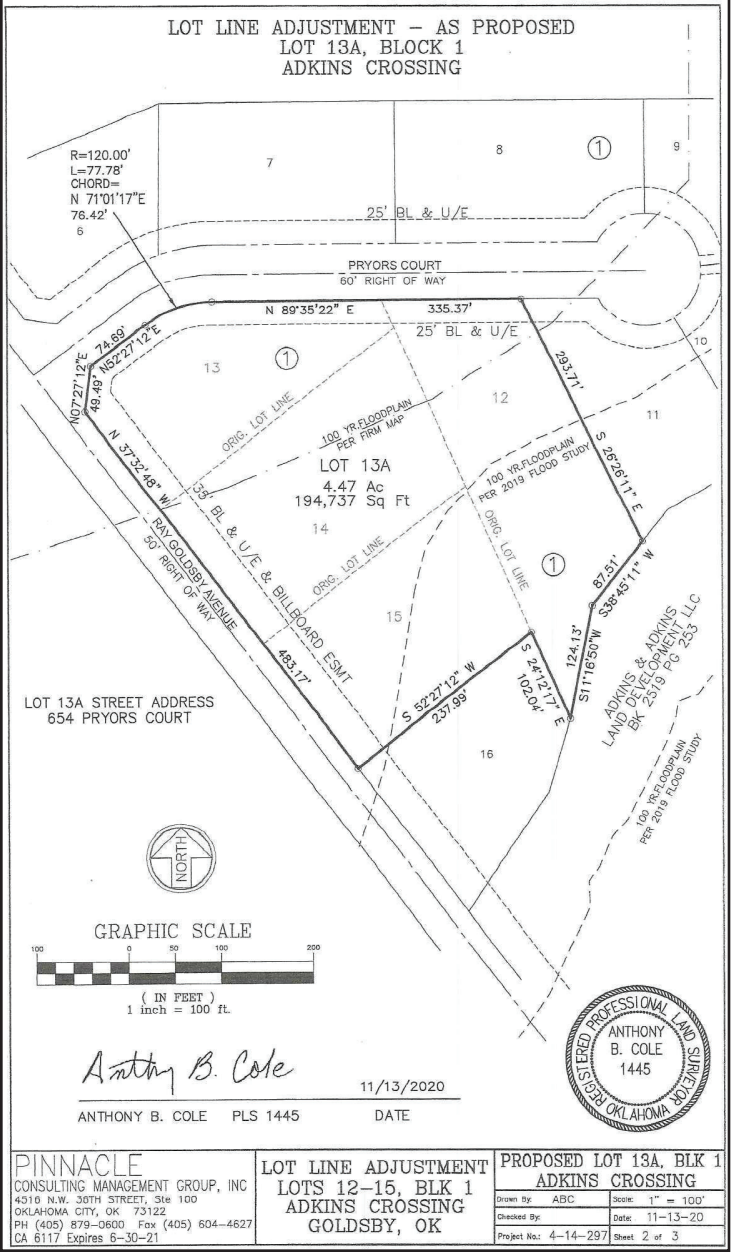

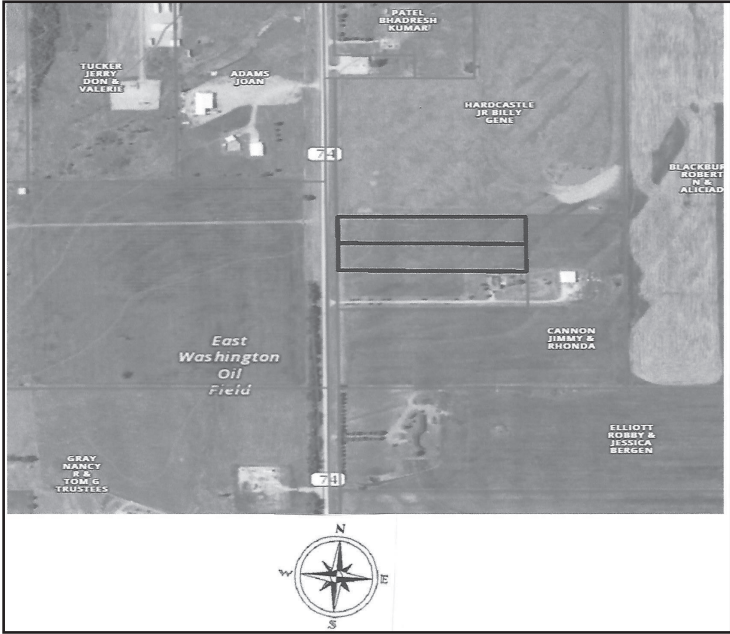
