City steps back from PMH allegation

An accusation of nepotism at Purcell Municipal Hospital was shown to be unfounded at Monday's meeting of Purcell City Council and Public Works Authority.

Darlene Meskimen told the council three family members of PMH Chief Executive Officer Kem Scully were employed as nurses at the hospital in 2019.

PMH paid salaries totaling

more than \$294,000 to the four that year.

"They are skilled nurses. They could find work anywhere," she said, adding that the family connection is detrimental to staff morale at the hospital.







Regulations for Garage Sales

A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall for each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.

A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.

Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.

Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-ofway, on any utility poles or street signs, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.

All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale.

If you have any questions please call 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission please call them at (405) 521-3274.

Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.



Happy Mother's Day to my mom, Carolyn, or as our boys nicknamed her way back when, Voom.

She is doing well and still living by herself in Norman. She loves her Sooners and doesn't miss a game on TV or on the radio.

jdm I've been itching to get my mitts on the new census figures but the news from City Manager Dale Bunn is we won't get the numbers until the end of September.

That's when the Census Bureau will deliver the final redistricting data toolkit to all states and the public, Bunn said. He said this will include digital tools which provides access to an integrated software browsing tool for official recipients.

It will also provide access to the online Data Explorer tool for both official recipients and the public.

The most up-to-date census data we have has McClain County as the second fastest growing county in Oklahoma behind only Canadian County. The latest available data has

Canadian County growing at a 34.12 percent rate while Mc-Clain County is growing at a 19.9 percent clip.

Following McClain County is Logan County at a 17.79 percent rate.

Bryan County is growing by a 16.49 percent rate followed by Cleveland County at a 12.69 percent rate and Oklahoma County at 12.54 percent.

The latest data shows a total of 40 of the 77 counties lost population.

The county with the largest decrease in population is Cimarron at a negative 15.78 percent clip.

Information I have come across shows the median age in Oklahoma is 36.3 and that almost 1/4 of all Oklahomans are under the age of 18.

Vote on medicaid bill

I rarely write letters to the editor bragging on Republicans for their votes in the legislature because, frankly, I disagree with most of their policy positions. I'm not saying I'm right and they are wrong. We simply usually just disagree.

However, both Representative Cindy Roe (R) Lindsay and Senator Jessica Garvin (R) Duncan accurately summed up excellent reasons for their support of SB131, which is the medicaid expansion bill filed by Representative Marcus McIntyre (R) Duncan.

This may be the most important legislation heard during the entire 2021 session as it potentially impacts health care coverage for over one million Oklahomans. It was drafted to replace Governor Stitt's ill suited, more expensive package moving the state to something defined as managed care.

We tried that approach in 1998 under then Governor Frank Keating and it was an unmitigated failure. SB 131 will leave Governor Stitt's more expensive, insurance company driven proposal where it belongs - in the trash heap of history.

Kudos to Garvin and Roe for leading with their brains, not their party registration. It's about time.

Biden leading America's downturn

Last week, President Joe Biden delivered an address during a joint session of Congress on the eve of his 100th day in office.

While it is always an honor to listen to any president speak to Congress, the president's message unfortunately missed the mark, especially since his actions thus far have been marked by partisan and progressive proposals and misguided unilateral actions.

Since taking office, President Biden has already proposed more than \$10 trillion in federal spending – a \$4.5 trillion annual budget, a \$1.9 trillion coronavirus relief bill, a \$2.3 trillion infrastructure program and now, as outlined during his address, a \$1.8 trillion expansion of America's social safety net.

Unfortunately, his latest proposal yet again calls for massive tax increases and runs the risk of derailing America's economic recovery that began to pick up in the third quarter of last year.

Unfortunately, the president's latest plan would transform America from a free market economy, based on hard work and individual initiative, into a European style social welfare state, replete with high taxes, reams of regulations and a suffocating bureaucracy to regulate our lives and harass hardworking taxpayers.

With the greatest tax increases in modern history, the growth in the economy he celebrated in his address would not last long. Indeed, we have already begun to see inflationary effects through rising gas prices and the increasing cost of goods.

While President Biden spent a great deal of time touting his so-called "American Families Plan" that would lead to higher taxes and irresponsibly add to the national debt, he chose to gloss over several urgent issues facing our country – like the

The bad weather across our state this week didn't stop your elected officials from continuing to work for the people of Oklahoma.

The Senate moved forward House Bill 2663, which would extend early voting opportunities for presidential elections. Oklahomans would have the chance to vote on the Wednesday immediately preceding a presidential election, in addition to the days of Thursday, Friday and Saturday already

In the 2020 presidential election, thousands were waiting up to four hours to vote early on these days. Expanding the days people can vote early would give more time and opportunities to Oklahomans. This bill would not affect the early voting days of Thursdays and Fridays during other elections.

Providing this additional time to vote early will hopefully encourage more Oklahomans to vote. HB2663 is currently on the governor's desk.

The Governor has already signed legislation to help high school students become more informed and engaged citizens. House Bill 2030 would require

the 2022-23 school year.

This is the same test a person must pass in order to become a U.S. citizen. Fourteen other states have adopted similar requirements. These students will become better-informed citizens after taking this test.

Gov. Stitt has also signed multiple bills this session to uphold our most vulnerable citizens' right to life, including a bill I authored.

House Bill 1904, which I passed through the House, would require that abortions be performed only by physicians who are licensed in obstetrics and gynecology. This will help lower the abortion rate in Oklahoma.

Another pro-life bill signed this week was House Bill 1102. This would revoke the medical license of doctors who perform abortions that are not medically necessary to prevent "irreversible physical impairment" or death of the mother.

The third signed this week was House Bill 2441 to prohibit abortions from being performed once the unborn child is determined to have detectable heartbeat. A heartbeat is proof that the child is alive and is deserving of all protections granted to any other person. The bill has an exception in situations where the life of the mother is at stake.

The Oklahoma Religious Freedom Act also became law this week. House Bill 2648 says that any government in-

Court Packing

In the pantheon of great American presidents, a few are always at the top. Lincoln usually comes to mind, then Washington, and Jefferson. In the 20th century, the president who makes every list is Franklin Roosevelt. What makes FDR interesting is that, unlike Lincoln, FDR was beloved in his own time

Because of the way he handled the Depression, it was not uncommon to see FDR's picture hanging in homes in a place of honor. Don't get me wrong. Some people had issues with this president, but most appreciated his efforts to relieve the nation's pains. Yet there was one episode where he did receive rebuke from both sides of the political aisle and the population at large and that was his effort to pack the Supreme Court.

Here was the situation. When FDR took over the nation in 1932, we were in the midst of the greatest depression in our history. The president wanted to tackle as many problems as he could in his first 100 days (starting a precedent that has lasted till today). Many of his proposals became part of his alphabet programs like the WPA, AAA, TVA, and the CCC.

One of his first and, it turned out, most controversial was the National Recovery Administration. The NRA, in an effort to reduce competition, created codes that did things like set prices. The problem for FDR was that in 1935 the Supreme Court ruled the NRA unconstitutional

FDR, worried that more of his New Deal plans would be rejected by the courts, came up with a plan to get the courts on his side. He proposed adding a new judge for every member of the Court over the age of 70, which meant adding six new justices to the bench, enough to turn the tide of the court in his favor. He claimed the court was overworked and suggested the new justices could relieve some pressure.

The problem was that most Americans and both sides of Congress saw it for what it really was, a power grab. Even though the Democrats held the majority in both houses of Congress, a vote for FDR's measure failed. The failure was partly because one judge had begun voting for FDR's programs, but also because the courts were seen as sacred and people feared FDR's plan could destroy the separation of powers.

Constitutionally, FDR had the power to propose this courtpacking scheme. As with many things, the Constitution is silent on the number of judges to the high court, simply saying in Article 3, Section 1: "The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish."

Congress passed the Judiciary Act of 1789, which set up the Court with six judges. John Adams dropped it down to five, but then Jefferson brought it back to six and then later, when the Federalist judges did not die fast enough, he moved it to seven.

Later Jackson added two more as the population grew and more judicial districts were needed. The Civil War saw some jumbling as Lincoln moved the number to 10, only to be reduced to seven by Andrew Johnson. Finally, under Grant the number was put to nine and since 1869 it has remained that way.

Now, in 2021 President Joe Biden is considering legislation to increase the number of justices for the first time since FDR. The president's reasoning is that the Republicans have gained an unfair advantage with Trump's three new justices. Democrats are still understandably upset at Trump's nomination of Amy Coney Barrett after Republicans blocked Obama's nominee, Merrick Garland, in his last year.

However, though understandable, what the Republicans did was legal, if not morally, correct. What Biden is trying to do is no different than FDR, who wanted to make sure the courts agreed with him. If Clinton had won in 2016 and liberal-leaning judges controlled the court, there would be no call for equality in the court coming from Democratic camps. I normally try to explain history, not solutions, but this is one area where I believe the Founders failed. Not that their system failed, but they could never have foreseen how partisan we have become.

We approved HB 2272 to help create better transparency and accountability as to who is actually applying or has medical marijuana business licenses in our state. The bill will require current licensees and applicants to submit an attestation confirming or denying the existence of any foreign financial interests in their business operation.

If foreign ownership exists, it must be disclosed within 60 days to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control or the Medical Marijuana Authority.

Anyone who fails to submit was going to cost the state over such information to the Bureau within the specified period will have their license revoked.

Another great bill that was signed into law this week was SB 947. Had this law been on the books last year, it might have changed the outcome of the voter-approved Medicaid expansion last summer. This bill will ensure that state questions include information regarding any costs that the state and taxpayers may incur should those ballot measures be approved.

\$160 million annually. Taxpayers have the right to know what proposals will cost because that is their money.

The bill further requires that the ballot provide possible funding sources, whether from the federal government or the state legislature, which could require a new tax, increasing an existing tax, or cutting or eliminating existing services to free up revenue. Nothing is free in government.

Effective Governing Isn't One-Sided

Last November, American voters made their decision at the polls and the result was to elect President Joe Biden and a Congress controlled by Democrats.

However, even in this era as the minority party, Republicans can and should continue to work productively for the American people. Even in the minority, Republicans can be effective at stopping things and getting things done.

Doing so requires willingness to work across the aisle on areas where there is clear common ground.

In his inaugural address, President Biden promised bipartisan cooperation with Republicans in solving problems for Americans. However, so far, he has asked for little to no input from Congress and has made a staggering amount of unilateral decisions that hurt Americans with a stroke of a pen.

First, President Biden has eliminated thousands of American jobs by canceling construction of the Keystone XL pipeline that would bring energy and resources through Oklahoma in the safest and most eco-friendly way possible.

He also made the decision to stop building the southern border wall, even though the funding was already provided by Congress. Now we are fac ing a humanitarian and security crisis like we have never seen before.

Although there are items that could be supported by both parties, it is counterproductive for Democrats to put forward partisan wish lists.

In addition, both parties can and should work together in the annual appropriations process. When I served as chairman and now as ranking member of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies, my Democratic counterpart voted for all four of my final conferenced bills, and I have voted for both of hers since she became chair.

This is because we found areas we could work together such as increases for public health readiness and biomedical research as well as for programs supporting early childhood education and firstgeneration college students.

In this process though, it is important to know each side's red lines. In recent days, the Biden administration and other Democrats have signaled the removal of pro-life protections or the elimination of the Hyde Amendment, which stops federal taxpayer funding for most

abortion procedures.

To be clear, I will never support any appropriations bill that weakens pro-life protections or removes the long-standing Hyde Amendment. I am disappointed the Democrats are even considering removing these long-supported bipartisan protections. It will make bipartisan cooperation on appropriations

that much more difficult. Both parties also see common ground in and can work together on holding our foreign adversaries such as China and Russia accountable.

While President Biden claimed he would do so, under his American Jobs Plan, his actions are extremely counterproductive. It incentivizes American businesses to move overseas.

We must contain Russia, a rogue nation that threatens both the United States and our allies in Eastern Europe, as well as move critical supply chains out of China so that our country is less dependent on foreign supply chains especially those under control of a communist regime.

The choice is up to Demo-

Republicans or not. Indeed, there are areas both parties will never agree such as H.R. 1, the Green New Deal and extreme tax hikes in the proposed American Jobs Plan.

Over the last few months, we have frankly seen little to no desire from our counterparts across the aisle to listen to our voices.

However, I expect this will change. Frankly, at some point Democrats will need Republican votes. I hope in the coming months, we can work better together toward bipartisan legislation that benefits all Americans. Otherwise, we will see gridlock and partisan discord.

We can do better than that. In the last Congress, Republicans and Democrats cooperated to pass five coronavirus relief bills. We also worked together to pass the National Defense Authorization Act and fund the government on a bipartisan basis. That can all happen again. And, for America to move forward, it must.

While Republicans should be ready to cooperate where true bipartisanship exists, it is completely appropriate for us to continue speaking out against the deceptive messaging of Democrats.



Chickasaw Nation Dental 421-4596, Monday-Friday Services have begun a phased from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. A virtual reopening of routine services dental visit will be scheduled at the Chickasaw Nation Medical Center (CNMC). A dental representative will contact all non-urgent patients with previously canceled appointments.

Dental clinic hours will be from 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday-Friday. Patients must have a dental appointment to enter a **Chickasaw Nation Department** of Health (CNDH) facility. Walk-in appointments are not allowed at this time.

Patients who did not have an appointment prior to CO-VID-19 will not be scheduled at this time; patients with previously canceled appointments are being contacted and rescheduled. CNDH dental clinics in Ardmore, Purcell and Tishomingo will not be rescheduling non-emergency dental patients at this time but will begin reopening in the coming months.

COVID-19 testing is required for most dental procedures and preventative care treatments. Staff will navigate patients through the rapid testing process prior to appointment time.

Urgent dental care remains available to patients by calling the dental call center at (580)

on the same day to determine next steps for emergent dental patients.

For dental questions or emergent issues, please call the CNDH dental call center at (580) 421-4596.

Urgent/emergent care (pain/ swelling) appointments:

A virtual visit appointment with a CNDH dentist to assess the patient and urgency for an on-site appointment is the first step. Results of the virtual visit appointment will determine next step. Staff will communicate next steps based on the assessment and recommendation of the dentist.

COVID-19 testing for dental patients:

COVID-19 rapid testing will be required for the majority of treatment and preventative care provided. Dental staff will work with dental patients to coordinate a COVID-19 test at a CNDH facility. Required testing must be completed within 72 hours of a scheduled dental appointment.

Appointments will be rescheduled when clinically appropriate if a patient tests positive for COVID-19.






