Summer school takes on new look

Little about the 2020-21 school year was normal. And neither is summer school 2021.

An estimated 150 to 175 students will participate in the summer session at Purcell Public Schools.

Superintendent Dr. Sheli McAdoo said the district is offering classes from kindergarten through 12th grade.

The emphasis for elementary students will be reading skills while credit recovery and remediation will be the focus at the secondary level.

In addition, the curriculum will include an ACT prep class for high school students, McAdoo said.

Bosse update

Killer to remain on state's death row

The U.S. Supreme Court signaled it may be willing to restrict the scope of its 2020 ruling in McGirt vs. Oklahoma in a decision announced on May 26.

Justices ruled Oklahoma will retain custody of Shaun Bosse, who was sentenced to die for the 2010 murders of a Dibble woman and her two young children.

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Private business shouldn't have to compete with feds

Prior to COVID, businesses were already competing for and retaining reliable workers.

Back then at least it was the free market with businesses competing against each other.

Today, as the pandemic begins to lessen its grip, there are many, many openings for workers in restaurants, convenience stores and many other industries throughout the country.

But as the economy reopens, those businesses find themselves competing at a severe disadvantage because of a federal program which gave recipients an extra \$1,200 a month in unemployment benefits that was implemented at the height of last year's mass COVID layoffs.

Oklahoma Governor Kevin Stitt is putting an end to the extra \$300 a week funded through the American Rescue Plan, a \$1.9 trillion bill approved in March and extending through early September. That funding will be cut off June 26.



To incentivize unemployed people to return to the work, Stitt said the state will offer a \$1,200 stipend for the first 20,000 workers who get off unemployment and work at least 32 hours per week at a qualifying job. Claimants can begin applying on June 28.

Not all people are staying home because of the more generous unemployment benefits. Some are still wrestling with child care, or the lack thereof. And some fear contracting CO-

VID, which should change with increased vaccination rates.

But some are staying home because they can make more through unemployment compensation than from working at jobs they weren't all that excited to have in the first place.

The idea people might pass up an honest job to stay at home with healthy compensation rubs some the wrong way.

It's true that some industries struggling the most to find workers aren't known for high wages. If they want to employ reliable workers they're going to have to meet some reasonable demands. But they shouldn't have to compete with the government in an already tough and changing market.

"Common sense tells you that if you want people to go back to work then the government can't be an unfair competitor by paying people not to work," Sen. Charles E. Grassley, R-Iowa said in 2020.

The same is true today.

Stay prepared during storm season

With summer in full swing, like many of you, I welcome more opportunities to be outdoors and enjoy the warmer weather.

Summertime brings many of my favorite activities like cooking out with family and friends, an afternoon on the water and simply slowing down a bit to enjoy life.

But summer months also make conditions right for dangerous storms. These potential weather events can cause system, but I want you to know hand sanitizer. Rural Electric crews are ready and standing by to respond should power outages occur

I would encourage you to also

practice safety and preparedness to protect your family during major storms and outages.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency recommends the items below as a starting point for storm and disaster preparedness, but you can visit www.ready.gov for additional resources.

- Stock your pantry with a three-day supply of nonperishable food, such as canned goods, energy bars, peanut butter, powdered milk, instant coffee, water and other essentials (i.e., diapers and toiletries).
- Confirm you have adequate sanitation and hygiene supplies
- stocked with pain relievers, bandages and other medical essentials and make sure your prescriptions are current.

 Set aside basic household items you will need, including flashlights, batteries, a manual can opener and portable, battery-powered radio or TV.

 Organize emergency supplies so they are easily accessible in one location.

In the event of a prolonged power outage, turn off major appliances, TVs, computers and other sensitive electronics. This will help avert damage from a power surge, and will also help prevent overloading the circuits during power restoration.

However, do leave one light on so you will know when destruction to our electrical including towelettes soap and power is restored. If you plan to use a small generator, make • Ensure your first aid kit is sure it's rated to handle the amount of power you will

Session wraps up

We adjourned "sine die," which is a Latin phrase that, when used in relation to the Legislature, means we adjourn without assigning a day for another meeting. Adjourning this way would allow us to meet again in a special session if it's absolutely necessary.

We are already preparing for our anticipated special session later this year, during which we'll review final data from the U.S. Census Bureau and approve boundaries for our congressional districts.

We have known for several months to expect delayed data from the U.S. Census Bureau, since the census ran longer than normal last year due to the pandemic.

However, the Legislature could not wait for the final data before we adjusted our legislative districts. Our state constitution requires us to redraw district boundaries during the session, so our House Redistricting Office used the

On Thursday, May 27, we most recently available data,

While any major shifts to the maps aren't expected, the Governor has already signed into law, we still need to meet for a special session so we can approve boundaries for our congressional districts.

This summer, our redistricting subcommittees will host town halls in each part of the state to hear from Oklahomans who want to share their thoughts on congressional boundaries.

We expect to receive our final data sometime in August or September, and we'll meet for special session shortly afterward to approve any changes.

Redistricting only comes around every 10 years. It has been a very interesting process to participate in.

I've also learned a lot this year about the committee process, as this was my first session as a committee chair. During my first term, I served

Biden must secure the border

Every year, the United States welcomes nearly one million immigrants entering our country legally and lawfully. That is more than any other nation in

While both Republicans and Democrats agree that immigration reform is needed, President Biden's policy reform by executive action is severely misguided and irresponsible. And as we have seen in recent months, the consequences of his open border policies are endangering American citizens.

I remain alarmed by the lack of leadership from the Biden Administration, which has led to the ongoing humanitarian, public health and security crisis at our southern border.

Moreover, although Vice President Kamala Harris was tasked by President Biden with addressing and solving the crisis at our southern border on March 24, she only recently made plans to visit and see

meantime, the emergency has Biden's open border. Accordseverely worsened.

Following the president's reversal of certain immigration policies by executive order, drug cartels are taking full advantage of Biden's open borders to smuggle in record amounts of fentanyl and other deadly synthetic opioids.

In fact, according to the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), the total weight of fentanyl seized at the southern border has increased 233 percent during the last several months - compared to the entire year before. And these figures are only the numbers for opioids actually seized and kept out of our communities.

Unfortunately, drug smugglers are also getting these dangerous substances across the border without a trace, and now many states across the country are experiencing a spike in fentanyl and other opioid-related deaths.

Sadly, the trafficking of dangerous drugs is just one of the situation firsthand. In the the consequences of President

ing to CPB, more than 17,000 illegal migrants were unaccompanied minors in April alone, and it is projected that as many as 184,000 unaccompanied children could reach the border by the end of September.

Such a journey is not only unsafe for these children since it could lead to sexual exploitation or forced labor, but it could also strain America's foster care systems that already have been stretched thin by the coronavirus pandemic.

Indeed, upon arrival, unaccompanied children must first be placed into foster care before they can be placed with another family or relatives already living in the United States.

With already 420,000 children in our foster care system, hundreds of thousands more is unsustainable and could make it difficult for any child to be properly cared for.

In addition to the trafficking

Starkly higher postage greets American public

The United States Postal Service announced a planned adjustment of postage rates as of Aug. 29, 2021, for the public and commercial mail users. For community newspapers using Periodicals mail to reach readers, the average rate increase will be nearly 9%. The First-Class Stamp will move from 55 cents to 58 cents.

The rate increase is part of a new USPS business plan that also includes a weakening of service standards for mail that is moving across the country.

The proposed new rates must be reviewed by the Postal Regulatory Commission. But the PRC has already granted USPS the authority to eliminate an inflation-based price cap on rates. It gave USPS a new set of parameters that allows it to charge more for mail that remains in the postal system while digital technology provides new competition for delivery of messages and advertising.

Brett Wesner, chair of National Newspaper Association and president of Wesner Publications, Cordell, Okla., said the rate announcement was grim news for community newspapers that have been fielding months of complaints that subscribers are not receiving their copies on time.

"Nothing about this scenario is good," Wesner said. "These increases will require many newspapers to increase subscription prices to cover this new cost and readers will think we have lost our minds to charge more when USPS cannot get the paper to so many on time. But times are tough in our world. We have to pay these bills.

"At the same time," Wesner said, "we have been warning our member newspapers for several years now that if Congress did not enact postal reform legislation, we would wind up exactly where we are today. It is not a recipe for success."

Wesner said that NNA has continued to support postal reform legislation and has endorsed the proposed Postal Service Reform Act of 2021, introduced by Reps. Carolyn Maloney, D-New York, and James Comer, R-Kentucky.

There are lids called Tatters that are reusable for three or four times. Make sure to sfollow manufactures instructions for their use.

Check your jar rings/bands for rust and dents. Rings may be used over and over if they are free from rust spots or dents. If you find rust and dents, it is time to toss and replace.

Rusted or dented rings can be a cause for canned products not to seal properly. Proper care for rings/bands include removing them for your cooled jars. Bands need to be washed and dried and stored in a cool place.

When canning, always use mason jars that have an embossed emblem on the jar. Always check your jars for cracks and chips, paying special attention to the rims and bottoms of the jars.

If you are using pectin in your preservation, it is usually good for three or four years or check the expiration date on the package.

When using outdated pectin your jam/jellies sometimes will not thicken properly. If this happens don't fret it can always be used for pancake or waffle syrup and an ice cream

down the road.







Rain damaged hay

South Central Oklahoma has been blessed with large quantities of rain this spring. While welcomed, it has also caused some of us a few headaches.

A lot of people have hay ready, but with rain still lingering in the forecast there is a chance to get it wet. What happens to that hay if it gets cut and then gets rained on.

Hay that has been cut and then rained on can lose quality in four ways. These include: 1) leaching of soluble carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals. 2) Increased and prolonged plant respiration. 3) Leaf shattering. And 4) Microbial breakdown of plant tissue.

Leaching of carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals is usually at its highest when the hay has dried somewhat and we then have a prolonged rain.

Rainfall right after cutting usually results in less leaching of nutrients and a quick splash and dash shower normally doesn't result in large losses of these nutrients on freshly cut hay.

Increased or prolonged respiration occurs when hay is not allowed to dry sufficiently to stop the plants metabolic processes.

Hay must reach moisture content of less than 30 percent for respiration to be reduced to acceptable levels.

Hay that is rained on when no cost on the "Connecting was taken into custody and relatively green will continue to respire for longer periods of time, resulting in the loss of forage nutrients and dry matter yield. Likewise, partially dried hay that is rained on can continue to respire for longer periods resulting in lower quality and yield of hay.

Increased leaf shatter is another problem associated with hay that has been rained on. Wet hay usually means more mechanical handling of the hay in order to dry it.

Since leaves tend to dry quicker than stems, any increased raking or tedding tends to shatter leaves from stems. Since more of the soluble nutrients are in the leaf tissue. the loss of leaf blades while The investigation is ongoing. raking and baling can reduce

hay quality substantially. Loss of leaf blades can also result in reduction of dry matter yields.

Microbial breakdown of plant tissue occurs when fungi, molds and other microorganisms begin to feed on the downed hay. These organisms develop rapidly in warm-moist conditions and feed on the dead plant material.

Hay that is lying on the ground and remains wet for long time periods becomes a perfect environment for these organisms to live and breed. They can quickly consume plant nutrients and destroy plant cell structure resulting in loss of dry matter yield, nutrient content and given time, will completely rot the hay.

What are the consequences of hay being rained on? Research conducted at the University of Kentucky by Michael Collins indicated that we can lose up to 5 percent of the dry matter per inch of rain on cut hay.

Digestibility can be reduced by 10 percent or more due to leaching of nutrients and leaf shatter. A similar study done by Ann Cowen at Iowa State University reported protein loses of 3 percent and total digestible nutrient reduction of 4.6 percent.

Rained-on hay is not a good thing, but, unless it is just a rotting mess, you still cannot tell by looking at it what the actual quality of that hay is. Testing it is your best strategy for determining the nutrient quality you will get from the hay.

Sampling rained-on hay will give you the information you need to design a supplementation program that will keep your animals in good shape during the winter feeding period. We can help you with sampling techniques, hay probes, and testing.

For a small investment of time and money, testing will pay off big in the health and nutrition of your herd.

The CVB is a cash equivalent benefit, provided by the WIC program, for the purchase of fruits and vegetables. The CVB amount will increase from \$9 per month to \$35 per month per participant beginning June 1, 2021 continuing through September 30, 2021.

This temporary benefit increase is funded by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. Current participants will see the increase automatically added to their benefits.

Until recently, program participants were only able to purchase fresh or frozen fruits and vegetables with their CVB.





Hate crimes are very much on the rise here in the good United States. Why is there all this hate in the USA? Where is it coming from? Who is teaching our children to hate? We are. Our media is. Our religious institutions are. Our schools are. Our businesses are. It comes from fear and starts at home.

Our next Food Bank Give- I would like to have written for Applied Social Research at Northeastern University in Boston and an expert in hate crimes. He said, "A father comes home from work and says over the kitchen table, "They're hiring all those Asians, women, Jews, Blacks. They're getting the promotions, and I'm being held back." Or, "Did you see that some Latinos bought the house down the street? There go the property values." Then says McDevitt, "Akid internalizes that and says 'I could do something to these people' and does."

What can be done about all this hate? It's one thing to tolerate hateful speech. In a Democracy we must. It's quite another thing to condone it. And it's even worse, of course, to participate in it.

You fight speech with speech, using words to pull a community together while others try to rip it apart. And you do more. You teach tolerance and respect at an early age. And, as a Christian, you teach that we are all created in the Image of God and that we all have worth, value, and dignity.

Lickin' That Calf Again!

About a decade ago, I heard the great motivational speaker Zig Ziglar tell a memorable story. It kind of reminded me of what my mama or Grandma would have told me as they tried to get me to grow up right. They both subscribed to an old redclay standard of there being one way to doing a thing: the right way. There was a clear distinction between right and wrong back in the old days.

Mr. Ziglar nailed that lesson square on the head in his speech at Dallas' Reunion Arena in front of several thousand motivation enthusiasts, including a group of students I had taken to hear the iconic speaker. I'll never forget how Mr. Ziglar owned the stage that day, bouncing around with the vigor of a teenager, telling story after story about his life experiences.

This particular story was from when he was a boy after his family had just moved from Alabama to rural Mississippi. Some of what Mama and Grandma offered regularly must've migrated even further west than I realized.

One day when he was about 10, his mama told him to go outside and hoe the garden. He grabbed the hoe and did as he was told, without complaint. After about half an hour, likely she had been eyeing him from the window, she came out to inspect his work. He described the sad scene with the classic Zig Ziglar chuckle.

"I knew the inspection wasn't going to go the way I wanted," he laughed, "just by the way my mama was walking on the way out there. Whenever I did a shabby job of something, she'd always put her hands behind her back as she walked; and she'd shake her head the whole way."

Sure enough, that day she threw her hands behind her and was shaking her head before she had taken ten steps toward the garden. Things did not look up for Zig once she got sight of his work, either. She took one look at the halfway-tilled garden, grimaced, and with a scowl, said,

"Son, you've got to lick this calf again."

I can still hear Zig telling this story, his voice rising up at the end of sentences, his hard stressing of consonants on the end of words, and his chuckle in between it all. He knew what Mama meant when she said, "Son, you've got to lick this calf again," but, as any kid will do, he still protested.

"What d'you mean, Mama?"

"You know what I mean," she snapped. Now get to re-hoeing this garden, and I mean now!"

"But, Mama," Zig protested again, pushing his luck to the limit, "most mamas don't make their sons do any better job than this!"

"That may be," snapped his mama, "but you're not 'most mamas' son. The quicker you learn that the better."

With that, she turned and walked away from the garden just the way she had walked out to it.

For the record, the son of this particular Mississippi mama sweated a good while longer in the garden that day, licking that

Filing period for upcoming Chickasaw election is June 7-9

The Chickasaw Nation Election Commission announces the filing period for the 2021 General Elections opens June 7 and continues through June

Candidates must contact the election secretary's office at (580) 310-6475 for more information and to schedule an appointment.

Candidates may file between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30

Seats up for election include five legislative seats and one seat on the Supreme Court.

Legislative seats to be filled are: Seats 1 and 2 of Pontotoc District; Seats 1 and 4 of Pickens District; and Seat 1 of the Tishomingo District. Seat 2 of the Chickasaw Nation Supreme Court is also up for election this year.

Legislative candidates must be registered Chickasaw voters at least 25 years of age, residents of the Chickasaw Nation for at least one year and of their respective district for at least six months immediately preceding the election.

Legislators must remain residents of their elected district during the tenure of their office. Term of office is three years. Filing fees are \$500.

A Supreme Court candidate must be a registered voter of the Chickasaw Nation at least 30 years of age. Justices must be residents of the Chickasaw Nation during their three-year term of office. Filing fees are

Candidates must bring verification of physical and mailing address, such as a utility bill or homestead exemption, which displays candidate's physical address, filing fee and upon filing must complete a financial disclosure statement. Statements are also due at the end of every month during the candidate's active campaign

Candidates will receive an electoral packet containing election rules and regulations, the Chickasaw Constitution, financial disclosure forms, biography form for the Chickasaw Times, and watcher form. Candidates must not have been convicted of a felony. Background checks are conducted on all candidates.

Primary election is July 27 and run-off election is August 31, if applicable.

Make sure you have easy access to water and your gardens have means for excess water to drain. The limited soil mass and increased exposure to wind, heat and sunlight make planting mixes dry out more quickly than in-ground beds. Always water thoroughly to encourage deep, more drought tolerant roots.

Extend the time between watering by as much as 25 percent with the help of a sustainable, organic product like Wild Valley Farms'woolpellets(wildvalleyfarms.com). Made from wool waste, these pellets absorb and retain moisture releasing it when needed by the plants.

Purchase an elevated garden with wheels or add casters to the legs if you need to move

entertaining. Take advantage of the added mobility to move your planter into the sun or shade as needed throughout the season. Employ space saving tech-

niques to maximize your gardens productivity. Space plants just far enough apart to reach their mature size. Plant quickmaturing vegetables like radishes, lettuce and beets between tomatoes, peppers and other vegetables that take longer to reach full size and start producing. You will be harvesting the short season vegetables just as the bigger plants need the space.

Look for compact flower and vegetable varieties that allow you to make the most of every square inch of these gardens. All-America Selections winner Patio Choice Yellow Cherry tomato produces up to 100 tomatoes on an 18-inch plant. Mascotte compact bush bean and Patio Pride peas are big producers suited to these and small space gardens.

Extend your enjoyment and harvest with succession plantings. Fill vacant spaces left once your garden out of the way for a row or block of vegetables are

harvested. Freshen up ornamental plantings by replacing weather worn flowers with healthy new selections. Add more planting mix along with wool pellets if needed.

Train vining plants onto trellises or other supports to save space and reduce the risk of disease. Dress them up by allowing trailing herbs and flowers to cascade over the edge of these planting beds.

Increasing growing success and reducing maintenance will make raised beds and elevated gardens a practical and productive addition to your gardening endeavors.
