

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
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Wet weather to continue

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Denied

McGirt not a get out of jail card for convicted killer

A convicted killer who cited the McGirt decision and subsequent Bosse case in an appeal filed in March saw his application for post conviction relief denied at a May 17 hearing.

Brian K. Spears, 51, is serving a life sentence without parole in the 1990 murder in Garvin County of Jimmy Dewayne Thompson.

Spears was charged with first-degree murder.

According to court documents, Spears and co-defendants Dudley A. Powell and Clayborn Johnson III beat, kicked and repeatedly stabbed Thompson during a robbery in which the victim's wallet and pickup were stolen.

Spears was initially given the death penalty at the conclusion of his trial in 1991 and was denied post conviction relief by the Oklahoma Court of Criminal Appeals in 1995 and 1999, according to court records.

The death sentence was overturned on appeal and in April

Luckily I didn't have to use any Kung Fu Fighting skills to subdue a would-be intruder. It just made a mess with all the trinkets spilled all over the


Still the damage had been done. Our last 15 minutes of dream time was rocked so we went ahead and got the ball rolling for a trip to Will Rogers World Airport.

Update from the Capitol

the First Session of the 58th Legislature. It's been a whirlwind—it seems like just yesterday I was getting sworn in relief as the personal income but at the same time, it seems like that was so long ago.

We've accomplished many things in the last six months. One thing I learned is crafting the annual budget is a yearround process. It doesn't start when session convenes each February, but rather within a month of the previous session adjourning.

Legislative leaders and committee chairs have numerous meetings throughout One of the most exciting the interim with the various state agencies to hear their lion tax incentive for providers funding needs and how they've used their current to underserved and unserved funding. It's a very in-depth and comprehensive yearround process.

legislature chose to spend significantly less than was available, given that they didn't know how the pandemic was going to impact the state's economy the last half of 2020 into this year.

That decision, along with our rebounding economy and strengthening energy sector, provided us with a historic level of revenue. This session, we once again decided to be fiscally conservative and put more than \$800 million of that surplus back into state savings, because you just never know when the next natural disaster or economic downturn could hit, and we must have a financial cushion to protect our state agencies and services.

Overall, we approved a \$8.8 billion FY'22 budget that will begin on July 1, which is a 14 percent increase over the FY'21 budget. The comprehensive plan protects our 65 appropriated state agencies, providing an average increase of 7 percent. It provides historic funding for schools, tax relief for all Oklahomans, economic development, rural broadband expansion and much more.

The Department of Education will receive its largest budget in state history at \$3.16 billion, accounting for more than one-third of the total state budget.

More than \$15 million will also be added to the Rural Economic Action Plan (REAP) to provide grants for additional infrastructure projects around the state, especially in rural districts like ours. Another exciting economic

> development effort will come through a \$30 million film tax incentive to attract more TV shows and major films to our beautiful state.

> We're working hard to diversify our state's economy and lessen our dependence on the energy sector, which requires us finding new sources of revenue. This incentive has already proven quite successful with a significant return on investment.

I'll talk more about this program next week along with some of the other major accomplishments of the session.

Israel's longest and most loyal ally

United States has proudly stood with and by the Jewish State of Israel on the international stage. Indeed, America has always remained Israel's longest and most loyal ally.

first established itself as an independent state on May 14, 1948, upon the declaration of the Jewish People's Council and following years of land disputes. It was on that very same day – 11 minutes later, in fact – that the United States was first to recognize Israel and affirm its right to exist.

About a year later, the United Nations also recognized Israel through admittance into its organization. However, many decades since Israel first declared its independence, there the previous Congress. are still 29 countries around the world, including several of its Arab and Muslim neighbors, that refuse to acknowledge allow a vote on it last week, Israel's right to exist.

Although the Israeli people desire to live at peace with their neighbors in the surrounding region, they are constantly the targets of senseless terror. And in recent few weeks, Israel has endured relentless and vicious attacks from Hamas.

To be clear, Hamas is a terrorist organization that does not friends and push back against

For nearly 75 years now, the Israel's use of missile defense systems to protect its civilians, Hamas purposely embeds among innocent civilians and uses them as human shields. Alarmingly, Hamas continues to receive funding from state And it is the shared desire to sponsors of terrorism, includ-

In response to what has now been more than 4,000 rockets in less than two weeks, House As you might know, Israel Republicans requested a vote last week on the bipartisan Palestinian International Terrorism Support Prevention Act, which was introduced by Congressman Brian Mast earlier this year.

Rightly so, the legislation would sanction those who fund Hamas and the Palestinian Islamic Jihad, as well as cut off the flow of weapons. Unfortunately, 217 Democrats blocked consideration of the bill – even though this same exact bill passed the House in

I am disappointed that Democrats who previously supported the legislation refused to even especially while Israel is the clear target of terrorism.

The House missed a critical opportunity to show it stands with Israel and against terrorist organizations and their enablers. Indeed, as Israel's most

loyal ally, we have a solemn

duty to stand with our Israeli

value human life. In contrast to sympathizers of the terrorist organization of Hamas and those who aim to misrepresent the narrative. Certainly, as a target of terrorism, Israel has the right to defend itself.

As a long-time member of the House Appropriations Committee that provides for our own national defense as well as significant security and economic assistance for Israel, I have proudly supported funding for initiatives like the Iron Dome, a joint Israeli-American project that intercepts missiles.

Over the years and particularly in recent days, this technology has proved critical to helping Israel protect its people from enemies and save hundreds of lives. While the U.S.-provided security assistance rightly comes with the flexibility for Israel to selfdetermine how to exercise the right to defend itself, much of it is spent on purchasing needed equipment from U.S. industry.

Mental Health Awareness Month 2021: Know what's covered

May is National Mental Health Awareness Month and many people have been experiencing greater stresses since

Many families are still facing economic challenges and anxieties about the health of loved ones.

In honor of Mental Health Awareness Month, I would like to take a moment to remind Oklahomans that all comprehensive major medical insurance plans are required by law to cover mental health and substance abuse services.

Under Oklahoma law, health

They cannot limit the number of visits you make to such providers and cannot charge greater co-pays for outpatient mental health and substance disorder services than other primary care medical services.

Here is some helpful insurance information to help you understand your access to mental health services.

Mental Health Coverage **Options**

The federal parity law generally applies to the following

- Employer-sponsored health
- Coverage purchased Act (ACA).
- Children's Health Insurance

• Medicaid program (SoonerCare). Requirements may vary, contact the Oklahoma Healthcare Authority if you are unsure how the federal parity law applies to your Medicaid benefits.

Eligibility and Claim Issues

Check your description of plan benefits — it should include information on behavioral health services or coverage for mental health and substance use disorders. If you still aren't sure, contact your insurance company directly or contact us at 800-522-0071.

If your mental health claim is denied, always ask why. Your health plan will have a process to review and appeal denied claims. You or your provider may also file a complaint with us. Check out the National Alliance on Mental Illnesses' tips for what to do if you're denied care by your insurance carrier.

Crime and Policing Pat-



Crime and policing in some way are as old as time itself, yet there have been periods in American history where crime was more common or at least thought to be. The first period that comes to mind is the socalled "Wild West." Whether the cow towns were actually violent is debated, but Hollywood has engrained in our collective minds the wildness of towns like Dodge City, Tombstone, and Deadwood.

What brought order to these towns were men as tough as iron. These sheriffs were quick with a gun but sometimes were accused of being as violent as the men they arrested. To make the west safe, they had to enforce tough laws with a strong hand. Hollywood has capitalized on men like Wyatt Earp, Bat Masterson, and Bill Hickock.

Another period known for lawlessness was the 1920s. Prohibition was the law of the land but that only opened the door to criminals who saw easy money in bootlegging. Gangsters became household names like Al Capone, "Baby Face" Nelson, and John Dillinger. There were also men like "Lucky" Luciano who helped organize the Five Families in New York.

Then there were crimes that are not as famous today but were know at the time like the Osage Murders in Oklahoma. The crimes of the 1920s helped turn the new and undermanned Bureau of Investigation into the modern trained and efficient Federal Bureau of Investiga-

could turn into secret police. However, the crime wave in the '20s and the inability or unwillingness of the local police to confront it, resulted in a public demand for help, even if some of the police tactics reminded some of a police state.

The Osage murders are a good example. As shown in David Grann's book Killers of the Flower Moon, which is currently being turned into a movie starring Leonardo DiCaprio, Osage Indians were being murdered in 1921 The local police were unable or possibly unwilling to find the murderers. In one of their first big high-profile cases, the FBI solved the crime. I don't want to give away more, but it's a

book worth reading. Hollywood has always taken advantage of these times to make a bit of cash and that is no different than with the next major crime wave. In 1971 America was introduced to a new character and catch phrase, when Dirty Harry first asked the bad guy, "Do you feel lucky?" The movie about a crime-ridden city and an ineffective police force resonated with the public. lyspeaking.blog or Facebook It took an old school cop, one at @jamesWfinck.

However, the sniper was released because Harry had not followed all the rules. Harry eventually catches him again, this time killing him, then throwing his badge into the river in protest to how crime was being handled.

Dirty Harry was not finished, however. His style of policing became so popular that he made four more movies and inspired several other similar movies. Another standout was 1974's "Death Wish." In this film, Charles Bronson's character was a happy family man until thugs broke into his home and killed his wife and left his daughter barely alive After the police could not help, Bronson began walking the streets at night in Central Park hoping to get mugged so he could bring his own form of vigilante justice to the city. Movies like "Dirty Harry"

and "Death Wish" reverberated with people who were themselves afraid to walk in places like Central Park. Crime rates had been on the rise since the 1960s but then started to fall in the 1990s. The reasons for the decline in crime are still being debated today, but many give credit to men like New York Mayor Rudolph Giuliani, who started controversial but effective policies to reduce crime. (Yes, he had a career before Trump.)

One thing he did was to greatly increase the number of cops on the street. Giuliani was attacked as a racist and his policies as Gestapo tactics, but people were able to walk the streets at night. What we have seen in all these cases is that the population tolerated more policing for safety. Yet over time, people became less tolerant, forcing less policing, and the cycle continued.

We are watching this cycle currently play out again. Time will have to tell if crime on the rise is a matter of COVID or new attitudes towards policing. Historically speaking, the attitudes towards policing and lower numbers of law enforcement will be followed by continuing higher crime rates until they get high enough that the next version of "Dirty Harry" will be required to clean up the streets. Who knows how long that will take, but until then the only question to ask yourself is, "Do you feel lucky?".

Extend your enjoyment and harvest with succession plantings. Fill vacant spaces left once a row or block of vegetables are harvested.

Freshen up ornamental plantings by replacing weath-

er worn flowers with healthy new selections. Add more planting mix along with wool pellets if needed. Train vining plants onto trellises or other supports to

save space and reduce the risk of disease. Dress them up by allowing trailing herbs and flowers to cascade over the edge of these planting beds. Increasing growing success and reducing maintenance

will make raised beds and elevated gardens a practical and productive addition to your gardening endeavors.

may live in apartments with only a balcony for outside space or in a home with a small yard."

Vertical gardens are often referred to as green walls, but they differ from facades such as ivy walls.

When considering support surfaces for vertical gardens, gardeners need to think about what they want to grow-flowers, vegetables or a combination of both—then let their imaginations go wild.

Hillock said obvious choices include fences, trellises, pergolas, posts, trees and cages.

"If you really want to create some visual interest, consider things such as old ladders, bicycles, old wagon wheels, wooden pallets or containers attached to an existing fence," he said. "The possibilities are endless and are limited only by what look you're going for in that space."

Although there are many plants that can be trained to grow vertically, not every plant is a good choice for every surface. Plants that thrive by crawling up or hanging down – including pole beans, some peas, tomatoes and most cucumbers – can easily be grown vertically with the necessary support.

The same is true of melons, gourds, squashes and pumpkins, but they need even sturdier surfaces. Other plants may need to be tied in place.

"Something else to consider is plants grown in a vertical garden are more exposed to the sun and air, so they're going to dry out faster," he said. "Frequent watering is essential. In some cases, drip and micro-irrigation alternatives can be combined very effectively to ensure adequate moisture.'

For those who enjoy traditional gardening along with their vertical projects, make sure to position structures so they don't cast unwanted shade on sun-loving plants.

'We know how damaging the wind can be in Oklahoma, so it's a good idea to have some sort of windbreak protection if possible,"Hillock said. "Also, as with traditional gardening, vertical gardening containers should drain well to encourage good root system development. Good drainage also deters root rot."

Growing vegetables vertically has the potential to greatly expand a gardener's food production by Although it may take a little extra time to get everything set up, vertical growing can decrease fruit problems and make watering, harvesting and spraying easier.

Depending on placement of those structures, vertical gardens can act as a cooling barrier between the sunlight and the residence, which has the potential to cut electric bills.

Hillock said there are great

increasing yields per square foot. benefits for seniors or others who have limited mobility.

"They can simply walk to their garden and harvest their vegetables and herbs much easier than is possible with a traditional vegetable or herb bed," he said. "Gardening can be such a creative outlet for many people, and vertical gardening is just another way to be creative in the landscape and get the most out of your outdoor space."




