Utility woes

Broken main leaves north Purcell high and dry

Utility company workers broke a water main serving north Purcell about 10 a.m. Tuesday.

City manager Dale Bunn said the crew was installing a new 12-inch water main on North 9th Avenue when they broke the existing main at Woodbrook Drive.

The break left much of north Purcell without water throughout the day. Bunn said repairing the

break and restoring water service is the responsibility of the utility company. "We're watching them,"

Bunn said.

The city's water department superintendent Michael Minor estimated it would be 5 p.m. before water service would be restored to the affected areas.

Included in the outage area were Purcell Municipal Hospital and Purcell Schools.

Well, Amy made the call and the next Mike knew, she called him and told him to get a haircut.

"We have a job interview in Clinton," she said.

And then she dropped the bombshell. The ad was from a funeral home.

"I am not going to a funeral home," Mike insisted.

But they went. The man (Troy Lee) was intense," Mike recalled. After an interview lasting 3-1/2 hours, Lee hired the Tolles. And just like that their lives changed forever. Mike, who took psychology classes and wanted to be a football coach, was an apprentice in a funeral home. Amy worked in the office and helped with evening

"The first shot teaches your body to recognize the virus. The second further instructs the immune system to remember the virus and make a stronger, more focused response if it sees it again."

2. What's a normal reaction?

The most common side effects are soreness, redness and swelling at the injection site. Other common side effects are fatigue, mild headache, chills. fever, nausea and muscle aches.

Easter Sunday was the perfect time for an egg hunt at Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church in Purcell.



"This is the immune system hard at work. The same thing happens when you get sick," said Chakravarty. "Many of the symptoms we experience with illness are not caused by the particular virus, but by the immune system doing its job to protect us."

3. How long could side effects last?

"Most people feel better within a day or two of symptoms starting," said OMRF physician-scientist Hal Scofield, M.D.

While rare, Scofield noted that symptoms that worsen or last more than a few days warrant a call to your physician.

4. If I don't have a reaction to the shot, did it work?

"Mild or nonexistent symptoms are no reason for concern," said Scofield. "Just like with a course of the virus, vaccine reactions vary from person to person," he said.

According to a recent U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention study of nearly 4,000 health care and other essential workers, Pfizer and Moderna's vaccines were 90 percent effective against COVID-19 infection after the second dose.

"These 'real world' studies should serve as an encouraging sign that, regardless of how you felt following your shot, the vaccines offer widespread protection," Scofield added.

NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL Preparing to travel abroad

As more people become fully vaccinated for COVID-19 and with summer fast approaching, the desire to take trips and vacations outside of the United States again will only continue to grow.

If you are hoping or planning to take a trip abroad anytime soon, please be advised about some important information and guidance regarding passport applications and renewals as well as certain foreign country requirements.

First, if you are planning to apply for a passport or renew an expiring one, you might experience significant delays due to application backlogs caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

As a result, routine passport applications could take up to 12 weeks or longer to process and even expedited passport processing could take between 4-6 weeks.

To ensure you have your passport in time for any sched-

uled vacations or trips, the U.S. allow someone from the State Department of State recommends that you apply early in case of delays. You can learn more about the process and begin your own application at travel.state.gov.

While you are visiting the State Department's travel office website, I encourage you to also take note of the useful traveler's checklist, including such things as confirming you have the correct travel information, documentation and insurance.

Second, as you consider your desired destination to visit, know that some countries around the world are currently requiring at least six months of passport validity before allowing entry. This means that travelers leaving the United States may be required to be in possession of passports that are valid for six months beyond the period of their intended stay.

Third, if you are traveling abroad soon and want to receive safety and security updates and

Jim Crow Voting?

Possibly one of the most important fights of this new century is being waged right now in the halls of Congress, in state houses across the nation, and with lesser significance on social media. The question is about voter accessibility and who has the right to determine it.

With COVID-19, voter accessibility was expanded and quite possibility responsible for Biden's victory. The Democrats who benefited from COVID rules want to make those changes permanent on the federal level, while Republicans who suffered want to return to traditional rules through state governments. President Biden weighed in last week, calling Republican attempts a return to Jim Crow.

It is worth taking a look at Jim Crow voting practices, but historically speaking, what seems ironic is during Jim Crow Democrats tried to keep Black Americans from voting booths while today Republicans are trying to force them to have to use them.

First things first. What does the Constitution say about voting practices? According to Article I, Section Four, "The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of choosing Senators." In other words, voting laws are made state by state.

The Federal government has passed amendments dealing with who can vote, but not how. Even then, as discussed in an earlier column, the Constitution does not say voting is a right, only that you cannot deny voting based on race, sex, or age. The Constitution does not prohibit states from blocking voters for different reasons.

Gender a good example of this. Before the passage of the 19th Amendment, states could choose for themselves if they wanted to allow women to vote. In fact, starting with Colorado, thirteen states, mostly in the west, gave women the right to vote before the Federal Government forced the rest to catch up.

Because states can decide who votes, they can also decide who does not, as long as the reason is not illegal. So, for Jim Crow, the 14th Amendment stated you could not deny anyone the right to vote based on their race, skin color, or condition of previous servitude (used to be a slave). What southern states did was establish poll taxes or education tests as requirements for voting.

Since most Black Americans at the time were poor and uneducated, this legally stopped the vast majority of Blacks from casting a ballot. To be legal, states that wanted to stop Blacks from voting also had to stop poor and uneducated White Americans from voting as well. There is some suggestion that some poor whites were willing to give up some political power to retain white supremacy.

With this in mind, are new proposed voting laws in Republican states the same as Jim Crow laws? Biden clearly thinks so. It seems like at the heart of all the laws are two things: mail-in voting and voter IDs. On the surface, these new state laws are saying that in-person voting with an ID is the only way to stop voter fraud.

Below the surface, however, they are saying that mail-in voting is allowing Democrats to go door-to-door to collect ballots from those who traditionally do not vote. Democrats are arguing that Republicans are trying to restrict voters, especially Black voters, by making them show up in person. This assertion is that it is harder for the poor to make it to voting stations and afford IDs, while Republicans claim voting is the only official activity allowed without an ID.

Is it like Jim Crow? Yes and no. Republicans are not trying

to pass new laws per se. They are trying to retain the laws from before COVID. It is actually Democrats trying to change or keep new election laws. But yes, it is true, Republican laws will limit participation.

However, the laws are really just a screen for the real issue that needs to be addressed. Should all people be allowed to vote? This is a difficult question because our instinct in a democracy is to say yes, but we also get the question confused with should all people have the opportunity to vote? Those are different questions.

The Founding Fathers did not find the question difficult. They believed that all people should have the opportunity to vote but that did not mean that all people should be able to. The Founders limited voting only to men who had a stake in society. This was shown by owning property or controlling their own means of survival.

If you worked for someone else, then you were not truly free and so did not have voting rights. Property requirements did not deny citizens the opportunity to vote. It was seen and even hoped that all Americans could become property holders and hence vote, but it took some effort on the part of the person.

One other requirement we see across all thirteen states was that the men had to show up. They had to. Most early voting was done by voice. Early in the 19th Century, voters would turn in a piece of paper with their vote, but even then, the votes were published.

At the time, it was believed voters should openly support who they voted for. Even though transportation was more difficult in early America than today and they had a functioning postal service, part of a stake in society was the expectation of showing up.

No person who wants to vote should be denied the privilege to do so. Extending voting days to up to a week should guarantee access, yet the process, at least according to the Founders, should be done in person as intended. Thomas Paine once said, "What we obtain too cheap, we esteem too lightly."

Voting should not be easy. It should be important. As a bare minimum, voters should at least show up. As for Jim Crow, there are some similarities, but there are those who risked their lives in the 1950s and 1960s for the opportunity to vote in person. Let's be careful not to compare them to those who want to be able to sit at home and mail in their ballot instead of having to wait in line.

§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited.

No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

Three top COVID vaccine myths debunked

Jennifer Rudd, DVM Veterinary Clinical Services, OSU

Vaccine hesitancy is one of our last major hurdles in the fight against COVID-19, and we are racing against the emergence of several variants to avert a (more) prolonged pandemic.

Alarming social media stories portraying COVID vaccines in a negative light have added a dangerous roadblock for many. I hope dispelling these three myths will help others feel ready to safely build protective immunity through vaccination. Myth 1: The approval pro-

cess was rushed.

Before last year, vaccines typically took six to 12 years to develop and receive approval, so I see where this is coming from. How did we roll out the current vaccines so quickly without any shortcuts?

First, the trials were wellfunded and run by companies that know what they are doing. Second, trial phases were overlapped and not run sequentially. Third, the number of participants were enrolled all at once instead of in phases.

Scientists simplified the data collection to two primary questions: Are these vaccines safe? And do they prevent severe disease, hospitalization and death? The vaccines are incredibly safe and highly effective at preventing hospitalization and death, so they received emergency usage approval. Studies did not stop there, though.

Since their approval, we now also know that these vaccines are highly effective at preventing asymptomatic transmission as well. Severe adverse events continue to be rare.

These vaccines continue to be effective against most variants. In fact, these vaccines are outperforming our highest hopes.

Myth 2: The vaccines will alter our DNA and create long-term problems.

The Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are based on mRNA which teaches our cells how to make a protein found on the virus. Because mRNA is found in a different part of the cell than DNA, these vaccines do not affect our DNA. Johnson & Johnson is a viral vector vaccine, and it doesn't reach our DNA, either.

So what about long-term efof the executives of state, ucts are degraded very quickly

example, with the oral polio vaccine and the yellow fever vaccine. That being said, these delayed reactions have all occurred within six to eight weeks of receiving a booster dose, and the reactions mimic natural infection.

Phase 3 trials for the COVID vaccine evaluated participants for the full eight weeks postbooster. No delayed events were noted. In contrast, the risk for long term and chronic, debilitating disease is significant with natural COVID-19.

Myth 3: COVID vaccines cause infertility.

Perhaps the most damaging vaccine myth to date arose when a doctor out of Germany and a former Pfizer employee raised concern about the similarity between part of the viral spike protein and a protein on the placenta — syncytin-1.

The concern was that vaccination would train our immune COVID-19 infection while know and love.

> Our immune responses can differentiate viral proteins from placenta very easily and will not mix these up. While these proteins share small areas of similar genetic code, they don't match. And data supports this as well.

> Within the vaccine trials, more women became pregnant in the vaccine groups than in the placebo group. We have seen no alterations in fertility rates in the U.S. during the pandemic. If this claim were true, then you would expect our immune systems to create antibodies from natural infection that would target the placenta and affect fertility as well.

On the other hand, pregnant women infected with CO-VID-19 are at an increased risk of hospitalization and having preterm birth complications and even death. The risk of

already received a vaccine or plan to in the future. Thank you. But we all know someone we love who is hesitant to get the vaccine.

Choosing whether or not to get a vaccine is too important to be taken lightly. How do we approach this with our loved ones? With kindness, empathy and an open mind.

Ask nicely what is holding them back. More than likely, they either do not believe it to be effective or do not believe the benefits outweigh the risks. Ask them to clarify what is creating their hesitancy.

Recognize that people are trying to do what is best for their families. And then, if you are unsure how to respond, educate yourself before having another discussion. You have more influence than you realize, especially with people you

He retired from active duty as a lieutenant colonel and returned to Purcell, where he served 18 years on the city council and several terms as mayor.

While professing great admiration for Fishburn, Cox said the city needs a policy "on how we name things."

"By no means I'm not against this," he said. "I'm good either way."

Citing today's counter culture, Cox admitted he is "scared" what can come back on the council in the future.

"You never know what will happen down the road," city attorney Greg Dixon said. "You have to protect the council."

City manager Dale Bunn said there is a draft of a proposed form for naming city property.

Among qualifications on that form are a requirement the individual be a member of the community for a certain length of time.

"They have to qualify for it, like Giving Time," Bunn said.

Council member Jay Tate brought the nomination before the council.

He pointed out the Airport Board had already approved naming the building for Fishburn and that's why it was now before the council to accept or reject that board's recommendation.

Tate read a list of Fishburn's accomplishments in the Army and as a civilian.

Fishburn's son, Graham, is currently on the city council. He was silent during most of the discussion before thanking Tate for his comments about his father.

The council eventually approved the measure on a unanimous vote.

In other business, the council:

• condemned a dilapidated vacant house at 520 Apache, clearing the way for the structure to be demolished by the city;

• approved a \$35,623.57 change order for the rehabilitation work of the Red Hill water tower after the contractor determined the tank's diameter is 60 feet, not 54 feet as reported;

We find a hint of greatness in this journey.

The topic of faith probably has never been timelier than it is right now as men are searching for something real to anchor their lives onto.

But for most of us, we do not need to investigate the resurrection of Jesus – as does Mr. Strobel -by interviewing medical doctors or psychologists. We simply go where we can find the greatest evidence for faith. Once we arrive there and spend time in that place, we accept its truth without hesitation. A far greater writer and "journalist" even than Mr. Strobel says, "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

We do not have to travel the country at all to find these great truths. We take the little book we call the Bible – particularly those first four amazing books of the New Testament – and we read the gripping account of a risen Savior, accepting the truth of those accounts through faith.

No, we do not accept them blindly but, rather, because there is overwhelming evidence that those accounts are true. Four men – evangelists – tell the story of a risen Savior in beautiful harmonizing detail, and we find the evidence is not only compelling but also convicting.

The world, I think, largely has missed the true meaning of this thing we call faith: Faith, you see, does not mean that we cannot know. It simply means that we cannot see.

friend Tonda Miller sent me a video of a neurosurgeon who had a seizure and almost died. He says that, during the seizure, he actually went up to heaven and saw all of its beauties.

As he speaks – certainly looking and sounding authoritative with his white jacket and apocalyptic story – he holds in his hand a model of the brain. The doctor explains that his experience had to have been outside the cortex of the brain, that it was something beyond man's mental capacities. So, as a result, he believed that heaven must be real.

My first thought at hearing that story was this: Wait a minute! We do not have to get a "free trip" to heaven for us to believe. Faith is knowing without seeing – not knowing because we've seen!

Certainly, we are glad that the gentleman now believes. But are we not more impressed when a man takes the inspired book in his hands, examines its great message continually and passionately, then comes to this one inescapable conclusion: I believe!

Faith, you see, is not the guessing, the assumption, the theory, the possibility of things not seen. Faith is the "evidence of things not seen." Faith is evidence!

So, today, we – along with all the Strobels of the world - take our place firmly and confidently in that one arena in this world that makes logical and spiritual sense. We call that arena "faith."

The observation of the Sabbath was given before the Ten Commandments were written. We read the statement, "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy." In other words, the commandment didn't create the Seventh Day Sabbath-that had already been done. "Keeping it holy" meant observing it as a day of rest, when no work was done and the day was spent in worshipping God.

As mentioned above, Jesus was put in the tomb before the Sabbath started. After the Sabbath ended on Saturday evening, the women went back to his tomb to prepare his body with spices. However, his body wasn't there — he had been resurrected! They went back to Jesus's group of followers to let them know what had happened. This was the first day of the (new) week.

Over the years, many Christian groups have changed to observing the Sabbath on Sunday (the First Day) to indicate a new covenant with God by Jesus's resurrection. Sometimes it is explained that the Seventh Day Sabbath remembers the Old Testament covenant while the First Day Sabbath honors the New Testament covenant.

Neither is particularly wrong or right. The important idea is to set aside a Sabbath, a day without work, so that God can be worshipped and honored.

In the past, people refrained from shopping, performing service work, playing sports, viewing TV, dining at restaurants, etc. There were even "blue laws" that restricted or banned some Sunday activities to promote observing a day of worship and rest. Many have been changed, leaving it up to businesses to decide their own schedules and whether they close for the Sabbath.

With more groups observing a First Day Sabbath, activities within the Christian church became more standardized. Called the Lord's Day, it began with attending morning worship, followed by catechism or Sunday school, performing acts of mercy (such as evangelizing or visiting prisoners or those in the hospital), ending the day by attending a Sunday evening service.

There are churches that declare Christians to be free of any mandates to follow any specific observances. The good part is that we have the freedom to observe the Sabbath whenever we set aside the time to worship God and rest. We just need to remember to do it!

No matter who you are, what you look like, or where you are from, you are welcome to worship God with us.
