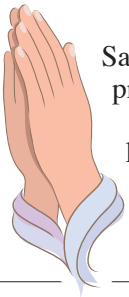

When Virgil Tague was barely 17, he convinced his mother to sign his Army enlistment papers.

In exchange for her signature, he promised to finish high school once he completed his enlistment.

He was a sophomore at Altus High School, but felt the need to serve in World War II.

He joined the Army and trained in artillery at the Dona Ana Firing Range near El Paso.

The Army then shipped him to Hawaii where he served the remainder of the war.

"Basically, we were kind of out in the boondocks, in the pineapple patch," he recalled.

It was near the end of the war in the Pacific and American forces were largely doing mop up operations against Japanese holdouts.

Virgil didn't see combat. Today he acknowledges that he was blessed.

Back in Oklahoma after the war, Virgil kept that promise to his mother.

He went back to high school and enlisted in the Oklahoma National Guard.

Virgil graduated high school in 1948.

When he was ready to start college at Oklahoma Baptist University, he got a discharge from the Guard.

The timing was fortuitous. A month later, the 45th was called up for Korea.

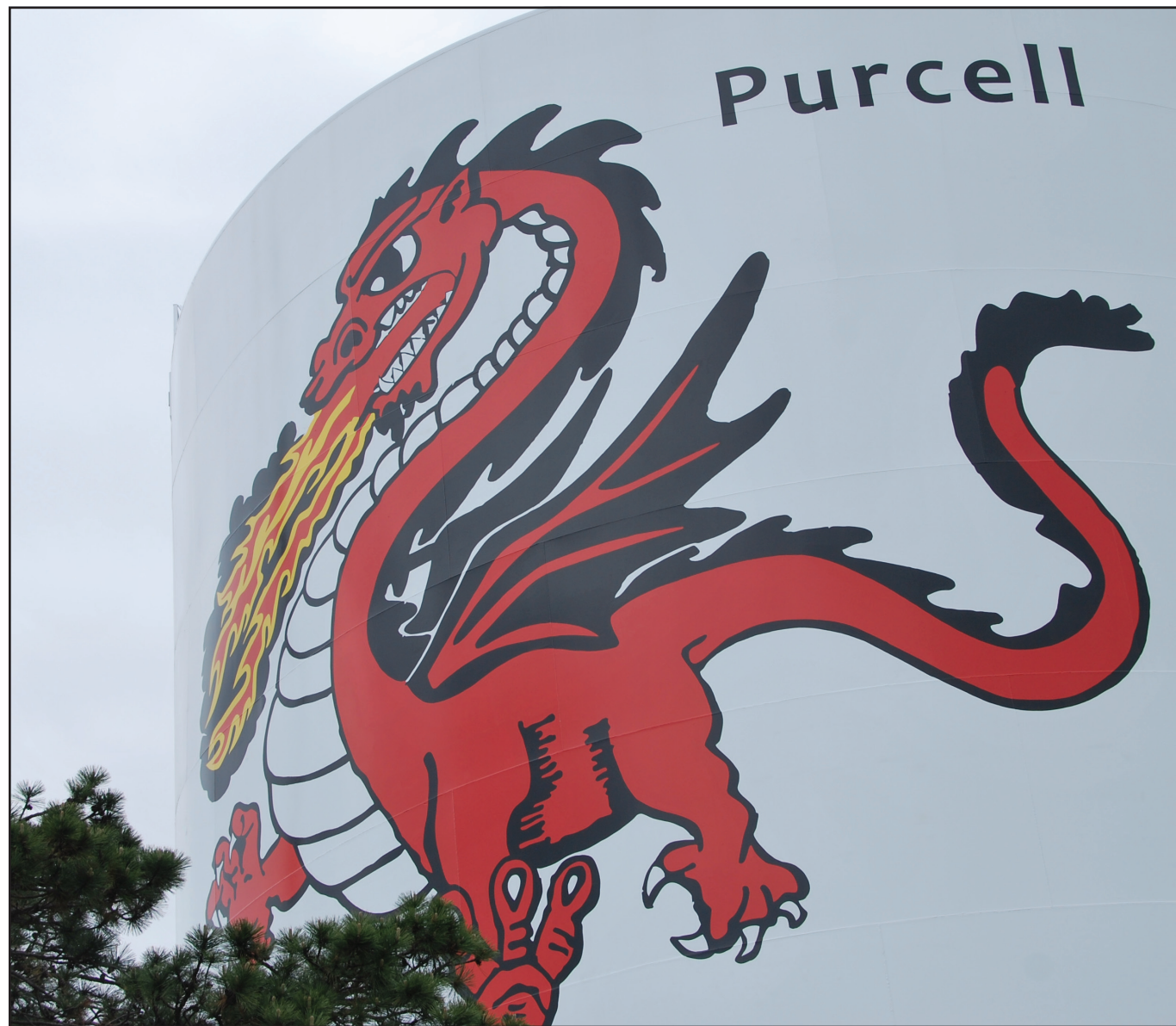
"The good thing about service," he said, "you knew you would get an education."

Still, the G.I. Bill didn't go far and Virgil, who majored in finance and accounting, took a job as a bookkeeper at Federal National Bank in Shawnee while he was in college.

Check for potential freeze damage in wheat

Freezing temperatures that hit much of Oklahoma in mid-April may have wheat growers racing out to their fields to check on potential damage to their crop, but time is on the side of agricultural producers in this instance.

"The extent of the damage likely will not be identifiable until a week or so following such an extreme weather event," said Amanda de Olivei-

ra Silva, Oklahoma State University Extension small grains specialist.

"Be aware recommendations about temperatures and time durations are rules of thumb and not an exact science. I've seen instances where conventional wisdom should indicate complete crop loss and we skate through with minimal damage," she continued.

However, there are some factors to consider:

- Every freeze event is unique, and freeze injury needs to be checked on a field-by-field basis.

- Healthy wheat heads will remain turgid with a green color.

- Damaged wheat heads will be bleached, yellow or brown, and will break easily when pushed against.

The amount of injury observed will depend on the growth stage of the plants, how low the temperature got and how long it stayed at those cold temperatures.

Cropelevation, residue cover and moisture content also can play significant roles.

"It's possible to have variability in injury symptoms among fields and even within fields because of the large number of influential factors," Silva said. "That's why OSU Extension recommends checking each field."

Silva recently provided additional insights about assessing potential freeze-damaged wheat on the agricultural television program SUNUP and on her online blog.

Fact sheets detailing research-based information about best management practices for wheat production in Oklahoma are available online through OSU Extension and at OSU Extension county offices.

"If a wheat producer is unsure how to properly assess potential freeze damage or have questions about management considerations, he or she should consult with their OSU Extension county agricultural educator," Silva said.

Eyes in the sky

Three drones to aid Cleveland County law enforcement

Three drones are the newest additions to the Cleveland County Sheriff's Department, Sheriff Chris Amason announced.

The drones, are equipped with spotlights and forward-looking infrared (FLIR) cameras.

"One of our core values is innovation," Amason said. "This program gives us the ability to save lives when searching for potentially endangered persons, as well as to search for fugi-

tives who may be a threat to the public."

The FLIR, or thermographic cameras, provide infrared radiation and night imaging.

"Drones are a tool that can be used to assist in searches in a wide variety of terrains and in limited-visibility situations," he continued. "We carefully selected a group of deputies to operate the drones. They have been trained and licensed in the appropriate and legal use of these systems."

In addition to the infrared cameras, the drones are equipped with a public address system which allows deputies to speak to people in the vicinity.

"We will be able to talk to someone who may be lost or help de-escalate a potentially dangerous situation," Amason said. "The capability to locate someone and communicate in the field under adverse situations will be an asset when minutes count and lives are on the line."



NEWS from the City of Purcell

The City of Purcell does free brush pickup two times per year. During the remainder of the year, the City of Purcell will do brush pickup by work order only. This means that the customer has to call in to City Hall to request pickup with charges to be assessed to the customer utility account.

The charges may range from \$15 for a small load up to \$50 for a large load, this includes Christmas trees.

The garbage company, WCA, does bulk waste pickup on the last Monday of each month. This includes small loads of brush. The brush needs to be cut in three foot lengths and bundled with twine.

Update from the Capitol

We're into the 13th week of session and are nearing the end with at most five weeks left. We started the session with over 3,000 bills filed in the Senate and House.

We've spent the last three months carefully considering these measures in committee and on the floor, and now we have decreased that number to just over 600 bills.

Around 100 of those were amended in one of the chambers, and those changes are now being considered. If the amendments are approved, the bill moves on to the governor's

desk. If not, a conference committee will be convened to try to work out compromise language to try to get the bill to the governor.

Six of my bills have been signed into law. I mentioned a few last week, and I'd like to talk about the others. SB 4 authorizes a pharmacist to substitute an interchangeable biological product for a prescribed biological product if the substituted product has been determined by the FDA to be interchangeable. This is an effort to help make medications more affordable.

HB 1152 removes the requirement to possess a minimum level of court reporting proficiency for applicants seeking to be examined for enrollment as a certified shorthand reporter.

HB 1773 directs preservice teacher preparation programs to require teacher candidates in early childhood, elementary, secondary, and special education to study the philosophy, framework, components and implementation of multi-tiered

The Supreme Court is not a political tool

Earlier this month, Democrats in both the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate introduced legislation to add four justices to the bench of the Supreme Court.

Ushering in such a drastic change to one of our nation's most fundamental institutions would represent an outrageous power grab and set a precedent of using our nation's highest court as a partisan political tool.

While true that the Supreme Court has been expanded and shrunk at different points in U.S. history, that has not been the case for some time.

In fact, it was 1869, more than 150 years ago, that lawmakers stopped this practice to ensure the Court would remain an apolitical institution for the American people.

Moreover, the majority of Americans are against expanding the Court since it is seen as a way for Democrats to rubber stamp their progressive

policies. Structurally changing the Supreme Court, as proposed in recent legislation, is something also previously opposed by past and present left-leaning justices.

For example, the late Associate Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg once stated, "Nine seems to be a good number. It's been that way for a long time."

In addition, Associate Justice Stephen Breyer, who currently sits on the bench of the Court, recently said in a lecture that institutional changes would lead to severe distrust in the Court and cause it to no longer be viewed as a fair institution by the American people.

In 1983, then-Senator Joe Biden adamantly disapproved of packing the Supreme Court, calling it a "bonehead decision" and "terrible, terrible mistake."

Those previous statements made by now-President Biden makes his newly established Presidential Commission on the Supreme Court of the Unit-

ed States, tasked with studying reform of the Court, hypocritical and misguided. Make no mistake, when Democrats talk about reforming the Supreme Court, they mean they are attempting to expand it.

While Democrats may claim that former President Trump "packed" the Court by putting forward a nomination when a vacancy came up, let's be clear. There is a difference between filling a vacant seat and adding extra justices to politically sway decisions.

Moreover, this could trigger a terrible precedent of either expanding and shrinking the Court whenever shifts in power in Congress and the White House occur in the future.

This would inherently erode the checks and balances our Founding Fathers created to ensure that minority parties, but more importantly, the American people are protected from one party gaining too much control.

We must keep the nine.

House address health care, supports local pharmacies

It's been a busy week at the State Capitol, during which we've heard several very important bills, including one that would shape the future of Medicaid and health care in our state for decades to come.

Oklahoma is poised to expand Medicaid on July 1 after being approved by Oklahoma voters in June 2020. Senate Bill 131 proposes that the Oklahoma Health Care Authority oversee the state's Medicaid program in-house.

I proudly debated in favor of the bill. Authorizing OHCA to manage the state's Medicaid program in-house would cost the state significantly less in appropriations every year than the proposed alternate plan, SoonerSelect.

SoonerSelect would cost at least \$2 billion to sign the contracts and would inevitably incur more costs over time. Our proposed plan would cost about \$263 million annually. A state based plan is more fiscally responsible to our taxpayers.

Additionally, I believe we need to cut out the middle man in our health care process. Under managed care, they would make your health care decision for you because they feel like they know more about what you need than your provider sitting with you in their office.

SB131 is supported by 16 organizations and thousands of medical professionals across the state. Ultimately, the House voted 73-17 to approve the bill and keep our healthcare dollars in the state.

We also approved two bills this week to keep local pharmacies in business. Senate Bill 821, which I coauthored, and Senate Bill 737 work together to create a level playing field for locally-owned pharmacies to compete against these big box pharmacies.

Pharmacy benefit managers, which operate these big box pharmacies, run local pharmacies out of business, which means rural Oklahomans would have to drive further to pick up their prescriptions or even ship them to their house. Both bills were approved by the House; SB821 goes to the Governor and SB737 returns to the Senate for consideration of a House amendment.

On Wednesday, the House approved Senate Bill 229, which creates the Redbud School Funding Act. The bill

proposes using medical marijuana taxes and the Common School Building Equalization Fund to provide annual per-student funding grants to eligible school districts and charter schools.

Essentially, it redirects school funding to help equalize the funding formula for schools serving areas with low-property values that, as a result, don't receive much local funding.

I also passed two bills this week, Senate Bill 405 and Senate Bill 164. SB405 modifies the expiration terms for each class of members on the Advisory Committee on Midwifery by staggering their terms.

SB164 authorizes certain doctors to treat an incapacitated person for an experimental treatment if the patient is in a life-threatening situation and are unconscious or unable to consent.

This avenue would only be taken when a patient may be actively dying and current treatments are not working; any experimental treatment used must be part of an approved research study.

The Governor has signed one of my bills into law. House Bill 1902 would allow safety plan monitors to seek medical treatment for a child in their custody.

Currently, there is no legal authority for a safety plan monitor to seek medical treatment for the child, even for a checkup. This bill was requested from a nurse practitioner in a child advocacy center, and I am very glad it was signed by the Governor.

As the end of May approaches, we'll continue developing the state budget for fiscal year 2022. Education remains the top priority for the House, and I'll share more details of the budget as those are finalized.

We'll now begin hearing Senate amendments to House bills and taking a much closer look at the state budget. Please reach out to my office with any questions or concerns about legislation we may be considering!

If April showers bring May flowers, get flood insurance today

As a resident of Tulsa for the past 25 years, it was devastating to watch our neighbors' homes destroyed in May 2019. It was emotional because it was not just the building itself they lost, but also the contents.

When my boys and I went out to help clean the waterlogged neighborhoods, we found pictures, keepsakes, kids' drawings and letters from loved ones—all things that can't be replaced.

We are back to April two years later and I want all Oklahomans to ask themselves if they have the necessary insurance coverage to mitigate its consequences.

During the late hours of April 30 and the morning of May 1, 17 tornadoes struck Oklahoma. The storm carried five to six inches of rainfall. Thousands of Oklahomans were devastated by flooding resulting in more than \$31 million in estimated losses.

More than 6,000 flood claims were reported. Unfortunately, many residents did not have flood insurance and some of them are still trying to recover today.

As April showers bring May flowers, I'm encouraging Oklahomans to Get Ready now and prepare for the worst. Flooding can cause catastrophic damage, and preparation now will lead to a better recovery later.

Here are three important reasons to consider flood insurance today:

You Live in Oklahoma

Flooding is the number one natural disaster in the United States. While most standard

homeowners policies cover tornadoes, hail, and wildfires, they do not cover floods. There is at least a one in four chance of flooding in high-risk areas during a 30-year mortgage.

30-Day Waiting Period

It typically takes 30 days for a flood policy to go into effect, so the time to buy is well before a disaster. That is why you need to purchase or renew flood insurance well in advance. Waiting until you see the water rushing is too late. Get flood coverage under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) today.

Cost of Flooding

Flooding can be an emotionally and financially devastating event. According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency, an inch of water in a home could cause more than \$27,000 in damages. About 33 percent of all flood claims come from outside of high-risk areas.

In 2019 nationally, the average flood insurance claim payment was \$53,301 while the average flood insurance premium payment was \$674.

Let's make sure that Oklahomans understand their flood risk. As I always like to remind folks... If it rains where you live, it can flood where you live.

You don't have to stay in the nursing home if you don't want to. If you can manage to get out and have a place to go then it's your life. Even if you want to spend your remaining days crawling in the floor to the kitchen or the bathroom then it's your God given right to live out your days in such a way.

Too often people feel as if they do not have choices. Some nurse or social worker says, "Oh, you can't leave here." Really? If you are mentally and physically able then you can show them by getting up, putting on your clothes, if you are able, and walking or crawling out the door.

A few years back, an acquaintance went to the emergency room. After 30 minutes of feeling like she was being treated very poorly, she got up and left.

The acquaintance said "No, I don't."

To which the nurse responded, "You can't leave without signing this paper!" The acquaintance responded, "I'm not signing anything," as she walked out the door.

Most of the time we are submissively obedient to everything the medical community says to do.

Many years ago, when Magic Johnson was diagnosed with HIV, many of us believed he would die very soon. That was in 1992 and he is still alive today. Johnson once said, "I do what my doctor tells me to do."

It only makes sense to pay attention to our doctors. Most of the time, they know more than we do. If your cardiologist says to take statins or high blood pressure medicine then it would be wise to do so until you can get your numbers under control.

A friend of ours was advised by her doctor that she needed a hysterectomy. The doctor scheduled the procedure. Days before the procedure our

friend called to say she had some unresolved questions. The doctor never called her back so our friend called and emailed the doctor's office to cancel.

The morning of the scheduled surgery, the doctor called the woman from the surgical room infuriated because our friend did not show up. Our friend said, "Doctor I never received a return call to answer my questions, so I cancelled the surgery."

The doctor said, "I can answer those questions here, you need to come on now." Our friend said, "No, I won't be there, I have questions about this procedure that I need to have resolved."

The doctor verbally berated her and forbid her to cancel. Our friend did not have the surgery.

Months later she got a second opinion and learned she didn't need the hysterectomy. There was a much less invasive procedure that would remedy her problem. She had the less invasive procedure and has been fine

for several years.

We are entitled to ask questions and get answers when it comes to our healthcare, surgery or any medication. If your doctor will not answer your questions then find a doctor who will.

We also have the right to be informed about all medical costs instead of being blindsided later and pushed into bankruptcy.

We are thankful for our good doctors and all who help us with our medical needs. It's important for us to listen to what they say, ask our questions and then determine the right thing to do.

The right thing to do, is to ask questions, get answers, and make informed decisions.

McGirt ruling forcing change in way law enforcement keeping public safe

There has been considerable discussion recently about the effects of the McGirt ruling issued last summer by the U.S. Supreme Court, and given the historic significance for tribal governments and the State of Oklahoma, it is to be expected.

The Chickasaw Nation remains focused on solutions. Since the McGirt decision was applied to the Chickasaw Nation on March 11, the Chickasaw Nation has filed more than 140 new criminal cases in Chickasaw Nation District Court. Police continue enforcing the law and prosecutors continue working to bring criminals to justice while most people see very little difference in their daily lives.

The Chickasaw Nation has always placed a high priority on public safety, law enforcement and equal justice for all. For years, we have worked closely in partnerships with federal, state and local law enforcement agencies to

effectively and safely serve residents of our area.

Cross deputations and other agreements among federal, state and local partners support the efforts of all the brave men and women who maintain law and order in the 13 counties that make up the Chickasaw Nation.

We all live and work in diverse communities and what affects one of us tends to affect all of us. We have long believed what is good for the Chickasaw Nation is good for the state of Oklahoma and what is good for Oklahoma is good for the Chickasaw Nation.

That belief is symbolized by our shared commitment to maintaining law and order and ensuring public safety. We are dedicated to seeking justice for victims while

securing the rights of the accused and ensuring punishment for criminals.

We are partners united in that commitment. Together, we have the tools we need to address the challenges of serving every individual who calls this area home. The most important thing we can do right now is work together as neighbors, friends and partners to protect our common interests and ensure that justice is served. United by a common mission, we have made tremendous progress.

Working together, we can continue protecting and serving our families, friends and neighbors.

By focusing on solutions together, we can shed light on the path to a brighter future for our children and grandchildren.

systems of support (MTSS) to address core academic and nonacademic needs of students.

Finally, HB 2352 authorizes that the Director of the Department of Human Services and the Executive Director of the Office of Juvenile Affairs to enter into agreements on behalf of the state with Oklahoma Indian tribes regarding jurisdiction over child custody proceedings.

As of Monday, I had four more Senate bills and two House bills awaiting the governor's consideration.

In closing, I want to talk about one of my bills, SB 131, that will be most likely be going to conference committee. Originally, my bill authorized facilities without a pharmacy license to dispense dialysate, or certain dialysis devices, for patients with end-stage renal disease.

The bill passed unanimously out of the Senate, but then the House introduced a committee substitute—meaning they gutted the measure and replaced it with another bill, the Oklahomans Caring for Oklahomans Act, as an alternative to the governor's proposed managed care system to address the voter-approved upcoming Medicaid expansion.

Having worked in the health-care industry for more than 15 years, I'm personally not a fan of managed care from having read how much more expensive it has proven to be in other states, with no improved health outcomes, but I'm curious what you think about this issue.

SB 131 would require the Oklahoma Health Care Au-

thority (OHCA) to implement the Act by developing a program that controls costs and improves health outcomes for Medicaid recipients. It directs the OHCA to include the following program elements:

- Prevention—enrollment and renewal in the program would include a standard baseline risk assessment identifying social health risks;

- Chronic care management—a plan for chronic care coordination to include medication therapy management, patient education, interaction between OHCA and beneficiaries, and development of long-term wellness plan;

- Payment reform—OHCA to develop a transition care management plan and establish value-based payments for providers.

SB 131 would further require the OHCA to maximize the sharing of health information among providers to reduce redundancy. Additionally, any program for sharing data would also have the ability to screen for social determinants of health.

Partnerships with tribal nations would be maintained and enhanced under the bill.

I'd love to hear your thoughts on this way of expanding Medicaid versus the governor's managed care plan.

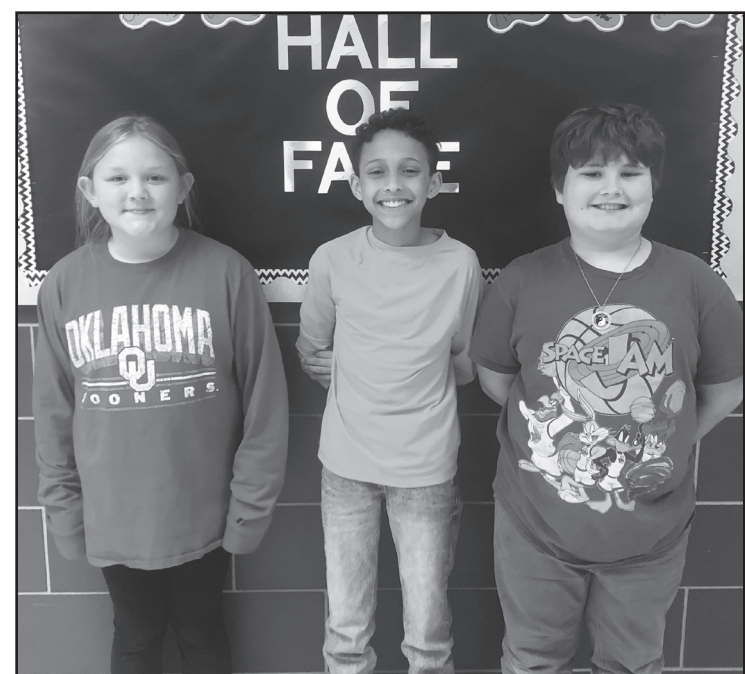

Pest control vital for overall pet health

There's more to caring for a pet than choosing the right food. Protecting pets from fleas, ticks and other parasites is vital to good health.

The first thing pet owners need to do when deciding on a pest control regimen is to contact their veterinarian, said Dr. Rosslyn Biggs, Oklahoma State University Extension veterinarian and director of continuing education for the university's College of Veterinary Medicine.

"Choosing a plan of action depends on several things, including the pet's age, how they're housed, the risk of exposure or if the animal has existing medical conditions. These factors will help determine which products are going to be the most effective," Biggs said. "Pet owners may discover that indoor pets will have different recommendations than outdoor only pets."

There are a variety of pest-control products available. Collars, sprays, edible products and topical options are readily available. Choose a product that provides the most coverage. Parasites, including fleas and ticks, can develop resistance to some products, so visit with your veterinarian to get the latest update on these products.

Biggs said it's important for pet owners to read and follow the directions of any product purchased for pest control.

"Some products are made specifically for dogs, which can be toxic for cats. It's vital to use the right product for its intended use. Also, be sure to keep the packaging," she said. "If your pet has a reaction, contact your veterinarian immediately and have the packaging handy. Contacting the manufacturer may also be needed. While reactions to pest treatments do happen, it's a small percentage. Make sure the pet's reactions are noted in their medical records."

While people tend to think of pests being outdoors nuisances, homes can become infested with fleas, too. Biggs said the environmental conditions also must be treated.

"Pest control is a whole approach, including both the animal and the home. Again, a consultation with your veterinarian can get you started in the right direction for controlling fleas in the home," she said. "Having fleas in the home isn't a matter of living circumstances or cleanliness. Flea infestations can happen in any home."

Breaking the life cycle of the flea is crucial. If the issue is extreme, pet owners may need to consult an exterminator. If the pet has a shelter outdoors, be sure to treat that area, as well.

Heartworm, which is carried by mosquitoes, is another serious health issue for dogs and cats. It can result in lung disease, heart failure, other organ damage and even death

in pets. Oklahoma is right in the middle of heartworm country and regular preventative testing and treatment is a must.

Biggs said pet owners also must be aware of internal parasites such as gastrointestinal worms. Fortunately, most heartworm preventative treatments also address this issue.

"Something else to consider is tapeworm. Ingestion of fleas is the most common cause of tapeworm," she said. "You'll often be able to see the actual worms on the area around the base of the tail and in fecal matter. Consider having a fecal exam done to check for internal parasites, and in particular, parasite eggs."

There are other methods pet owners can take to protect their pets. David Hillock, OSU Extension consumer horticulturist, said try to make your landscape unattractive to pests.

"It's important to keep your landscape tidy. Keep weeds pulled on your property. Also, mow the grass regularly," Hillock said. "This removes habitat and breeding ground for pests. Saucers under potted plants, children's toys and other items that collect water are places where mosquitoes breed. Make sure to dump water out of these types of collection points on a regular basis."

While homeowners can't completely eliminate pests from the landscape, general upkeep is important to help reduce the threat.

USDA reopens signup for Coronavirus Food Assistance Program 2

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) announced that signup has reopened for the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program 2 (CFAP 2) as part of the Pandemic Assistance for Producers initiative.

The initial CFAP 2 signup ended on Dec. 11, 2020, but USDA has reopened sign-up for CFAP 2 for at least 60 days, which began April 5, for producers to apply or make modifications to existing CFAP 2 applications.

CFAP 2 program provides direct financial relief to producers due to market disruptions and associated costs because of COVID-19.

"Most of the crops and livestock raised in Oklahoma, including many of them raised in our area, are eligible commodities for this program," said Katie Waltman, county executive director for FSA in McClain/Cleveland Counties. "If you missed getting an application in last fall, you now have the opportunity to apply for assistance. Our staff will help you through the application process, or if you need to make any modifications to your existing application."

Row crops, livestock, dairy, specialty crops, aquaculture and more all are eligible for the CFAP 2, including the recent addition of pullets and turfgrass sod. Producers are encouraged to visit farmers.gov/cfap to review eligible commodities and learn about the payment structure for each.

CFAP 2 is a separate program from the first iteration of the program (CFAP 1) and interested producers must complete a new application to be eligible for payment for CFAP 2.

Waltman said producers are

encouraged to call the McClain/Cleveland County FSA office at 527-3160, ext. 2 for guidance on the process to complete an application. Producers also have the option to visit farmers.gov/cfap and access the online application portal or learn about other application options.

A call center is available for producers who would like additional one-on-one support with the CFAP 2 application process. Please call 877-508-8364 to speak directly with a USDA employee ready to offer assistance.

Additional CFAP Payments for Beef and Row-Crop Producers

The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, authorizes an increase in CFAP 1 payment

rates for cattle. Cattle producers with approved CFAP 1 applications will automatically receive these payments and do not need to submit a new application since payments are based on previously approved CFAP 1 applications.

Producers may be asked for additional information depending on how they filed the original application. Information on the additional payment rates for cattle can be found on farmers.gov/cfap.

This act also authorized additional CFAP assistance of \$20 per acre for producers of eligible CFAP 2 flat-rate or price trigger commodities.

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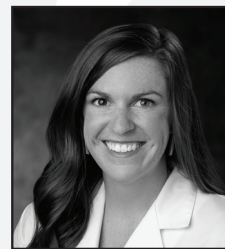

Richard Saint Clair Grisham was born January 13, 1934 in Purcell, Oklahoma, as the first born to Leo and Jewel Grisham. March 10, 2021, he passed away at age 87 in Mankato, Minnesota.

During his childhood he embraced the concept that knowledge and life is revealed in books. *Encyclopedia Britannica* allowed him to explore countries while at home. He read every page of each issue of *National Geographic* and *Reader's Digest* as they arrived through subscription. He could access older issues through the organized stacks in the basement.

He ran track in high school and played trumpet in the band which prepared him for his experience with the University of Oklahoma marching band. His extraordinary intellect and critical thinking skills allowed him to excel at the state and national level in debate. Prior to his graduation from Purcell High School in 1951 he was accepted at Yale University. To his dismay he was unable to attend due to distance and cost.

From 1951 to 1954 he attended the University of Oklahoma. It was there that he saw a photo of Mont Saint Michel on the wall above his study desk in his fraternity. This was an additional trigger to explore the world in the future. He liked to listen to Tchaikovsky on his record player as he studied. He was admitted to the University of Oklahoma College of Medicine after just three years which made him the second to youngest in his class.

March 5, 1955 he married Sara Carolyn Smith. He accepted his commission in the United States Army medical corps as a second lieutenant. He was offered a residency in ophthalmology at Johns Hopkins medical school/Wilmer Eye Institute. He was required to turn the offer down since the Army wanted him to train at their program in San Antonio, Texas.

He saw the birth of his son, Jeffrey, and his daughter, Kathy, while in his medical training. He graduated from the University of Oklahoma medical school in 1958. His residency training was completed at Brooke Army Medical Center in 1962.

He rose to the rank of major in the Army during his assignment in Germany from 1962 to 1965. It was a unique season which allowed him to travel to every European country (except communist Russia, Czechoslovakia and Romania). He acquired a love for photography and started to golf and snow ski which all became life-long passions.

In 1965 he was transferred to Fitzsimmons medical center in Aurora, Colorado, where he was chief of ophthalmology. He applied for a retina program and was accepted. His desire was to establish a retina program for the U.S. Armed Services. When his general told him he would not be allowed to pursue his goal he decided to leave the army and establish his private practice.

During September 1966 he moved to Bartlesville, Oklahoma, establishing his office on the 10th floor of the Price Tower. From 1975 to 1986 his practice was in the Jane Phillips medical building. He served as chief of staff of the local hospital. He began Grisham Eye Associates in 1986. Grisham Eye Surgery Center was built in 1992.

His ophthalmology practice was characterized by innovation and the pursuit of excellence. He took pride in developing "big city" offerings with a small city touch.

He retired from ophthalmic surgery in 1999, but continued to see patients until December of 2017. He served on the Bartlesville Symphony board and chaired the building committee for Grace Community Church (Bartlesville) upon the construction of their worship facility.

He enjoyed great literature (50-70 novels per year), classical music, international travel, architecture and the building process, art, foreign languages (Spanish, German, French, Italian), photography, golf and snow skiing.

After the death of his wife he married J. Heather Langlinais in 1999. She was a delight to him during their almost twenty-two years together. They enjoyed extensive travel opportunities. In 2018 they moved to Mankato, Minnesota, to allow greater proximity to her family.

His life was characterized by an optimistic and positive spirit which allowed him to push into the future and accomplish much in spite of the vicissitudes of life. He was diligent, hard-working and resilient. He could be quite persuasive. He was highly intuitive when it came to perceiving national trends in medicine and science. With great aplomb he navigated life's channels.

We will greatly miss his enormous capacity to spontaneously utilize metaphor in conveying important principles. "We don't know how many pages are in our book... all we know is that we are on today's page." As it relates to hardship... "Stay on the horse!" Or, as it relates to aging... "Life is like driving a racecar... the further you go down the road, the more narrow it becomes... with increasing curves and no shoulder." Toward the last months of his life he stated "I am ready. I know I'm getting ready to change zip codes!"

Richard grew increasingly in his spiritual journey. His last years were characterized by a vibrant faith in Christ, love for and dependence on God's Word, and a heart for individual worship of his Savior. He clearly articulated his belief in the resurrection of Christ and the expectation of his own eternal life based on God's grace toward him and not his own merit.

He is preceded in death by his father, Leo Grisham; his mother, Jewel Grisham; his wife, Sara Carolyn Grisham, and his sister, Kathleen Grisham.

He is survived by his second wife, J. What's in a serving? Nutrition Facts labels get an update

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently served up the first major change in 20 years to Nutrition Facts labels on packaged foods and drinks.

Adjustments in serving sizes, calories, percent daily values and nutrients on labels are now required by the FDA due to updated scientific information, new nutrition research and feedback from the public.

These changes to the labels are intended to help consumers more effectively and easily use the nutritional information, said Janice Hermann, Oklahoma State University Extension nutrition specialist.

"The new labels feature calories per serving and serving size in a larger, bolder font, making it easier for consumers to make informed choices that

contribute to lifelong healthy eating habits," Hermann said. "The number of calories needed daily varies by person."

On that point, she suggested using the Nutrition Facts label in conjunction with information on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's MyPlate website to determine caloric needs. MyPlate offers ideas and tips to help consumers create an eating style that meets individual needs and helps improve overall health.

Nutrients shown on the label include fat, carbohydrates, protein, cholesterol and select vitamins and minerals. With the updates, some serving sizes have changed, resulting in nutrient values being higher or lower than before. The FDA also removed and added nutrients to the food label, she said.

"Added sugars are now re-

quired on the label. The FDA required this change because added sugars make it harder for people to get the nutrients they need and stay within their daily calorie limit," she said.

Potassium and vitamin D were added to the label because American diets often lack in these two nutrients. Potassium can lower the risk of developing high blood pressure, and vitamin D can reduce the risk of developing osteoporosis.

The FDA removed vitamins A and C because most people normally get the daily recommended amounts of these vitamins in their diets.

"Another change was removing calories from fat. Research has shown that the type of fat consumed is more important than the amount," Hermann said.

Signup:

FSA will automatically issue payments to eligible producers based on the eligible acres included on their CFAP 2 applications. Eligible producers do not need to submit a new CFAP 2 application.

Additional CFAP Actions

FSA has also begun payment processing applications

filed as part of the CFAP Additional Assistance program in the following categories:

- Applications filed for pullets and turfgrass sod;
- A formula correction for row-crop producer applications to allow producers with a non-Actual Production History (APH) insurance

policy to use 100 percent of the 2019 Agriculture Risk Coverage-County Option (ARC-CO) benchmark yield in the calculation; and

- Sales commodity applications revised to include insurance indemnities, Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program payments, and Wild-

fire and Hurricane Indemnity Program Plus payments.

Additional payments for swine producers and contract growers under CFAP Additional Assistance remain on hold and are likely to require modifications to the regulation as part of the broader evaluation and future assistance; however, FSA will continue to accept applications from interested producers.

Service Center staff continue to work with agricultural producers via phone, email, and other digital tools. Because of the pandemic, some USDA Service Centers are open to limited visitors.

Stolen tools and van leads to arrest

Wayne man charged with embezzlement

A Wayne man allegedly took and never returned a company van and \$6,000 worth of tools from his employer and is now charged in McClain County District Court with embezzlement.

An arrest warrant is outstanding for Dwight G. Crook, 43.

The charge is filed after five former felony convictions.

The vehicle and tools belonged to Comfort Home

Expert in Oklahoma City.

According to an affidavit, Crook told his employer, Abolalali Aittchakht, in October that the van broke down on the highway between Norman and Purcell.

After searching days for the vehicle, Aittchakht found it at the intersection of State Highway 59 and U.S. 77, not far from Crook's home. The back glass was broken and the tools were missing.

When a McClain County sheriff's deputy reached Crook

by phone, Crook said he'd left the van at Riverwind Casino when it broke down.

He also claimed Aittchakht owed him \$2,000 and denied any knowledge of the missing tools.

The next contact with Crook was November 18 when Crook allegedly tried to strangle his live-in girlfriend.

When Crook refused to come to the door, a stand-off with sheriff's deputies ensued.

Meanwhile, Sheriff's Det. David Tompkins took the

girlfriend to the hospital.

On the way there, the girlfriend volunteered information about stolen items in the home, according to the affidavit. She reportedly said Crook had stolen the tools and cut holes in the floor to hide the tools.

The girlfriend gave consent to search the house and told Tompkins that Crook initially hid the van under a brush pile in the back yard, according to the affidavit.

He later moved it to the intersection and abandoned it.

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

May 2, 2021 will be the Fifth Sunday of Easter. The Gospel reading is from John, Chapter 15, verses 1-8. Jesus said to his disciples: 1 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine grower. 4 Remain in me, as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me. 8 By this is my Father glorified, that you bear

much fruit and become my disciples."

Jesus uses the things of daily life to teach. Sometimes, especially during Ordinary Time, the readings are commonly parables. Parables are not actual events but stories pointing out Christian teachings. The prodigal son teaches that God is always pleased when a lost soul returns to him and that those who stay with the Father all the time receive blessings every day.

The woman who lost a coin searched vigilantly to find it and invited others to celebrate when she did. She illustrates God's pleasure when what was lost is found. The story of the virgins, some prepared and some not, illustrates that we do not know when the bridegroom (Jesus) will return.

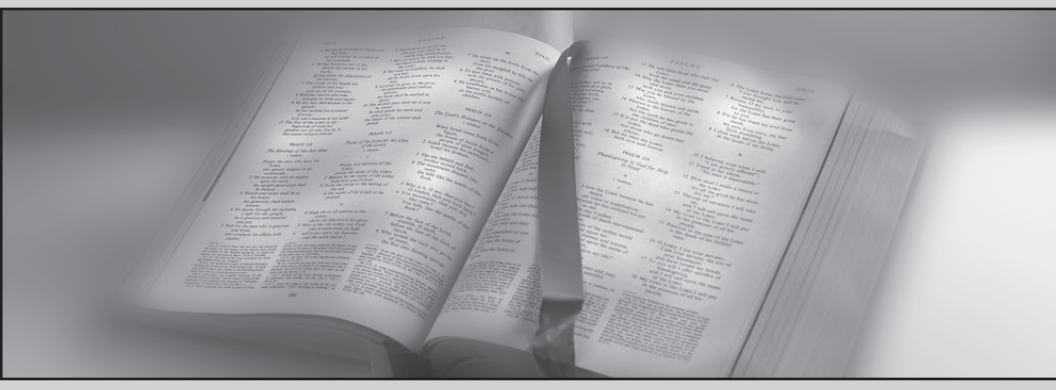
We are practicing social distancing and everyone is required to protect each other by wearing a mask.

And then Mike has our friend and tireless worker Gloria, whom you, also, may already know.

MawMaw's life-story would not have been complete without telling about Mr. Ivy Thompson, dashing and handsome when he took Pearly as his bride. PawPaw left all of us on September 29, 2010.

As with most couples, MawMaw and PawPaw were as different as sweet milk and a good ol' glass of buttermilk.

Paw Paw was the eternal optimist, always laughing, always with a joke and always looking around to see to whom he could tell it. He'd tell his latest within the first minute of seeing you, and Maw Maw would say,

"Aw, Ivy, he don't wanna hear all that," but that wouldn't slow Brother Ivy up at all.

But that's how different two of the people who left such a lasting impression on me were. Paw Paw was the optimist, and MawMaw naturally leaned more toward the pessimism, naturally. MawMaw's latter years were spent at the Florence Hand Home, and when we went to see her when we were home—and visiting MawMaw and having a little prayer together was always a highlight for our homecomings—we'd greet her with a hearty greeting

and ask how she was doing, "Aw, I ain't doin' much good," she'd say, and I'd look over at her youngest son and smile. She's been saying that my whole life. If she said, "I'm doin' great!" we immediately would've been pushing the red button and summoning the nurse. That just wasn't Maw-Maw. Once, on the way home from the visit, Mike said, "You know she's the longest surviving cancer patient, because she had cancer fifty years ago," and we both laughed.

The beautiful thing is, when MawMaw left us last week at 99 years of age, she didn't have cancer, she didn't have heart trouble, and she really didn't have much trouble with her mind. To me, that's such a beautiful thing. She just went as long as she could and until she was just too tired to go on, then MawMaw laid her burdens down so she could go see PawPaw. I'm sure he greeted her with a huge Ivy-Thompson smile and one of heaven's best jokes.

We loved MawMaw, and she loved us, too, I know. She would sometimes tell people, "Stevie's my boy, too, just like my own." I think she took it on herself to be kind-of a mama to me when Mama left us way back in 1973.

For the "rest of the story," I suppose I should tell you that the Mike I've been telling you about is the same Coca-Cola Mike you've all grown to know and love; and sweet Gloria is the 'Glory' of whom we write about often. You know, too, that he's my best friend, even if I do have to tell some stretchers on him from time to time.

Now you know why my heart hurts so much. When Coca-Cola Mike lost his mama last week, I lost one, too.
