

Cycle accident sends man to OU Medical Center

A one vehicle accident just before 11 p.m. last Saturday night on US 77 sent a Paoli man to OU Medical Center in Oklahoma City.

Investigating OHP Trooper Noe Martinez said a 2015 Black Harley Davidson driven by Jeffrey K. Weaver, 52, for an unknown reason went out of control.

The motorcycle went into a broad slide and ejected the driver 394 feet.

Weaver was transported by Air Evac to the hospital in critical condition with head, arms, legs, trunk internal and trunk external injuries.

The trooper said no helmet as in use at the time of the accident.

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

Keep watch on obese horses eating green forage

Obesity in horses is never a desired condition, but especially so for animals that have developed equine metabolic syndrome (EMS), a condition similar to Type II Diabetes in

Springtime can be especially hard for horses that suffer from EMS because the disorder is associated with insulin deregulation that can promote increased fat deposition and a reduced ability to lose weight, said Kris Hiney, Oklahoma State University Extension equine specialist.

"The lush forage that greens up during the spring is a lot like candy to horses, both in terms of palatability and how its sugar content is higher compared to other times of the year," she said. "Even metabolically normal horses can gain a lot of weight if left to eat as much as they want. Horses with EMS that overeat spring forage can find themselves with hyperinsulinemia, an increase in insulin beyond what you would see in a metabolically normal horse.'

EMS typically occurs in middle-age or older horses. Horses with insulin deregulation can

easily develop laminitis, an because they love that yummy the best possible animal health extremely painful condition. Named for the disruption of structures within the foot, the problem can affect one or all feet, but is most often viewed in the front feet at the same time.

Fighting the battle of the bulge can be a challenge. Equine management options include:

- Limiting the amount of time horses are turned out on green
- Increasing control over unwanted foraging by placing the horses in drylots.
- Using grazing muzzles, if necessary, as they allow the horse to only take small bites of food at a time.

Hiney recently provided additional insights about managing obese horses on the agricultural television show "SUNUP." The video segment also is available on YouTube.

"Horses, and ponies in particular, can develop a sense of how long an equine manager is going to leave them out on pasture," Hiney said. "Once they learn the horse manager is going to take them off before they prefer, they adjust by eating faster. The horse manager has to account for their behavior

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
Goldsby beat 27 county seats

and science, study of civics and American history is key to a well-rounded education.

Indeed, when Americans have a deeper understanding of our nation's history and founding principles, they become more engaged citizens who participate in our government the way our Founding Fathers intended.

It also preserves our republic and ensures a prosperous future for generations to

Sadly, the National Assessment of Education Progress has reported a nearly 27-year proficiency decline in these subjects. Moreover, only nine states require a full year of civics education be included in high school curricula, and 10 states do not require any sort of civics education at all.

The weakened citizen knowledge of our nation's history and understanding of our unique system of governance should alarm every American.

Along with mathematics in sponsoring the Civics Secures Democracy Act, aimed at strengthening and expanding access to civics and history education across the United States.

Unfortunately, this legislation has been conflated with support of a national curriculum threaded with liberal ideologies, including critical race theory.

To be clear, as written, this bill does not impose or incentivize the adoption of any national curriculum or promote teaching of critical race theory. In fact, the legislation explicitly prohibits such action.

Indeed, mandating use of a national curriculum is something I do not and cannot support.

Create a garden anywhere with straw bale gardening

By Melinda Myers

Add productive garden space and raise your planting bed with straw bale gardening. This technique allows you to create a raised bed garden on the patio, lawn, or poor compacted soil.

Straw bale gardening has been around for centuries, but thanks to Joel Karsten's book Straw Bale Gardens it has gained new popularity.

All you need are a few straw bales, fertilizer, a bit of compost and time to condition, plant and water your garden.

Purchase straw bales made used on day one. from alfalfa, wheat, oats, rye or other cereal that have less weed seeds than hay. Start a This would be one quarter cup few weeks before you plan to start planting.

Place bales in their permanent location with the cut sides up and twine parallel to the ground. When you start the condition process, they become very heavy and hard to move.

Once the bales are in place, you are ready to start the conditioning process. This is done

bales composting, so they will plant. You will likely need to support plant growth.

Day one spread fertilizer over the tip of the bale. Use one half cup of a complete garden fertilizer or three cups of an organic fertilizer, like Milorganite.

The organic fertilizers feed the microorganisms that help decompose the straw into a nutrient rich planting medium. Now thoroughly moisten the bale with water.

Continue to thoroughly soak the bale every day. On days three and five you will also add more fertilizer at the same rate

Days seven through nine use half the rate used on day one. of a complete garden fertilizer or one and a half cups of an organic fertilizer. And once again thoroughly water the bale.

On day 10 you will add one cup of 10-10-10 or three cups of an organic fertilizer rich in phosphorous and potassium. This completes the conditioning process.

Bales treated with a complete to start the inside of the straw fertilizer should be ready to

wait a few more days when using an organic fertilizer.

The inside of the bale should be the temperature of warm bath water or cooler. If it is hotter than this, wait for the bale to cool a bit before planting.

Use a trowel to pry open a hole in the bale. Place the transplant in the hole and cover the roots with potting mix or

Create a planting bed for seeds by covering the bale with a one- to two-inch-thick layer of planting mix. Follow the planting directions on the back of the seed packet.

Regular watering is critical for success with this method.

Soaker hoses or drip irrigation make this an easier task. You can also use gallon milk jugs with holes in the bottom or inverted 2-liter soda bottles placed near the base of each plant to provide water where

Know your quality grades to get the most out of steak season

Grocery meat counters are filled with beef steaks labeled Choice, and while many consumers rightfully associate the label as a good choice for grilling or the stovetop, they might not be familiar with industry quality standards behind the designation.

A beef steak's tenderness, juiciness and flavor all affect its palatability, or the degree to which food and fluids are deemed desirable and satisfying to a person's palate, said Earl Ward, Oklahoma State University Extension area livestock specialist for northeastern Oklahoma.

Those aspects are worth closer consideration by industry producers as well as consumers: More than 98 percent of American households purchased meat in 2020, and 43 percent of Americans now buy more meat than before the pandemic, according to the 2021 Power of Meat report conducted on behalf of the Food Industry Association.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has set quality grades that evaluate factors that could affect the palatability of the steak.

"Beef carcass quality grades such as Choice are based off the degree of marbling - the steak that contains less maramount of fat within the lean tissue of the muscle – and carcass maturity," Ward said.

"Marbling is the single greatest amount of marbling can vary factor to a steak's palatability and is determined by an animal's diet and genetics."

The USDA quality grades Prime, Choice and Select account for 90 percent to 95 percent of beef steaks in grocery meat counters.

However, there are also beef quality grades of Standard, Commercial, Utility, Cutter and Canner.

The latter five grades are for more mature carcasses, typically animals older than 42 months of age when harvested. Thus, any steak labeled Prime, Choice or Select likely comes from an animal less than 42 months old.

Key takeaways of the three most dominant beef quality grades commonly purchased by consumers include:

• Prime—the highest-quality grade available. It contains the most marbling and, if prepared correctly, what numerous studies have found to be the most flavorful eating experience compared with other beef steaks.

Steaks of this grade are quickly bought by five-star restaurants and upscale wholesalers. About 5 percent of young American cattle are graded as USDA Prime.

• Choice—a high-quality bling than Prime but is still very flavorful, tender and juicy when prepared properly. The Ward said.

widely.

Depending on the cut, a Choice steak may require slower cooking or a marinade to bring out its tenderness and flavor, compared to a Prime cut.

The most-commonly-purchased type of steak at grocery stores, approximately 60 percent to 65 percent of young American cattle grade USDA Choice.

• Select—formerly called Good, it still represents a quality meal. The reduced amount of marbling will be noticeable by simple visual inspection, compared to Prime or Choice steaks. Select cuts most often are either marinated or braised to achieve the best eating experience.

Select steaks also benefit from longer cooking times at lower temperatures. Approximately 25 percent of the young American cattle grade USDA Select.

Standard and Commercial grades of beef are typically sold as ungraded or as store brand meat. Utility, Cutter and Canner grades of beef are seldom sold as steaks at retail outlets but are instead used to make ground beef or processed products.

"If you want a great steak, start by picking up a highquality cut of beef, fire up the grill, add some salt and pepper, and enjoy the flavors provided by its juiciness and marbling,"







counseling and other assistance to victims is a responsibility we take very seriously," said Governor Anoatubby. "While bringing criminals to justice is important, it is also important to ensure victims are treated justly and compassionately."

Todd Crawford, Chickasaw Nation undersecretary of support and sustainability, said their efforts center on comforting victims of crimes and getting them in touch with programs and services designed to support them.

"Our desire is to listen to the victims and their families' needs and getting them in contact with the appropriate part of the Chickasaw Nation to meet their need," Crawford said.

These may include legal assistance, law enforcement sup-

port and connection to various programs and services offered by the Chickasaw Nation appropriate to the individuals calling the hotline. Services available include

probation management, sexual assault assistance, child support, child welfare and strong family development.

The hotline also helps keep victims informed through the judicial process. "Some may have questions

about a person who is currently incarcerated, and want to know if and when they may be released. You may want to know who has responsibility," Crawford said, adding services are available in cases of previous convictions as well as criminal charges currently being adjudicated.

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
