The Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma Election Board last week certified Joey Tom as winner of the District 7 seat of the Choctaw Nation Tribal Council.


Tom's 660 votes in the August 7 runoff race bested 603 cast for his opponent, Adrian Johnico.

In the July 10 general election on July 10, Tom and Johnico received 40.07 and 36.67 percent of the total votes, thus forcing the runoff.

Other winners of Tribal Council seats on July 10 were Jess Henry, District 4; and Anthony Dillard, District 10.

Incumbents were lone candidates for three districts. They were Jennifer Woods, District 6; James Dry, District 9; and James Frazier, District 12.





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Broomcorn memories of a sharecropper's son

(Editor's note: This is the first installment of a series on broomcorn)

From deep in Norman's suburbs, I picked up my latest edition of **The Purcell Register**. The front page story "Broomcorn' Last Thresh" jumped right out at me! A lifetime ago, I was a share cropper's son. One of our crops was broomcorn.

I went to my study and took down from the wall one of my cherished possessions - my johnny knife. I was flooded with memories of bygone days, some good, some bad. Such things keep me grounded, and mindful of my McClain County roots from more than a half century ago.

My motivation for writing this letter is twofold. First, to correct some of the misinformation in the article, and secondly, to share my memories and thoughts on raising broomcorn. Along with the technicalities, I will share snippets of the colorful, local small farming culture.

We had no running water. We "drew" water from our well, with a bucket, pulley, and rope. We had an outhouse and the Sears catalog to go along with it. There was no telephone nor television, although we did eventually get a television the year before we moved to town (Purcell).

My family had 80 rented acres of land, with an old house (1920s vintage), and out buildings which included a broomcorn shed. We had somewhere else and not have electricity, which consisted of a single long cord, with a bulb into cash. dangling from the 10 or 12 foot ceiling in each room. It was 10 or 12 miles, due west of Wayne, in the old time Bryant school

Technically, we were not sharecroppers. We rented or leased the land. The rent or lease money took the place of sharing a portion of your crop with the "landlord." This allowed the owners to be Please see **Broomcorn**, page 5A







Additionally, last week we started training five more volunteers to assist veterans with their claims and questions about VA benefits. Some of them will go on to receive training to become accredited.

We continue to monitor the COVID-19 situation in our town and state and plan to keep our volunteers and clients as safe as possible. In addition, we have returned to using our Plexiglas shields on an as needed basis to separate our volunteers from the clients who visit us.

One of the jobs I have is representing veterans and surviving spouses before a Board of Veterans Affairs Hearing Judge or a Decision Review Officer. Each year we represent our clients at several hundred of these hearings. As I'm not a lawyer, quoting past decisions is not what we do. We do our hearings the same as our claims: to provide medical evidence supporting the veteran's claim for service-connection of a disability. We will often ask the veteran to obtain a VAD is ability Benefits Questionnaire from a medical provider that supports their request for service connection of a disability or an

increased rating. We are always looking to add more volunteers. The more people we have behind the scenes affects how many people we can serve. If you have a little extra time on your hands, please take the opportunity to help us help others.


