The 2021 edition of the fair officially began on Tuesday with two days devoted to the entering and judging of building exhibits. There was also a horse show on Wednesday.



Construction company hit for \$700K

An office manager/bookkeeper and her alleged cohorts are facing 54 felony counts in McClain County District Court in connection with more than 1,100 fraudulent transactions totaling in excess of \$700,000.

Held on bonds of \$200,000 each after their arrests August 24 are Linda Elliott, 54; Keith Elliott, 53; Sheila Railback, 51, and Tatiana Railback, 38.

The four were arrested by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation which was called in on the case in February 2021 by the McClain County Sheriff's Department.

Linda Elliott began working for Ben Hayes Construction at Washington in November

Administrators address chamber

From five schools in the Heart of Oklahoma

The five Heart of Oklahoma school superintendents were the featured speakers at last Friday's chamber of commerce luncheon at the Holiday Inn Express.

Wayne Superintendent Toby Ringwald led off the speaking telling just over 30 attendees the one positive aspect of the COVID situation is the added federal dollars.

Ringwald said the school has been able to do a \$200,000 remodeling of the cafeteria, got new keyless entry doors on two buildings and were able to put on a new roof to the tune of \$800,000.

Purcell Superintendent Sheli McAdoo said her district is trying to keep normalcy for the students in the school including activities.

She told the gathering the Purcell School District is one to one with respect to students and devices and that they recently added 900 Chromebooks. Teaches all have lap tops, as well.

The biggest news came from Washington and the Mid-America Technology Center.

Washington Superintendent Chris Reynolds announced the district will be attempting to pass a \$24.5 bond in a special election October 12.

Goldsby Mayor Glenn Bergan told **The Purcell Register** some 1,800 new homes will be constructed over the next few years in Goldsby.

That's why Reynolds wants to expand the current campus. "We expect our school to double in enrollment in the next 10 years and we are completely full right now," Reynolds said.

The district, that enrolled 170 new students this summer, will be adding classrooms and remodeling current facilities.

Reynolds said also in the plan is a new Fine Arts Building.

Mid-America Superintendent Mike Eubank said they are in the process of starting construction on a new satellite building on SH 9 in Newcastle's city limits on property they already own.

Eubank said 2021 is the 50th anniversary of MATC. "In 1971 when it opened

Maysville was larger than Newcastle and had more enrollment," Eubank said. "So our population center has shifted."

Newcastle now has a population of 10,984 and a school enrollment of 2,292. Maysville's population is 1,232 and has a school enrollment of 283.

"At the beginning of this school year we had 570 on our waiting list," Eubank said so the need for additional space is quite obvious.

Proudly, Eubank announced that 83 percent of MATC graduates "go pro".

Lexington Superintendent Chad Hall had a previously scheduled meeting but elementary school principal Kathy Keeler pinch hit for him at the luncheon.

"At Lexington we are full steam ahead," Mrs. Keeler told the chamber members.

Among projects completed recently at Lexington are a complete remodeling of the gym with the addition of air conditioning and the construction of safe rooms.

"They will make the month of May a lot less stressful," she said.

Also at the meeting and introducing herself was the coordinator for the Oklahoma Aeronautics Commission, Paula Kedy.

"People don't know it, but aeronautics is the number two industry in Oklahoma behind oil and gas," Mrs. Kedy said.

Broomcorn memories of a sharecropper's son

(Editor's note: This is the third installment of broomcorn memories)

Often this responsibility fell to one of the younger kids. He/she was called the "Waterjack." "Well off" farmers had large insulated water buckets. Other mostly "poor" farmers, "made do" in other ways. We would get gallon jars or jugs, of one kind or another, wrap them in "gunny" sacks (burlap bags), and stitch the burlap tight with bailing wire. The ubiquitous bailing wire was used to fix most anything around the farm.

After filling the jugs with water, the whole thing would be soaked in water and placed in the shade, if possible. It helped to have a little breeze to evaporate the water around the "water jug", and presto--a "poor man's" cool water jug.

Cool might be a little overstatement. That was O.K., be-

cause, if you worked the fields hard, you learned that ice cold water, would not quench your thirst, as fast as room temperature water. Ice cold water would give you stomach cramps. Sometimes, we left water jugs at the end of the row, and other times, we carried them around on the B Farmall tractor.

Keeping your shirt on when working, provided the same evaporation, (cooling, with your sweat), as the burlap bag around the water jug. Some Johnnys would, invariable strive to be "Macho" for the ladies, and cut without a shirt.

There were three levels of "itchy misery" in the broomcorn business. The first was the cutting, although, on balance not bad. The next level, threshing, ramped up the "itchy misery" considerably, considering the seeds were beaten off the head, by the thresher. The dust, and to some extent, the Fuzz, was a choking, itching

"left/right punch."

The third, and last level of "itchy misery" was the baling. It may have not been as hot, but the Fuzz on the dried broomcorn straw was everywhere, when it was taken from the shed. It itched like heck, and filled every corner of your clothing, eyes, nose and lungs. Anyone who worked broomcorn, dreaded the bailing, the most.

The whole thing could be educational, if viewed in the right "light." One learned to pace yourself; you learned what your limits were. You developed stamina, which would, in the coming years prove to be like good muscle memory - without thinking, your body says "can do."

In broomcorn business, the process that required the most "hands," was the actual cutting. Getting it done as quickly as possible, and in the yard was good. The threshing and bailing required less coordination and logistics, and could be done with fewer "hands."

The tradition of feeding the Johnnys (even the girls and women, we called Johnnys) was an old one that could be traced back to, at least the horse and/or mule farming days. The farmer lives closer to Mother Nature than most. People (hands) and animals must eat to work; we never thought about it that way because it was simply second nature - unconscious.

For the sharecropper, and other farmers, food was often the hub around the wheel of social events, pie suppers, churches, and dinner on the ground. Paper sacks of goodies were given to everyone in the community, at Christmas time, in the one, or two room, rural schoolhouses, etc.

There was also the social aspect of the noon meal, in working broomcorn. At our level of farming, the mostly teenage boys and girls and, some adults between jobs, or out of work, would gather around the wraparound porch

Vaccine booster not for everyone yet

Third dose not seen for all at present

The Delta variant of the COVID-19 virus continues to drive an unrelenting wave of new infections and record-setting hospital admissions across Oklahoma.

The push for vaccination continues, with anti-vax skeptics pushing back with pseudoscience posts gleaned from social media.

If that wasn't confusing enough, now the talk is about booster shots for those who received two doses of the Moderna or Pfizer vaccines.

But according to the McClain County Health Department, it's not that complicated.

Yes, a third dose of the vaccines is available. Just not for

everyone.

The booster shots are for persons age 12 and older diagnosed with "conditions that would consider them to be moderately or severely immunocompromised."

This includes individuals who have:

- Been receiving active cancer treatment for tumors or cancers of the blood;
- Received an organ transplant and are taking medicine to suppress the immune system;
- Received a stem cell transplant within the last two years or who are taking medicine to suppress the immune system;
- Moderate or severe primary immunodeficiency (such as

DiGeorge syndrome, Wiskott-Aldrich syndrome);

• Advanced or untreated HIV infection; or

• Received active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids or other drugs that may suppress the body's immune response.

If you have questions, the health department advises talking with your healthcare provider about your medi-

cal condition(s) and whether getting an additional dose is appropriate for you.

It's important to note that Moderna and Pfizer are the only vaccines eligible for the administration of a third dose at this time.

According to the FDA, an additional dose is not currently recommended for individuals who received the Janssen (J&J) vaccine.

Tribes pivot to booster vaccines

Armed with the news that booster shot guidelines are on the horizon, tribal nations in Oklahoma continue their fight against COVID-19 in a state with a low vaccination rate as another surge pushes health care systems to their limits.

"The local Native community is probably vaccinated at a higher rate than their non-Native neighbors, just because we, Indian healthcare in general, have made it extraordinarily easy for them to get vaccinated," said John Bearden, the Wyandotte Nation's Bearskin Health and Wellness Center's clinic compliance officer.

"No portal to have to sign

in to make an appointment somewhere. We've been available as a walk-in vaccination clinic since very early on, and continue to do so."

Bearden said the tribe will continue to provide vaccinations to non-tribal citizens as well.

"Our stance has been and will continue to be that the COVID

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Washington's bold school plan

Washington's Board of Education and Superintendent Chris Reynolds are seeking support from their school patrons for an important school bond election coming in October.

Among projects included in the proposed \$24.5 million include a multi-purpose room, a fine arts building, additional elementary classrooms and an elementary multi-purpose building, elementary media center, updated playground equipment, remodeling of existing classrooms, a new band room, new LED lighting at the football field, new football seating and field and new uniforms and equipment.

Reynolds reports Washington students and staff are currently out of space.

The bond will focus on newly

constructed elementary and secondary classroom spaces.

With an estimated 1,600 new homes to be constructed in the Goldsby area in coming months and years, Reynolds predicts the Washington School System's enrollment will double over time.

In fact, they added 137 new

students just this past summer district-wide.

Growth is coming and Washington School officials are making plans to accommodate the influx of students and staff with this bold new plan.

The band room will be acoustically-designed and have an ensemble room and private practice rooms.

The room will have a direct connection to the football field and house new locker rooms and officials dressing rooms, a new concession stand and new and expanded public restroom facilities.

Also included in the plan is a covered drop-off and pick-up area for the full length of the elementary building.

The time is now for Washington to begin building for the future and future growth.

Each year on August 26th, America celebrates "Women's Equality Day" in remembrance of the adoption of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, prohibiting the states and federal government from denying the right to vote based on gender.

Admittedly, I didn't know this holiday existed until recently, and I'd venture to bet that I'm not the only one who didn't know about this annual celebration. However, the past two years, I've made a point to discuss the day with my kids and pray they understand the significance someday.

Last week, I had the opportunity to speak on a legislative panel hosted by Congresswoman Stephanie Bice and the POWHER PAC, a women's Political Action Committee established in 2021 whose focus is on inspiring conservative, Republican women to run for

office in Oklahoma.

Their mission is important to me, and it was truly humbling to be the first female Oklahoma state senator endorsed by their board, and an honor to have had the opportunity to share my story and how God has worked in my life over the past two and a half years.

While knocking doors, both men and women would ask me questions like, "Who will take care of your kids if you get elected?" and "What kind of mother would do that to their children?" Many times, this question was asked of me by Republican women over the age of 65.

Because Oklahoma is such a biblically focused state, I think we're raised understanding that a woman is meant to be a helpmate to a man. Unfortunately, that oftentimes drives the narrative that a woman's place is at home, cooking, cleaning,

and raising children, and not out trying to change the world.

I remember going home many times feeling defeated after receiving those questions and crawling into bed wondering if I should regret the decision my family had made. But each time, I remember Stephen telling me to stop trying to talk myself out of what I felt God had called me to do and reminding me that we'd figure it out when the time comes.

And just to reassure you, if you were one of those who asked, we have figured it out. We have a lot of help from family and friends, I come home from session as often as possible, and my sweet husband has learned how to braid the girls' hair.

Our kids don't ever starve, and they still participate in

Out-of-touch priorities

Last week, Speaker Nancy Pelosi called members of the U.S. House of Representatives back from their August district work for an emergency session.

However, instead of considering truly pressing matters affecting the safety and security of our nation and allies, she focused debate and votes on ensuring passage of a "budget" in order to usher in \$3.5 trillion in new spending on socialist-style policies and programs through the reconciliation process.

Considering that the budget originated in the Senate and was shepherded by socialist Senator Bernie Sanders, who chairs the Senate Budget Committee, this should not come as a surprise.

In addition to opening the door to trillions in socialist and unsustainable spending, the "Bernie Budget" recommends eliminating tax cuts benefiting middle class Americans and instead greenlights higher taxes for families and small businesses.

In fact, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce reported that

this plan would raise taxes by 33 percent for 1.4 million small businesses. It would also eliminate the small business deduction, which was used by more than 21 million small businesses to invest, hire new workers and increase employee benefits.

For years, high taxes like those outlined in the so-called budget have forced businesses to set up shop overseas and rewarded countries like Communist China.

However, thanks to the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, businesses were able to stay in America and create more jobs for our own citizens.

Indeed, the out-of-touch priorities put forward in the Democrats' budget threaten to reverse the progress made prior to the coronavirus pandemic in growing our economy, encouraging small businesses to expand and hire and creating more job opportunities for Americans.

American farms and ranches, like the thousands located in the Fourth District of Oklahoma, would also be targeted if Demo-

crats eliminate "stepped-up basis" as the budget suggests.

This current policy allows family businesses, including farms and ranches, to be passed down from one generation to the next without being forced to sell off assets in order to pay off a massive capital gains tax, which Democrats have also proposed to double.

According to an economic analysis by the Family Business Estate Tax Coalition, this would destroy family farms, ranches and businesses and eliminate nearly 1 million jobs over the next 12 years.

While the Bernie Budget would take hard-earned money and generational businesses away from American taxpayers, it would elevate and advance Green New Deal-like and socialist programs, including amnesty for illegal immigrants, expansion of government-controlled health care and Medicare, bail outs for poorly run Democratic states and many other "freebies."

Helping small business advertising

Would be a boost to local economies

A little-noticed initiative by Sen. Maria Cantwell, D-Washington, and six other senators would boost local jobs, accelerate sales and improve economies. The Local Journalism Sustainability Act, S. 2434, is designed to help local news media support their newsgathering missions.

One provision goes far beyond offering aid to community newspapers, local news websites and other news-gatherers. It would help small businesses to dig out of the economic doldrums by supporting their advertising costs in local news outlets, which in turn will help publishers and broadcasters to hire journalists.

This provision would permit small businesses to claim a tax credit for a portion of their advertising purchases up to \$5,000 a year. Credits would remain, but in declining amounts, for five years.

The legislation, originally introduced in similar form by Reps. Ann Kirkpatrick, D-

Arizona, and Dan Newhouse, R-Washington, would also help subscribers by providing them with a refundable tax credit up to \$250 a year. It provides financial support for hiring as well, assisting news organizations with journalists' salaries.

It is the advertising tax credit that is the unsung hero of this legislation. Like a pebble tossed into the pond of local economies, it will show the ripple effect of benefits in local jobs, enhanced spending, revenues to run local governments and a boost to get American small businesses back in the game after a very tough couple of years.

Every dollar of advertising spending generates \$8.77 in sales, according to a 2010 study by IHS Global Insight, a firm that periodically measures advertising's impact on economies. Advertising is directly responsible for about 20 percent of the American economy by directly generating jobs in media sales, creation of materials and collateral work but it does far more by juicing activity in other businesses.

No surprise to anyone on Main Street: after the 2008 recession small businesses cut way back on their advertising campaigns, dropping from their normal 3-5 percent annual increases to a stunning 6 percent cut in 2009. It is too soon to know what the COVID-19 pandemic has done to this spending, but it would be no great revelation to learn that the cuts equaled or exceeded those following the Great Recession. Expense cuts are what businesses do to stay afloat.

But when they are ready to climb back into the cockpit for a new takeoff, the spending needs to accelerate rapidly. Cash-strapped businesses may be in no position to fuel their journey though. That is why a little boost in the form of the Cantwell tax credit would be so timely. If the economy behaves as it usually does after economic retraction, the new spending will generate more sales and the public coffers will refill. The bill's benefits end after five years but the growth it generates will pay off for decades.

American young people will be buried by college debt.

Further, reports indicate that we have handed over to the Taliban approximately 22,000 Humvees, 8000 large trucks, 42,000 pick-up trucks, 358,000 assault rifles, 64,000 machine guns and 126,000 pistols, plus 155 mine-proof vehicles.

We have equipped them with billions of dollars of high-priced items that we will pay on forever. They will use American equipment to dominate a defenseless nation of people that will now be left behind to try to survive a revitalized Taliban.

We may be finally leaving Afghanistan, but Afghanistan, for our generation, will never go away.

Preparing for interim studies

Although session has ended, the work of a representative is never over, and I will continue to be busy for the rest of the year.

During the interim, which is the name of the several months during which we're not in legislative session, members will brainstorm, request and prepare for interim studies.

These are studies on a specific area of policy that seek to learn more about the topic and hosted by one of our committees. Interim studies often inspire legislation for the next session.

Members can propose certain topics that may then be approved or combined with another similar topic. Once approved, the study is scheduled and the member hosting it begins inviting stakeholders and experts in the area to speak before the committee.

I will host two interim studies before the House Alcohol, Tobacco and Controlled Sub-

stances Committee.

My first study is on medical marijuana and minor patients. I hope attendees will learn more about the effects of medical marijuana on people under the age of 18, look further into the lack of physician oversight when dealing with medical marijuana patients under 18, and examine how laws in this area may be adjusted as necessary while remaining true to the intent of State Question 788.

I also have an interim study on youth access to tobacco. Tobacco consumption rates in Oklahoma are well above the national average, and roughly 30 percent of high school students have consumed e-cigarettes. The study will consider potential policy proposals that would protect young Oklahomans from tobacco addiction to determine which steps we could take to improve health outcomes.

I am also cohosting an interim study with Rep. Sean Roberts

of Hominy. We will study how healthcare in the state, especially rural healthcare, has generally fared since COVID-19 was first identified in the United States in early 2020. We hope to learn how the pandemic is affecting various aspects of our healthcare system.

I am still working to secure speakers for each study, so they haven't been scheduled yet, but I will share further details about the studies and how to watch it online when they are scheduled.

In addition to preparing for interim studies, we're also preparing for a special session later this fall to complete the redistricting process for legislative and congressional districts. In the meantime, please feel free to reach out with any questions or concerns!

1 small white onion (diced)
Velveeta Cheese Loaf (16 oz.) - cut into 1 inch cubes
12 oz. package Thin Spaghetti Noodles

Cook bell pepper and onion in 2 tablespoons olive oil or butter until almost done.

Cook spaghetti noodles according to package directions.

Combine chicken, pepper and onions with the cooked spaghetti noodles while they are still hot into a slow cooker. Add cubes of Velveeta cheese to the mix and stir until everything is combined and the Velveeta cheese is completely melted.

COVID-19 testing, vaccinations return to Chickasaw Nation in Ada

The United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) issued full approval August 23 of the Pfizer BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine, which will now be marketed under the brand name "Comirnaty."

The approval covers prevention of COVID-19 in individuals 16 years of age and older. The vaccine is still approved under the emergency use authorization (EUA) for adolescents 12-15 years of age, and for the additional booster dose in immunocompromised individuals.

The additional booster dose will be offered to those who meet immune suppressed criteria, beginning August 25, at all Chickasaw Nation Department of Health (CNDH) clinic locations. The additional dose can be scheduled at COVID-Vaccine.Chickasaw.net starting August 25.

In response to the increased presence of COVID-19 in our local communities, the Chickasaw Nation Department of Health (CNDH) has moved all testing and vaccinations to the Emergency Operations Facility (EOF), located at 1300 Craddock Road, in Ada.

Hours of operation have been extended to increase availability to Chickasaw citizens and the community. Drive-thru testing is offered at the EOF from 7 a.m.

to 4 p.m., and vaccinations are available from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Hours of operations at other CNDH satellite clinics in Ardmore, Purcell and Tishomingo are extended to 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Drive-thru locations are identified on the scheduling website. All locations are open Monday-Friday.

The COVID-19 vaccine is available to the public at no cost at sites in Ada, Ardmore, Tishomingo and Purcell. To schedule an appointment, visit COVIDVaccine.Chickasaw.net.

To schedule an appointment for testing, visit CovidTesting.Chickasaw.net.

CNDH leadership stress the importance of getting vaccinated and being tested at the first onset of any symptoms including congestion, runny nose, headache, cough, fever, chills, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, sore throat, fatigue, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, body aches and new loss of taste or smell.

Updated guidelines from CNDH leadership and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommend everyone over the age of two wear masks when outside of their households, and continue to maintain responsible distancing from others.

That's the word from McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley.

Haley said persons who are United States Citizens, residents of Oklahoma and at least 17 1/2 years old are eligible to apply for voter registration. However, you must be at least 18 years old to vote.

Applications must be received by the election board or postmarked no later than midnight, September 17.

Applications postmarked after that will be accepted, but will not be processed until after the October 12 special election. Applications may also be submitted to any motor vehicle agency that is also an official voter registration agency by the submission deadline.

Applicants will be notified in writing when their appli-

cation has been processed. Approved voters will receive a Voter Identification Card in the mail.

Some may receive a letter that explains the reason or reasons the application was not approved. Haley said those who do not receive a response within 30 days of submitting their application should contact the election board office immediately.

The McClain County Election Board reminds voters that applications must be approved by the election board secretary in order to vote.

Registered voters who have moved to McClain County from a different county or state will need to complete a new voter registration application in order to be eligible for elections in McClain County. If you have moved within the county and need to update your address, you may make changes online using the OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/

elections/ovp or complete a voter registration application.

Voter registration applications can be downloaded from the State Election Board website at oklahoma.gov/elections. You may also complete a form at your county election board. Most post offices, tag agencies and public libraries have applications available upon request.

The McClain County Election Board is located at 121 N Second Avenue and is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. For questions, please contact the election board at 405.527.3121 or mcclaincounty@elections.ok.gov

Broomcorn:

on the old Victorian house, and laugh, flirt and have a grand time. You could just see their "batteries" recharging.

Mom put on a spread. Providing the meal was also extra motivation, to come and work. And the "hands" didn't have to eat a stale, sack lunch, that they would have otherwise had to bring with them.

After cutting the broomcorn, it was hauled to the designated area, awaiting the threshing machine. You could do this the same day, or wait for another time. We hauled it on the old "float" to the front side of the broomcorn shed. It had to be threshed (removing the seeds from the cut stalk), which would then reveal the "green" straw of the head minus the seed. This was put into the broomcorn shed to "cure."

It was common practice to hire a threshing machine and operator. The machine was too expensive for most to own; there would be a few around the county. Pop knew where they were.

The thresher was powered by a tractor, parked close, with a long belt and pulley system. It made a lot of noise, and the dust was everywhere (not too much fuzz yet). Large piles of cut broomcorn were on the ground, and the strong men and boys would "buck" as much as they could pick up and carry to a table, where the operator would separate the broomcorn into small stacks that were "fed" through the thresher.

The thresher beat and separated the seed from the straw. When the broomcorn came through, someone else would make little piles to be carried ("pissant") to the shed (this was the correct term in our lexicon). This stage was accomplished by younger kids, both boys and girls, to carry to the shed (yes, that was the exact term.) The girls would also cut the broomcorn and help with the threshing and bailing, but generally not with "bucking" the piles and other heavy work. Today, talking about boys and girls having different jobs, etc., is a slippery slope, but I'm just saying

The broomcorn shed had the common "sheet iron roof" but was distinctive in several ways. It ran east to west in length. There were no ends to the front or back of the large shed, so the southern Oklahoma prevailing winds could blow through. It had about 6 "stalls" (open rooms) running east to west that were about 8 feet wide.

The ends of the shed and all of the dividers that formed the open rooms, were constructed in a clever way. They all were "walled" with, what I remember as 1- by 6 boards, with a space between the boards that was just wide enough to stick a 1 by 2 length of wood, about 8 foot long (slats), between the cracks.

The green threshed broomcorn straw was stacked (not over 3 inches or so deep), and perpendicular on the broomcorn slats, which were about a foot apart. This allowed

rows on top of rows, floor to ceiling, to lay and "cure." The Oklahoma wind and heat did the rest. As anyone knows, who has lived in Oklahoma for most of their lives, harnessing our wind and heat, to do something positive is a rare happening--a "wonderment."

After the broom straw cured, the process of putting it in the shed was reversed. It was carried from the shed to the baler. For me, this was the third, and deepest level, of broomcorn itchiest hell. You tried to cover as much of your body as possible. You buttoned your shirt at the sleeve and at the neck. You wore a cap or hat, and anything else, to keep out the itchy "fuzz."

The cured broomcorn straw was carried out and then put through the bailer. The bailer, as best I can remember, was made of heavy beams and iron straps fashioned in the shape of a box. The sides moved and/or the top squeezed the broom straw into a bale. The baler machine had a long tongue/lever that was attached to the draw bar of a tractor. The tractor was driven in a partial semicircle, which powered the movable sides, compressing the broomcorn straw into the bale.

The highlight of the day, for

the kids, was if the "Baler Man" didn't have enough broomcorn straw for a full bale. If not, this was called a "short" bale, and left an empty space in the baler. The "Baler Man" squeezed himself in the empty spot, and instructed another man to drive the tractor and squeeze the bailer down. After this, the "short bale" was "tied off" and the bailer was opened; the "Baler Man" jumped out, all in one peace, bowed, and much like a circus performer, basked in the applause.

In those days Lindsay was known as the "broomcorn capital" of the world. Pop would drive down, or call a buyer from one of his friend's house phones, and sell the broomcorn bales. We would have supplies and new shoes for the coming school year!

By the time plastics superseded the broomcorn business, three of my siblings had already left home. My parents, who had day jobs in Purcell already, decided not to renew the land rent/lease. They decided "the juice was not worth the squeeze" when it came to "share cropping" in general. We said "goodbye" to farming, forever, and moved to Purcell.

OMRF marks 75 years of discovery

In 1946, a polio vaccine was still years away. DNA was just a group of letters. And no one had any idea cigarettes caused cancer.

But in Oklahoma, a group of citizens recognized that it wasn't enough for physicians to work each day to treat illnesses like tuberculosis, heart disease and cancer.

To make real headway against disease, medicine had to do more.

So, they created an institute where scientists could devote their entire careers to rooting out the causes of human disease: the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation.

Saturday, August 28, marked OMRF's 75th anniversary. On Aug. 28, 1946, Oklahoma's Secretary of State granted the charter of the new foundation that would, in the words of an early fundraising brochure, conduct "scientific investigations in the field of medical research to attack killing and crippling diseases about which little is known by science."

"Oklahoma is a young state, so we sometimes find ourselves playing catch-up," said OMRF Interim President Adam Cohen. "But when it came to creating an independent research institute, we were on the cutting edge."

To fund the construction of OMRF, which would become one of only a handful of independent biomedical research institutes at that time, Gov. Roy J. Turner led a drive that spanned all 77 of the state's counties.

The state's physicians organized one fundraising campaign, and pharmacists, dentists and nurses followed suit with their own efforts. When Turner declared a statewide "Research Week," organizers held 137 meetings in 42 cities and towns over seven days.

"This is one of the finest things we of Oklahoma ever have attempted," said Grace Marlow of Shawnee in 1947, when she and her husband donated \$26,000 to the new foundation in memory of their

late son. "Such a wonderful movement cannot fail."

All told, 7,000 Oklahomans gave more than \$2 million to build the foundation. And what began as an 18-person scientific staff has since grown into an internationally recognized research institute.

OMRF now employs 450 staff members who study cancer, heart disease, autoimmune disorders and diseases of aging. Their discoveries have yielded hundreds of patents and three lifesaving drugs now available in hospitals and clinics worldwide.

Most recently, Adakveo became the first targeted therapy approved by the Food and Drug Administration for sickle cell disease, which affects an estimated 100,000 Americans.

OMRF scientists made crucial insights that paved the way for powerful protease inhibitors that transformed the therapeutic landscape for people with HIV/AIDS.

The National Institutes of Health has designated OMRF

an Autoimmunity Center of Excellence, one of only 10 in the country, for its work on conditions such as lupus, where OMRF researchers have played a role in identifying or confirming more than 60 genes involved in the disease.

OMRF has also taken on emerging challenges like the Covid-19 pandemic. It's now serving as the lead clinical site for a nationwide clinical trial sponsored by the NIH to study why immunocompromised patients fail to respond adequately to COVID-19 vaccines.

"The goal of every medical researcher is to make discoveries that improve people's lives," said Rodger McEver, M.D., OMRF's vice president of research. "OMRF scientists have done that, and they're continuing to do so."

OMRF's founding donors could not have foreseen the advances their gift would make possible. Still, said McEver, "I hope they'd be proud."

OMRF receives grant for ovarian cancer research

The National Institutes of Health has awarded the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation \$450,000 to research promising new ovarian cancer treatments.

OMRF scientist Magdalena Bieniasz, Ph.D., received the two-year grant to test combinations of drugs that may be more effective than current treatments for aggressive forms of ovarian cancer.

"There is a receptor protein that signals tumor cells to multiply faster and survive better," said Bieniasz, who joined OMRF in 2016 from the Huntsman Cancer Institute in Utah. "We are studying drugs that could inhibit this signal."

The presence of this receptor signal is one reason ovarian cancer often develops resistance to traditional therapies. After chemotherapy treatment, this signal promotes the growth of any cancer cells that weren't stopped, producing a new tumor resistant to the previous medicine.

In an effort to slow or prevent this resistance, Bieniasz's lab team plans to pair the compound blocking receptor signaling with a chemotherapy-type drug.

"We know that to achieve the strongest response, there has to be a combination," Bieniasz said. "Two drugs combined may be better than the sum of each by itself."

These drug combinations will be tested on cell models that represent tumors of patients at the University of Oklahoma

Health Stephenson Cancer Center. OMRF scientists will use a targeted approach to treat the models, applying different drug combinations based on cancer type and stage.

"In targeted therapy, drugs are matched to specific tumors that have specific features," said Bieniasz. "We characterize the samples so we know which

tumor would be a good candidate for each treatment."

Bieniasz noted this project will focus not only on what works, but why. Understanding the mechanism of the receptor signaling inhibition will help set

up future studies for more effective treatments.

"The signaling protein is present in nearly half of ovarian cancer patients, and each one of those patients could benefit from this," Bieniasz said.

Specialty Crop Grants now available

Funding opportunities to enhance the specialty crop industry within the state are now available, thanks to stimulus money allocated to the Specialty Crop Block Grant Program through the United States Department of Agriculture's Agriculture Marketing Services.

Eligible applicants include non-profit organizations, local, state, and federal government entities, for-profit organizations and colleges and universities. In addition, individual businesses and producers will be eligible for projects addressing a response to COVID-19.

"The stimulus money for this grant program will provide an opportunity for producers to respond to pandemic challenges as well as help consumers understand the safety of their food," said Jason Harvey,

ODAFA Agriculture Marketing Coordinator.

To be eligible, projects must enhance the competitiveness of an Oklahoma specialty crop. Projects are encouraged to reflect a response to the impacts of COVID-19 but still must follow standard SCBGP rules.

Projects involving the following specialty crops are eligible: fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, culinary herbs and spices, medicinal plants, as well as nursery, floriculture and horticulture crops.

Proposals may be for but not limited to: promotion, marketing, nutrition, food safety and security, education, increased knowledge and consumption, improved efficiency and reduced costs of distribution

September 5, 2021 is the twenty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

The first reading, Isaiah 35:4-7A, says "5 Then will the eyes of the blind be opened, the ears of the deaf be cleared." The responsorial psalm, Psalms 146:6-10, says "8 The Lord gives sight to the blind; the Lord raises up those who were bowed down."

The second reading, James 2:1-5, says we are not to judge others based on anything like clothes or money. "5 Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Did not God choose those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom that he promised to those who love him?"

In the Gospel, Mark 7:31-37, Jesus healed a man who was deaf and mute.

We treasure our senses. We

can see, hear, speak, taste, touch, and smell. With all those abilities, sometimes we still miss important information. Let's focus today on hearing.

Cacophony is one of my favorite words. It means harsh or discordant sounds, like that of an orchestra tuning up. In other words, Noise with a capital "N." It is hard to listen in noise. In the Gospel reading, Jesus took the man who was deaf and mute away from the crowd. Clearly, the noise of the crowd did not disturb the deaf man, but Jesus wanted their encounter to be personal and not part of a "show."

In the same way, Jesus calls us away from the noise into his quiet. Before church begins, we need to be quiet out of respect for: 1) the presence of the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, 2) the needs of others to get away from the noise, and 3) for our own need to listen to the Lord in the quiet.

Jesus wants us to hear him. He wants to reassure us that, like Elijah, he has a plan for each of us. He wants to tell us that even in our darkest moments, like his time on the cross, we will get through this together. He wants to encourage us to stand up for our beliefs and lifestyle, even if we are not in step with society.

The most important hearing we do is often in quietness. Don't let the noise of life block out the sounds of Christ.

Several years ago, I came home from one of my trips to find on my desk a package that had arrived in the mail. I could tell it was a book, but, while I order books regularly, I knew I had not ordered anything recently. When I opened the package, I found a thick, hard-back, red book called, *For Such A Time As This* with a subtitle of *And Other Essays from the Back Page*.

I immediately knew the book was one recently published by an old preacher friend of mine, Carl Johnson. In addition to the thrill of receiving the book, I was equally proud of the note

he had written in the front that said that he wanted me to have his new book as a token of his appreciation for my encouragement to him during the years he wrote "The Back Page," an article he wrote monthly for 15 years that appeared on the back of the long-running "Old Paths Advocate" periodical. I always told Carl that the "back page" was the best part of the paper. Why, sometimes I would not even have to open up the paper to enjoy that month's publication. I would just flip it over to read the back.

Brother Carl, to me, has always been a giant of a man and a preacher. Eight years' age difference makes a big difference when you meet someone

when you're about 12 and then know him your entire life.

Hailing from Ada, Carl starting preaching the gospel right out of college and has held meetings all over the country – from early spring through late fall – for almost half a century. He is one of the few preachers who makes his living primarily traveling and preaching, holding 25 or more meetings each year.

As a preacher, Carl is a good speaker. Saying a "good speaker" may sound unflattering, but it is just the opposite. He is the epitome of a good speaker. He is not as dynamic as


Two of my favorite books in the Bible are Mark and James (and it's not because they are short *smile*). This week, let's look at Mark 8:22-26. This is the only place in the Bible that this particular healing occurs. It is also the only miracle that is progressive in nature. It reads: Jesus and his disciples came

to Bethsaida. Some people brought a blind man to Jesus and begged Jesus to touch and heal the man. Taking the blind man's hand, Jesus led him out of the village. After spitting on his eyes and laying his hands on the man, Jesus asked, "Do you see anything?"

The man looked up and said, "I see people. They look like trees, only they are walking around." Jesus placed his hands on the man's eyes again. This time the man opened his eyes wide. The man's sight was restored, and he could see everything clearly. Then Jesus sent the formerly blind man home, saying, "Don't go into the village!"

There are a few odd things

in this passage. The blind man was brought by people, not necessarily friends, although they did beg Jesus to heal the man. Jesus takes him outside of the village, with the implication that it was just the two of them.

Jesus spits on the man's eyes, but his blindness doesn't go away at once. The man could see shapes, but not clearly. After Jesus touches his eyes again, the man's sight has been completely healed. Finally, Jesus tells him not to go into the village on his way home.

Why did this healing happen the way it did? God alone knows the real reasons, but we can speculate on them. Blindness can be interpreted as a lack of understanding or even a lack of faith. We are often blind to the meaning of certain happenings. This healing is early in Jesus's ministry and early in his training the disciples. He is leading his students step-by-step, like we see in this healing. Jesus may have chosen this method to show the disciples that their spiritual blindness would be healed, but gradually.

Jesus may have wanted to be alone with the man (and the disciples) again to teach the disciples, not dazzle the village. Jesus wasn't quite ready to reveal his mission and who he was. This was an opportunity to build the faith of the blind man and that of

the disciples.

We've all had incidents where our eyelids are "gummy" and we have to wash and rub them to get them separated. Jesus didn't have (or need) eye-drops for soothing—he used his own spit to get them apart. Laying his hands on the man's eyes, Jesus started the cure.

When asked, the blind man said he could see "trees" that could walk. He must have been able to see at some point in his life, or someone had given him a very good description of what trees are. So, Jesus laid his hands on the man a second time. The man opened his eyes widely this time and could see clearly.

Finally, Jesus tells the man to go home, but to avoid the village. Why? The man could avoid the turmoil of the crowd when they found out he could see. It also allowed the man to mull over his healing and make sense of the faith lesson Jesus had taught him. Being with the villagers would have been a distraction from Jesus's true purpose. He wasn't sent to us to concentrate on performing miracles.

A couple of weeks ago, we talked about changes and the steps that making a change takes. Remember that deciding something doesn't mean it is done once and for all. Becoming a Christian doesn't give us instant spiritual maturity.

That's not the end of it at all. We have to continually grow and build our faith in steps. The disciples were starting their faith journey.

Fifty years ago, Ray Stevens wrote a song called "Everything is Beautiful." (He has done a 50th anniversary version with a spoken part on YouTube. You may want to check it out.) A partial phrase from it keeps going through my mind: "There is none so blind as he who will not see. We must not close our minds, we must let our thoughts be free." Let's choose to see.

We invite all of you to meet and worship with us at 9:30 a.m. on Sundays. (Yeah, we know it's a little early, but what about a small sacrifice to be with God once a week?) We continue with Sunday school at 11:00 a.m.

The Wednesday evening Bible class, studying the fourth chapter of Philippians, closely examined the eighth verse where the apostle Paul urged Christians in Philippi to think on things which are true, honorable, just, pure, lovely and commendable. The class looked at each of these categories.

The Sunday morning adult Bible class, still studying the subject of racism, looked at the primary obligation we all have to our fellow man, the obligation to love one another (Luke 10:25-28, Mark 12:29-31).

During the Sunday morning assembly Keith Shackelford brought a lesson on the ascen-

sion of Jesus as recorded in the last four verses of Luke 24 and the first chapter of Acts. After looking at some of the evidence Jesus presented of His resurrection, the sermon examined the record of the ascension itself and the selection of Matthias to replace Judas as an apostle.

The Sunday evening sermon, using the outline of a tract written in 1921 by a well known gospel preacher, outlined five basic principles which the author referred to as the "platform of the church." The first "plank" of the platform is that the Bible, the word of God, is the complete revelation of God (John 14:26). The second plank is faith, noting that faith comes from hearing the word of God

(Romans 10:17).

The third and fourth planks involve obedience (James 2:21-24) and how that glorifies God (1 Cor 10:31). And the final plank is enjoying the promises of God as He is able and dependable to keep them (2 Peter 3:9, 2 Corinthians 7:1).

Now, I hesitate to put our good brother up on a pedestal so much as to embarrass him – and, I can tell you, he is already humbled by this tribute. That's the gentleman he is. But I cannot describe my friend without mentioning that his best quality may be a certain grace that he carries with him, both in the pulpit and out. He has that unique ability to be genuinely gracious and engaging to others when he greets them, always sharing a big, heartfelt Oklahoma smile and a sincere "Good to see you!" every time you meet.

You know how you look at

people and try to borrow just a little bit of some quality they have. The quality from Carl that I have always sought—or, more accurately, "wished for"—is that rare grace. He is a big man physically, but I have always considered him a bigger man in graciousness.

So, you can understand why I was thrilled to receive a personal, autographed copy of his book. When I got it, I immediately looked for one particular article I had read some years ago, one that had long stuck with me, called, "God Bless You." Sure enough, I found it on page 309 of his new book. Carl used a sermon with that title to close out a meeting he held for us in Lexington several years ago, referencing several key scriptures that contain blessings. I never forgot the sermon nor the article.

I have been changed in a

very good way, I believe, by this simple lesson from my good brother. You see, now, whenever I say, "God bless you," or – as I am more apt to say – just "God bless," I try to make sure I mean it sincerely.

If God allows us to bestow a blessing on another, we want to try to offer it in a way that the Lord will answer the plea with a true blessing.

Carl had no way of knowing this lesson has stuck with me for such a long time, that it would be the first one for which I would look when I took his new book in my hand. And he certainly has no idea the impact the latter part of his handwritten note would have, as he concludes, graciously, with this benediction:



pandemic isn't just a tribal, county, state or national problem," Bearden said. "It would do little good to limit our COVID vaccination and COVID testing to just tribal members, if the folks that they work with, go to school with and worship with are still susceptible. The healthier our communities are, the healthier our tribes are."

With the rise in cases, notably from the delta variant, Oklahoma tribes have adopted other measures to help defeat the virus. Some have gone so far as shutting down all Labor Day activities. Mask mandates remain in place for some tribes, although Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt never implemented a statewide mask mandate.

Meanwhile, Oklahoma has fully vaccinated 1.73 million residents, or 43.6 percent of the population.

The Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, the state's largest tribe, reports 70 percent of its employees have been vaccinated, nearly doubling vaccination rates in some Oklahoma counties.

The upcoming use of booster shots was announced by President Biden before the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) met to approve boosters or formalize guidelines.

There is nothing different about the booster shot, which is a third dose of the same vaccine as the initial two doses. Still, Bearden said, the Indian Health Service (IHS) cannot give tribal nations any formal guidance on boosters until the committee acts on August 30.

Some Oklahoma tribes are not waiting.

Chickasaw Nation Department of Health locations in Ada, Ardmore, Purcell and Tishomingo began offering the additional booster dose on August 25 to those who meet immunocompromised criteria.

Oklahoma tribes such as the Choctaw, Cheyenne and Arapaho, Citizen Potawatomi, Absentee Shawnee and Wyandotte Nation are following CDC, IHS and FDA guidelines and will likely begin booster shots about September 20.

IHS also is getting ready for the booster shot.

Following the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and CDC guidelines as they become available, IHS Chief Medical Officer Dr. Loretta Christensen said her agency is preparing to offer booster vaccines in the fall for those who have had the Pfizer or Moderna vaccinations, starting eight months after a patient's second dose.

"At that time, the individuals who were fully vaccinated earliest in the vaccination rollout, including many health care providers, nursing home residents, and other seniors, will likely be eligible for a booster," Christensen said.

Oklahoma City's IHS Area Office is expected to be the primary booster vaccine provider and distributor for many tribes in Oklahoma, such as the Citizen Potawatomi Nation's Health Service, according to Citizen Potawatomi Chief Medical Officer Dr. Adam Vascellaro.

Vascellaro said the OKC-IHS vaccine supply appears to be "much higher than before" and booster vaccine distribution will be through in-clinic appointments, strike teams and mass vaccination events. Other tribes will be administering boosters alongside their pre-existing COVID-19 vaccination programs.

The Cheyenne and Arapaho and Absentee Shawnee tribes said they are working with IHS to ensure they receive a sufficient number of booster doses for their tribal and community members that the CDC has deemed a priority for booster

shots.

The FDA released a statement on August 18 that the Moderna and Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine would be evaluated for safe and effective use for booster shots, pending CDC approval.

Previously, the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, which will be remarketed under the brand name "Comirnaty," had been approved for emergency use authorization, which remains in place for children ages 12-15 and immunocompromised individuals, according to a press release from the FDA.

IHS also anticipates that booster shots may be needed for the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, consistent with approved FDA and CDC guidelines.

Vasquez:

in the sentencing phase of his trial began Tuesday afternoon.

Prosecutors are seeking the death penalty.

The other felony counts for which he was convicted are unlawful removal of a dead body and pattern of criminal offenses.

Jurors recommended a term of five years and a \$5,000 fine on the first and two years and \$25,000 fine on the second.

Vasquez, of Oklahoma City, is the first of three defendants to be tried in the 2018 murders of Shalayah Toombs and her unborn child.

According to an affidavit, Toombs, who was seven months pregnant, was reported missing from an apartment in southwest Oklahoma City on April 29, 2018.

On May 2, 2018, Vasquez was driving a pickup belonging to co-defendant Joshua

Finkbeiner, 33, and ran out of gas south of the Goldsby exit on I-35.

He walked to the Love's on State Highway 9 West where he contacted a Chickasaw Lighthouse Police officer and told him there was a murder victim in the pickup.

McClain County sheriff's deputies found Toombs' body in the pickup's back floorboard.

Finkbeiner, of Oppelo, Ark., and Staci Harjo, 45, of Oklahoma City, were arrested in

Arkansas and returned to Oklahoma.

Prosecutors here charged Finkbeiner with two counts each of first-degree murder and conspiracy, kidnapping and pattern of criminal offenses.

Harjo is charged with two counts of conspiracy, possession of a firearm after a former felony conviction, kidnapping and pattern of criminal offenses.

Their trials are scheduled for 2022.

The investigation uncovered more than 1,100 fraudulent transactions on the business account, the owner's credit cards and other accounts.

Those transactions include :

- 95 fraudulent checks and direct deposits on the Ben Hayes Construction account totaling \$410,780.45;
- 318 fraudulent charges on one credit card for \$64,520.33;
- 174 fraudulent charges on a second credit card for \$64,806.82;
- 151 fraudulent charges on a third credit card for \$11,567.37;
- 361 fraudulent charges on a fourth credit card for

\$137,752.26;

• 39 fraudulent charges on a credit card obtained by Linda Elliott using the company owner's identity totaling \$2,167.40;

• 7 fraudulent charges on a fifth credit card for \$4,795.07; and

• 33 fraudulent charges on the company owner's Amazon account totaling \$4,074.76.

According to the OSBI, Linda Elliott faces 27 felony counts, including 12 counts of embezzlement, 10 counts of violating the Oklahoma Computer Crimes Act, three counts of identity theft and one count each of exploiting the elderly and conspiracy.

Her husband, Keith Elliott, faces three counts of receiving stolen/embezzled property, two

counts of obtaining money by false pretenses and one count of conspiracy.

afraid to admit that. They also know they can count on me to work hard alongside them to figure out a resolution to anything that comes our way.

We are problem solvers and seek ways to help students and families any way that we can. Dealing with the pandemic can bring you down if you let it. 

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation

Each week that goes by I have been able to see an increase in the number of veterans claims our volunteers have been able to help us to process. Also, the quality continues to improve as our volunteers receive more of our in-house training. I believe that we will be able to continue to increase the number of veterans and surviving spouses that we assist each week.

Last Thursday our triage team was able to assist 45 veterans with their claims for service-connection of a new disability or for an increase of an existing service-connected disability. When our triage teams meet with a veteran their VA claims folder has been reviewed, this then enables our team member to know what disabilities should be reevaluated or to file for a secondary condition to an existing disability.

When we review a veterans VBMS records his or her service medical records are usually available to our accredited volunteers. By having this access

to view veterans records we can probably find the evidence that will support the veterans claim for service connection of an injury that occurred in the military.

One of the most common secondary conditions that many veterans have been diagnosed with is depression that was caused by an injury or disability that was caused by or aggravated while in the military. An example could be depression caused by a back injury that occurred in the military and has been granted service connection. Many people who have chronic back pain will suffer from depression.

For those of you who are following our story. One of our drivers Clayton Lee found a small six-inch square wooden urn with a Marine emblem attached on the side of Highway 62 near Blanchard. One of our other volunteers Brad Nelson was given the task to find out whose ashes were inside and to return them to the family.

We believe that the urn was stolen during a burglary and discarded when they figured out what they had taken. Brad posted his search on Facebook where it has had over 50,000

hits along with three tv stations broadcasting information. We would like to see this Marine's ashes returned to his family as soon as possible. A photo is available on our Facebook page.

We are always looking to add more volunteers. How many people we have behind the scenes affects how many people we can serve. If you have a little extra time on your hands, please take the opportunity to help us help others.
